Colmesneil To Host RC&D Tours

The regular monthly meeting of the executive committee of the Southeast Texas Resource, Conservation and Development Organization (R.C.&D.) will be held at the Colmesneil Community

Center on Wednesday, Oct. 25. Included in the day's activities will be a tour of the Colmesneil School campus to study recent improvements there. The Colmesneil School District received 80% of the

\$50,000 erosion control project from the R.C.&D. Included in the project was the installation of an underground sprinkler system, concrete lined waterway channels, water-control structures and

vegetation. Also contributing funds making possible paved driveways and parking space along the concrete walks was made by the Temple Foundation of Diboll. The whole project was supervised and engineered by the Soil Conservation Service (SCS) and sponsored by the Long Leaf Soil and Water Conservation

District. The meeting is scheduled to begin at 12:30 with a luncheon provided by the Home Demonstration and Colmesneil Service Clubs. Judge Wayne Baker of Polk County will lead the meeting. Serving as vice president is Joe Lagow and as secretary-treasurer is W.S. Edwards, both of Cham-

F. Lee Bailey To Give Address

HUNTSVILLE-F. Lee Bailey, the nationally known attorney, will be one of the keynote speakers at the annual meeting of the Texas Forestry Association here Oct. 19-20.

The 64th annual meeting of the 2,600-member association will be at the Lowman Student Center at Sam Houston State University, with the program getting under way at 9 a.m. on Oct. 19, according to Alan D. Dreessen, area forestry specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Bailey will address the group at a banquet on Oct. 20. The attorney, who has handled such celebrated cases as Patty Hearst, Capt. Ernest Medina, the Boston Strangler, Dr. Carl Coppolina and Dr. Sam Sheppard, will present a talk titled "For the Defense."

Postal Bids Sought Again

SPURGER, TX.—The U.S. Postal Service is again asking for construction bids to build and lease a new post office building at Spurper, Postmaster Mildred B. Ramer said here.

A contract was awarded in July to The Williams

Company of Woodville, Tx; however, the company has defaulted on the contract necessitating a re-advertising for the new post office building.

Bids are to be submitted to Raymond F. Barnes, realty management and acquisition specialist, Dallas Field Real

Estate and Buildings Office U.S. Postal Service, P.O. Drawer 239, Dallas, Tx. 75221.

Bids will be opened at 2:00 p.m., November 2, in Room 523, General Post Office Building, Bryan and Ervay Streets, in Dallas.

The proposed building will have 1,400 sq. ft. of interior floor space. It will be built with private funds and leased to the Postal Service for a basic period of 10 years with renewal options for 20 additional years.

The Postal Service has acquired an option to buy a site for the new post office which will be assigned to the successful bidder.

The site containing approximately 17,000 sq. ft. of land is located on the east side of State Hwy. 92 approximately 2,000 ft. north of FM 1013.

Fire Alert Issued

The Texas Forest Service has issued a high fire danger alert for all of the East Texas Area due to dry conditions that have persisted over the past several weeks, according to George Alders, area forester in the Tyler County TFS office.

These conditions have been brought about by high winds and cool dry temperatures that are not expected to decrease over the next several

weeks," he said. The National Weather Service has predicted in their 30-day long range forecast which extends through the middle of November that East Texas will experience below normal temperatures and rainfall.

Employers Tax Report Due Oct. 31

Employers must report on Form 941 Social Security and withheld Federal income taxes for the third quarter of 1978 by Tuesday, October 31. If the quarterly liability (reduced by any deposit during the quarter) is \$200 or more, the unpaid balance must be deposited. Persons who have deposited the entire quarterly tax liability in a Federal Reserve Bank or approved commercial bank have until November 10 to file Form 941. "Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return," the Internal Revenue Service said.

Examine Withholding Statement Closely

AUSTIN, TEXAS—Employers should take a close look at the income withholding statements turned in by their employees in order to identify potentially false statements, the Internal Revenue Service said. Tax regulations require employers to notify the District Director of the IRS when they have reason to believe an employee has submitted a false Form W-4, according to Robert M. McKeever, Director of the IRS Austin District. An employee must submit a withholding statement, Form W-4, to the employer when beginning a new job. Using information on the form, the employer withholds income tax at a rate which should equal the employee's actual tax liability. If the withholding rate is too low, the employee will owe the tax when filing the return. If it is too high, the employee will receive a refund.

