Post Office Appeal For Early Mail

"With the Christmas mailing season fast approaching, we are encouraging our postal customers to Shop early and Mail early to assure delivery of their gifts for Christmas," Postmaster Bruce Latiolais announced today.

"We wish to further emphasize that many suggested overseas mailing dates, including the U.S. Armed Forces, fall due before the end of this month," Postmaster Latiolais said. "These dates, as in past years, vary according to different parts of the world. Specific information can be obtained by calling the Woodville Post Office. The important thing to remember is to do your shopping early and mail your cards and parcels early."

"Mailing early is not the only solution," Postmaster Latiolais said. "Proper packing of the gift and wrapping of the parcel are essential to assure that the gift is not damaged or lost in transit and arrives in good condition. Here are a few tips that may be helpful:

1. Assure that all articles and particularly fragile articles are individually wrapped and cushioned with shredded or crumpled paper, excelsior, compressed tissue paper, cloth, styrofoam, or even popcorn and tightly packaged in strong cardboard or fiberboard containers.
 2. Pressure-sensitive filament reinforced tape should be used rather than string, twine, Scotch tape or masking tape.
 3. Each package should contain the name and address of the person to whom it is being mailed, inside as well as outside the package, to assure that it will be delivered promptly even if the outside address becomes lost or obliterated.
 4. And finally, the package should be addressed correctly and legibly with the correct Zip Code on both the address and the return address included.
- "If we can be of assistance to you in your Christmas mailings, please call or come by the Woodville Post Office and we will be more than happy to assist you," Postmaster Latiolais said.

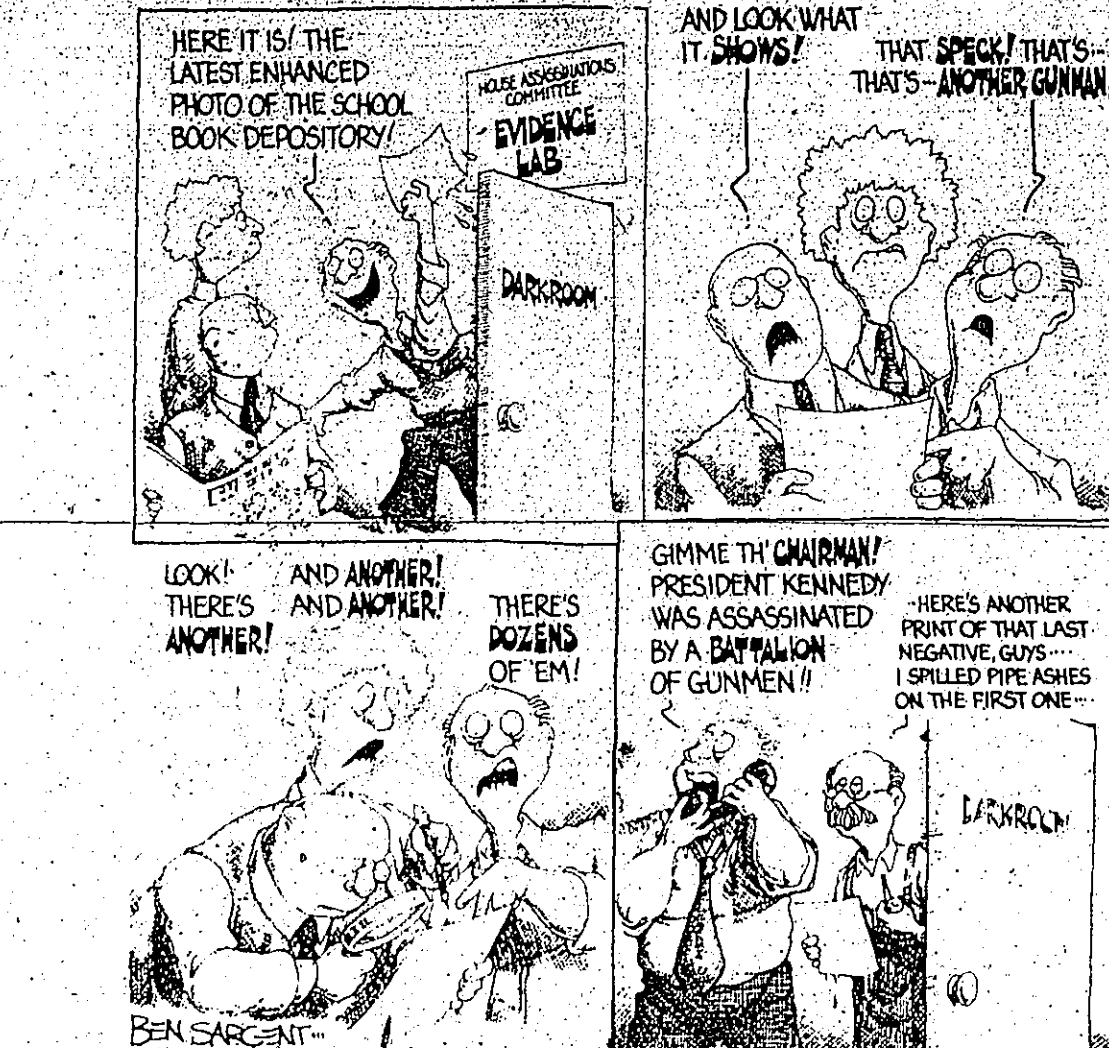

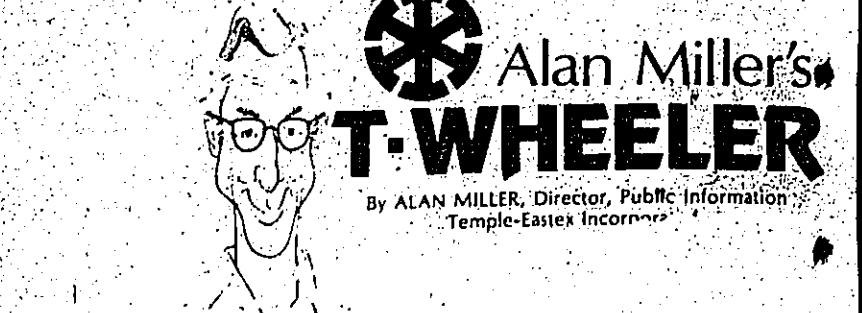

TOTAL LOSS - If you are falling short of meeting that requirement, you might consider increasing your support in the remaining weeks of 1978.

