Cowart Quits Deputy Post

When Sheriff's Deputy "Slim" Cowart called in last Tuesday to say he wasn't reporting for work anymore, observers around the courthouse were quick to guess that the reason was a real major difference with Sheriff Lewis Craven.

According to Cowart who was interviewed at his home near Wolf Creek north of Dab-B, "It isn't that simple but I really don't have a rub with Lewis himself. It's with the whole system."

Cowart said he blamed the whole Tyler County courthouse for his decision to quit last week. He said further that he has spent night and day working to pull things out for the department but he can't see that things are getting any better.

Craven could not be reached for comment Tuesday as was reported to be out of the county.

Cowart made a specific reference to the jailer job position at the courthouse saying "The jailer can sleep all day and draw the same amount of pay while the rest of us are beating our heads against a wall and knocking ourselves out to do a good job."

Cowart decided to quit at a time when Tyler County is suffering from an already acute shortage of law enforcement personnel.

"I didn't quit for another job," Cowart said insisting that he wasn't leaving Tyler County either and that he was staying where his home was at Dab-B.

"The county needs to take a long look at how they're wasting peoples' time and wasting the taxpayers money in law enforcement," he said.

Cowart said "If you're going to play ball then you've got to know what your coach wants," and "it doesn't end with the coach...it's the whole athletic department," he said flinging the Commissioners Court specifically.

He indicated that the whole Courthouse needed to work together and that "things won't get better till things get more cooperative from each office."

"They've got to stop suffering from brother-in-lawitis," Cowart said.

"There are other things too," Cowart said. "The job was interfering with my personal life. Usually I lead a very private life but it's hard working 24 hours a day, then getting a call at 4 a.m. It would be easy to roll over and go to sleep, but you know you can't when you've got to be there for an emergency within five minutes."

Cowart said the demand of the office has been too much for too little pay "And no one seems to care."

"Everyone takes the attitude 'Hooryay for me, the hell with you...lets wait till payday!'"


The former deputy said his differences with Craven were "nothing we can't settle." Cowart said also the two men "Agreed to disagree."

Cowart said that "personal family differences" was a definite problem in the courthouse. He said "I fell, along with a lot of other people 'Sandwiched in between...I ain't got no side'."

Some folks are already nervous about me running for sheriff," Cowart said adding "I'll be right in there with the rest of them."

Cowart said that "The job of jailer was 'As useless as a side saddle in a bronc bustin' match."

"No one was moving to make things better and the people up there are out for their own personal gain they just don't have Tyler County at heart," Cowart indicated that he would be present at future commissioners court meetings. He said "I tried that in the past when I was on the club. Now, he said, "I'm not a part of the team anymore."

BBB Tracks Fowler

Because of concern over Business Bureau members in Tyler County have cared enough about their community to do something towards protecting it against deception, misrepresentation and fraud, they may have helped the entire state of Texas.

For 20 some years John Wallace (Wally Fowler) has been working the 250 counties in Texas. Through 20 to 80 percent sponsorship of law enforcement officers and "quasi law enforcement groups," advertisements in his "Law Enforcement Manual" and "Drug Abuse" Booklet have raked in untold thousands of dollars for him and his "associates" as he refers to his boiler room operators who sell community businessmen while soliciting these ads. Reliable sources tell the BBB that deals doing this type of work normally receive about 50 percent of all they collect for themselves.

Although the \$2,500.00 collected in Tyler County recently from 78 "taps" may seem small in itself, when that much leaves the economy of a community that size, never to return, it has that more negative impact. These same "tap cards" are apparently

intended to be used again to sell tickets for the "benefit" show Fowler is scheduled to put on Sept. 28 in the school auditorium in Woodville.

In a meeting held July 26 in the Tyler County District court jury room, one businessman expressed the general feeling: "If the sheriff or rescue unit had come to me and asked for a straight donation I'd have given it. We all want to support our Sheriff. But to tell me it's all going to them when it's not, they only get 20 percent and then have to meet expenses out of that, that makes me mad!"

