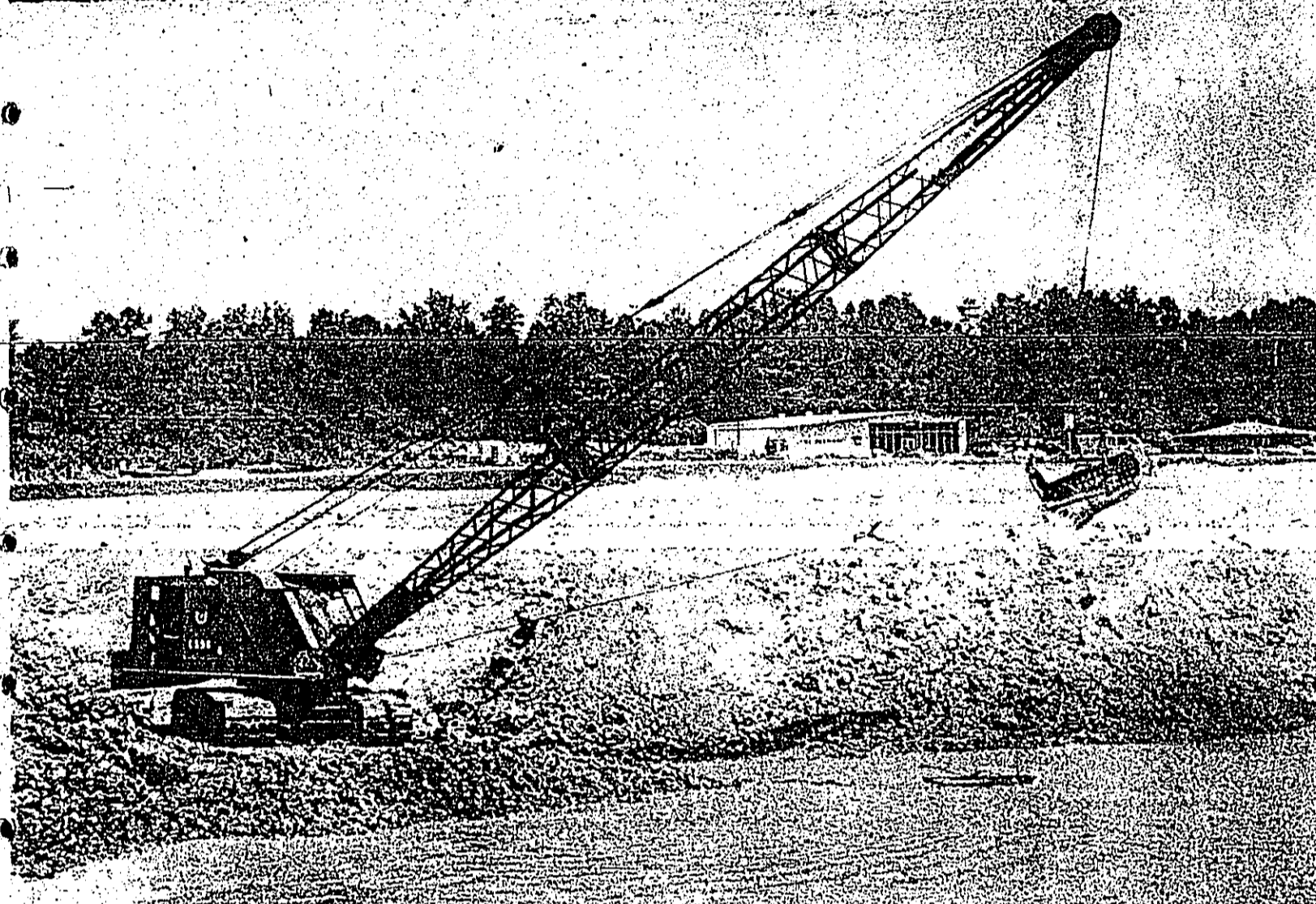

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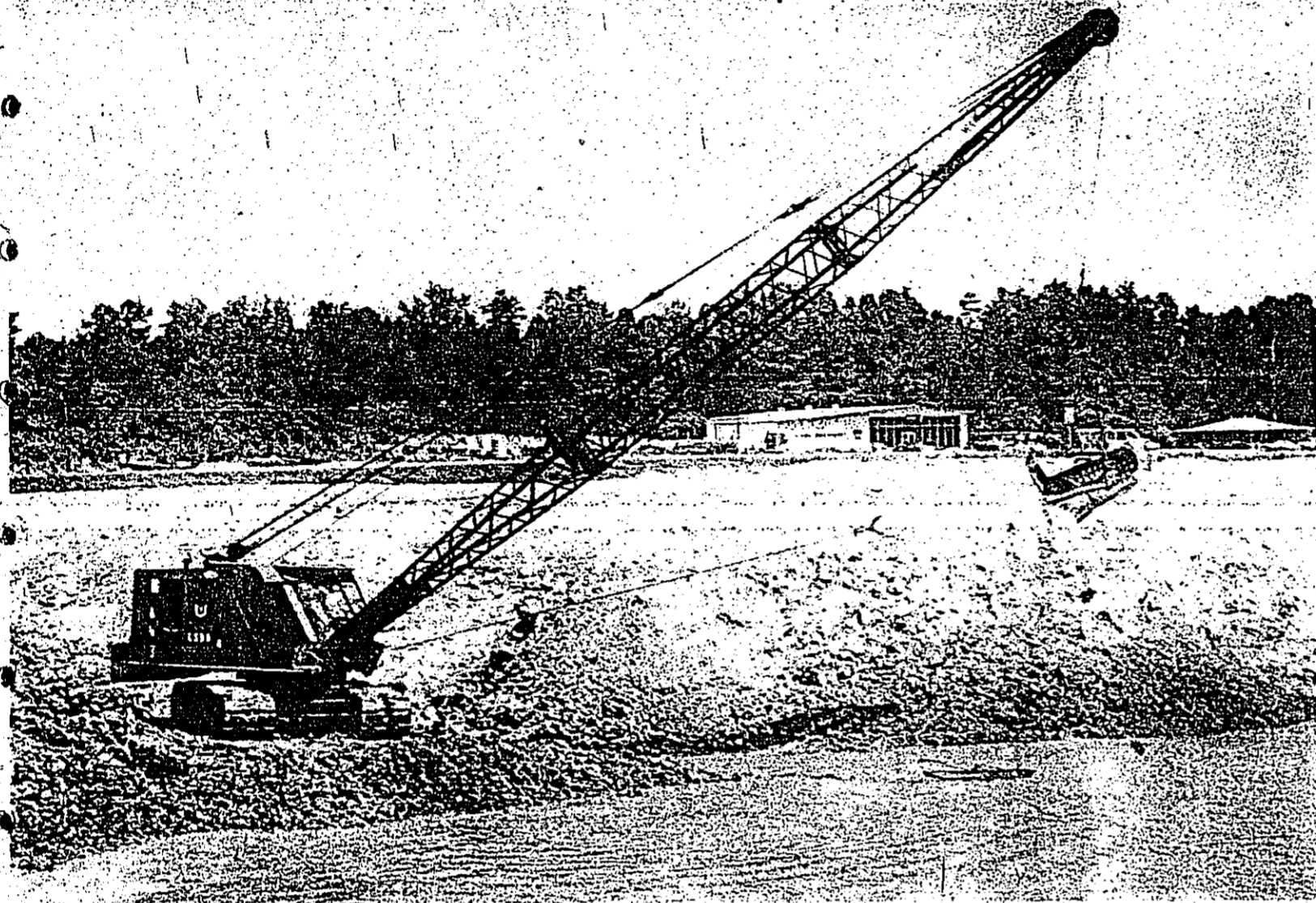
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While on tour Debbie was chosen to make three instruction films to be viewed by beginners and advanced twirlers alike, by a French director.

