## Brown Here June 15

Texas Department of Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown will be the guest speaker of a combined Woodville Rotary-Lions Club meeting which will be held in the ballroom of the Woodville Inn at 7 p.m. Thursday, June 15.

Brown is one of Texas' most popular speakers according to club spokesmen. His down-to-earth philosophy and humor have made him a favorite in Texas and throughout America. He has spoken in every county in Texas and twenty-five states.

He received three degrees from Texas A&M University and has studied at Michigan, Colorado State and Utah state universities. He is a professional sociologist. For many years he was associated with Texas A&M University's Agricultural Extension Service in charge of community improvement. He has helped more than 1,000 communities in Texas become beautiful, more prosperous, and a better place to live, club officials said.

Appointed by Dolph Briscoe to fill the unexpired term of the former commissioner, Brown not only is concerned about the progress of Texas agriculture but also maintains his interest in the improvement of the quality of life in rural communities. His goal is to place Texas in the number one spot in U.S. agriculture by accelerating efforts to gain more profits for the farmer and sustain the steady flow of goods to the consumer at reasonable prices.

Brown has received the Faculty Distinguished Achievement Award presented by the Former Students Association of Texas A&M University and the Superior Service Award of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. In 1968, the Progressive Farmer Magazine selected him for the Man of the Year Award in Texas Agriculture.

From 1943 to 1946, Commissioner Brown served

with the U.S. Army as a captain with combat and Occupation duties in the European Theater. After returning home he owned a food, feed, and fertilizer business in Henderson for two years.

In 1948, he began his long career with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, first serving as an assistant county agent in Hunt County. He was county agent in Kaufman and Caldwell counties from 1948 to 1956. A one-year break from Extension Service duties in 1952 allowed him to serve as an agricultural consultant with International Harvester.

In 1956, Commissioner Brown accepted the position as an Extension Sociologist in the Department of Agricultural Economics and Sociology at Texas A&M University.

During his years with the Extension Service, he worked closely with rural communities helping to install 750 water systems, upgrade the development of 1,000 small towns, and spearhead the revitalization of 800 rural churches.

In encouraging a pride in regional production, Brown was instrumental as a county agent in the establishment of community projects such as the Luling Watermelon Thump and the Kaufman County Vetch Festival. The community spirit created under Commissioner Brown's supervision as an Extension Sociologist continues to thrive in many rural areas in the state today.

During his tenure with the Extension Service, Brown also served as a member of the graduate faculty of Colorado State University, teaching summer courses in Human Behavior.

In March, 1974, Brown was named special assistant to Governor Dolph Briscoe, responsible for rural development and agricultural programs. A popular public speaker, Commissioner Brown represented the Governor's Office on more than 400 occasions, delighting audiences

with his East Texas wit and humor. In recognition of his speaking to more than 5,000 community building meetings,

the Chambers of Commerce managers of Texas recently honored Brown with a special tribute, one of the first of its

## County Eyes Insurance Needs

County Commissioners found that the county courthouse and other county owned property was "sorely lacking" in insurance coverage during a special meeting held Thursday, June 1.

According to County Auditor Ann Fondren, the county courthouse is presently insured for only \$547,788, a figure which should, according to insurance companies, be 80 percent of the cost of replacing the courthouse should the building be destroyed or damaged. "Off the cuff" replacement estimates, made by county officials, put the cost of rebuilding the courthouse close to \$2.5 million.

Ms. Fondren told the court that since the building was "under-insured," that the insurance companies would not pay the total insured amount.

No action was taken during the meeting, although commissioners requested that Ms. Fondren and County Attorney Rois Brockman investigate the insurance question further and to contract a certified appraiser to re-appraise the county office facility before getting additional insurance coverage.

Also during the meeting, Truitt Pritchard of Truitt Pritchard and Associates of Houston gave a review report on the county tax assessing situation his company has been involved with.

Pritchard stated that the 1977 tax records show that properties in the county have been assessed at over \$22 million. Oil and Gas property values within the county is over the \$55 million mark.

Pritchard told the court that for budgeting purposes in his opinion there would not be any reduction of monies available for the county to operate in the year 1979.

Pritchard did say however that there should be additional oil and gas property on the tax rolls. "I don't know exactly how much though," he said.

## Police Probe Shooting

A late Wednesday night apparent disagreement between a man and his wife over whether or not she would go to work in the morning resulted in the fatal shooting of the man when the 20 gauge single barrel shotgun the two were allegedly wrestling over discharged, hitting the man in the right side of his abdomen.

John Kenneth Harrison, 50, was pronounced dead on the scene by Pct. 4 J.P. Roy Drake after the woman, who is 44-years old called Elenore Ambulance Service at approximately 11:25 p.m. and told them "I shot my husband."

