Air Show Shapes Up For Saturday, Oct. 14

Exciting acrobatic stunts, heart-in-the-throat action of the "Tora, Tora, Tora" team and precision parachuting by a few of the spectacular sights offered at the 2nd Annual Woodville Benefit Air Show that takes off Saturday, Oct. 14 at the Tyler County Airport.

Sponsored by the Woodville Rotary Club and benefiting the Rotary Scholarship Program, the air show will host key figures in the aviation world.

Topping the list of performances will be ace acrobatic pilot and international champion Art Scholl. Flying the Royal Canadian Airforce plane, the modified DeHavilland "Chipmunk", Scholl has been described as a "legend in his own time." He has over 11,000 flying hours to his credit and in recent years has been involved in television and movies combining his flying abilities with acting, producing and aerial photography.

Both Scholl and his aircraft are put through severe stress at each air show as he performs incredible maneuvers such as the low-level outside loop, a Lomcevak and the inverted ribbon pickup when Scholl flies inverted some 150 feet above the runway snatching a ribbon from the cockpit of his aircraft.

Also appearing at the Woodville Benefit Air Show are the Golden Knights of the U.S. Army, rated as the

finest parachutists in the world.

Since its formation in 1959 the Golden Knights have won more national and international honors than any other parachute team, military or civilian, in the history of sport parachuting.

Beginning their descent some two and half miles above the surface of the earth, the Golden Knights free-fall to around 2,000 feet, using their bodies to take them

through various maneuvers both before and after deploying their special designed parachutes. They plummet towards the earth at speeds nearing 180 miles per hour during free-fall, then parachute to a pinpoint or glide under para-foils, para-wings or other such devices with smoke tracing their way down from the sky.

The Confederate Air Force will rally at the airport to re-enact, for awed spectators, war scenes from W.W. II. The famous "Tora, Tora, Tora" team will perform exciting maneuvers and their planes and pilots will be on hand before the show for questions and autographs.

Narrating the air show will be Bill Bordeleau, rated as one of the top producers at air show narrators in the country. A pilot himself, Bordeleau has more than 20 years experience in aviation.

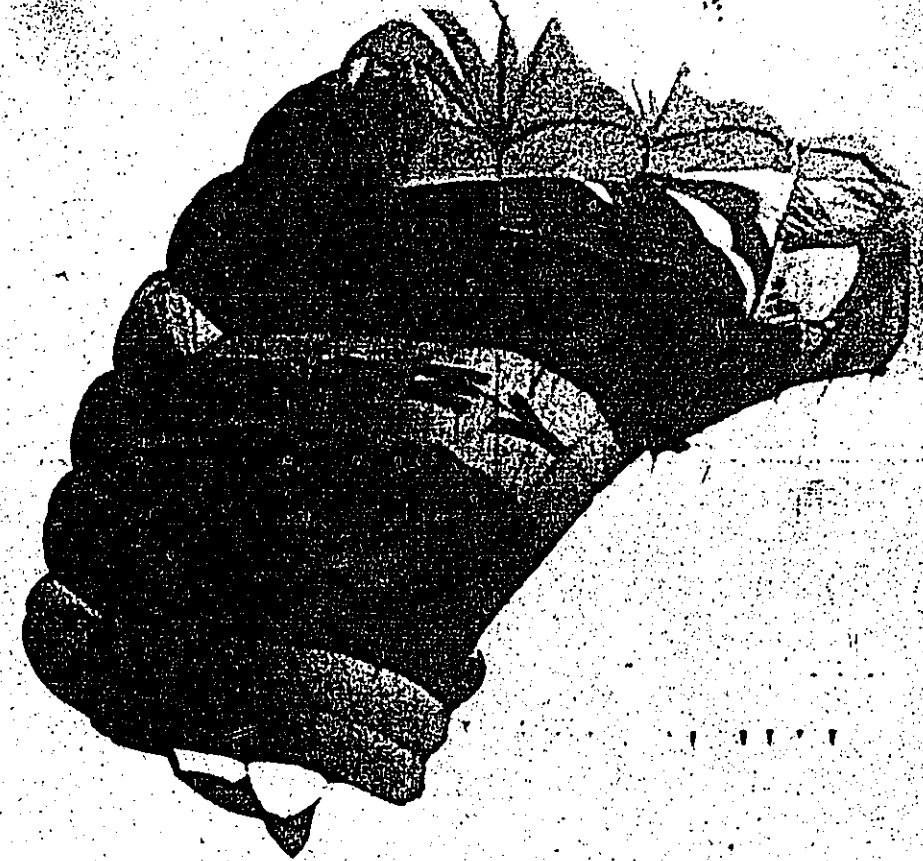
Other attractions at the show will include a Military Static Display, Warbirds of America, NASA's Moon Suit and noted artist and War hero Col. Paul Johnson who will be lecturing around the county the week prior to the show.

