## Commissioner-elect Offers Views

Precinct Four Commissioner-elect Adnel Odum says he's been working closely with Commissioner "Bo" Jordan who will turn over the reins of the Precinct Four commissioners' job December 31.

## Service League Meets

Woodville School Service League met Monday, Sept. 18, at the Woodville Elementary Library for the first general meeting of the 1978-79 school year. Featured was the expanded motor development program begun by the Woodville School District this year. Reading Supervisor, Mary Nette Rainey, and Elementary Physical Education Instructor, Dee Watt, explained the close correlation between the development of physical coordination in both gross and fine motor skills and success in the classroom. Approximately 20 second, third, and fourth grade students demonstrated their skills for the '70 or so

parents and teachers present. Judy Watts, chairman of the physical plant committee for the School Service League, explained the role volunteers have played in financing and constructing the obstacle course for the district.

In the regular business meeting that followed Beth Allison reported that the membership drive last week was quite successful with 250 parents joining the roles of the organization. Sylvester's 7th Grade class recorded the largest number of new members signed up with a record 22. Other classes that will be awarded a party for signing up the most members in their

grade level are as follows: Kindergarten-Mrs. Holland's with 6; 1st grade-Mrs. Tucker with 11; 2nd grade-Mrs. Minyard with 15; 3rd grade-Mrs. Watts and Mrs. Spurlock, each with 40% of their class membership and 10 members; 4th grade-Mrs. Williford with 18; 5th grade-Mrs. Spurlock with 11; 6th grade-Mrs. Spurlock with 12; 8th grade-Mrs. Clemons with 19.

Jo Ella Knapp, coordinator of the teacher assistant committee, reported that 20 parents assisted primary teachers the first school day in greeting students. Also that playdough was made for the kindergarten program.

Myrtle Martindale, co-chairman of the cultural enrichment committee, announced that plans are underway for the annual field trips taken by grades 1-8, and that Homemaking Classes under Mrs. Linda Jones will prepare the lunches for the students on the trips this year.

Marsha Risinger, fundraising chairman, discussed plans to participate in the school-wide carnival and also the possibility of a raffle being the major fund raiser held later in the year.

Teachers requesting funding for materials were asked to submit their wishes in writing at each general meeting. Thirty-one teachers from the Elementary School and their principal, Mr. L.C. # 'Curb Drugs With Dogs'

The drug problem in Tyler County is increasing every day, says Deputy Butch Kraus, and he and other law enforcement officials are looking for ways to curb the problem. One such answer is the use of a narcotics dog, which would be used to sniff out drugs in homes, schools and vehicles.

The dog would cost about \$3,500 though, and until funds can be raised, the county is without the protection such an animal can provide. Kraus says that he

is hopeful the money can be raised and the dog purchased before the first of the year, if not sooner.

He said that the animal would be kept at the jail facilities or with a deputy. He would be used to assist on search warrants, to search schools for drugs and in searching vehicles. "A dog can really save time in searches. They are a good thing to have," he said.

The dogs are usually Labrador Retrievers and are

gentle, he said. "They are not harmful at all, they have a gentle nature." He added that the dogs are guaranteed for one year.

Contributions can be made by contacting any member of the Sheriff's Department or Judge Billie Broom. Contributions can be given at Whitworth Grocery in Chester or to Ken Freeman at Freeman Concrete in Colmesneil.

Kraus added that anyone wishing to be fundraiser may also contact him.

## Officer Finds Home

Most people spend the week before their wedding in nervous anticipation of the big event. It's often white knuckle time. Mike Wolfe, though, was finding a job for himself and a home for his wife-to-be.

The Houston native heard about an opening for a probation officer in Woodville two days before his wedding on Sept. 2. Nine days later, Wolfe started work as the probation officer for misdemeanors and juveniles, in Tyler County.

He and his wife Kappy have found Woodville to be receptive. "The people have been very nice to us. It's nice here because you can get to know people better."

"A couple of days after we got married my wife suggested we drive to Woodville to see it. We fell in love with it, and the next day I got the job. We even found a house the same day, which was a real stroke of luck."

Although new to the area, Wolfe is not new to probation cases, having worked last year with the Harris County Adult Probation, after graduating from Sam Houston State University with a Bachelor of Science in Criminology and Corrections.

He left the Harris County program though, and went to work in retail sales, because he was dissatisfied with the work. "It disenchanted me, the work was mostly paper shuffling. I wanted to work in a rural county and when I got this chance I took it. The work is more fun and a lot more rewarding."

Wolfe says his work load is a workable size, about 35 juveniles and 90 adults, 80 percent of the adult misdemeanors are Driving While Intoxicated cases. The juveniles are usually truancy, runaways and drug cases, he says.

He must meet those on probation according to the schedule the court sets up for each offender. Some are monthly, some weekly. He

## Ideas Asked

The Deep East Texas Council of Governments has been verbally notified of the continuation of the Title VI program under CETA. With this in mind, we are again soliciting proposals for special projects.

