## Krueger Flies In Tuesday

Democratic Senate Nominee Bob Krueger helicoptered into the old football field, adjacent to the Allan Shivers Library, for an informal chat with area residents and was greeted by Becky Jettie's Government class, made up of Seniors.

Krueger noticed that the government class was made up primarily of women and he said, "That's not at all unusual, since so many women are now actively participating in governmental affairs. He cited Barbara Jordan as an example.

Krueger allowed the students to question him for a short time before flying off to Jasper, then on to address a senior class at Newton later in the day. ## Council Gets 133 Name Petition

The Woodville City Council Monday hosted the largest citizen group appearing before that governmental body, in several years, hearing an appeal, backed up by a 133-name petition, asking that the council not endorse plans of Friedman/Hudson developers, who are speculating with property adjacent to the landowners in the Timberland Addition, who were present at the meeting.

In other action, the council accepted for consideration an offer from Harry Stafford in behalf of Josiah Wheat and Lloyd Fortenberry, who are offering some 26 acres adjoining Turkey creek for a city park in the southwest quadrant of Woodville in exchange for street, bridge, lights, water and sewer services, which would enhance "The Center", a 100,000 square foot shopping center facility plans of which are currently being developed by the group.

In other business, the council agreed to pay \$250 of "front money" expenses to help Woodville Air Show Chairman Bud Byram put on the "Second Annual Woodville Air-O-Rama Air Show" on Saturday, Oct. 14 at 2 p.m. Byram explained to the council the attractions which have been invited, stating that "This years show ought to be the best yet."

We need your moral and financial support," Byram said, "to create a perpetual annual show which will bring people into our area."

In other action, the council approved an ordinance on mandatory connection to the city's sanitary sewer system.

Authorized an ordinance on sales tax which allows the Woodville City to keep in force the one percent sales tax.

Created an ordinance allowing that "No Parking" signs be placed on North Reid Street following the logging of several complaints from residents in the area; and

Discussed briefly Cable TV commitment and contracts with the city, concerning specific failure to hook-up several city residents and a need to secure weather station information.

# Gilliam Trial Verdict Near

Testimony in the David Wayne Gilliam murder trial, ended in Kountze at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday, with the state presenting a total of 26 witnesses in an attempt to prove that the suspect killed Neva Bates Salmon, by slashing her throat on March 29, 1977, in Woodville.

Court appointed Defense Attorney James A. Clark ended his defense of Gilliam

by calling only two witnesses Tuesday. And, in a surprise move, Clark read a statement given by Gilliam (which was edited-blocked out for jury consideration) which suggested that he (Gilliam) had been enticed into going into the Salmon apartment on a consent-to-sex premise. He said she went from apartment 2-A in the Fortenberry Apartments to apartment 1-A and

asked him to come back with her. The statement says further, that he was then reportedly told by the victim, that police would be called if certain oral sex acts weren't performed. The statement ends, "I then pulled out my knife."

District attorney officials indicated they don't believe the statement issued by Gilliam, or they would have

introduced it into evidence earlier.

Judge Clyde Earl Smith of the 88th Judicial District Court, was scheduled to instruct the jury and charge them, at 8:30 a.m. Wednesday Sept. 13, with questions which are expected to call for charges of capital murder, murder or voluntary manslaughter.

He's not hard to identify," she said.

Above Attorney Clark's repeated objections, Mrs. Kirk further testified that Gilliam and his brother, Dennis Lee, came into the laundromat while she was reading a paper and put a knife up to her throat and told her to get face down in the backseat of their car. Mrs. Kirk testified that after driving several miles out-of-town, the younger Gilliam held the knife, while the other committed the alleged offense.

Attorney Clark moved for a mistrial in the case, stating that repeated use of the word "rape," by the witness, was a "legal conclusion."

Judge Smith overruled Clark's repeated objections. Clark claimed that Mrs. Kirk's testimony was "extraneous" and that it may have occurred "at another place and at another time." Clark contended that the testimony contravenes the general rule in all jurisdictions.

