Tax Relief Agenda Revealed By Briscoe

For the first time in Texas history, the state legislature convened Monday to examine legislation that could bring \$6 billion dollars of tax relief to Texas citizens in the next two years.

In a historic move, Governor Dolph Briscoe listed his legislative agenda late Saturday. The tax relief proposals recommended by Briscoe include:

- Repeal of the state sales tax on residential utility bills, with a provision for cities to remove their local sales tax by a vote of the majority of the governing body. Estimated savings to taxpayers is \$450.7 million over the next three years, assuming immediate enactment, that would work out to a \$3.4 dollar a month savings to the average consumer.
- Increasing the state inheritance exemption from \$25,000 to \$200,000 on each estate. The tax savings over a three-year period is estimated at \$46.3 million.
- A constitutional amendment increasing the residential homestead exemption to a maximum of \$10,000 (or \$20,000 for those 65 and older) for school tax purposes with the state to reimburse school districts for their actual loss.

- Estimated tax savings to homeowners is \$650 million for 1980-81.
- A constitutional amendment directing the legislature to provide for taxing agricultural and timberlands on the basis of productivity, rather than market value, with the state to replace the loss to school districts. Savings to farm, ranch, and timber owners is estimated at \$29 million during the next two years.
- A constitutional amendment establishing limits on tax or spending increases by local governments. A five percent per year limit is under consideration, with additional increases possible through two-thirds

Wheat Is State Bar Delegate

State delegates serve on the nominating committee for national officers and are chairmen of the state delegations in the House. They are elected by the ABA members in their

respective states.

Wheat, who has been a House delegate representing the State Bar of Texas since 1972, has served as a member of the ABA's Committee on Environmental Quality and the Water Resources Committee of the Section of Natural Resources Law and the ABA Standing Committee on Environmental Law.

A member of the Tyler County and Jefferson County Bar Associations, Wheat organized the Texas Conference of Bar Presidents and the Environmental Law Section of the State Bar of Texas during

his administration as president from 1969-1970.

He served as director of the State Bar of Texas from 1964-1967; was chairman of the Environmental Law Section, State Bar of Texas; and chairman of the state bar's Committee on Law of Water Rights from 1967-1978.

Wheat is a Fellow of the American Bar Foundation and a Life Fellow of the Texas Bar Foundation.

Active in civic affairs, Wheat is a member of the administrative board, Woodville United Methodist Church member of the executive

council, Trinity Neches Council, Boy Scouts of America; past president and member, board of directors of the Texas Water Conservation Association; and member and chairman of the Land Use Committee of the National Water Resources Association.

Born in Woodville, Wheat was graduated from the School of Law, University of Texas in 1952. He first practiced law with the firm of Wheat and Briscoe from 1952-1966. The name was changed to Wheat, Briscoe and Briscoe in 1966 and is now Wheat and Stafford.

Council Meets

legislature acts favorably on the tax reduction proposals now before it.

Relief will come in the

form of lower utility bills, increases in homestead exemptions (particularly for those 65 or older), an increase in the inheritance tax exemption, and a change in the method of valuation of farm, ranch, and timber land.

State Senator Roy Blake of Nacogdoches, while hopeful is cautious about making any predictions. "We have a lot to look at, and a long way to go," he concluded.

Rep. Jim Browder of Coldspring echoed Blake's concern but stressed the need for relief.

The rapid growth and development of the Tyler County area will make the land valuation issue even more crucial.

Currently land is valued at its fair market value, regardless of its production worth. As many people are discovering, a new subdivision or commercial development can send real estate values soaring. Soon the taxpayer is faced with much higher taxes, a little prospect of relief.

Under Briscoe's proposal for valuing land on the basis of productivity, the productive worth of the land would be used as the basis for taxes. Only when the land was sold would the valuation be shifted upward to reflect the sale.

State estimates predict that the savings would amount to over \$259 million dollars in the first two years.

Revenue lost by school districts would be replaced by the state from projected revenue surpluses.