These special projects must include new activities with specific objectives that can be accomplished by one or more persons within one year duration. CETA funds will be used to pay participants; however, supplies and equipment must be furnished by your agency. Supervisory positions may be requested, but that person must also meet the Title VI eligibility criteria. We have been instructed to give special attention to short-term contracts

that produce identifiable and viable results.

Some examples of special projects include: (1) restoration of a building, (2) improving a playground or equipment, (3) recreational program, (4) special education services, (5) beautification, and (6) health services.

Project applications will be reviewed and approved by the Manpower Advisory Council and should be submitted by October 20, 1978. 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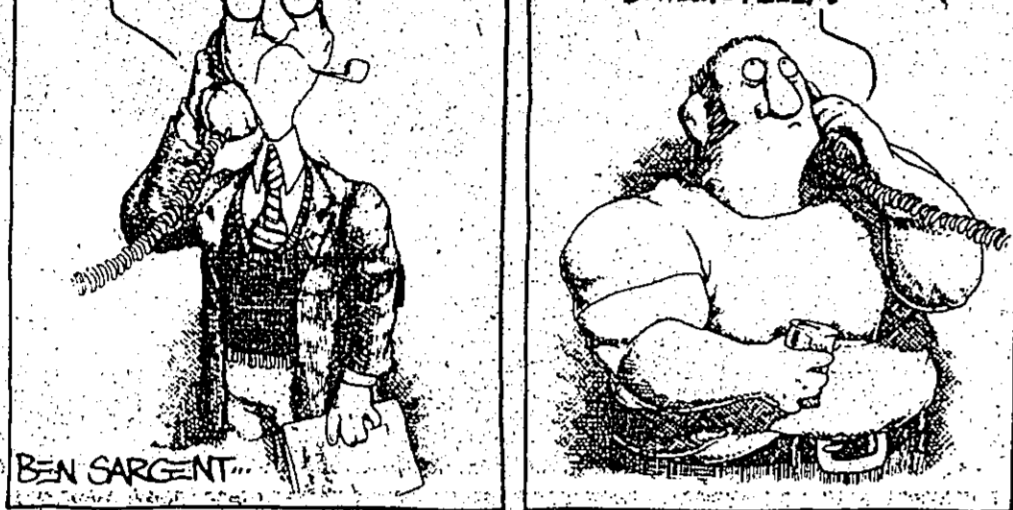

A Government That Works By DAVID COHEN

Immediately after Labor Day, the House will face its first key test on whether it has learned any lessons from California's Proposition 13 vote.

The Carter Administration's legislation builds on the concept that citizens will receive effective government service only if it is impartially administered.

Government employees' unions and veterans' groups are working overseas in the halls of Congress to maintain the present inflexible civil service.

The Hatch Act is an essential protection against partisan political interferences with the civil service. In a system based on performance, it becomes extraordinarily important to protect civil servants against such political interferences.

The choice for the House is: will it be responsible in remedying many of the problems facing our civil service system and show that it is paying attention to voter dissatisfaction with government performance, or will it continue to cave in to the intense pressures from veterans' groups and government employees' unions who have a stake in a status quo that results in poor government performance?

City governments which will repeal the one per cent city sales tax, residential gas and electric bills October 1 will be given early notification to notify the state comptroller.

Comptroller Bob Bullock said it is absolutely essential that information be given to citizens immediately.

October 1 is the earliest date for repeal of the local use of a new law passed in special session last month.

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David Cohen is President of Common Cause, non-partisan citizens' lobby.

Those who enter the Service would be eligible for bonuses for superior performance and would be removed for poor performance.

An independent counsel would be authorized to investigate allegations of improper reprisals against those who blow the whistle on wrongdoing within the government.

