\$1.5 Million Woodville Grant 'Looks Good'

The City of Woodville apparently still has a wild card to play in a four-acre hand which predicts that the municipality will receive, by Nov. 1 at the latest, a \$1.5 million dollar Community Development Block Grant needed for improvements in what is

considered a low income section of town. According to David Waxman, planning and Management Consultant for the city, "Woodville ought to qualify easily for the 100 percent 'no-match' federal monies to be utilized in the vicinity

located between Hyde and Railroad Streets." Indicating his confidence in the grant possibility, Waxman stated that the City was definitely in the running for the Grant which would be obtained over a three-year period ("500,000 each year

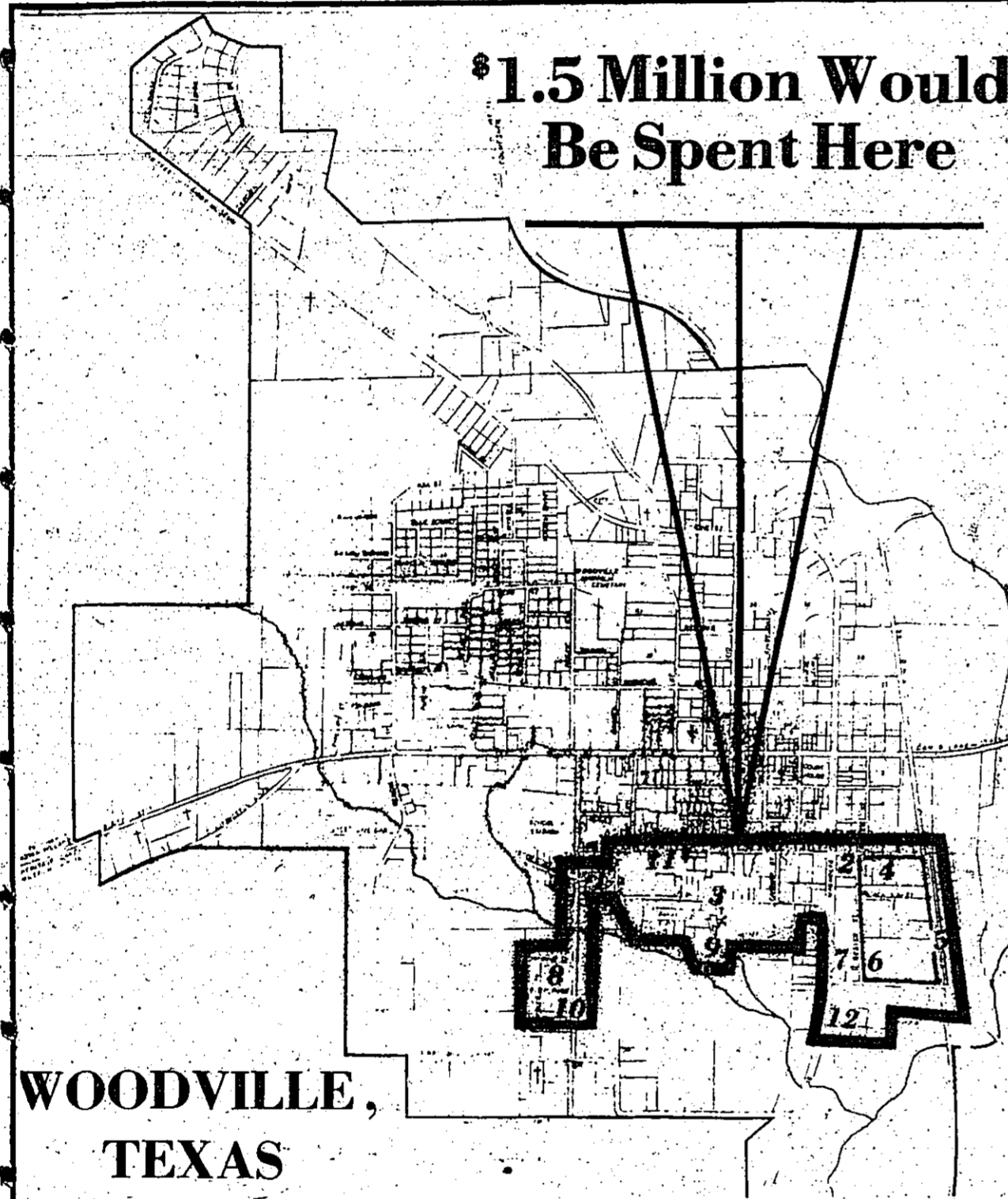