Mrs. Kirk reported that she was then taken back to the laundromat. She then reported the incident to local police.

Following the trial the lady said that very shortly thereafter, she recognized the two brothers, gar in Paintsville and used her own vehicle to block its movement from in front of a food store, then reportedly alerted police saying, "If you want them they're here."

The two brothers were subsequently arrested by

Paintsville Police Chief Ross Spears.

Shortly after their arrest in Kentucky, the two escaped from jail on March 13, by bending the cell bars and crawling out the window. Subsequent to that escape, David Wayne Gilliam has been arrested by Woodville Police and Dennis Lee Gilliam was arrested by Escandido, California authorities, for a charge involving the use of a knife.

Dennis Gilliam has since been extradited back to Kentucky and will face charges, along with brother David Wayne of rape, kidnap and felony escape.

Following her testimony, Mrs. Kirk said, "I hope he gets what he deserves."

Attorney Clark attacked and challenged the method of obtaining the written and oral statement issued by Gilliam asking officers if they had threatened the suspect during the questioning.

Clark challenged Woodville Police Chief Gary Mattingly also, on the advisability of circumventing the Tyler County Sheriff, before going to Kountze with the suspect.

Mattingly testified that under the authority of District Attorney George Kirkpatrick and Woodville Mayor Terry Watts, "I was instructed to bring the suspect directly to Kountze." He said that this was done because of numerous escapes which had occurred at the Tyler County jail. He said further that he felt it was safer for the community of Woodville.

EDITORS NOTE: Penalties resulting from an indictment of Capital Murder are death by injection of sodium pentothol, or, life imprisonment in the Texas Department of Corrections. Felony First Degree Murder, a penalty of not more than 99 years and not less than 5 years; and, Voluntary Manslaughter, a second degree offense not more than 20 years and not less than 2, both with a fine not to exceed \$10,000.

Judge Smith told the court that he expected to hear lengthy arguments as to the wording of the questions as submitted to the jury before they deliberate.

Clark placed two witnesses on the stand Tuesday, Karl Ashworth, the father of David Ashworth, who resided in an adjoining apartment to where the offense was committed and Wayne Allen Blanchette, both of Starks, La., and both of whom were present when Gilliam was arrested less than 24 hours after the crime had been reported in Woodville.

According to testimony throughout the trial, Gilliam had been seen wearing the same clothes in Woodville and also in Starks, La. He was reported to have been wearing a black T-shirt with a skeleton on the back, blue jeans and black ankle high boots.

The last witness for the state was Mary Ethel (Vance) Kirk, of Swamp Branch, Ky., who testified that she was raped by Gilliam after being abducted Feb. 15, 1977, from a Paintsville, Ky. laundromat strip-mining road near a cemetery and assaulted.

The witness, when asked if the person who committed that offense was in the courtroom, quickly identified Gilliam.

## Air Control Testing On

An experiment in air control is being conducted in Tyler County by the Texas Forestry Service in conjunction with Air Quality Control Board, according to Lou Sloat, area educator for the information and education department.

The project involves 40 acres of land off the Magnolia Park road near Dam B. 20 acres are being burned in the standard, window fashion, while the other 20 are being cleared using an air curtain destructor.

The air curtain destructor is a machine that forces air in a particular direction across a fire pit in which debris is

burned at a faster level than in a window. A giant fan sends air across the pit and air is forced under the debris and back up. (See photos on page 1-B). Sloat said that, hopefully, by burning debris faster, the destructor will help eliminate pollution. He said that the TFS has five goals in doing the experiment.

They want to see if the method is economically feasible; they want to find out if it eliminates pollution; they need to know if particular matter is emitted into the atmosphere; will the mechanics of the project create an additional hazard to the soil; and will it create additional labor problems or will it

increase time on the job. The project was started about two weeks ago and is scheduled to finish any day. Sloat said that it will be a month to six weeks before the results are in. When they are in, they will be turned over to the Air Quality Control Board, he said.