In an early Thursday morning interview with Mrs. Harrison, she stated that the gun had gone off accidentally when her husband hit her in the face with it.

"He was drunk," she said "he'd been drinking whiskey all day and he gets mean when he drinks. He just couldn't understand that I told my boss I would be there and that I had to go."

counts of aggravated assault. Cowart also said he had answered calls before at the couple's home in Town Bluff Estates, and had taken other guns from the residence.

"The muzzle of the gun had to be within 4 to 5 inches of the man's body," Cowart speculated, "and more than likely it was right up to his skin when it went off." He based these conclusions he said on the facts that there were no

powder marks on the clothing of the dead man's body and that the gun would have had to have been cocked before it would fire.

Mrs. Harrison, however, told the BOOSTER that her husband was beating on her and was hitting her in the face with the gun when it went off. She suffered from numerous cuts, bruises and abrasions.

"I don't really know how it happened," Mrs. Harrison said slowly. "The gun went off

and there was blood everywhere. I thought it was mine but it wasn't."

She said that she then called the ambulance service to come and help her because she had shot her husband.

Mrs. Harrison was arrested by Cowart and charged with murder. Pct. 3 J.P. Frank Grimes set bond at \$5,000. After spending the night in the Tyler County Jail, she was released.

## Telephones Are June Topic

Even a particle of a fraction of a second can be critical in providing quality telecommunications services, according to Mark Klester, Southeastern Bell public relations supervisor for Southeast Texas.

"Our company's science demonstrator, Jim Sage, will show and tell the Deep East Texas Development group how the Bell System's research and development efforts make it possible for us to use even microseconds to provide the best possible communications we know how," Klester said. Sage will present "Time, Telephones and Technology

to the group June 23 in Woodville.

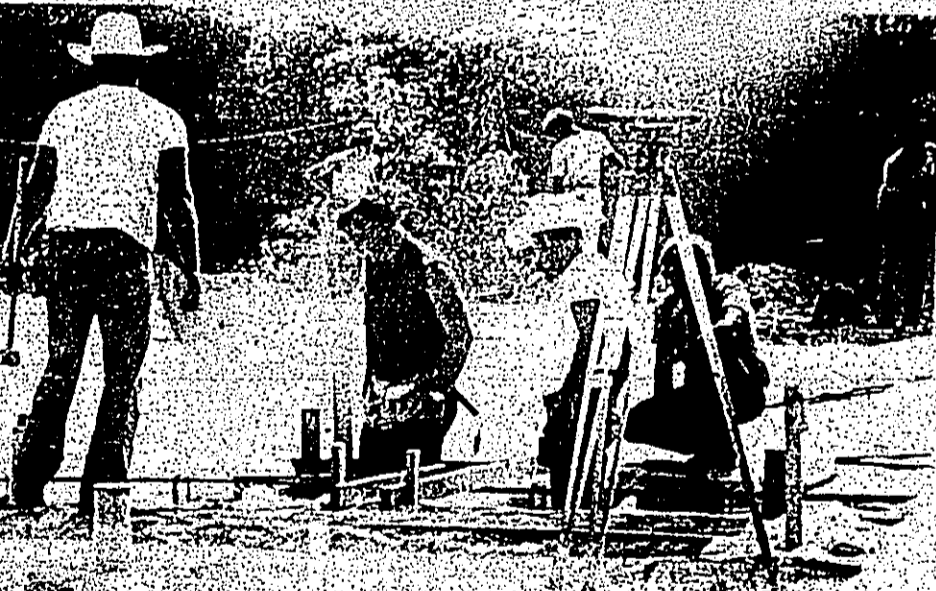
Klester said the telephone company's program for high school through adult audiences revolves around the theme of time and how its utilization makes possible communications services that are now commonplace.

"For example, our science demonstrator uses a special 'picoclock' in the program to actually measure the speed of sound over a distance of only twelve feet," Klester noted. "The sound is transmitted approximately 750 miles per hour, which seems pretty fast. However, in the telephone

business that's a real tortoise pace. In fact, if telephone messages were sent at the actual speed of sound, it would take several hours for the word 'hello' to reach New York from Woodville."

Sage explains how the Bell System is able to speed up the transmission of voice and other telecommunications signals so we can communicate over great distances in what is called "real time."

Klester said the science demonstrator is presented in a non-technical, entertaining manner for greater audience enjoyment.