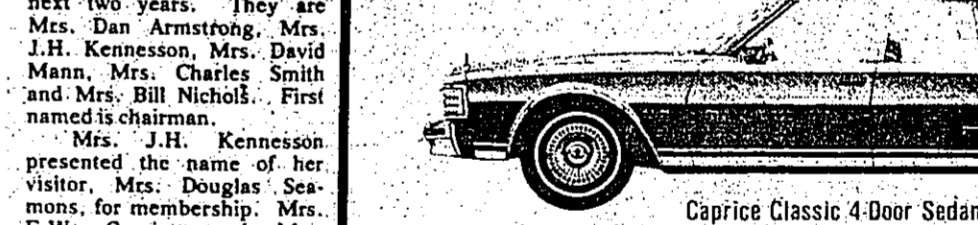

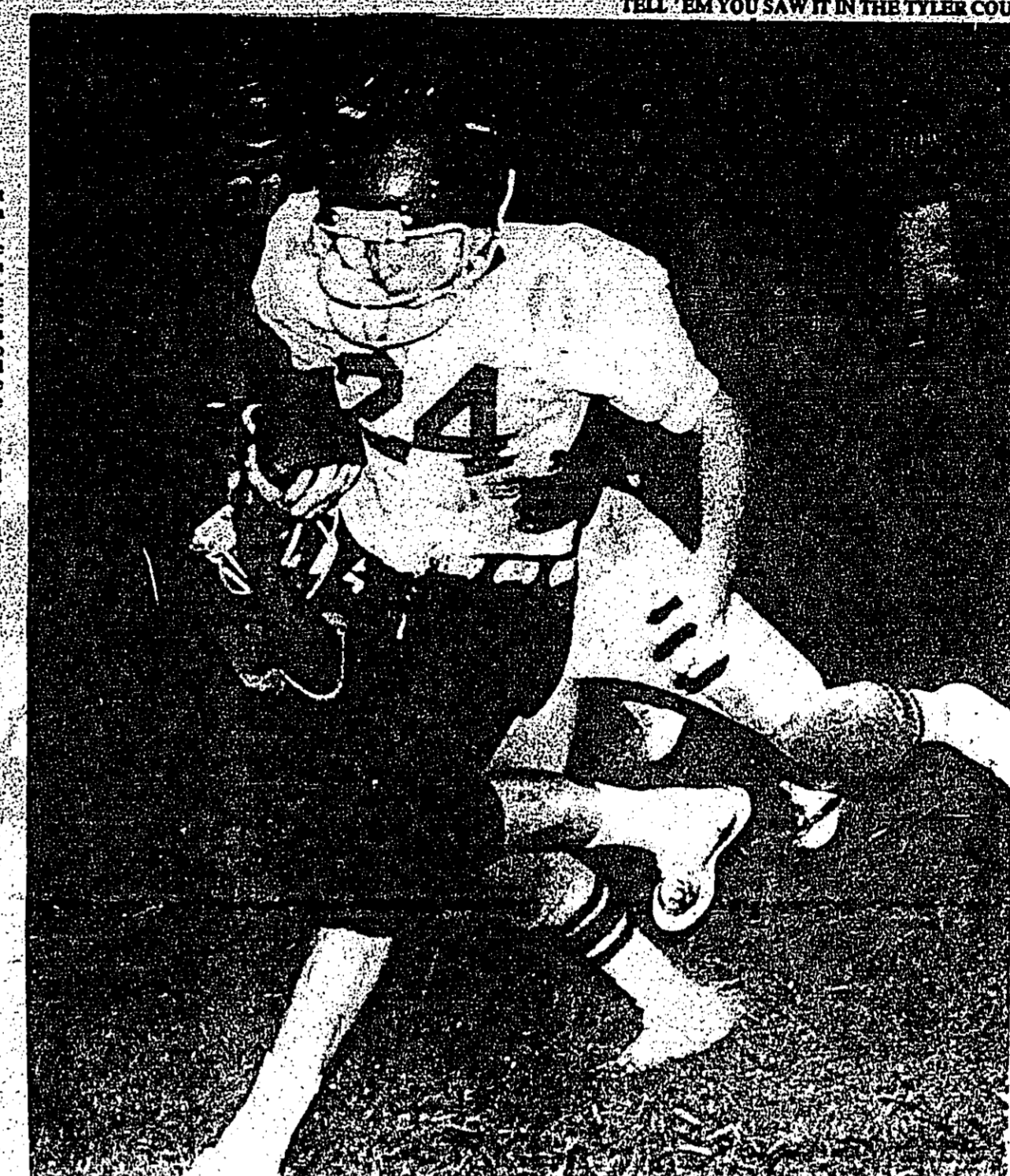

Once again, during this fall and winter season, Americans will take to the open country to enjoy the ancient sport of hunting. Most of these hunters are sportsmen in the truest sense of the word. Unfortunately, many others are inexperienced and reckless with deadly weapons.

The true sportsman gladly teaches the younger generation the responsibilities of gun ownership. He cooperates with all wildlife and law enforcement agencies. He respects the rights of property owners. And, most importantly, he is far less likely to become just another statistic by the end of the hunting season.

The statistics are discouraging according to the National Safety Council. More than 1,000 persons are killed in the field every year. Many of these accidents could have been prevented had hunters followed the 10 Rules of Gun Safety. The true sportsman follows them religiously, they are:

1. Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun.
2. Guns carried into camp or home, or when otherwise not in use, must always be unloaded.
3. Unattended guns should always be unloaded.
4. Always be sure barrel is pointed in a safe direction.
5. Never carry your gun in a car trunk or in the direction of the muzzle, even if you are not in the car.
6. Never point a gun at anyone until you are ready to shoot.
7. Wear a safe color. The best color daylight fluorescent orange.
8. Never climb a tree or fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun.
9. Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or at the surface of water.
10. Avoid alcoholic drinks before or during shooting.

**BARREL RACE** - Horse and rider are both intent on the job at hand - turning the barrel in a spray of dirt tipping over the obstacle. Girls Rodeo Association rules add a five-second (5) penalty for knocking down a barrel. Rodeo contest for cowgirls is run around a three-barrel course. The three complete turns around the barrels make a cloverleaf pattern. Fastest time is the winner! The starting and finish line and position for the barrels are marked permanently for entire rodeo, with contestants allowed a running start. Time begins as soon as horses nose reaches the starting line and stops when horses nose reaches the finish line. Starting and finish line is the same.

