

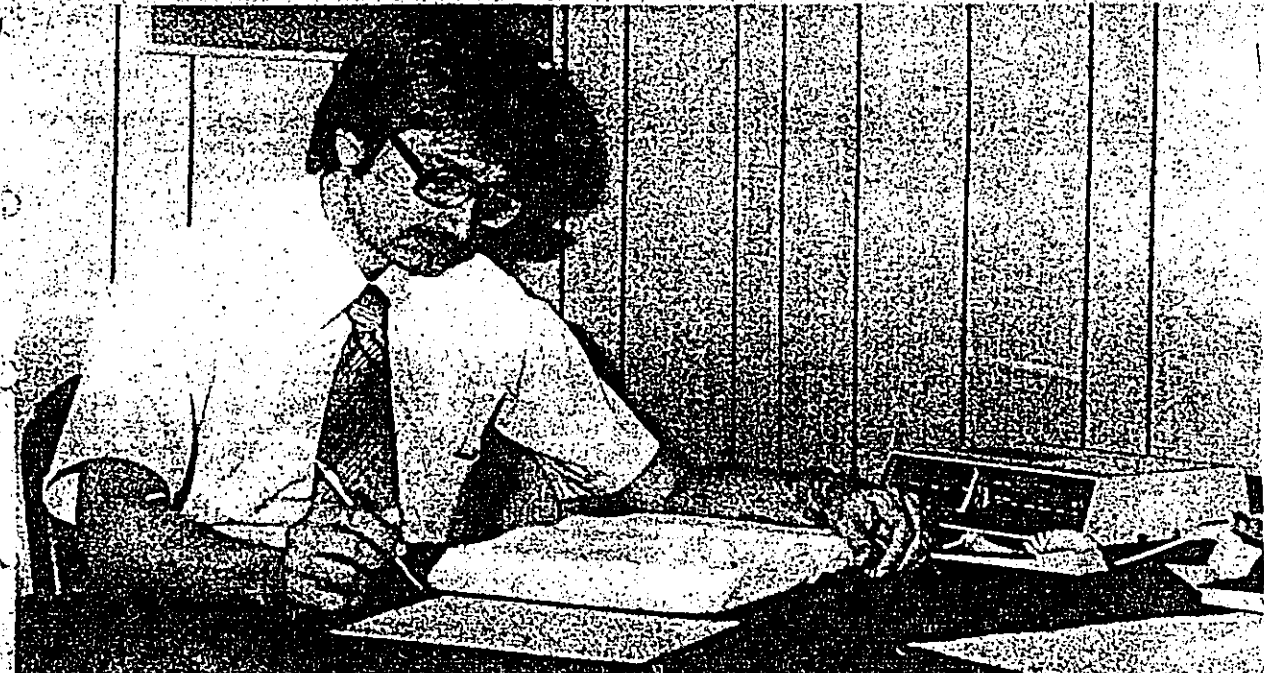

## Vogtsberger Takes Post

The Deep East Texas Mental Health and Mental Retardation (MHMR) out-patient clinic of Woodville has a new doctor, Ken Vogtsberger, M.D.

Vogtsberger, whose main office is in Lufkin, will come to Woodville every Monday to work in the evaluation and treatment of people who have had emotional difficulties.

"We work in medication treatment for people who come in, and we work on follow up care for those discharged from Stark State Hospital. We give them check-ups and keep up with their progress," he said.

Since he is only here one day a week, Vogtsberger has a full schedule of cases to review when he is here. There is also a screening process set up to evaluate those who come to the MHMR office. He does not see every person who needs treatment, because there is a staff of qualified personnel available. Counselors are also here on Wednesday and Friday.

Vogtsberger graduated from W. T. White high school in Dallas, and then finished his pre-med studies at Stephen F. Austin University in three years. He was accepted to three medical colleges and those of the University of Texas in San Antonio.

He earned an M.D. there and did his specialty training in psychiatry at Timberlawn Hospital in Dallas. Upon completion of his specialty training there he began work for MHMR.

He sees the potential for growth in the MHMR clinic in Woodville. "There is a need in the community for psychiatric services. If there is enough funding many can be treated on an out-patient basis even though it is their first period of difficulty."

