## Council Hears Request

The Woodville City Council heard a request from the Tyler County Mental and Physical Handicap Association Inc. Monday for \$75,000 of Community Development Block Grant money to be used to build a Sheltered Workshop for mental and physical handicaps in Woodville and Tyler County.

The group, which was represented by some 20 persons made a presentation to the council at a performance hearing required before the Department of Housing and Urban Development can release the \$1.5 million in funds designated for a underdeveloped area in Woodville.

Councilmen spoke in favorable terms about the project which will be located in the grant impact area in Southeast Woodville.

Spokesman for the TCM&PHA said that the action to assist the group in the \$75,000 request would amount to the Council making a one-time investment in Woodville which will generate income to the city and those who cannot earn a normal income unless in a "sheltered" environment.

The program will reap economic benefits to the total community the spokesman said, "by providing a new workforce to area businesses and industries."

"We don't care what a person can't do," said John Morrison, president of the TCM&PHA board of directors, "we just want to know what they can do."

Shannon Arrington, building committee chairman for the organization said that the group was formed about a year ago "to help those of us who are not as blessed as we are."

Arrington told the council "because of the geographic location and the service nature of our project, please consider this expression to the council a sincere formal request for funding assistance in the building and construction of a Sheltered Workshop here in Woodville."

According to Arrington, a "sheltered" workshop in Woodville would help make

the mental and physical handicaps who are able to utilize our services... taxpayers... instead of tax burdens.

## Suspect Eyed In Jones Death

Lorenzo Kiel, 40, has been charged with the murder of his grandfather Robert Mitchell Jones, 78, after a Saturday evening shootout at their Woodville home.

Jones was shot nine times with a .22 caliber pistol at close range. The wounds ranged from his left thigh to his right temple. Apparently the two men got into an argument, possibly about who was going to feed the hogs.

Kiel, released August 8 on \$25,000 bond, emptied a Harrison-richard nine-shot, .22 caliber pistol into Jones, stuck the pistol into his pocket and went to his neighbors house and told him he had shot his grandfather and may have killed him. He asked to be taken to the Sheriff's Department.

The incident occurred shortly after 5 p.m. Saturday. Officers Jay Crews, Charles Rainey and Sheriff's Deputy Butch Kraus were the law enforcement officials at the scene. Kraus said that Kiel

told them he had three beers and a large amount of gin before the shooting.

According to Justice of the Peace Frank Grimes, District Attorney George Kirkpatrick may take the case directly to the Grand Jury. No decision has been made though, as the case is still under Sheriff's Department investigation.

According to Rainey, Kiel gave himself up and turned over the pistol. He seemed to be afraid of his grandfather, or at least gave that impression. Grimes said. Kraus said that although Kiel admitted drinking the three beers and the gin he did not appear "all that drunk" at the scene. He also said that Kiel was "mad, real mad."

Jones' funeral is set for 2:30 Saturday, August 12, at the Tyler County Funeral Home.

The merchants have been contemplating filing a class action suit against Fowler. It had generally assumed that the concert was set up for the school auditorium, but Linam said no one had contacted him about arranging use of the hall for that night.

Last week we discussed two reasons why members of churches of Christ believe the Old Testament. 1) God wants us to believe it (Rom. 15:4). 2) the geological record of historical events and Luke's indicates our need for faith in it.

The boom goes on, and the South will again ride the crest of a banner sales year for forest products.

That is the guestimate of more than a handful of industry economists, and market forecasters, looking ahead at what is in store for the rest of 1978.

The only cloud on the horizon is the effect certain actions by the federal government may have on the industry's performance.

There is a severe timber supply problem in the West that millions of those western acres are prime timber growing sites, admirably suited to multiple-use management.

Looked at from the other side of the coin, the West's problems benefit the Southern industry. With finished products in short supply from western mills, a reasonably good construction market for new homes should keep product prices at good levels throughout the year.

And despite the forecast for many, over the last several years that rising costs were pricing the potential home owner out of the market, new construction and building permits, (which forecast future building) continue at good levels. This, in spite of the worst winter in one hundred years, and a general concern by the American public on the state of the economy.

