## New Post Office Soon In Woodville

Woodville Postmaster Bruce Latiolais informed the Woodville City Council Monday night that the U.S. Postal Service has plans to build a new, larger modern facility here. Latiolais predicted that construction would start as soon as Feb. 1, 1979.

### Highway Bids To Be Opened

AUSTIN—Bids will be opened October 18 for the resurfacing of highways in eight Southeast Texas Counties by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. The work will provide a seal and new surface on existing roadways. C.B. Bond of Orange, the department's engineer in charge of the project, said the work will prevent further damage to the road base from the effects of weather. The application of a seal coat also helps improve the safety characteristics of the highway.

"This will be your post office," the postmaster said. "And it will be one you can be proud of." Latiolais said he came to the council as part of a "community contact" phase of the Federal Real Estate Board requirement prior to construction of such a facility. Latiolais said he wanted to get input and comment from the Woodville city fathers as to where the location for the new facility should be. Latiolais said the U.S. Postal recommendation was for the new facility to be located somewhere on a north-south line either side of Hwy. 69 remaining inside the city limits. Latiolais heard requests from the council asking that the post office consider areas on either side of Hwy. 190 also as they plan the facility. He said ideas to that effect will be put into the plan.

The work will be on highways in Liberty, Chambers, Jefferson, Hardin, Tyler, Jasper, Newton and Orange Counties, Beaumont District Engineer Franklin Young said. (continued on Page 3-A)

## Police Chief Resigns

Woodville Chief of Police Gary Mattingly has resigned, effective October 20, to take a similar position with the Rosenberg Police Department.

Mattingly was chosen over 10 other applicants for the job in the 25,000 citizen city, west of Houston. A graduate of the FBI National Academy, Mattingly was Chief of Police in Woodville for over five years, taking the reins in February 1973. Before that he was with the Atlanta, Georgia, police department for six years.

He said the move would present him with "A much greater challenge. I will do more of a police management type job. I had no reason to leave, but I thought about it awhile and decided to take it."

He hadn't been looking for a job he said, and found out about the opening from his daughter who works with the Bellaire Police Department. In Rosenberg, he will oversee 35 full-time employees. "I enjoyed working in the city of Woodville, and I feel like I made a lot of friends here. I really love the people here. They are the nicest I have ever been around. I have never been treated as nicely as the city council and mayor here have treated me," he said. "I couldn't ask to work with any better group of people than this one. I know I'll miss the association with Walt Davis, the city manager and the city council. I have enjoyed working with the other law enforcement officials and the people in the police department." ## Chief Vacancy May Be Filled In One Month Says Mayor

Woodville will probably have a new police chief within a month, according to Mayor Terry Watts. Presently, Chief of Police Gary Mattingly is leaving October 20 for a similar position in Rosenberg, Texas. Watts said the city will send out notices of a vacancy and then take applications for the position. He said they might keep a local officer as chief or hire someone from outside the community. He said he hopes to have the process completed within a month, and until that time he has appointed Jay Cruise temporary chief of police.

## Commissioners OK 1979 Budget

County taxes for residents of Tyler County will increase in 1979 by approximately 12.5 percent. The increase was approved for the proposed 1979 county budget, by the Commissioners Court at their meeting October 9.

County Auditor Ann Fondren said the total county-wide ad valorem tax rate will be \$1.24 per \$100 property evaluation. The 1978 rate was \$1.38. The ratio of assessment was increased from 28 percent to 35 percent a 25 percent increase. To lower the overall cost to taxpayers to about 12.5 percent, the rate was lowered. Fondren said the increase in taxes is necessary due to inflation that has increased the cost of supplies and contractual services and the increased cost of new jail personnel. The court also accepted a new set of specifications for platts and roads in Tyler County. The specifications will be required if all platts filed for record with the district clerk. And Nan is looking at me all this time, convinced I'd lost my marbles. But wouldn't you all agree that twenty years of marriage is worth some little recognition?