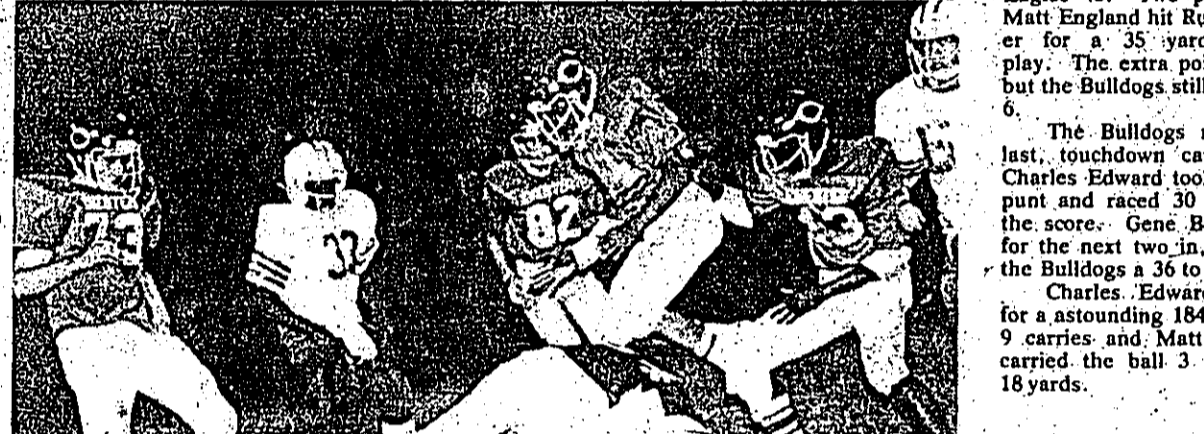

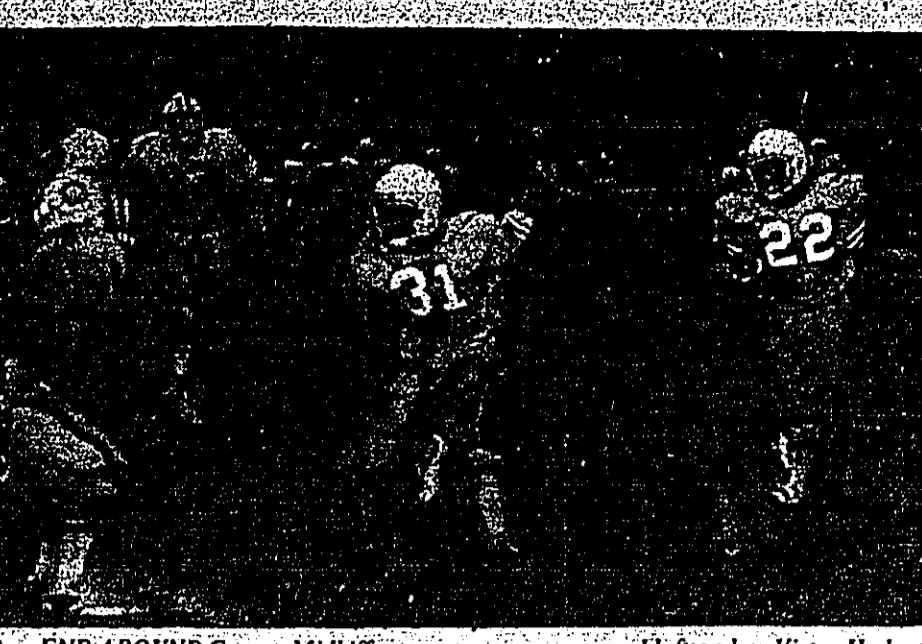

Antlerless Deer Permits To Be Issued Soon

AUSTIN—Antlerless deer permits will be available at county courthouses in 11 counties across the state in late October or early November, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The exact dates will be announced before a time and published in the local news media.

Landowners who wish to utilize the permits may pick them up or have them picked up by someone acting as their authorized agent. It is recommended that the permits be obtained from the county issuing office where the hunting property is located.

The deadline for obtaining antlerless deer permits for the October season in Burnet, Gillespie, Llano, Mason, McCulloch, San Saba and Travis Counties already has passed, but most other counties allow antlerless deer to be taken during the archery season without permits.