Before the meeting was over, 10 signatures were obtained seeking filing a "class action" suit against Fowler and all associated with him, which could conceivably include the Sheriff and the rescue unit.

Before the day was out, many more had called Attorney John Kinney asking to be included in the suit which calls for "triple damages and court costs."

Tyler County Bureau manager Fran Wyche and executive director Mary Ann Kittell met later in the day with D.A. Kirkpatrick and County Attorney Rolls Brockman to make out procedures

for filing charges with the county.

If all 78 businessmen filed a complaint with the County Attorney as well as joining in the civil suit, this in itself could keep Wally from coming back into Texas rather than answering charges and paying potentially \$78,000 or more in fines.

Drug Arrest Said 'Drop In Bucket'

The Saturday afternoon arrest of two men charged with "possession of dangerous drugs" and suspected of selling these drugs in and around Woodville was "Only a drop in the bucket compared to what is really happening" in Woodville, according to arresting officer Jim Deal of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Acting on a tip that the car the men were driving contained the drugs, Deal stopped the vehicle driven by James E. Gifford, 22, of Woodville and Jesse Royce Brown, 23, of Rockland on Highway 190 inside the Woodville city limits.

According to Deal, he had just received the alert when the late model Pontiac pulled out in front of him. He then pulled the car over and asked to check Gifford's driving license. "When he rolled the window down," Deal states, "The smell of smoke of marijuana came pouring out." At the same time Deal said he observed Brown putting "Something down the front of his pants. I had the suspicion of the possibility of a gun, the law sees it like that," Deal said.

He then called D.P.S. officer Gerald Corbell and Woodville Police Officer Jay Crews for assistance which led to the subsequent search of the two and the vehicle.

A black suitcase found in the trunk of the car, contained a large assortment of various types of drugs, usually obtained from a physician. The drugs Tepanil, Benadryl, Ritalin, Isonamin and Benzadrine were among those found by law enforcement officers. Also an unidentified substance called Captagon, allegedly manufactured in Puerto Rico was also found. These drugs are used medically for the control of weight, stimulants for older persons, the treatment of children with brain dysfunction, controlling motion sickness and other disorders relating to the central nervous system. "An undetermined amount of marijuana was also confiscated during the search," Deal said. "Gifford produced the marijuana of his free will before the search was made, hoping we'd take

that and not find the other stuff," Deal surmised.

A later search was conducted at a Woodville residence but no other drugs were found.

Both Gifford and Brown were charged with possession of dangerous drugs and bond was set at \$35,000 each.

Deal said that the two had apparently been selling the drugs in Tyler County for some time.

"This arrest is nothing compared to what's really happening in the county," Deal said. "People shut their doors and don't want to see what's happening to their kids." Deal suspects that drug dealers have been "working hard" to sell their drugs around the schools and area locations that are frequented by Tyler County youths.

Other warrants are expected to be issued by the end of the week as a result of this arrest. Law Enforcement agencies did not release the names on the warrants but did say that they were for drug related crimes.

Ambulance service in operation

A new 24 hour emergency ambulance service has started in Tyler County, according to Tudy O'Neal, vice-president and general manager of the Woodville-Tyler County Ambulance Service.

The service operates with two fully equipped emergency ambulances. According to O'Neal, the cars have all the features required by state law plus several other features. She added that there are no better equipped emergency vehicles anywhere in Southeast Texas.

Woodville-Tyler County Ambulance Service has five attendants and three drivers. Four of the attendants are "Emergency Care Attendants" while two are Emergency Medical Technicians.

O'Neal stressed that the vehicles can hold a capacity of four people, and will be equipped with radios that contain a hospital frequency, as well as the local frequency.

"The new business hopes to provide professional ambulance service to all of Tyler County," O'Neal said, and she added that the service will also transfer patients anywhere they need to go from this region.

Woodville-Tyler County Ambulance Service is located at 604 No. Magnolia. The emergency number is 283-3700, and the service is on 24 hour call.