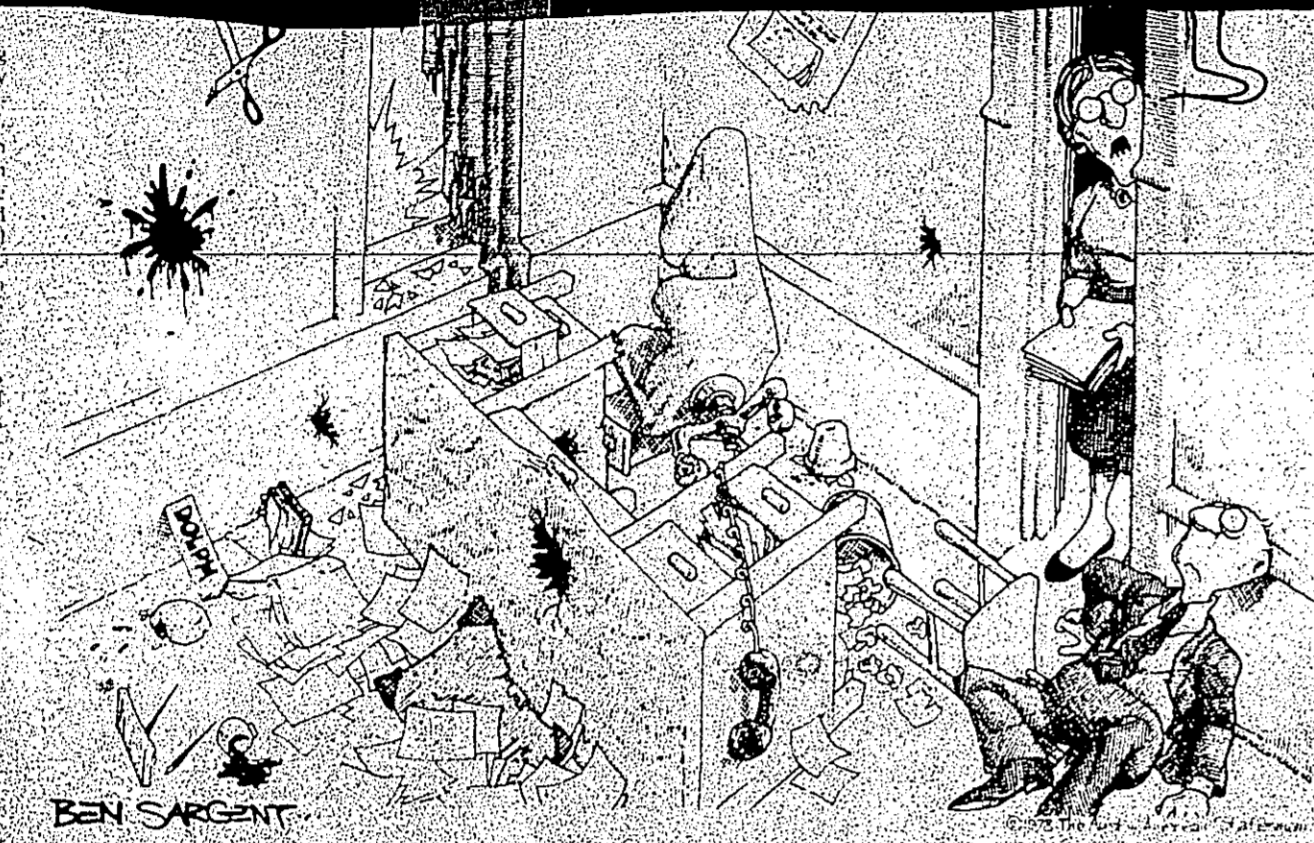

By PHEBE ARMSTRONG. With school newly out, what some parents wouldn't give for a Jewel Reid in their neighborhood! The Tyler County Messenger of July 20, 1917, carried a two-column account of the summer Play School Jewel (now Mrs. Jess Neely of Silsbee) conducted in the neighborhood her home on the corner of Red and Redburn where Mr. and Mrs. John Reid later built.

Jewel's parents were affectionately known as Uncle Ander and Miz Tildy. Andrew Reid was Tyler County Clerk for many years.

The article is signed "A Neighbor" but those familiar with her style of writing would detect Bird Sholars in every word.

"How did it happen to find this 'Select School?' she asked. She sort of stumbled on it, but, of course that was a ruse to hide her own identity.

However, in primly Victorian vordage the writer did report truthfully the doings in that school-as far as she wadd.

There was the most sedate but gracious little school-marm if in charge of a dozen happy little youngsters.... My coming most naturally created a bit of confusion among the children, but the teacher's 'Get busy, Children' brought about instant order.

There was modern school equipment such as crayon and crasers, blackboards of black oil cloth tacked across the wall, a tap bell, the teacher's clock, an evenly arranged row of nails on the rear wall for the boys' caps and the girls' stilly starched pink and blue sun bonnets.

On a table near the window were neat little boxes and baskets of lunch. Cracker and soap boxes were substitutes for real desks... Fresh flowers filled the pretty little vases, and pictures ranging from drug store almanacs to tiny framed ones of 'Covid Asleep and Awake' graced the walls.