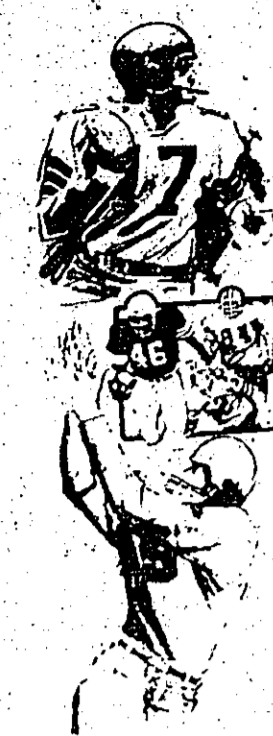
The Head of The Red: 1852

Prevent Weeds and Grasses

COLLEGE STATION—Remember those unsightly weeds and grasses that emerge in your lawn last winter? Now is the time to take action to prevent a similar situation this year.

Winter weeds begin to germinate as the temperature drops in October or November. Weed seedlings emerge from November through January but remain small and often don't become obvious until January or February, points out Dr. Dave Weaver, weed specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

A number of herbicides will control winter weeds in St. Augustine and bermudagrass if applied before weed seeds begin to germinate. This means applying pre-emergence herbicides in early October.

Bertran (Balan), benazide (Betasan, Pre-San) and DCPA (Dacthal) are all available in granular formulations and will give good weed control if properly applied, says Weaver. Granular materials are easier to apply than sprays because calibration is more simple. "Drop-type applicators are better than spinner type distributors because of uniformity of coverage and ease of calibration. All these herbicides are available mixed with fertilizer (weed and feed products), but these mixtures must be used with care, cautions the specialist. Areas that need fertilization, such as flower beds and gardens, could be damaged by the herbicide, depending on what is growing there or what will be planted later. Proper application rates are more important when applying a herbicide than when fertilizer only is applied.

Two other effective pre-emergence herbicides are atrazine and simazine, but these are labelled for use only in fertilizer mixtures. Never apply fertilizers containing atrazine or simazine near young trees or ornamentals or injury may occur, emphasizes Weaver.

Unless there is rain soon after herbicide application, the lawn should be watered thoroughly to carry the herbicide down into the soil to contact weed seeds.

Before buying and using a herbicide, check the label for the exact rate and specific weeds and grasses to be controlled as well as precautions for use, adds the specialist.

California Voters Still Shock USA

California sent shock waves across the country with Proposition 13. Next month it may do the same with Proposition 5.

In November, Californians will vote on Proposition 5, the Clean Indoor Air Initiative, which will provide protection for non-smokers in public places, health and educational facilities, restaurants, and places of work. Although other states have laws to protect non-smokers, what is striking about the California situation is this: the proposal will be voted on directly by the people themselves, not the legislators. More than 600,000 Californians signed petitions to put the initiative on the November ballot, millions will vote on the issue. As with Proposition 13, the proposition will amend the California Health and Safety Code to read, in part, as follows:

The People of the state of California find and declare that smoking in enclosed areas is detrimental to non-smokers' health, welfare, comfort, and environment and is particularly harmful to non-smokers with allergies or with cardiovascular or respiratory disease; that smoking in certain enclosed areas is a public nuisance and a cause of material annoyance, discomfort, and physical irritation to non-smokers; that non-smokers have no adequate means to protect themselves from the damages inflicted upon them when they involuntarily inhale smoke emitted from cigarettes, cigars, pipes, and other smoking equipment; and that regulation of smoking in certain enclosed areas including public places, places of employment, educational facilities, health facilities, and clinics is necessary to protect the health, welfare, comfort, and environment of non-smokers. It is not the intent of the People of the State of California to deny persons the right to smoke or to prohibit the sale of tobacco products, but rather to recognize that and declare it necessary to breathe clean air supersedes the right to smoke; where the two rights conflict.

For every dollar a producer spends on fertilizer, he wants to be assured of a return greater than the expenditure. Likewise, fertilizer dealers want their customers to be satisfied with the results obtained from using their product.