IF IT'S NOT A TOTAL LOSS - If you have been thinking about selling off a capital asset that has "dropped" in value since you bought it, remember that selling it by year's end may help save taxes for you on your 1978 return. You might be able to use a portion of the loss to offset some income.

THERE'S STILL TIME - It's not too late to take steps that may help reduce your 1978 income tax bill. For example, if you're planning to incur deductions, you can pay bills for deductible expenses that might otherwise not get paid until

after the New Year (medical and dental services, charitable contributions, certain state and local taxes). And you might be able to delay some income until 1979.

CHOOSING THE RIGHT SAVINGS ACCOUNT CAN MEAN EXTRA DOLLARS EARNED - When opening a savings account, it's useful to recognize the distinction between "day-of-deposit-to-day-of-withdrawal" accounts and "grace days" accounts. The former allows you to withdraw funds before the end of the quarter, and still be paid interest on that money for the time it was in the account. A "grace days" arrangement permits you to earn interest from the first of the month on money deposited after the first

of the month. Bank depositors who are hesitant to tie up funds in high-interest, long-term time accounts sometimes fail to realize that they can earn perhaps a half-percent more on savings by committing funds for only three months at a time. Both savings and commercial institutions offer this advantage on 90-day certificates of deposit. At the end of each 90-day period the depositor can renew the certificate or shift the funds into a regular account.

DON'T LET ACCOUNTS BECOME DORMANT - Don't allow your bank books to lie around too long without having any transactions recorded on them. Accounts that are "dormant" for too many years cease to draw interest and may even be taken over by the state government. If you have no deposits or withdrawals to make, have the interest posted in the book every year or so.

STILL ANOTHER WAY - In addition to regular savings accounts and certificates of deposit, there is a third type of account offered by some commercial banks. It returns high interest—perhaps a half-percent above the regular savings rate—at regular intervals and only to a brief period at the end of each quarter and may also require advance written notice of any withdrawal.

CHECKING FOR SAFETY - Interest paid on bonds often reflects the degree of risk involved. Another way of estimating the safety of an investment is by referring to bond rating services such as Moody's and Standard & Poor's, which periodically assign ratings to each entity that issues bonds for public sale. A rating of AAA is the highest expression of confidence that a rating service gives, and a rating of A or higher is considered to represent a reasonable safe investment.

STOCKS VS. BONDS - A bond differs from a share of stock in that the former represents a loan on the part of the bondholder, while the stock represents part ownership in the issuing company. Bonds pay interest at regular intervals, and as a rule are considered safer investments than most stocks. But a low-rated bond—in the C or D category—may in fact pose a greater risk than do many stocks.

Both pay the same rate of interest, so choose the account that best suits your savings habits.

Typically, a savings bank or savings and loan association will let you borrow against your savings at rates as low as four to ten percent below the rates normally paid on credit cards and most other credit sources. There's a drawback, however: an amount equal to your loan balance is kept frozen in your savings account, so don't borrow against funds you're likely to need soon.

Special care should be taken to safeguard a "bearer" bond, which is not registered in the name of its holder. Such bonds are fully negotiable and difficult to trace if lost or stolen.

At this time of year it might be worthwhile to make a quick calculation concerning your 1978 income taxes: will the taxes withheld from your paychecks cover less than 80 percent of your total tax bill? If so, you might wind up paying a penalty for underwithholding. The problem perhaps can be eliminated by having your employer increase withholding from your last few paychecks of 1978. Deer Season Good

AUSTIN—Early indications are that the deer season in Texas is off to a good start. Reports from the opening weekend indicated there are lots of deer, the animals are in very good body condition, and an early rut is getting underway in many areas.

The only minus factor, as predicted by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists, is that antler development is a bit sub-par. This was a result of dry conditions during the spring, according to Charles Winkler, big game program chief.

There apparently was a heavy turnout of hunters on opening day Saturday, Winkler said, and a fair number of deer were taken. Hunting may have slipped somewhat Sunday when a slow drizzle dampened most of the state.

Winkler said the deer check stations in Webb County where the department is conducting an experimental buck permit system, are a good indicator of South Texas hunting. Several nice bucks were brought in the first day, but they consistently were better in body condition than in antler development, Winkler noted.

He added that early reports from the Chaparral Wildlife Management Area near Cotulla and the Kerr Area in Kerr County indicated that hunters saw numerous deer.

Winkler said because of the range, conditions and the rutting season getting underway, hunters should get into the field early this year and utilize antlerless deer permits as well as trying for a buck.

In spite of good range conditions in many areas right now, Winkler said, it is an urgent need to harvest more antlerless deer because of overpopulation. He said, however, he is becoming more aware of this need in many areas, and some even are requesting hunters to take a doe before allowing them to shoot a buck.

