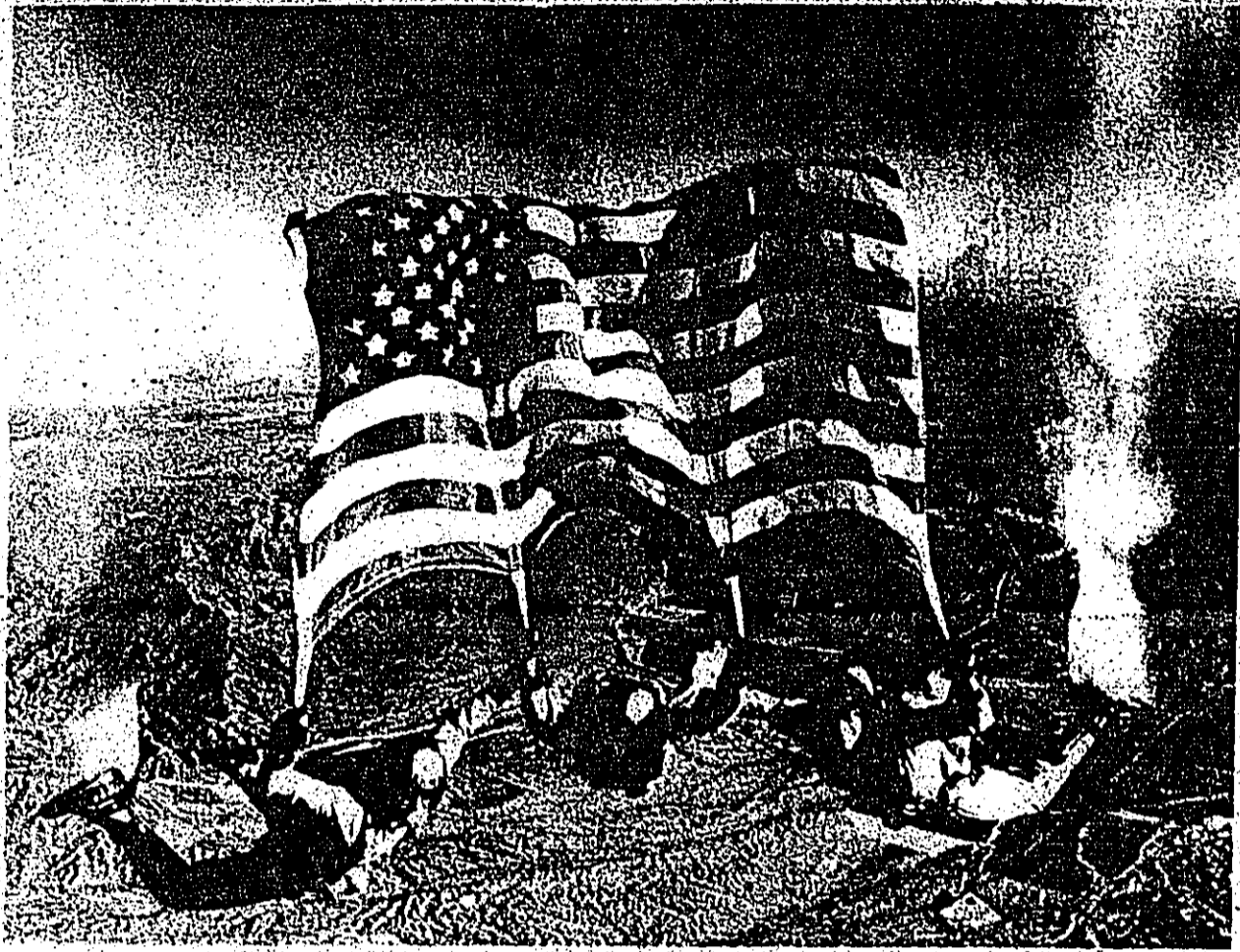

Hill Promises Local Government Support

Democratic candidate Attorney General John Hill brought his race for the governorship to Woodville last Thursday appearing before the Deep East Texas Council of Governments where he pledged a return of local government support from Austin and said he would send back any surpluses in the state treasury to local school districts if elected.

Hill told the group that Councils of Governments play a vital role adding "they are a resource that more fully needs to be utilized."

The Attorney General was introduced by Woodville Mayor Terry Watts as "The next governor of the State of Texas."

Hill, who said he was a "Friend of local government

said that "Cooperation is a key theme of the campaign." He said the reason for his visiting the regional councils of government was to become more familiar with each region.

"You get to know me and I get to know you, and we can hit the ground running in January and not lose anytime establishing a new area of strong cooperation between the state and local governments."

Hill said he hoped to build a capable staff in Austin which would provide "A straight-on and direct relationship with local governments."

Hill drew applause from the audience, about 150 strong, when he said, "I will not permit any legislation to pass over my veto that would give local govern-

ments obligations to carry out requiring new expenditures on your part without sending state financial assistance. I think it's very important that the state stop this kind of activity."

"We're quick to ask the federal government to stop that practice with the states. It's time we took some of our own medicine."

