10 Escapes In 3 Years Prisoners Flee Using Hacksaw And Grease

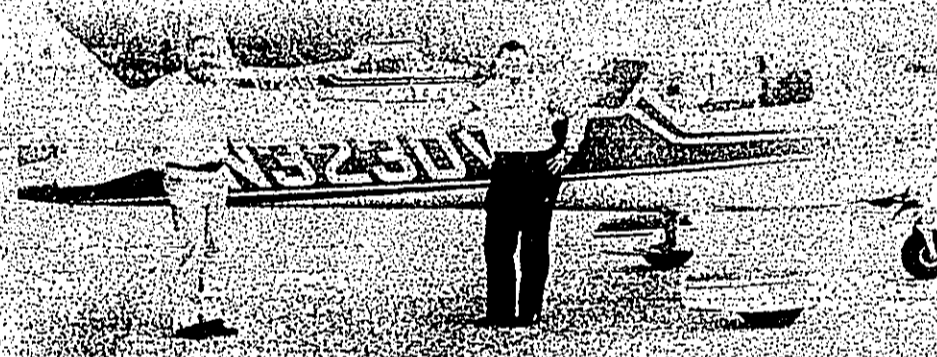
Three more prisoners have escaped from the Tyler County Jail... This brings the total to 10 escapes within a three year period... The get-away Monday night around 10 p.m. of two burglary suspects and a person accused of passing a forged instrument now will face charges of felony escape which were filed by Precinct Justice Frank Grimes around midnight Monday... Juvenile Probation officer Roger Harvill made the discovery when he went up to check on a noise... The three which were originally arrested by Deputy Floyd Derr include Gary Lee Parks, 29, of Pennsylvania; Richard Allen Lile, 25, of Dallas; (both wanted for apparently burglarizing a Warren residence) and Billy Ray Grant, 19, of Hillister, suspected of passing a forged instrument... As of late Tuesday, no apprehensions had been made in the case of all of Region II law enforcement officers had been advised on the escapes.

Airport Operator Touches Down

Tyler Countians will have the opportunity to learn to fly, charter airplanes and receive the benefits of having an "active" airport, according to Buell Owen, president of A.B.C. Aviation, which began operations at the Tyler County Airport Saturday... Owen, also a pilot and flight instructor of 18 years, will operate the Cessna Flight Center, offering flight school to interested persons... "With this course the student can begin anytime and progress at their own rate," he said. "It takes an average of 16 weeks to complete the course and receive a Private Pilot's License." Teaching the course with Owen is George Turk, a 6-year flight instructor... The flight course requires 35 hours of ground school and 40 hours of inflight training, approximately half of which is done solo... Owen said students receive the lessons four times by listening to the audio-visual tapes, reading the flight manual, workbooks and personal instruction... The student starter kit includes the flight manual, workbook, maps, logbook and the computer needed to figure air time, distance, fuel consumption wind correction, etc... Also by having an active airport, Owen said, "is that it opens the door to the county. Many businesses won't locate in an area that doesn't have an active airport." Owen said air attractions also benefit from a working airport. "Most pilots just look for place to fly over the weekend. Things like the Dogwood Festival, Heritage Gardens and area fishing are good weekend trips," he said... Plans for the Unicom System are included for the future of the county airport. This system will allow Owen to maintain radio contact with all aircraft. This encourages pilots to land at the airport to refuel or perform maintenance... For the present, Owen and Turk will be at the airport Saturday's and Sunday's for the next four weeks. They will be able to answer any questions regarding the flight school and will do demonstration flights... Chester Awaits Tax Figures