Artist Gray To 'Release' Tile Process

WOODVILLE—After 20 years of being the only artist in his field, Clyde E. Gray, Artist, Inventor and Creator of Heritage Village, has decided to release his ceramic tile process, so that other artists may benefit from it.

Although Gray is self-taught and did not take up painting until he retired in 1953, his ceramic tile paintings are known all over the world.

Gray's largest single sale for his Tile Paintings was \$7,000.00 for 6 ceramic tile

panels. While some of his 4-inch tiles sell for under \$10.00, he has one 24 tile painting for which he has turned down a \$2,000.00 offer.

He has evolved his own system of underglaze painting which ceramic authorities say is not duplicated here or abroad. This application method permits him to achieve in ceramics either the effect of oils or flowing water, colors while still obtaining hairline detail.

Gray has been awarded the National Liberty Medal of

the Texas Heritage Foundation for his work in preserving Texas History in his ceramic paintings. The ceramic tile process that Gray has developed is a revival of an all but lost art of the 18th century. Until he developed his process the most fine arts were oil, watercolor, pastels and pen & ink. Gray's process is the only one of the media which requires no protection or care to preserve the painting as all other works of art do. A ceramic painting will last forever whether it is hanging on a wall

or buried in the ground.

The colors that Gray uses in his process are mineral oxides and only achieve their true effect by extremely high heat. Most of the work that Gray does is fired at around 2,000 degrees.

In his 20 years of development Gray is now in a position to teach any artist to do this work in their own style using his method of application and making it a work of art that will endure forever.

Gray will teach in his own

studio in Woodville, and his classes will be limited to about 5 artists per week. He is only taking artists who have had art training. If they are now painting, Gray says "He can teach them his process in a week's time."

"I think it is time," Gray said, "to teach other artists this process so that it can be carried on. Everything he paints on tile will be around somewhere 10,000 years from now," Gray points out, "even if he won't."

Best intended of federal laws too often end up as nightmares.

That's why the truck's belly, madhorn, Furish layover and orange footed pimpleback are soon to be household words.

All are on the endangered species list, and under the regulations of the Endangered Species Act, passed by the Congress in 1973. Each of these, and 24,000 plant and animal species are now protected by law. Dams have been halted when the project was more than 90 percent completed, because of a tiny fish called the snail darter. The Furish layover, a spring blooming plant has stopped a power plant construction project in the State of Maine.

And lest you think Texas has been forgotten, the Houston road has stalled a major shopping mall completion in Houston. No one seems to know much about the Houston road. Apparently no one has seen a Houston road in Texas, but according to the federal Fish and Wildlife Service, who catalogued and identified the 24,000 endangered plants and animals, the Houston road's last known habitat was the parking lot (now covered with asphalt), at the new shopping center. All future construction of the complex is stalled until government officials can determine whether or not the Houston road is extinct.

I would presume when the Congress passed the Endangered Species Act five years ago, they were thinking of whooping cranes, bald eagles and grizzly bears. In fact, when the Act was signed by the President, only 100 species were formally identified.

But bureaucracy being what it is, keeping track of 100 plants and animals wasn't nearly as challenging as 24,000.

None of us can honestly say we aren't in favor of protecting our heritage, but with Mother Nature's perverseness in eliminating only the hardest of the species, can we presume to influence her judgement in favor of the tan rifle shell, orange footed pimpleback, and Cumberland monkey face. (All are mussels by the way that halted construction of the Duck River Dam in Tennessee.)

The Endangered Species Act, legislated to fill what seemed to be a necessary need at the time has been turned into a travesty. The cost of enforcement will be astronomical. The species to be protected, most often that do not cannot presume to outweigh the public good.

I don't approve of killing bald eagles, I have watched with fascination the return of the whooping crane from almost certain extinction.

The fact that in our zeal to protect the alligator, people in Florida are fishing them out of their swimming pools, and the timber wolves are ravaging stock populations in northern Minnesota should give us pause.

Imagine if our ancestors were confronted with protecting the dinosaur and the sabre tooth tiger. We never would have come down out of the trees.