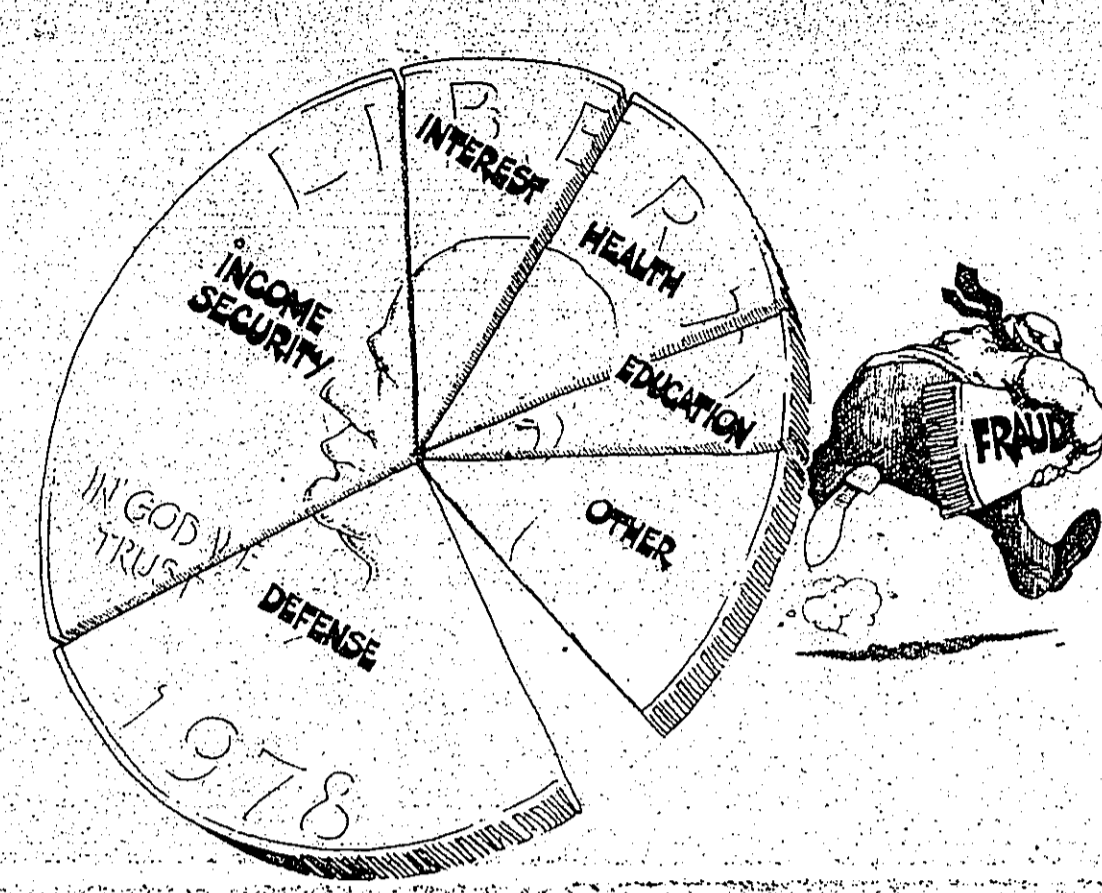

## WHERE'S YOUR FEDERAL TAX DOLLAR GOES



## Anthony Harrigan SENSING THE NEWS

The attention being lavished on tax limitation should also be devoted to curbing the federal spending spree.

Alan Reynolds, economist for the First National Bank of Chicago, reminds us of that basic truth in a recent issue of *Fortune Magazine*. Warning that the federal deficit will be \$61.4 billion for fiscal 1979, Mr. Reynolds states that "The harsh arithmetic suggests that the only effective way to cut both taxes and the deficit is to greatly and promptly reduce federal spending, which is otherwise due to climb 23 percent in just two years."

Mr. Reynolds' splendid article is a commendable prescription that is much needed at a time when all the attention is on tax limitation while government expenditures or more or less

The prudent conservation position is to reduce spending as taxes are limited. Any other course is a gamble. Mr. Reynolds offers five basic rules of budgetary restraint. He calculates that if these rules are followed, the Congress could eliminate \$51.4 billion worth of spending programs.

The five rules are:

1. Eliminate or reduce subsidies. He points out, for example, that consumers pay for farm subsidies in both higher taxes and higher interest rates.
2. Eliminate "temporary" programs that no longer serve their purpose. An example is a program in the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act, originally due to expire this year. "Financing CETA jobs," Mr. Reynolds says, "through borrowed or printed money tends to dis-

## Notes From An Oldtimer

**Dear Lute,**  
Do you remember that whiz of a math teacher we had in high school, Monroe Tolar? I have something to tell you about that man you wouldn't believe! You probably thought his heart was an isosceles triangle, and his whole system worked on ratios and proportions.

