## Chester School Bus Accident In Fog

### Notes From An Oldtimer

Trick or Treat on Halloween hadn't yet been invented in the early twenties or at least it hadn't come to Woodville. At that time Halloween was all trick and no treat. Mostly the teenage boys went about doing minor mischief such as turning over privies and fiddling the unsuspecting.

Although, by this time, some people had bathtubs, outdoor accommodations were still much in evidence. The boys still had a variety of models to choose from for their Halloween "en devils."

Webster's Dictionary defines ticktacking as a "contrivance for making a tapping sound, as on a window, used especially by children in play." It was a contrivance, but it didn't make a tapping sound and it wasn't child's play. Ticktacking was an art handed down from father to son. One end of a length of stout cord was tied to the screen wire of a window. The other end was threaded through a hole punched in the bottom of a tin can and secured by knotting it around a stick. When he pulled the string fast, the holder of the can rubbed it up and down the string as far as he could reach. All the bed covers piled on your head wouldn't hold out that extra care-taking. You knew that all the boys from the neighbor would suddenly gather together to see who was ticktacking and how their forefingers of death. The boys did this sort of thing late at night after everyone else had gone to sleep.

Halloween evening's festivities were usually in kind of the young set with a party, street dancing. One memorable street dance might have been the last ever held on Halloween in our town.

Bluff Street was topped off from what is now Village at the corner. The curbs and sidewalks were lined with people. The boys slipped away from their parents and took their seats on Miss Callie West's steps. They struck up a tune, and the dance began to swirl around the feet of dozens of young lovers.

As long since Mr. C. Davis, son of Mr. John Davis, had had a fine new story with a conical conical slab instead of the usual wooden porch. Where Bidwell's store is now. On the west end of that slab was parked a shiny, brand new wagon. It's been high spring seat and tongue resting on the curb were bright red. That wagon was a thing of beauty and the eyes of probably every farmer in the county. It was Davis Bros.' finest mechanical horse.

That wagon was there in all its magnificence when dancing began that evening. When darkness fell, the dancing began to halt. One by one the boys slipped away leaving partners stranded. Kerosene lanterns and flashlights appeared. Most of them flickering and darting around the west end of Davis Bros.' store.

Halfheartedly the fiddlers fiddled and halfheartedly the girls danced with each other as they waited for the boys to return.

After an hour, wrapped up in something less than a downy breeze, the boys had returned. They grabbed their partners and began to dance feverishly. But the party was over. The fiddlers were tired and so were the girls. Then a "boom" word got around in Woodville. The boys' morning at store opening time were going to be usual were in town. Men in little blimps stood whistling and swapping yarns just waiting. When Mr. C.M. Davis strove to open up, he discovered his beautiful wagon was gone. He looked around first one end of his building then the other. He seemed about to panic when the tinkers of the bystanders became loud guffaws. There he knelt the job was on him.

If his memory serves me right, the town boys had taken it down and put it back together just as they had taken it up. Nearly all of those young fellows who perpetrated that deed are gone now, but Jeff Mooney might have been there.

For the seventh straight year, Temple-Easter is publishing a hunting guide for sportsmen of East Texas. Identifying forty-nine forest areas in fifteen counties where free public hunting is permitted.

Stretching from Panola county on north to Jasper and Harrison county on the south, these 153,000 acres represent some of the most challenging hunting areas in the Pineywoods.

As in years past, the 1977 Temple-Easter hunting guide may be ordered by writing to "Hunting Guide," 229 North Bowie Street, Jasper, Texas 75951.

Each tract in the Guide is referenced to state or federal highways, and corner boundaries are clearly marked. Interior road systems are maintained by company road crews, by during inclement weather, caution should be observed in traveling bottomland areas.

Overnight camping is permitted, but on permanent structures or deer stands should be constructed.

It is suggested that you visit prospective hunting areas prior to season opening to familiarize yourself with the terrain.

It goes without saying that all camp litter should be carried out when you leave, with all gates closed and fences left intact.

Hunting of all game species in season is permitted. Company logging operations may be underway in certain locations, so please observe prudent hunting safety rules.

Over the past seven years, small herds of deer have been transplanted on certain tracts. Game populations were known to be low. Company game management people also encourage hunting in recently logged areas, as these open spaces often provide the browse and forage required for deer survival.

Reprinted here are the ten commandments of shooting safety. We hope you will continue to observe them where you are in the field.