Tyler County was chosen for the project because of its sandy to sandy loam soil, which represents a majority of the soil for pine in Texas. "It is a typical pine site," Sloat said. He added that the project is part of a continuing search for new ways to prepare land for planting pine trees. (See Photos On Page 1-B)

## TFA Says 'No' Wilderness

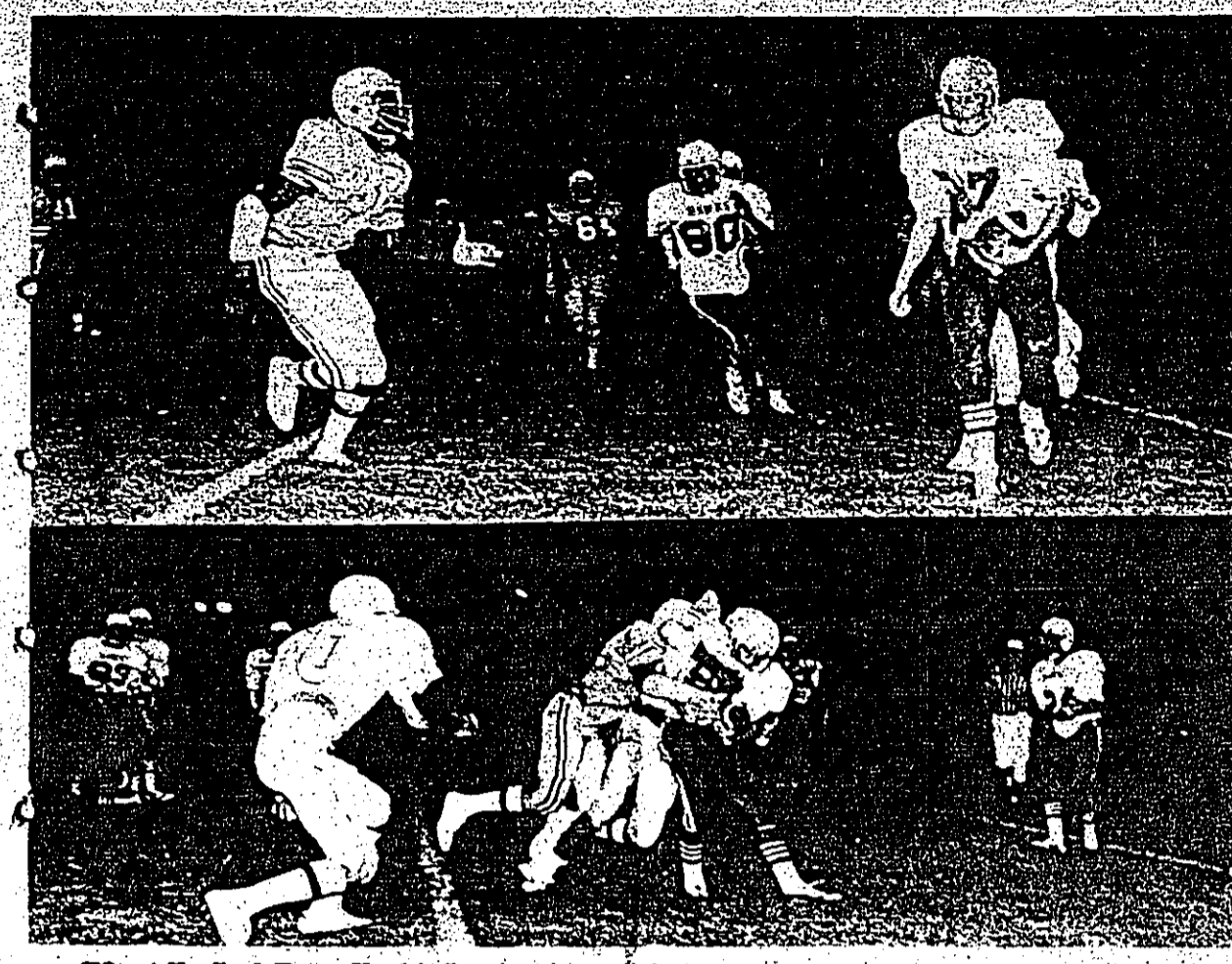

# Nutrition Has Influence On Education Performance

Every time a child reports a grade in school cost approximately \$700. Many nutritionists are convinced that nutrition can have an influence on the education performance of children. The Iowa Breakfast Studies found that elementary school students without breakfast were careless and inattentive during the late morning hours. When they did have breakfast, the same students showed recognizable improvement, especially in scholastic achievement.