With the Houston firm of Underwood, Neuhaus acting as bonding agents for the Chester Independent School District as they approach their \$700,000 school bond issue fiscal agent for the district, Jim Shaw, says they are still having trouble tying down the actual tax increase impact information... According to Shaw, the firm was awaiting mineral and utilities property figures from the firm of Fritchard and Abbott which the board hopes will carry some of the tax weight in a positive way. Shaw said the firm had just delivered the information Tuesday but still had to have District approval before the information could be released to the Chester community... With the current tax rate per hundred dollar valuation set at \$1.45 with \$1.29 set for maintenance and \$.16 for debt service the board heard projections from Shaw at a recent meeting which suggested what the increase might be... According to board trustee, Leo Vinson, the board was told those increases might settle about 30-35 percent higher than the current valuation. Shaw emphasized that those figures were, however, subject to reports from the mineral and utilities properties information... Shaw said that his firm was preparing a brochure to be handed out soon to district patrons prior to the election and in the next few days the handout would be available... Shaw said he couldn't release the new impact information gathered by the valuation engineers because it would cause a lot of false information at a time when things were confusing enough... Shaw said also that since there was a fairly severe range of home values in Chester that was also making the valuation job somewhat difficult... As of this date C.I.S.D. patrons have only 13 days till the vote on May 20... The \$700,000 program, which is the first for Superintendent David Malone, calls for a new elementary school which will occupy an estimated 16,000 square feet. Malone has said that renovation of the existing facility would cost approximately \$5 per square foot. The new facility will cost \$2,500 per square foot according to estimates from Architects Dixon-Dixon and Bullock. The new facility will be built on the site of the original school which was built in 1915... Other elements of the bond election call for demolition of an existing building, (estimated cost \$9,000); Air conditioning, high school, (\$70,000); repair foundation to existing high school (\$3,000) and a soils analysis, (\$2,000)... According to Malone the school district staff will convert the existing school cafeteria into a band hall and will convert the tax office and superintendent's office into a special education classroom... The total cost of the construction and repairs, along with bond and architects fees comes to an estimated \$680,000 with \$20,000 designated also for football field lights and for new furniture... Voters will vote in the school cafeteria 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Thursday, May 20.

Jimmy Wayne Davis, 35, of Colmesneil, announces his candidacy for Justice of the Peace, precinct 3, in the May 6 elections... A graduate of Colmesneil High School and Southwestern Louisiana University, he presently owns and operates Jimmy's Auto Parts and Hardware in Colmesneil... Davis served in the United States Navy for four years as an Aviation Ground Flight Instructor... He served as Chief of the Colmesneil Volunteer Fire Department for two years and is presently acting as secretary/treasurer of that organization... The Davis' live in Colmesneil and have two children... "I ask for your support on May 6 for Justice of the Peace in precinct 3. I'll be available for your service 24 hours a day," Davis said.

Sorensen, of Warren, will serve as Election Judge. The Republican County Convention will be held Saturday, May 13 at a time and place to be announced later.

Know Your Farm Bureau

The time has come for the American Farmer and Rancher to stand up and be counted. It is a tragic situation when the Congress of this great nation of ours has to speak a state by voting to give to them the right to prevent controversy. I speak of the GIVE AWAY of the Panama Canal to a Dictator who had said that plans had been made to dig the canal out of operation the next day and the Senate ratified the treaty.

Another point I feel should be made is the increasing power of Organized Labor. We uphold the right of employees to bargain collectively for their services, but this right must be exercised with consideration for the public interest and the rights and interest of others. We condemn either the rights of Management of Labor to force, coerce, or intimidate or any other unfair means designed to force its will upon the other.

We maintain that a high standard of living is possible only through high productivity and therefore condemn such practices as "slow-down", "make-work", "feather-bedding", and the prohibition of improvements in technology.