Amateur concreters, every Friday, admission 1 cent had been the means of equipping the school room. And the little teacher, in pinafore and socks with a pink ribbon bow holding stray curls in place, scarcely past babyhood herself, painstakingly guiding the children through the A B C's of knowledge....

And rafter walking! What the author of that article didn't know were some of the reasons school was such fun that, even lucky enough to be included appeared promptly each morning eager for the session to begin.

We didn't line up at the barn door as we had to do at the proper school house, Jewel called the roll in her front yard. As each name was called, instead of answering 'present,' that child had to run up the climbing tree (it's there still), jump down and run around the house to the school room in the barn. Nobody wanted to miss that ritual.

One of the first lessons we had to learn was to walk the rafters over our classroom. If one fell off onto the straw floor below, that was a bad mark for the day, but there would be another chance tomorrow. When one made it across and back, you'd have thought from all the cheering that a player had made a winning goal in the last few seconds of play.

There was no method of punishment in sight. The teacher's firm but loving manner indicated no need of corporal punishment. You can lay odds on that! Had one person dared act up to Jewel, he or she would have been banished from the school forever by all the other, and no one wanted to take that chance.

Jewel was always in complete command whatever the situation. Hurt fingers and stubbed toes that took care of herself, she never sent a message to my Ma. Even when someone had a stomach ache from eating too many plums or figs, Jewel had her own remedy. She calmly stuck her finger down the throat of the sufferer and thus forced him to swallow the excess and school went on as usual.

Just before school dismissed, the scholars were formed in a line and in honor of a visitor sang several childish songs. They may not have hit the tune but in high places, but the sweetness of youth and happy childhood, they caroled as the late sun flickered through the cracks in the old barn. First came Margaret, the most advanced pupil, conscious of her place as leader, then Mary and Phoebe followed with bare feet and bobbed hair. Next came Dora, whose babyish lisp I remember so well, then Jack and Frances. Jack as sweet as a sugar plum, but a terror to Frances' curls and teacher as well. And Frances, whose fat chubby cheeks were made to kiss. Fate, the newest pupil, who had the most head marks, sat next. And there was Opal as tiny as a violet, and as modest, too. W. B. 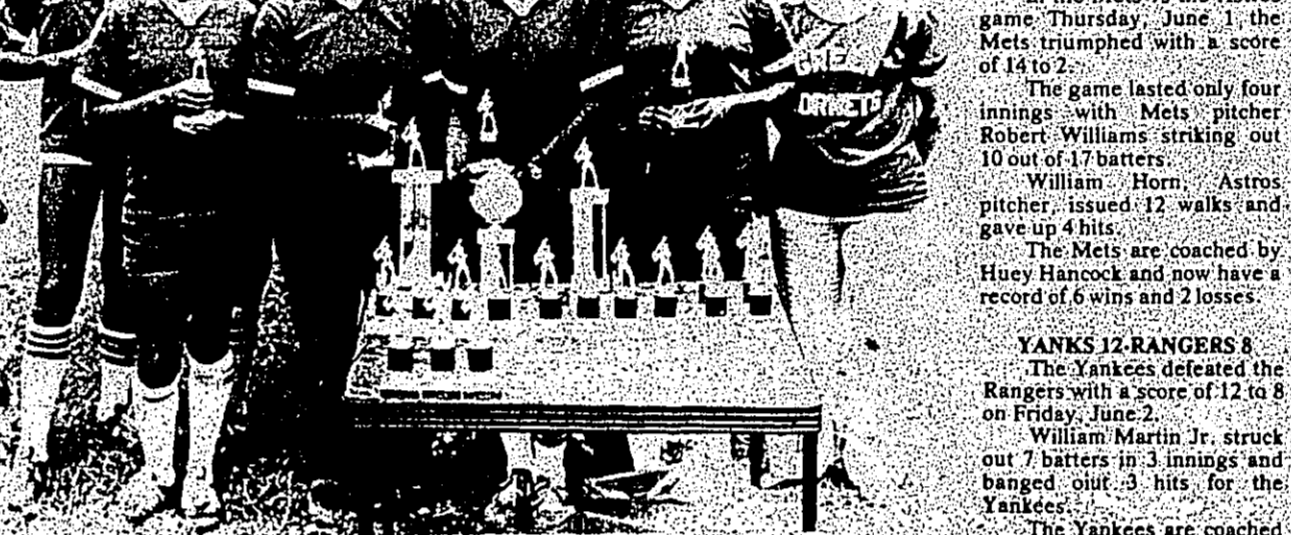