# Government Getting Bigger

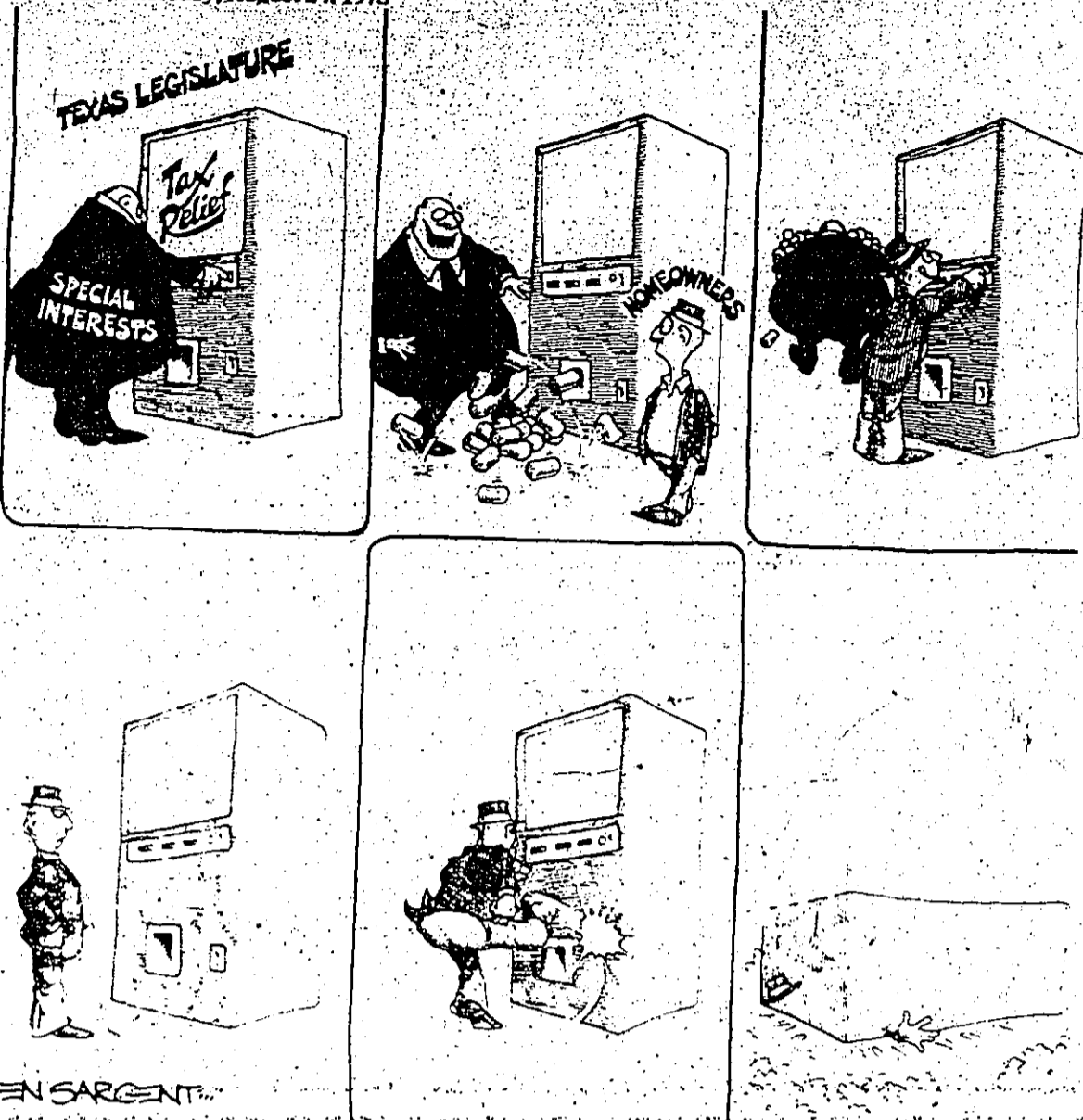

Right Around Home

El Morro

Two years before the first mosquito bit Captain John Smith at Jamestown and 15 years before the Pilgrims stepped ashore at Plymouth, a Spaniard stopped in a soft sandstone in New Mexico and carved a message in a soft sandstone monument.