Vacation House & Tax Deferment

Among the benefits of being a homeowner are the unique tax advantages available. One of them is the ability to defer paying income tax on any profit made from the sale of your home if you buy a more expensive one within a certain amount of time. It does not apply in all cases.

For example, if you sell a vacation home at a \$2,000 profit and promptly buy a much more expensive place, can you defer paying the income tax on the profit? The answer is "no". This tax break is available only when both the house sold and the

house purchased serve as your principal residence. A vacation house doesn't qualify. However, if you owned the dwelling for more than the required time to allow the profit to be taxed as long term capital gains (nine months during calendar year 1977 and one year after that), the \$2,000 profit would only be taxed at half the normal rate.

Hunter says that he plans on having as good an athletic program as anyone in the state.

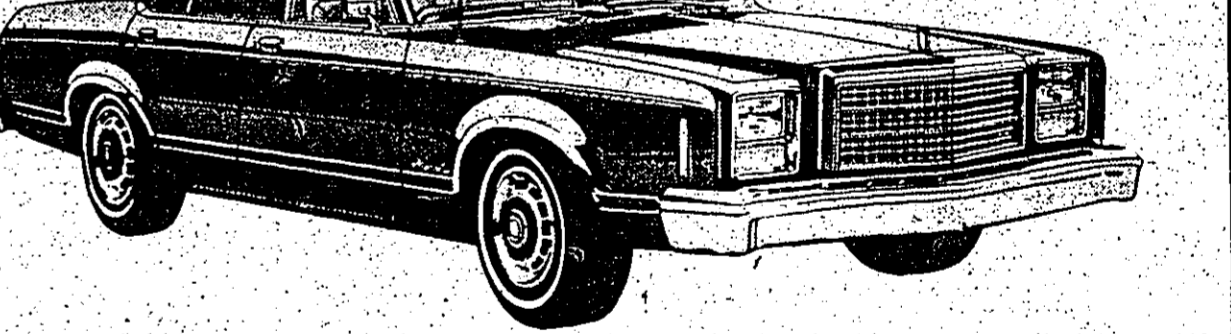

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Kids Are Taught To Blow Out Under Water

'Waterbaby' Lessons

(Featuring Zac Cole And Michael Kethan)

A special water safety course to be offered to parents and for youngsters ranging in age from 12 months to 4 years-old will be held at the Dogwood Country Club beginning this Monday July 17 at 10 a.m. Interested parents who wish to enroll must call before the July 17 date to enroll their child.

The term "Waterbabies" or "Waterproofing your child" are two ways of describing the hoped for results which are left from the parent-child learning experience.

Darby Kethan, who is certified to teach such a course will handle 12 children in one class at a time. A parent or guardian must be with each child and must be in the water with the child. If the first class exceeds 12 child limit then another class will be set up.

The course is offered to anyone within the 12 month to 4-year-old age bracket. Cost is \$26 for each child with classes extending over an 8 day period excluding weekends.

The course teaches a child to blow out water instead of inhaling. And according to Barbara Cole, of the Dogwood Country Club, the course hopefully will teach the child not to fear the water but to recognize when there is a problem and react accordingly. Like if another child falls in...to go get help...immediately.

Water safety is a major element of the course but having fun is a major part of the course, too. Blowing, splashing and kicking plus learning to swim are the overall expected end product of the lessons.

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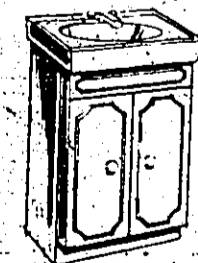

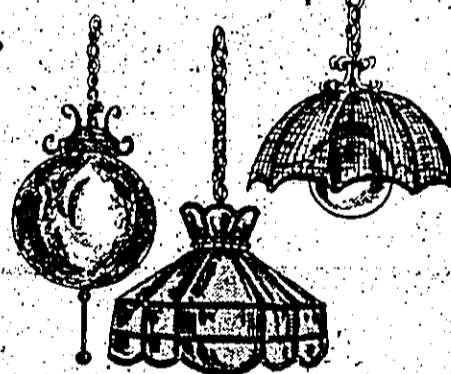

'All Or Nothing' Special Session

The Texas taxpayer revolt is a silent one. Missing in Texas are the vocal outcries of angered voters, whose pockets have been plucked of loose change. Absent are the slogans, the banners, the protest meetings.

