## Roads Improvement On

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation is planning the upgrading of U.S. Highway 69 between F.M. 418 in Kountze and State Highway 63 in Zavalla.

The proposed improvements, primarily consist of widening the sections of road that are now only 20 feet wide to provide a modern 2 lane

facility with surfaced shoulders over the entire length. The plan also provides for replacement of the railroad underpass at Warren and the Neches River bridge at Rockland. An informal Public Meeting was held in Woodville on January 26, 1978 to discuss the proposed work. In February and March, opportunity was afforded interested citizens to request that a public hearing

be held. There were no requests. The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation has certified that the public hearing requirements of the State's Action Plan have been fulfilled. Work was received this week that the Federal Highway Administration has accepted this certification. Highway Engineers are proceeding with development

of detailed plans for these improvements with the intent of having all of the work completed or under construction within the next five years. It is anticipated that a contract for reconstruction of the Neches River Bridge and Approaches will be let early in 1979. Work has already begun on widening Cypress Creek Bridge near Hillister.

## Dam-B Patrolmen Sought

Dam B lake side parks and recreation areas will be more tightly patrolled during the upcoming summer vacation season as a result of a contract agreement between Tyler County and the Dam-B Corp. of Engineers.

According to John Letney, project manager at Town Bluff, the contract, which calls for the hiring of two individ-

uals to patrol the parks and government project lands, will be in effect around the first of June and last through September 16.

Total cost for the law enforcement personnel at the parks will be \$11,806.48. However, the project is state funded and all monies will be reimbursed to the county. The

county will receive all revenue through from cases filed through the Sheriff's Department.

Applicants for the job will be carefully screened by both Commissioners Court and Sheriff Lewis Craven, who will be responsible for the deputies and their actions.

"The key out there is not to arrest everybody but to see that they're doing things right," stated Commissioner Riley. "The program can work out great or it can be a total disaster if the right personnel are not chosen."

Persons interested in the job may contact the Tyler County Sheriff's Department at the County courthouse.

Woodville Rotary Club and Lions Club, Tyler County Hospital-Auxiliary, 1978 Vocational Nursing Students, Tyler County Hospital employees, First Baptist Church in Warren, American Association of Retired Persons and the First Baptist Church Day Care Center.

## Crop Questionnaire Available For Tyler County Ranchers, Farmers

**CLINTON R. CURRIE**, County Extension Agent, during late May and June many Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service's field staff. This is part of the continuous effort of keeping track of Texas' biggest business—agriculture.

The information gathered through the questionnaires and interviews provides the basis for determining the acreage devoted to the various crops and midyear livestock numbers for the state of Texas and for each county. With the depressed prices of many agricultural commodities, it is more important than ever that the statistics be as accurate as possible.

to-aid producers in making the best production and marketing decisions. They are also essential in enacting wise legislation affecting agriculture and are used in determining the national program acreage and payment levels to producers under the various commodity programs. The primary beneficiaries of accurate estimates are farmers and ranchers themselves. Prompt and accurate

completion of the survey forms provides for more reliable estimates of Texas' largest industry—agriculture. It also helps to reduce survey costs.

All individual farm and ranch information is kept confidential, and only state and county summaries become part of the final published estimate.

This is a cooperative effort of the USDA's Economic, Statistics, and Cooperative Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

ence of Executives for the Association. For Retarded Citizens and has served on numerous committees in advisory capacities.