Hill said, "The cry of the people for more competent government is the real underlying theme of Proposition 13. A plea for 'competency,'" he added.

Hill said he wanted to "Give a pat on the back to local government, generally speaking for the good job that they've tried to do."

"I feel that Texas is in the best position of any state in the nation to show the way...people are looking to Texas for leadership. They're

looking to us, for example... they're not looking toward California or New York. They're looking toward Texas and we need to be ready to show that we're deserving of being looked to."

Yes, we need tax relief and we'll be providing in the new tax relief legislation amendment to be voted on November 7th."

"I hope it will pass. It will be a step in the right direction and I assure you that it will be implemented faithfully."

Hill said he had discussed the amendment with Lt. Governor Bill Hobby and Speaker Bill Clayton. "And" he said, "we're all committed to presenting this as an emergency matter at the next session of legislation, so that this \$450 million can be re-mitted back to our school

Airshow Coming Soon

Members of the world famous U.S. Army parachute team, the Golden Knights, will perform exciting aerial free-fall demonstrations Saturday, October 14, during the 2nd Annual Woodville Benefit Airshow. The show will begin at 2 p.m. at the Tyler County Airport.

Etching intricate maneuvers in the sky with red smoke, which trails from canisters attached to their boots, the knights attain speeds close to 200 mph while free falling. After completing two-thirds of their 2 mile plunge earthward, they open their parachutes to glide into the demonstration area for a stand up landing.

With over 175,000 jumps, this championship team has thrilled and delighted more than 100 million spectators in 25 foreign nations and throughout all 50 states.

Before and after the jumping is completed, the Golden Knights will be on the runway to give parachute packing demonstrations and answer questions both about parachuting and its part in the U.S. Army.

All proceeds will benefit the Rotary Club Scholarship Fund. The Tyler County Airport is located 3 miles west of Woodville on U.S. 190.

Rodeo Funds Offered

The Jasper Noon Lions Club has announced the procedures to be followed in awarding the first series of annual Jasper Lions Rodeo Scholarships in Jasper and surrounding communities.

Scholarship Committee Chairman, Sid Stover, stated that a total of \$5,500.00 from the proceeds of the 1978 Jasper Lions Rodeo will be distributed to deserving 1979 seniors throughout East Texas.

"These scholarships, derived from funds earned by the Jasper Noon Lions at their annual Rodeo, are intended to help in the education of students that show promise of future service to their community and county," Stover said.

Each participating school will be asked to submit a candidate to the Jasper Noon Lions Club by May 1, indicating the candidate's leadership and initiative, scholarship standing in class, character and citizenship, and intended course of collegiate study.

The 1979 scholarships will be presented to graduates of high schools in Jasper, Kirbyville, Buna, Brookeland, Newton and Woodville.

"The scholarships given outside of Jasper will rotate annually," Stover added. "So, the communities that support our rodeo will be getting a return on their investment."

Fire Prevention Week Is Oct. 8-14

County Judge Allen Sturrock has proclaimed the week of October 8-14, 1978 as FIRE PREVENTION WEEK in Tyler County.

The Tyler County Farm Bureau in conjunction with all fire departments in the county are working together to emphasize fire prevention and protection throughout the county.

The National Fire Protection Week (Sponsored By The National Fire Protection Association) is always the Sunday-through-Saturday period in which falls October 9, date of The Great Chicago Fire in 1871. The Chicago disaster killed 250 persons and destroyed 17,430 buildings at a cost of \$168 million.

In his proclamation, Judge Sturrock said, "The United States has the worst fire record of any industrialized nation. Hundreds of thousands of fires rage each year, killing some 8,800 persons, wreaking damage in excess of 11 billion dollars, leaving thousands homeless and jobless."

The Judges' proclamation also calls attention to the 347 fire deaths in Texas during 1977; 24 of which occurred on Texas farms and ranches.

The NFPA's 1978 National Fire Prevention Week Poster dramatically depicts an incipient trash fire in a darkened house. But equally prominent is a smoke detector reminding the viewer that with such fire protection "You are not alone."

The 1978 Fire Prevention Week places emphasis on three areas of fire safety: (1) Smoke Detectors Give Early Warning of Fire; (2) Operation EDITH, the family fire escape project which means Exit Drills in The

Home; and (3) "LEARN NOT TO BURN."

NFPA studies show that residential fires claim an estimated 6,200 lives annually, usually during night hours from 9:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. Some of these people die from burns, but three times as many die from smoke inhalation—breathing the deadly toxic gases released into the air when common household furnishings smolder and flame.

Smoke detectors give early warning of a fire. This can mean the difference between a safe escape and no escape at all.

Under most circumstances, an approved model of a smoke detector, properly placed, installed and maintained, will do a satisfactory job in giving early warning of fire," say experts at NFPA.

Congressman Wilson said, "Town Meetings are the most enjoyable, interesting part of the job. I enjoy the give-and-take and direct challenge that I've experienced in Town Meetings up to now."

David Miller Accepts Korean Invitation

The First Baptist Church of Weimar has voted to send their pastor, David R. Miller, to Korea for an evangelistic effort there at the invitation of 22 Baptist Churches in Pusan, a city of 2.2 million.