**BULL OR STEER RIDING** - Contestant rides bull or steer with loose rope or rigging, and may hold either with one or two hands. Rider must indicate which before leaving the chute. In the event of two hands, if one comes loose, rider is disqualified. Rider mounts animal in chute, and chute gate is opened. Time starts when animal makes initial jump out of the chute. Contestant must ride for six (6) seconds, for judge to consider it completed ride. Rider and animal are both marked.

**TEAM ROPING** - Two riders on horseback chase running steer. One rider ropes the head (header) and the second rider then ropes the heels (heeler). Each rider dangles rope (wraps it around saddle horn). Riders then face steer with ropes tight and time is signaled. Good time is 8 seconds.

**STEER UNDECORATING** - Ribbon is taped to middle of steer's back. Steer leaves chute followed by contestant on horseback and an assistant on another horse on the opposite side called the hazer. Hazer's duty is to keep steer running straight. Contestant must reach down, remove ribbon from steer's back and raise hand into the air signaling time. Ribbon can be removed from either side of steer.

**GOAT TYING** - Goat is tied to take with rope at least 10 feet long, allowing goat to maneuver. Contestant rides up on horse back (usually distance of 50 yards), dismounts, catches goat and throws it to the ground. Three legs (two front, one back, or two back and one front) must be tied with plugging string. Contestant steps back, time is signaled. Judge waits additional five seconds to make sure goat does not get free. Good time is 10 to 12 seconds.

**Log Cabin Life: 1847-1853**

In 1847 the Johannes Romberg family, emigrants from Germany, arrived in Texas and established a farm on the San Bernard River. Here the family, which included eight children, lived until they moved in 1853 to another farm on the Navidad River near Black Jack Springs in Fayette County.

Some eighty years after her arrival in Texas as a girl of seven, Lillie Romberg Fuchs wrote an account of her life, which was privately published about 1927. She said she did this to provide a family record for her descendants, who then numbered nine living children, forty grandchildren and thirty-three great-grandchildren.

In her book, "Eremunger's farm (Memorial)", Mrs. Fuchs published a description of life on the San Bernard farm which she had written in 1855 at the age of sixteen. Translated from the original German, a portion of this reminiscence appears below.

"I can still clearly picture our earlier farm, with the humble loghouse, and the grey oak shingled roof. And I could not protest if someone were to say that the house, with its log already worn in places and smeared with yellow clay, was not at all attractive."

"It had its good points, just the same, for it was very warm inside, and in winter when the north wind howled, and blew with its dreadful voice through the bare branches and whipped them against one another so that they broke and fell clattering to the ground; it was very comfortable inside, and would follow with eager attention the heroic deeds and adventures of a young knight."

"But it seemed quite heartless to us that father would often leave the hearth in the midst of great danger of his life, struck down unconscious by his ailment, and cheerful conversation shortened our evenings. Often ten anecdotes and story ghost-stories were told. But the greatest pleasure for us children was when father would take a deep draw on his pipe, and at great cost would blow the blue smoke in several puffs into the air. Then only after a long pause, as if he wanted to allow our patience, and the deep sympathy which we felt for the hero, to cool down somewhat, he would continue the story. In this way the evening passed quickly, and the admonition to go to bed always came too early for us. But as soon as we were in our beds, and had pulled the covers over our heads, and after we had listened for the north wind with the tree that stood beside our house, whose branches, blown by the wind, often struck upon the roof, we went to sleep."

"At the beginning, when we moved to the farm, there was on one side of the house a thicket of trees, shrubs and grapevines. One Sunday we set to work on it, with axes and shovels, and before the sun had gone down, where earlier there had stood only tangled vines and bushes, there was now a beautiful, spacious arbor, created in four hours of work, so overgrown with wild grapes that not a ray of sunshine could penetrate it. In front of it, this was a large round flowerbed in the middle of which there soon stood surrounded by willow-trees, a cactus with many small sharp needles. To our alarm, this soon spread with such impetuosity and complacency that it persistently crowded out almost everything else."

"The arbor itself was soon improved with a table and a bench. Here we drank our coffee on Sunday, and our parents chatted away the afternoon with our neighbors. On weekdays, during the rest time, this was the playground of our children. Here we did not eat ourselves reasonably to eat, no, here we played tag, even in the trees, by climbing on vines from one tree to another, and shouted, laughed, and were as happy as only children can be."

## Protect Children In Car Accidents

An injured child instinctively turns to the safety of mother's arms for protection. But in an automobile accident, even the strongest of arms are incapable of protecting a child from death and injury, warns the Texas Medical Association. Infants and children, due to their short legs and large heads, are much more likely to be thrown about the car upon impact than are adults. In a 20 m.p.h. collision, a 15 pound baby is thrown at a force equal to 300 pounds.

Automobile accidents are the leading cause of death in the U.S. for children over the age of 1 month. Approximately 1,000 children, 5 years old and under, are killed in auto accidents each year and another 100,000 are injured. Car seats and restraint devices could prevent many deaths and injuries. A Washington State Seat Belt Study indicated that if all children under the age of 5 years were restrained at the time of an accident, reduction of death by 91 percent and of injuries by 78 percent might be expected. Despite this startling statistic, a 1975 study by the Insurance Institute of Highway Safety showed that 90 percent of children under 10 years of age are not properly restrained as passengers in vehicles without any type of restraint. An infant, in particular, is so fragile that he or she is someone's arms. The baby is not only inadequately protected against crash forces

but also is placed in jeopardy because of the possibility of being crushed by the person holding the child.


