Denman Case Gets Grand Jury Date



'Her Honor'
How Can A Country Girl From Cobb Mill Road Become The Mayor of South Pasadena, California? You'll find out today in the Editorial Pages of The Tyler County Booster in Phebe Armstrongs "Notes From An Oldtimer." (Page 2-A)

The autopsy report on 16 year old Kenneth Ray Denmon who died June 5 after participating in a Physical Education class at the Warren High School, revealed that the youth had died of a "cardiac arrest" brought on reportedly after the boy had over exerted himself while playing basketball.

The autopsy was performed by Dr. Walter Hathaway of Wilcox Laboratories in Beaumont.

According to the youth's parents, Mr. and Mrs. D.L. Denmon, of Fred, Hathaway told them that the "arrest" was placed in the showers.

Carolyn Denmon, the boy's mother said that several students and friends of her sons had told her that the coaches "forced" Kenny into the showers trying to cool him

off after he got weak.

According to an account in the Beaumont Enterprise Tuesday, May 16, edition School Superintendent Adolph Hryhorchuk would not comment on the fact that the boy was forced but did state that the coaches wanted to "cool him off."

According to District Attorney George Kirkpatrick, his office is investigating the death. "Anytime someone dies under unexplained circumstances it is our duty to look into it," he said.

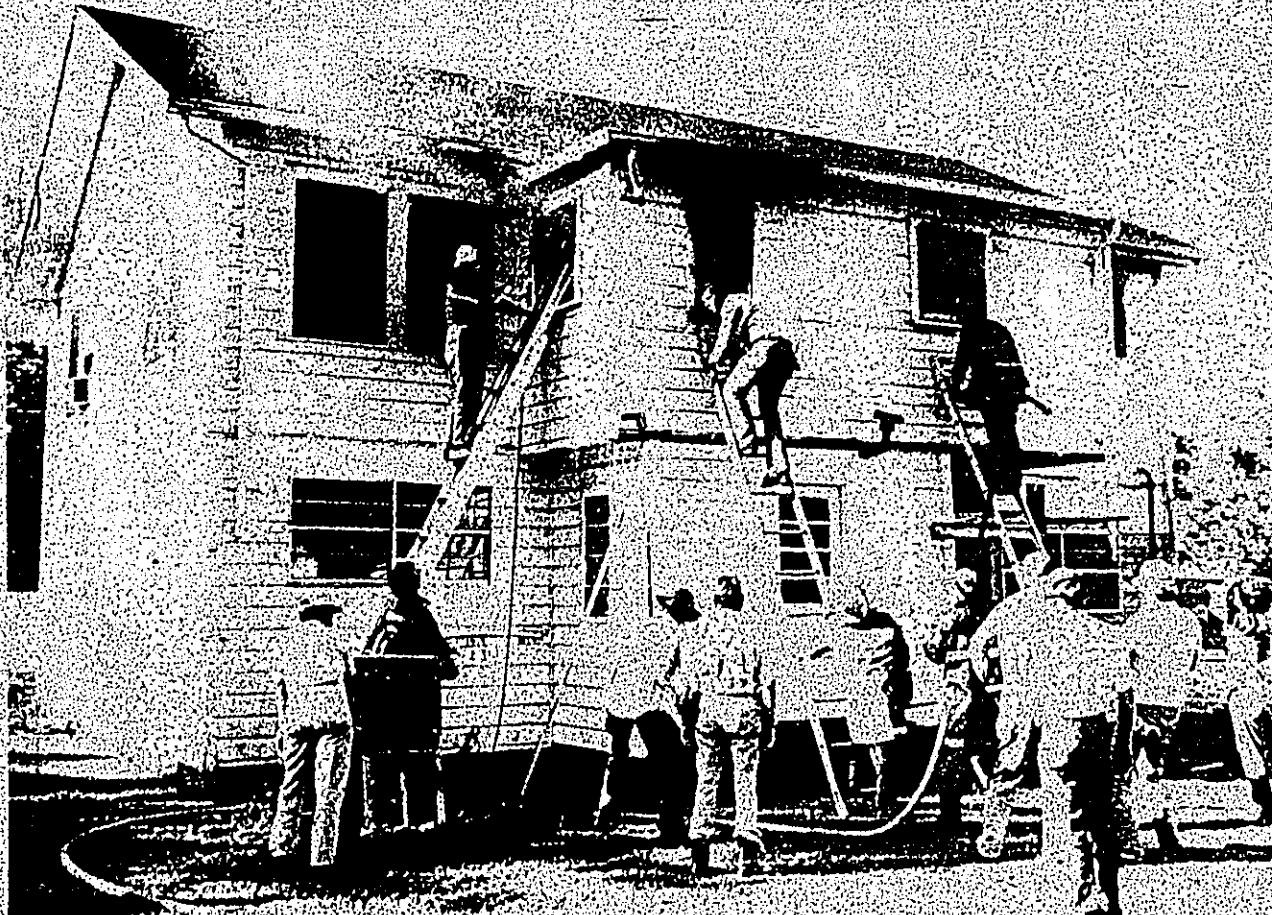
Kirkpatrick also stated that witnesses would be questioned throughout the week. The case is expected to go before the grand jury on June 23.