The early rut, which is at least partially a result of the good forage conditions, is a real boon to hunting, Winkler pointed out, as the deer are moving fast enough to give hunters some shots.

The good range and forage conditions extend almost throughout the traditional whitetail hunting areas of South Texas and the Edwards Plateau, and even northward through the major deer areas in West and North-Central Texas.

East Texas, on the other hand, has fairly stable populations but not as good forage conditions due to a lack of precipitation, Winkler said.

Slime Mold Appears In Wet Weather

A common but usually not damaging nuisance during wet fall weather is slime mold. These molds cover plants, particularly lawn grasses, with a dusty gray, black or dirty yellow film. Slime molds do not feed on living plants. They normally live on the soil and feed on decaying organic matter, using plants only for support during reproduction.

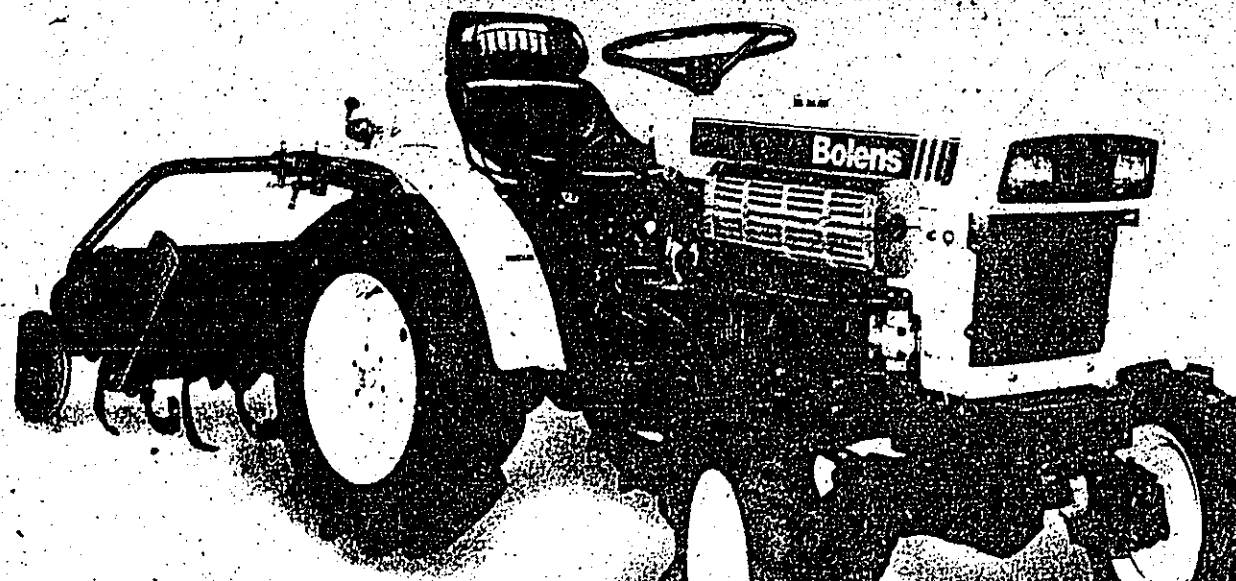
The molds move up on grass blades and other small plants to reproduce, forming in a mass of sooty-like powder.

The only damage to grass and other plants from slime molds is shading them from sunlight. If the fungus like growth becomes too heavy, it may cause leaves to yellow.

Village Mills Navy Vet "Back At The Bench"

BEAUMONT, TEXAS—A Navy veteran who is studying at Lamar University declares electronics is one of the "fastest growing fields."

William H. Maurer of Village Mills spent 23 years in the Navy, completing his service as a Master Chief Petty Officer. "During his Naval career he was an electronic technician and then a communications technician, literally serving all over the world."

Today he's back at Lamar, driving 47 miles each way each class day, studying electronics in the College of Technical Arts. He's studying under the GI Bill.

To other veterans who are turning to school, Maurer offers this advice: "I would recommend that other veterans evaluate the courses here based on their own needs. In other words, look into it."

"At Lamar, I'm taking a refresher course, relearning a lot of material I first learned back in 1953. During my final years in the Navy, I was a supervisor and got away from working on circuits. Now I'm back at a bench again."

He completed his Navy service in 1975.

"I'm in a transition period. Civilian life is completely different from the Navy, where we had one set of rules. In the service, learning is a duty. Here it is voluntary."

Maurer said when he completes his studies at Lamar, "I'm going to work."

He graduated from old French High School when it was in the French Independent School District in 1951. He served in the Merchant Marine on tankers, then enlisted in the Navy in 1953.

During his career, he was assigned to all kinds of ships—destroyers, cruisers, carriers, seagoing tugs, and submarines.

In his later years in the Navy, he was a communications technician working with the Naval Security Group on shore stations with duty in Europe, Asia, Alaska, Cuba and Mozambique.

While he was in London, he met and married his wife, Philomena, in 1958. She is a native of the Republic of Ireland.

The couple has four children. William Jr. is employed as a plywood heater supervisor at Kirby Lumber Corp., Silsbee. Maurer, Kathleen and Eileen are students in the Warren Independent School District.

He says he lives in "God's Country, in the Turkey Creek bottom next to the Big Thicket National Preserve." He hunts or fishes almost daily. "Lately he's been squirrel hunting and has had pretty good luck."

Maurer said he's always been an avid sportsman and fished whenever possible while in the Navy.

"I picked my place out years ago. I like the schools in Warren." He said his children had attended school in many places.

"Communications in the Navy have improved fantastically. Ships now use satellites and have television. I worked with satellite communications, and before they were developed we bounced signals off the moon."