Seat belts alone, however, do not always provide adequate protection, especially for small children. Studies have shown that lap-type seat belts often slip into a position on the child's abdomen which could cause internal injuries during a crash.

To insure adequate protection, all children should be placed in some type of child restraint device. There are four basic types: infant carriers, child seats, booster seats, and harnesses. When choosing a restraint device, parents should consider their responsibility in installing and using the device correctly, the size and weight of the child, and special features of their automobile which may prevent them from using certain brands.

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

Usually, "static" from another person only clouds the message. Some couples complain they have to explain their spouse's thoughts and interests by listening in on a mate's conversation. Others say they feel less threatened in open group discussions, where there is less chance of a marital fight, which the group can act as mediator.

## New Brides Must Change Records

COLLEGE STATION—New brides who change their names have many official records to change, says Lillian Cheneveth, family resource management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Place of employment is one of the first places to state. Employees need to know of a new status for pay check purposes and to avoid confusion with federal taxes. When making name change on insurance policies, consider any change in beneficiaries at the same time. To change social security records, call the nearest office of the agency and request a name-change form.

After completing and returning the form, a new card will be issued. The number will remain the same.

Another place to change the record is the driver's license office. They will issue a new license for a new name.

To update credit records, notify the local credit bureau of a name change. Request that they maintain separate files for the bride and her husband in order to retain a credit identity checking account, know that account under the bride's name. A separate saving account is not essential to establish a credit record.

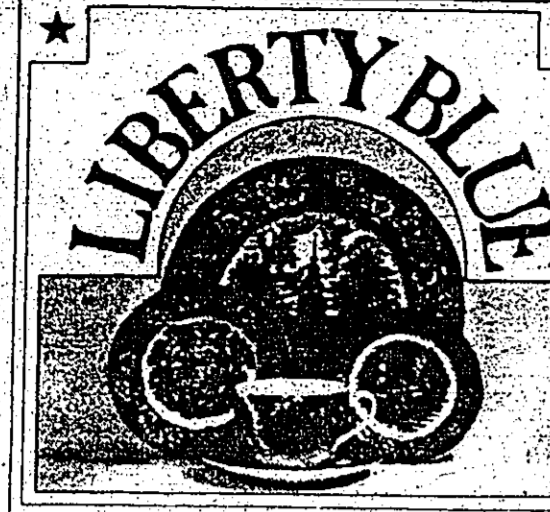

### Cigarette Stamp Tax Collections Up

AUSTIN, TEXAS—Figures Department indicate a size-able increase in stamp tax collections. According to State Treasurer Warren G. Harding, state cigarette stamp tax collections for the fiscal year ended August 31, 1978, amounted to \$289,601,633.42, an increase of \$12,105,664.37 over collections in the previous fiscal year.

Collections hit an all-time monthly high in May, 1978 when \$27,071,882.90 was collected. The increase reflected during fiscal year 1978 averaged in excess of \$1 million per month.

Collectors from the sale of stamps on liquor, beer and wine amounted to \$1,836,206.29, an increase of \$70,959.63. This tax is imposed on tourists who bring alcoholic beverages across the bridges from Mexico into Texas.

**Grocery Bills Stabilizing**

COLLEGE STATION—Consumers can expect more stable grocery bills through the rest of 1978—barring unforeseen weather problems or other disruptions, a Texas home economist predicts.

Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, a consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, made the food-price forecast.

According to Mrs. Clyatt, this week's price-quality trends at Texas grocery markets are the following: **GROCERY MARKET FEATURES**—Look for special prices on canned vegetables and fruits, peanut butter and pasta products. **FROZEN FOOD FEATURES**—Specials include orange juice, french fries, vegetables and ice milk. **FRESH VEGETABLES**—Items in best supply at economical prices are carrots, cucumbers, corn, dry yellow onions, bell peppers, yellow and zucchini squash.

Eggplant is more plentiful with slightly lower prices. New-crop sweet potatoes have moderate prices, but buy only 10-day varieties. **FRESH FRUITS**—Good supply items with economy prices include bananas, prunes, cantaloupe and watermelon.

Plentiful items are nectarines, plums and grapes. Peach supplies are lower, but quality is still good. **POULTRY**—Look for large supplies of eggs and fryer chickens. Medium-size eggs are a better buy than usual.

Also reasonable prices appear on turkey parts and turkey roasts. **BEEF**—Supplies are ranging from stable to slightly higher, but prices are about the same. Consider less-tender cuts, such as chuck cuts, round steaks, ground beef and liver. **CONSUMER WATCHWORDS**—Short-grain rice is ideal for puddings and stuffings, while long-grain rice is best as a side dish, in soups and with gravies.