Visitors to El Morro National Monument may still read the message he left there nearly 375 years ago: "Paso por aqui" it begins. "There passed by here the governor Don Juan de Onate on his return from the discovery of the sea of the south, April 16 of the year 1605."

Onate wasn't the first man to carve his name into the sheer cliff that sentinels the high plains surrounding the monument and he wasn't the last. Today the cliff-applied named "Inscription Rock"—is a 200 foot high autograph album that has many historical messages on it, including some entertaining ones.

Corporal Joseph Trujillo worked some humor into the rock in 1736. On July 14 of that year, General Juan Paez Hurtado recorded the fact that he was at the rock. Just underneath, two lines were added, no doubt when the general's back was turned.

"And in his company, the Corporal Joseph Trujillo." With that line Corporal Trujillo found his place in history. Visitors to El Morro today have no such easy route because the rock is closed to autographers. But there's a block of sandstone in front of the visitor center where you can scratch your name. It is not the typical National Park Service guest register.

There is more than signatures in stone to this 1,278 acre monument located off Interstate 40, 43 miles from Grants, N.M. and 58 miles from Gallup, N.M.

Long before the first European arrived on our shores, the prehistoric American lived on, and around the rock. Atop it are ruins of two pueblos. On its face are petroglyphs—carvings of men, goats, winged serpents and birds.

The first known historical mention of El Morro is found in the journal of Diego Perez de Luxan, chronicler of the Espejo expedition of 1583. Luxan stopped at El Morro for water on March 11 of that year.

Water lured others to the rock. Over the years, soldiers, goat seekers, and cattlemen were attracted to a precious pool of water at the base of the cliff that was the result of summer thunderstorms and winter snows. There is a small campground located in the park, which can double as a picnic area. The nearest restaurant is in Ramah, 13 miles away and there are overnight accommodations in Gallup and Grants.

# Insurance Helps Homeowners

You've just bought a house, signed a mortgage, and have a deed to prove ownership. You think you own the house, but do you?

Chances are that in fact you are the owner. However, situations might arise which could challenge your claim to full ownership. For example:

The parties who sold you the house claimed to be the heirs of the prior owner, but one of the heirs failed to sign the deed.

Your seller gave you a deed to the land but two weeks earlier he had been judged incompetent by court.

You start to build a new garage on the back of your lot but the power company tells you that you will have to relocate it because it will interfere with an underground utility easement which no one told you about.

You receive a notice that your house is subject to a special assessment for \$4,000 for street improvements, completed but not paid for at the time you took title.

Does this sound like a nightmare, something that can't ever happen? In the complicated world of real estate, these things do happen and many others like them happen every day, according to the Family Housing Bureau, a public information service of Chicago Title Insurance Company. No one can guarantee that claims against your title won't be made, but you can protect against loss from such claims by title insurance, the Family Housing Bureau points out. In most areas of the country, title insurance is a part of virtually every real estate transaction.

Lenders—including savings and loan associations and commercial banks that make mortgages—insist on title insurance to make sure they have a valid first lien on the property. In addition, buyers should have their own title insurance policy to protect them up to the full value of the property, not just the amount of the mortgage, the FHB recommends.

What title insurance does is guarantee the existence or non-existence of rights in land. The final determination as to the existence or non-existence of rights in land. The final determination as to the existence or non-existence of rights in real estate lies in the province of the courts, but it would be impractical to subject every title to real estate to court review.

The next most reliable means to establish the ownership of rights in real estate is through the guarantee of title insurance. The title insurer has special skills to determine the ownership of the multitude of rights that can exist and gives a guarantee to pay the cost of resulting losses if the title insurer is later found to have been wrong in its determination.

This guarantee includes defending your ownership in court, if necessary, and paying you if you lose your property or certain rights to it through a defect in the title as insured.

As important as title insurance is, a recent survey conducted by Chicago Title Insurance Company in eight major markets, disclosed that 35.8 percent of home owners have never heard of it, and only 57 percent of those surveyed rate it highly important, compared with 69 percent who rate medical insurance highly important and 65 percent who put auto insurance in the same category.

This is probably because title insurance is just one of the many items considered in the closing costs of a home purchase and the buyer and seller pay little attention to it, according to FHB, adding that the informed buyer will insist on title insurance.

Since the lender will usually require a mortgage title policy, it is suggested that the buyer request his own's policy at the same time because both policies can be written on the basis of a single title search, examination and underwriting process. The owner receives no coverage of any kind under a mortgage title insurance policy issued on his real estate. Only an owner's policy protects the owner.

The one-time payment for a title policy, including the search of the records and examination, averages about 0.4 percent of the sale price of the home nationwide. Far less than many people think title insurance costs. According to the survey cited earlier, the average person thinks that title search and title insurance represents 2.87 percent of the sale price, and thinks that 2.47 percent would be a fair premium to pay.

The relatively modest charge for title insurance guarantees the new owner that as long as he owns the property the title company will protect him against a multitude of past actions that may threaten his title. The title company is required by all states to have adequate reserves to back up its guarantees.