In an earlier statement to the Booster, Carolyn Denmon said that her son was forced to

participate in active sports after they had reportedly asked the school several times to limit Kenneth's activities.

Hryhorchuk said that although they had not received any written request limiting the youths activities from the parents or doctors, that the boy had been placed in what he called a "modified activity program."

According to Warren Coach Gene Isabell, following the class the Denmon youth became visibly weak, alarming his schoolmates who rushed out and got the coach and another member of the staff. Isabell said that they began resuscitation on the boy but no mention of the shower which Mrs. Denmon referred to was made by the coach.

Largest Mantel Clock To Begin Ticking May 27

WOODVILLE—At noon Saturday, May 27, the Market Square and City Hall clock of Houston will once again ring out its chimes and begin a new career as the World's Largest Mantel Clock at Heritage Garden Village.

The museum is being opened to the public from 11 a.m. until 2 p.m. so they may witness the clock begin its work again.

C.A. "Neal" Pickett, the oldest living former Mayor of Houston, will officially dedicate the clock and cut the ribbon which holds the pendulum back.

Taking part in the program will be Buddy Gilbert and Gini Stevens, both of whom are active in television and movies; Gilbert, who played the Lee Harvey Oswald TV movie, has just completed playing with Johnny Cash in a film made in San Antonio. They plan a skit on "Time."

Also appearing on the program will be Jimmy Lashio, the Burmese country-western singer who is appearing in the major night clubs of Houston. He has just completed a film for the Buick company, which will later be used as a commercial.

Congressman Charles Wilson has notified Heritage

Garden that he will fly down from Washington, D.C., to participate on the program.

Norm Johnson, of the KGRH, Henderson, will serve as master of ceremonies and greetings will be extended by the Mayor of Woodville, Terry Watts. Others on the day will include County Judge Allen Sturrock, Roland Poncho-public relations director for the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation, Chief Fulton Battle of the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation, Walt Broemer, Texas Indian Commissioner and representative of Discover Texas Association, Bertis W. Best, president of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce, and Mr. Goldman of Washington, D.C., guest of Congressman Wilson.

Found after 38 years of gathering dust in a forsaken junk yard, the clock was identified by the Seth Thomas Clock Company of Thomaston, Connecticut, who is sending a representative to be here for the ceremonies.

The clock was found and authenticated by Clyde E. Gray, owner and operator of the well known museum village here. It was built at a cost of \$702.98 in 1903, shipped by the Mallory Steamship line to Houston and installed there in one of the towers of Market Square at a total cost of \$1100.00. Today, museum and antiquity experts have valued this uniquely designed mantel clock at \$125,000.00. As far as is known, it is the world's largest mantel clock.

It will be of great interest to school children as well as adults as they will be able to walk inside and look at the many parts and weights needed to operate the mechanism, Gray pointed out.