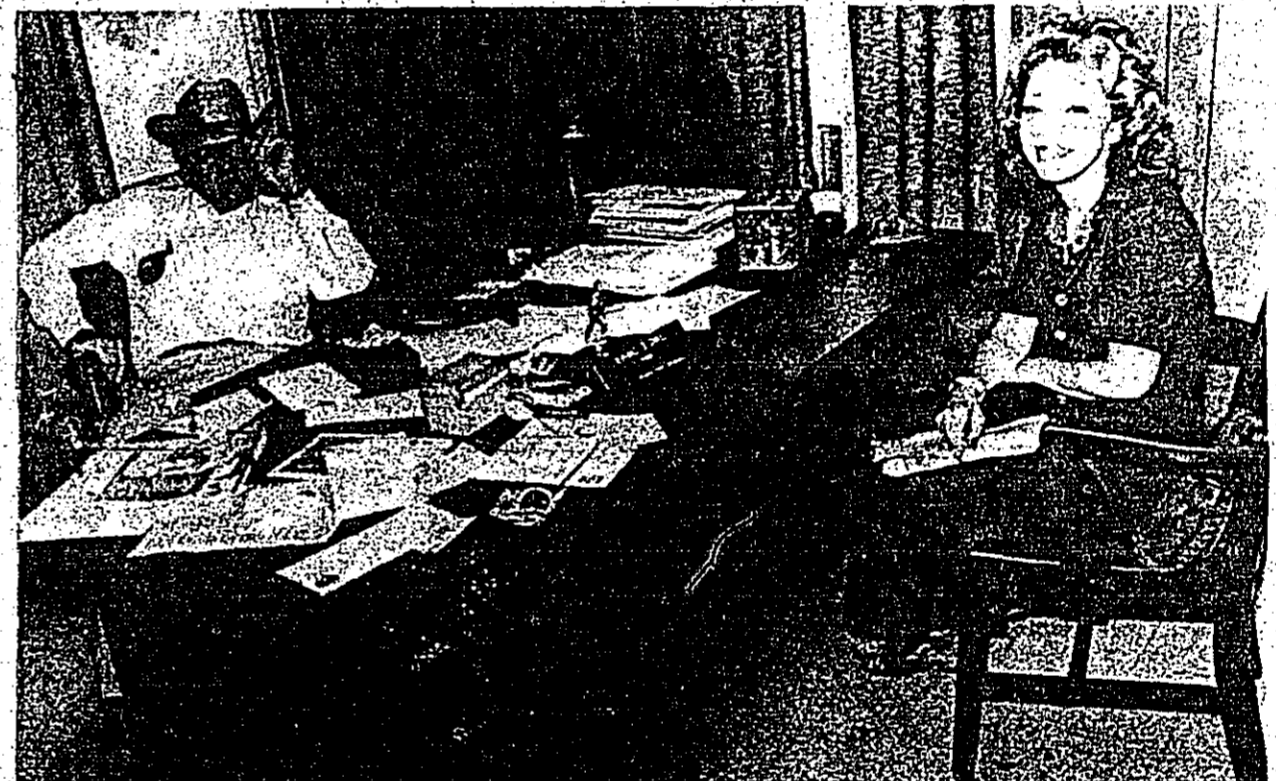

In addition, the City of Woodville has been invited to make application for \$500,000 dollars in Urban Development Action Grant Funds under the Community Development Block Grant Program. The purpose of these funds is to construct sewer lines, water storage facilities and pave roads for industrial development.

Construction Lags

Construction work on the new Woodville High School, scheduled for completion July 15, 1979, has fallen behind schedule, according to a report given to the Woodville school board.

"Once the slab is poured the rest will come faster," he said. He also stated that the projected finishing date of July 15, 1979 is not going to work. "Once the time spent is past the amount of money, there is no way of catching up," he said.

