SWC Input Sought

Public views on the future of the conservation protection and enhancement of Texas' soil, water, and related natural resources will be sought at a meeting to be held in Room 101-County Commissioners' Courtroom at 2:00 p.m. June 15th, Val Blanchette chairman of the Long Leaf Soil and Water Conservation District, said.

The meeting is in response to President Carter's signing of the Resources Conservation Act last November which requires an appraisal and evaluation of the state and nation's soil and water conservation program.

The RCA act authorizes and directs the Secretary of Agriculture to develop a national soil and water conservation program in cooperation with the public, our local soil and water conservation districts, the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board and the Soil Conservation Service, said Blanchette.

This program will establish new direction for future soil and water conservation efforts in Texas based on current soil, water, and related resource appraisals, Blanchette continued.

One point I want to make clear is that districts in their 40-year history have always assisted landowners with voluntary conservation programs on their farms and ranches. We do not advocate any other approach since farm and ranch land is privately owned and that the interests and welfare of the owners must be served and that programs must be acceptable to them, Blanchette added.

Actions required by the RCA act include gathering data to appraise the condition and quality of Texas and the nation's soil and water resources by 1979.

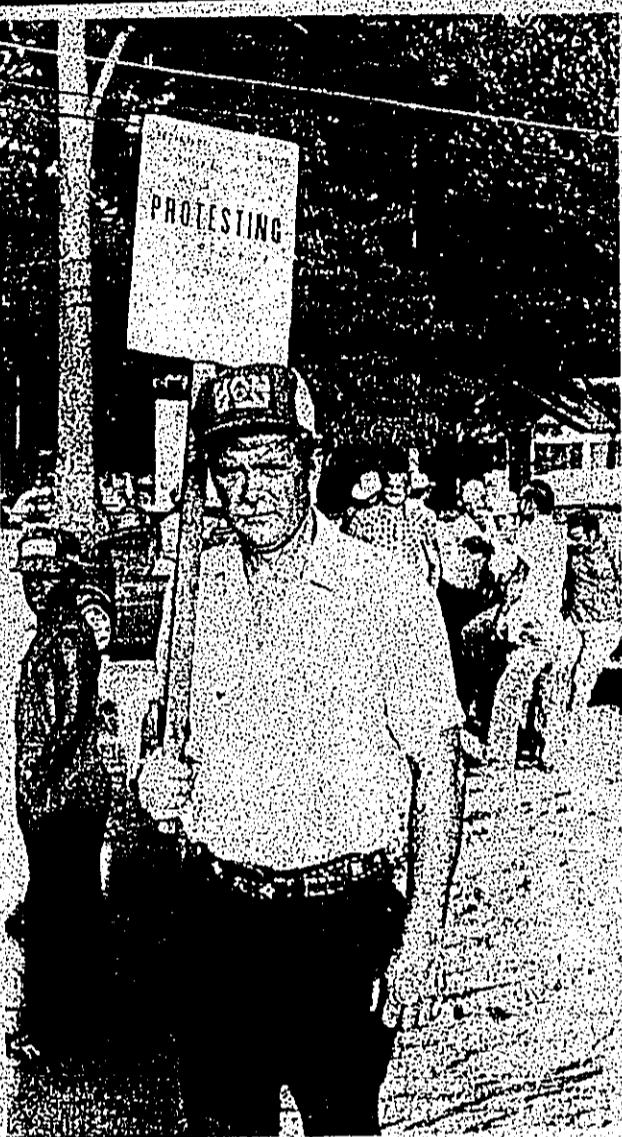
The act also outlines a 5-year plan for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's conservation assistance to districts and requires an evaluation of the effectiveness and progress of ongoing programs. Reports will be made to the public and Congress.

Our first meeting will primarily deal with discussions on soil and water resources in the district and how to conserve them, Blanchette said. The public will also have the opportunity to learn more about the RCA act and the mission, relationship, and responsibilities of the district and Soil Conservation Service.