Both the producer and the dealer can gain valuable information to assure these results by attending the Soil Fertilizer Short Course beginning at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 24, at the First National Bank in Jasper. The four night short course will feature outstanding speakers on all phases of soil fertility and its relationship to forage production. The other three sessions are scheduled Oct. 26, Oct. 31 and Nov. 2.

Fertilizer is probably the largest variable factor in the production of forage in Tyler County, according to Chas. R. Currie, County Extension Agent. "If producers and dealers have the ability to interpret soil tests and determine the fertilizer program accordingly, they have the potential of making maximum use of both dollars and land," Currie said. "This short course will enable both groups to work closer in designing fertility programs for an individual production goal."

Each session of the short course features two speakers. A \$5.00 registration fee will be charged to cover miscellaneous expenses and a notebook that includes information on topics discussed and available publications. Sponsors of the short course are the Board of Fertilizer Extension, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas A&M University, Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Fort Worth Extension Service.

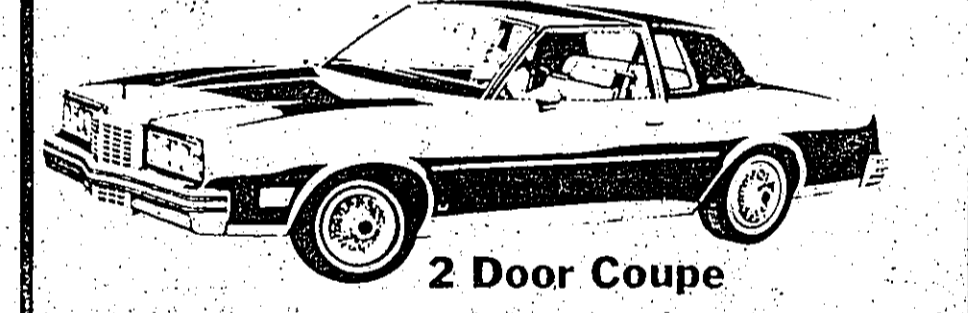

Tetanus Boosters For Texans

COLLEGE STATION— United States; 16 of those were in Texas.

The reports for 1976 and 1977 show a nationwide decrease to 75 and 77 cases respectively.

However, for these same years, Texas reported 12 and 16 cases respectively.

TETANUS DISEASE
Tetanus, also known as lockjaw, can be fatal. It is caused by spores of bacteria which can enter the body through a wound, the special-ist explains.

Because the tetanus germ cannot grow in the presence of air, deep puncture wounds or cuts are favorite growing environments for the germs. There is no natural immunity to the tetanus toxin; therefore, immunization against this disease is needed regardless of age, she points out.

IMMUNIZATION
Tetanus immunization is recommended every 10 years for the general population. However, persons constantly exposed to the possibility of getting tetanus may need more frequent boosters. Or, an accident may necessitate immediate tetanus immunization, Ms. Shearer suggests.

Children are usually protected against tetanus because they receive the immunization along with immunization for diphtheria and pertussis.

However, adults are often unprotected because they don't recognize tetanus as one immunization also needed by adults, the specialist says.

Rockers Turn Superheros for Halloween

Who else embodies the spectacle of Halloween, but KISS? On Saturday, Oct. 28, the bedazzled, silver-and-black-clad hard rockers will star in their first movie, "KISS Meets the Phantom of the Park," for NBC.

The thriller takes the superhero characterizations of the Marvel comic "KISS" and makes a real-life superheros-out-of-Gene Simmons, Peter, Criss, Paul Stanley and Ace Frehley. KISS appears as KISS, a famous rock group hired to rescue two broke amusement park owners from bankruptcy.

Bass guitarist Gene Simmons and drummer Peter Criss stopped by their Manhattan press office to explain just what they will be doing on prime-time TV.

Decked out in a three-piece, pin-striped suit that set off his prematurely grey hair, Peter Criss looks dapper — deceptively unlike the cat-man who beats out KISS's percussion. However, as Peter discusses his work on "KISS Meets the Phantom of the Park," he reveals that he's as agile as any cat. In fact, he did most of his own stunts for the film.

Peter explains that one of the amusement park owners, played by Anthony Zerbe, is a sinister Dr. Frankenstein-type inventor. "He takes people into the park and makes them into robots. He wants to do that to us, but he doesn't know we're superheros."