He is a graduate of A&M University and Southwestern Seminary. He is the son of Mrs. Ann Bowen of Woodville, World Evangelism Foundation, who is co-ordinating the effort, asked Miller to participate as a team leader and preacher.

Teams will be sent out into various areas of the city of Pusan to conduct simultaneous revival services for 9 days. Miller will be going to the Dong Nam Baptist Church which has an average attendance of 345 and will minister in an area of about 75,000 people. He will leave for Korea on Oct. 3rd and will return Oct. 17th.

Alan Miller's T-WHEELER The Art of Compromise

American politics, we were told in high school civics, was the art of compromise. The ability of two political parties, often with widely diverse interests arriving at a consensus regarding legislation, and the appropriate goal of government, regarding the private sector.

We are inclined to believe that could be as correct today, as it has been. But with one glaring weakness, that has grown progressively perverse over the past decade.

The framers of the Constitution saw the problem we are in today more than 200 years ago. They tried to design a government of checks and balances — an Executive, Legislative and Judiciary departments that would prevent the country, or its leaders, from running off in several different directions, and as it would appear to be today, quite out of control.

Remember the phrase, the President proposes — the Congress disposes. That is as it should be. But not to the detriment of the White House should be swallowed hook, line and sinker by the Congress, or that the Congress on the other hand should become petulant, and thwart the President, just out of spite.

Reporters reveling in the President's low rating in the polls? Politicians pontificating for their constituents ears back home, and not much being done in the public interest?

Sinking nuclear carriers on the one hand, spending seven months on the other trying to put an energy bill together, one man's job by the Senate and the House on a tax package, all smack of grandstanding — and a President, naive enough to think that his ideas were going to get through Congress unscathed, must be having some second thoughts about now, on just exactly how American politics operates.

Harry Truman was a great student of history, and he had a feel for the body politic. Lyndon Johnson was the great floor manager of the Senate. But in our time, the power cliques in neither the Senate or the House exist any longer. Seniority and committee chairmanships don't carry the massive weight of years past.

Shouldn't the art of compromise be all that more important today, even though in the political climate we live in, much more difficult to achieve? Certainly, we can't continue to spin our wheels as we have. The country is in the mood for indecision, and voters for contrary opinions.

If the polls are correct in one thing, it is that the country is weary of death of inflation, concerned about higher and higher taxes, and the colossal growth of government at all levels.

Most of us feel we aren't being heard, and when heard, not given the benefit of doubt, and when we hear, we hear much fighting for the high ground going on in Washington.

It may well be that Washington is being over-reporter by the press.