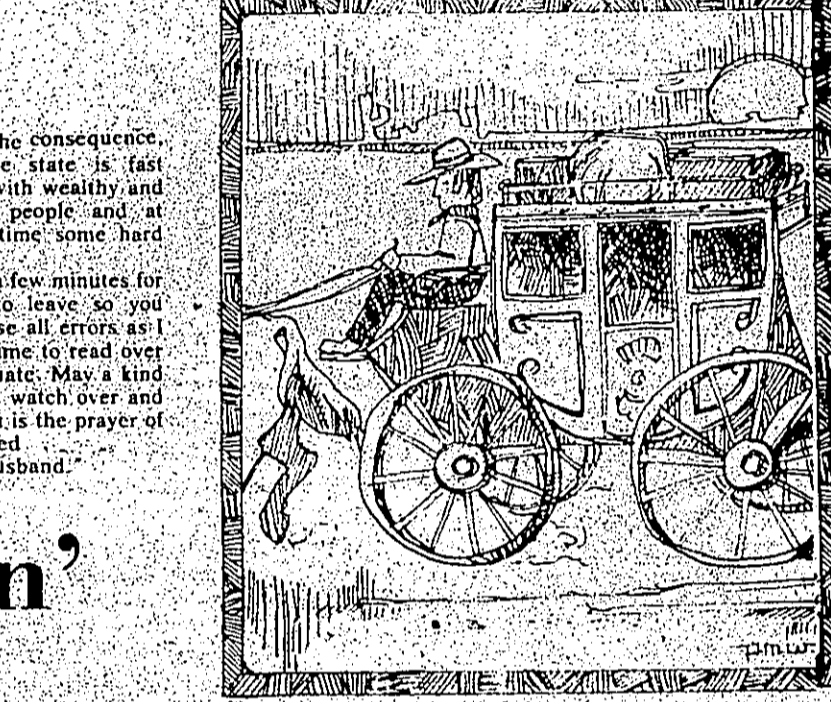
## Looking For A Home: 1860

James Henry Carter of Georgia travelled through Texas in 1860, searching for a promising location to which he could move his family. Before he ultimately settled in Waco, he visited several areas of the state, observing and asking questions about the merits and disadvantages of each. A letter which Carter wrote to his wife from Austin on April 20, 1860, reveals much about his requirements and methods. Some of his statements are such as his report of a circus parade in Austin, and his opinion concerning the kinds of people who were settling in Texas, afford informative glimpses of pre-Civil War Texas through the eyes of a sympathetic visitor. Carter's hasty punctuation and syntax have been corrected.

What I have seen of this place: I am much pleased with it, with the exception that it is too difficult to reach. The atmosphere is very fine and delightful, situated on an elevation, and quite a broken country, remarkably healthy, good society and a nice quiet place. I rather think you would like this place and I hope, my dear wife, I shall be successful in selecting a location that you will be pleased with an where you will find friends congenial and pleasant. "We have been traveling in a crowd all the time and even now, the hotel is full as the Circus company arrived this morning, and now the music wagon drawn by two large elephants is passing the Hotel, I wish the little ones were here to see them; they would be much pleased. Tell Jim there are plenty of nice points out here and if we come out they shall all have one apiece. (The cage with the Lion is now before the window, and the old fellow is bellowing), but they will have to learn how to ride as they are not so gentle as pets. "Hendrix has just put him up a beautiful store, 160 feet long, 40 feet wide, which would do honor to no store in Savannah equal to it, all of rock and the front polished and looks like marble. "Really, I think this is the country to live in."