Church on TV

The First Baptist Church of Woodville will begin televising Sunday services on Sunday, August 6 at 11 a.m., according to Phillip Sherrod, minister of music and education.

Services will also be broadcast at 7 p.m. Sunday. Broadcasting will be on cable Channel 3 and will be in black and white, Sherrod said.

The church began planning on providing the televi-

sion service when the discussions on installing cablevision began, Sherrod said. They have been waiting for the camera to arrive, and are now ready to begin transmission.

The First Baptist Church will have Channel 3 exclusively and has plans to expand their programming in the future. According to Sherrod there will be no other program on, and Christian and Classical music will be played in the background.

In the future the church hopes to add another camera for filming and to put shows on video cassette for reference and replays. In addition to a video taping machine the church hopes to subscribe to a Home Bible Study program on the video cassette system.

Additional shows will be shown during the week, and possibly movies, Sherrod said. He added that they will not just be church-related movies, but would include "Good clean movies." He added that there is no time target date for any of the additions, but that they hoped to implement them as soon as possible.

Tillman Johnson of Woodville will operate the camera, and Allen Temple of Colmesneil will handle audio for the broadcasts.

Vaughn Keeping Craft Alive

SAN ANTONIO—Woodville's Hugh Vaughn does more than make chairs—he also is keeping a dying craft alive.

Vaughn will participate in the seventh annual Texas Folklife Festival where he will show visitors from all across the state—and country—how the oldtime cowhide, bottom rocking chairs are made.

The craftsman will bring a custom lathe to the Festival to show how long and short posts for chairs are carved and teach the basics of turning wood on a lathe. In addition, he will demonstrate hide work. "The art of stretching cowhide in chairs has almost come to a stop, so I must inform and demonstrate the procedures of chair work."

The Festival, Aug. 3-6, offers four days of Texas heritage. Some 5,000 people representing 30 ethnic and cultural groups, travel to San Antonio from all over Texas to help describe the story of Texas and her people. They do it by presenting the occupations, skills and fun of Texans.

The Festival is sponsored each year by The Institute of Texan Cultures, a communications center devoted to the collection, interpretation and presentation of the history and folk culture of Texas.

The celebration opens at 5 p.m. Thursday the third and at noon Friday through Sunday. Gates close at 11 p.m. every night. Tickets are \$3.00 for adults and \$1.00 for children under 13.


Debbie Gore Shows Poise

Flattering Colors Often Change



As colors change with the seasons, choose those that create a desirable effect for present body size, shape and personal coloring.

Sometimes favorite fashion colors are not the most attractive color choices for an individual.

Also, skin and hair color change with age and figures change to size and shape. Flattering color choices may also change.

Some basic guidelines about effect of color on the body may help in clothing selection.

Warm colors make the body appear larger, cool colors make the body appear smaller.

Warm colors are those with dominant red, yellow, or orange hues. Colors with dominant blue, green, or purple hues are cool colors.

Colors create different effects depending on their value or strength. For example, bright, hot pink reacts as a warm color while pastel pink responds as a cool color.

Bright, or strong colors and light tints make the body look larger. Conversely, dull or subdued colors and darker shades generally make the body appear smaller.

Use color to make "top heavy" or "bottom heavy" figures appear "appropriate." For example, a dark, cool colored skirt will help subdue heavy hips.

For a taller appearance, choose cool, dark, solid colors or muted prints. Direct attention upward with a color contrast near the head.

To appear shorter, select cool, dull colors with contrasting colors on top and bottom. Bold or contrasting colors at the hemline direct eye attention downward.

Colors also have a dramatic effect on skin tone. Hold a small portion of a flattering color as a scarf, collar, or jewelry item near the face to see the effect reflected on the skin.

Generally, cool colors and lighter warm colors complement cool skin (those with bluish or violet cast). Warm colors and bright, cool colors flatter warm skin (those with deep peach, yellow, or red cast).

Intermediate skins (those with white with greenish tints and those with both warm and cool traits) are complimented by both cool and warm colors.