Peter reveals that each member of the band has a special power: Gene can fly and breathe fire; Peter, the cat, can climb walls; Ace, a master of space and time, can levitate himself; and Paul has bionic eyes, which emit lasers.

"I've always wanted to act," he claims. However, neither Peter, nor the other band members realized just how hard acting is, Peter reveals. "You sit

a long time in the trailer, you get up at 5 a.m., and you rehearse for hours and hours."

Peter grabbed the bull by the horns, though. This was his first crack at acting, and he volunteered to do most of his own stunts. "I really did some dangerous stuff. I'm fighting Dracula, the Mummy, Werewolf and Frankenstein, and I swing across the room on a chandelier. Well, the candles fell, and I was on fire for a few minutes."

"I'm into Al Pacino and Robert DeNiro," he continues. "I eventually want to get into more serious acting. The band would eventually have to say good-bye to each other. It's just a dream."

Although Peter insists the band is not breaking up, he adds, "Everyone says I'm a born actor. I guess I want to be another Frank Sinatra. He does it all, music and acting."

As for KISS's audience, Peter insists, "It's gonna blow minds cuz we're the first rock group to do a feature movie."

Gene Simmons agrees. "KISS Meets the Phantom of the Park" is "in the class of 'Galactica.' It's like 'A Hard Day's Night' meets 'Star Wars/Superman.'"

PRIME TIME — Could you tell me why, in this age of technology, must we in the Eastern and Western time zones suffer with "prime time" starting at 8 p.m.? Central starts at 7 p.m.; I'm not sure of Mountain zone. I can never watch a movie as I can't stay up until 11 p.m. and function at 6 a.m. the next day. My young children have to stay up until 9 p.m. to watch their favorite shows, or miss them. Is there anyway that there could be a change so both coasts have prime time starting at 7 p.m.? Comment please! — J.M.G. Jacksonville, N.C.

The federal Prime-Time Access Rule determines that only three hours a night be used for network entertainment programming. For example, in the East, the half hour between 7 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. is slotted for network news, and the half hour between 7:30 and 8 p.m. reverts to the local stations. As to Mountain and Central prime time starting at 7 p.m., this is because programming is fed to the Central Zone from N.Y., and Central time is approximately one hour earlier than Eastern. Programming is fed from L.A. in the West, and again, Mountain time is one hour earlier, too.

Lacrosse on horseback as played by Nomadic tribes; North of Afghanistan, a Soviet child movie star, the Soviet-Armenian opera and a Siberian school for circus performers are all potential shorts for this season's "Big Blue Marble."

The syndicated children's show, which is sponsored by International Telephone and Telegraph, is distributed free to stations across the U.S. provided there are no commercial interruptions and

no gratuitous violence. "Big Blue Marble" reaches out to children in 68 countries and territories — in five languages. In the U.S., half of those stations are Public Broadcasting stations.

There's a new look and a new aim to the series this year.

The opening animation is straight out of "Star Wars"; the new theme song, "Closer," is very contemporary; the entire show is scored with original music.

The familiar magazine format will run the same

type features as last year, however, more depth will be added to the story lines. An Austrian ski story shows how a kid handles losing. There's a rodeo piece in which a nine-year-old steer rider is injured.

Producer Robert Weimer explains that "We want to broaden 'Big Blue Marble's' appeal, expand the audience upward. The stories for older people will appeal on several levels. In the past the shows became more event-oriented than people-oriented. This year, stories are about older children who are becoming

people. It's still informative and interesting to the youngest audience."

A 15-year-old surfer from Oahu, a traditional joust in Sardinia, soccer tips by Pele, John Curry's Ice Ballet, a world frisbee champ and aerobics are all slated for this season.

Weimer agrees there are "quite a few sports segments." He wanted more variety "after four years of sticking with young kids, they could be involved with sports." But so many good sporting stories came up that Weimer added new story lines and went with them.

"This time I'm practically a good guy. I commit suicide." And that's progress for a guy who usually plays psychos and was killed 14 times by James Arness on "Gunsmoke." (Hanged, shot, blown up, dragged by horses, etc., etc.)

What do you need for credentials to write soap opera. And how do you get the job? How's this for unexpected answers... all true.

CBS's "Search for Tomorrow" has two Ph.D.s as its head writers a husband and wife team: Bill and Joyce Corrington. Neither had ever watched daytime TV until the job came looking for them.