Investigate Before Buying Firewood

COLLEGE STATION—Investigate before buying firewood, a specialist recommends.

Also, find out if delivery and stacking charges are extra or included in this quoted price, she suggests.

FIREWOOD TYPE
Type of firewood is just as important as price. Hardwoods—like oak and mesquite—have the best heating qualities and generally burn slowly.

Softwoods—like pine and cedar—work well as kindling but tend to burn quickly and spart frequently.

A cord of wood—"cord" is the standard unit of measure for firewood," she explains. "A cord is 128 cubic feet. For example, a cord of wood will fit a box eight feet long, four feet wide and four feet deep."

To check for a full cord, mark a 128 cubic foot area next to a fence—away from the house—and see that the wood fills this space, the specialist recommends.

Tips On Christmas Tree Maintenance

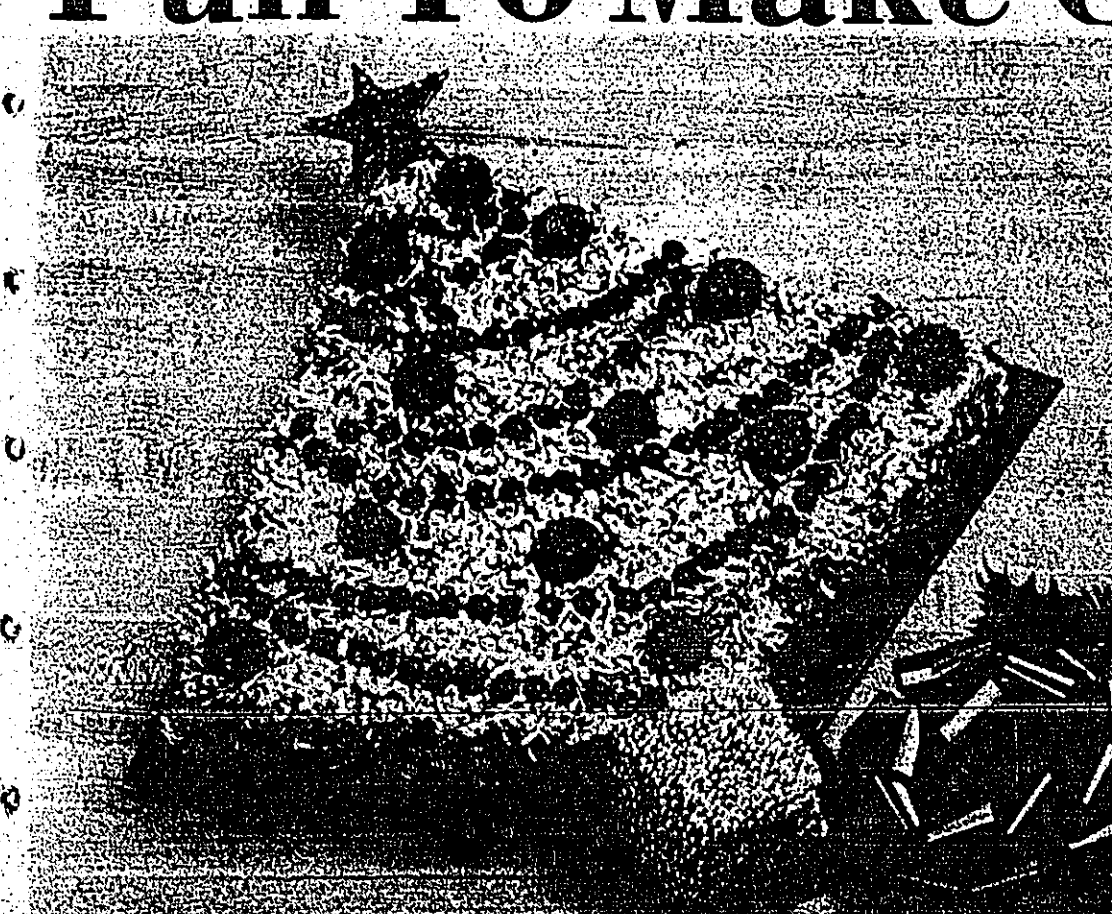
COLLEGE STATION—Many people still enjoy and appreciate the beauty, color and aroma of a traditional Christmas tree. Everett James, landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, offers some tips to help you select your Yule tree and maintain it in the best possible condition throughout the holiday season.

1. Choose your tree early. Most Christmas trees are cut four or five weeks before they arrive on the lot. The sooner you can get the tree home and into water, the better.
2. Select a full, dense tree that is evenly branched. The branches should be firm and flexible. Shake the branches when selecting to see if needles fall. Fresh, healthy Yule trees do not drop their needles.
3. Select a tree with good green color. This indicates that the choice is fresh, has good needle retention, fragrance, fire resistance and longer holiday beauty.
4. Once you have selected your tree, saw off the lower two inches of the trunk. This will help the tree absorb water which will insure freshness and lasting qualities.
5. Stand the tree in water in a cool location outside until you are ready to trim it. Then, place it in a tree stand that holds water and keep filled during the holiday season.
6. Place your tree in the coolest location possible indoors, away from the open fireplace, radiators and heat.

"While it might seem a great waste to cut down thousands of trees every year, we really should not criticize this practice," says James.