1. TREAT EVERY GUN WITH THE RESPECT DUE A LOADED GUN.

2. WATCH THE MUZZLE. Carry your gun safely; keep safety on until ready to shoot.

3. NEVER POINT A GUN AT ANYTHING YOU DO NOT WANT TO SHOOT; avoid all horseplay.

4. BE SURE BARREL IS CLEAR OF OBSTRUCTIONS, and that you have ammunition only of the proper size for your gun.

5. BE SURE OF TARGET BEFORE YOU PULL TRIGGER; know identifying features of game you hunt.

6. NEVER CLIMB A TREE OR FENCE OR JUMP A DITCH WITH A LOADED GUN; never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.

7. NEVER SHOOT A BULLET AT A FLAT, HARD SURFACE OR WATER; at target practice be sure your backdrop is adequate.

8. NEVER STORE GUNS AND AMMUNITION SEPARATELY, beyond the reach of children.

9. NEVER SHOOT AT A TARGET BEYOND THE REACH OF CHILDREN.

10. AVOID ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES before or during shooting.

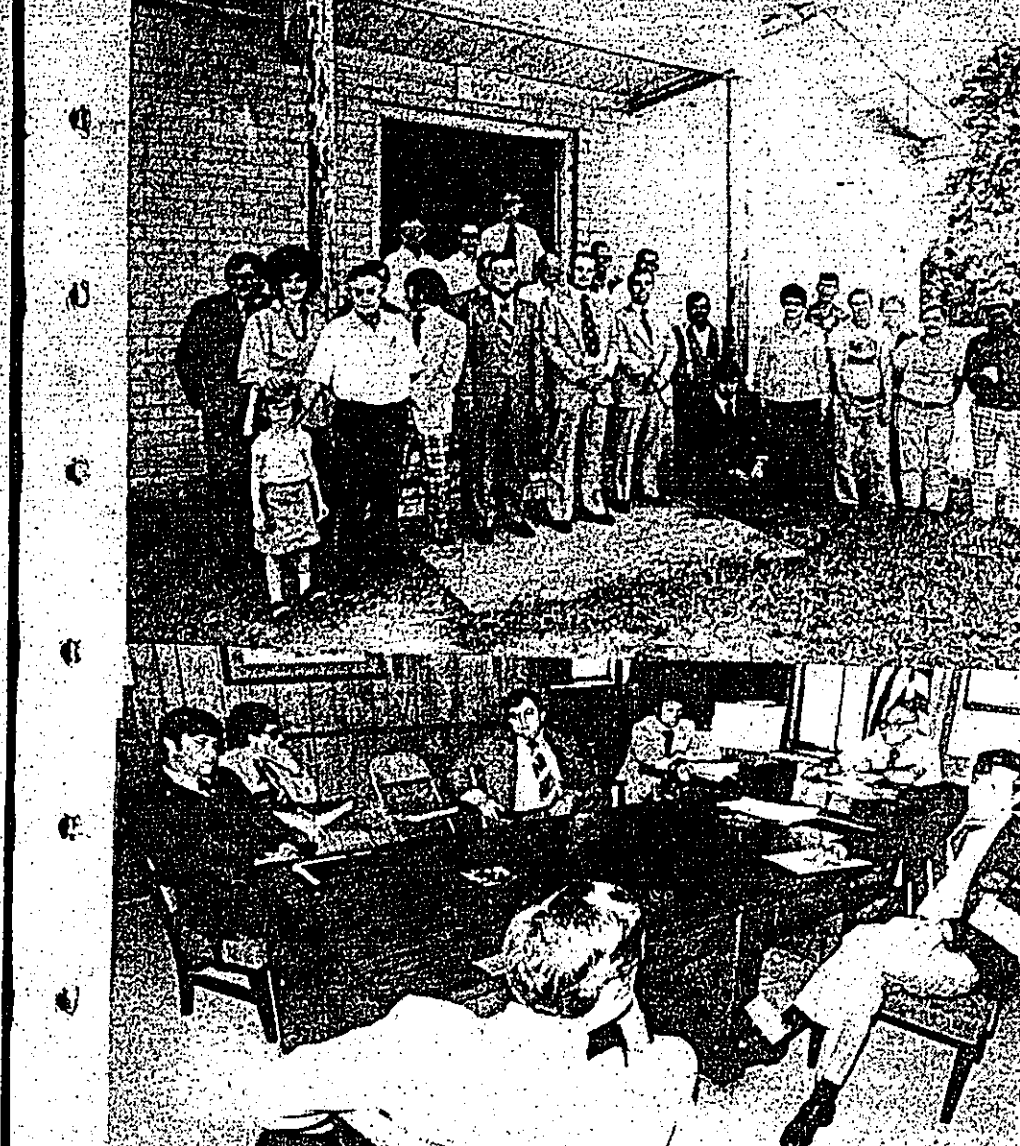

**AUSTIN**—Legislative Budget Board recommended abolishing two agencies and transferring their duties to other agencies.

The budget-writing arm of the legislature said the Governor's Office of Management Affairs and the Texas Commission on Jail Standards should be wiped out.