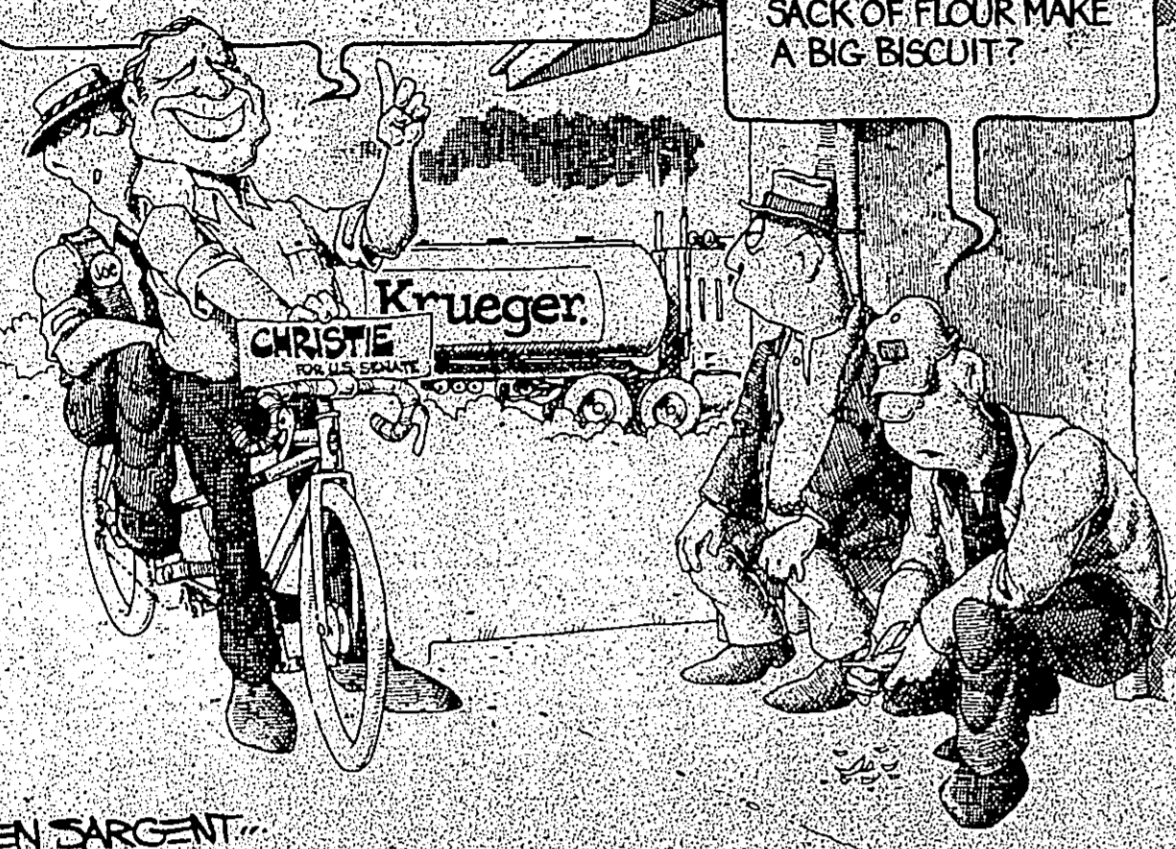
We hold that the Constitution of the United States guarantees to each individual the freedom to engage in worthwhile work and that this freedom is not contingent upon the paying of dues to any individual or organization. We favor retention of the right of states to enact "right to work" legislation and vigorously oppose the repeal of Section 14(b) of the Taft-Hartley Act.

We believe that if should not be the function of the federal government to determine whom the employer may hire. Strikers should not be eligible to purchase food stamps, collect unemployment benefits, or receive welfare payments. We recommend legislation that will prohibit use of compulsory dues for political purposes.

Notes From An Oldtimer

Now that political campaigns are in full swing, I am reminded of a story that Henderson, Texas, U.S. Representative from Arkansas and son-in-law of Samuel Bronson Cooper of Beaumont and Woodville, used to tell about one of his father-in-law's campaigns right here in Tyler County. Sam Bronson Cooper had been serving in Congress for fourteen years when old Martin Dies, Jr., decided to unseat him.

Remember what an orator Martin Dies, Jr., was? He was the hazzardous address for the 1927 graduating class of Woodville. Well, he was a chip off the old block. All those Dies men were great speakers. Even if they didn't have much new to say, they could spellbind an audience with the way they said it.