I want to emphasize that the grass roots bottom-up approach is the key to this act. Out-district and Soil Conservation Service will need to identify specific resource concerns and associated problems, if any, in addition to determining the extent and severity of these problems. We urge anyone with an interest in natural resource conservation to attend and air their views, Blanchette concluded.

Strike Hits School Job

Carpenters with the Sabine Area Carpenter Association threw up the picket lines early Tuesday morning at the entrance to the site of the new Woodville High School in protest, they say.

Spokesmen for the A.F.L. C.I.O. group, John Wallace said the sub-standard conditions included "indifferent working conditions, poor sanitary and water facilities and finally, he added, low wages."

Wallace stated that the workers were making from \$4.50 to \$9 per hour on the job. Much less, he said, than the carpenters should be earning.

The picketing workers do not plan to resume construction duties until contractor Herman Bennett of Herman Bennett Company in Brownwood, Texas, shows good faith to provide these things, Wallace said.

As of Tuesday afternoon, Bennett had not been advised of the picket line but did state that the wages were fair and if the workers had complaints about the water to talk to the

On Weekends Doctors Seek Relief

Staff doctors at the Tyler County Hospital have advised the rapidly developing nationwide practice for hospitals to hire emergency room doctors and that these doctors are becoming a specialty and patients require and expect increasingly better care. Also, the doctors said that "hundreds of people are moving to the area and during the summer months the county is full of travelers that are accustomed to and expect complete emergency room care."

The doctors listed several reasons for their request which stems from the increased usage of the emergency room facility, especially during weekends. Staff doctors at Tyler County Hospital are Dr. R.E. Swearingen, Curtis M. Garner, L. Gayle, Burton, John O. Gilchrist and A.C. Ohlen. Some of the reasons that are pointed up by the request include: that it is becoming a rapidly developing nationwide practice for hospitals to hire emergency room doctors and that these doctors are becoming a specialty and patients require and expect increasingly better care.

Money Will Be Split

County Commissioners have until September of this year to spend some \$5,000 in Anti-Recession money, according to County Auditor Ann Fenderson, who said the money could be used for repairs, replacements or other current services provided by the county.

During the regular monthly meeting held Monday, commissioners voted to divide the money between the four precincts according to the number of road miles and bridges in the precinct.

According to County Judge Allen Sturrock, Anti-Recession money is similar to Revenue Sharing and is sent to counties that are economically depressed. "Back in the fall and winter we had a real high unemployment roll. The amount of the money is based on that," he said.

The funds will probably be used to hire extra help to work county roads during the summer months, commissioners say.

Fair Board members were also appointed during the meeting. They are Johnny Rushing, Pct. 3, Ruth Stanford, Pct. 2 and Henry Jordan, Pct. 4. They join other members: Louise Owens, Harold Lewis, Ben Worthy and Mrs. Harold Davis.

Commissioners requested that past Fair Board Chairman Carl Nichols, get the members together and to start plans and form committees for the 1978 Fair.

Write in votes went to Rodney Lawless with 8 votes, C.W. Whiteaker with 3 votes and M.D. Holland with 3 votes.

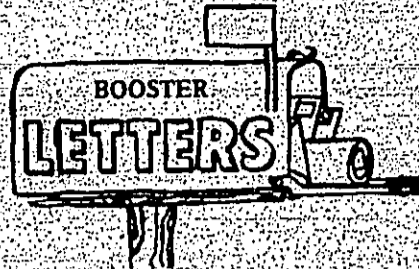
According to Vince Messina, Good Government Committee, a total of 308 votes were cast in Saturday's election, the largest turnout ever he said.

### Notes From An Oldtime

"Watermelons are ripe when the crepe myrtle blooms" and "Watermelons aren't sweet enough until June 'teenths." With such folk wisdom as that, how can one go wrong at least about watermelons? But June 'teenths is another matter. Once it was celebrated with such fervor, watermelons just had to be ripe. There were those among us, then, who had lived as slaves. What has happened? Have their people forgotten?