A United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) study estimated that more than \$12 billion could be saved annually in health care costs if Americans would improve their diets. Another researcher estimated that between \$8 to 18 billion an edu-

ATIONAL COSTS could also be saved. The school breakfast program was initiated in limited areas to provide students from poorer homes with a meal before they started school. Educational studies found that well fed students were able to grasp those very essential skills of reading, writing and math. These important lessons were often taught during the morning hours, when students are supposedly bright and alert.

School administrators and teachers soon realized that all students needed to have the opportunity of eating breakfast. Daily Council, Inc. nutritionists say that it is important for children as well as adults to have a balanced meal to start the day. Using the four-

The Long Leaf Soil Conservation District will pay for the first bale entered from each producer. Additional entries will be \$3.00 per sample. The purpose of a hay show is to encourage efficient, economical, and profitable production of high quality forage. Considering the rising cost of producing and harvesting hay, high quality hay has never been more important. All phases of pasture management are important and can be discussed with our judge and guest speaker, Dr. Kenneth Smith, Area Agronomist, Agricultural Extension Service from Overton.

# Daycaring

"We try to teach them what their mothers would teach them if they were at home" is the operating philosophy behind the First Baptist Church Day Care Center which opens its 10th Anniversary on Sept. 15.

The Day Care Center which was formed in 1968, started with a class of 16 kids and has grown and been licensed by the state to allow 75 children to enroll.

Since its inception, the Day Care Center has accommodated over 500 children. According to Mrs. Riley, director of the facility, "We let the children know that we love them," she added. "We hope that what we do will make them better leaders."

Mrs. Riley says she is thankful that the First Baptist Church has seen fit to give the financial support it has to the school. "We wouldn't be here today if it wasn't for the group that oversees the operation of the center. They have continued to fund us to a point where we can't have to charge high rates to provide the kind of care that we do."

State regulations have forced the Center to spend money on regulatory aspects of the facility and "although some of the standards are good, in some cases the requirements are unfounded," Mrs. Riley said.

But, despite continued and expanding state regulations, which appear to nip the growth of this Day Care facility and others around the state like it, Dr. Raymond Parker says that the main problem is that "We need more concerned parents."

Dr. Parker said "The Day Care Center can't substitute for parents, but sometimes we have to try to jump into the gap."

According to the Pastor of the church, "Mrs. Riley believes very strongly in what she's doing. To her it's the most important thing she does, and she's willing to work day and night. She loves children," he added.

Mrs. Riley said that the Center concentrates on the basics of a child's growing up, like teaching them to tie shoes, fold sheets and to dress themselves.

"Our kids are more adjusted and will sit still when they start 'regular school' she said."

# Rough Rider Roster: 1898

The sinking of the battleship "Maine" in Havana harbor in February 1898 brought the mobilization of the United States army in preparation for the Spanish-American War. Some adventurously inclined civilians, who could find no place among the troops of the regular army, joined the action by enlisting in such volunteer regiments as the 1st U.S. Volunteer Cavalry, popularly known as the "Rough Riders."

Led by Col. Leonard Wood and Lt. Col. Theodore Roosevelt, the Rough Riders assembled for training in San Antonio early in May, camping and drilling on the International Fair Grounds just south of the city. Their Quartermaster was Tom Hall, a young West Point graduate and author who, like many of the others, had tried in vain to join the regular army. In his memoir, "The Fun and Fighting of the Rough Riders," published in 1899, Hall described the motley composition of the "hastily assembled regiment."