In his report Flowers told the board that the slab is poured, for the vocational building, and that 35 percent of the slab is done on the academic building. He also pointed out that the parking lot is in good shape and that the road leading to the school is finished.

In other business the school board approved the June 1978 financial report and discussed the report on school tax assessor and collector. The report had over 92 percent of the years' taxes paid, with only the railroad failing to pay for 1978.

Three school buses were also sold at the meeting. A passenger 1969 International bus was sold to the Fairview Baptist Church. A 54 passenger 1969 Chevrolet, and a 66 passenger 1970 Chevrolet were both sold to Don's Auto Salvage in Pineland.

DA Offers Help In Fowler Case

Merchants or business who want to file complaints regarding a possible bill-con game scheme involving a contract between Tyler County Sheriff Lewis Craven and Wally Fowler of Nashville, Tenn., are asked to attend a meeting scheduled for 9 to 10 a.m. Wednesday (July 26) with District Attorney George Kirkpatrick for advice and suggestions about the voluntary complaint procedure.

The contract in question calls for Fowler to sell an area wide campaign which uses the Sheriff's office county tele-

phones, and a booklet about drug abuse (which is already free to the public) to combine in a "worthy cause" appeal for money, 80 percent of which goes to the promoters while only 20 percent stays with the Sheriff for the Tyler County Emergency Corps.

Kirkpatrick said although the case seemed like a misdemeanor-level situation, that he would be glad to advise those who needed help in the matter.

New Post Offices Contracts Given

Contracts have been awarded for the building and leasing of new post office buildings in Fred and Spurger, according to the U.S. Postal Service.

The new office in Spurger will be at the intersection of State Highway 92 and the Old Shefield Ferry Road, according to Postmaster Mildred Ramer. The building will have 1,400 square feet of interior floor space. It will occupy approximately 15,000 square

feet. Construction costs for both will be paid with private funds and the building will be leased to the Postal Service for a basic period of ten years with renewal options for an additional 20 years.

The buildings are expected to be completed by July 1979 and both contracts were awarded to the Williams Company of Woodville.