"I hope we can do the best possible job in mental health care here. We hope to do away with the biases people have

toward those who have had problems. We are all the same in that we all have problems. It is only a matter of degree."

"The problems people face are due to any combination of factors. They can be biological, environmental, or

psychological. I believe in solving the problem with a conservative approach in medication use. There is no magic pill."

"We are available to help everybody whether they have money or not. We treat people with alcohol and other drug

problems, as well as those with emotional difficulties."

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## Briscoe Says

# Property Tax Cut Plan 'Interesting'

Governor Dolph Briscoe this week said he is very interested in a proposal which could effectively reduce property taxes levied by Texas school districts.

The proposal, as put forth by Representatives Jim Nugent of Kerrville and Lynn Nabers of Brownwood would dedicate one-fourth of the revenue from the State's general sales and use tax to reduce school ad valorem taxes throughout the state.

"The Legislature currently is meeting in a special session to consider legislation and proposed constitutional amendments which would return a portion of the current and projected state surplus to the people of Texas," Governor Briscoe said. "I am extremely interested in any proposal which could result in a lowering of property taxes and particularly those levied by our Texas school districts."

Nugent and Nabers have expressed hope for a hearing early this week on their proposal.

Nugent and Nabers explained that to be eligible to receive additional state funds, under their proposal, a school district must reduce the ad valorem taxes it levies for maintenance and operation purposes by \$200 for each \$220 it will receive. The maximum amount by which a school district would have to reduce its taxes would be 50 percent. The "new" state money, the two House members said, would be distributed to school

districts on a per Average Daily Attendance (ADA) basis with the 1978 share being \$220 per ADA.

"The existence of the surplus in the State Treasury and the projected surplus has to mean that the State is taking too much money from the pockets of Texas taxpayers. In our opinion it is time to return part of that money to the taxpayers and we think our approach is most equitable," Nugent and Nabers said.

Preliminary statistics show the proposal would have the following effect in Tyler County:

\*\*'New' State Funds means the amount of additional State money to be received by a school district in excess of the amount the district currently is raising through ad valorem taxes for maintenance and operation purposes.

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### STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Bills to slash state taxes about half a billion dollars were advanced by the House and Senate in first floor action of the special legislative session.

These measures were approved by lawmakers. Repeal of the state's four cent sales tax on home gas and electrical bills.

An increase in the inheritance tax exemptions from \$25,000 to \$200,000.

The Senate bills allow cities the option of eliminating their local sales tax on home gas and electrical bills.

The House elected to abolish the local one-cent level as well as the state tax on home and "mom and pop" small business establishments.

The House further approved a five percent per year inflation provision on the income tax.

## Bureau Supports Individual Rights

The Farm Bureau supports the rights of individuals to own and operate his farm and his property in the way that he sees fit so long as it does not negatively affect any one else.

We recommend and support action through legislation, regulation or otherwise to provide maximum protection for the mineral, land, and property rights of farmers and ranchers in Texas. Such action should include measures to provide additional safeguards for property owners in condemnation or annexation proceedings.

We strongly support soil and water conservation on a voluntary basis through such programs as the Great Plains Conservation Program, the Rural Environmental Assistance Program, and through our local Soil and Water Conservation Districts. We strongly oppose compulsory soil and water conservation practices. We do not feel that laws should be passed permitting public access to private property.

We strongly recommend legislation providing that land owners not be held liable for any accident that occurs on his property unless the injured party is employed by the property owner, or is a guest of the property owner.

We believe that protecting and maintaining the present level of private ownership of farm and ranch land and the supply of taxable property will benefit all our citizens. With federal and state ownership of over one-third of the nation's lands, and with approximately 1/4 million acres of land being taken from agricultural production each year, it is imperative that new controls and policies be established on governmental acquisition of land.

It is a fact. Money spent for advertising can be deducted from an income tax report. Some times we almost wonder if Woodville's a businessmen appreciate that fact.

I would be the first one to admit that this column does not have the impact of a cover photo on Sports Illustrated. We all know what happens to teams and individuals that find themselves in living color on the cover of Sports Illustrated.