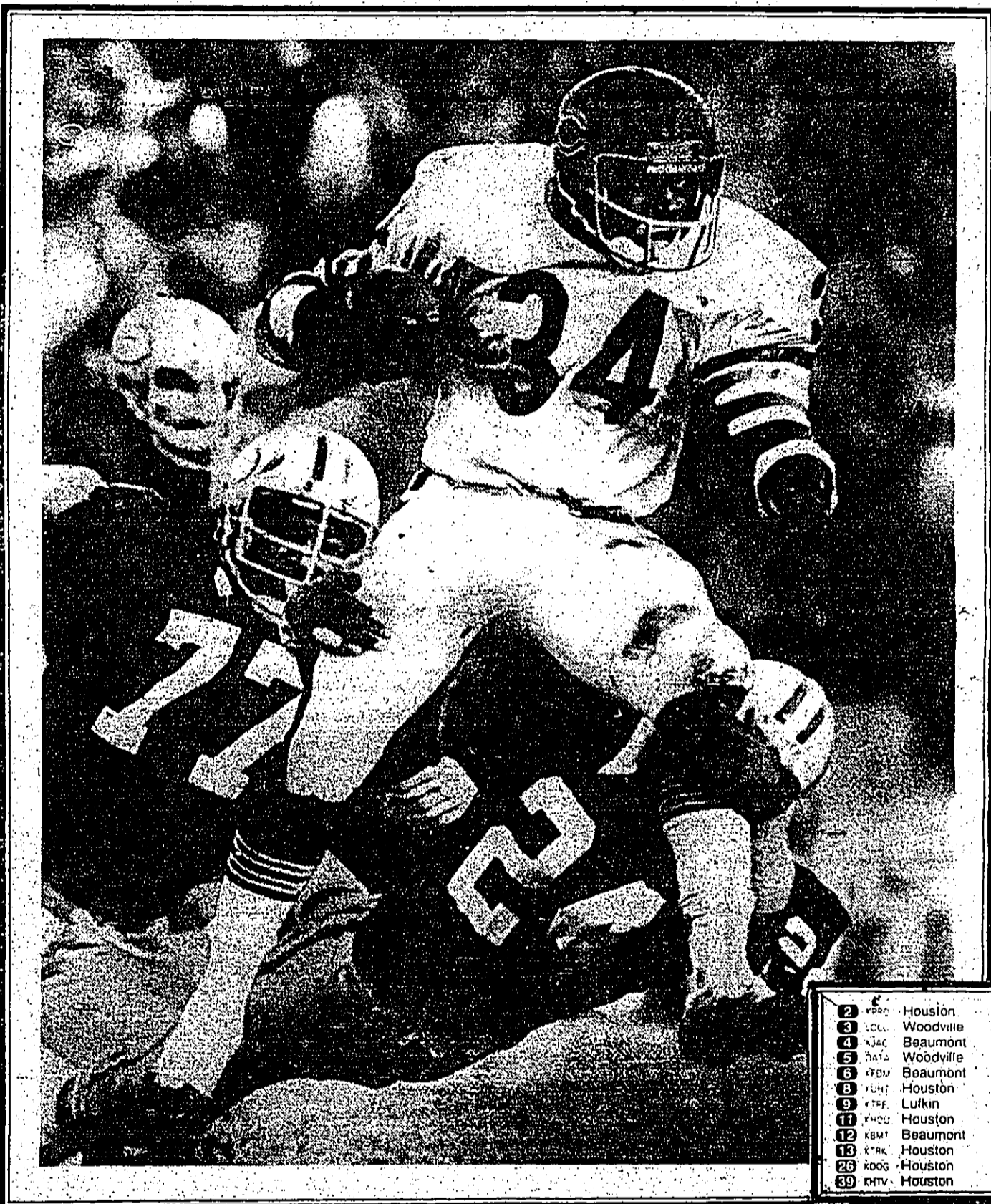

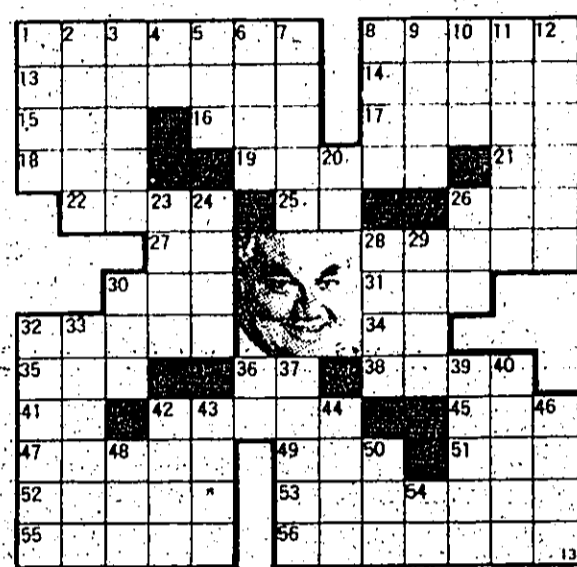

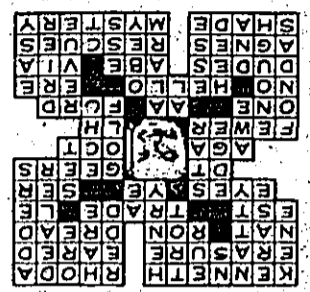

The series differs from the usual variety program in that it will not utilize the talents and appeal of weekly guest stars. Rather, it will concentrate on the myriad talents of a carefully selected repertory company, Mary's new "family," consisting of Dick Shawn, James Hampton, Swosie Kurtz, David Letterman, Judy Kahan and Michael Keaton.