Avoid purples and yellows with yellow skin, and avoid greens and reds with dominant red skin.

Blemished skins should avoid rose and purple tones.

If favorite colors of the colors which create the best illusion for the face wear a small portion of a flattering color as a scarf, collar, or jewelry item near the face.

Vegetables, Local Specials Top Best Buy Bargains

Best buys this week at Texas grocery markets include fresh vegetables and store "specials."

Also, frozen vegetables and selected fresh fruits, according to Mrs. Greenholme, a consumer marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

This week's price-quality trends are the following:

FRESH VEGETABLES—Carrots, cabbage, corn and others are some of the best quality and most economical vegetable choices. Others include dry beans, peas and yellow and Zucchini squash.

GROCERY MARKET—AISLES—Pick items such as catsup, mustard, pork and beans and tea mix are among the grocery items given store emphasis this season.

Other features include canned tuna, tomato products, sugar and instant dry milk. Now, macaroni, peanut butter, mayonnaise, canned peaches and grapefruit juice are best buy items.

FROZEN FOODS—Frozen vegetables, are among the better values in frozen food choices. Other specialties include ice cream, strawberries and lemons/lemonade.

FRESH FRUIT—Best values include moderate prices for oranges, pineapples and bananas. Cantaloupes, watermelons and honeydews are plentiful, although prices vary.

Peaches, nectarines, grapes and plums carry moderate to high price tags.

POULTRY—Fryer chickens remain a good value despite slight price increase. Buy the whole bird and cut it up at home to save money.

Egg prices are up a bit, but eggs continue as a very reasonably-priced protein food.

BEEF—Check the cuts for features on various high weight and mature beef cuts. Look for best beef values on round steaks, roasts, chuck cuts, steaks and liver.

PORK—In smoked cuts, look for scattered values—pork chops, ribs and pork loin roasts, and liver.

DAIRY PRODUCTS—Dairy features include low fat milk, sour cream, yogurt and a selection of cheeses.

CONSUMER WATCH—WORDS: If Valencia oranges in the market have a greenish tinge, they are really mature. "Re-greening" occurs when the weather gets warmer and ground temperatures increase, causing the chlorophyll to return to the skin.





Air-conditioned Cars Have Pollution Problem

Air-conditioned cars make levels were markedly lower than those in the air-conditioned cars.

Take an experiment done in Miami traffic. Ten passenger cars were driven four miles through downtown Miami. The windows of the cars were shut tight, and the air conditioners were on. The driver of a control car made the same trip with the windows wide open and no air conditioning.

The results were a surprise. Carbon monoxide levels inside the air-conditioned cars climbed up and up during the 30-minute drive. As more of the gas entered the confined space, it was not passed out fast enough. By the end of the trip, levels were four to eight times higher than at the beginning. Way above Florida standards for permissible levels in the ambient air.

And the control car? With the windows wide open, high levels of carbon monoxide inside the car were noted at two stop lights. Otherwise,







Two Years Later, Jane's No Rookie

By JOAN GEOGHEGAN

Jane Pauley of NBC's "Today" show had a tough act to follow. In October of 1976, she was signed on along with co-host Tom Brokaw as Barbara Walters' replacement on the early morning magazine show.

At 26, Jane was the youngest national newscaster in the country. Although she had co-hosted the evening news on Chicago's WMAQ, she was still a greenhorn when NBC offered her the job of co-hosting "Today" with former White House correspondent Tom Brokaw.

Jane admits her success may have been "too fast." However, she continues, "I was taking more of a risk than NBC. In six months time, NBC could have come to me and said, 'Gee, Jane, you're a nice kid but...' I was definitely an experiment and I was frightened, but turning the job down wasn't a viable alternative."

The risk has worked to Jane's favor. She admits, "I do more hard news than I ever did in Chicago. I never interviewed Joan Baez or Larry Flint there."

The pert, pony-tailed rookie is gone. Jane Pauley has a shorter, more sophisticated hair cut these days, and her manner is self-assured.