## GETHSA Letter Describes Services

Dear Citizen of Tyler County: The Greater East Texas Health Systems Agency (GETHSA) is a private, non-profit corporation designated under the National Health Planning and Resources Development Act of 1974 to perform health planning and resource development activities within a fifteen (15) county area (see attached map). For the first two years, GETHSA was involved in developing two major plans for the area. The first is called a Health System Plan (HSP). The HSP is a long-range plan developed to increase the availability of health care and amount of care a person may receive within a reasonable travel distance, and accessibility (removing financial and transportation barriers) while keeping the costs affordable to the general population. This plan was completed and adopted on January 20, 1978 by the Governing Body of GETHSA. The second plan is called the Annual Implementation Plan (AIP) and is a short range (one year or less) plan. Its purpose is to set forth needed resource development activities required to fulfill the goals of the HSP. This plan was also adopted by the Governing Body on January 26. The AIP has identified Tyler County as a Medically Underserved Area that needs additional ophthalmologists and optometrists. As a result of Tyler County, GETHSA tell that you should be made aware of the lack of an adequate number of these health care providers and that GETHSA is available to assist in helping you obtain additional health care providers. Assistance in developing grant applications is limited to technical information required to fill out the application. GETHSA cannot write the grant application. 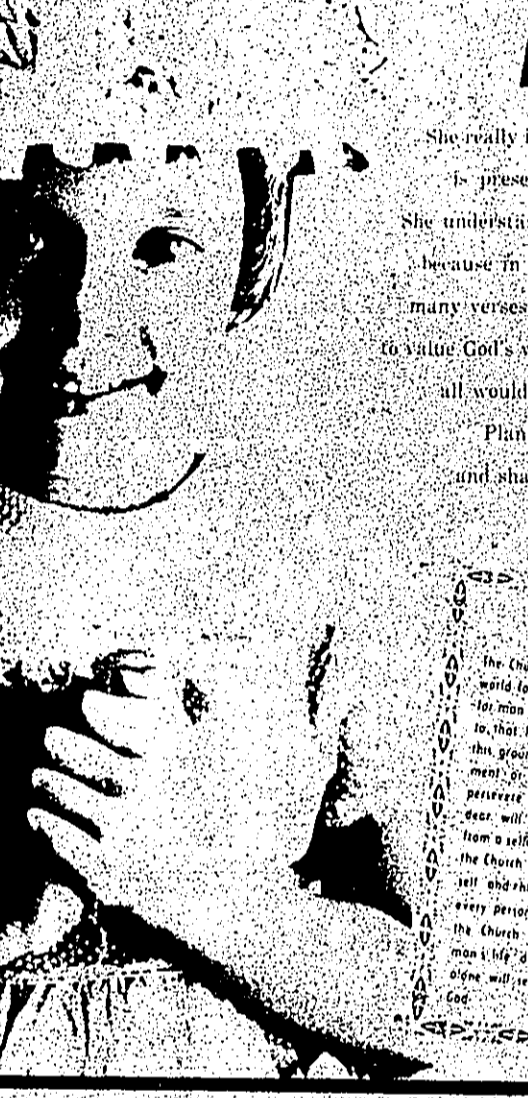

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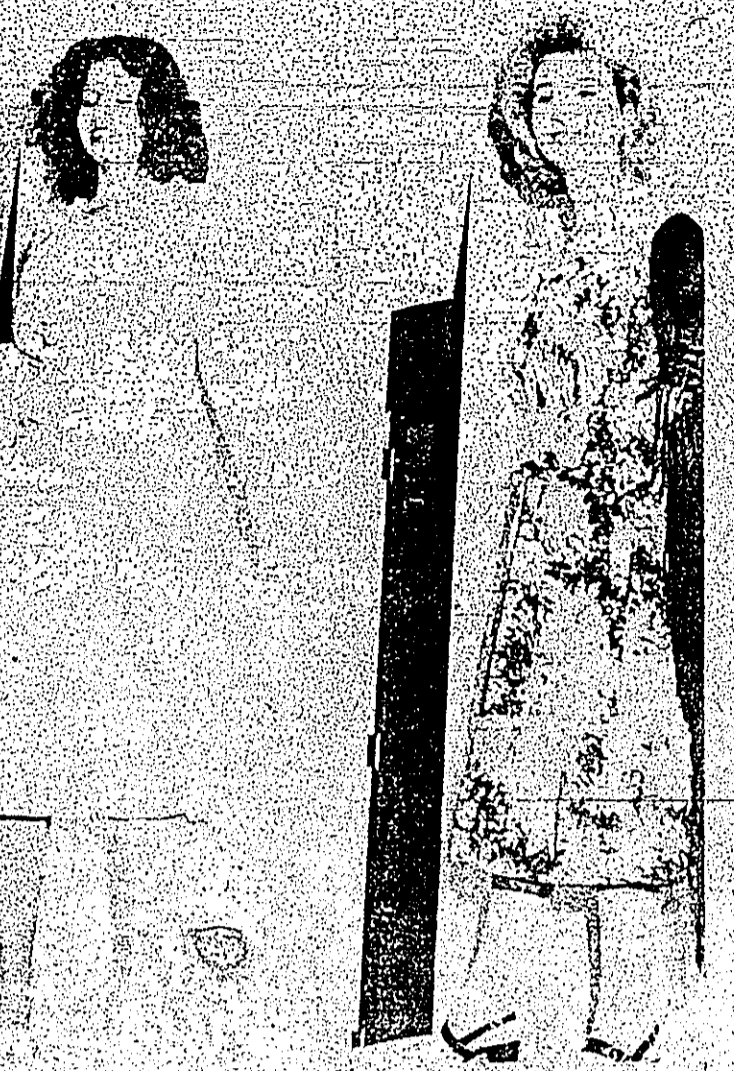