In their place, a solid stream of curious citizens, carrying babies, cameras, and tour maps, who paused briefly to peer over the railing and observe the Texas legislative process in silence.

Their main concern seemed to be the merciless July heat, the lack of parking, and finding a water fountain.

Legislators seem no less excited. Briscoe's call for the special session was not greeted with great enthusiasm. The shock-wave from the California revolt has been slow reaching Texas.

For one thing, our tax burden is much lower than California's. A report by the House Study Group showed California per capita property taxes in 1977 were \$378, compared to \$190 in Texas. The U.S. average was \$242.

The report goes on to mention that total state and local tax collections in California were \$46 per person, but in Texas the amount was \$51. "Texas has among the lowest tax burdens in the country, with only 12 states collecting less taxes per person", the report concludes.

Texas ranks even lower when tax figures are compared to personal income. "As of 1974, only three states had a total tax bite that was a

smaller percentage of personal income", the House report explains.

Apart from the grumblings of the legislators roused from their summer pleasures, our revolt is silent--but yet much is at stake.

Our revenue surpluses are mounting at record rates, amounting to over \$3 billion during the next fiscal period. Briscoe's proposal would return over half of that surplus back to taxpayers.

In fact, Briscoe remains the lone, strong voice for tax relief. Governorat hopefuls John Hill and Bill Clements have applauded Briscoe's tax plan but haven't as yet taken the issue to the people to drum up popular support.

Capitol observers are predicting that the only tax relief we'll see will be in the form of sales tax-less utility bills. Other proposals, they offer, are just ahead of their time.

The legislative mood is strongly "lets get on with it". Whatever the "it" ultimately refers to.

The opening speeches are over. The pomp and ceremony, back-slapping, and rituals are over. The serious, business of law-making begins. Without the constant clamor of outraged taxpayers in the heat of revolt the legislators may soon forget why they are in Austin.

As elected representatives they are paid to reflect our wishes and concerns.

The next thirty days will show us what effect our collective yawn will have on the taxes we pay for years to come.