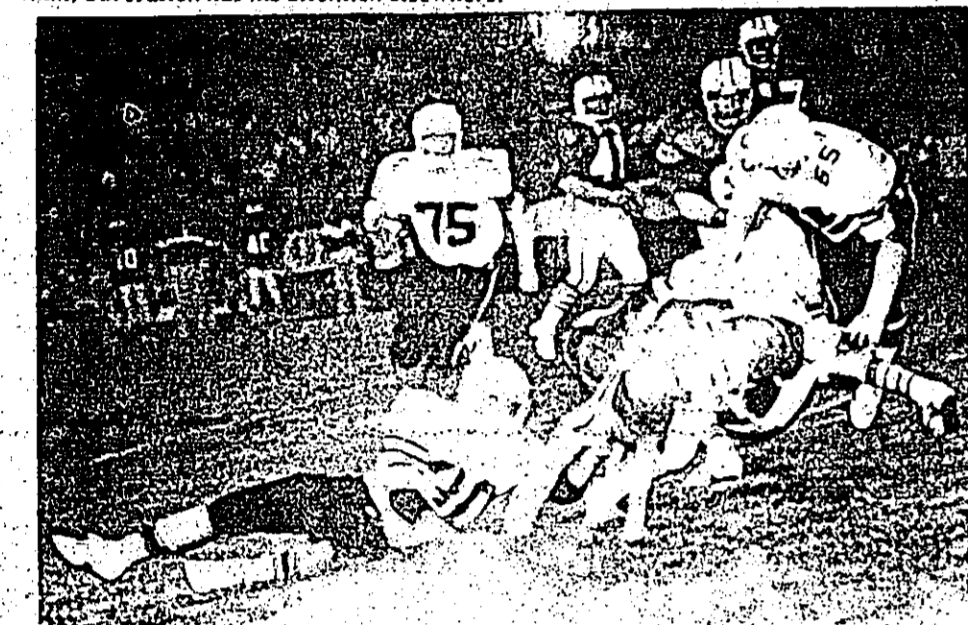

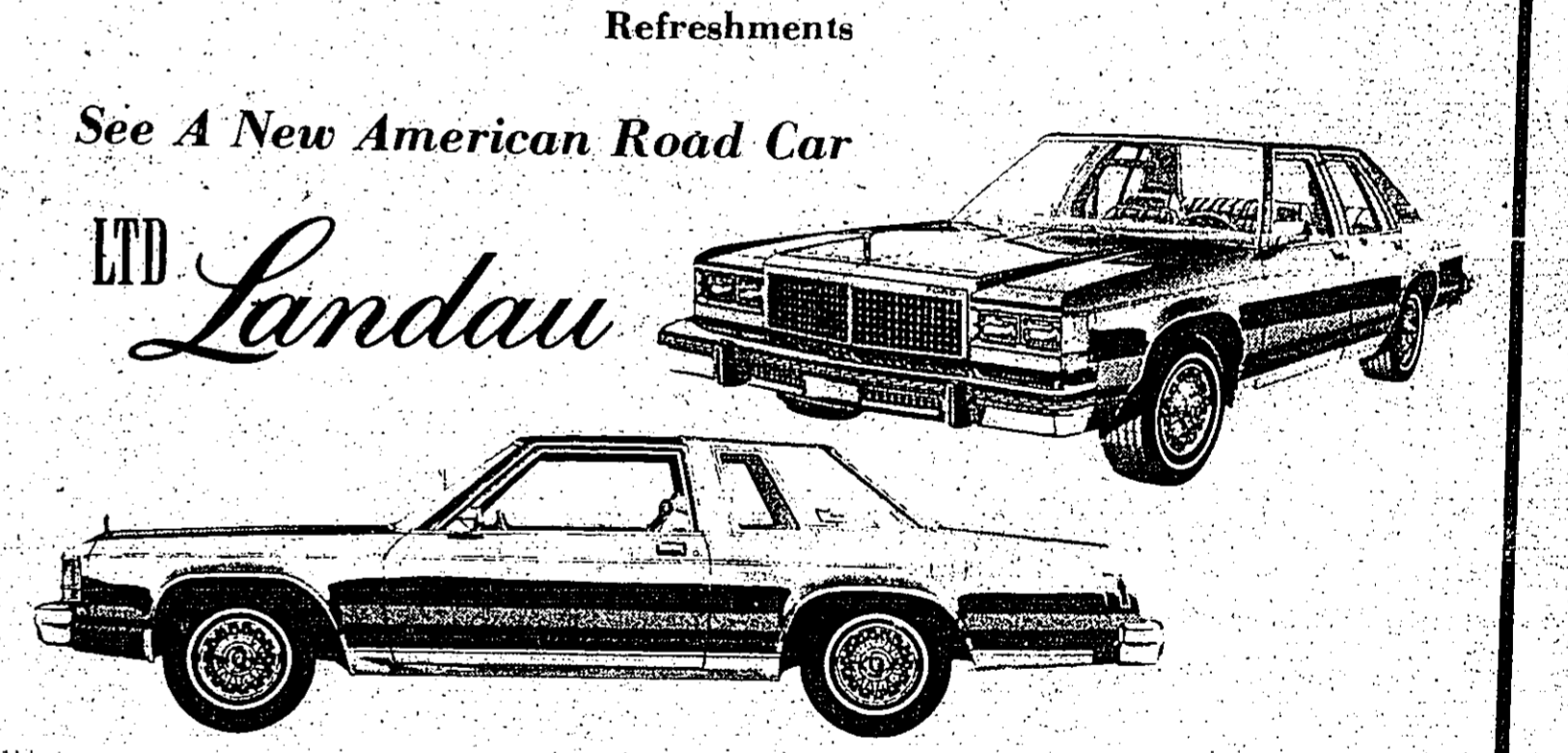

October Bills May Carry Tax

AUSTIN—State Comptroller Bob Bullock last week said Texas homeowners and renters should not be alarmed if their October gas and electricity bills continue to carry the state and local sales tax.

"Under the law, the utility companies will continue adding the tax on their October bills if their billing cycle begins before October 1," Bullock said.

The Texas Legislature voted in special session earlier this year to repeal the four percent state sales tax on residential gas and electric bills effective October 1.

In addition, some 125 Texas cities have also eliminated the local option, one percent city sales tax on those bills effective the same time.

Under the law, the utility companies will continue adding the tax with the start of the utility companies billing period on or after October 1. This means Bullock explained, that a customer whose billing period is October 3 through November 3 will get advantage of the tax break as of October 3.

A customer whose billing cycle is September 25 through October 25 will continue to pay the sales tax through October 25, he said.

Bullock said that homeowners and renters need to jump on their utility companies about the sales tax on the October bills.

"They are only following the law," Bullock said.

He said elimination of the state sales tax on gas and electric bills will save homeowners and renters \$150 million a year.