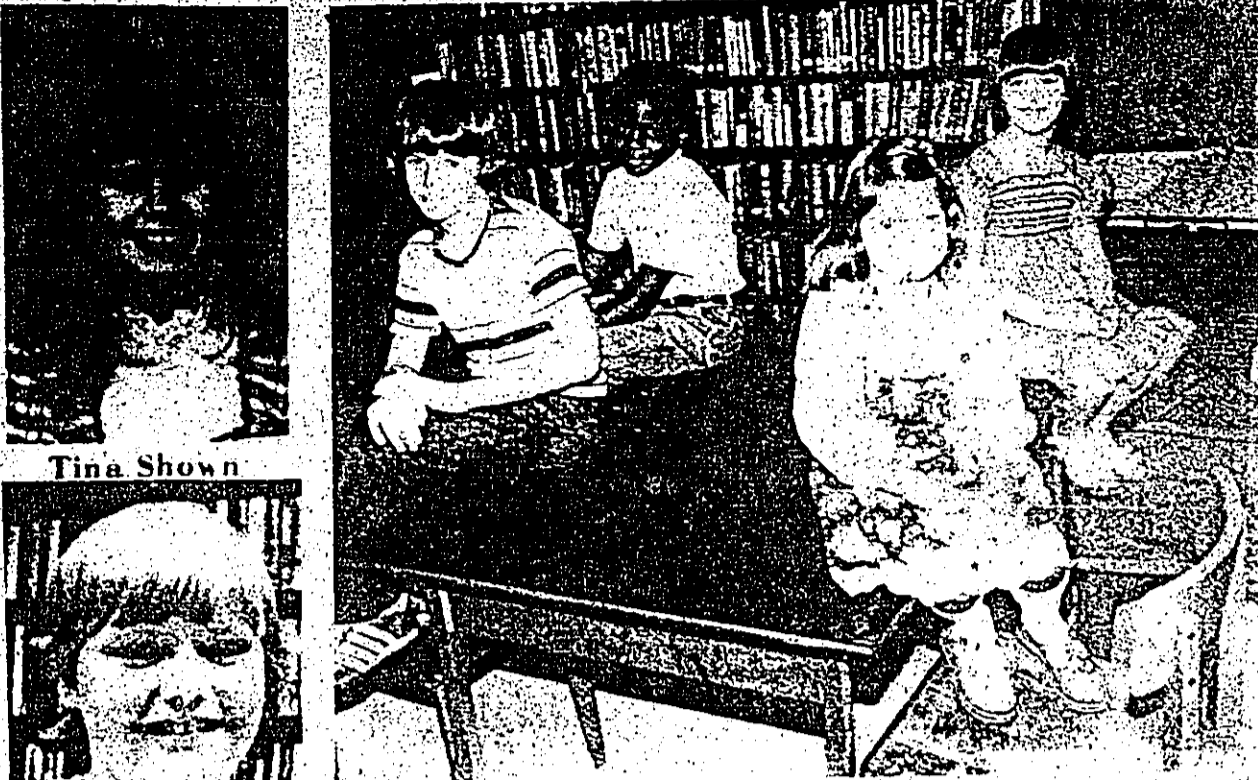

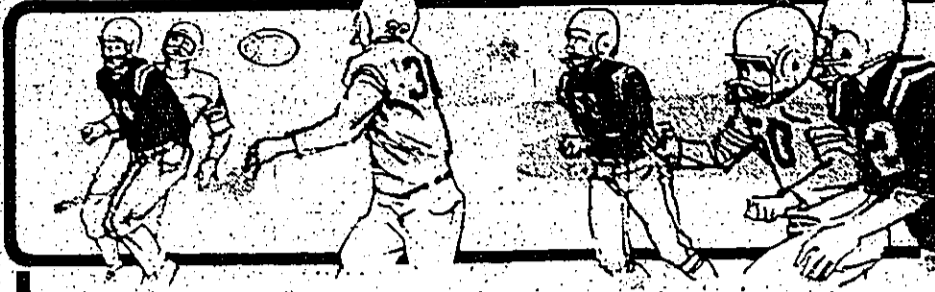

### Law Aimed At Child Ads

It's time for concerned parents to speak out about television advertisements aimed at children, a consumer information specialist urges.

The Federal Trade Commission has developed a regulation which would require TV advertising directed at children to explain the product being advertised.

The report points out that the average 2-to-11-year-old watches over 1,300 hours of TV annually and sees about 20,000 commercials.

Based on its investigation, the FTC staff finds the following:

- Many young children don't understand the selling purpose of TV advertising and regard it as just another form of programming.
- TV advertising aimed at children too young to understand the intent of commercials is both unfair and deceptive.
- TV advertising for sustained products is deceptive under the FTC Act because it fails to reveal material facts regarding the health benefits of such consumption.
- Also, it violates well-established legal policies that protect children against serious and lasting consequences of their own mistakes and against adult exploitation.