Remember Dan Woods? For decades, his long mournful call from Gillespie Hill echoed over the town at sunrise and again at sunset telling the world of his years of bondage. It was a lonely sound, but music, but there was a cadence, it was always the same and so regular you could almost set your clock by it. Perhaps it was imagination or the direction the wind was blowing, but you could follow him by the sound as he plodded down the dirt road to his field at daybreak then back to his home from his day's toil at dusk.

Then there were the Gilders, J. J. Gilder and U. M. Gilder owned plantations near here and they had a number of slaves who as was customary, took their master's surname. Four of their former slaves lived among us, Dave Henry, Nels, and Jones Gilder. They may have all been brothers some of their descendants claim that they were.

Dave was married to Charly and they owned their own home down the railroad. A part of each year Dave would stay in Houston working for John Henry Kirby. He would return home with money in his pocket to buy groceries and supplies his family would need until he came back again to the back doorstep to rest and Jones, with much prodding, would tell me all he could remember of his life. Since the burning ambition was to become a journalist, I decided I should write a "piece" about Jones for the paper.

He told me that the "chahms" he wore on a string around his neck, a rusty nail and a little cloth sack of some herb, probably John-de-conqueror, would ward off the voodooes. The "chahms" must have done the job because voodooes never seemed to bother Jones.

Amos Hyde told me that Jones was his great grandfather U. M. Gilder's slave and that they came here from Georgia in the early 1850's. Jones was sure that he was born in Alabama.

We hit a snag in Jones's biography when the question of his age came up. He hadn't the vaguest idea when he was born, knew nothing about his age but he "spec" he was mighty old.

Somewhat to a would-be journalist, dates and figures seemed very important. Session after session we probed, but nothing came to light. Was there anything big that happened in his memory that we could pin his age to? No, there weren't nothing.

April 8, 1943. When you hear a commotion in the barn yard some night, grab your shooting-iron and go out fishing. Hogs, piglets, calves, steers and even cows are found missing. The reason is meat rationing and the whole country is going to have to fight meatloggers. Senator O. Daniel declared in a radio talk in New York, Saturday, that Washington is "creating boards and bureaus to create problems" which were hampering the war effort. "I take the position that this is the people's war and also should be the people's government. I am, therefore, in favor of firing most of the Washington bureaucrats" and turning the government back to the people.

### Blake Urges DPS Support

AUSTIN—State Senator Roy Blake, D-Nacogdoches, announced his active support of increased appropriations to the Texas Department of Public Safety, in the 66th Session of the Texas Legislature. "I am appalled by the increasing crime of violence against our law enforcement officers, and I am equally concerned with the safety of the citizens of Texas who travel our state's highways," Senator Blake stated today. His action was prompted in part by the deaths of three Oklahoma State Troopers who died from wounds inflicted by fugitives from justice. "You cannot place a value on human life, but these officers laid their own lives on the line to save the lives of others,"

A couple of years ago, he uncovered the fact that the National Institute of Alcohol Abuse had spent \$102,000 to find out if drunk fish are more aggressive than sober fish. (I don't know about fish, but I had a cat once that loved beer, and no neighborhood dog was safe when she had a load on).

Proxmire you might remember is the guy who jogs from home to office every day of the year. To make a face-lift and a hair transplant, and once stomped a would-be mugger into the pavement. He is Chairman of the Senate Finance and Banking committee in his spare time, and eats sardines for breakfast.

Proxmire caught the Institute of Mental Health with their hand in the till, discharging \$97,000 to study the "Peruvian Hotel," a Sexual Dispensary and Social Arena.

Besides, if the Institute of Mental Health had checked with some 3,000,000 sailors who visited Mammie Stover's on their way through Pearl Harbor in World War II, there wouldn't have been any reason to spend \$97,000 and go all the way to Peru to find out about dispensaries and social arenas.)