"The make-up of the regiment was one of its most interesting features. Was there ever before such a personage in the ranks of a military organization? We could have made up a child's game to fill all the buttons a French dressmaker could sew on a gown.

"Rich man, poor man; Indian chief, Doctor, lawyer, not one thief, Merchant, sheriff, artist, clerk, Minister, ocean gondolier, Broker, banker, engineer, Cowboy, copper, actor, miner, champion amateur sports to boot."

"And all of them could tie and shoot. I can only say that longed considerably. The matter interested me greatly. I found every profession represented but one. As I sat down at the day-goods box dinner table one day, I mentioned the fact, and wondered suddenly if there was an actor in the regiment. I was promptly informed of three. We had one newspaper correspondent in the ranks. He corresponded for a newspaper just once. He was their 'latter-day' by Colonel Wood and concluded to write no more during his stay in the regiment."

"This bizarre make-up of the regiment gave me some queer experiences. I is some of the work was all done willingly and cheerfully. No one can measure the self-abnegation (denial) of such men."

"The regiment was a company of a shoe to the building of a railroad you had but to raise your voice and ask for a man to do it. An expert would appear. We even had a naval officer in the person of one of our sergeants and a West Point cadet. Short-hand writers, telegraph operators, electricians, and type-writers were in abundance. Two of our captains were editors of newspapers, and I had to accept many manuscripts from them. For a short time we even had one opium fiend. We soon got rid of him."

"The number of men who wanted to join the regiment was simply amazing. The grand total numbered about ten thousand. One man celebrated for his daring and ability as a frontiersman, formed an entire company of picked men, Terzan I think, and came to camp by volunteer for himself and his band of willing fighters. He was a man of such spirit that the thought never occurred to him that the regiment was full of our caps, were editors, and I had to accept many manuscripts from them. For a short time we even had one opium fiend. We soon got rid of him."

"The Rough Riders left for embarkation at Tampa, Fla., at the end of May, only about three weeks after the arrival in San Antonio of the first contingent. Through an administrative mistake, about half of the regiment was detained in the United States. The portion of the group which went to Cuba, however, fought so effectively and so bravely that their name became a legend, and has remained a byword for daring and gallantry."

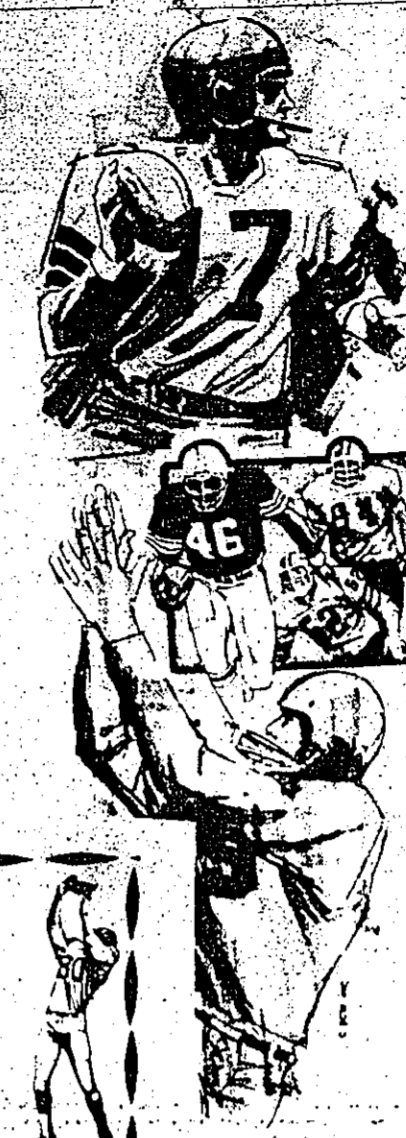

## Geriatrics Creating Medicine Problems

PHILADELPHIA—The increasing geriatric population (age 65 or older) is creating new problems for medicine. Some European countries, like Sweden and England for example, have excellent geriatric services. Recreational programs and meals that are delivered right to the home, are only two of the services made available in England for the growing population over 65.