**Wrong!** While he was flapping that yardstick against the blackboard trying to pound trigonometry and mental arithmetic through our thick skulls, old Erato herself was leading him around by the nose and filling his mind with all sorts of fantasies. Our math teacher was writing poetry on the fly!

A "furriner" yourself, an immigrant from Hardin County, you likely didn't realize the Tolars were one of Tyler County's old pioneer families. You may not remember the old Tolar farm out from Hillister. Clyde Gray has the log cabin from that farm in his Heritage Garden. It was built by Monroe's grandfather, Robert Tolar, in 1867. The Tolars lived in it until their home was built and broken down for their kitchen. Monroe's father, Calvin Tolar, was born in that cabin in 1875. Monroe himself spent many a night sleeping on a pallet there. Two of his spinsters, Betty and Sarah Tolar, cooked on the fireplace in that cabin.

Of course you remember the Best girls, Willy, Lily, and Gertrude? Their mother was Monroe's Aunt Lou Tolar.

In December, 1920, Monroe took the State examination in 27 subjects to get his first-grade certificate and in January, 1921, he started teaching just before he turned 19. He took Gladys York as his first wife, and she and Bobby Pennington were married that Christmas.

As you recall, Monroe Tolar came to Woodville to teach math in the fall of '26. He never took off from teaching to go to college during that time. He went to Stephen F. Austin in the summer, and took extension courses at home during the winter.

After serving as principal for seven of his nine years here, Monroe left Woodville in 1935 to go to The University of Texas where in thirteen and one-half months he got his B.A. degree and did all the work for his Master's except his thesis which he completed later. He taught at the College of Marshall and helped get the Baptist University started in Corpus Christi and taught in Beaumont High School. All this time he was teaching math, math, math.

To finish out his Texas State teacher retirement, he came back to Warren and was principal of the high school there. Heretofore there in 1967.

How many of his students ever suspected he was such a romantic soul that he would write love poems and write poems singing praise of people and commemorating events? Here's the shocker: he has just published a book, his third, and the title itself is a string of genius, "Aftermath." Think about that - "Aftermath," "Aftermath" really has something for everybody. I personally prefer the singing, lilted kind of poetry he reached his peak in "When They Ring the Wedding Bells." That's my favorite.

There is one very telling prose piece, a memorial to an old friend of ours, Dr. Watt Barclay.

Of their three sons two are teachers like their dad. Billy got his M.A. degree and teaches physics in Fort Arthur. The youngest, Robert, got his Ph.D. and teaches at the University of Northern Colorado at Greeley. He, however, makes more money as a singer and professional entertainer than he does as a teacher but teaching is in his blood. Their oldest, George Weston, chose a business career.

Isn't Monroe's a wonderful way to spend his retirement years, those years after math?

### STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

The House Education Committee recommended a revision of a Texas presidential preference primary law, which expired by its own terms after single use in 1976.

Democrats are divided on the issue. Many conservatives in the legislature fear the primary would draw conservative voters to the Republican voting boxes at presidential candidates like Ronald Reagan, Jim Connally or George Bush. Cross-over, they reason, would increase the strength of liberals.

But many liberals have turned against the idea of a presidential primary, preferring the old convention system of naming delegates to national party conventions. Some liberals argue national party rules avoid primary states to avoid major proportional representation requirements.

Democratic gubernatorial nominee John Hill has come out firmly for a primary, however, and said he expects the legislature to approve one of some type of Democratic convention barely mentioned in the issue, and tossed it to the state party's executive committee for study and recommendations.

GOP State Chairman Ray Barnhill also recommended a compromise recommendation "hypocrisy" aimed at misleading the people.