The base is 24 by 47 feet and the height is 55 feet, not counting the seven-foot weather vane. The clock faces, enhanced with the zodiac signs around them, measure 14 feet in diameter. The bob for the pendulum is made of brass and shaped into a five-foot Texas Star. Together, the bob and pendulum will measure 20 feet in length.

The first floor of the clock will be used to house a Museum of Time, featuring artifacts and photographs sent by the Smithsonian Institute and the Seth Thomas Clock Company. The second floor of the tower will place visitors where they may see the clock actually operate and the giant weights hanging from the ceiling. If you watch closely, Gray said, you can see the hands move as they tick away the seconds. This huge dial is illuminated so it may be visible day or night to anyone driving down Highway 190.

Information on the clock, Gray said, has been sent to the headquarters of the Guinness Book of World Records in Middlesex, England. The clock has created such interest Gray continued, the event will be covered by all three TV Networks as well as a remote radio broadcast.

Chester Bond Vote Saturday

Voters in the Chester Independent School District will go to the polls this Saturday, May 20, to decide the future of the District's Proposed \$700,000 School Improvement Program.

Approval of the bonds would bring about the construction of a New Elementary School for K-6th grade with two special classrooms, an Auditorium/Cafeteria structure will anchor the New School which will be adjacent to and north of the High School Gymnasium. The cost of this structure alone is estimated at \$520,000.00.

Other improvements and bond features include:

- Air Conditioning of the High School
- A minor foundation repair to the High School
- Conversion of the cafeteria building to a band hall
- Demolishing the disbanded building on campus
- Demolishing the present elementary building upon the completion of the new building
- Soils Analysis Costs
- Furniture and equipment