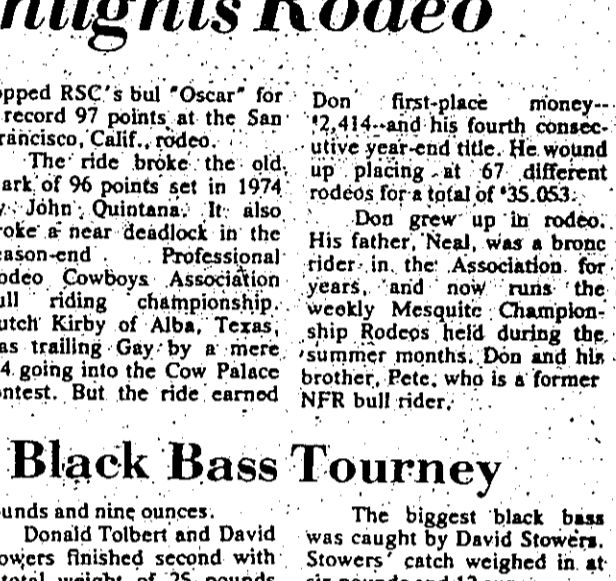

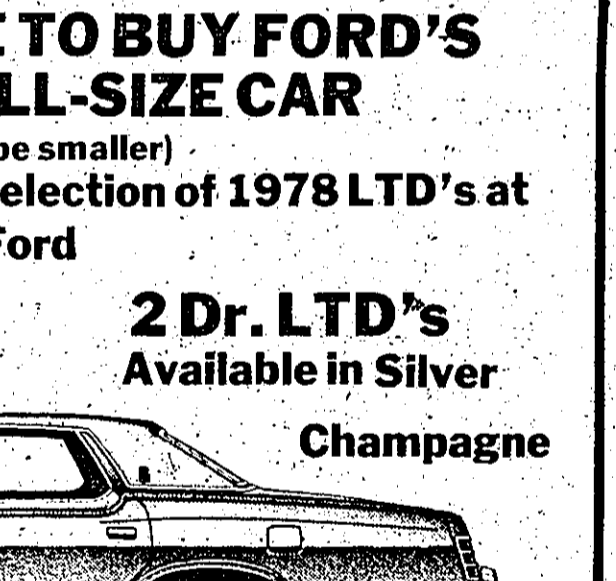

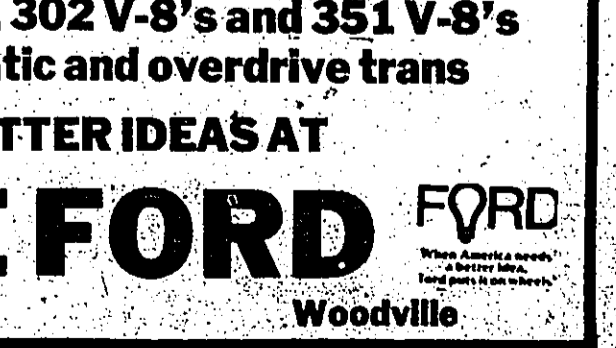

FFA Members Attend Convention

Local FFA chapter members attended the 50th Anniversary Convention of the Texas Association of Future Farmers of America, July 11-14, at the San Antonio Convention Center. Attending the convention were Lavayne Sheffield and James Shaw of Spurport.

More than 6,000 members attended the four day convention, the highlight of the year's activities in FFA. Some 1,600 voting delegates representing 82 chapters in the state were on hand to elect officers for the coming year and to honor outstanding members of the organization.

Texas is the state with the largest membership in FFA. There are more than 60,000 members and the national organization has drawn many of its national officers from the ranks of the Texas members.

The current national FFA president is J. Ken Johnson from Nacogdoches.

The convention, which celebrated the 50th anniversary of FFA, had as its theme "FFA at 50: A Golden Past and A Brighter Future."

In 1928, the Future Farmers of America has had almost a million members since its inception. In its first half century, the organization has been noted for its distinguished contributions to youth, leadership, agriculture and vocational education. Current FFA programs encompass every phase of agriculture from livestock production to development of leadership to agricultural economics.

At the convention, outstanding FFA members were recognized for significant achievement in FFA programs including supervised farming, agriculture and leadership. Also, more than \$200,000 in college scholarships were awarded to 70 FFA members by nine organizations that are long time supporters of FFA.

Bell Tel Expenses Questionable

Southwestern Bell has asked that \$174,160 of alleged questionable expenses be allowed from its \$214.3 million dollar rate request. The company filed a motion Friday with the Texas Public Utility Commission requesting that the PUC convene a public hearing as soon as possible to consider the expenses in question. Southwestern Bell's action resulted from information developed in an ongoing criminal investigation being conducted by the U.S. attorney in Dallas.

Jon Dee Lawrence, Southwestern Bell's general attorney for Texas emphasized that the company is not commenting on the guilt or innocence of any individual under investigation. "However," Lawrence said, "to insure there can be no question now or in the future as to the accuracy of our expenses submitted in this rate case we believe the expenses in question should be withdrawn from consideration by the commission."

Lawrence said the dollar amounts used by the company in figuring the alleged inappropriate expenses were provided by the US Attorney. The applicable amounts of equipment purchases were subtracted from the company's rate base or state wide investment on which the company earns a return. Applicable portions of the lease amounts were deleted from the operating expense claimed by the company in the rate filing. Both the rate base and operating expense reductions were applied to the company's revenue requirement resulting in the proposed \$174,160 disallowance. Lawrence said that Southwestern Bell customers in Texas will be fully protected. "Our customers should not be called upon to bear the risk of being burdened with any expense subject to question as a result of the investigation."