But I can't help being a little braggish this week, as the Boston Red Sox continue to tear the American League East apart, and look better on the field than they have in years.

However, this year might be different. I have been saying that every year for thirty years too. The Sox finally have some pitching, well, at least till the end of June. Only two old timers on the staff, two new ones stole from the Yankees and the Cleveland Indians playing away players to be named later, and several million dollars make the 1978 season more interesting.

Not that the month of June wasn't fraught with peril. Fever since the expansion teams came into the league, scheduling of home and away games has been a nightmare for the players. The poor Yankees had to go fourteen innings the other night in New York to beat Boston and then fly to Milwaukee for a doubleheader the next day. (They lost both games.) The ironic thing is that the next two days, the Yanks didn't play anybody.

Boston, Baltimore and New York, the perennial teams at the top of the division for several years, and up playing seventeen games with each other in June, and that performance could well determine where each is in the standings in October.

Baseball fan sport has been "buried" by sports writers and fans alike for years, but this season, attendance records are up all over the league. Boston passed the million mark at home a week ago, and the Houston Astros, who must be as frustrating to their fans as the Red Sox are with me, are more than 150,000 tickets ahead from this same time last season.

Only one thing bothers me about Boston. It is the smallest ballpark in either league, both in dimension and seating capacity. All the years Mr. Yawkey owned the ball club, he said they would never sell advertising on the outfield fences, nor would they add seating capacity.

With his death last year, and subsequent sale of the franchise to new owners, all that may change. Seating is to be increased by about twenty percent.

There's only one feature of the ballpark I hope they never tamper with.

With a short left field foul line (311 feet from home plate), the pitchers have been given a break. If you can call it a break. It's a 17-foot tall fence out in left field, to keep routine fly balls in any other park from ending up cheap home runs. Course, every right-handed hitter in the majors thinks that fence is tailored just for him, and it's amazing how many of them make fools out of themselves trying to pull the ball.

So you folks in Boston who make the decisions, leave the Green Monster just as it is. Fenway Park is one of the few ball yards left where the fans get practically on the field, and the teams play on natural grass. Somehow symmetry and Astroturf would take all the fun out of rooting the Red Sox to the pennant every ten years.

It does not call for new taxes or bond issues. Yet, it does create more new businesses and new jobs in a given area than any five industries you can name. In a recent news release the Missouri Department of Tourism released these figures. Tourism in Missouri in 1977 was a \$2.5 billion industry. It provided jobs for 230,000 persons and it created 26,440 new tourist oriented businesses.

As to our two day visit to Woodville, I would like to give you some figures as to how much we spent from the moment we arrived until we left Friday morning at 8:15. Motel, \$58; Breakfast, \$1.00; Noon, \$1.00; Outdoor Drama \$9.00; Program \$2.00; Drinks \$1.00; Admission to the Alex Shivers Museum \$1.00; Gasoline \$10.55; Miscellaneous \$5.00 for a total of \$98.38.

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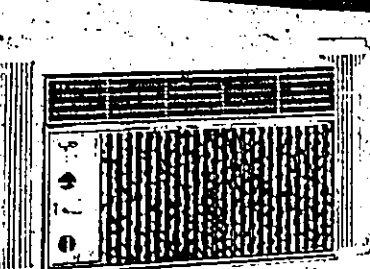

The Tyler County Big League All-Stars once again clinched another "double" victory on Friday, July 14, against the Beaumont All-Stars, with the final score of 4-0.

The Beaumont All-Stars who had previously defeated the Lumberton All-Stars and Tyler County (3-2) needed only to win the game Friday to knock Tyler County out of the District play-off.

The pitching of Martin Riley and the offensive batting power of Tyler County proved to be too much for them that night.

Both teams were locked into a pitching duel until the top of the fourth inning. Gerald Dill started the Tyler County part of the inning by drawing a free pass to first. The Beaumont pitcher, Troy Coleman, in an attempt to pick the speedster off first, threw the ball over the first baseman's head and Dill hustled into center field. Dill scored and on the throw to home, Maclin then went to second. The next 2 batters were downed, but Tyler County had a lead of 1-0.