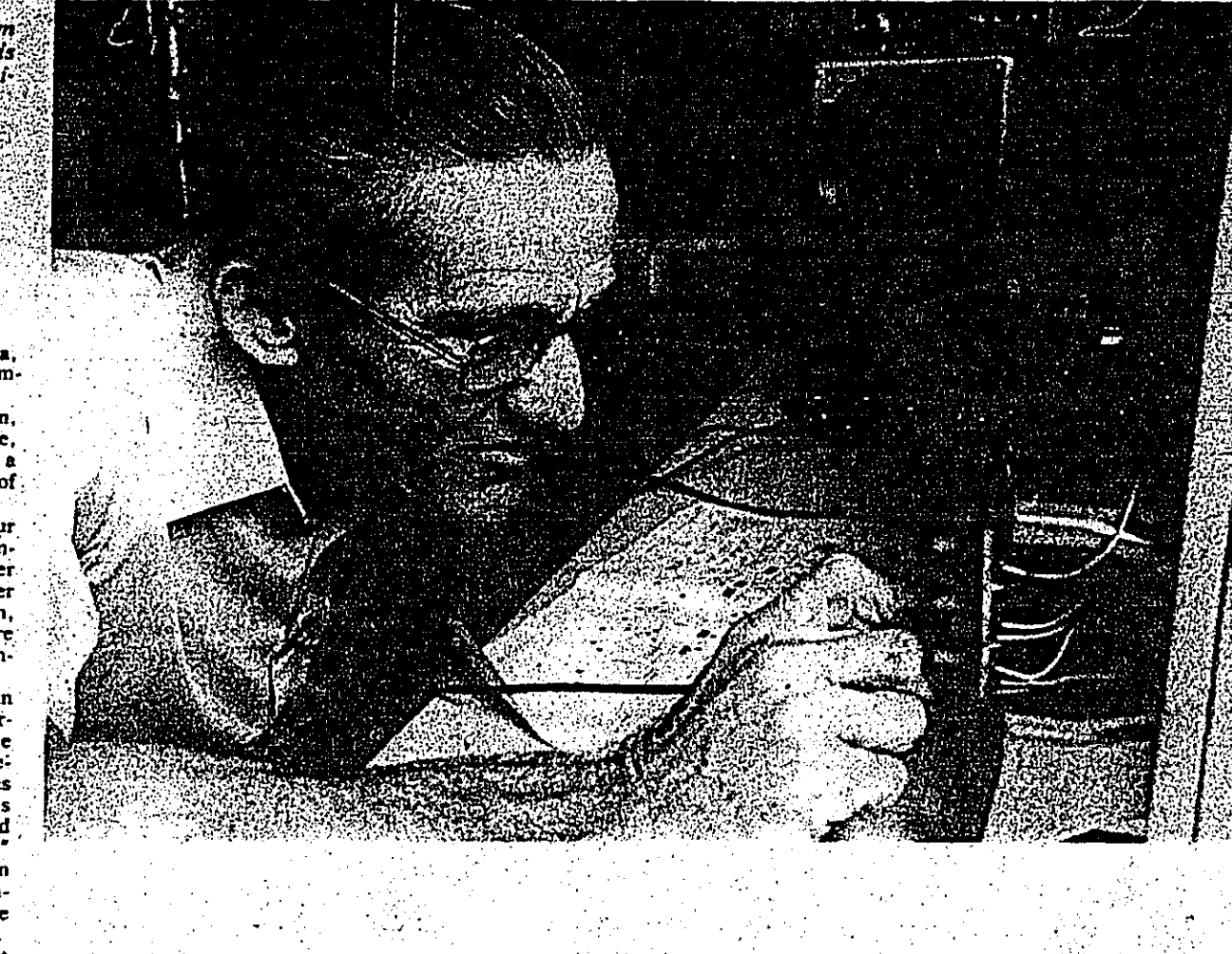
The majority of trees cut for Christmas are grown specifically for that purpose on commercial Christmas tree farms. They are just as much a crop as fruits and vegetables. In addition, we can be sure that, like fruits and vegetables, these trees are carefully replanted for future harvests."

Take Care Of Your Christmas Tree

FLUFFY WHITE Frosting

1 1/2 cup Imperial Granulated Sugar	1/2 teaspoon salt	2 egg whites, unbeaten
1/2 cup water	1/2 teaspoon lemon extract	1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar
2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour	1 cup red and green maraschino cherries, cut in half	
2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder