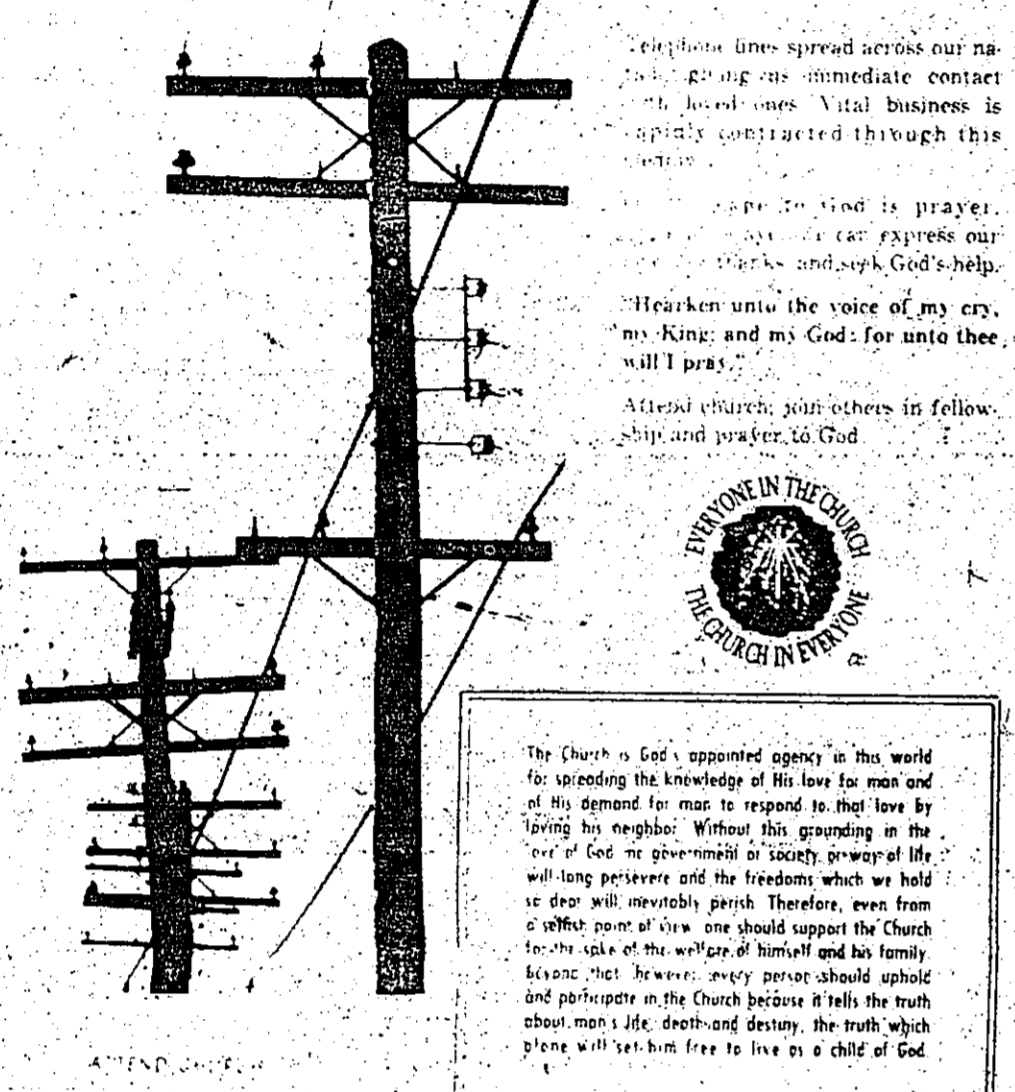

A Letter From Castroville, 1847 Part II

Arriving in Texas in 1847 to establish a Catholic church in the colony of Henri Castro in Medina County, Father Claude-Marie Dubuis, a French missionary, wrote in October of the same year to a fellow cleric in France. The beginning of his long letter, which formed the first segment of this three-part series, described his arrival in Castroville and his reception there:

In the second portion, Father Dubuis related to his friend some information about the Indians of the area, with whom he had become acquainted in his efforts to evangelize them:

Besides the colonists there were the Indian tribes to evangelize. I can tell you something about these redoubtable savages. I have

made their intimate acquaintance for I have been twice captured by them. On the 17th of June, as I set out at daybreak to go to celebrate the Holy Sacrifice at Ochi, where these cannibals had recently killed seven persons, I saw hundreds of them. I could not think of flight, I doubt whether I had time to even dream of it. The Indian's horse is as swift as his arrows. All I knew was that these savages introduced me to a new world. But scarcely had I told them that I was the captain of the Church, when I found myself lifted on their horses and pressed by turns to the breasts of the chief and his followers. Not a smile on their lips or their faces qualified that singular drama, which though it lasted but a quarter of an hour seemed to me sufficient.

DETMHMR Services Help Patients In Rural Areas

The most important aspect of the Deep East Texas Region Mental Retardation Services is that services for the mentally and emotionally handicapped in rural areas have help in their home communities.

Tyler County Judge Allen Sturrock, a member of the board of trustees of DETMHR, said the services in the county are enabled him to encourage people to seek help early before problems become so great they require hospitalization.

The services being made available in the county allows persons to continue working at their jobs to support their families and keep families intact.

"Having the services available locally has helped to remove some of the stigma involved with mental problems in the past," Judge Sturrock said.

Other board members have no control of who is appointed to the board, he said.

"With the county commissioners and county judges involved there is good local control over the functions of the agency and a check and balance system is provided.

"We live in the different areas served by the agency and we understand the needs," Judge Sturrock said. "This is also good for persons who have complaints because we are a lot closer to the people than someone in Austin or Washington."

Second Quarter Reports Due

Employers must report on Form 941 Social Security and Medicare taxes quarterly.