One other Golden Fleece Senator Proxmire turned up in the Federal Register was a \$250,000 breath stopper commissioned by the Department of Transportation to find out our mode of travel in the year 2025. To make that study interesting, and justify their quarter of a million dollar spendthriftness, no doubt, they programmed in an ice age, a dictatorship, a hippie culture and ultimately the American Dream.

### Wilson Adds Amendment

WASHINGTON—CONGRESSMAN CHARLES WILSON (D-TX.) announced today that in addition to the introduction of his bill to the full House, an amendment to the HEW Appropriations bill has been introduced which will preclude OSHA (Occupational Safety and Health Administration) jurisdiction over hunting, fishing or sports shooting in areas which are primarily recreational activities. WILSON concedes having played a significant role in having the amendment introduced in the Labor/HEW subcommittee of the Appropriations Committee, a subcommittee of which Wilson is not a member. "Sure I helped it along," said Wilson. "My friend from Massachusetts, Silvio Conte introduced it for me. We figured that even if the pending court appeal was not won, we would simply render OSHA immobile by stripping them of all funding in this area of concern. It looks as though the combination of my bill and this amendment has it tied up."

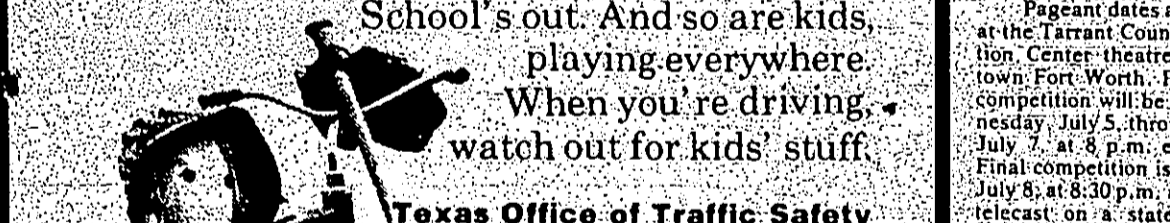

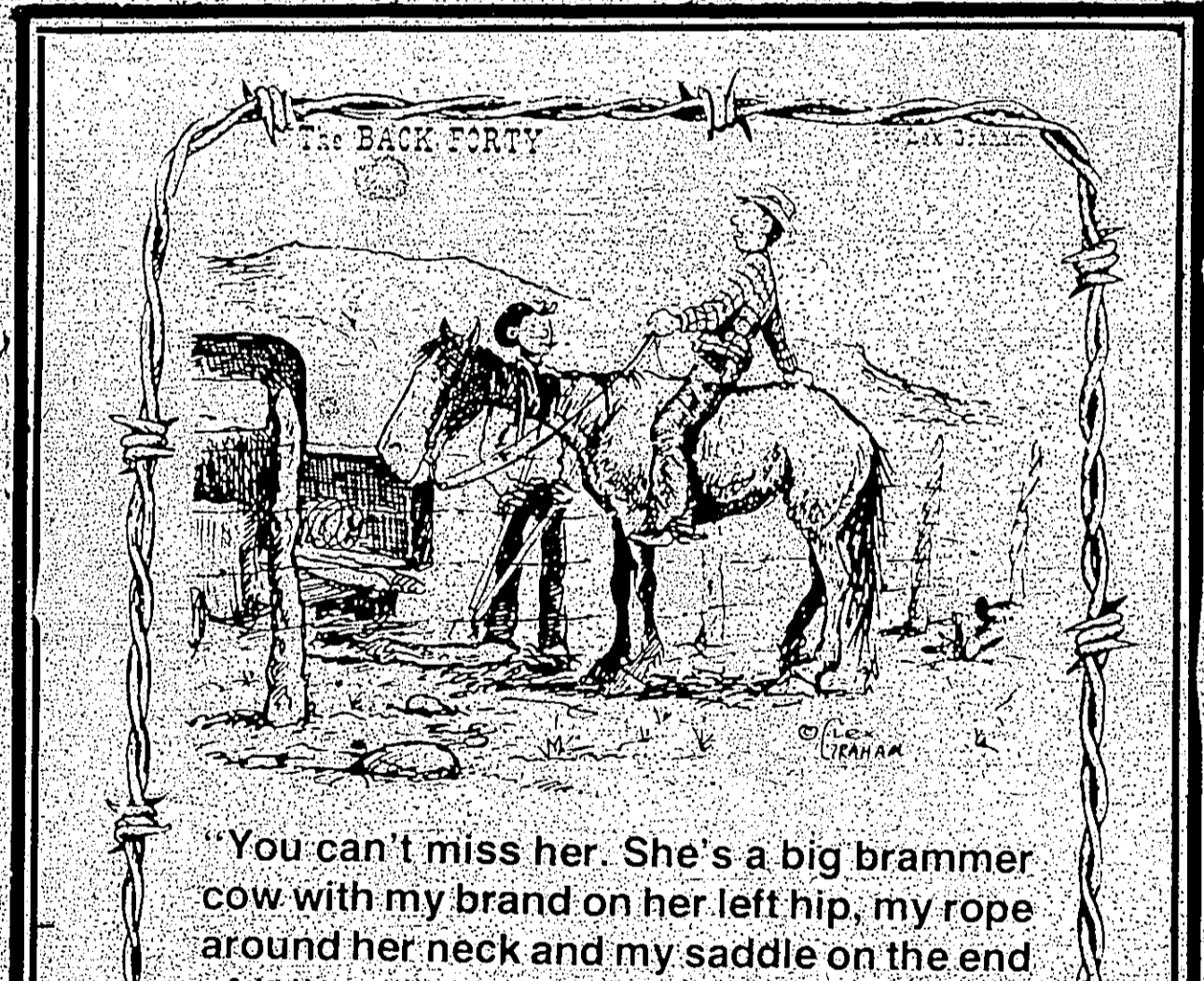

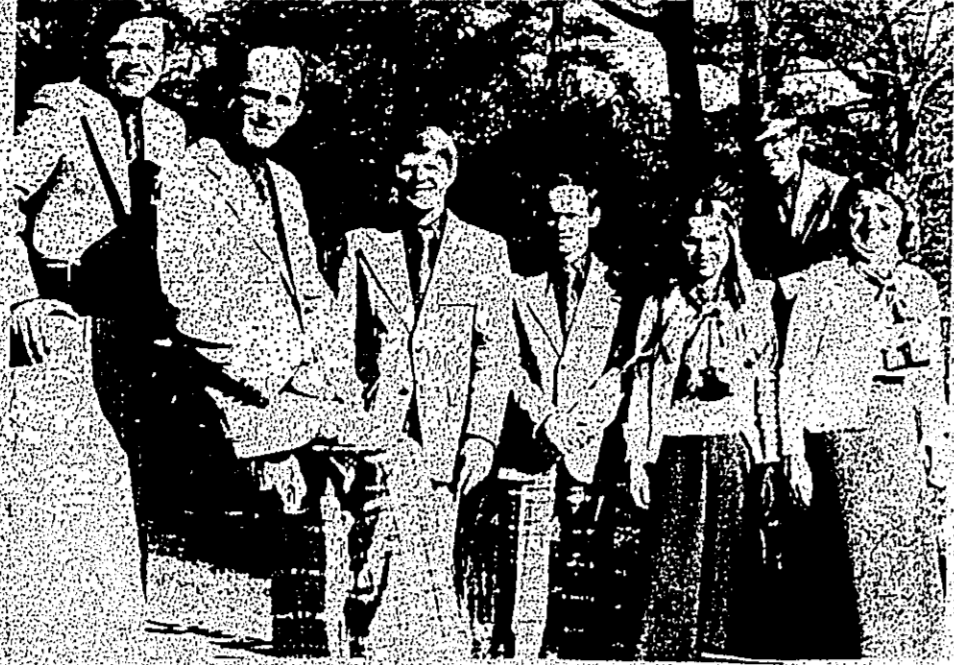

### Baptism

"The supreme standard by which all human conduct is judged; and opinions should be tried" is the Word of God (Baptist Manual, J.M. Pendleton, pg. 44).