"I was just plain bored. I was tired of looking at the same person. I had had that pony tail when I started out in Indianapolis. 'As I get older,' she continues, "the less my age is an issue. At 26, I'm no big deal. I behaved competently, and I've been accepted by my colleagues, which is the highest compliment."

Did Jane ever take acting or speech lessons to improve her television image?

"Acting, I can't do and never did. But, I was very active on my high school

speech and debate team."

As co-host of "Today," Jane is expected to initiate stories and do two two-minute essays each week. She gets help from the show's two researchers and a staff of writers. She also gets assignments from the show's producer, Paul Freedman.

"Since we have a reasonable amount of live programming each week, part of my job is to keep an eye out."

She explains, "I design each interview and organize my six minutes with each person."

Her essays include one topical piece and one light piece each week. Often, she'll write the essay on Wednesday for the Thursday morning show. However, Jane doesn't consider this a rushed procedure: "I work a full day. Of

course there are days when there isn't enough time. I suppose some people think as soon as the show is over I'm out the door, but this is wrong."

About once a month, "Today" will travel out of New York for an on-location show. The staff spent 10 days in London last summer for Queen Elizabeth's Silver Jubilee. When "Today" travelled to Charleston, South Carolina, for a music festival, the whole crew went along.

"I think we do better shows on location," Jane says. "You don't have a home to go to." Consequently, the "Today" staff puts more into the show.

"When we did the 10 days in England," Jane explains, "we could do some spots in advance. One we did on a boat on the Thames took 10 hours to tape. We could do things

over."

"Today" be doing any on-location shows in the next month?

Jane doesn't think so. "In summer viewing is down."

Jane will keep her cool, however. Her experience at the Columbia University graduation last May assures her of that.

She and Tom Brokaw were broadcasting from the Ivy Manhattan campus when a student doused her with a cup of cold coffee. "With cream and sugar," she adds.

Although Jane wasn't flustered by the incident, she comments: "When you go out on the street with a camera crew, you do attract attention. I realized I could interview a controversial character, and I, too, would be in the line of fire."

"We turned it to our advantage. If he had a point to make, there are better ways. He made himself look foolish."

The "Today" hosts can fend off fire before the cameras, but can they stand up to the growing number of competing TV news magazines?

"Our standards are high," Jane maintains, "but the pacing and competition with other news magazines make us hustle more for the newsmakers. It hurts if we go after Joan Baez five minutes too late, then turn on 'Good Morning America' and see her. Our morning position helps. For our viewers, we're a routine — like shaving or brushing their teeth. Also, 'Today' doesn't have to be a slick production like prime-time shows."

After two years with "Today," Jane isn't looking to follow her predecessor's example and anchor an evening news show.

"I can't think of a better job for me in television. It would be presumptuous and greedy to go after something else."

Jack Klugman

HOLLYWOOD — Jack Klugman has a problem. Thus seems to be going so well that he has very little about which to complain.

He has some new, young writers for his "Quincy" series. He hasn't been battling with writers, or the producer or the network over scripts. He now has 10 days to prepare each show, which he says is nine days more than preparation time last season.

The episodes deal more with forensic medicine, which makes him happier, since he is supposed to be a medical examiner with a penchant for solving crimes, and not a detective looking for crime.

"I spent a lot of time in-fighting last season," Klugman said. "We have none of that this coming season. This is the happiest I've been since 'Odd Couple,'" he said.

It also pleases Klugman that each hour-long episode is done in six days, but without losing quality because, after scrapping with writers and producers through the early part of last season, "they gave us enough freedom to do our job and enjoy it."

There was a moment when Klugman was being harassed by the writer's guild for his public utterances against script writers.

"I must please myself," he contended, without backing away from his stand versus the writers.

"Don't argue with me over things I don't like. Take me off the air, or leave me alone," he challenged. "Television works one way. Nobody ever got a job for being a nice guy, or nobody ever gets fired if he's a lousy guy but gets good ratings. I've never been cowardly about my work."