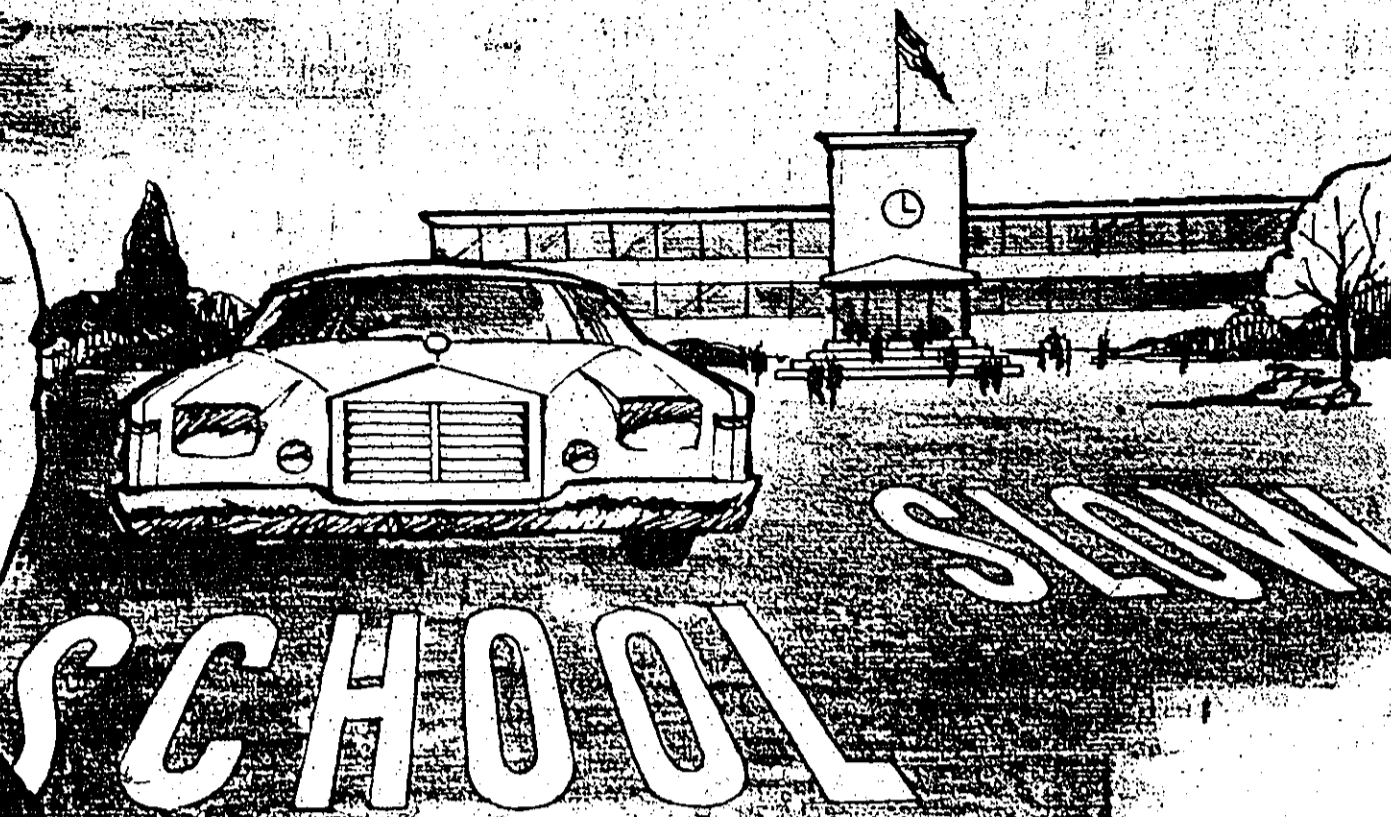

## McIntire's T

James McIntire, born in Ohio in 1846, came to Texas as a young man. He worked first as a cowboy for a rancher J.C. Loving in Jack County, and then as a buffalo hunter on the North Texas prairies. After a brief service as a Texas Ranger on the Indian frontier, his career alternated between periods of saloon-keeping, ranching, law enforcement and gambling. Finding himself on the "wrong side of the law" after a brief residence in New Mexico, McIntire spent the next several years on the move throughout Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas, and Oklahoma Territory (O.T.). While he ran a gambling establishment in Mountain View, O.T., in about 1900, McIntire contracted "black small-pox." After a month's illness, according to his own account, his heart "stopped

beating and he "died" a period of about ten minutes. Following his resuscitation by doctors and his subsequent recovery, he published in 1902 his memoirs, "Days in Texas: A Trip to Hell and Heaven." The greater portion of the book tells his adventurous life, with final chapters describing his visions of Hell and of Heaven during the period which was "dead."

Although McIntire's death took place in Texas, he was a Texan for a major portion of his life. This reason for the name of his experiences both in this world and in the world merit inclusion in literature of Texas.

"When I died, I felt a hand on each of my shoulders which picked me up and took me flying through space. I offered no resistance to the unseen hands, and experienced no fear in my flight, though it seemed that I was moving a hundred times faster than anything moved on earth. I felt my speed suddenly slackening, and in a short time I alighted on the ground before two large fiery pits; each one of which seemed about one hundred and fifty yards long, fifty yards wide, and fifty feet deep, with a stone walk six feet wide between them and surrounding them on each side. The bottoms of the pits were covered with fire, which blazed up ten or fifteen feet high, and resembled burning oil. There were a number of planks fastened together, which led up to this walk from the ground a few feet below, and on each side of the chute two dragon-like angels of the Devil were stationed.

.....

There were people coming almost all the time. They marched up in squads and singly, while these hideous monsters, reaching out and catching them in their claws, would throw them into the fire. The women were thrown into one pit and the men into the other. An unseen hand again took hold of me and ushered me out on the arch between the two pits, three or four steps from the end. When we stopped, I asked who it was with me, and answer came in a hoarse, discordant, but plain voice. "The Devil; be not afraid."

.....

Just then I was seen by one of those dragon-like reptiles, and it came after me, but the voice ordered it back. There were five of them in each pit, and they were the most hideous looking things I ever saw. They were all different in color, and their heads were shaped differently. All were of the same size, except one, who seemed to be the leader of the pit. They were about thirty feet long, and would weigh about a ton, while the leader, a big gray one, was twice as large. They resembled a dragon in shape and appearance, and their heads and fore-quarters were large. They had large mouths with long teeth, and great claws on each foot, they stayed in the fire, except when they saw anyone they would rise up just like a fish in water, without any exertion, and grab the unfortunates, throwing them into the fire. As I walked along this walk they came after me several times, but the voice ordered them back; then they would dive into the fire, stirring it up so it would boil and blaze higher....

.....

It was an awful spectacle to look upon. Men were groaning with pain and their contortions were pitiful. I could look down into their faces and see the terrible look of agony each one expressed. The fire did not consume their bodies; it only tortured them. It was not hot where I was, though I was standing on the walk between the two pits, which were only six feet apart. back and the big gray guard of the pit saw me for the first time and came after me. He opened his mouth and rolled his eyes at me, as if he was sure of his prey. He looked far worse than all the rest, and when he rose up close to me, I felt that my time had come; but the hands again touched me on the shoulders, and I felt myself rising in the air as if by the wind. Hell soon disappeared from view, and I was glad that I had escaped its horror.

Horse trainer Hunter Penn in Fountain, Colorado, believes that many of today's horses are smarter than their owners.  
So smart, he says in the September issue of HORSEMAN Magazine, on sale nationally Aug. 25, that the horses often outsmart their riders. That's when problems begin and bad habits form, he says.  
Because Penn believes that the horse of today is more intelligent and capable of learning easier and quicker than "old-time" horses, he applied a great deal of psychology when training a colt or removing the bad habits in an older "problem horse."  
"Riders create most of the bad habits their horses have," he claims, "simply because the rider is not enough of a horseman to understand the horse and to know what to do."  
The horse will quickly recognize the inability of the rider and take advantage of

are the major keys to good training and horsemanship. "The colt is like a child," he notes, "and must have discipline to understand what he can and cannot do. The rider must be consistent in applying this discipline."  
He says confidence is necessary for the horse and the rider. The horse must have confidence in how the rider will treat him and what is expected of him.  
The rider, at the same time, must have confidence in his or her own ability to know the right actions to take at the right time.  
The ability of a rider to recognize and understand significant body language of the horse and knowing the correct action to take is a major distinction between a novice and experienced horseman, according to Penn.  
"As an example of body language, he points out that the horse's ears act as a barometer of the horse's mental state. Ears pointed forward tell the rider that the horse is attentive and concentrating on what is ahead of him. He is in the mood to learn.  
Ears pointed back should tell the good rider that the horse's attention is divided. He may be sore, worrying about the rider, or have a tender mouth. At any rate, Penn says, he is not in the mood to learn."  
Horses have to be in the mood to learn," Penn states. "The good horseman knows how to create that mood and take advantage of it."  
He disagrees strongly with riders who believe that they can train a colt by "learning with him." That kind of approach results in both rider and horse forming bad habits.