At the same time, the budget board declined to act on proposed budgets of the Board of Pardons and Paroles and the Board of Private Investigators and Private Security Agencies.

Board members expressed concern that it takes six to eight weeks to release a

prisoner after he is paroled and called for a new budget of the private detective agencies fitting its revenues.

ICDMA's duties, the budget-writing said, should be transferred to the Texas Department of Community Affairs to avoid duplication of effort. An increase in staff of the Manpower Services Division of IJMA also was recommended to permit closer monitoring of government subcontractors' job training programs.

Commission on Jail Standards duties should go to an agency such as the Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and

Training.

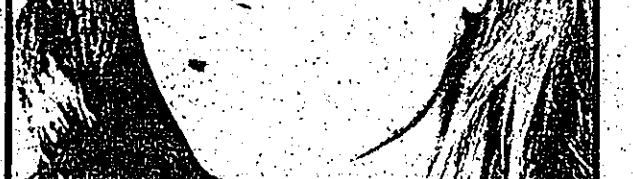

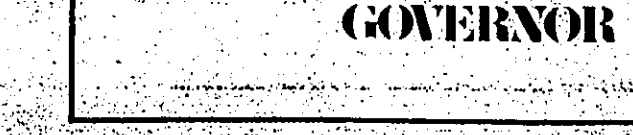

## Hickman Earns Certified Title By Texas Assessors

## Deer Permits To Be Issued

WOODVILLE-Investigations conducted by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department have revealed that deer populations in the western portion of Tyler County are decreasing sharply in recent years. Further studies have indicated that present food supplies are becoming inadequate to support existing deer numbers. Deer densities are being reduced during critical periods has led to decreased antler development and average body size. If the current trend of conditions persists, the area deer herd will deteriorate and will be susceptible to disease, parasites, and malnutrition. Therefore, to prevent waste and depletion of existing herds, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will issue antlerless deer permits on the affected area of western Tyler County. 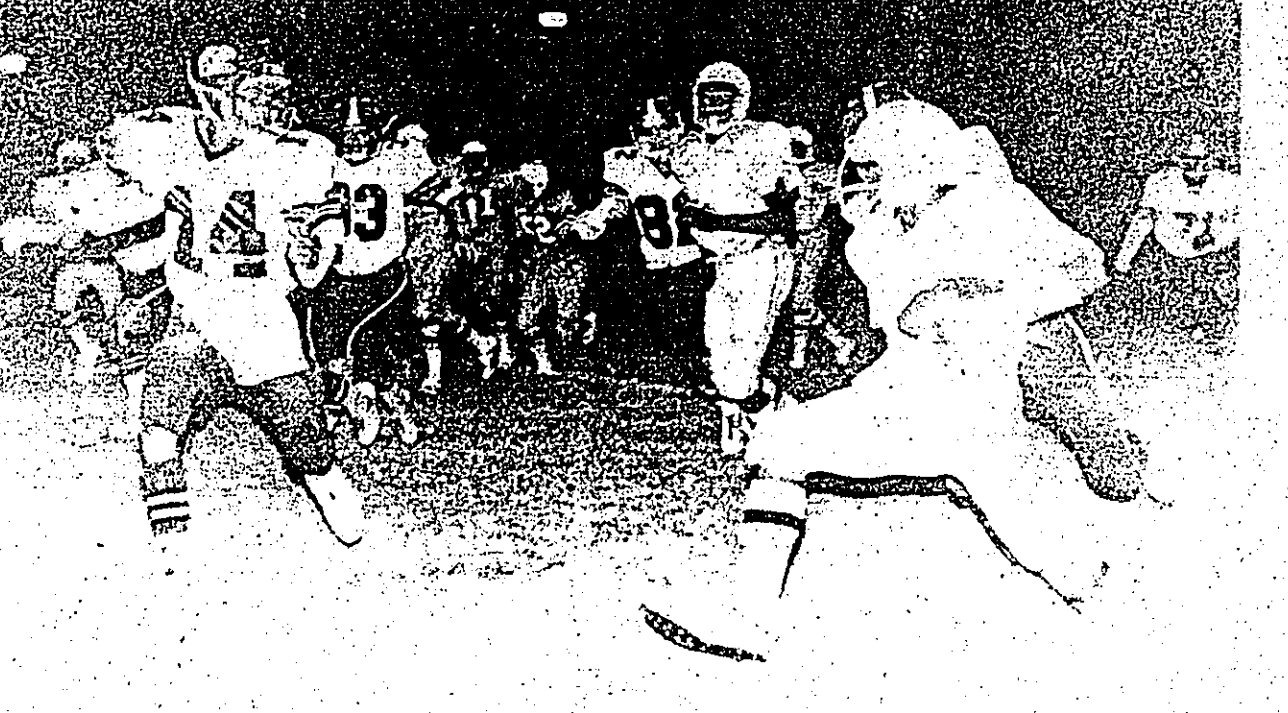