It is probably a forlorn hope, but in our opinion, the federal government is self-defeating in its apparent lack of concern for the timber supply situation. The U.S. Forest Service is one of the few federal agencies that can "turn a profit" through the sale of timber from the national forests. And the counties that receive a portion of those sales dollars, in lieu of taxes, are placed in a financial bind, because of the loss of income.

All this at a time when the President has authorized \$350,000,000 or more to expand the Redwood National Park. A decision that gives the Redwood the unenviable distinction of being the most expensive, and least-used park of the entire federal system.

The various litigations constantly being filed against commercial timber harvest on both federal and private lands will obviously continue. In turn, creating supply problems for mill operators, and high prices in the marketplace.

But to many a home is still the wisest investment they can make, and new households continue to be formed.

The end of the year may tell us something different, but at this juncture, it looks like another great year. Great news for those in the building industry, and the communities they serve.

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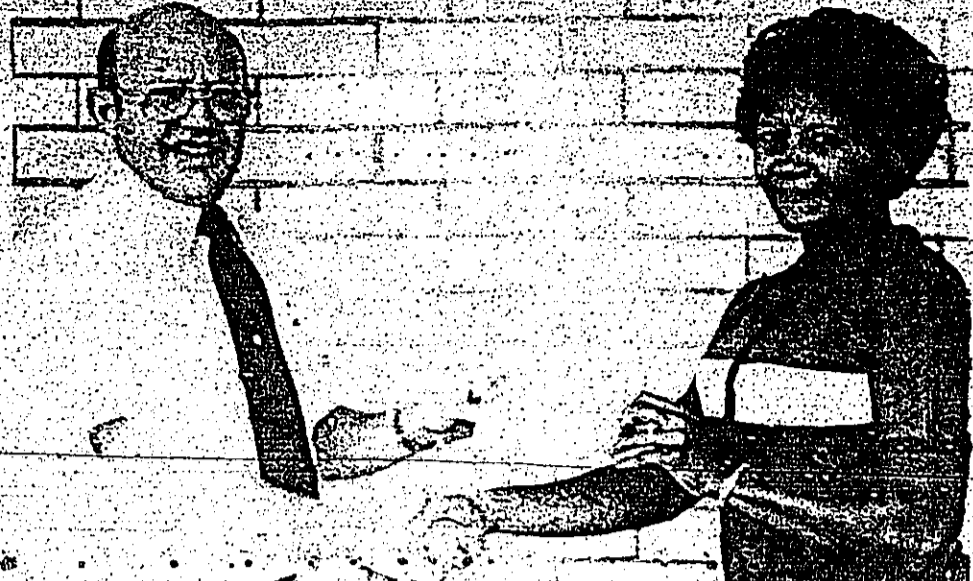

## 'Part-Week' Work Study Done

WASHINGTON—Three out of five employed women have steady jobs that require less than 35 hours a week, according to a study prepared for the U.S. Labor Department.

The study, "Women and Part-Week Work" focuses on the relationship of married women to part-week work that is, employment with regular hours of less than 35 per week. It examines a group of 10,000 women to the extent to which they work part-week over a six-year period, various combinations of part-week and full-week work, and their significance and the effect part-week has on their wages and unemployment experience.

The group studied were married women between 18 and 49 years of age. The study was done in 1973. Findings include:

- During the six years of the study, 40 percent of the women worked part-week.
- More children in the home and the presence of a preschooler in the home were among the major factors.
- For mature women, poor health was an important reason for limiting work to part-week, and being black was a significant factor in reducing the probability of part-week work.
- When work experience after the birth of the first child and before the current job was largely of a part-week nature, it reduced the current level of earnings. In fact, the wage of a current job of a woman who emphasized part-week work during this interval of her life was not improved compared with a woman who did not have outside employment during the interval.
- The sources for the study were the National Longitudinal Surveys of 1967-72, for mature women (30-44 years of age) and the same surveys for young women (18-24) in 1968-73.
- The study, "Women and Part-Week Work" was done for the Department of Employment and Training Administration by Ethel B. Jones and James E. Long of Auburn University's School of Business.