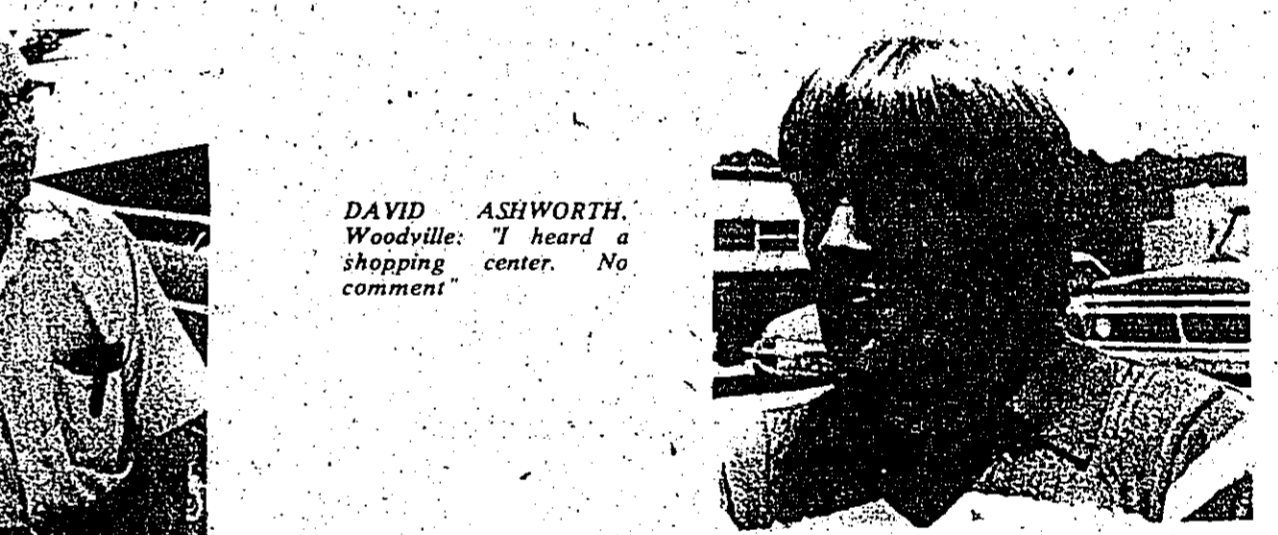
New construction always piques the interest of the citizens in a community. Woodville's no different and many people have been wondering what kind of project they are working on at the south end of town, on Highway 69.

One youngster thinks they are building more roads, but most people we polled said they expect it to be a shopping center of some sort.

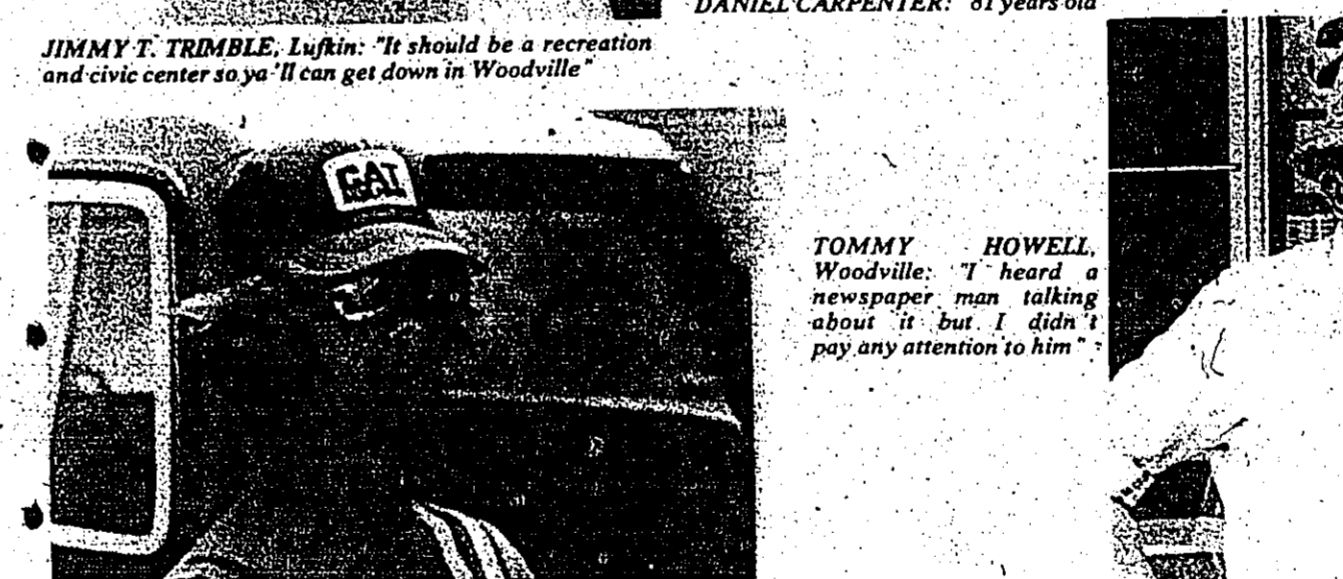

The Sexes In Texas: 1882

In the autumn of 1882, J.C. Houzau, was entitled "L'Amérique et l'Emigration" and the concluding chapter, presented an overview of Texas with reference to the aspects which might be of interest to prospective settlers.