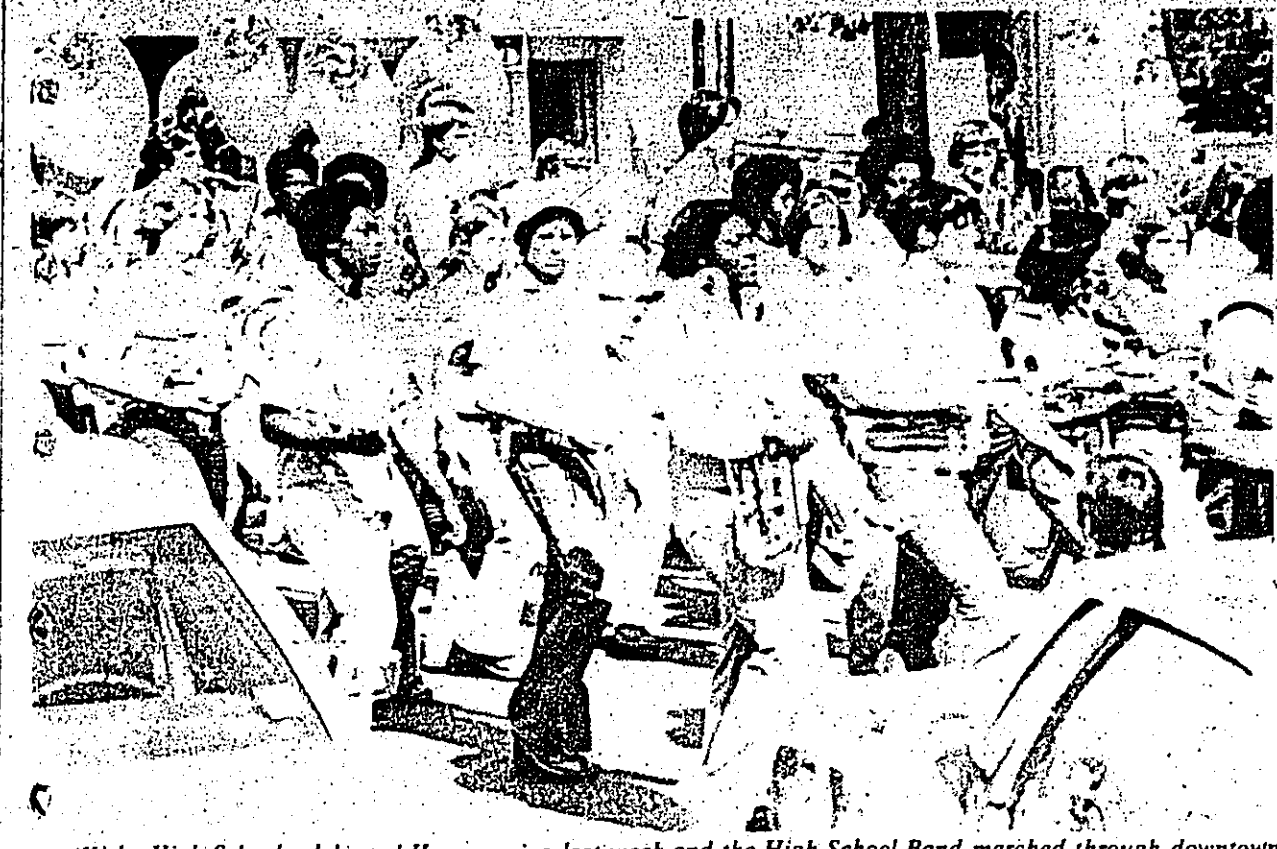

### Winter Boat Protection Ideas Given

With the onset of cold weather, recreational boat owners are advised to take precautionary steps to prevent major weather damage to their boats.