Stamps Changed

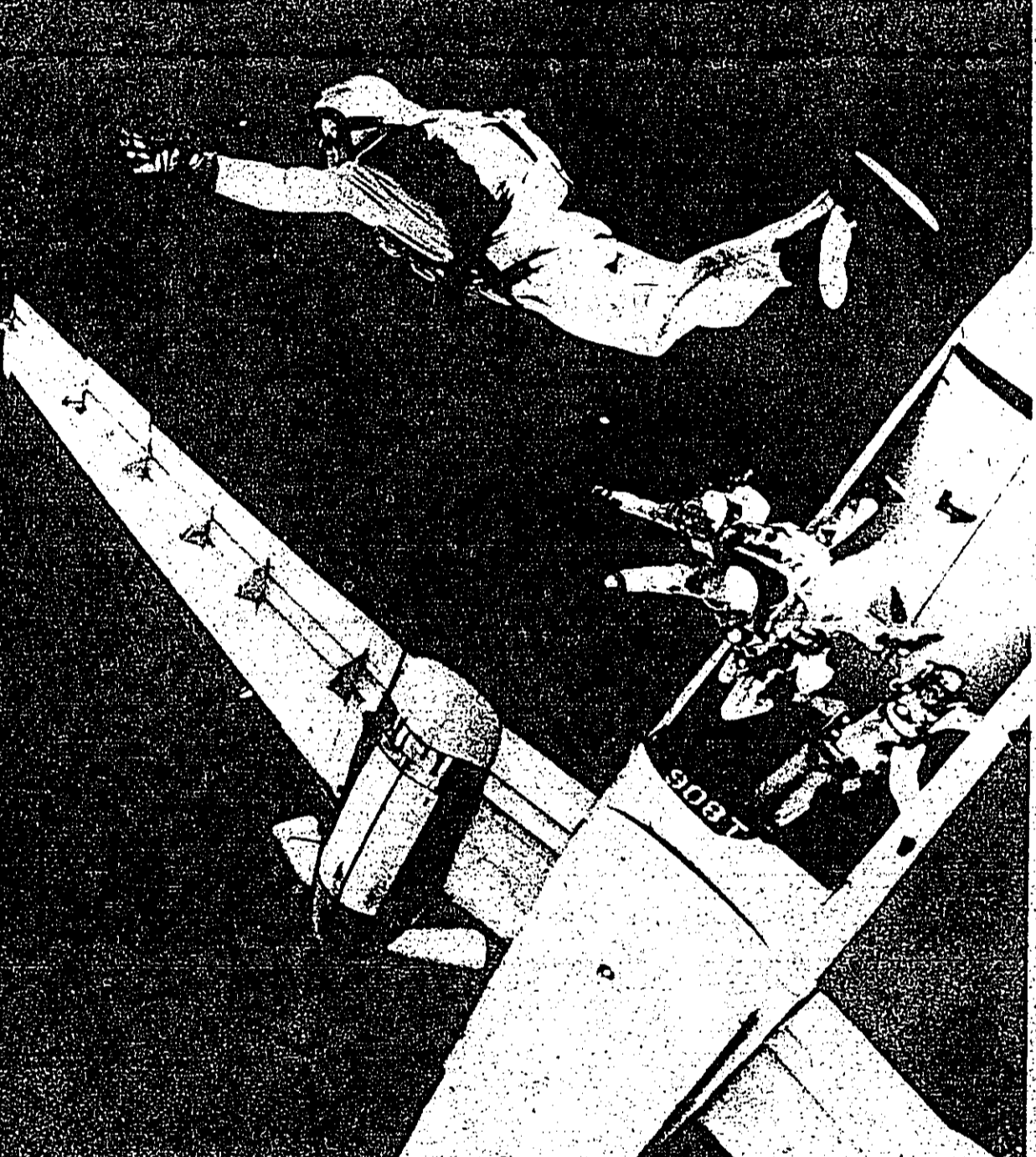

### MH-MR Offers Services

The Tyler County Outpatient Clinic, 1014A Pecan Street, Woodville, is one of five mental health facilities operated by the West Texas Regional MHMR Services.

Sandy Skelton, Director of the Outpatient Clinics, said the clinics are located throughout the 13 county region to provide area residents with mental health care in their own communities.

"If a person needs the care offered by Rusk State Hospital," Skelton said, "but if the care needed can be offered locally, we provide that service."

The service to a client begins with an intake and evaluation procedure that develops information on the problem a client may have and the client's background. Skelton said the most common problem is depression or anxiety, some caused by specific situations such as strained parent-child relations and marital problems that result in extra stress at the particular time.

After the problem has been determined an assessment is made as to what is needed, Skelton said.

He said there are several services available including general counseling, individual or group of family counseling. Some persons require medication only and other require both medication and counseling.

Skelton said the services are provided by professionals including psychiatrists, psychologists, nurses, social workers and case workers. The person needing care will be directed to the staff member who can best provide for the needs of that individual.

Skelton said no one is turned away or denied treatment because of lack of money. The payment schedule is based on a sliding scale figured on the income and number of people in the family.