During the premiere hour, Mary will introduce the new cast via specially prepared audition tapes. One production number will be dedicated to her old comedy cohort, with the presentation of the first (and undoubtedly last) television appearance of the Ed Asner Dancers. Another will feature Mary and the Tony Stevens Dancers. A special satirical salute will honor the first 25 minutes of "Mary" and, in what will be regular weekly features, Mary's monologue will deal with a vexing or controversial but always humorous subject. At the end of each show, the entire cast will be depicted gathering at a nearby nightclub to relax and refresh the evening.

The world of music, dance and comedy is a natural television progression for Mary Tyler Moore, who began her career as a singer and dancer. Those talents were showcased in the feature motion picture, "Thoroughly Modern Millie" and have come to the television fore on various specials. During the five-year run of "The Dick Van Dyke Show," she received two Emmy Awards and during the seven-year run of her own comedy series, amassed four more.

Dick Shawn returns to television after completing a successful Broadway and Los Angeles engagement in his solo comedy, "The 2nd Greatest Entertainer in the World."

## TV Advertisers Showing Disgust

TUPELO, MISS.—A move to pull more than \$60,000,000 in revenue from the ABC-TV network has been announced by the National Federation for Decency. The effort is a protest of the generally low quality programming and the violence, sex and profanity being aired on ABC.

Donald E. Wildmon, executive director of the NFD, said his organization is asking Americans who are disgusted with the television programming to join in a nationwide boycott of ABC in November. He said the NFD would promote the effort through their organization, mailings to as many as 100,000 churches and interest groups, and pickets of local ABC-TV outlets on October 31.

"We are disgusted with the cheap, violent and vulgar programming on television. By directing our efforts against one network, we can make our voices heard and our impact felt," he said. Wildmon stated that the A.C. Nielsen Co. would be conducting a nationwide "sweeps" during November. The sweeps determines how many viewers each network has and the networks in turn charge their advertisers based on those figures.

"If we can drop ABC's rating by two points, it could result in a loss of more than \$60,000,000 over the period of a year," he said. "ABC doesn't understand letters of concern. They ignore them. But they do understand the dollar. It is the only thing they understand. By boycotting ABC in November we can really

make our disgust with the crude and tasteless programming felt in their pocketbook."

Wildmon said a previous NFD led TV boycott in March of 1977 was greatly responsible for a drop of one million households daytime and one-quarter of a million households prime-time from March to December of 1977.

The NFD said it is urging those asked to participate in the Nielsen ratings in November to indicate in their viewing diaries that they did not watch ABC during the month. "With those disgusted by the violence, vulgarity and profanity on television indicating their participation in the ABC boycott in their Nielsen diaries, it will have a tremendous impact on ABC and the quality of television in the future," Wildmon said.

He said viewers could send a message to Nielsen which could shake ABC and all television like an earthquake.

He called the move a modern day reenactment of the Biblical David-Goliath story. "Sure, all we have is a pebble and a sling. And ABC is a giant. But we are among our public in their pocketbook and we won't miss. Our pebble will cost ABC millions," he said.

The NFD is asking every concerned individual; PTA group, civic organization, church and synagogue and decency group in America to join the effort. Wildmon said he hopes people will write letting the NFD know the number participating. The address is NFD, Tupelo, Miss. 38801.

## Franco Nero Depicts Modern-Day Shiek

The American audience barely knows Franco Nero, despite the fact that he has starred in 60 films during the past 15 years. Sometime in November, however, U.S. television audiences will see Nero in a four-hour film version of Harold Robbins' "The Pirate."

Most of Nero's films have not been seen in America. Nero did play Sir Lancelot in "Camelot" (his first exposure in this country) but Vanessa Redgrave and Richard Harris had the key roles, and Franco insists his portrayal was "marshmallow."

But if he didn't like the picture, he did like Vanessa, and that inspired a relationship that produced a son, Carlo, now 9 years old.