Congress was held over that year, 1908, and Mr. Cooper couldn't get back in time to start his campaign before Mr. Dies got the jump on him and had his campaign rolling. Where Mr. Cooper had left friends when he went to Washington, he came back to find political enemies and he had a hard row to hoe to make up the lost time. Martin Dies, Sr., had done his work well.

There was a bandstand on the courthouse lawn once where many a political rally was held. The speaker stood on the platform with the ever-present table with its pitcher of water and glass by his side. The audience sat on wooden benches or the grass or leaned against trees or posts or even the building itself.

It was in just such a setting on a hot day in late summer that Mr. Cooper faced a particularly hostile crowd.

Bronson Cooper was a sweet speaker, but he wasn't the orator old Martin Dies was. He was having trouble keeping his listeners' attention. They like all good Tyler Countians, were willing to give the man a chance, but the sun was hot and they were fidgety-some were even drifting away.

Just as Mr. Cooper was beginning to feel that his was a lost cause, he felt a tug on one of the tails of his swallow-tail coat. He stopped speaking and looked down into the flushed, tear-stained face of a little fellow who was asking for a drink of water.

The audience stilled while Bronson Cooper silently poured the water and waited for the child to get it done. He took the little boy by the hand and together they stepped forward to the front of the platform.

Mr. Cooper loosened his string tie, cleared his throat, and in solemn but gentle tones began:

"I've seen my share of the run of things. I've wandered many a weary mile. I've never seen nothing that could or can get the good out of the heart of a man. Like the hand of a little child!"

The crowd stood up and clapped and cheered. Tears were in the eyes of some. You can be sure Mr. Dies didn't like that boy.

Now, folks, that's spollitickin'!

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Texas has one of its hottest statewide elections in care coming on Saturday, but interest is waning. Secretary of State Steve Oaks, who has been moving registration and absentee voting, predicts the turnout may drop below the modest 29 percent for 1974 primaries.

Oaks said only a remarkable near-legendary surge in absentee voting would give the election any real momentum. He said that the turnout of low participation calculations.

At the same time, the commission also approved \$528 million 1978 civilian signal program for the federal highway system, subject to Federal Highway Administration approval. It includes 94 projects in all sections of the state.

Wins Microwave Oven Says Wilson

It's Open Season On OSHA

WASHINGTON—Congressman Charles Wilson announced today the introduction of legislation prohibiting federal interference with hunting on both public and private lands in East Texas.

OSHA's adverse ruling on the sport of East Texas is the most astonishing, absurd and disgusting action taken by an agency which specializes in the astonishing, absurd and disgusting. Wilson said, "OSHA is absolutely off-the-wall on this one."

WILSON'S LEGISLATION will preclude OSHA (Occupational Health and Safety Administration) from any involvement or intervention to restrict hunting, recreational sport shooting and fishing. The bill which amends the Occupational Health and Safety Act of 1970 also removes from OSHA jurisdiction the ability to establish safety or health standards for work performed in any location which is customarily used for the above recreational activities.

If OSHA is going to take it that far," said Wilson. "Then skateboards, archery, demolition derby and topless dancing on wobbly tables should have OSHA safety regulation—where does it all end?"

The OSHA ruling was triggered by a case in North Louisiana in which a forest management technician for Olinchraft complained to OSHA that it was unlawful for him to be in the forest at the same time as hunters. OSHA sided with the technician and fined Olinchraft \$540 for violating the regulation starting that employers must provide a safe working environment for employees. An appeal of this ruling is now in the courts.

"I'm just surprised that OSHA didn't test this brain storm out on rats first. I can feasibly see them issuing a report saying that hunting is prohibited on timber lands because 2 out of 3 rats in a controlled testing died of gun-shyness," said Wilson. "I'm seriously thinking of introducing a bill to include hot-shot OSHA inspectors a fair game in East Texas. I would certainly mind having one mounted for my congressional office."

Landry Says 'No' To Gambling

DALLAS—Dallas Cowboy Coach Tom Landry said Sunday that legalization of gambling in Texas would damage professional sports in the state.