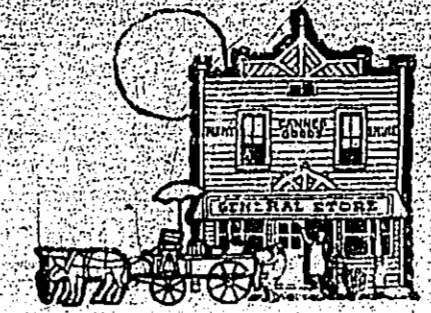

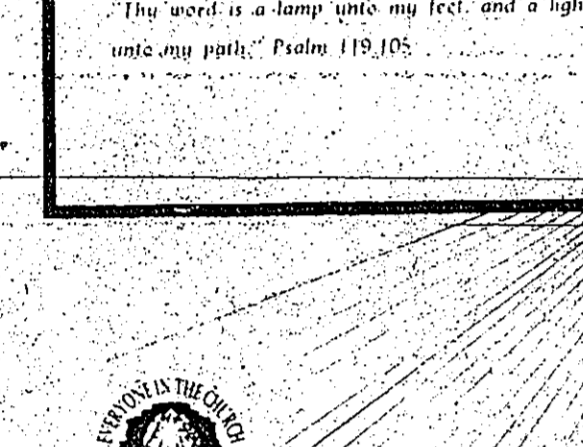

Child Abuse Focuses On Mental Health

COLLEGE STATION—Modern child abuse research focuses on mental health of abusing parents, stressful home situations and the part the child plays in causing the abuse.

Today, understanding the cause of abuse is as great as knowing how to cope with the problem, says Dorothy Taylor, family life education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

With more than 162,000 children in Texas battered or mistreated emotionally this past year, the need for child abuse and neglect awareness grows more critical, the specialist explains.

ABUSER'S MENTAL HEALTH

Mental health of the abuser is a factor in child maltreatment. Some factors affecting mental health and linked to abuse include alcoholism, disturbance in eating and sleeping, and depression.

The most common trait among abusers is role reversal—when the parent wants the child to love him and support his needs rather than the parent giving nurturance to the child, Miss Taylor points out.

"Therefore, when the child cannot meet the parent's expectations and the child's inability to walk, talk or control his bowels or bladder may further antagonize abuser's reaction.

"The irrational parent cannot accept the child as a child's level and expects adult behavior. This frustration leads to a total loss of self control," she says.

HOMELIFE

Abuse relates to home situations, too. No matter how little or how much money the family has, when too much stress or pressure is present, violence will likely occur, the specialist reports.

Money shortage, unemployment, lack of or loss of power or status are traits often found in child abusers.

In addition, research reports child abusers exhibit isolation or less involvement in the community and neighborhood.

Also, abusive families tend to be larger than non-

abusive ones.

Discord, disorganized household, marital quarrels and fewer systematic routines are other typical traits of families that abuse, she continues.

CHILD'S PART

In addition to mental health and homelife, researchers recognize that children can influence the behavior of their parents and may contribute to the maltreatment.

Abused children tend to be "different" from their brothers and sisters, Miss Taylor indicates.

"Parents of abused children often describe the abused child as 'whiny, fussy, lazy, always crying, demanding, stubborn, sullen, pale, sickly,

weak, fretful, panicky and unsmiling."

For instance, no response or no tears for a spanking could threaten a parent's discipline or even abuse, she explains.

DPS Concerned Over Wrecks

AUSTIN—The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety today expressed "serious concern" over the state's rising traffic death toll and increasing rate of violent crime.

Colonel William F. Speer said the trends are "symptomatic of the rapid population growth experienced in Texas during the last few years."

The DPS director observed that traffic deaths on city streets and highways of Texas are 11 per cent higher than at the same time in 1977.

"In the same time period, we will for the first time kill over 4,000 people on Texas roads in a single year," he said.

The all-time traffic death record was 3,698 killed in 1977. Deaths previously peaked at 3,692 in 1973.

Best Buys This Week

COLLEGE STATION consumers can expect a slight drop in meat prices for the rest of the year, Mrs. Gwen Collins, livestock evaluator marketing information specialist, predicts.

Small declines in meat prices are forecast due to seasonally larger pork and poultry supplies, she says.

Mrs. Clyatt is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

According to Mrs. Clyatt, this week's price-quality

trends at Texas grocery markets include the following:

POULTRY—Eggs and fryer chickens are two excellent protein foods at low prices, although egg prices are up slightly, and medium-size usually offers the best buy.

BEFF—More specials are the trend items with the most attractive price tags are chuck steaks, and steaks, round steaks, boneless roasts, and liver.

PORK—Supplies are increasing, but prices are rather

irregular. Look for feature prices on smoked cuts such as hams and bacon. Also, consider fresh cuts such as quarter loin cut into chops, Boston butt roasts and liver.

VEGETABLES—Several items are worthy of consideration price-wise and quality-wise. They include potatoes and onions, carrots, corn, cucumbers, squash and mustard greens. Also, head lettuce and bell peppers.

Sweet potato quality is good, but buy only enough for a week or 10 days.

Cauliflower is on the market, but it has relatively high first-of-the-season prices.

FRESH FRUITS—Fruites highlight some fruit counters, but their short season will be over soon.

Shop carefully for other fruits since price levels vary.

GROCERY MARKET AISLES—Leading features include tuna fish, soups, peanut butter and macaroni. Watch dry bean prices, especially pinto cans, in heavy supply.

CONSUMER WATCHWORDS—Label information does little good if consumers ignore it.