The United States Coast Guard recommends the following measures to winterize recreational boats:

1. If you remove your boat from the water, make sure you store it with adequate support all around, and not just with one or two points carrying all the weight. Put the boat under cover or place a weatherproof tarp over it, allowing air to circulate through and around the craft.
2. For outboard motors that use an electric starter, remove the battery, take it home and put it on "trickle charge." If you leave your boat in the water (inboard motors and auxiliary sailboats) and use the battery to run an automatic bilge pump, arrange to have the battery placed on trickle charge at a marina and have it monitored.
3. Outboard motors should be flushed with fresh water and stored upright and out of the weather (in your basement or garage). If your outboard is too large to remove from the boat, make sure it is well covered against the elements.
4. On inboard engines, drain the engine block after closing the raw water intake. If the engine is cooled by a fresh water heat exchanger system, you can either drain the system or add sufficient anti-freeze to prevent freezing.
5. Portable fuel tanks should be drained. Installed tanks should be filled with fuel and have a fuel stabilizer added.
6. If you live in an area where ice forms in the water, arrange to have a water disturbing device, such as a bottom water circulator or a "bubbler", to keep the area around the boat ice-free.
7. No matter how you store your boat, check it over at least once a week. It cannot take care of itself.

For more specific information on protecting your boat and engine from winter damage, consult your owner's manual or contact your local marine dealer.

And finally, to get your boat ready for next year's boating season, consider taking one of the many free boating courses that are available. For information on class schedules, contact your nearest Coast Guard Auxiliary Flotilla, United States Power Squadron, Red Cross Chapter or State Boating Authority.

### Treasure Exhibit

**BEAUMONT, TEXAS**—Gold, silver, cannons and other relics from several Spanish ships wrecked in 1554 off Padre Island will be on display from Oct. 22 through Dec. 31 at Lamar University's Spindletop Museum.

Artifacts from the Spanish ships *Santa de Yciar*, the *San Esteban* and the *Esperitua* were salvaged in a time capsule of life in the 16th century: wood fragments and rope, anchors, navigational instruments, eating utensils and crossbows will be displayed.

"It's a fantastic exhibit," Calvin Smith, director of Spindletop Museum said. "We were really pleased to get this one." The exhibit is entitled "Treasure: People, Ships and Dreams."

The Texas Antiquities Committee supervised the salvaging of artifacts near the Port Mansfield jetty. The unearthed treasures are now accessible to the public, prepared by the Institute of Texan Cultures in San Antonio.

The first modern effort to raise the treasure was attempted by a group from Gary, Ind., named *Platono Inc.* The salvage company was strictly after treasure, and kept no records or adequate maps of the diving sites, nor was information kept of the relation of each recovered item. According to Texas archaeologists, a lot of data was destroyed when the artifacts were dredged up and a number of "uses" to the past were lost.

To locate the site of each of the three shipwrecks, a magnetometer was towed by a boat, measuring the difference made by a piece of metal in the earth's magnetic field and each major magnetic disturbance was investigated by scuba divers. The divers dug down into the sand with a large bottom scoop similar to a vacuum cleaner. Almost all of the ancient artifacts were encased in conglomerate rock, glued together by shells and sand in lumps weighing up to 300 pounds.

The conglomerates contained bronze objects, cannon barrels, pewter dishes, coins, lead particles and even rock-machetes. The rocky lumps were carefully taken apart with pneumatic "chisels" and then dental "picks," after first being X-rayed.

Measures included a 16-foot cross of a ship made of white oak, the oldest known astrolabe ever found. The astrolabe was a navigational device used for measuring the sun's elevation. This particular model is assumed to be Portuguese on the basis of a maker's mark. Because astrolabes were carefully registered with the King of Spain, it is also assumed that the ship had a Portuguese navigator.

Recorded history of the 300 men, women and children aboard the three ships who struggled through an April storm, were shipwrecked on a "deserted" Padre Island only to find a shower of Indian arrows, waiting for them, is a tale of human suffering and bravery.

Only a few survivors brought back the tale of the castaways, struffling down the beach to Mexico, constantly harassed by Indians. There was no food or shelter, and little water. Small boats had to be built, to cross the bay where Fort Isabel is today. The Spanish gave their clothes to the Indians, wrongly believing it was the clothes the Indians were after. Naked and in a hostile land, they fought their way south. Almost unarmed, the Spanish were cut down to only a few, with none of the women or children surviving.

The shipwrecks are old, occurring only 62 years after Columbus discovered America. The ships were smaller than the big Spanish galleons of later years and the cannons are a different variety from the huge ones commonly found along the Florida Keys. The artifacts in the exhibit offer a look far into the past, into Columbus' time.