"Every one of the professional sports commissioners including Pete Roselle of the National Football League oppose gambling," Landry said. "It has a tendency to influence players, officials, coaches and fans' just as it does jockeys, veterinarians, trainers, horse owners and race fans where participation in an area influences people who would generally gamble."

Landry added, "It affects young people in the area by letting on football games. Association gives gamblers an edge and more opportunity for manipulation. My major problem with legalized gambling," added the coach of the Super Bowl champion Cowboys, "is that it puts a sanction on gambling people who watch professional sports are not gamblers, but whenever you legalize gambling in one area, such as horse racing, then fans tend to accept it in other sports."

He said, "Fans tend to be emotional enough about the outcome of games without increasing the climate for gambling and thereby escalating the violence of their reaction about victory or defeat."

What Lawn Grass To Plant?

By CLINTON R. CURRIE, County Extension Agent

During spring lawn grass planting time, the question often asked, "What is the best lawn grass for planting?" There is no perfect lawn grass. Every choice has good and bad qualities. The good turf, safe selection will depend on the condition of your lawn in the condition under which the grass must grow.

There are six basic permanent lawn grasses from which to choose in North and East Texas.

St. Augustine, which is popular in the average-sized lawn, is perhaps best known for its shade tolerance. It is also known for its serious insect and disease problems. St. Augustine, which cannot be planted from seed, demands high maintenance with regard to fertilization, summer watering, frequent mowing, and insect and disease control. This grass will offer the greatest "dark green" turf of the underground runners in reasonably fast growth and coverage. Floratam, a St. Augustine hybrid, is now available but risky in our area due to possible cold damage.

Common Bermuda is perhaps the most popular lawn grass in North and East Texas. This grass, which may be established from seed, is quick and comparatively inexpensive to establish. The major disadvantage of common Bermuda is its inability to grow in shade or beneath trees. Bermuda grasses, insect and disease problems are not serious. Its maintenance is high in regard to fertilization, summer watering, and control of the underground runners in flower beds and cultivated areas.

Hybrid Bermudas are relatively expensive to establish, but they are used in Texas. Zoysia and Meyer Emerald, and the very slow-growing Midway Centipede grass is very much at home in the sandy, acid soils of East and North Texas. Compared to other lawn grasses, this one demands the least maintenance in that it does not like high fertilization, is heat tolerant, and has few insect and disease problems. Centipede will grow in partial or filtered shade and may be planted from seed, but seeding, however, may result in erratic germination; therefore, it is best planted from vegetative parts.

Carpet grass, too, is a low maintenance grass, yet one that lacks the beauty and polish of other lawn grasses. Carpet is often used over large areas where maintenance becomes a serious problem. It has no major insects and diseases, yet poor drought tolerance. Carpet grass may be planted from seed.

Jamboree goers were treated to good food, lively entertainment and were able to get a close look at the newest and best in radio equipment during the day long event.