In the Beaumont half of the inning 2 possible runs for Beaumont were stolen, when first baseman Grady Hatton jumped about two feet in the air to nab a screaming line and then stepped on first for a single-handed double play.

Then Tyler County drew more blood in the sixth inning after Martin Riley made it to first on a Beaumont throwing error. Gerald Dill then drilled the ball into left field for a single, putting Riley on second. Gary Benoit then laid down a bunt in an attempt to advance the base runners, but the attempt failed as Riley was thrown out at third base. Charles Maclin then hit a ground ball straight up the middle which advanced Dill to third and Benoit to second, but Maclin didn't seem aware of this fact, and after rounding first he started on to second base. When he was 4 to 5 feet from the bag he realized that it was already occupied. While all of this was happening, the Beaumont center fielder had thrown the ball home to hold Dill on third. The catcher walked when Maclin was doing and so he threw the ball to the first baseman, who stood holding the ball, without a force play thereby allowing Maclin to make it safely back to first. Gary Covart drew a walk, which forced Dill home. Then a new pitcher was brought in for Beaumont and he threw a wild pitch, while facing Kevin

Battise, which allowed Benoit to score. Battise drew a walk, which loaded the bases again.

However Coleman, the new Beaumont pitcher, put out the fire by striking out the next 2 batters.

That inning clinched the 4-0 victory for Tyler County. With this victory a playoff will be placed to decide the District champs.