Other services offered by the outpatient clinics are evaluations for court proceedings and for other agencies. A function of the agency is the education of the public to recognize emotional problems and to be familiar with the help that is available through MHMR.

"There are still many people we can help," Skelton said, "who have a problem but are not aware of our services. Other people who are in need of our services misunderstand our services or are not motivated to seek help."

"The national average for emotional problems is 10 percent of the population. The population of the 13 counties area according to the 1975 census figures is 273,000. We conduct workshops and make personal appearances in an effort to help people recognize problems at the early stages," Skelton said. "If we can begin to treat the problems early, then they will not be as difficult to treat when they become more serious," he added.

### Farmers Nominate Candidates

Farmers are asked to nominate candidates of their choice to be on the Tyler County ASC Committee. Harry Stafford, chairperson of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee.

The Tyler County ASC Committee election will be conducted from November 24 to December 4 by mail ballot. ASC committees are responsible for managing government farm programs on the local level. To meet the needs of individual producers, ASC committee members must be concerned and responsible individuals, Mr. Stafford said.

Mr. Stafford said, Tyler county farmers have the opportunity to nominate persons they feel would best serve the farm community. Farmers who have received petitions forms by mail and are now submitting them to the County ASC Office.

A few basic considerations should be kept in mind when circulating petitions, Mr. Stafford said. In order to be valid, petitions must be limited to one nominee each, must include written certification that the nominee is willing to serve if elected, must be signed by at least three eligible farm voters in the ASC community, and should be received in the County ASC Office no later than October 30.

A farmer may circulate or sign nominating petitions for as many candidates as he chooses. Anyone wishing to nominate a farmer for the ASC Committee Election may contact the County ASC Office for full details, including eligibility requirements for officeholders.

Mr. Stafford believes that farmer nominations of candidates for the upcoming ASC Committee Election are very important. He said, "Farmers should petition for and elect those individuals they feel would do a good job as ASC Committee members. The election of concerned farmers to positions on ASC Committees is necessary for good administration of farm programs."

Mr. Stafford further explained that the County ASC Office welcomes all valid petitions. The opportunity to nominate one and be elected to office is guaranteed to all farmers regardless of race, religion, sex, color, or national origin.

## Emergency Feed Help Available

The Tyler County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service is currently offering an Emergency Feed Program (EFP).

Due to the drought this summer, many livestock owners have suffered a loss in their pasture production and/or hay production. A loss of 40% or more of pasture and/or hay production could mean a livestock owner would be eligible for the program.

To be eligible for EFP assistance, a livestock owner must have suffered at least a 40% loss in hay or pasture production of what he normally produces, not have sufficient feed for eligible livestock for the feeding period, and have made feed purchases in quantities larger than normal.

Hay production loss of 40 percent or more can be easily computed after you have completed your last cutting of hay for the year.

Pasture loss can be applied for now if your pastures are 40 percent or more below normal, and you have started feeding about what you normally feed this time of the year.

Assistance for EFP is 50 percent of the cost of the feed purchased not to exceed .02¢ per pound grain equivalent.

If you are a livestock producer and feel you meet eligible requirements for EFP, contact the ASCS office for further details.

**Prevent Disease Of Lungs**

Preventing and treating lung disease in children is important. Because lung disease can last a lifetime, says the American Lung Association.

"Any disease that occurs early in life may inhibit growth and damage the lungs permanently," says Dr. Lynn Tausig, associate professor of pediatrics at the University of Arizona Health Sciences Center. Dr. Tausig points to studies that show a relationship between lower respiratory tract illness in early life and chronic lung disease in adulthood. Contributing factors in childhood diseases include: air pollution; smoking, including exposure to secondhand smoke; social factors; genetic factors; infections; and asthma.

One study of 1,000 newborns and their families showed that at age 20 the prevalence of chronic cough was nearly double for those with a history of one or more lower respiratory tract illnesses prior to age two. The study focused only on those who had never smoked.

According to Dr. Tausig, preliminary results of a study at the University of Arizona indicate that children with a history of such diseases as group and pneumonia later develop abnormal lung function; nearly 100 percent also showed "exercise-induced bronchial reactivity," which involves a constriction of the air passages of the lungs during exercise. Dr. Tausig's study is attempting to find out whether or not this group of children will develop chronic disease as adults.

One recent study has shown that the rate of hospitalizations for pneumonia and bronchitis was nearly 50 percent higher among infants of mothers who smoked; this it was among infants of nonsmoking mothers.