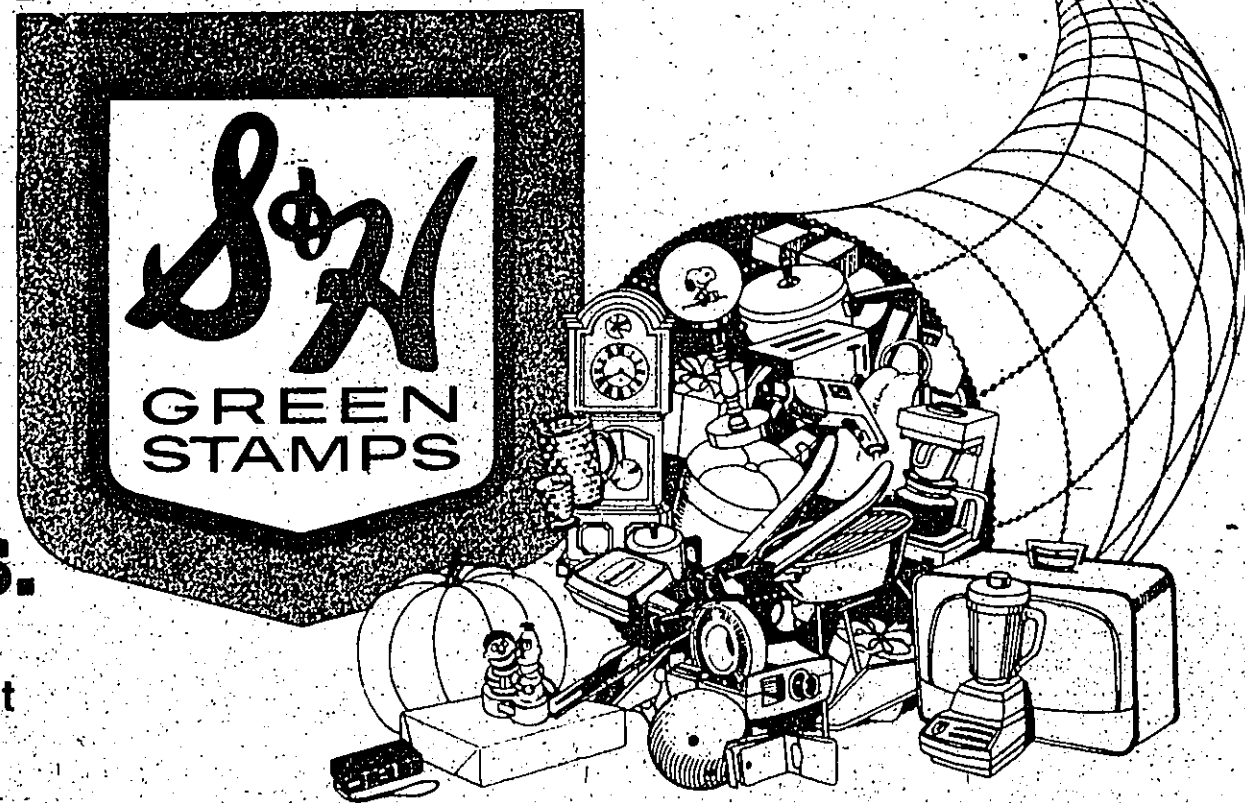

Tips On Slips

COLLEGE STATION—Proper slip length contributes to an attractive appearance with this year's longer or varied-length slippers, say a clothing specialist, Rocky Culp.

Mrs. Culp is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

CHECK LENGTH
To check slip length, align slip and garment waistlines.

The slip hemline should fall between the top of the garment's hem allowance and about one inch above the garment hemline, she explains.

TOO SHORT SLIP
A too-short slip is a noticeable distraction, especially with the lightweight and/or semi-sheer fabrics popular this season.

To lengthen a too-short slip, add a softly gathered ruffle of tailored band, or inset a similar fabric or decorative lace, the specialist suggests.

If a too-short slip already has an attractive hem finish, consider lengthening by inserting a suitable fabric at the waistline to drop the hem the amount needed.

TOO LONG SLIP
A too-long slip is just as unattractive as one that is too short, unless of course, it's designed to show. Mrs. Culp continues.

SEWING SLIP FABRICS
When sewing to lengthen or shorten tricot slips, use a fine ball point needle in sizes 9/70 or 11/80 and a lightweight synthetic thread, she recommends.

Straight, zigzag, stretch and other specialized machine stitches are suitable with seam allowances most often one-fourth inch wide.

For additional information on sewing with tricot, call the local County Extension Office or ask for the free publication "Tricot Knit Looks All Season" (4-1035).

AVAILABLE
Line with renewed interest in dresses and skirts, slips currently available are more varied than in recent years.

Multi-colored tiered, gored and straight lines in synthetic tricot or lightweight broadelons in cottons and blends are among those currently popular.

For the slit-hemline trend, slip looks are likewise slit, often with a curved edge at the slit hemline to minimize showing.