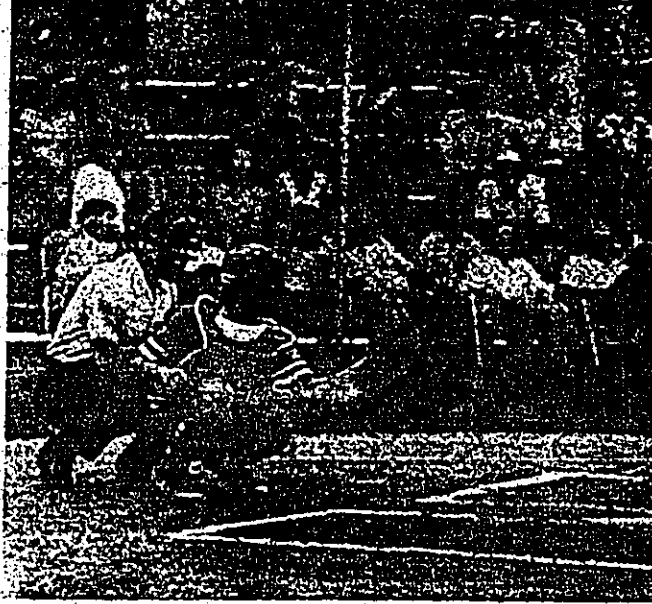

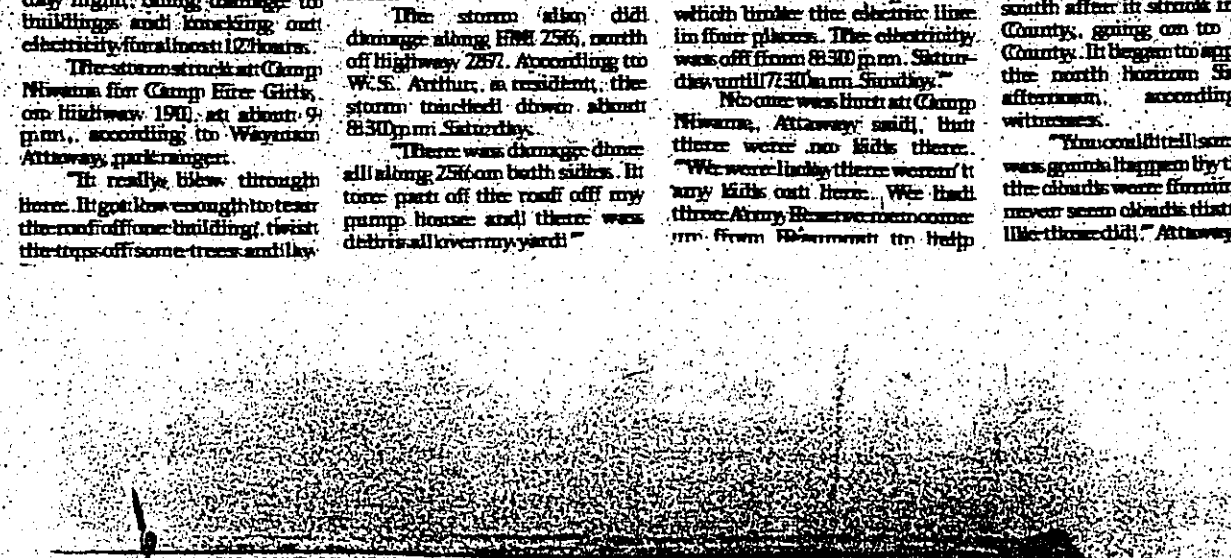
# Tornado Touches Down

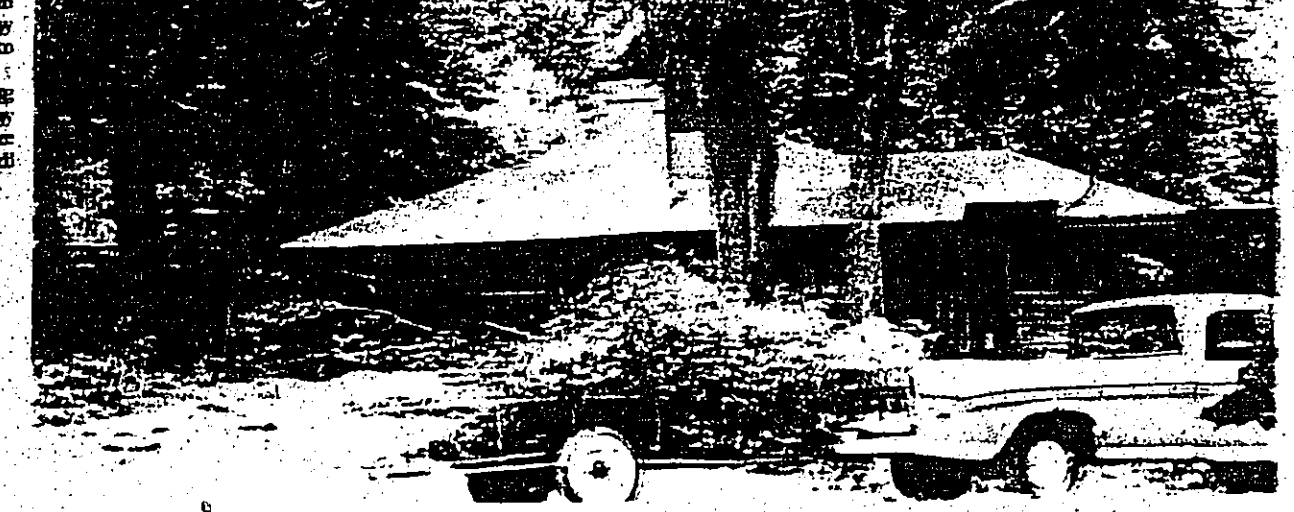

## IRS Exam Enrollment Deadline Nears

AUSTIN, TEXAS—The deadline for filing an application to take the 1978 IRS Special Enrollment Examination is Aug. 15. The examination will be given Sept. 25 and 30 in Austin and Houston. It is given annually to qualify persons who are neither CPAs or attorneys to represent clients before the Federal tax agency.

IRS District Director Robert M. McKeever said that persons who want to take the examination must send a completed Form 2387, Application for the 1978 Special Enrollment Examination, to the Taxpayer Audit Division, Internal Revenue Service, Washington, D.C. 20224.

As extensions of time to make applications will be granted. "Aug. 15 is the deadline," McKeever said.

The 1978 examination will have an increased emphasis on Federal tax laws as they apply to business operations such as sole proprietorships, partnerships, and corporations.

## Browsing With Belinda

Belinda Covington, County Extension Agent, says that garden-fresh flavor year-round, try frozen corn. The procedure for freezing corn at home involves a few easy steps.