Now, 424 years later, the artifacts will be shown in Beaumont. At 8 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 26, archaeologist Barto Arnold will talk about the exhibit and discuss aspects of underwater archeology in Landes Auditorium, Galloway Business Building.

The exhibit will be open to the public at Spindletop Museum for the first time from 1 to 5 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 22, and will continue from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Saturday until Dec. 31. Prior arrangements are necessary and can be set up for students' group tours by calling 838-8122.

**Leather 'n' Fashion Look**

COLLEGE STATION - Leather's "fashion look" for fall will take special care - a clothing specialist advises. Smooth leather and suede with its textured look need different care techniques, according to Nancy Brown with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas A&M University System. However, both will last longer if given the proper care, she adds. SMOOTH LEATHER - Garments made of smooth leather do not require much care. Let smooth-leather garments dry naturally. Wash off spots with warm water and soap. Then wipe dry with a clean damp cloth. SUEDE - Suede requires more care. These garments need frequent brushing. Use a dry bristle brush or a rubber sponge to prevent dirt from settling in the nap. Let gum creases or cement stains can remove stains usually. If suede becomes wet, allow it to dry away from heat - and rub it with a terry cloth towel to bring up the nap.

And we hope he will have many more.

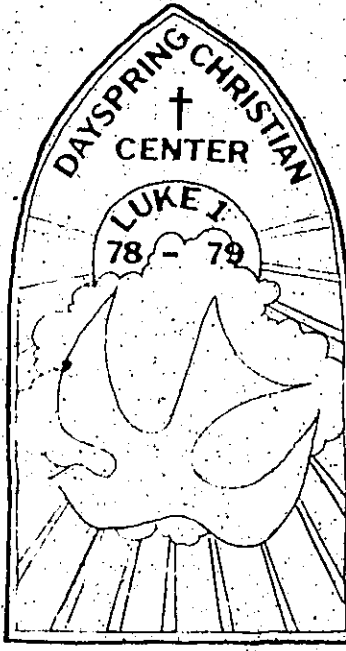

## 'Puff' Is Tuned From Song Into Cartoon

The song "Puff the Magic Dragon," which Peter, Paul and Mary made popular, has a magic all its own: Peter Yarrow's catchy tune about little Jackie Draper and the dragon, Puff, is a musical fantasy which has been adapted by writer Romeo Muller for an animated CBS special on Oct. 30.

Romeo Muller somewhat resembles a dragon himself. The rotund writer confesses he has no background in childhood education; he insisted, "I've a knack for working with children. I have a total recall of things that appealed to me when I was a kid."

This ability to appeal to both children and adult imaginations has enabled the middle-aged bachelor to create some of television's animated classics. "Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer," the Christmas special starring Burl Ives for which Romeo wrote the book has become the most repeated special in TV history.

Muller's other Christmas specials include "The Little Drummer Boy," "Frosty the Snowman" and "Santa Claus Is Coming to Town." Last spring, ABC aired one of Muller's most ambitious projects, an adaptation of Tolkien's "The Hobbit."

According to Muller, "Puff" animators had tried to do Puff, but Peter Yarrow held off until Muller approached him.

"Instead of a live cartoon show it deals with an autistic child. In his head, Puff occurs. One step at a time, the child overcomes his fears, masters his speech problem and calls out for Puff at the end."

How did Muller dramatize the vague lyrics of "Puff?"

"I write a straight screen play," he answers. "I'm not limited. With animation, I can have all sorts of special effects."

The dragon, especially, lends itself to special effects. Muller describes one incident:

"Puff asks Jackie what he thinks the sea is like. Since Jackie won't speak, he draws a sea on his bedroom shade, and it comes to life with sharks and terrible waves."

## When Dick Van Patten Is Off The Set

**HOLLYWOOD** — Dick Van Patten's role in the successful ABC series, "Eight Is Enough," parallels his real life attitude as a responsible and devoted parent.

He doesn't have eight children, as is the case with his television family, but Van Patten does have three sons, Nels, Jimmy and Vincent. All three are young and active men, who remain as close and devoted to their parents as Dick and Patty Van Patten are to them.

Although the sons have grown up and moved into their own living quarters, they haven't strayed far from the nest. They moved two blocks from their parents, to be exact.

When Dick and wife Patty execute plans to build a home, it will be adjacent to the house younger son, Vincent, bought. Jimmy lives with him.

Dick and Patty are already renovating a small home on the property, and their oldest son Nels, a tennis pro, may move in. He was named after the character his father portrayed almost 30 years ago, the young son in one of television's earliest series, "I Remember Mama."