"As might be expected, a subject of great interest to the Europeans was the position of women in Texas society. The following excerpt from Lancaster's book, translated from the original French, depicts a system of sexual role-playing which might well cause a modern-day feminist to wince with indignation."

"Despite the readiness of the Americans of the North, to have great respect for women. It is one of the most characteristic traits of the United States. Among the Texans this respect even has something savage about it: certainly it is gallantry, but of a quite particular sort, which has nothing in common with the so highly refined French gallantry. In the eyes of the Yankee, and even more in the eyes of the Southerner, women are superior beings. He acknowledges the ascendancy of quality and of charms of which he feels himself completely deprived. In the paragraphs exaggerated, deference which he has for her, one finds something like a reminiscence of the obsequiousness of the slave. These feelings by men for women are a strength of the American woman. This timidity is unknown to her even when she speaks to a person who is totally unknown to her. It is always in a tone filled with assurance."

"How many times, traveling in a train or a railway carriage, have I heard some 'mike or some 'lady' say to me: 'Sir, close the door open the window...' It was a command. Rarely a word of thanks repaid me for my obedience."

"I have seen many times, where the strong sex is represented in great part by persons of rough habits and manners, women or young girls may move about at all hours of the day or night, without fear of being importuned. The population does not take this matter lightly. When an infraction of the laws of respect toward a woman has been committed, she takes it upon herself to chastise the guilty party."



"In all circumstances and situations where it can occur, deference with respect to women is to be found. Thus, in the restaurants and hotels, there is always one salon reserved exclusively for unaccompanied ladies. At the Post Office in San Antonio, there were two windows: one for the 'genies', the other for the 'ladies'."

Vaccinations Prevent Many Virus Diseases

Unless they have been immunized against it, virtually all children will at some time develop measles, a disease which can involve serious complications. Live virus measles vaccine is safe and effective, and should be administered routinely to all children, as is exemplified from the American Medical Association. Measles immunization is especially important for children with chronic illnesses such as heart disease, cystic fibrosis and tuberculosis, and for those who are malnourished or are institutionalized.

German measles is often so mild it is overlooked or misdiagnosed. But if acquired by a woman in early pregnancy, this disease poses a direct threat to the fetus. Live rubella virus vaccine is recommended for children between one year of age and puberty, with priority for those in kindergarten and first grade.

Live mumps vaccine may be given at any age from 12 months to 15 years, particularly in children approaching puberty, adolescents and adults, especially men, who have not had the disease.

The vaccine is generally advised for anyone with chronic heart disease, lung or kidney disease, diabetes, for people over 65, and for those in health, public safety and general service vocations. It is not recommended for healthy children and adults, or for people allergic to eggs. The vaccine is grown on egg cultures.

Vaccines protect us against many of the great killer diseases of the past. Smallpox has been gone for years in the United States, and may well be eliminated in the entire world. But protect those who neglect to get vaccinated against those remaining infectious diseases.

Coastal Grass Good Hay Crop

Coastal bermudagrass is the most important hay crop in East Texas. According to Dr. T. C. Keating, soil scientist for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, maintaining a good stand of bermudagrass is very essential if top yields are to be realized. Since all the above-ground parts of the plant are killed by temperatures as low as 26 to 28 degrees Fahrenheit, the amount of quality rhizomes (underground runners) greatly determines yields for the following growing season.

Keating has research underway at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research & Extension Center at Vernon to study Coastal bermudagrass stands. rhizome production, rhizome regrowth reserve and root vigor. These studies already indicate that lack of potassium (potash) decreases the production of rhizomes, thus reducing the stand. Consequently, as the stand is reduced, so is the yield. When the bermudagrass starts to grow in the spring, any increase in stand is almost the same as the increase in rhizomes.