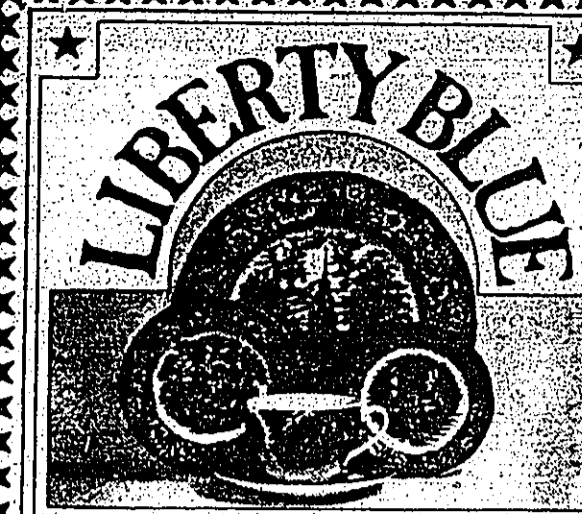

interested citizens who own land. Much is being said about what it will do to the public schools if this is passed. This measure will not cut funding to the schools because the Texas Legislature has made arrangements for the state to replace those moneys that might be lost due to the reduced tax on farm and ranch land. We should make it our business to see that this bill is well supported and passed; letting our representative know our feeling on the matter.

The Texas Farm Bureau supports our public schools 100% but we want to see our farmers and ranchers survive and we cannot survive with continuing increase in the tax burden. We recommend that the best possible balance of efficiency and economy be maintained in our school system with primary control in the hands of local school districts. The primary emphasis in curriculum should be on teaching basic academic skills and subject matter, including

our Constitution, Bill of Rights and the free enterprise system. Strict discipline should be enforced and strong moral and spiritual values should be stressed in every subject. Moneys for pay increases for teachers should come from an appropriation from The State funds so that local school districts who have no say in the pay increase, will not have to raise part of the money by raising property tax to take care of the increase.

White House Fellowships Offered

Dry Weather Hurts Texas Pecan Crop

COLLEGE STATION—Texas size pecans will be harder to find this fall because of the severe dry weather that has plagued the state since last summer.

Although this year's crop will be short and nuts will generally be small, the quality of pecans will be high, points out B.G. Hancock, horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Texas pecan growers are estimating a crop in the neighborhood of 25 to 26 million pounds, down sharply from average production of about 40 million pounds. The nation's crop is estimated at 170 to 180 million pounds, also down from an average of about 200 million pounds.

Texas is the largest producer of native pecans and ranks second nationally to Georgia in total pecan production. This year's crop endured many adversities as far as weather conditions are concerned, notes Hancock. The cycle began with the dry summer of 1977, followed by a cold winter, and continued with an extremely dry spring and summer this year.

According to the horticulturist, pecan trees were under stress late last year due to lack of moisture. Then the unusually cold winter followed by a late spring caused trees to be two to three weeks late in leafing out and setting nuts. Continued dry weather this spring and summer is resulting in a lighter crop and smaller nuts.

"Of course, there is still a little time for good rains to

help in nut development," points out Hancock. "In addition, moisture is also critical to keep trees in vigorous condition for the 1979 crop."

The late spring and lack of tree vigor due to dry conditions also opened the door for severe damage from the crop's most destructive insect pest, the pecan nut casebearer. Casebearer damage was heavy in many areas, particularly where timely sprays were not applied.

Looking over the state, Hancock gives this view of the pecan crop. "Best prospects are in the irrigated west—the El Paso Valley, the Trans-Pecos area and the White Garden. Production in these areas is all on planted, irrigated orchards. The crop in South Central Texas and the Gulf Coast region will be light, with only good crops where orchards were managed properly. Pecan production in the Hill Country will also be down due to the dry weather. The crop suffered most from dry conditions in the West-Cross Texas and North-Central Texas. The severe dry weather in these regions actually caused some tree damage and therefore will have a long-lasting effect on pecan production."

According to the horticulturist, most production this year will come from improved pecan varieties grown under good management. Production from native trees will be down sharply.

"Despite the shorter crop, good quality Texas pecans will still be available to the public this fall," assures Hancock.

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World Series

Baseball's classic, the 1978 World Series, will be broadcast on NBC for the 51st year, beginning Tuesday, Oct. 10 on NBC stations.

The first of a possible seven games between the American and National League pennant winners will be a night match in the stadium of the National League Champion.

NBC's play-by-play announcers will be Joe Garagiola and Tony Kubek. NBC veteran sportscaster Curt Gowdy will host the pre-game segments. Garagiola comes to the World Series with nine years of experience. He was a catcher with St. Louis Cardinals from 1946 to 1954. Tony Kubek also spent nine years in the professional ballparks. He was the New York Yankees shortstop from 1957 to 1965 and played on the all-star team three times.

The prime-time opener is expected to attract an audience of 57,670,000 viewers according to the NBC Research estimates. Game Two, set for Wednesday evening Oct. 11, and Game Three, for which the scene will shift to the park of the American League champ, Friday night Oct. 13, also have projected audience estimates of 57,670,000.