- Football Field Lighting Improvements

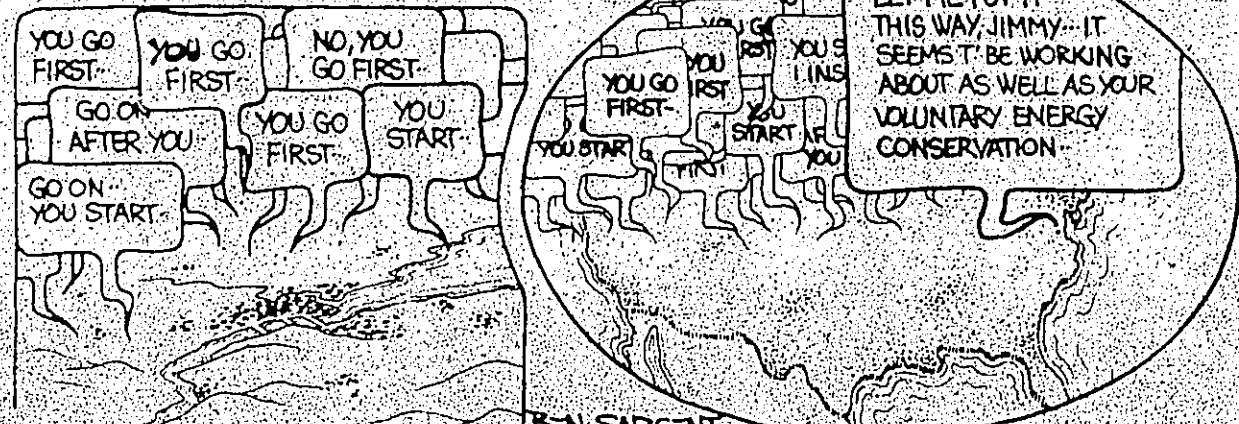
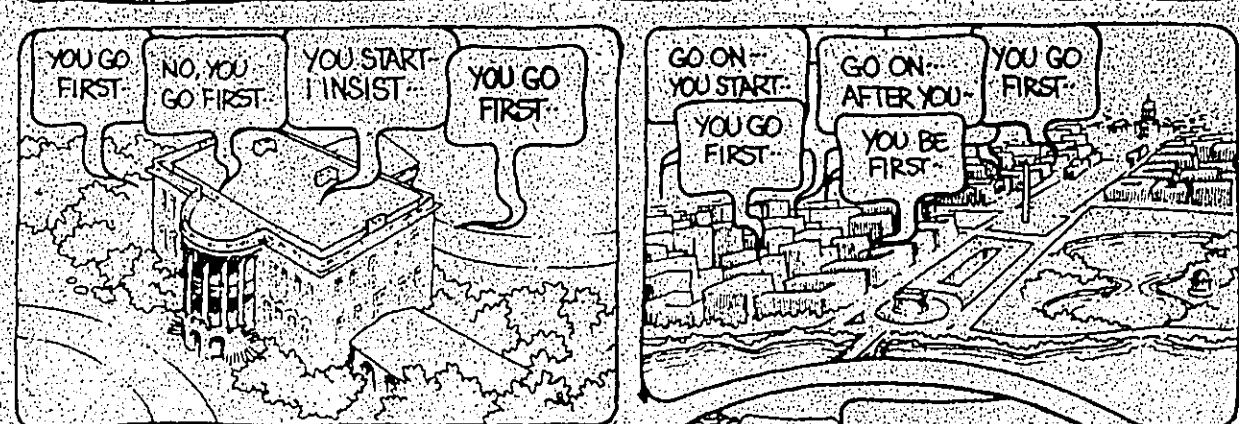
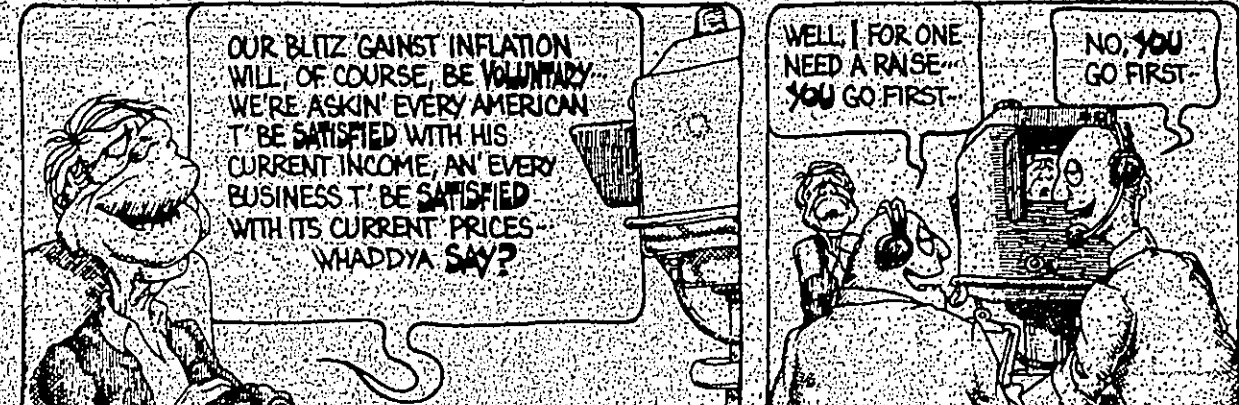
'I Wonder'

Notes From An Oldtimer

Using the old East Texas expression one would say the was from "good stock" to start with. Her mother, Ida Mae Risinger, was the sixth child in one of the fine old families of Woodville. Her father, Dan Cobb, was a construction engineer from Georgia.

Dan Cobb worked for a construction firm, Thrall and Shea, out of Shreveport. His speciality was building sawmills so the family moved about somewhat until, in 1921, they decided to come home and build and operate their own mill on the corner of Cobb Mill Road and what is now Highway 69.

He went back to work for his company in 1924 and was sent to Broken Bow, Oklahoma. It was there at the age of eight Alva Lee made her first entrance into political activity. She entered a contest sponsored by W.K. Henderson of a Shreveport radio station. She supported the independent candidate against the incumbent. The encroachment of chain-operated stores and won the contest.

Back to Woodville they came in 1929 and reopened Cobb Mills. Some of you may remember Alva Lee as a blond-headed tad who stuttered.