Potassium deficiency also caused decreased vigor and growth of feeder roots. Under these conditions, coastal plants were not able to fully utilize the water and nutrients in the soil. Coastal bermudagrass actually died during a summer drought on soil severely deficient in potassium.

In previous studies, adequate potassium fertilization has reduced "winter kill" in Coastal. By increasing potassium fertilizer rates, bermudagrass tends to be "hardened" to lower temperatures.

The importance of rhizomes in regenerating spring growth is general knowledge. The key seems to be the total number of rhizomes present. Keating found that adequate potassium fertilizer does cause the Coastal plant to produce more rhizomes. As a result, the stand is also improved and the potential for greater forage production is enhanced.

Many Coastal bermudagrass hay meadows in East Texas are showing characteristics of inadequate potassium. The severity of the situation depends on soil potassium reserves, forage production levels and previous fertility practices. Even though many growers are caught in a cost-price squeeze, reducing potassium applications under these conditions will further complicate the problem. A reduction in potassium fertilizer rates on Coastal bermudagrass also reduces the grower's chance of producing abundant, high quality forage.

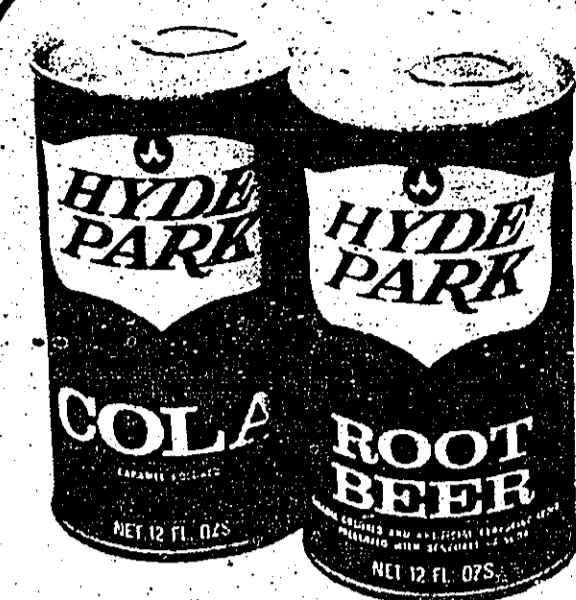
Health Clinic Set

REFORGER Back In Germany

FT. POLK, LA.—The 5th Infantry Division (Mechanized) from Fort Polk will be the primary combat force when more than 13,000 American troops go to Germany next month to test U.S. reinforcement capability to North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) military commands.

The military exercise, known as REFORGER, is the United States' largest and most comprehensive peacetime readiness commitment to world peace. It will be conducted from August to October. REFORGER, an acronym for "Return Forces to Germany," fulfills a U.S. requirement in cooperation with the United Kingdom and West Germany signed in 1967. The 1967 agreement authorized the removal of certain U.S. and U.K. forces from West Germany provided that NATO committed ground and air units return to Germany for annual training.

REFORGER is a strategic mobility deployment involving Army, Navy and Air Force personnel in a joint effort to transport combat and combat support units in the United States to Europe and back. In addition to enhancing military training, the exercise will demonstrate the continuing resolve of the United States to reinforce NATO in crisis situations.

Special units of the Army, Air Force and Navy are selected each year to participate in the exercise. Actually, REFORGER 1978 is part of a series of exercises named Autumn Forge.

In addition to the 5th Division, the prime element of Army's troop strength, other REFORGER units include elements of the 4th Mechanized Infantry Division from Fort Carson, CO; an attack helicopter battalion from Fort Campbell, KY; a hawk missile battery from Fort Bliss, TX; two battalions of the 9th Infantry Division from Fort Lewis, WA; and several smaller units of Army National Guard and Army Reserve.

The 5th Infantry Division (Mechanized) is the largest of the Army's 16 divisions, total force. It carried its platoon on the REFORGER team as a combat-ready division last October in the Bold Eagle exercise at Eglin AFB, FL.