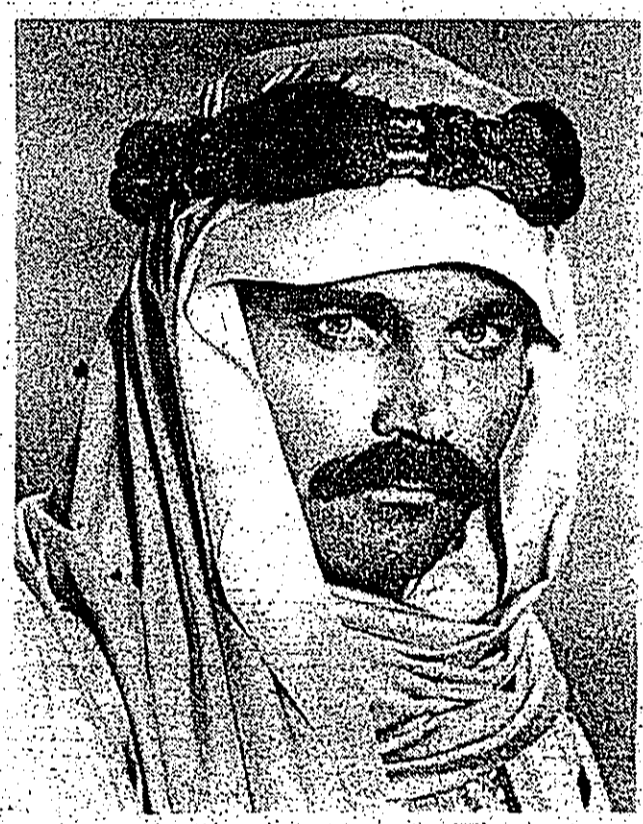
Franco and Vanessa never married. Franco doesn't believe in marriage, or rather, he doesn't believe in divorce, as he declares in his generously accented English. Although he has never wed, he is a devoted father.

Carlo accompanied his father to America recently, during school vacation. The two were headed for Italy where Franco said, "we will go fishing in Calabria, and have a wonderful vacation."

Franco had just finished filming "The Pirate," which follows the adventures of an Arab businessman and womanizer.

"The Pirate" is one of three major television appearances for Franco Nero in American television, where he seems more in favor than in theatrical films. He recently played the terrorist — again, an Arab — in "21 Hours at Munich," which told the story of the horrendous attack on the Israeli athletes at the Olympic games in Germany in 1972.

He also played the lead in TV's "Valentino" film, about the great Latin male

He claims she sleeps only two hours a night, and is in the streets at 5 every morning, selling papers that reflect her causes.

"She suffers for all this. She is the best actress today, but she has practically given up her career for the causes."

His own career flourishes. After "Camelot," he purposely didn't work in the U.S. for a number of years. One reason, he explains, is that Americans quickly type actors. Internationally, he is able to vary the roles. "I have made more than 60 films, and they have been for me more than 60 different roles."

He says he enjoys making films for American television. "It is almost perfect," he declares, adding the only flaw is the speed here.

"American films exaggerate too much," he says. "And the crews are too big. You have 60 or 70 people on them, and when you move from one location or set to another, all those people have to move. Maybe, only 10 are working. It wastes time. Too often, the director tries to save time by taking too many close-ups."

There is an informality about production in Italy that he enjoys explaining with this story: "The Italian director comes onto the set in the morning, looks at the crew, walks over and tells Franco that all those people are waiting for me (the director) to tell them what idea I have for today's filming. They don't know that I have no idea. So let's go have a cup of coffee."

Of "The Pirate," which will air sometime in the fall on CBS, Nero confides that there was stronger commitment. Howard Koch, he relates, is a "first-class producer" and Ken Annakin, as director, "did the job very well," and finally, Jules Epstein, the writer, authored an excellent script.

"Cinematic Eye" is a unique series devoted to the art of film and designed to accompany 13 classic European films from the Janus Collection (PBS Movie Theater). Written and narrated by Benjamin Dunlap of the University of South Carolina, each 30-minute program uses all the resources of the television medium to explore the background and technique of the film Dunlap introduces. A college credit series, "Cinematic Eye" airs on Saturday evenings.

After "Cinematic Eye" educates film fans, "Sneak Previews" will give PBS viewers a chance to see for themselves "what's new in the movies" every other week. Each program provides an advance screening of film segments along with comment and criticism by two of the nation's youngest and brightest movie critics, Roger Ebert (Chicago Sun-Times) and Gene Siskel (Chicago Tribune). "Sneak Previews" begins on Thursday, Oct. 12.

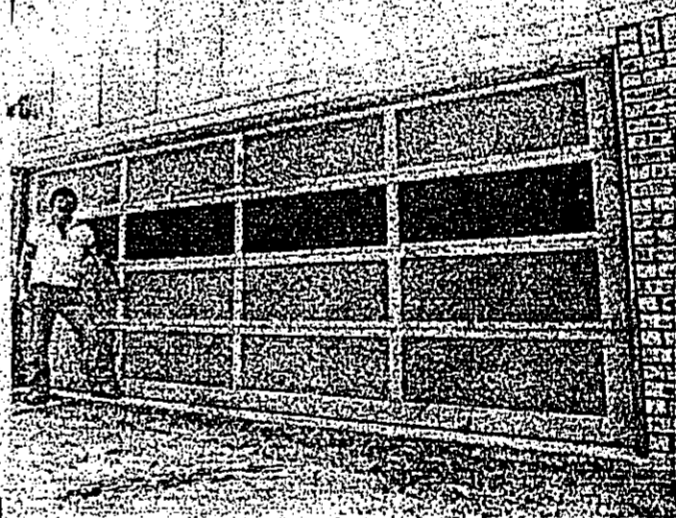
Last year's winners got to rap with the publisher of The New York Times, the head of NBC and Muhammad Ali ... among others.

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