Daytime coverage of Game Four Saturday, Oct. 14, will have an estimated viewing audience of 51,550,000 while Game Five (if necessary) Sunday afternoon Oct. 15, will be viewed by a projected audience of 50,940,000.

The high drama and excitement of game six and game seven (if necessary) set for prime time in the park of the National League champ, will attract the largest viewing audiences. Game Six will be witnessed by an estimated 55,250,000 total viewers while Game Seven is expected to draw an American television viewing audience of 72,000,000.

Last year, the series was decided after six games when the New York Yankees wrested their fourth win from the Los Angeles Dodgers. The sixth game was a real thriller. Los Angeles batted four runners home, but they couldn't keep up with Reggie Jackson's three home runs. The Yankees took it 8-4.

The presentation of World Series action in prime time has been extremely popular among TV sports fans. The first time a World Series game was televised in prime time -- Game Four of the 1971 fall classic between the Pittsburgh Pirates and the Baltimore Orioles -- it was seen by over 56,000,000 viewers.

In 1972, the first year of extended prime-time coverage, two night contests between the Cincinnati Reds and Oakland A's attracted an average of over 52,000,000 viewers.

Ronnie Milsap at Country Music Jamboree

"Rhinestones will be alive and well," jokes Ronnie Milsap about the special magic the Country Music Awards bring to Nashville, Tenn., each year. Ronnie has good reason to know -- last year he won three of the awards: Entertainer of the Year, Male Vocalist of the Year and Album of the Year. When CBS broadcasts the 1978 Country Music Awards on Monday, Oct. 9, Ronnie will be up for the same three trophies.

Relaxing in a New York hotel room, Ronnie was reluctant to discuss his contention for the three awards. He had performed at the prestigious Bottom Line, a Greenwich Village club, the night before and was setting out for an outdoor fair in Rutland, Vt., next.

Dressed in jeans, an embroidered jean jacket and his omnipresent dark glasses, he admits his 31 m, "It Was Almost Like a Song," is among the five nominations for Album of the Year. However, when pressed as to what he thinks his chances for winning are he answers, "I'm not campaigning. I'm happy to be in country music, grateful to be part of something I love."

Ronnie doesn't have much respect for awards it seems. He claims all his trophies from last year are home on a shelf, then jokes about his Grammy Award. "My first Grammy broke, so I sent it back. The second one broke, too. It wasn't until the third one that I got the doggone thing."

Ronnie's sense of humor may interfere with his respect for trophies, but it certainly doesn't quell his enthusiasm for the upcoming award ceremony.

"It's the biggest country event because of the worldwide exposure," he says. "The Country Music Awards show every year its special because it's live TV. It's the only time you see the crew at Opryland hustle, the rest of the year..." and Ronnie chuckles out the end of his thought.

Since the show is live, Ronnie can't be specific about just what he'll do. However, he's met in Hollywood with the producer, Bob Frecht, to map out his acts.

"I'll open the show with 'I Got the Music in Me' from a country aspect," he reveals. "The 'Me' will be changed to 'Us,' and Ronnie will introduce the host,

Johnny Cash, the guest stars and the nominees. He continues, "I'll be appearing with Johnny in various spots." When it comes time to turn over his three awards from last year to this year's winners, he "probably will present them to the entertainers."

It's quite likely that Ronnie will be holding on to those awards.

Born in Robbinsville, North Carolina, near the Tennessee-Carolina border, Milsap was blind from birth. At the age of five he was sent to the State School for the Blind in Raleigh and there discovered an aptitude for music. He learned to play most of the keyboard, stringed, percussion and woodwind instruments.

After graduation from high school, Ronnie studied pre-law at Young-Harris Junior College in Atlanta, planning for law school at Emory University where he had been granted a full scholarship. His love for music won out over a legal career, though, and Ronnie stayed on in Atlanta, picking up jobs as a sideman.

After college Ronnie had a hit rhythm and blues single, "Never Had It So Good," but later songs flopped. Ronnie would wait a good long time for success.

He played a Memphis club for several years before he decided to go country and moved to Nashville. In April, 1973, Ronnie signed a recording contract with RCA Records. His first release was "I Hate You," which was followed up by "The Girl That Waits on Tables," "Pure Love," "Please Don't Tell Me How the Story Ends" and "Lengends in My Time." In just two years, Ronnie received the award for "Male Vocalist of the Year."

Ronnie's rough ride up the road to success makes him an ideal spokesman for the Country Music Association.

Last year's big winner confides, "I love getting dressed up." Country singers may be big on jeans, but not Ronnie. For the Country Music Awards "I'll be wearing a black tuxedo of stretch satin with lace. It's wild and crazy."

Ronnie settles back and draws with his mellow voice, "Let's of fans get to see their idols on TV, prime-time, from a first class facility in Nashville. It's going to be the best Country Music presentation."

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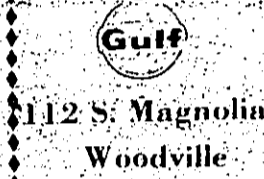

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Return of America's Favorite French Chef

I had lunch with Julia Child today, but she didn't cook it. Instead, America's favorite French chef was in New York City to promote her new PBS series, "The French Chef" which premiered on Saturday, Oct. 7 and will run for 13 weeks.