**Browsing With Belinda**

Before shopping for a new refrigerator, do some planning. Start planning now—sales during the next several weeks may offer the lowest prices during the year.

First, look to the future. A typical family will keep its refrigerator 15 years—some determine what the family's future needs will be. Consider the number of young children and teenagers or whether no children will be in the home during the next 15 years. Also, consider food storage needs—frequent shopping means less capacity is needed. In addition, a large freezer compartment is less important if the family has a separate freezer. Next, decide on what features are needed.

Remember, more gadgets add to the initial costs and to potential repair problems.

**SIZE, TYPE**

Size and type are the first features to decide on. Conventional refrigerators are available in nine to 14 foot capacities. These single-door units have a small section for freezing ice cubes and short term storage of frozen foods. The freezer will require defrosting every two to three weeks or before frost deposit is one-fourth inch. Two-door refrigerators with a top or bottom freezer compartment are available in 12 to 22 cubic foot capacities. They come with semi-automatic defrost or automatic defrost freezer compartments. Most two-door semi-automatic defrost units are no larger than 13 to 15 cubic feet and will require defrosting before the frost is one-fourth inch deep.

Side-by-side models offer two doors the full length of the appliance and come in 17 to 25 cubic foot capacities. The newest side-by-side models feature two freezer doors opposite the refrigerator door.

These refrigerators usually offer more freezer space and are only available with no-frost freezers.

- Automatic ice-maker.
- Hot and cold water dispenser on the door.
- Adjustable shelves and half shelves.
- Storage bins of various types and sizes.

**Family Violence Under Study**

"Family Violence" society is talking about it, especially for the first time in the history of modern man, and perhaps that is a first step in coping with it.

Family violence is a growing concern in Texas and the rest of the nation, with more cases of child neglect and abuse and battered spouses—reported daily.

In open dialogue about the problem, the most frequent question is "why" and the answer has two parts.

Family violence appears to have two major causes or conditions.

First, violence is an adaptation or response to stress.

Also, violence is learned.

When an adult cannot cope with excessive role expectations—or can't express feelings about pressure, then violence may be the only outlet he or she knows to relieve pent-up frustrations.

Also, if an individual learns that violence is an "appropriate" behavior for frustration or anger, then that person may abuse his children, beat his spouse or react in a violent manner to any stress.

Looking at the nature of family violence, it touches all social classes and family classes. None is exempt from stress situations or violence. Violence can be a one-time outbreak or can be a weekly or daily occurrence in families.

Victims and offenders may be the same family members each time, or different incidents may produce different aggressors and victims in a family.

Violence among family members is less likely outside the home or when bystanders are present or when other avenues of escape from conflict is available.

Any family who is willing to openly communicate about violence has taken the first step in coping with the problem, because they have recognized it as a problem.

## A & M Suggests Helpful Hints On Writing A Resume

**COLLEGE STATION**—Writing a resume can unfold hidden talents, especially for "off-to-work" mothers, says a home economist. As mothers and homemakers, these women have acquired a number of valuable skills—often those that employers consider the most important, says Linda McCormack. They include responsibility, discipline, organization and planning skills and ingenuity, she adds. Mrs. McCormack is a family resource management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

**TALENT OUTLINE**—Before actually writing a resume, outline talents and experiences first. List special areas of expertise and special "likes."

Include such activities as money raising, extensive entertaining for husband's business interests, leadership of various groups, or organization of others.

**TYPING A RESUME**—Type a resume on standard 8 1/2 x 11-inch paper, usually white bondpaper—or a beige or gray—with, perhaps, a slight texture. If it really "adds something" and shows good taste. For most people, a resume should fit on one page.

Type name and address at the top of the page, centered, so a paper clip cannot hide it. Include age and

marital status opposite the name and address, if desired. Next include four headings: experience, education (or education and training), interests and aptitudes, and references.

**EXPERIENCE**—Under this heading, describe activities that involve important skills. For example, list managing money; caring for children; decorating or fund raising. Also, include previous employment.

Then list special skills. For instance, include writing, photography, typing, shorthand, languages, music or graphic arts.

**EDUCATION AND TRAINING**—Include all formal schooling and training, degrees or certificates. List right school courses, scholastic honors, extra-curricular activities, correspondence courses and seminars attended.