In the United States, more than 10% of the total population is comprised of people 65 or older. If the present birth rate decline continues unchanged, the percentage could double to 20% by the year 2025.

Misconceptions about old age have blown out of proportion the real problem, chronic disease.

A New England study cited in the editorial showed that the aged who constituted 14.4% of the population, accounted for about 20% of all hospitalizations and incurred a third of all hospital charges for chronic diseases. The diseases do not wait until the person reaches 65, but start early in life and increase in prevalence with age. Hospitalizations, with many expensive bills, are part of the lives of the geriatric population. According to a federal government study cited in the editorial, the per capita cost for personal health care in 1975 was \$374 for persons under 65, and \$1,360 for those over 65.

Dr. Peterson notes that very few geriatric services compared to Britain or other European countries. Professor John Williamson, a visiting professor from the University of Edinburgh, told a recent Philadelphia conference that the home help services seemed to be a very effective alternative to institutionalization of the aged. Home help services in the United States are in short supply.

## Baker Unveils Crime Proposals

AUSTIN—Attorney General Jim Baker today unveiled his proposals to fight crime in Texas, reorganizing the parole program covering five major areas.

Calling crime "one of the biggest challenges we face today," Baker focused on stopping drug traffic, toughening the sentencing process, restructuring the parole system, a program for juvenile offenders, and one for career criminals.

These are all serious problems," said Baker, "and I am offering specific, constructive proposals to solve them. Two, often in campaigns, serious policy debate is, subordinated to political gimmickry and rhetoric. I hope my proposals show I am concerned about crime, more over that I have the ideas and the experience to translate my ideas into action."

In the first area Baker addressed, narcotics traffic, he stated that two-thirds of the heroin entering the United States comes through Texas. Baker urged a redirection of D.P.S. resources to an all-out fight against drugs, noting that state police currently must, many times, weigh trucks that they do fighting drugs. This redirection would be coupled with a major effort by the Attorney General's Organized Crime Division to provide legal assistance to local prosecutors.

Secondly, Baker proposed the adoption of Fixed Length Sentencing, which would inject certainty and uniformity into the sentencing process. "Currently, there is too much disparity and leniency for the criminal justice system to serve as a deterrent," explained Baker. "Too many criminals slip through the cracks."

Thirdly, Baker suggested a restructuring of the parole program covering five major areas.

"Most criminals can be eligible for parole after serving only one-sixth of their time - yet seventy percent of those parolees commit another crime within four years. I want to institute minimum standards so more criminals will serve out the time they were sentenced to. I would also create a category of 'life imprisonment' without possibility of parole for the most heinous offenses."