**American's Use More Energy**  
Americans use more energy per person than any other people in the world. And create more pollution. A surprisingly big chunk of energy, 26 percent, is consumed by residences, says the American Lung Association. Most of the residential energy, 70 percent, is used for heating and cooling. An additional 20 percent goes for heating water. The furnace, along with the water heater, is the most energy-consuming, and running small appliances. According to government studies, about 40 million homes are not insulated adequately.  
Homeowners could save 8 percent on heating and cooling costs if they installed proper insulation and checked R-values: insulation ratings, which evaluate resistance to winter heat loss or summer heat gain. Attic insulation is important, too. In summer, a whole-house ventilating fan in the attic or upstairs window pulls cool air through the house if the windows are open downstairs.  
When you use fluorescent lights wherever possible, you cut energy demands. A 40-watt fluorescent bulb gives off 80 lumens per watt, while a 60-watt incandescent bulb gives off only 14 lumens. Every time you take a shower instead of a bath you save about five gallons of hot water. "Most plantings were on industrial private lands," stated Don Staples, district forester with the Texas Forest Service, "which makes up about 75 percent of the planting."  
Staples reminds landowners, "Now is the time to order your seedlings from the Texas Forest Service. To obtain a seedling application, stop by our office at 508 Pan American Drive, Livingston or call us at (713) 327-4832 and we will send you an application."

### OLD TESTAMENT (4)

Members of churches of Christ believe the Old Testament because: 1) God intended that we should (Rom. 15:4). We accept its application only to Jews who lived from Moses to Christ, the justice of God is manifest therein, we believe the truthfulness of its historical record, accept its prophetic utterances and we believe the OT demonstrates that men cannot thwart the purposes of God.

Does all of the foregoing mean that we are obligated to keep any or all of the OT today? Several passages teach that men are under law to Christ rather than Moses: Rom. 7:1-4; Gal. 3:24; Eph. 2:11-22 and Col. 2:14-16.

Some might object: Jesus said, that He did not come to destroy the law or the prophets (Mt. 5:17). It is true that Jesus did not come to abrogate the law. He came in fulfillment of its prophecies. The OT pointed to Christ. "And beginning at Moses and all the prophets. He expounded unto them in all the scriptures the things concerning Himself (Luke 24:27). Jesus knew and taught that the OT writers were talking about Him and that He came in fulfillment of their writings (John 5:39).

Both testaments have many things in common. Both forbid idolatry, murder, fornication, stealing, lying, covetousness and probably many more things. There are many things in which they are not alike. 1) They differ as to law-giver. The OT had a human lawgiver (Moses) while the NT has a divine lawgiver (Christ). 2) The OT had a high priest (but had infinitely while the high priest of the NT, Christ is perfect). 3) The OT was dedicated with animal blood, the NT with the blood of Christ. 4) They differ as to place and time with the blood of Christ. 5) The OT had animal sacrifices in worship, we offer spiritual sacrifices (Heb. 13:15; 1 Pet. 2:5). 6) The testaments differ as to subjects. Those who were under the OT (Luke 24:27). The Jews ONLY were under Mosaic law. All men are under law to Christ (Mt. 28:18-20). 7) The OT required a man to marry his brother's wife if the brother died leaving no offspring. The NT does not.

Members of churches of Christ have a deep and abiding respect for the OT. While it has many good uses, it must not be used as a law by which men are governed today -- we are under Christ's law.

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

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**Health Habits Promoted By Medical Assoc.**

In an effort to help patients prevent many of their personal health problems, the Texas Medical Association (TMA) is promoting six health habits the association says can save lives and money.

A California study showed that people who followed these ideas lived 7.1 years longer than those who did not. One of the authors of the 1973 study said a man at age 55 who follows all the habits can be as healthy as someone 30 years younger who follows less than two.

If these habits can help keep you healthy, then they are going to save you money on medical bills, said Myrtle E. Durham, Jr., M.D., TMA president. Freely giving and saving money are two great reasons to follow these recommendations.

1. Eat three meals a day, including breakfast, at regular times and avoid snacks.
2. Control your weight. Use your head to fight fat. Remember that fat doesn't keep weight off permanently. Diets based on good nutrition and sensible amounts of food have the best chance of success.
3. Exercise moderately. If you have a heart problem, check with your doctor before starting a program.
4. Avoid having more than two alcoholic drinks daily.
5. Get enough sleep. Eight hours nightly is the general rule, but individual requirements vary.
6. Don't smoke.

Health experts are putting more stress on self-help health habits because they are a major part in solving several problems.

As scientists increase the average lifespan by battling traditional killers such as heart disease, an individual's efforts to increase the quality and quantity of life become even more important. Even expensive advances of modern technology cannot save someone if he is determined to drink, himself, or make life miserable by following bad health habits, Dr. Durham said.

Bad habits also are piling up the rising cost of health care. Medical bills and other related expenses of alcoholism will cost more than \$44 billion this year. Another study estimates smoking-related problems will cost more than \$18 billion, including missed work days and other costs. "Cutting these and other expensive health habits could mean a lot more money available for pleasure instead of pain," Dr. Durham said.