**ACTION OF BAPTISM:** Do the Manual and the Bible agree on the act of baptism? The manual teaches that the only way baptism can be performed is by immersion (pg. 65-70). In Col. 2:12 Paul teaches: "Buried with him in baptism." Therefore, we are buried with him by baptism into death (Rom. 6:4). The Bible and the Manual agree on the action of baptism-it must be an immersion in water-sprinkling or pouring do not meet this requirement.

**SUBJECTS OF BAPTISM:** Baptism requires hearing (Romans 10:17); faith (Mk. 16:16); repentance (Acts 2:38). The Bible and the Manual (pg. 79-88) teach that the proper subject of baptism is a person capable of the foregoing conditions. However, they disagree as to the spiritual condition of the subject of baptism. "Baptism also expresses, in emblem, the believer's death to sin, and resurrection to newness of life. In repentance toward God and faith toward our Lord Jesus Christ, there is a spiritual death to sin, and a spiritual resurrection to newness of life. These two facts are emblematically set forth in baptism. Hence the absurdity of baptizing any who are not dead to sin." (Manual, pg. 75). A person dead to sin would be a saved person. Therefore, the Manual teaches that a saved person is the only one to be baptized. Yet, Acts 2:38 teaches that baptism is "...for the remission of sins." The Amos told Saul (Acts 8:39) he was saved-God having forgiven him (cleansed him of sin) when he submitted to the command of God (Cf. Acts: 10:48). Is the power of salvation in the water? No! The power of salvation is in Christ (Acts 4:12) who required the water (Mk. 16:16; Acts 2:38).

## Hardin County Western Weekend June 30 & July 1

### District Engineer Notes New Regs.

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
A new regulation which goes into effect on 15 November 1978 has been published which will allow seaplane operations on all Corps of Engineers lakes in those areas not prohibited by the respective District Engineers. This new regulation is a part of the Federal Regulations.

In order to implement this new regulation in a fair and equitable manner each District Engineer is charged with the responsibility of examining each lake in his District which has a seaplane landing area and determining if it is suitable for seaplane operations. Before making any final decision, it is the intent of the Public Notice to have as much public input as possible. That is the purpose of this public notice.

Having completed my preliminary investigation of B.A. Steinhagen Lake and Sam Rayburn Lake, both in Jasper, Texas, I propose to prohibit seaplane operations at B.A. Steinhagen Lake and place certain restrictions on seaplane operations at Sam Rayburn Lake. B.A. Steinhagen Lake, sometimes called Dam-Burner town Bluff, has a water surface of 13,700 acres at contour elevation with the main body of the lake oriented in a southeasterly-northwesterly direction. The lake has several characteristics which, in my opinion, would be detrimental to seaplane operations. The lake is shallow having an average depth of seven feet. The elevation of the lake is 100 feet above the High Water Elevation. The lake is surrounded by numerous stumps and periodically has large amounts of aquatic weeds, such as alligator weed and water hyacinth. The lower half of the lake is spotted throughout with small cypress trees and considerably throughout the year, sometimes exposing small islands in the lower southern half of the lake. There are a few small areas of open water, but these are usually dominated by cypress trees.

## Can County School Districts Absorb Handicapped Students?

Can public schools in Tyler County adequately take over the care and education of severely handicapped children? Can our schools be equipped with the type of facilities needed for this program, such as hallway activities, up-ramps for wheelchairs, and special restroom facilities?

When asked those questions, Warren High School Superintendent Adolph Hyppochuck, stated, "It's not a case of can we take over this program, it's a case of we have to."