Nels may follow his father — and two younger brothers, and his lady love, actress Valerie Perrine — into acting. Miss Perrine is encouraging him.

Vincent, at 20, the youngest son (Nels is 23) has been a busy actor in Hollywood ever since his father came out from New York eight years ago for what was supposed to be an eight-week "look-around."

Dick has kept busy since that summer, too, with many guest starring roles, series and films.

At 21, Jimmy, like Vincent and his father, is a tennis devotee and an actor. Nels is the pro, but Vincent is ranked No. 2 player in California.

Vincent built a tennis court at his home, and all the Van Pattens play there daily, when they're not off on "tour" in the pro-celebrity net events.

The entire family, plus Dick's sister, Joyce Van Patten, are busy actors. Patty is a former June Taylor dancer, who occasionally returns to those dancing roots to choreograph.

But Patty's major spare-time devotion is numerology. And it may become her vocation. She recently turned her interest in numerology into "free-lance

writing, and currently authors a monthly column for Beverly Hills Magazine."

She writes about the meaning and influence of numbers she attaches to the stars; it's based on the letters in the name and natal-day digits. Many Hollywood personalities are seeking out Patty for readings.

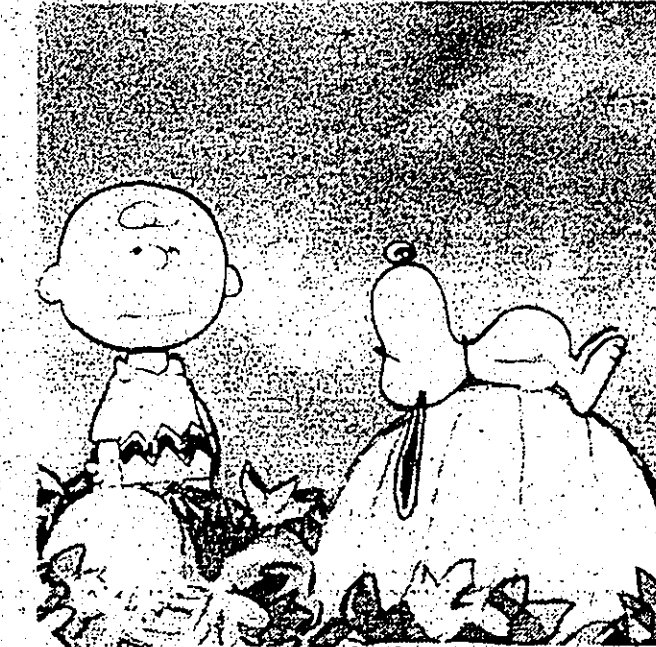

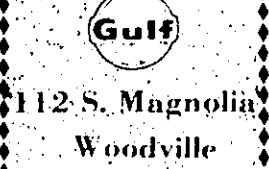

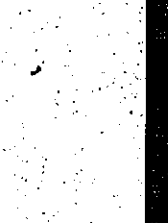

## Cooking a Bash for Edwardian Royalty

Our "time-does-fly" note of the week: Arlene Golonka, who as an ingenue added lightweight charm to the old "Mayberry, R.F.D." series, returns to the home screen as a regular later this season in NBC's "Joe and Valerie." Plot problem No. 1: How does a mother react when Valerie announces plans for unwedded "together" cohabitation with Joe? (Char. Foxtang is Valerie; Arlene plays her mom.)

David Cassidy's four-year "retirement" from show business to live as a gentleman farmer could have proven disastrous. It was a gamble he felt he had to take to think through the meaning of his life. And the gamble has paid off big in his favor now that he's ready to bring his talents back to TV as an actor. The bonus: he doesn't have to go it as a post-teen-age rock singer, possibly in competition with his younger half-brother Shaun. Instead, the special he did last year, within the "Police Story" format has parlayed into a weekly NBC series. Furthermore his name is right up front on the title: "David Cassidy: Undercover."

Somebody who did take a gamble and lost, which is rare for him, is Kreskin the mentalist, a frequent guest of Merv Griffin. The gaff, however, happened off-camera during a personal appearance at Kansas State College.

It has become Kreskin's custom to play hide-and-seek with his pay checks. If works this way: a concert's sponsors are challenged to secrete Kreskin's fee somewhere inside the theater, and if he can't divine where it is, he forfeits the whole thing. He walked off with his dough to rousing applause 250 times this year. In his whole career he has missed only six times.

Who wants to star on Broadway? Who is holding out for theater-release movies? Not David Janssen, the veteran of 30 films. TV has treated him to some of its major plums, and he treats the medium with respect. Last year he evaluated his role in "A Sensitive, Passionate Man" as one of the best of his entire career.