**INTERESTS & APTITUDES**—Describe talents and hobbies, including recreational interests, such as sports. Add a paragraph that describes the range of work that seems most suitable—and that would be most appealing.

**REFERENCES**—List all references, personal and professional, or note that they will be furnished on request.

**KEEP RESUME UNDATED**—Finally, remember to keep up-to-date—including each activity that adds a new skill and increased experience—both of interest to prospective employers.

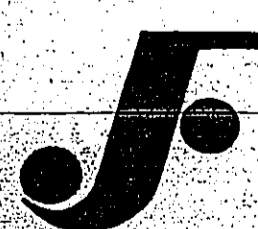

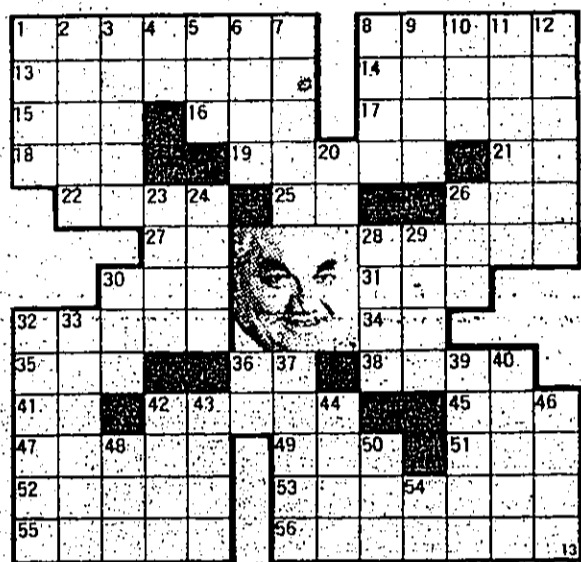

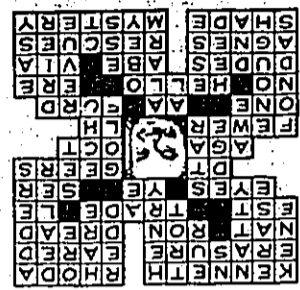

quently married the producer, Leon Isaac Kennedy, and moved to L.A., where Jayne found work as a "Laugh In" dancer for one year and as a Dean Martin singer/dancer for 2 years.

"Last year," she cooed, "things started breaking for me. I did 'Cover Girls,' an NBC Movie of the Week and signed an NBC contract for a year." She also did two more films, "Big Time" and "Death Force," which was directed by her husband, and guest-starred on various TV series.

Bruce Springsteen, the vocalist whose comeback tour has rocked and rolled fans across the U.S. this past summer, tops Ken's list. "We're talking to him now," he explains. He'd like to feature Springsteen in the last of his 12 concert episodes for the 1978 season.

"I want to do The Beach Boys - but they've all got their individual crazinesses... Paul Simon, Randy Newman," he adds. Ken Ehrlich has featured contemporary music's finest in a weekly 60-minute format.

This year, he's enlisted top jazz, country and rock artists - from George Benson to EmmyLou Harris to Pablo Cruise - to bedazzle the series.

"I'd like to do some live shows," Ken insists. "Soundstage" is a series of specials: The episodes have no common factor other than the concert format. It varies. I've never been locked in in anyway."

The former Chicago P.R. man, who spent his 1977 hiatus from "Soundstage" as producer of NBC's "Midnight Special," explains that "Soundstage" grew out of a local show, "Made in Chicago," five years ago.

It was 1974, the first year of the Public Broadcasting stations' cooperative program, and the time was right. "PBS had a high profile with kids because of 'Sesame Street' and 'Zoom' and an older profile because of 'Masterpiece Theater,' but no programming for young adults."

After producing for both public and commercial

television, Ken can appreciate the advantages of public TV. "Soundstage" is uninterrupted instead of trying to be all things to all people," he explains. "We try to key in on a single, or two performers with something more to offer... for instance, why the performer writes."

"Acting writes the series," he continues, "We involve them in the creation. They really feel a part of it, they can sense the involvement."

"Fortunately, the format lends itself to people wanting to do the show," Ken can boast, "I never get a turndown because of show, but because of other reasons - like they don't do TV."

According to Ken, "Soundstage" doesn't really fall into the rock ghetto of late Friday and Saturday night. It's more a variety show than music.

Not rock, but personalities."