"I think we ought to reconsider our priorities in education. The school districts are spending too much money on programs that aren't nearly as important as one of this manner. Therefore, we are neglecting students who have a greater need for public education, such as the handicapped," he added.

When asked where handicapped students would be placed in the Colmesand School District, superintendent James Handley said, "The students will be placed in grade levels according to their mental abilities."

Public Law 94-142 entitled "Education For All Handicapped Children," states that public schools must provide educational services for all handicapped children ages 3 to 21, no matter what degree the severity of the handicap.

"In general schools have not wanted to serve the severely handicapped. They justify this by not having the funds to provide special facilities and qualified teachers needed by these children since the state has not provided funds to implement this law," according to MHMR officials.

"This law was passed four years ago but has not gone into effect until this year because the guidelines for it have just been completed."

The Texas Plan which is approved by the Texas Education Agency says that schools will provide services for the handicapped unless the school district pays 100 percent of the cost for another agency to provide these educational services.

Eileen Mason and Wanda Hadnot are co-workers at the Tyler County Developmental Center located on Wheat Street in Woodville. "These are my kids, big and little, and we're here to show them we love them and to teach them basic things that are essential that they know for everyday life."

According to the Director of the Texas Mental Health Mental Retardation Service, supervision of the program for one year, with the local director being paid by the school and all overhead such as rent and utilities being paid by MHMR. What happens after next year has not been clearly portrayed to Tyler County School district officials and to their tax paying patrons. The questions of how the districts will effectively assume the educational role still remains to be seen.

## Wilson Opposes Double Standard

WASHINGTON—Congressman Charles Wilson (D-TX) today announced his co-sponsorship of a bill seeking to place 535 members of Congress and 1,600 Congressional employees under laws that would require Congress to abide by the provisions of laws that have passed in the areas of equal employment opportunity, equal pay, freedom of information, social security, labor relations, and occupational health and safety.

One of the more pronounced double standards in Congressional compliance to laws, is that of the Social Security system. All Americans are required to pay SS

with the exception of Congress and government employees. They have their own pension plan and do not help to support Social Security. Congress would also be forced to comply with Equal Employment Opportunity, Labor Management Relations, Fair Labor Standards, Freedom of Information act and others.

"There is justifiable public outrage with the double standard Congress applies in exempting itself from the laws it passes," said Wilson. "It can only breed disrespect for our law-making institutions and that is one thing Congress cannot afford to encourage."

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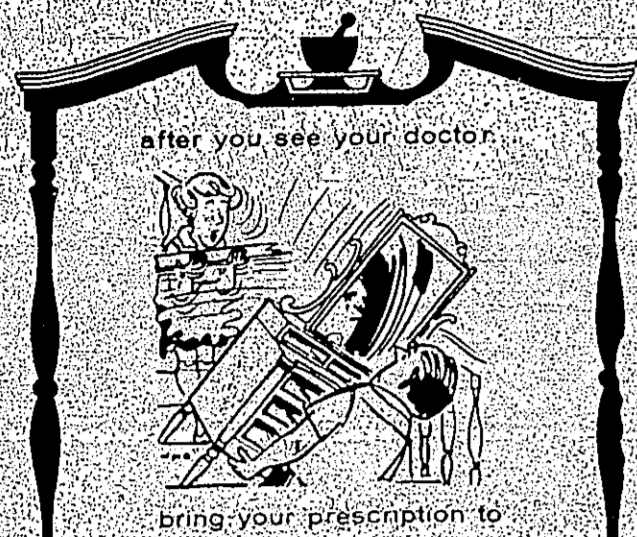

# Study Before Buying

Consumer "homework" before buying a major appliance can pay off—money-wise and time-wise.

The wise consumer will want to invest some pre-purchase study to maximize purchase satisfaction and avoid the pitfalls experienced by consumers who buy appliances in a hasty and uninformed manner, says Dr. Carolyn McKinney, family resource management specialist.