As part of the association's efforts to educate the public, doctors statewide are distributing several hundred thousand pamphlets entitled "Your Health Is In Your Hands." The pamphlets include the six health habits and other ideas on saving lives and money. Sergeant Russell L. Davis of the Texas Highway Patrol announced today that during the month of July 1978, in Tyler County, there was 1 Rural Fatal Accident in which 1 person was killed. In addition, the Texas Highway Patrol investigated 25 Rural Motor Vehicle Accidents in which 13 persons were injured.

Through July of this year, there have been 113 Rural Accidents in Tyler County, killing 4 persons and injuring 50 people.

During the same seven-month period in 1977, there were 109 Rural Traffic Accidents, killing and injuring 54 persons.

During the month of July in the 10 Counties comprising District 2B, The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 518 Rural Accidents, killing 14 persons and injuring 281 people.

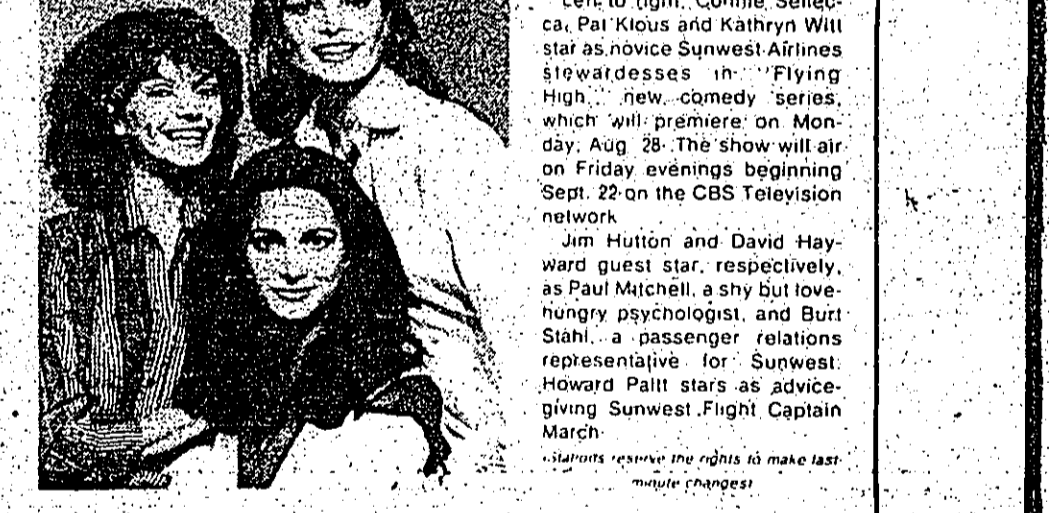

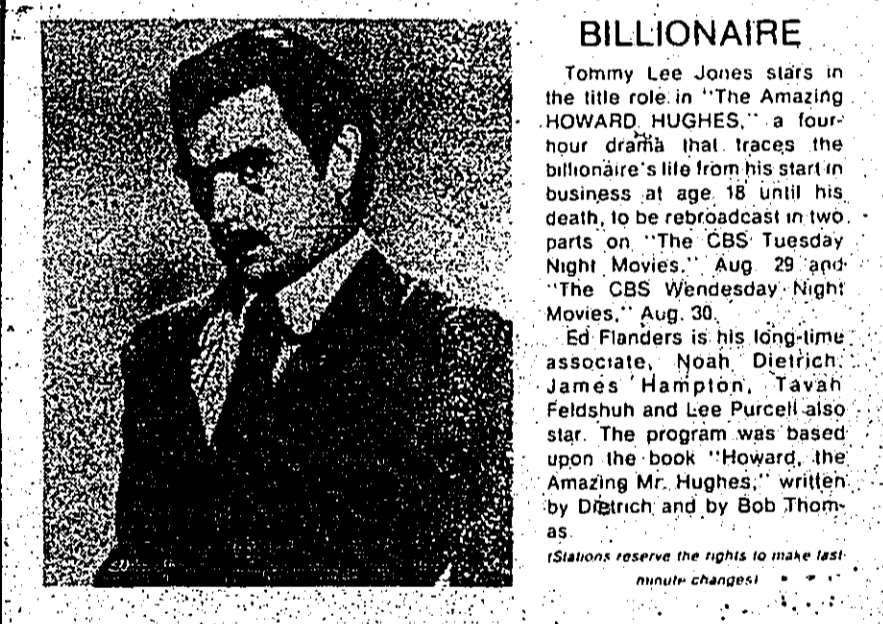

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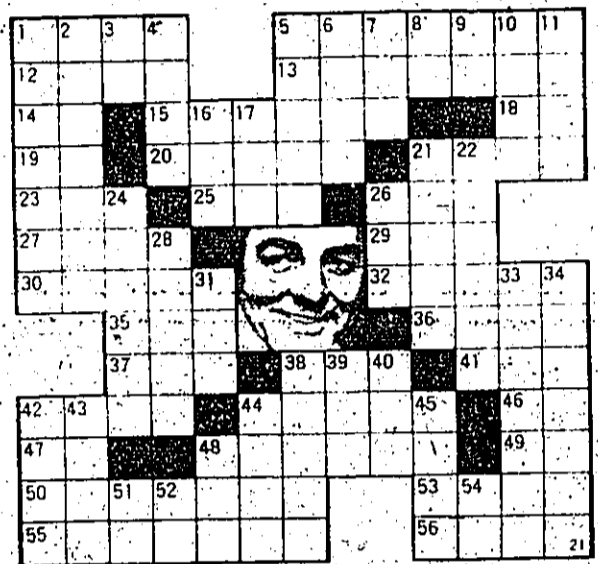

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## Wisconsin Resurrects Native Playwright

Thornton Wilder is best known for his plays "Our Town" and "By the Skin of Our Teeth" and for his novels "The Bridge of San Luis Rey" and "The Eighth Day." The Pulitzer Prize-winning author is read by students and literary buffs across the country.

Unlike the early works of other successful writers, many of Wilder's early plays were never produced. Not that the plays are not intriguing or illuminating. They are. But until WHA Television in Madison, Wisconsin, applied the medium's technology to the plays' production, they were considered unproducible parlor pieces designed for reading rather than stage realization.