Fourth, Baker looked at juvenile crime. 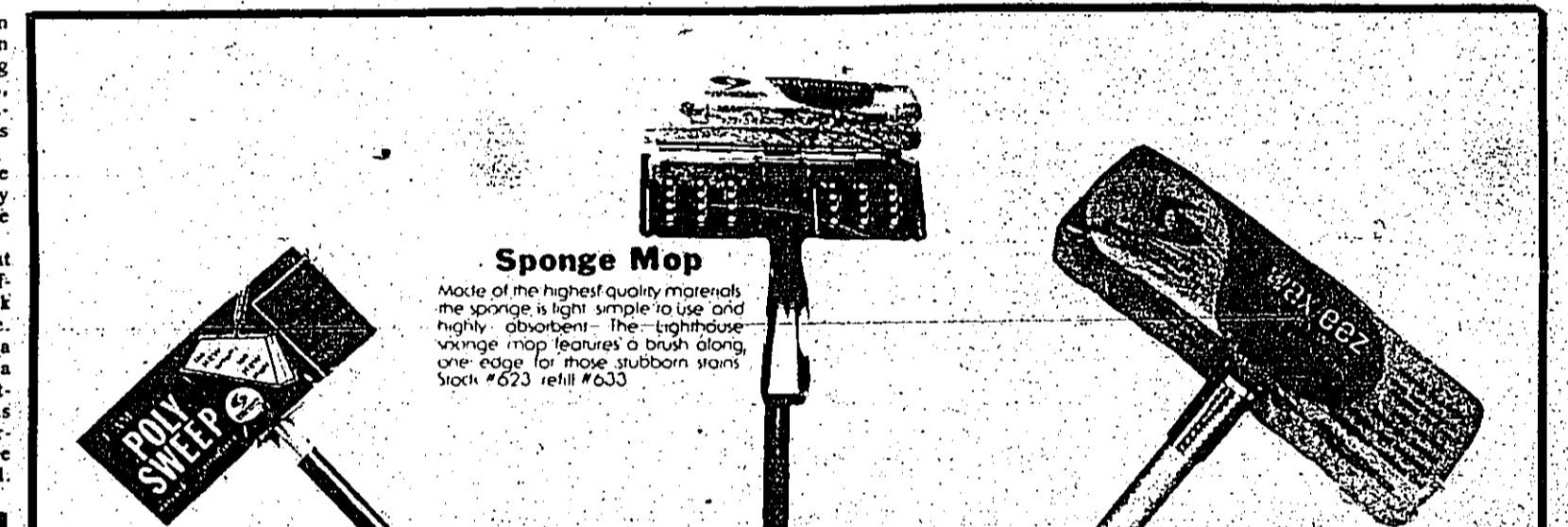

## Pregnant Women Shouldn't Drink

**COLLEGE STATION**-Pregnant women who drink alcohol may threaten their unborn baby with malformation or mental deficiency, a health education specialist warns.

Three ounces of alcohol or more per day is a definite risk, says Carla Shearer. Ms. Shearer is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"Drinking only one to three ounces of alcohol per day also can be risky, and pregnant women should approach even these amounts with caution," she adds, quoting information from the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism.

Researchers say that of the total newborns in the United States, thousands are malformed and mentally defective because their mothers drank too much alcohol during pregnancy, Ms. Shearer adds.

Due to evidence that alcohol consumption by pregnant women can cause—in some cases—birth defects in children, the Food and Drug Administration is now considering new regulations that would warn consumers of this danger.

Labels of caution would appear on certain oral drugs and foods that contain alcohol, according to the proposed regulations.

Alcoholic beverages might also carry such labels, Ms. Shearer says.

Just "how much" alcohol is "how dangerous"—and "when" during pregnancy—are still areas of uncertainty, but researchers are still looking for the answers, the specialist says.

"However, until we know the answers, extreme caution with alcohol consumption is best," she urges.

Explaining how alcohol damages an unborn baby, Ms. Shearer says that when a pregnant woman drinks, the alcohol goes through her bloodstream and that of the unborn—in the same concentration.

"In other words, if the mother is drunk, so is the baby," she stresses.