Air Show director Bud Byram said, "This show shouldn't even be coming to Tyler County. It's too spectacular and exciting. It was a matter of being in the right place at the time that we were fortunate enough to get the top professionals for the show."

Gates open at 10 a.m. to allow first hand inspections of the air-craft and talks with the performers and pilots.

Take-off time for the show is 2 p.m. Tickets are Adult \$4.00, and Senior High \$3.00, Pre-teens \$2.00, and children 6 and under are admitted free.

Tax Pamphlet Free

Do you really know very much about the property taxes you pay?

If you don't, like most taxpayers, and would like to learn more, you can get easy-to-understand help in a new pamphlet now available free from your local school district tax office.

It's entitled, TAXPAYERS' RIGHTS/REMEDIES/RESPONSIBILITIES. This eight-page pamphlet explains the four basic stages of the tax process in the local school district—from the first of each year when your property is valued, through the tax bill which you receive later that year.

The various tax procedures are explained in separate articles which can be read any time and then checked again at times of the year when you need specific information about school taxes.

Humorous cartoons of exaggerated tax situations are included, along with a helpful tax-year calendar and information on such things as how to render your property; the tax assessor-collector's job; the items your tax bill should list; determining a fair appraisal; agricultural land value; meeting the board of equalization; certain exemptions; how tax rates are formed; lawsuits; school budgets; and public meetings.

The pamphlet is produced by the Texas School Tax Assessment Practitioners' Board.

State Treasurer Warren G. Harding said interest income from investment of state funds during his first year in office will amount to more than \$130 million.

Harding said the percentage of funds invested has increased steadily from 84.8 per cent to an unprecedented 94.5 per cent during the month of August 1978.

Interest rates have increased from six per cent to seven per cent, and total interest earned on the state's operating funds amounted to \$174 million last month, an all-time record.

Income Taxable State employees must pay income taxes on additional take-home due to the state's paying their Social Security contributions, the Internal Revenue Service has ruled.

That means employees, at one time, enjoyed freedom from governmental interference and our free enterprise system, for the most part, fostered a healthy and vigorous financial system in which prices changed only modestly from year to year, wage increases were geared primarily to merit and seniority, and profit margins were predictable.

Today, our nation's staggering rate of inflation, heavy demands by some labor groups, excessive price escalation by some large corporations, and constantly fluctuating profit formulas challenge not only the experience of corporate America as well as the small business person, but also impact the average wage-earner in a very substantial way.

In 1978 a new "economic philosophy" has been offered - this time not by the politicians or so-called economic experts, but instead, by the people - a move I, for one, applaud.

However, the people of California's in passing Proposition 13 has triggered additional interest in economics and in our systems of taxation and government spending. A subject area that would almost certainly be of America in more constant times is now a common dinner table topic.

The merits and demerits of Proposition 13 will be debated, and may not be particularly obvious for years to come. Recently backed of the Kemp-Roth legislative action halted it as the answer to the problems of Middle America. However, what Kemp-Roth failed to include with their cut in federal taxes was a limitation of government spending.

That is why this month I agreed to sponsor House Joint Resolution 130, which calls for a constitutional amendment requiring a balanced federal budget by 1983.

Earlier this year I attempted to pass through the House an amendment with similar goals, an amendment that would have contained federal spending at its current level (except in a few essential areas) and would have dimmed the federal deficit by \$7 billion.

A tax cut is essential - but also essential is a cut in government spending.