To illustrate the show's point of view Ken says, "It combines very popular taste and an eclectic approach in booking." For instance, we do one show with George Benson, Chet Atkins and Earl Klugh. All three are guitarists, but they're coming from different places.

"Another episode features Garland Jeffreys, a New York song-writer, and his idols, Sonny Rollins and Carmen McRae. We develop a person beyond what you'd get from a record or a concert."

For the Garland Jeffreys concert, the "Soundstage" cameras followed Jeffreys as he roamed his favorite New York City haunts. In the Leo Sayer concert - the first of the 1978 season - the cameras follow Sayer to the Maxwell St. Market in Chicago.

Ken prefers public to commercial TV. "As a producer," he explains, "I have greater flexibility and more time to play. Because I started the show it's very close to me. I try to mix popular taste with people I think ought to be seen."

This season, Ken is particularly excited about one episode - the fifth anniversary episode of "Soundstage," which will air Dec. 5.

"It's hosted by Harry Chapin. It's a look back at what the series has been... shows from Judy Collins with Leonard Cohen to Barry Manilow."

Last year, "Soundstage" was stereo simulcast in about 15 cities - including Boston, Chicago, San Francisco, Dallas and Atlanta. This year, PBS has launched its own satellite. A soundtrack will be put directly on the audio and more and more stations be able to distribute the soundtracks to cooperating local radio stations.

"That's going to change everything," Ken insists. "Stereo stores are advertising stereo hook-ups to TV. Within four or five years, music on TV will be a whole different scene." Today, with music in general on TV, the emphasis is not on music, but on video. But with big screens and stereo TV, things will change.

Ken has also done independent music specials for commercial television. He did the Ringo Starr special for NBC last year. This January, he'll produce a UNICEF benefit, again on NBC.

The BeeGees and David Frost will host the UNICEF special. Ken is enlisting 10 different performers to write a song and perform it on the special. All proceeds from the songs will then be donated to UNICEF. It will be taped this December in the General Assembly Hall of the United Nations.

The Bee Gees, the Australian rock 'n' roll group that turned disco to compose the "Saturday Night Fever" soundtrack, then flipped back to rock for "Sgt. Pepper," will be making a rare TV appearance this January. Barry, Robin and Maurice Gibb, along with Dick Cavett, will host a UNICEF benefit taped in the General Assembly Hall of the United Nations. Although all the acts haven't been signed yet, NBC is enlisting rock artists to write a song for UNICEF, perform it on the special, then donate all the record proceeds to that charity.

All three of the Gibb brothers, Barry (b. Sept. 1946) and twins Robin and Maurice (b. Dec. 1949), are married. Maurice and Barry have homes in Miami, Fla., and Robin has a home in England. However, all three spend a lot of time together recording in Florida. Write them in care of their recording company, RSO Records, 1775 Broadway, New York, N.Y. 10019.

## Action & Adventure

Falling into a neck-deep mud hole or avoiding the lethal hit of a spitting cobra is not anyone's idea of the good life," but it's all in a day's work for the crew of "Studio See," public television's exciting Saturday magazine for family viewing.

Producer Jayne Adair created this lively series three years ago at the South Carolina Educational Television Network with the purpose of providing an action-packed program with interest for the entire family.

"The Saturday morning cartoon block is a ghetto that isolates kid viewers from the rest of the

family," claims Adair, who believes successful programming for children should be more varied than the present commercial-schedule.

"Kids are the most challenging audience the media has today. They are so media-wise that they won't spend their time watching anything other than the most action-packed, professionally produced shows."

These ideas have produced a series of real life adventures taped on location all over the United States. Features spotlight gutsy subjects like a behind-the-scenes look at television violence, the re-

sponse of a New England community to juvenile delinquency problems, and an ecology trip down the Hudson River on board folk singer Peter Seeger's sloop, The Clearwater.

This sampling of teen interests and activities offers no consistent "star" or program, "host," but focuses attention on the real kids who are the subjects of the feature stories. "This is a grass-roots program," comments Adair. "A 'star' only makes the viewer more aware of the distance between himself and whom- ever he's watching. We are attempting to honestly present a world and people that kids can relate to... people like the viewers themselves."

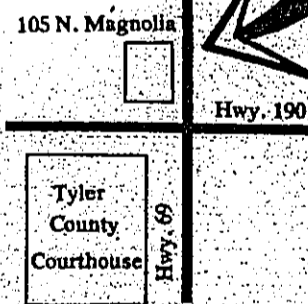