If the issue is service-related, the vet can get compensation. If it was a non-service-related accident there is the possibility of a monthly check depending on outside income.

There are also survivors benefits. If the veteran is 100 percent disabled his wife and children can receive money to attend college. ## Diet - Eat Less And Exercise More

Do you need to lose weight? If you do, you are not alone. One out of every five Americans is fighting more pounds than he or she should, says a pamphlet from the American Medical Association.

And you can forget all of the books and magazine articles about losing weight without dieting. The only way to take in your weight, give or take five or ten pounds, is to eat less and exercise more, the A.M.A. points out.

But no matter how much you exercise, you can't just shake it off. An inescapable exercise is turning your back on food and eating less. Most people leading moderately active lives need 15 calories per pound to maintain their desired weight. If you want to weigh 150 pounds, you can consume food containing no more than 2,250 calories each day—150 x 15.

There are approximately 3,500 calories in each stored pound of fat. To lose one pound of fat, you must consume 3,500 fewer calories each day than you need to maintain present weight. You need to go hungry. Just eat more low-calorie foods and shun the gravies, creamed

disks, rich desserts, fried meats, and liquor. Eat slowly and fill up on carrot sticks, leafy vegetables, radishes, consommé, and most fresh fruits. Get a calorie counter booklet and plan your diet menus around it.

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# Good Diet Essential Warren News

COLLEGE STATION—Well-balanced diets—not fat foods—insure athletes of the proper nutrition they need, says Mary K. Sweeten, foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas A&M University System.

They believe in any food or vitamin supplements they feel will improve their performance, she points out. However, no dietary special foods or vitamin pills give the athlete competitive skill. Well-balanced foods are the best source of nutrients for the athlete. Vitamin pills are unnecessary for a healthy individual and add neither extra energy or pep, says Mrs. Sweeten.

four food groups are the best insurance of a well-balanced diet. Eat four or more servings each of the fruit-vegetable and bread-cereal groups, two or more servings of milk group and two and one-half to three ounce servings of meat group foods every day, she recommends.

## Home Canning Revives Memories

To many, the thought of canning brings back childhood memories. Of baskets of fresh-picked tomatoes, still warm and sweet-smelling from the garden sun. Of steaming kettles and rows of shining jars. Of grandmother's garden where everything from asparagus to zucchini grew in abundance. Of canning days sitting in the kitchen peeling, paring, pitting and slicing. Of mother marking the jars with red-bordered labels.

For generations, canning season has been a time for relatives to congregate and a time to be thankful for a plentiful harvest. In earlier days, canning was a need necessity. But with all the developments in food technology, processing and distribution, canning is not nearly so necessary as it once was.

Yet, home canning has grown tremendously in popularity in recent seasons. Millions of Americans are returning to a basic pioneer concept: your own food, preserve it for winter, be a little more self-sufficient.

Surveys in widespread sections of the nation tell the same story—not since the victory gardens of World War II have families gone in so heavily for home preservation of food as they have in the last several years.

These same surveys also suggest that many families

are rediscovering that, in addition to economy, there is something basically satisfying and rewarding in preserving food. And canned foods can be enjoyed at a later time when they are needed more. Also, fruits and vegetables can be available all year long, not just when they are in season. And most importantly, the home canner has complete control over which, if any, additives are put in the food—and home canned foods can be made to meet the specific tastes of the family. Here is a home-canning recipe for sweet corn:

**CORN WITH RED PEPPERS**  
12 Large ears fresh corn  
1 Sweet red (or green) pepper, diced  
2 teaspoons salt  
2 teaspoons Imperial Granulated Sugar  
Dried basil

1. Husk corn, remove silk and wash. Cut corn from cob. With corn in colander, rinse in cool water.  
2. Measure 2 quarts corn kernels into large kettle. Add salt, Imperial Granulated Sugar and 4 cups boiling water.