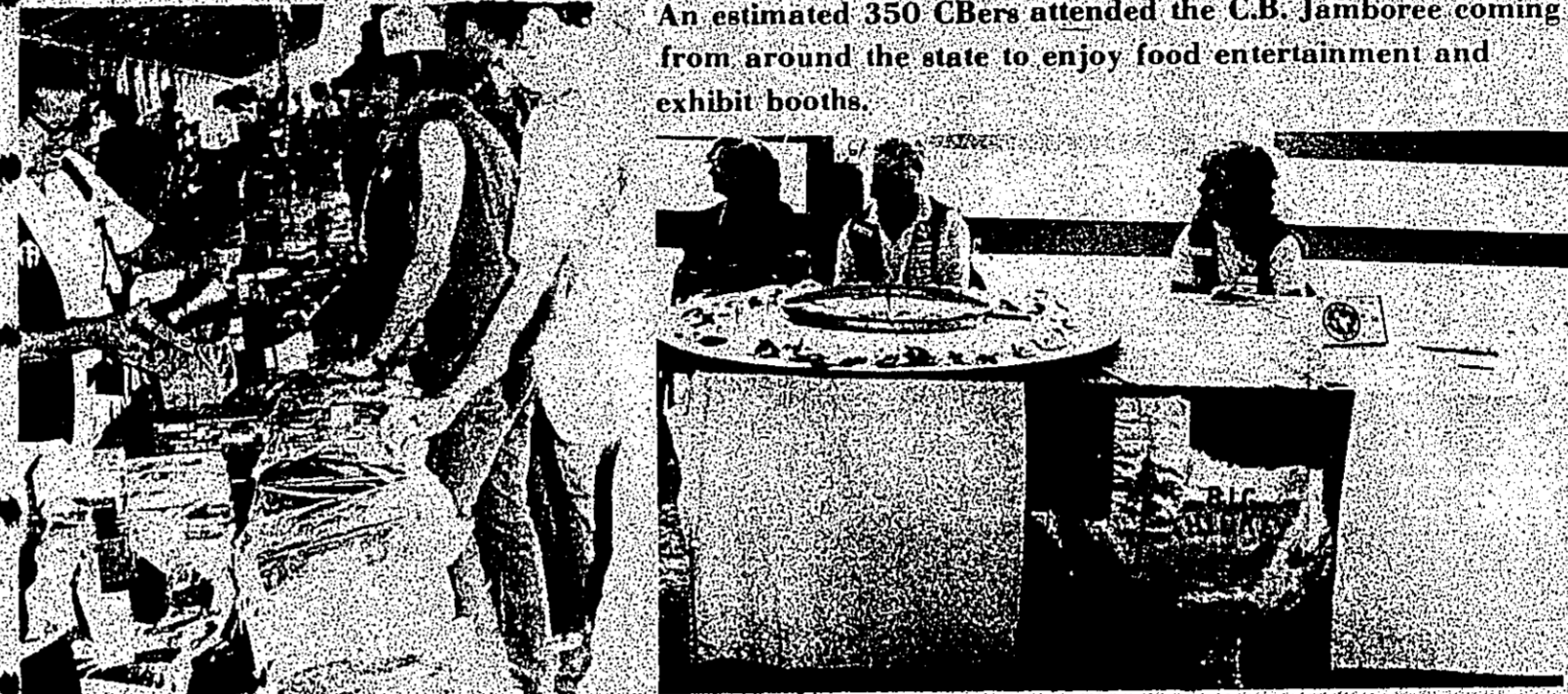
Entertainment was provided in part by the Dogwood Country Square Dancers, a male beauty contest which hosted the "ugliest ladies in the world" and some "down home country music."

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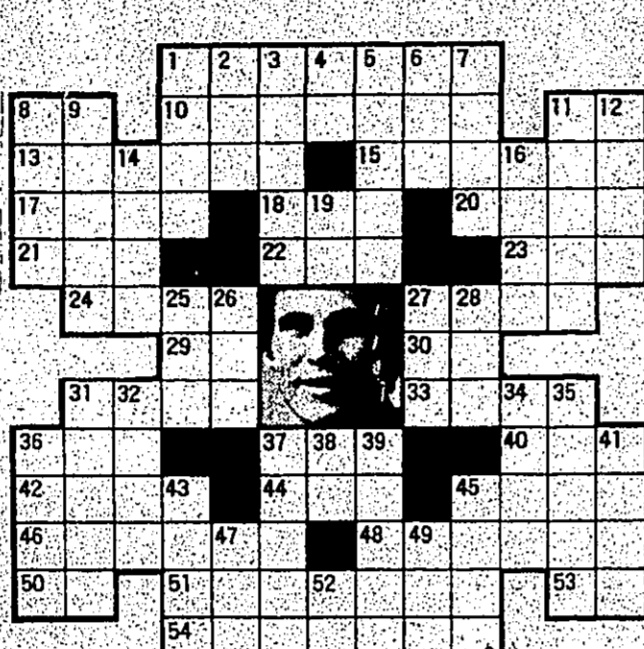