**HARVEST IN RIGHT STAGE**  
Harvesting corn in the right stage is most important for flavor. There are only 72 hours from the beginning of prime eating quality until corn becomes over mature.

Harvest it when the ears are filled out in the milk stage and avoid gathering in high temperatures—preferred time is the cool morning.

**WHOLE-GRAIN-STYLE CORN**  
For whole-grain-style corn, husk, silk, trim and wash ears of corn. Blanch corn by heating in boiling water for four minutes in a blancher—large kettle with basket.

If a blanching basket is not available, a deep-fryer wire basket may be used. Cool immediately by plunging corn in ice water or cold, running water.

When cool, cut kernels from cob at about two-thirds the depth of the kernels. Package in moisture-vapor-proof containers and freeze immediately.

**CREAM-STYLE CORN**  
For cream-style corn, prepare corn and blanch as for whole kernel. Cut kernel tips once or twice, no deeper than the center of the kernels.

Scrape the cob with the back of a knife to remove the juice and heart of the kernel. Package and freeze immediately.

**CORN-ON-THE-COB**  
For corn-on-the-cob, husk silk, wash and sort ears according to the size.

Blanch by heating small ears up to one and one-fourth inches in diameter in boiling water in blanching basket for seven minutes.

Blanch medium-size ears one and one-fourth to one and one-half inches in diameter for nine minutes, and large ears over one and one-half inches in diameter for 11 minutes.

Cool in ice water or cold, running water and drain. Pack ears into containers or wrap in moisture-vapor-proof material. Freeze immediately.

Frozen corn kept at zero degrees F. or less will keep up to one year.

**THAWING CORN**  
Whole-grain and cream-style corn may be cooked with-out thawing.

However, partially thaw corn-on-the-cob before cooking so the corn will be heated through by the time the corn is cooked.

Holding corn after thawing or cooking causes off-flavors.

## Hot Weather Precedes Livestock Disease

With the advent of hot dry weather, livestock producers should be on the lookout for the appearance of pink eye in their cattle. "Pink eye" is an infectious eye disease of cattle of all ages and breeds, however, younger animals under two years of age appear to be more susceptible than older ones.

A bacterial organism called Moraxella bovis can often be found in the secretion from the eyes of infected cattle. This organism has been reported to live in flies for up to three days and an outbreak of pink eye is often associated with a high fly population. A virus disease called infectious bovine rhinotracheitis (IBR) is sometimes associated with pink eye. Irritants such as intense sunlight, dust, pollen, seeds, awns, and tall grass seem to be capable of irritating the eye predisposing to the infection.

Cattle with unpigmented skin around the eyes seem to be affected more frequently. However, severe outbreaks have occurred in black cattle. Once an animal recovers from the infection a temporary immunity develops, building up a resistance to further outbreaks for about a year. These cattle can still serve as a source of infection to other susceptible animals.

A knowledge of some of the causes of pink eye can help cattlemen to eliminate or to prevent additional spread of the disease. Preventive measures are well worth the effort since research has indicated that a suppression of weight gains may exceed 30 lbs. in calves affected with pink eye in both eyes. This could mean a 15 loss in 50-cent calves.

Some factors that can help prevent the spread or severity of the infection consist of fly control, pasture management, use of Vitamin A where this is lacking, and prompt treatment of the infection with anti-bacterial preparations.

1. Vitamin A does not necessarily prevent pink eye, but deficiencies in dry pastures may allow the eye tissues to be affected more easily.

2. Pastures should be clipped to eliminate the seed heads and to keep the stubble below eye level so as to avoid irritating the corneal eye tissue.