3. Add pepper to corn in kettle.  
4. Pack hot into hot jars, leaving 1-inch head space. Add ½ teaspoon basil to each jar. Adjust caps.  
5. Process pints 55 minutes, quarts 1 hour and 25 minutes, at 10 pounds pressure.  
6. Yield: five pints.

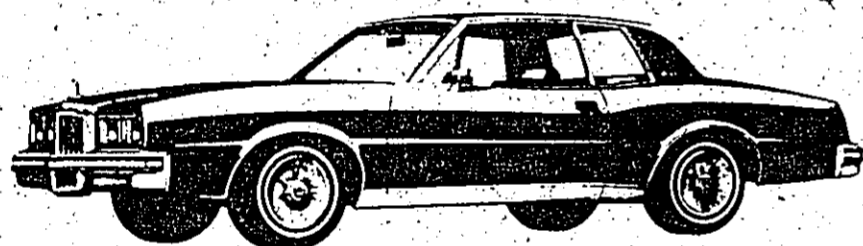

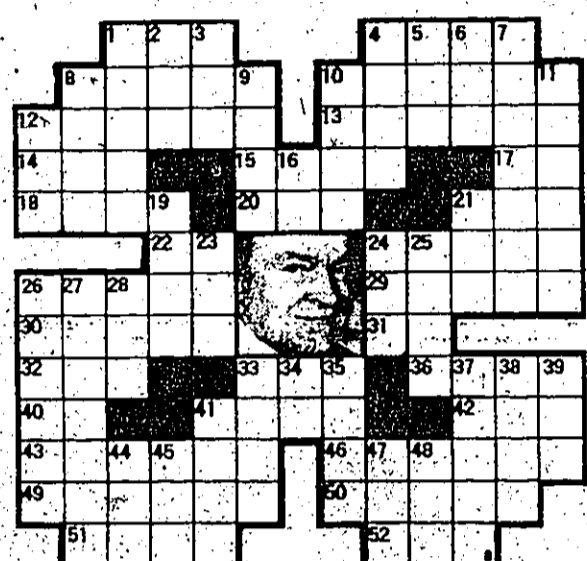

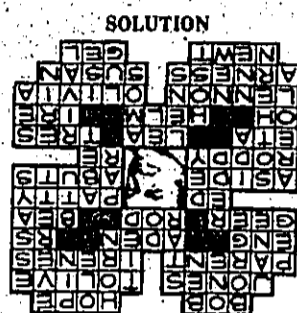

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## From Broadway to Hollywood

### Joe Namath is Coaching a New Series

HOLLYWOOD — Joe Namath is seated on a small platform facing as many as 100 newspaper people and answering their questions with the straightforward style which has marked his flamboyant football career for the past 13 years.



Former pro quarterback Joe Namath will star as Harry Casey, the coach of a hapless high school basketball team in NBC-TV's new comedy series, "The Waverly Wonders," this fall.

The blossoming star has a co-starring role in a major adventure film, "Avalanche Express," in which he plays alongside of Lee Marvin and Robert Shaw, and television series, "The Waverly Wonders," which he is doing for NBC.

In the Friday night series Namath will portray an ex-player who becomes coach of a hapless high school basketball team, which can't seem to win any games.

Joe was telling the television reporters and critics that he long ago realized that football was only a temporary job. Since he never entertained thoughts of going into coaching, he had to consider a future beyond football. How ironic that his first TV role casts him as a coach!

"I saw all my coaches putting in those 16-hour days, seven days a week," Namath observed. "I appreciate my health. I never wanted any part of that. And when did he decide that he had had enough as an active player? Did being relegated to second-string have anything to do with hastening his decision to retire?"

"No. I decided I was going to quit at the end of last season when I got bored with practice. Then I realized it was time to move on," Namath responded. "I'll miss being outside every day."

Has he considered following the route of other former athletes who have turned to sportscasting following their playing days?