Or you may remember her leading the Halloween Carnival/Parade on her pony Molly. The County Fair had been discontinued during the depression and the Dew-wood Festival hadn't as yet been dreamed up by Judge Wheat. The big parade during those years in the early thirties was the Halloween Carnival/Parade that kicked off the Bazaar the ladies held on the school ground at that season.

Alva Lee, dressed as Uncle Sam and proudly carrying the flag, rode Molly at the head of the parade. Alva Lee was an excellent student at Kirby High School-making the four years in three and helping her father in the lumber yard as well. Some of her classmates she remembers best were Ruby Ruth Wheat, Frances Rock, Lawlida Parson, Frances Dean, Oma, Marie Barclay, Martin Neilius, Jr., and, of course, her own brother James who tragically died in a fiery automobile accident.

For three years after graduation Alva Lee gained practical business experience working full time in the lumber yard and operating the A.L.C. Grocery.

Instead of giving an outright scholarship Marshall Baptist College made possible for top quality students to attend by giving them jobs helping teachers with routine work. Alva Lee's job was grading papers for Mr. Monroe Tolar who had been principal of Kirby High School during Alva Lee's years there.

There was a case of mutual admiration. Mr. Tolar remembers Alva Lee as a lovely, dependable girl. She credits him as being the most influenced in the direction of her life.

At Marshall College she majored in Business, was active in drama, sang with a choral sestet at Baptist conventions, served as secretary of the Phi Beta Kappa chapter, and maintained a B and above average all the time.

December 7, 1941, Pearl Harbor Day found Alva Lee in her last year at Marshall. After receiving her A.A. degree, she went to work for Consolidated Steel, a ship building firm in Orange. There she met and married Ernest Arnold who was head of the Cost Accounting Department of the same firm.

After the war was over, they went back to Ernest's home in California where they have lived ever since.

In the beginning her interest in public affairs was as a concerned parent of seven beautiful children, four boys and three girls, and as a citizen of her community. As a

troop leader, chairman of the Girl Scouts, Den Mother of Cub Scouts, Little League Team Mother, and Teenage Club Advisor for her church, she participated in the activities of her children. As a concerned citizen she became a leading Freeway Fighter against the Meridian Route which threatens to destroy the kind of life she loves to live in her hometown. This battle has been going on for thirteen years and is not over yet, but it's a safe bet that she's putting up a good fight.

Alva Lee has served as Chairman of South Pasadena Republican Women's Club, 54th A.D. Pledent Chairman, member of Republican State Central Committee, member of United Way, and City of Hope and many others.

She was elected to the South Pasadena City Council and by that body was chosen Mayor. This was her hometown thanks for her leadership in getting made an environmental impact study of the proposed freeway and it is now in the Southern California Department of Transportation.

In 1977 Alva Lee was selected as "Woman of Achievement" by the California Republican Women's Clubs. She has been listed in "Who's Who in American Politics" for eight years, and in "New Orleans" Circuit Court of Appeals of a District Court ruling that no clear-cutting was allowed in Texas' national forests, was "late in coming, wasting millions in revenue for East Texas, but welcome nonetheless."

"The tragedy of it all is that it was so unnecessary," said Wilson. "Environmentalists are well-meaning, but extremist among them, can certainly disrupt working people trying to make a living."

U.S. District Court ruled last year that the U.S. Forest Service could not clear-cut in the Texas' national forests unless it filed an environmental impact statement. The ruling was such that virtually all harvesting was halted. Last Monday the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans overruled that decision involving 662,000 acres and million of dollars worth of timber in the Sam Houston, Angelina, Sabine and Davy Crockett national forests. The opinion of the Circuit Court was that the District Court "impermissibly substituted its judgment for that of Congress."

"It's getting to be frustrating, costly, and exhausting fighting these non-sensational battles," said Wilson. "I'll be glad when the environmentalists in Houston and Dallas understand that the 84,550 acres set aside in the Big Thicket is more than they can use, and furthermore, if a lot they're going to get as long as I'm here."