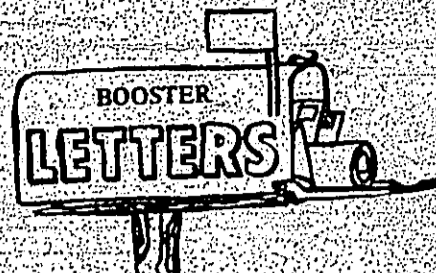

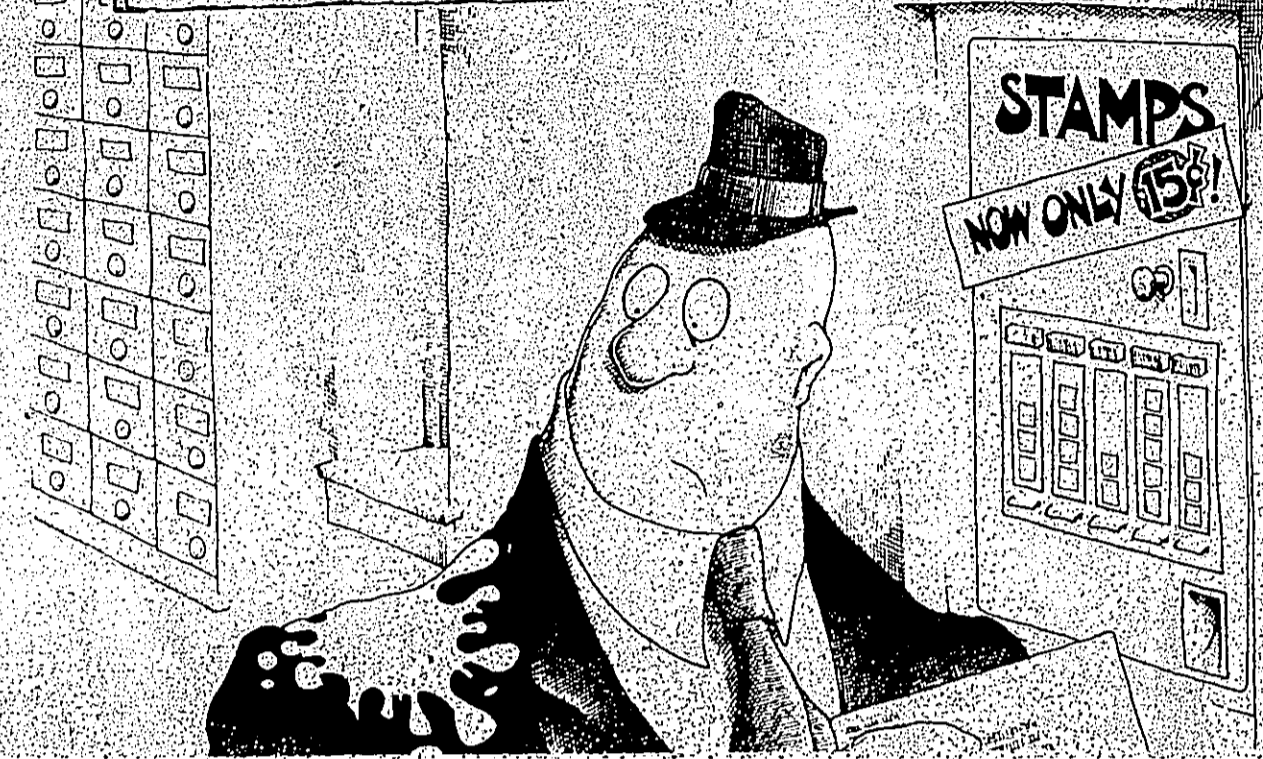

### Know Your Farm Bureau

By MILTON DURHAM

In my last article I mentioned that we believe that no one should be required to pay dues for the right to work on any particular job. We do not think that it should be the function of the Federal Government to determine whom an employer may hire. We favor legislation which respects that other party to controversy may request a secret ballot vote of workers with respect to acceptability of the employer's last offer.

Many kinds of strikes should be prohibited in the public interest. A strike by local, state or federal government employees should not be allowed. A strike in agriculture or in an agricultural processing plant during a critical period of production or harvest is an aid holding the high rate of inflation. It should be outlawed for an employer to be forced to hire unnecessary workers. A strike of public school employees should be unlawful and strictly enforced.

We urge the Congress to enact legislation to prohibit transportation strikes, including dock strikes. These hamper the sale and trade of agricultural products by import and export.

We are concerned about abuses of the unemployment compensation program. An

Tornadoes and hurricanes and typhoons and cyclones may all be the same thing to some people, but we didn't have typhoons and tornadoes around here. We had hurricanes and cyclones, and they were different.

Hurricanes came from the Gulf of Mexico, cyclones came generally from the north.

The old white frame school building was a death trap and Mr. P. I. Hunter knew it. He wasn't about to let one of nature's temper tantrums catch that rickety building full of school children.

When Mr. McCombs down at the depot received a message on his telegraph that such a storm was sighted heading in our direction, he got word to Mr. Hunter as quickly as a messenger could bring it. Mr. Hunter then sent some of the older students to all the rooms to tell teachers to dismiss their classes with firm instructions that the children were to go straight home as fast as they could carry them. No one was to stop on the way for anything.

Cyclones we knew about. A cyclone could cut a swath through a forest leveling every tree in its path for a hundred feet or more then rise and circle off to vent rimation upon some other victim. Once, from across the street, we watched a cyclone twist off like matchsticks, nearly all the huge cedar trees Mr. Slade had planted in a double row from his house to the road three quarters of a century before. That same twister rose over Ed Pate's house and dipped again to topple his barn.