"I might do something with the Olympics, but I don't see myself as a broadcaster," Namath said. "For the most part, former athletes are terrific

sportscasters, like John Brody and Frank Gifford. But that's not my style. I don't want to go in and out of a stadium every Sunday afternoon, spending five or six hours there. That would be too tedious right now. I have no desire to do it."

Joe says he never took acting lessons, until he signed with Lorimar Productions, which financed "Avalanche Express." Lorimar also is producing "Waverly Wonders." In preparing for both roles, Namath underwent special coaching from former actress-turned director Joan Darling, who also conducts one of the most popular acting courses in Hollywood.

Acting is far from anticlimactic for him after all those years of football, huge crowds and fan adulation.

He recalls that even before his first season, when he was signed out of Alabama as quarterback for the Jets for what was then

considered an incredible \$400,000 bonus, he underwent knee surgery, and doctors told him at best he might play four years in the pros.

Instead, he went for 13 years, many of them painful, but, Namath asserts, all enjoyable, including his last season.

He recalls an old teammate, Don Maynard, once told him in his first season out of college that football is a cold business. "Make it, or leave it," Maynard advised.

When his career was finished, Namath followed those words and quickly left football. "I don't dwell on problems. I like to move on."

However, he admits to being in awe of his co-stars on "Avalanche Express."

"Those guys, (Shaw, Marvin, Maximilian Schell and Mike Connors) were a lot of fun to be with, and they were willing to help me. I picked up a lot of acting pointers from them."

Initially, I laid back, a little awe struck. I felt strange working with those guys. I've seen them on the screen so much."

Of "Waverly Wonders," which went into production less than a month after he returned from Europe, Namath confides that he was not "terribly pleased" with the pilot. He said he would suggest changing a few things, if his advice is sought. "It wouldn't be very bright of me to say anything right now," he observed. But he does feel a good deal of the show and the character is a mirror which makes it very real for him.

Still, Namath is not his own best fan on the screen. Namath admits that he didn't watch the dailies during shooting of "Avalanche Express."

"I liked to watch myself on the screen while I was playing football, but I don't like to watch myself as an actor."

Although Namath must wear ace bandages and tape to keep his feet from swelling, he reported there never was any thought of pampering himself, easing up on work.

And he still relishes questions about his personal life, regardless of how much he may protest. When the questions dealt with his macho personality and his playboy image, Namath was willing to talk. One reporter noted that a recent gossip item quoted Namath as claiming he "couldn't conceive of spending five or six days, 24 hours with the same female," explaining his reluctance about marriage.

"I was misquoted," Namath said, smiling impishly as he continued. "I never said 'conceive.' He drew a large laugh.

"I haven't settled down," Namath expanded on his remark, "because there are so many lovely ladies, but I haven't found one that I feel ready to settle with. I'm not going to give it (marriage) a shot yet. I don't want that pressure."

## Madcap Maniacs

The Hudson Brothers, the modern answer to such comedy troups as the Marx Brothers, the Three Stooges and Abbott and Costello, are hard at work outside of London. They are preparing their syndicated show "Bonkers," for September release in the U.S. and abroad.

The Hudsons have recorded the hit singles "So You Are a Star," "Rendezvous," "Spinning Wheel" and "I Don't Wanna Be Lonely."

They explained, "We're doing all our music live. Since TV and music are hard to mix, the music spot is totally separate."

One, with all the cuts, the movie looked like it went through a meatgrinder. Two, how old is Alex Cord, who was the star? A book I got in the library lists his birth date as 1937, which would have made him 30 when he made this movie. He looked great, but not 30. Also, where is he from? His accent drifts from a cowboy drawl to a very straight, enunciated sound. Odd. Finally, where can I write him these days? I know it's a lot of questions, but maybe you can give it a go. — Joanna Saunders, Wauray, S.D.

I'll do my best to fulfill my duty. From the top: The movie did go through a meatgrinder — about 25 minutes (mostly violent scenes; as you might have guessed) were cut from it by the ABC censors. The questions of censorship and TV violence are too complex to go into here, but I agree that the butchery done to many films equals the butchery they're out to eliminate, although "A Minute to Die..." was no great movie to start with. As for Alex Cord, you should get a job guessing ages at a carnival. You're right, he was born Aug. 3, 1931, in New York City, so he's not a born cowboy. But he did ride broncs on the rodeo circuit for a while before becoming an actor (breaking a leg on stage was better than breaking one on a horse).