It's been five years since "The French Chef" went into reruns. Julia has spent those five years "writing a new book, 'From Julia Child's Kitchen,' cooking, doing free-lance writing, doing cooking demonstrations for charities and picking up the pieces after all those years of TV."

She also admits that she needed a chance to rest from her TV work.

However, she's done with resting and back with a new series and an accompanying book, both entitled "Julia Child and Company."

Unlike her "French Chef" series, "Julia Child and Company" will feature whole menus instead of individual recipes.

Julia can pinpoint one reason for her return, "I just thought it would be fun to do."

She concluded her "French Chef" series because she felt she had said everything there was to say. But with the new menu format, Julia also has new material. And, she's never at a loss for words.

She comments, "It's nice to have a change. You're not cooking in limbo, each recipe is a part of the orchestration of a whole meal. We suggest the menu, but can only do two of three highlights on each episode."

The 13 shows are based on the solutions to 13 cooking problems: How to throw a low-calorie banquet without anyone catching on; what to serve to 19 guests when you are both cook and butler; if it should rain, how to move a barbeque indoors.

French cooking is the backbone of good cooking, but "people get scared off by French titles," Julia claims. She gives the recipes American names, then adds the French title.

Cooking has changed in the past five years. "Julia Child and Company" will reflect those changes. One major revolution is the food processor.

"A food processor is a normal part of anyone's kitchen," Julia maintains. "It's the most important kitchen invention since the electric mixer." For Julia, anything that makes cooking faster and easier is a must.

"People are tremendously interested in food now," she continues. "They have kitchens that really work. Plus, public food gets worse and worse." There's a need for

good home cooking.

Moreover, the revolution in French cooking "La Nouvelle Cuisine" leaves chefs free to create dishes of their own instead of recipes from 75 years ago. This has led to ridiculous extremes - cow's udders and oysters. Then there's 'Cuisine Mincure,' diet cooking, French cooking did need modernizing. People are watching their diets, especially tourists."

Julia incorporates her own inventions and American twists into her 13 menus. "Americans," she insists, "were not tradition-minded like the French. We've always acted this way - combining French, Spanish or English cooking. We're free to invent. However, the corned beef and the fish-cowder are very American in approach."

Some of Julia's featured inventions are Los Gatos Gateaux, a cake of apricots and meringue, and a beautiful new chocolate cake that's a cross between a cake and a mousse.

If the new series is more spritely than "The French Chef," it's because "Julia Child and Company" has a slightly larger budget to work with. Julia's first



shows were shot in one taping. And if Julia made any mistakes, it was just too bad, the episode couldn't be edited. As a result, Julia's slap-dash cooking escapades endeared her to countless at-home cooks who also dropped ingredients on the floor or broke the wine glasses.

In "Julia Child and Company," the cook still ad libs through the recipes. However, she does have an editing option. The episodes can be cut and shot over if disaster strikes.

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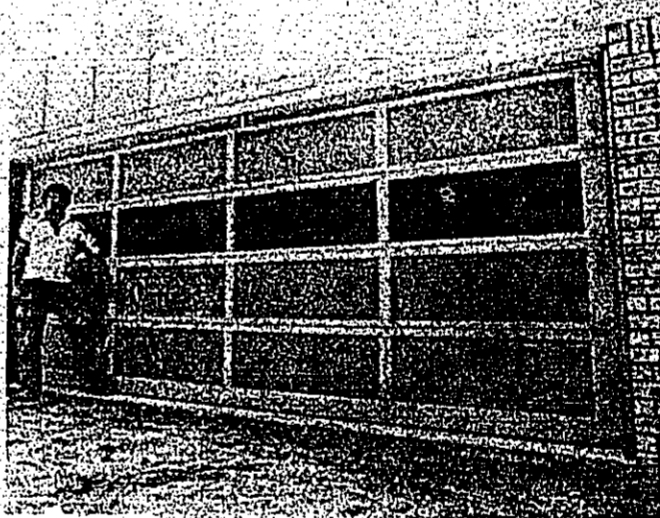
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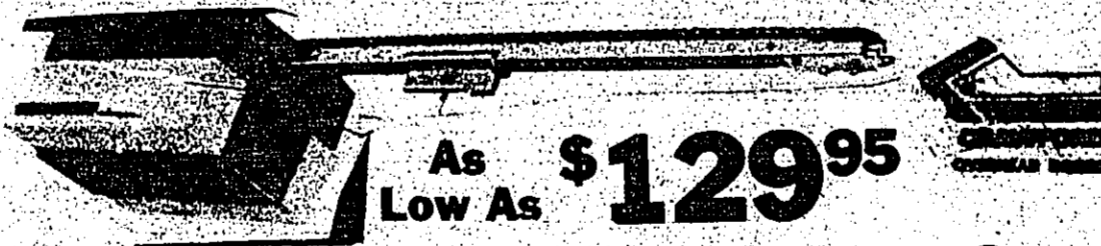
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