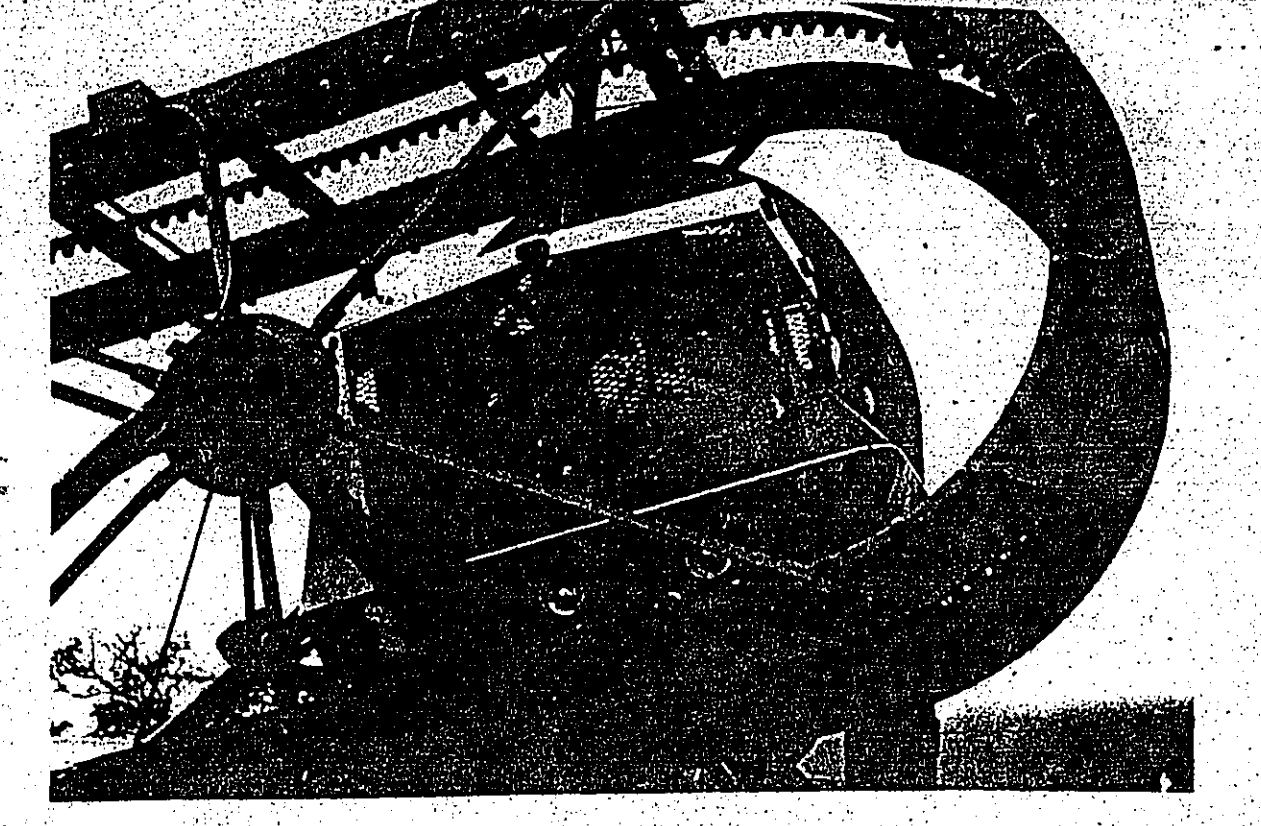

Giving The Massacre A Miss: 1836

John C. Duval, a Kentuckian, volunteered in 1836 to help Texas win independence from Mexico. He was among the soldiers who under the command of Col. James W. Fannin, surrendered to Mexican forces after the Battle of Coleto on March 20, 1836. With the other men of his company he was taken as a prisoner to Goliad. On the morning of March 27, more than 400 of the Goliad prisoners, including those who had surrendered under Fannin's command, were marched under guard in three separate directions away from the town. In each case, before they had traveled a mile, the Mexican guards, acting under orders from Santa Anna, suddenly fired upon their prisoners. Most were killed with the first volley. Only 28 were able to save their lives by flight. Among the survivors was Duval, who later described in his book, "Early Days in Texas," the circumstances of his escape.