Quarterly liability (reduced by any credit during the quarter) is \$200 or more. The unpaid balance must be deposited.

Persons who have deposited the entire quarterly tax liability in a Federal Reserve Bank or approved commercial bank have until August 10 to file Form 941, "Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return" to the Internal Revenue Service.

Employers should use the preaddressed Form 941 mailed to them by the IRS or obtain copies of the form from the nearest IRS office.

IRS Publication 15, "Circular E-Employer's Tax Guide," provides more information and is available free from local IRS offices.

Steering Committee Elected For Fred Water System

At the recent second meeting of the steering committee for the Fred Water System, members of the Steering Committee were elected.

The steering committee was headed by Chairman W.A. McMillin who is the owner of the Fred Water Supply. The other five members consist of Mr. McMillin's wife Joyce, J.M. Cray, Dan Jordan, Alex Arnesen, and Dennis Moore.

This committee is responsible for obtaining applications to the System. Any person seeking an application or information should contact one of these committee members. The committee has set their quota for applications at 100 but they hope to obtain more.

For 100 residents to obtain membership into the Water System, a meter box will be installed at his home on completion of the project, and he will be charged an approximate water bill of \$10 per month. All members are guaranteed a good water supply and good water pressure.

The water system will be maintained and supervised by a Board of Directors. This Board will be an elected group of residents who are members of the Public Water System of Fred. Any resident applying for membership after the completion of the Water System will have to be reviewed and accepted by this Board of Directors.

If for any reason a resident should want to withdraw his membership from the System he should notify the Board of Directors in the Water System. He then will be refunded his \$100 membership fee and his meter box will be removed.

Ravburn Moore consulted engineer with J.F. Fontaine and Associates, will be at the next meeting for the Public Water Supply System of Fred on July 17. He will answer any questions concerning the system then. The general public is invited and are encouraged to attend," said Steering Committee Chairman W.A. McMillin. The meeting will be held in the auditorium of the Fred Elementary School at 7:30 p.m. Setting north and south boundaries for taking applications will be discussed at this meeting.

Concrete Repair Is Simple

COLLEGE STATION—If small cracks in sidewalks are becoming larger or uneven surfaces dangerous, follow a few easy steps to repair them, suggests Pat Seaman, housing and home furnishings specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

To begin repairing cracks in concrete sidewalks, obtain the following:

- (1) Packaged ready-mix mortar.
- (2) Epoxy concrete—"clear" type for narrow cracks and "grey" type for wide cracks and concrete breaks.
- (3) Wire brush.
- (4) Pointed trowel and wood float.
- (5) Heavy-duty paint brush.

Follow these steps to repair the cracks:

- (1) Carriage repair only when concrete is dry.
- (2) Chisel out the crack or hole wide under the surface.

Texas Highway Dept. Seeks Compliance

AUSTIN—An illegal roadside advertising sign has cost an owner a \$1,000 fine and drawn court orders to get the sign down by August 1.

The penalty for the sign is to be erected.

In the Smith County case, the owner did not have a permit for the sign. Neither would have done the owner any good, however, since the sign was in an area where roadside advertising signs are prohibited.

The department administers the highway beautification law which covers both advertising signs and junkyards. The state laws were enacted six years ago to bring Texas into compliance with federal highway beautification programs.