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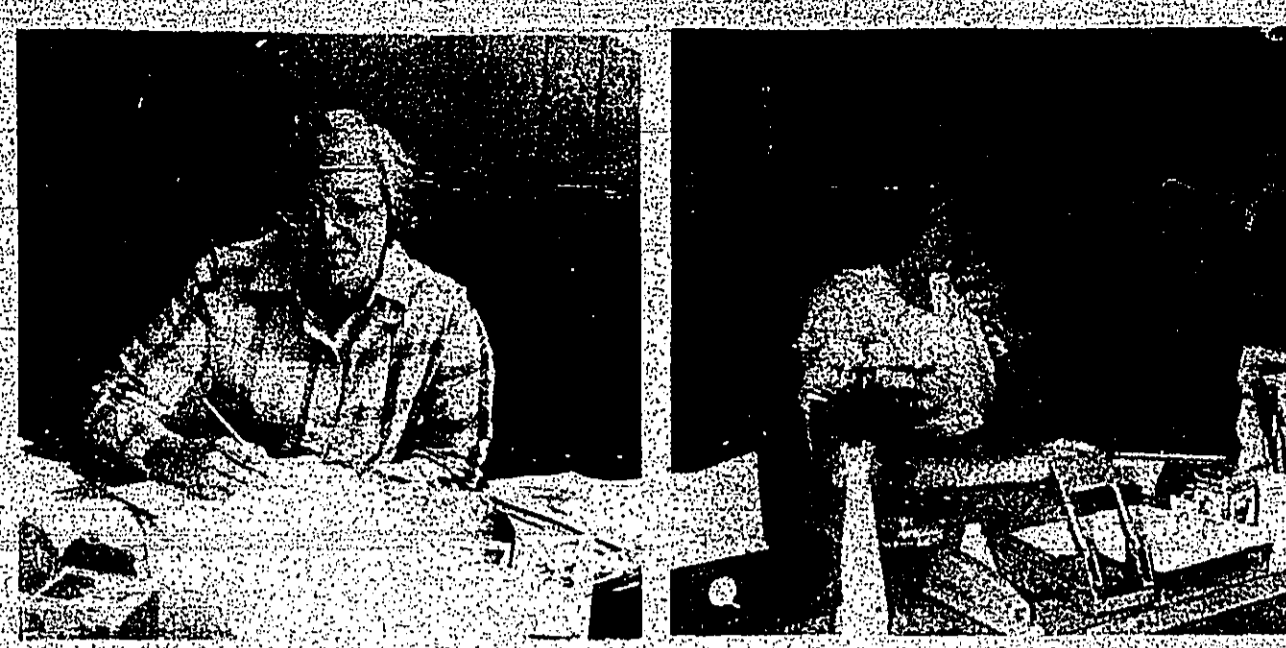

**MHMR Pilots Projects**

The Deep East Texas Regional Mental Retardation Services (MHMR) has been awarded \$1.978 to pilot an Aftercare Program. The pilot is the result of the recently passed Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation's Commissioner's Rule on Aftercare.

The Deep East Texas Regional MHMR Services is one of three centers throughout the State of Texas chosen for this pilot. The other two MHMR Centers chosen were Harris County and Heart of Texas located in Waco.

The pilot will focus on two major areas: Aftercare and Prescreening. The Aftercare Program will insure that any individual that leaves a state mental hospital such as Rusk State Hospital or a state school for the mentally retarded such as Lufkin State School, that leaves Rusk to come back into the region will have a discharge interview with this aftercare worker. This worker will see to it that the individual is put in touch with one of the community-based services of MHMR which will assist him/her in the adjustment process back into community life.

The other aspect of the pilot is prescreening. This part of the program requires that all voluntary admissions to Rusk State Hospital and all admissions to Lufkin State School from the Deep East Texas Region must first be screened and evaluated by MHMR staff at the community level. This prescreening process will assist in determining the best treatment approach for the individual. In many instances, the prescreening assessment will indicate that the person does not need to enter a state institution, but rather can be treated in a less restrictive environment at the community level.

This pilot project, once completed, will serve as a model for other community-based MHMR services throughout the State of Texas. The Deep East Texas Regional MHMR Services provides a variety of mental health and mental retardation services at a community level under community control to citizens of Angelina, Nacogdoches, Shelby, San Augustine, Sabine, and Newton Jasper.