Tasty, Nutritious Brown Bag Lunches

Brown bag the basic four must include: bread and bread/cereals, suggests Frances Reasonover, a food and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University.

For milk, use cheese sandwiches, with filling of pimento cheese, any sliced, ready-to-eat, sliced, or cheese dip with crackers. For a weight problem, cottage cheese or Neufchatel cheese. On a cold day, send a thermos of hot cream soup.

Meats go ready-sliced—such as sausage, beef, or combine with cheese for a variety. Refried beans pack as a dip for meat substitute.

Add fruits and vegetables for "favor" color and texture. Especially for vitamin content. Carrot sticks, high in vitamin A, are crisp and easy.

Oranges peeled and cut, or sections, are high in vitamin C, or for easy packing, can't miss "unpeeled" tinned gives extra protection to the vitamin content.

Apples, bananas, pears or a jar of container of canned fruit, also add nutrition and variety.

Crispy celery or pickles give the brown bag meal added appeal. Lettuce and tomatoes, plastic package and zesty to a sandwich meal.

To add further variety, try: frozen, frozen, canned, or dried fruit. Also, a plastic bag of fresh, crisp vegetables can serve as a great accompaniment to a sandwich meal.

Go slow on high-fat, high-salt desserts for the weight watcher. Eat a sweet taste and the daily requirement of the fruit. Food groups include cookies, oatmeal, and other ready-to-eat types added to cookies; increase their nutritional value.

HECE Program Offers Valuable Experience For Young People

By MARION TIDWELL
 More and more emphasis has recently been placed on the need for students to have skills when they graduate from high school. Educators and the public alike are rallying this cause as if it were a brand new idea.
 For educators this is not a new concept. The whole idea behind the HECE program is to provide high school graduates with home economics related skills based on a combination of classroom and on-the-job training.
 HECE is set up as a cooperative training program provided by local business and the school system for 11th and 12th grade students. This program is offered in many high schools, giving students an alternative to the college preparatory program yet still giving them all the courses needed for college entrance.
 The HECE program even provides several benefits. It gives the students one or two years of valuable work experience. It also allows students to begin earning money to defray the costs of attending college, if that's where they are headed.
 If a student does not elect to go to college, he or she is several steps ahead of other high school and even college graduates who have had no practical work experience. HECE graduates have received both classroom training and job experience in their career field. They are already employed when their training sponsor working full time. Often, they receive promotions which put them even farther in front of young people entering the business world for the first time.
 Jobs are provided by cooperative businesses in the area. These business people contact the HECE coordinator at the local high school or the coordinator contacts them. The two of them work together to match the right student in the right available job.
 Jobs for incoming HECE students are such as arts and crafts, child care, aide, dietetic, food service, worker, fabric coordinator, companion to elderly, floral designer, and housekeeping management assistant.
 Students work a minimum of 16 hours a week Monday through Friday and receive a salary just as any other employee. The big plus, however, is that the student is also earning credits toward high school graduation and receives credit for the time he or she spends on the job.
 A typical class schedule in HECE prepares students for traditional academic subjects or electives needed for graduation. Usually the student then leaves campus to report to work.
 Subject matters covered in HECE prepare students for employment in occupations requiring knowledge in skills in one of more home economics subject areas, including child development, clothing and textiles, consumer education, family living, food and nutrition, home management and housing. The students acquire this knowledge through classroom work, individualized assignments and work experience.
 Through this combination of studies and experience a student successfully completes the HECE program is well prepared to take his or her place in the business world.