Of the forthcoming CBS miniseries, "The Word," he has noted it as the equivalent of four high-budget movies. He is in nine out of every 10 scenes in a demanding role that casts him as an inwardly tortured man whose fortunes depend on promoting a shady, new version of The Bible.

And what about love interest? Plenty: faded, fading and impending. Janice Rule plays his estranged wife; Kate Mulgrew, his mistress.

He's a pleasure-loving prince of the blood who has his choice — and exercises it thoroughly — of beautiful women.

She's the plainest of Janes, an ex-scully maid whose skillet skills have liberated her from the scrub pail.

Together, they are an Edwardian odd couple — Louisa Trotter and His Royal Highness, Prince of Wales, of "The Duchess of Duke Street," the new comedy-drama on Masterpiece Theater on PBS Sunday evenings. Louisa's a fictional successor to Rosa Lewis, whose extraordinary liaisons with heads of state and titled aristocracy made the Cockney ex-skivvy and her establishment at London's Cavendish Hotel in Jermyn Street the spicy talk of turn-of-the-century society.

What did HRH see in the rough-spoken, aproned Louisa? Gemma Jones, the British stage/screen-TV star who portrays her in the Mobil-funded series, agrees that it certainly wasn't Louisa's looks.

"She was plain, very plain, and saucy, vulgar and free," says Gemma, a low-key attractive blonde who couldn't be more unlike the character she plays in the BBC-Time/Live Television 15-parter. "I think he just found her a marvelous person to be with, to relax with. Someone he didn't have to behave with. He didn't have to pretend to be royal in her presence."

The Prince of Wales, later Edward VII, (played by Roger Hammond), was by no means the only blue-blood attracted to Louisa — or to Rosa Lewis, whose shrewd talents for sating male appetites at the Cavendish inspired producer John Hawkesworth when he conceived Louisa

and the Bentinck Hotel for "The Duchess of Duke Street."

"I think she probably was quite callous about it," says Gemma, who read three biographies of the legendary Rosa and then never referred to them again, since Louisa's "only loosely based on real life. It was a matter of business with her ... Louisa's a shrewd businesswoman with guts, determination and arrogance, and very much her own boss. She really pre-empted women's lib."

Louisa also pre-empted

the attention of some 13 million British viewers when she made her debut on the BBC. But it's not likely that any of the thoroughly hooked audience found it easy to spot Gemma off-camera, minus the red hair, Cockney accent and uncharacteristic walk she adopted for the role. Certainly in previous parts — on stage as the implacably cooperative one and only female in Pinter's "The Homecoming," as Titania in the Royal Shakespeare Company's world tour of "A Midsummer Night's

Dream," and in Ken Russell's film "The Devils" — there's no trace of the chirpy, spunky scrubbie of "The Duchess of Duke Street."

That's exactly why Gemma enjoyed playing Louisa. "It was so unlike anything I'd ever done before," she explains. "It was such a character so far away from myself, so disguised. I was in hiding, so to speak. It made me much braver."

Louisa cautions the audience not to bother writing her for recipes for any of the gorgeous gourmet dishes she concocts as "The Duchess of Duke Street." She really doesn't know much about them.

"You'll see me on screen chopping fines herbes or breaking on egg with single-handed aplomb," says Gemma. "But then, cut. A moment later, I'm adding the last cherry to some exquisite dish prepared by a real chef, Michael Smith. My job is simply to appear hot, flustered and apparently triumphant after five hours' feverish work!"

Although Gemma's father is distinguished actor Griffith Jones, she wasn't one of those youngsters lured early on by the smell of the greasepaint. "When I was small, I wanted to be a nun, a missionary or a nurse," Gemma recalls. "My mother, despaired of my ever being able to earn a living doing anything, so she suggested I go to drama school just to fill in the time until I found something to do — like find a rich husband!"

It must have been fairly evident, even then, that cooking was not young Gemma's forte. "I'm not a bad cook," she says. "But when viewers write for recipes for those exquisite dishes, I have to admit my culinary skills are based on optical illusion."

Debbie Boone, the "You Light Up My Life" girl, will be starring all over the dial at holiday time. ABC has her along with her siblings on the Pat Boone family special at Thanksgiving. For Christ-

mas, NBC has her co-starring with John Rubinstein in O. Henry's classic, "Gift of the Magi."

With ABC's "Three's Company" continuing to orbit at the upper limits of the ratings, there's reason

to believe there's more than rumor to the talk of spinning off the landlords,

Audra Lindley and Norman Fell, into a separate series for next fall.