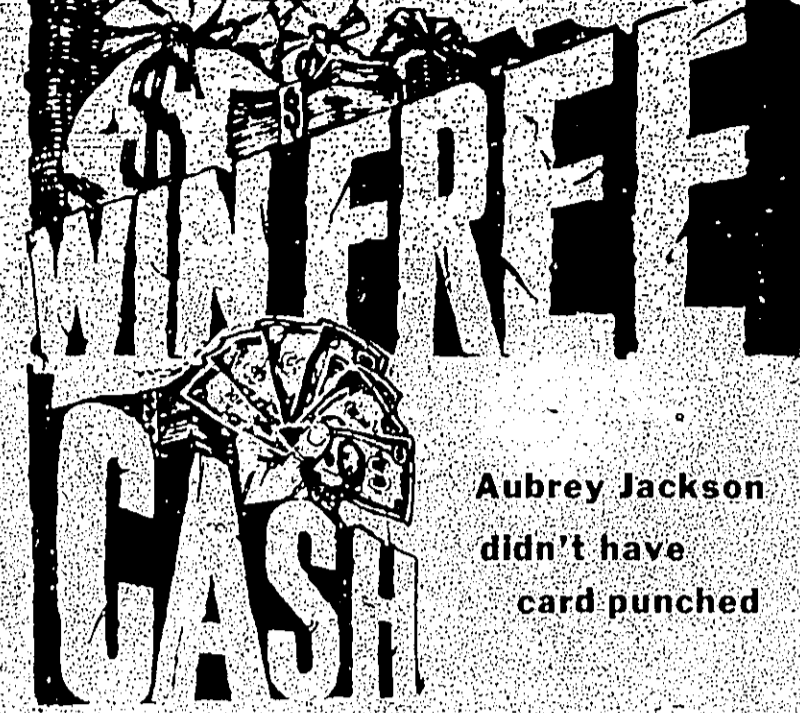

**How Much Hot Water?**

One of the items frequently overlooked when remodeling or buying a new home is the capacity of the hot water heater. First notice of this oversight normally is discovered while under a hot shower when it turns ice-cold prematurely. But, then it is too late. So, here is a short course on the subject.

The capacity of storage water heaters is rated in two ways and is usually imprinted on the nameplate of the tank. One number tells you the capacity of the tank and the other number shows the recovery rate. The sum of these numbers gives you the number of gallons of hot water a tank can supply in one hour.

A tank of 50 gallons capacity with a recovery rate of 40 gallons will supply 90 gallons an hour which should be plenty for a family of five in a home with two baths and an automatic dishwasher and clothes washer. A family of four without the dishwasher should be able to get by on a 30 or 40 gallon tank with 30 gallon recovery.

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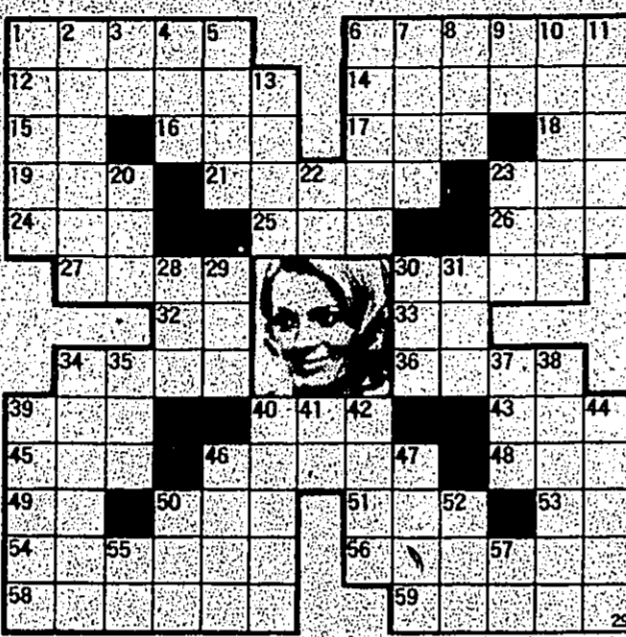

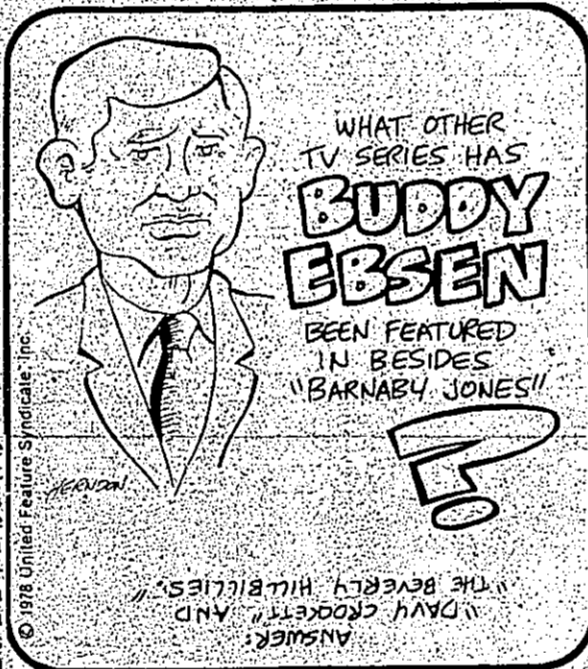