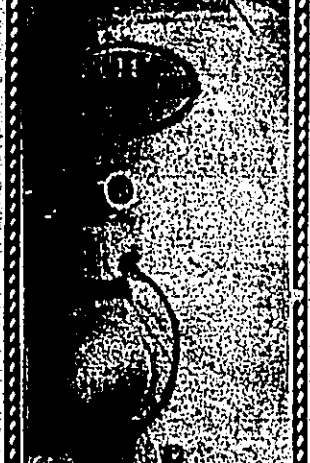

State Earns High Interest

State Treasurer Warren G. Hardin stated that during his seven month tenure, the substantial improvements of his office has made in the area of interest earned for the State and the percentage of funds invested continues to result in increased earnings to the taxpayers of Texas.
 The percentage of funds invested has steadily been increased from 80% a year ago to an unprecedented average monthly percentage of over 91% during the month of April, 1978. As of April 30, 1978, the total of current operating funds deposited in time accounts earning interest was 93.9% of all funds available for deposit. During Harding's tenure, interest rates earned on funds deposited in time accounts have been increased from 6% to 7%.

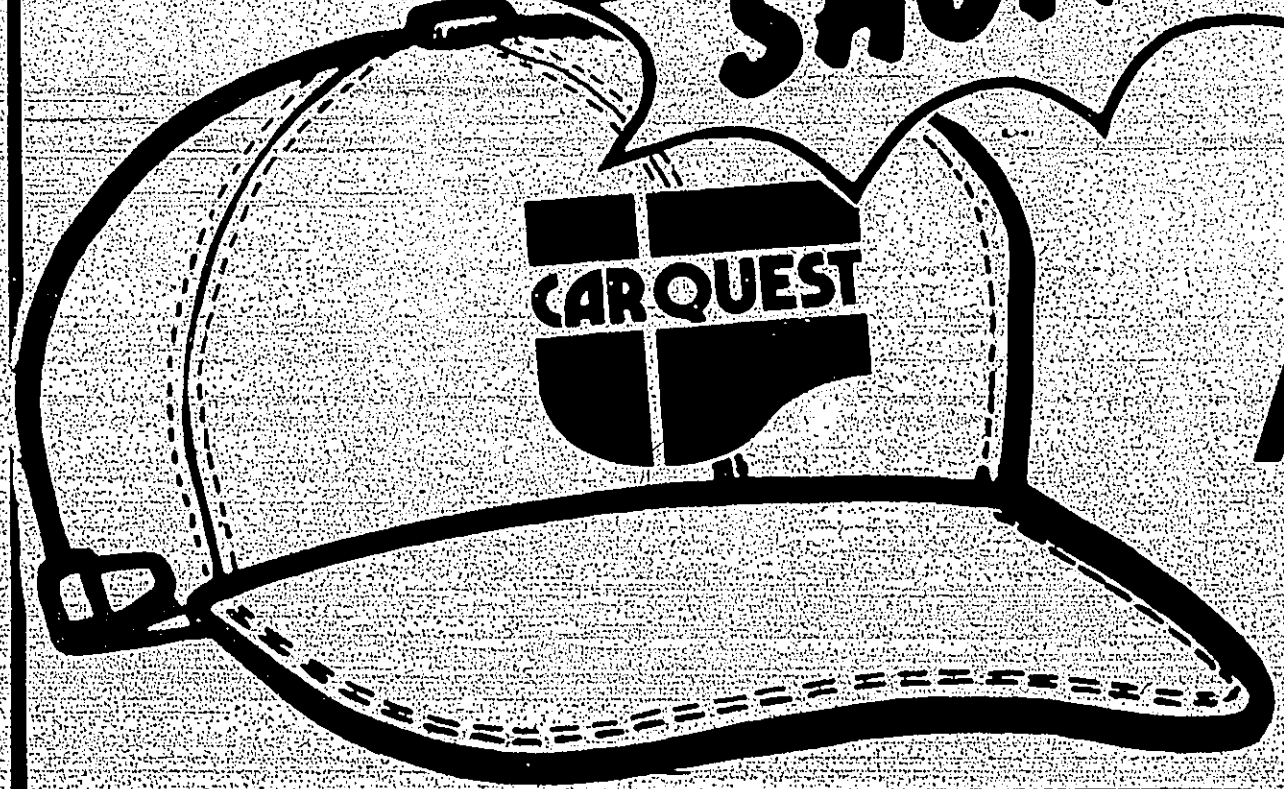