It was Jewel Pate's first year in school when word came that a cyclone was coming our way. Jewel was such a pretty little girl with the blackest hair and the pinkest cheeks that everybody in the neighborhood tried to look out for her. As one self-appointed guardian, I dashed out of Miss Seibert's room down the hall to Miss Myrtle's first grade room. I grabbed Jewel's hand and pulled her toward the door.

When we got outside, children were flying off in every direction like a bunch of chickens when a rock's been thrown in the chicken yard.

Across the school yard we ran and took the stairs two steps at a time. We raced up the alley between the Tubb's house and Aunt Mindy's. (The Wood Pains live on that corner, now.) We were alone; all the others had reached the safety of home and Jewel and I were still running. On top the alley, now called Redbud, we sped past the Reid house and around the corner at Granddama Brown's.

Poor little Jewel! She was panting and gasping for breath. We were past Joe Anderson's as far as the oak tree that stood where Rutha Trull now lives when Jewel threw a shoe. She didn't just step out of it; she slipped it up into some weeds around the trunk of the tree.

Jewel wanted to stop to find her shoe, but it was no deal. Our instructions were clear: "Don't stop for anything!"

"What are we running for?" she cried.

"With practically my last breath I yelled over my shoulder, 'A cyclone's in Nagadoches!'"

News of the severe weather alarm hadn't gotten around and there was a sign of a funnel cloud on the horizon, but Mrs. Pate was waiting on her front porch when Jewel got home. From our house I could tell she was scolding Jewel roundly because of her missing shoe. As Jewel explained, a look of puzzlement spread over her mother's face. "The cyclone took off her apron and marched across the road to our house."

"What is this Jewel's telling me?" she asked. "They sent you home from school because Miss Seibert's got a bad cold and you couldn't even stop to find her shoe?"

Buddy Ebsen has digressed from his usual vacation pattern to play prosecutor in a forthcoming NBC mini-series, "The Critical List." Usually, as soon as "Barnaby Jones" finishes the season's filming, he unpacks his tap shoes, summons his kids and starts polishing up the family song and dance act that they've been touring on the state fair circuit.

James Coburn says now that "The Dain Curse" is history he has no further plans for doing television. 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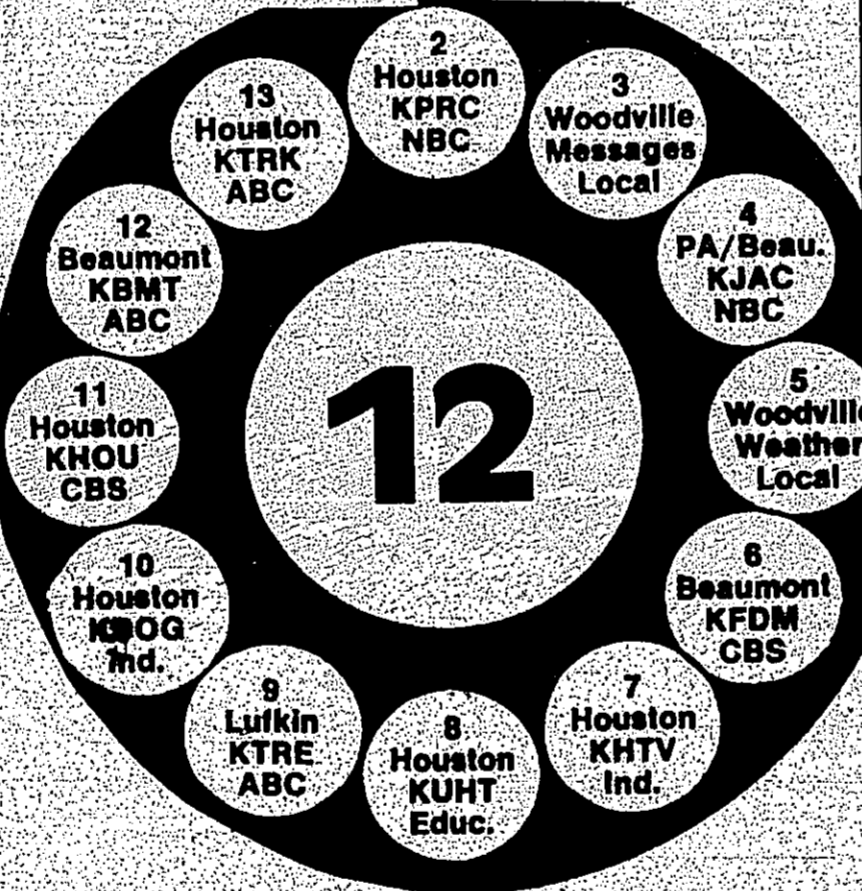
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