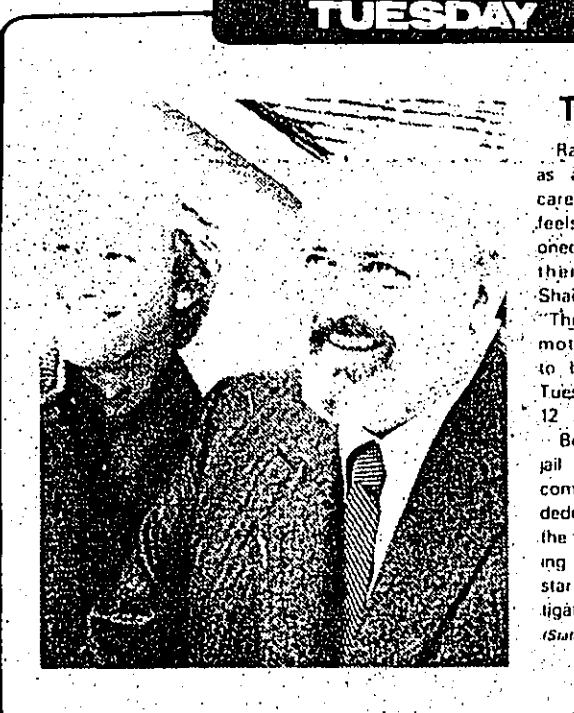

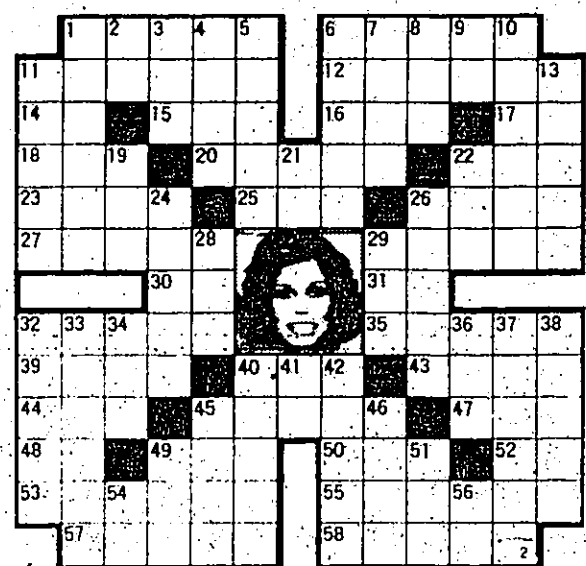

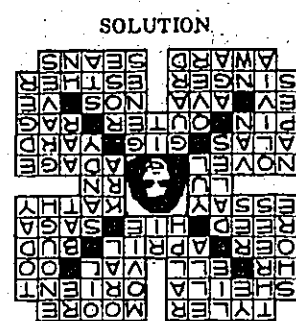

A Special Yuletide Animation Festival

Six different interpretations of Christmas, some animated, others mini-plays, are wreathed in the PBS special "Simple Gifts: Six Episodes for Christmas." The hour-long program is slated for Sunday, December 17, on most PBS stations. Be sure to check local listings for times and stations in your area.

"Simple Gifts" opens with a remarkable animation short. A bare-footed boy nervously paces a stark white frame. Inspiration strikes! Arm to branch, legs to trunk, he metamorphoses into a dazzling Christmas tree, repeat with crowning star on top and adorning youngsters at its base.

The first gift, "The Great Frost," is an animated excerpt from Virginia Woolf's "Orlando." Clumsy Orlando is a medieval London dandy. He has turned out for the Thames skating festival during a particularly severe winter only to be smitten by the mystique of a skating Russian princess.

The ice sculptures adorning the frozen Thames, the colorful cutouts of nobility, the static architectural backdrops

combine to give a picture-book quality to this fairy-tale romance.

Like any Christmas celebration, motion movies from opened gift to wrapped-box. Gift No. 2 is unraveled with particular care. "A Memory of Christmas" is taken from playwright Moss Hart's autobiography, "Act One." Hart and his parents are frozen in their New York City tenement during an impoverished Christmas by a succession of sepia-toned still photographs.

As Hart and his father case streetcars full of toys, 12-year-old Hart realizes his father has only enough money for a small gift. The chemistry set and the printing press he had set his heart set on are impossible.

Hart remembers his father's despair and his desire to comfort him. But instead "stood shivering beside him" because his family was so undernourished.

In "My Christmas," an entry from 11-year-old Teddy Roosevelt's diary contrasts with Moss Hart's melancholy memory. Set in Rome, this animated episode describes a day filled with love and pre-

December 25, 1914" tells of an extraordinary, short-lived truce during World War I. Based on a letter to his mother from a young British soldier, Captain Sir Edward Hulse, the segment describes the truce -- when, in certain parts of the line between the German and English forces, soldiers spontaneously refused to fight.

Instead, they came out of their trenches and began shaking each other's hands, exchanged gifts, sang together and played soccer. This went on for two days. The episode is recalled in dream-like sequences painted by noted watercolorist James McMullan.

"Toonerville Trolley" brings back to life the well-loved trolley car and Toonerville folks created by the late Fontaine Fox. William Littlejohn, who animated the original Toonerville Trolley shorts, animated this segment.

Finally, "No Room at the Inn" is an animated retelling of the traditional Christmas story.

At 'Alice's' Restaurant

Viewers Are Tipping Flo, Generously

A year ago, Polly Holliday faced an uncertain television future as Flo, the gun-chewing, blonde waitress with a squeaky Southern drawl on "Alice."

The co-producers started to trim her role. They even eliminated Alice's (Linda Lavin) son as they veered away from Alice's domesticity and strengthen her comedy involvement.

The alterations didn't last very long. The co-producers didn't, either. They departed after the first hour shows last season. Two of those episodes were redone, to build up Flo's role. Son Tommy (played by Phillip McKee), returned to his role. The other two episodes have never seen the light of television. Probably never will.

Now, Flo has not only reclaimed the character with all its original fervor, but she is emerging as a pivotal actress in the weekly comedy series on CBS, Sunday nights.

"Alice" is part of CBS's solid double-punch with "All in the Family" leading off the family-hour.

Except for the Southern accent, Polly and Flo are as far apart in their personalities as north is from south. Polly is a soft-spoken, sophisticated Southern lady whose tone doesn't dip in grits with every syllable. She is from the deep South, and taught school, startlingly enough.

She is a latecomer into acting, not getting interested until late in college. She dabbled with local community, then regional theaters. She labored for 10 years in stock before arriving in New York, where she rented a one-room studio apartment (with a bathtub in the kitchen, she notes) in Greenwich Village.

She still maintains that apartment, still goes to the corner luncheonette, for breakfast, where the Greek owner can't understand what she does for a living. Everytime she shows up on hiatus, the guys at the luncheonette think she's lost her job.

"They have no idea of what I do or who I am, except that I live in the neighborhood," says Polly. In fact, few people do recognize her on the streets, a luxury of a private life she enjoys very much. What the viewer sees on the screen is a far cry indeed from the real lady. That's a blond bouffant wig she wears. She really has dark hair, shaded with gray.

For this interview CBS

rented a two-room suite at the fabled Algonquin Hotel just for the day for press sessions because, as Polly explained, "I couldn't invite anyone to my apartment, with the tub in the middle of it."

She wore a tailored suit with coordinating high-neck sweater, a contrast to the white, above-the-knee waitress's outfit, which television viewers see her in.

Asked about her anonymity on the streets, Polly responds, "That's fine with me. I remember when I was in Dustin Hoffman's play on Broadway ('All Over Town'). Dustin had to hide out in the theater after each performance until the crowd

left the stage-door area. I don't relish that."