Now, however, all that has changed. "Wilder Wilder" is a 30-minute television program scheduled to air Wednesday, Aug. 30, and presenting four brief plays the Wisconsin-born Wilder wrote as a young man. The project, which took over half a year from conception to completion, was the most ambitious ever undertaken at the University of Wisconsin-

Extension. Telecommunications Center, and is being aired nationally by the PBS Network.

Experimental and hallucinatory, each play has a dream-like quality as it explores religious and moral themes, which were a life-long preoccupation for Wilder, and which were further examined in later, more widely known works.

Although the four plays -- each five-and-a-half to seven-and-a-half minutes long -- were written before television existed, they are uniquely suited to the medium.

"We literally spent weeks trying to come up with a way to shoot underwater sequences," Goldman explains. "We even considered building a huge tank and submerging the actors."

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## TV Detente, An International Special

By JOAN GEOGHEGAN

In April of 1977, an international production crew under the direction of Mike Gargiulo set up shop in Leningrad, U.S.S.R., to tape "The Leningrad Ice Show." On Tuesday, Aug. 29, CBS will air this figure-skating special.

Although producer Gargiulo spent only two weeks in Leningrad, his special has taken a full year to reach American audiences. It took six months to get the tapes and four months for other ice shows to air. "It's the first time I had to wait in line after Snoopy," Gargiulo jokes referring to the "Snoopy's Holiday on Ice" special.

Although he had problems getting the special on the air, Gargiulo had few hang-ups with the actual production. Mostly, because he's had plenty of experience with U.S.-U.S.S.R. productions.

Two years ago he followed "The Russian Dance Festival" tour of the U.S. The Soviets asked him, in particular, to tape the tour for television.

Did he have any language problems? "We did everything with little stick figures," he explains.

Then there is the trip Gargiulo took to Moscow in 1958 as part of a cultural exchange program to build a television studio for the Soviets. "I was staff director at NBC. I was sent to show the Russians what was then the new color TV to really break down the iron curtain."

In 20 years, Gargiulo sees no big changes in Russian TV. He says, "The technology has improved, but not the technique. They thought it was horrendous to shoot into the lights to capture children's reactions to performances. They'd argue, 'Why waste time and tape on the audience?' I tried to explain that we try to show

ambience," the overall feel of the event.

Because the ice show was offered to CBS when the three networks were bidding on rights to the 1980 Olympics, Gargiulo bowed to the Soviet stipulation that he use a Soviet technical crew.

"I could have brought a full CBS crew. But this was one-and-one-half years ago, and whoever got Olympics had to use Russian engineers.

"I used a French truck with an American oscilloscope and Russian tape, which is a totally different system." The Soviets, like the Europeans, use 625-line 50-cycle tape, while Americans use 525-line 60-cycle tape. "I had to have it sent to England and transferred from the European to American system. Then, once we got music rights, we were back to back with two other ice shows, Peggy Fleming and Snoopy."

"I was impressed more

with that (the skating) than the actual production," he backtracked. "We had to force them to do one low-key production number with the lights dimmed and a spotlight. For them, lighting techniques don't exist. They have two variations, on and off."

Gargiulo makes the general assessment that "The high point of 'The Leningrad Ice Show' is the skating. The Suite in Blue Ballet" at the end and "the Gladiator number are both very good. There are no big numbers like you see in the Ice Follies or the Ice-Capades. They do group numbers, but their idea of a chorus line reminded me of one in the Yukon."

"Harry Morgan (co-host along with Sally Struthers) is the gag ending to one number. Each evening, two guys dressed as witches reach into the audience and try to pull out a little boy or girl. Well, the witch pulls Harry out. It was hysterical because no one ever goes with the witches."

Was there an overall challenge to working in a foreign country with a foreign crew? "The Russians don't move that quickly," Gargiulo answers. "That's not the way we do it" is a constant answer. They're wrapped up in old traditions."

"Still, he adds, "You get the feeling people are basically alike. The Russians were very warm towards me. We were trying to make them look good in 'The Leningrad Ice Show,' we weren't competing with them."

"I don't expect to go back next year," he concludes. "The show was already shown over there, they didn't have to wait for Snoopy."

"I'd like to have kids see this," he says. "It's a family show."

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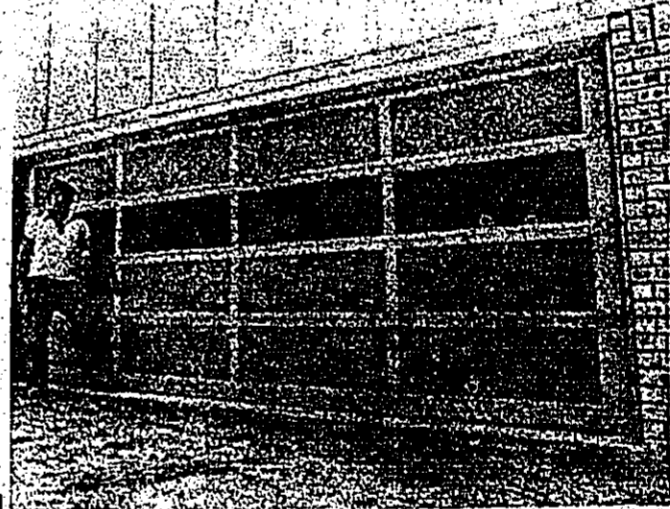
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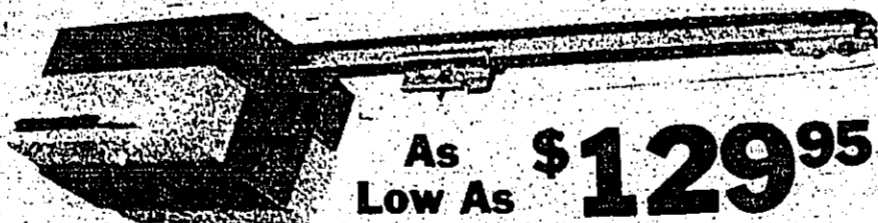
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