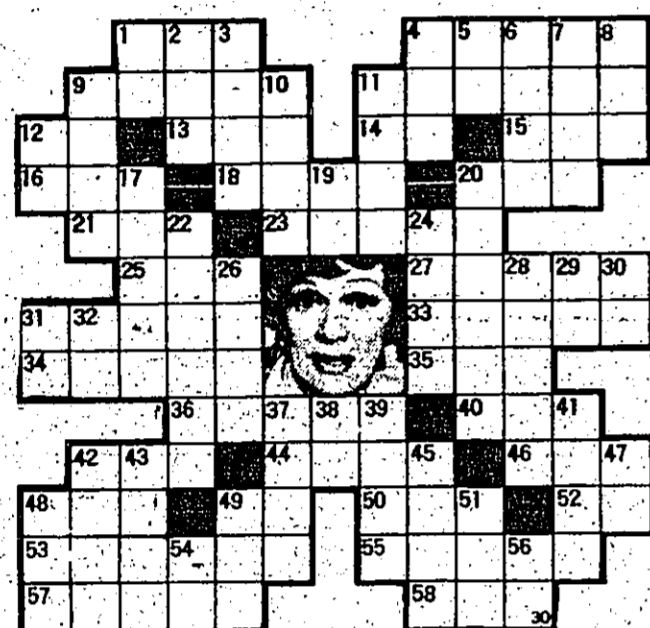

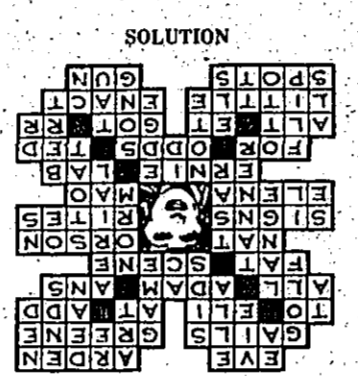

When Steve walked into the ABC offices in New York, he looked quite different from the sweatpogs he has newly joined: his red and white man-tailored shirt was neatly pressed and tucked into clean straight blue jeans, his tan cowboy boots were shiny and unscuffed. There were even a few freckles visible across his face. The new sweathog seems as clean-cut and guileless as the boy-next-door back home.  
 Except, for one thing, Steve is no "boy." "I'm 25," Steve says casually. Then his face breaks into a smile and his brown eyes look away. "Well," he says laughing, "I'm somewhere between 20 and 30."  
 Probably closer to 30. Steve has a son, Scott, and a wife, Cathy, of two and a

half years. They had been living in Connecticut while Steve commuted to New York to do commercials - Jovan, Earthborn, Crisco - professionally for print fashion lay-outs.  
 Steve did not always plan to act. He was an avid athlete, winning a sports scholarship for water-polo, and he was even a semi-professional artist for a while, having sold about 10 paintings. "Some abstracts, but mostly impressionists."  
 Despite the water polo and the painting, Steve said he has always loved to act. "I did a play in junior high school" and has studied acting along the way, in Los Angeles with Vincent Chase and in New York with Jack Walters. The acting route has not always been easy, though.  
 "In three years, I've had about 10-12 calls. From those, I only got three screen tests and two jobs."  
 The first job was an obscure movie called "Fraternity Row," which was released by Paramount about three years ago. The second job, the one he hopes will catapult him to fame, is the role of the new kid in town on "Welcome Back, Kotter."  
 With little acting experience behind him, why was he chosen for a major role on such a popular show? For one thing, the screen test. "I just had a ball with it," said Steve, lighting a Marlboro light. "I took it as a joke. It was that kind of attitude I read with and they liked it." And his appearance? "Looks play quite a bit. It probably had a lot to do with my physical make-up. But you have to be able to cut it when it comes time to act."  
 When it came time to act, Steve found situation-comedy "one of the hardest things." But he found that honesty with the cast, telling them at the outset - "I'm scared to death" - was the best thing.

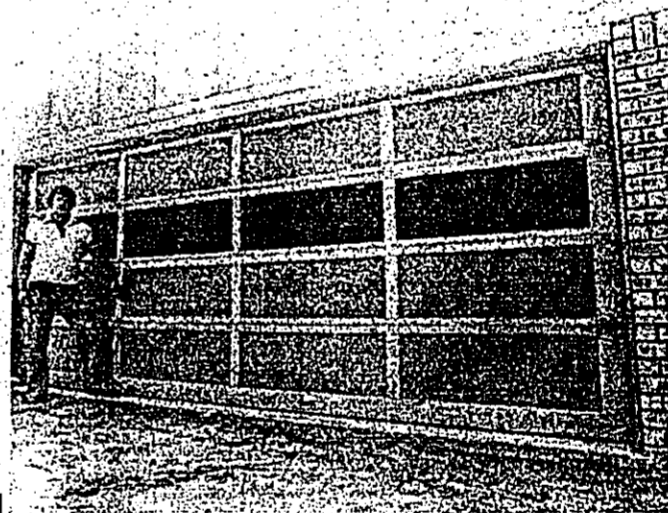