Unfortunately, in all too many situations, major appliances are hastily purchased and the consumer becomes a victim of his or her own lack of pre-purchase thought and investigation.

Dr. McKinney is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Pre-purchase homework should include a review of information about the appliance being considered. Magazine, and newspaper articles, state, Extension bulletins, manufacturers' brochures and specification sheets, and federal government bulletins are available information sources.

Consider appliance styling and features, fuel requirements, and energy efficiency, family size and lifestyles, and available space, she says. Also, the wise consumer will think in advance about what questions to ask and discuss with the appliance dealer and salespeople.

Dr. McKinney recommends asking about items such as the following:

(1) Is the delivery and installation cost included in the sales price or are these charges extra? If the charges are extra, what is the estimated cost?

(2) What is the estimated operating (daily) cost of the appliance on an annual basis and over its lifetime?

(3) Does the dealer service the appliance? If not, where can authorized service be obtained?

(4) Will the dealer arrange for a demonstration of the appliance—especially the special or unique features?

(5) What information is available in the use and care manual? The dealer should have one available from the four models on display. Ask to see it—it will suggest additional pertinent questions about the specific appliance.

(6) What safety or certification seals are applied to the appliance to indicate safety performance and durability standards? American Gas Association Underwriters Laboratories and the AIA certification seals are those commonly used.

In addition, the consumer will need to consider the appliance cost in relation to the family budget.

Color and style factors, size or capacity requirements, and construction features that will contribute to long-term durability, ease of cleaning and convenience are also important to the specialist.

## Get Rid of Fleas

"Flea" in the pet world is the lowly flea. This little predator is capable of jumping 100 times its own length every few seconds. It lives on the blood of its host—the dog or cat.

Most pets show little evidence that fleas are present except for occasional scratching, but young animals afflicted with fleas can lose so much blood that they may die of anemia. Some pets have violent reactions to fleas and will have badly damaged skin and suffer extreme hair loss. Animals with severe flea allergies will scratch and tear at themselves, especially just above the tail and around the hind legs. Mildly infested animals may have only small red spots on the skin.

Careful examination of the hair coat may reveal fleas scurrying about. Often only the presence of numerous pepper-like specks may be found in the hair coat. These specks are not flea eggs (which are white), but rather the bowel movements of adult fleas, containing dried blood. Drop a few of the specks on a wet white paper towel. The area around the speck will turn red as the blood dissolves. Animals with severe flea allergies often will scratch off all the fleas leaving the specks and a severely damaged skin as the only evidence of flea infestation.

Fleas act as a carrier of tapeworms and many animals with flea infestations will eventually have tapeworms. Tapeworms are small white worms in the animal's bowel movements that look like a grain of rice.

The best treatment for any animal with flea infestation is to eliminate the fleas on the pet and keep them off. This is much easier said than done. It often requires dipping the pet, using a preventative, dust and treating your house and yard with an insecticide.

"Baths, even with a 'flea shampoo' have little value in getting rid of fleas," explained Dr. James R. Collins, a small

animal practitioner in Houston. "The most a bath does is to give the next crop of fleas a nice, clean environment."

The most effective dips varies in different parts of the state, Dr. Collins explained, so you should consult your veterinarian for the most effective one to use in your area. A five percent methylcarbamate dust is used between dips. Special preparations are required for cats and only those approved for use on cats should be used.

"Don't count on a flea collar to completely control fleas on all animals," Dr. Collins continued. "If a collar is used, examine the skin underneath it regularly to make sure there is no skin

reaction to the chemicals in the collar."

Treating the premises is the most important aspect of flea control. Since the eggs and some growing stages are extremely resistant to insecticides, multiple weekly applications are necessary. Follow manufacturers' directions carefully for compounds applied with a sprayer attached to the garden hose. Carpets in the home must be vacuumed often. Some of the flea fogger bombs work well but a professional exterminator is recommended for inside flea control.

Prevention, careful observation and treatment will result in a healthier, happier pet without fleas.