As for the "odd" speech patterns you describe, all I can say is a little of his Shakespearean training may have leaked through the cowboy veneer of the character he was playing. Cord started acting in Shakespeare with the Stratford company in Ontario, Canada. He also studied at the famed Actor's Studio in New York. ## Soap Exposition

According to a survey conducted by a national research company, some 35 million women are avid viewers of TV soap operas. There is a plethora of daytime soaps vying for the attention of the multitude of viewers. Currently, 14 shows are being telecast on the networks with 11 originating in New York and three on the West Coast. The shows range in time from one-half to one hour.

The soaps differ from the normal run of TV series because of their staying power. Two of the shows are in their 28th year; "Search for Tomorrow" and "Love of Life." The stars as well are known for their staying power. For example, Mary Stuart ("Search for Tomorrow") has been a cast member since her show's inception.

The on-going popularity and consistency of the

older series, however, has had no bearing on the development of newer soaps. A few tough competitors: "All My Children," 7 years; "Ryan's Hope," 3 years; and the baby of soap operas, "For Richer, For Poorer," on the air since last year.

Along with these innovative, new programs come new personalities. Some of the recent additions gaining stardom are Jill Voight and Judith Light (both of "One Life to Live"); Larry

Fleischman and Julia Barr ("All My Children"); Dene Kristen and Nancy Addison ("Ryan's Hope").

Until recently, most viewers of these soap operas shared their interests by joining the various fan clubs. They now have a monthly newsmagazine, The Soap Box, and a weekly newsletter, entitled the Confidential Report. Both are available by subscription only.

Perhaps the most important event designed to bring these fans together is the First International Soap Opera Exposition. It will take place August 26 and 27 at the Statler Hilton Hotel, New York. The Soap Box, sponsor of Soap Expo '78, reports that more than 2,000 reservations have been received from fans throughout the country.

Hundreds of soap stars, supporting actors and technicians will be on hand to meet the fans. Soap stars attending include Val DuFaur and Marilyn McIntyre ("Search for

Tomorrow"); Tom Fucello, Jill Voight, Jacque Courtney ("One Life to Live"); John Gabriel ("Ryan's Hope"); Wayne Hudgins ("As the World Turns"); and Velaka Gray ("Love of Life"). Autograph and photo sessions will be scheduled.

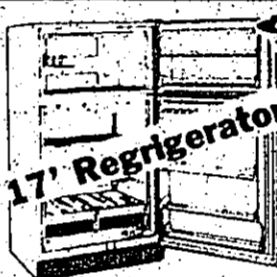

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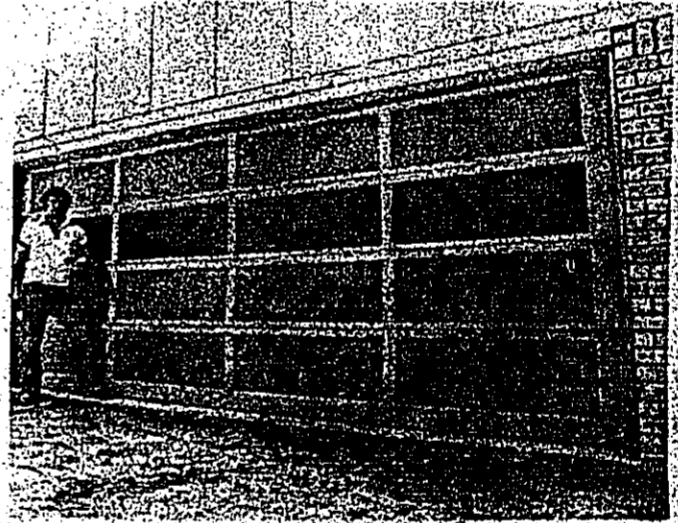
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