There is a career problem, however. To agents, producers, directors she is "Flo." Consequently, the only roles that have been offered to her have been those that are similar to her TV character.

She turns down those roles. At one point Warner Brothers, which produces

the series, wanted her to appear in public, wearing the wig all the time -- especially on talk shows.

"I said no to that," she reports. Because of this problem, the only feature she's been able to do was "The One and Only," with Henry Winkler last year. In that film, she played Kim Darby's mother.

If she's concerned about being typed, she doesn't express it. "I love doing 'Flo' so it hasn't bothered me yet," Polly explains. "I just get so intrigued by her."

There has been talk of a spin-off almost since the series first went on the air. Polly is skeptical about it.

"I don't know if I would want another five years of playing her (assuming it would be a successful series)," she says cautiously. "My whole feeling is that if they would end the show tomorrow, I'd come right back to New York and do anything in theater."

Occasionally, she falls back on her teaching experience and conducts acting classes in Los Angeles. She gives young students seeking an acting career this advice:

"Read a lot, and major in English in college. Do whatever is at hand -- community theater, college plays, neighborhood plays. First thing I ever did was in college."

"I had a woman write to me from the Midwest, married two kids, telling me she wanted to come to Hollywood and be a television star, that she was big in her community theater. I wrote back and said she had everything, a husband, children, theater. I told her not to give it up."



Is more than one show-business career in a family sure to trigger speedy divorce?

The record shows otherwise.

Alexis Smith, currently the toast of Broadway in the musical "Platinum," has been married for 34 years to Craig Stevens, a frequent television guest star this season and forever remembered as "Peter Gunn."

During the long years of her stately-lady movie stardom only he and she knew she was also an agile dancer yearning to kick up her heels. But his inside knowledge of the vagaries of show biz reinforced her own healthy philosophy that if you don't get the job you want, you do something else. For her, the first of the "right" jobs came along half-a-dozen years ago with "Follies," which won her a Tony Award.

Steve Lawrence and Eydie Gorme, who work together and separately, now have two decades of legal togetherness to their credit.

Interestingly, there is also a sub-category of successful twosomes who met on-the-job early in their careers, or in drama school. They wed young and struggled for dual goals. Many of the wives, who beat their husbands to career breakthroughs, retired and let their husbands solo in the limelight.

Chauvinism? To the last man, these male stars say "no!" It was the women who chucked their careers because they didn't want to be separated from their small children.

Tony Lo Bianco Is Cagey With Big Cats

Tony Lo Bianco will be thrown to the cats this Sunday when CBS presents the "3rd Annual Circus of the Stars."

Along with other death-defying acts, which include Bob Seagren and Cathy Lee Crosby's flirtation with the "Wheel of Destiny" 55 feet above the ground, Lo Bianco puts a panther, a tiger and a leopard through their paces in a locked cage. Neither he, nor the cats can escape.

Why would a successful actor agree to risk his life in a circus act?

"I get a great feeling of communication and alertness," he says. "It's as though I have a third eye. You have to be constantly aware of all three animals."

When Tony steps into the cat cage a surge of energy runs through him. "It's scary," he says, "but it's exhilarating, too. There's a sense of danger and accomplishment that comes from doing something that's not done often."

He confesses that he dreamed about the cats later.

Tony is all enthusiasm as he recounts his scant training sessions with trainer John Campolongo. "We had three and one-half days of rehearsal. The first day there was no cage. The second day we went through the choreography without the animals. The third day we went through the whole routine."

The rehearsals were held outside, but the TV performance was taped in the sports arena of Caesars Palace in Las Vegas. Tony

says that Campolongo's 10-minute act became an hour-long ordeal at taping time. The heat got the cats cranky and each trick had to be repeated several times.

Trainer Campolongo assembled the three-cat act about six months ago. Tony is the only other person to carry it off.

In fact, Campolongo insisted that only Tony take his place in the TV circus. Tony commands the animals to leap through a flaming hoop. He has the panther leap over his head and the leopard roll over on its back.

Standing in for a big cat tamer isn't all exhilaration and cheering crowds, Tony admits. "There can be some hairy moments."

For instance, when the tiger started weaving back and forth from paw to paw and his claws came out, Tony figured it was time to end the rehearsal and leave the cage.

Eye contact is of utmost importance in an animal act. Tony cited a second instance when he was too tense and his eye contact was too strong. Trainer Campolongo called him out of the cage and explained that he had hypnotized the

cats. They didn't know where they were and could jump their trainer.

"You have to gauge their tension," Tony says. That way you know when to leave the cage.

Although Tony finds the cat act a challenge, his family is not supportive. "My wife doesn't want to hear about it," he says, "nor the kids."

He insists, "You have to be very firm with animals. John Campolongo is like a madman when he is in the cage with them." If you're dealing with cats with teeth and claws that big and that sharp, discipline is a top priority.

When the trainer is in control, big cats can be wonderful. Tony can say with the self-confidence of a life-long sawdust campaigner, "I love those animals; they're very sweet."

As an actor, Tony has an advantage over your everyday amateur cat trainer. Much of the cat act is choreography, standing in the right place at the right instance and imitating Campolongo's technique.

"Whatever the part is, I do it," Tony says with a versatile actor's assurance. "So, I'm an animal trainer. You do what is required. I became a rodeo rider in 'Goldenrod.' I learned to ride in five days. I do all my own stunts. I like to do different things."

Tony doesn't know if he'll get into the cage again next year. Trainer Campolongo wants to incorporate a lion, then later a bear into the act. Dealing with that many ferocious animals requires real expertise.