3. Fly control can be carried out through the use of sprays, dust bags, back rubbers, or by hand dusting in small herds.

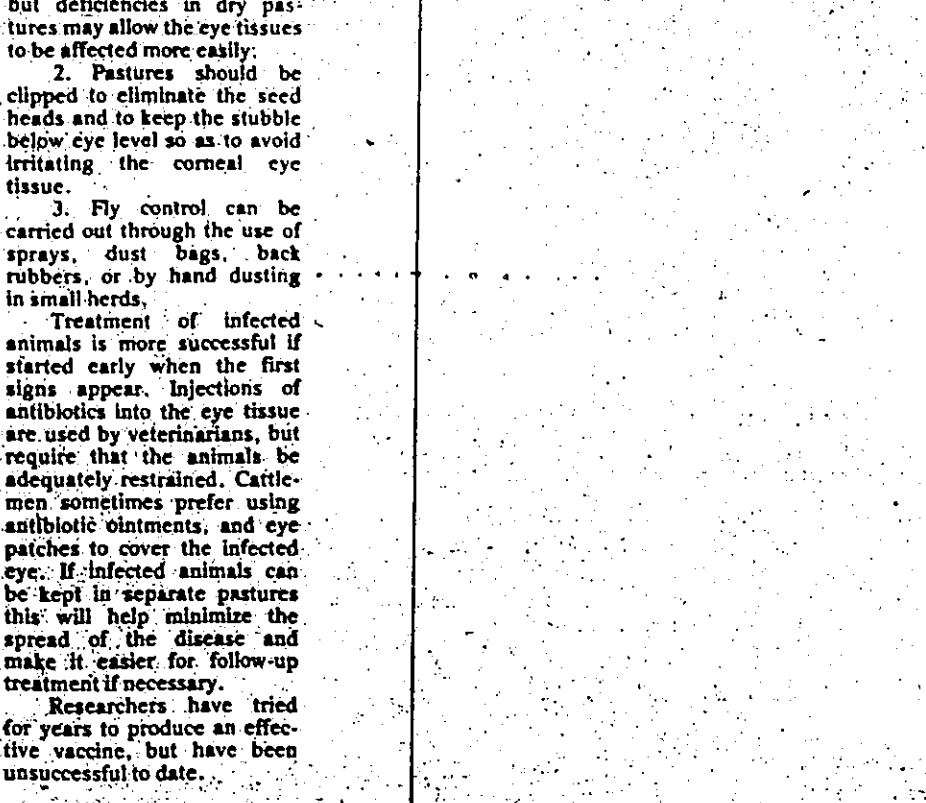
Treatment of infected animals is most successful if started early when the first signs appear. Injections of antibiotics into the eye tissue are used by veterinarians, but require that the animals be adequately restrained. Cattlemen sometimes prefer using antibiotic ointments, and eye patches to cover the infected eye. If infected animals can be kept in separate pastures this will help minimize the spread of the disease and make it easier for follow-up treatment if necessary.

Researchers have tried for years to produce an effective vaccine, but have been unsuccessful to date.

### Provide Healthy Summer Snacks

School has been forgotten and kids are in the full swing of summer. Outdoor activities offer more important than meals to active children. It's up to you to make their meals and snacks as nutritious and appealing as possible.

In developing meals and snacks for children use the 3-2-4-4 formula. It is based on the four food group system developed by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA). The USDA determined that a child needs three servings from the milk group, two servings from the meat group, and four servings from both the vegetables and fruits group and the breads and cereals group. If you use 3-2-4-4, you can be sure your child is meeting his daily recommended dietary allowances established by the scientists on the Food and Nutrition Board of the National Academy of Sciences.

**SNACK IDEAS**  
If you have a problem with active children this summer, here's a snack activity that will get rid of some excess energy. Find a jar small enough for your child to handle and make sure it has a tightly fitting lid.

Place a spoonful of non-sweetened pudding mix in the jar and fill the jar three-quarters full with cold milk. After five or more minutes of brisk shaking, your child will be rewarded with a nutritious snack he's prepared himself.

**3-2-4 SNACKS**  
Milk Group: cold milk, chocolate milk, pudding, fruit yogurt, ice cream.  
Meat Group: peanut butter spread on crackers or bread, hot dog "kebobs", nuts.  
Vegetables and Fruit Group: Fruit and vegetable wedges dipped in yogurt, vegetable sticks, fruit and cheese "kebobs".  
Breads and Cereals Group: graham crackers, soda crackers, bread sticks.