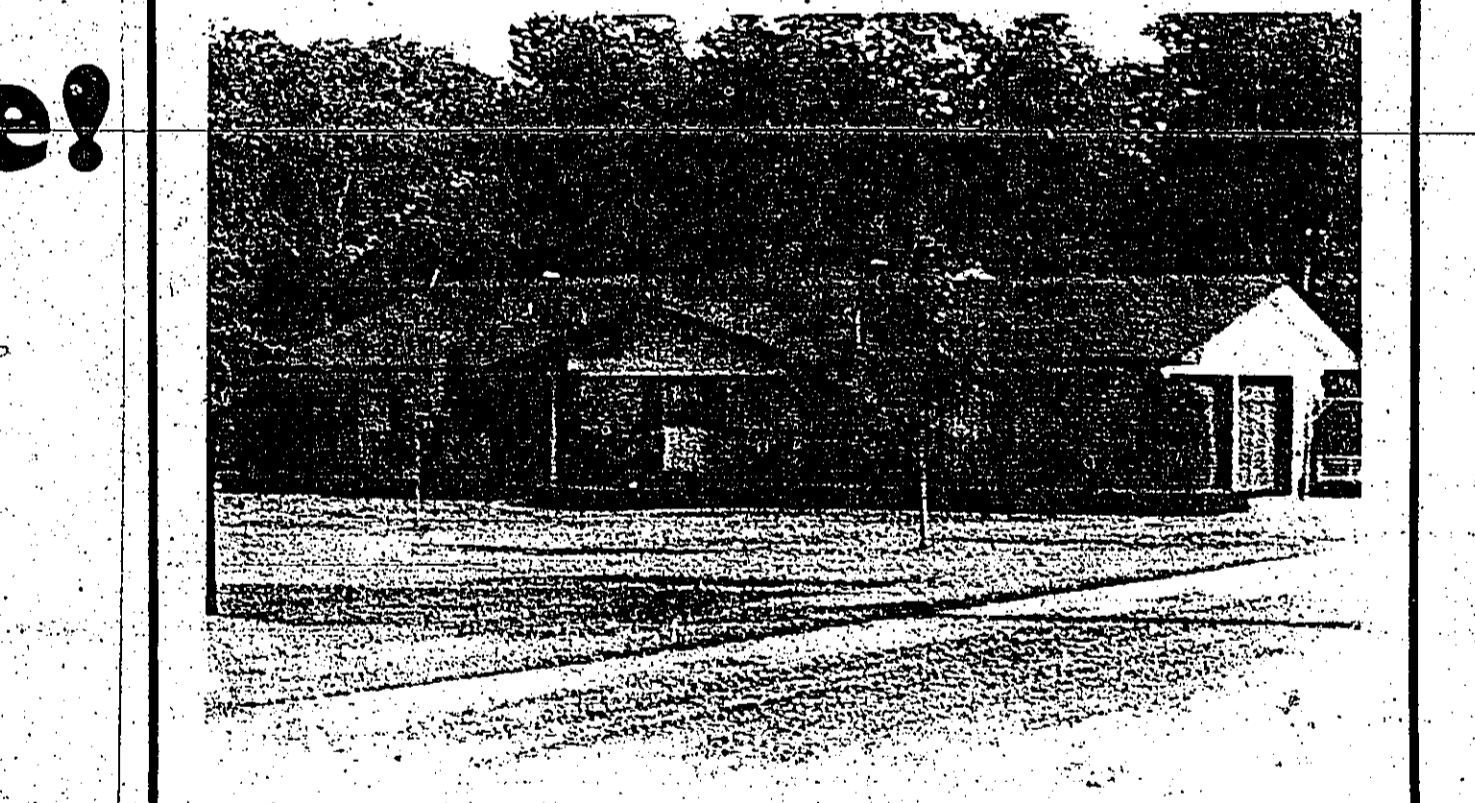

Wilson Seeks Hearings

WASHINGTON—Congressman Charles Wilson (D-Tx) today sent a letter to the chairman of three committees to which the bill H.R. 12937 was referred, requesting immediate hearings on legislation which seeks to place all members of Congress as well as 16,500 Congressional employees under the same laws Congress has passed for other Americans but from which it has exempted itself.

In his letter of request, Wilson stated that he "could think of no more urgent matter than to attempt to immediately remedy this gross double standard." The passage of the bill would place Congress under the Social Security Act, the Fair Labor Standards, Freedom of Information Act and other regulatory legislation.

Wilson's letter was hand delivered to Congressman Al Ullman, (D-Ore.) Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, Congressman Jack Brooks (D-Tx) Chairman of Government Operations Committee, and Congressman Carl Perkins (D-Ky.) Chairman of the Education and Labor Committee. Wilson urged their attention and action in expediting the passage of the bill from their respective committees.