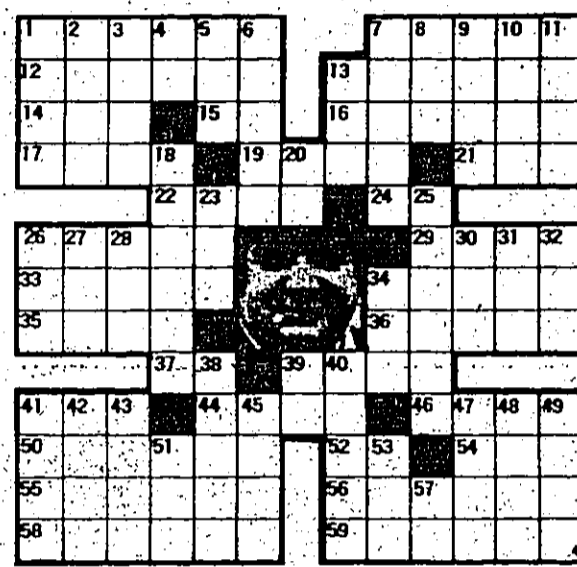

News or Gimmicks?

On July 10, ABC News, New York is, does Max

premiered its much heralded, decentralized format, "World News Tonight." Peter Jennings now broadcasts international news from London; Frank Reynolds anchors the national news from Washington, D.C.; Max Robinson is on top of the domestic news in Chicago; and Barbara Walters is "face to face" in New York.

Roone Arledge, president of ABC News, characterizes the new format as "the first significant change" in network news presentation since the teaming of Chet Huntley and David Brinkley more than a decade ago. Arledge adds that scores of award-winning producers, directors and specialized correspondents have come to ABC News to improve the quality of the newest programming. Indeed, ABC News built a repertoire of top newsmen in the past years. The network is spending more money on news than ever before, too. However, does Peter Jennings' presence in London really put him on top of the news from Angola or Hong Kong any quicker than David Brinkley's reporting from New York? And, although Chicago is closer to Kansas City than

Robinson's domestic desk report news from San Diego, California, or Biloxi, Miss., more accurately than Walter Cronkite's New York livecast? ABC's critics maintain that Arledge is gambling on a gimmick, and that ABC would be better off to concentrate on getting the news to its viewers. Still, a new format is akin to a new show. The shakedown period for "World News Tonight" might take anywhere from three weeks to three months. Roone Arledge has wisely premiered the new news at the height of the summer season, when television viewing is at its lowest. ABC News will use the summer heat to iron out any wrinkles or creases that fail to mesh with the program's design. If Roone Arledge's gamble pays off, and if viewers respond to ABC News' "greater sense of immediacy," then the decentralized and dispersed may become the norm for all network newscasts. ABC has a top team of journalist and a professional production crew. If you're interested in something other than the traditional anchorman reporting the news, look to ABC News' "World News Tonight."

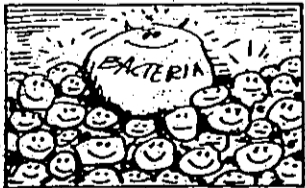

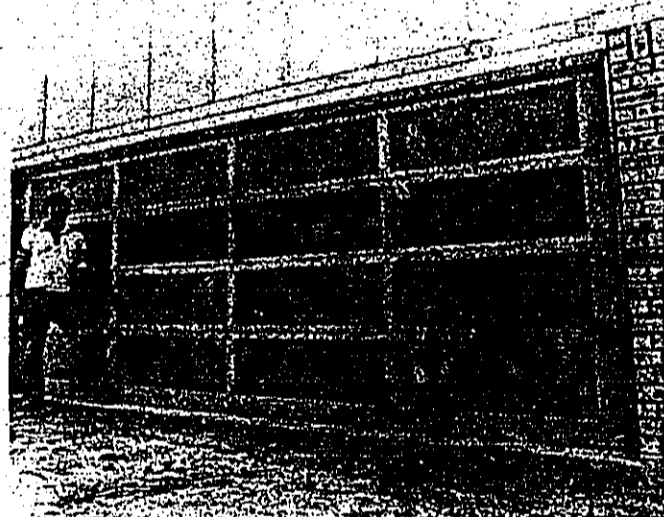