### Landscape With Vines

**COLLEGE STATION**—Summer weather brings on the search for ways to improve landscapes, making them cool and inviting. One way of accomplishing this is through the imaginative use of vines.

Dr. William C. Welch, landscape horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says that vines offer an interesting variation in plant form. All woody or herbaceous plants that require some support for their development may be classed as a vine.

Vines may be used in several ways—on walls, arbors or other designed structures. Interesting effects may be achieved by placing a well selected vine on a wall and allowing it to spill over the other side.

The value of vines in the landscape may be practical or esthetic, notes Welch. "The practical value is in the shade and privacy they provide. Muscadine and grapes give an added bonus in the form of fruit."

Temperature is the deciding factor in determining the kind of vine that can be grown successfully in a given area, explains the Texas A&M University System specialist. A vine that freezes down during winter in one area may be evergreen in another area. "To be successful, vines must be well adapted to the environment in which they are to be grown."

Effectiveness is achieved in their use as part of an overall landscape plan. Properly used, they can add dimension to any landscape, contends Welch.

## Texas Doctors Urge Early Vaccines

Texas doctors are joining plans for a massive immunization drive aimed at boosting protection levels above 90 percent of the population. The Texas Medical Association (TMA) says this large-scale effort is needed to protect people from diseases which in their most serious forms can cause death, crippling, blindness or brain damage.

The U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare estimates that approximately 25-40 percent of U.S. children are not immunized against one of seven preventable, dangerous diseases. In an article in the July issue of Texas Medicine, the TMA monthly journal, Clinton Craven, M.D., of Austin, asks doctors to monitor patients' records and encourage people to get needed immunizations for diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis, polio, measles, rubella and mumps.

### Boat Regulation Changes

Boat owners in Texas should keep in mind that boats situated or operated on the fresh waters in the state which have permanent sleeping quarters must be equipped with an approved marine sanitation device, a spokesman for the Texas Department of Water Resources said Thursday.

Game wardens with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department have authority to inspect boats for compliance with TDWR regulations are now checking boats on Texas lakes to see that they are conforming with the requirements.

"No person may discharge sewage, treated or untreated, from a boat into the waters of this State...nor adjacent to the water where such sewage may flow or seep into the waters."

Discharge of sewage into freshwaters in Texas is a misdemeanor which, upon conviction, is punishable by a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$200 the department advised.

To comply with the law and with TDWR regulations, boats which are required to have sanitation devices must be certified and must display a decal which is supplied by the TDWR.

## Safety Management Prevents Tragedy

**COLLEGE STATION**—

"Manage to prevent farm and ranch accidents" is the theme for this year's observance of Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Week, designated July 25-31, announced Dr. Gary S. Nelson, a safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Vice President for the Farm and Ranch Section of the Texas Safety Association.

Nelson emphasized that

"safety management is a responsibility of every farm and ranch manager interested in an efficient and profitable farm or ranch operation. Accidents cost money in property damage, medical care and in lost production time. Accidents prevention is an essential management function."

What is the job of a farm "safety manager?" Nelson explained that a farm or ranch

operator must first set up a mental, if not a written, plan of action. He must consider the kinds of hazards common to his operation and consider the abilities or limitations of the people doing the work.

Next, he should inspect his operations periodically and look for unsafe conditions.

Workers may also call attention to a faulty mechanism, a loose guard, or other danger-

ous situations. These hazards should be corrected promptly with the engineer.

Farm managers should also watch for unsafe practices that can lead to accidents and insist that workers adhere to and understand the reasons for the use of safe work procedures.

Nelson emphasized that "safety management" includes getting your equipment ready

for planting or harvest well in advance." Also, "Follow your own rules and set an example for your workers," advised the engineer.

Further points suggested by Nelson included the following: Keep yourself posted on new developments in farm and ranch safety and accident prevention. Watch for and participate in short courses on safety subjects.

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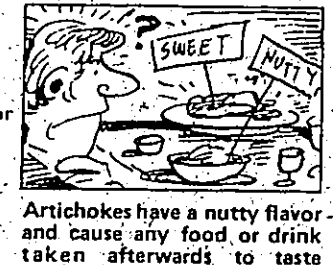