On the morning of the 27th of March, a Mexican officer came to us and ordered us to get ready for a march. He told us, we were to be liberated on parole; and that arrangements had been made to send us to New Orleans on board of vessels then at Copan. This, you may be sure, was joyful news to us, and we lost no time in making preparations to leave our uncomfortable quarters. When all was ready we were formed into three divisions and marched under a strong guard. As we passed by some Mexican women who were standing near the river entrance to the fort, I heard them say, "poor fellows! poor fellows! but the incident at the time made but little impression on my mind."

One of our divisions was taken down the road leading to the lower fork of the river, and the division to which my company was attached, along the road leading to San Antonio. A strong guard accompanied us, marring our double files on both sides of our column. It occurred to me that this division of our men into three squads, and marching us off in three directions, was rather a singular maneuver, but still I had no suspicion of the foul play intended us. When about half a mile above town, a halt was made and the guard on the side nearest the river fired around to the opposite side. "Hardly had this maneuver been executed, when I heard a heavy rattling of musketry in the directions taken by the other two divisions. "Some one near me exclaimed, "Boys! they are going to shoot us!" and at the same instant I heard the clicking of musket locks all along the Mexican line. I turned to look, and as I did so, the Mexicans fired upon us, killing probably one hundred out of the one hundred and fifty men in the division. We were in double file and I was in the rear rank. The man in front of me was shot dead; and in falling he knocked me down. I did not get up for a moment, and when I rose to my feet, I found that the whole Mexican line had charged over me, and were in hot pursuit of me. I saw him put his bayonet in the bayonet in such a way as to prevent the Mexican from withdrawing it immediately. I saw him put his foot on the man, and make an ineffectual attempt to cartwheel the bayonet from his body, but one look satisfied me as I was somewhat in a hurry just then, and I hastened to the bank of the river and plunged in.

The river at that point was deep and swift, but not wide, and being a good swimmer, I soon gained the opposite bank, untouched by any of the bullets that were patterning in the water around my head. But here I met with an unexpected difficulty. The bank on that side was as steep I found it was impossible to climb it, and I continued to swim down the river until I came to where a grape vine hung from the bough of a leaning tree nearly to the surface of the water. This I caught hold of and was climbing up, as I heard over-hand, sailor fashion, when a Mexican on the opposite bank fired at me with his escopets, and with so true an aim, that he cut the vine in two just above my head, and down I came into the water again. I then swam on about a hundred yards further, when I came to a place where the bank was not quite so steep, and with some difficulty I managed to clamber up.

After a series of remarkable adventures, which lasted for several weeks, Duval at last made his way back to a portion of the Texas army, only to discover that in the meantime the Mexicans had been defeated at San Jacinto and Texas was independent. In later years Duval was a member of Capt. John C. (Jack) Hays' company of Texas Rangers.

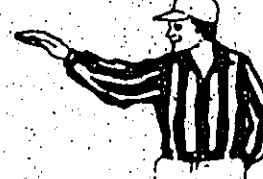

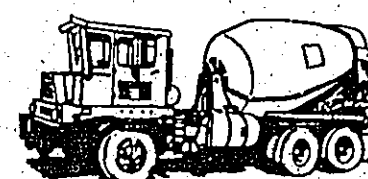

ASCS Seeking Nominations

Tyler County begins their process of electing responsible concerned farmers to positions on the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service County Committees on October 6, 1978.

Nominating petitions will be mailed to Tyler County farmers on October 6th. The deadline for return of petitions is October 31st. Each farmer will be given the opportunity to nominate one of his fellow farmers as a county committeeman. The nominees will be entered on ballots to be mailed to eligible voters November 25th. Voters will have until December to mark the return ballots. New committee members and alternates take office January 1, 1979.

Farm owners, operators, tenants, and sharecroppers, 18 or older, can vote in the election if they are eligible to take part in any Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Program authorized by Federal legislation. A person under 18 who runs a farm is eligible as is a spouse who is a bonafide joint operator. A legal guardian who runs a farm for a child may vote for the child.

Almost anyone eligible to take part in a county ASCS program may be a candidate for the committee.

ASC Committees administer farm programs at the county level. If you are interested and/or have any questions, please contact the Tyler County ASCS Office, 411 N. Pine St., Woodville, 283-2244.

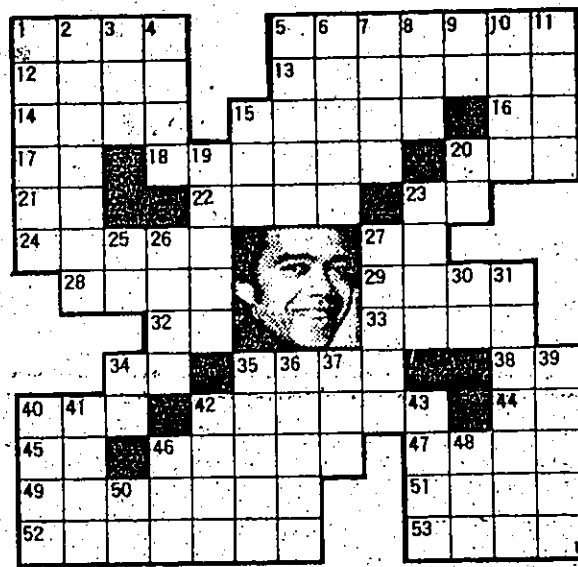

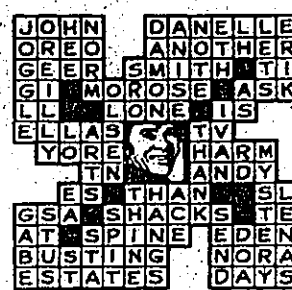

The actual shots of Las Vegas exteriors are for real, though. "They took everyone to Vegas and shot pictures of hotels, casinos and the strip," Scott says.

"We don't have any Vegas sets in Burbank, just an apartment set - but that could be anywhere."

Scott was enthusiastic about his brief visit to Las Vegas. "I loved it. I couldn't gamble or play the slot machines. I'll go back in a couple of years." By then, Scott will be 17 years old. If you add his experience on "Who's Watching the Kids?" Scott should hit the game rooms like an old pro.

He did find one draw-

back to Las Vegas, however. "It was so hot, 115 degrees."

Since Scott worked as Fonzie's cousin on all 26 episodes of "Happy Days" last season, does he have any regrets about moving off that very successful series?

"I have a much bigger part," he answers.

However, he does concede that "Happy Days" was a good learning experience. "They're both three camera shows. It's easy to block someone out with three cameras, if you don't know what you're doing. I got to know which camera is on you."

Scott continues that Ron Howard, rather than Henry Winkler, was a most helpful co-worker. "Ronny is really funny and natural," he says. "He teaches you a lot."

Scott, who is a native of Brooklyn, New York, commuted to Los Angeles for "Happy Days" because he was still in school. This spring he finished high school at Xavier in New York City. "I was ahead," he claims. "I had a tutor. You can't fake learning or teaching when you have a tutor. I did learn a lot."

Although Scott finished high school ahead of time, he doesn't resent playing the role of a poor learner. "My character is not a dumb kid," he insists, "but kind of a rebel, a street kid. If he wanted to he could be smart."

Scott's sure about his future education. "I'll go to college, but I'm taking this semester off. I moved to L.A. two months ago with my brother, mother and father. My sister is coming out later. She's an X-ray technician in New York."

"I miss New York," he continues, "there's always someplace to go. California is nice, but not alive. almost everything dies at 10 p.m."

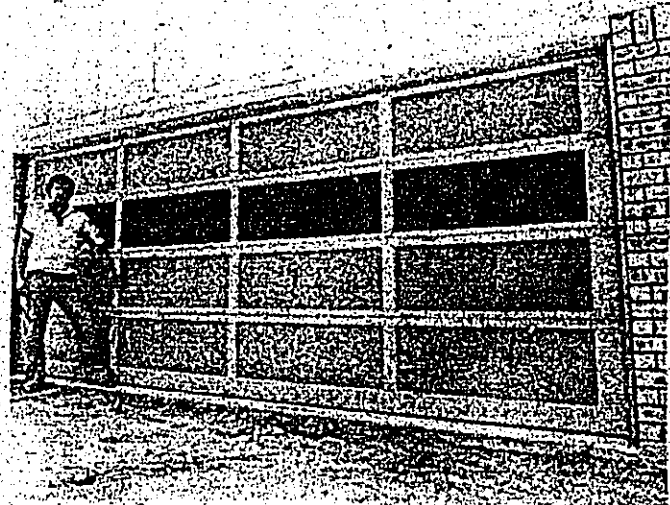
