## Commissioners Distribute School District Funds

The Tyler County Commissioners met Monday and approved the distribution of funds received from the local school boards within Tyler County.

The Rev. Jesse Adams reported on the progress thus far in finding a location for the hot meal program for the aged. Tyler County is one of three counties participating in the Governor's Committee on Aging

to provide hot meals for a minimum quota of 100 persons a day. Both San Jacinto and Livingston Counties have programs in operation but Tyler County has not been able to locate a building for this purpose.

The Court entertained a motion to investigate the possibility of buying the old Baptist Church in Hillister for this program and to be used as a community center. The building is made of cypress and could be moved to a location in Woodville upon the approval of the Commissioner's Court. Adams said. This would not only

allow for the hot meal program, but also several other functions as a community center. The Court approved the formation of a committee to study the cost and possibility of government aid to complete this program.

There were four companies present to present their bids on the cost and delivery of a front end loader for Precinct 4. The George P. Bane, Plains, Mustang, and Allen Companies presented their bids after which the Court recessed to consult with Commissioner Bo Jordan who is in the hospital. Based upon his recommendation the bid from the George

emphasized that today, when most household items, such as carpeting and upholstery are made from synthetics, people need to exercise extreme caution and refrain if at all possible from re-entering a burning building. The smoke and fumes from these burning chemicals are very lethal, he added.

Christmas shoppers should keep their local post office in mind as a source of inexpensive holiday gifts again this year, the U.S. Postal Service said today.

Several philatelic items appropriate for holiday gift giving are on sale at most post offices throughout the country. They are also available by mail order from the Philatelic Sales Branch in Washington.

The fifth edition of the 240-page Stamps & Stories book, significantly revised and updated to include 1978 stamps, has color reproductions of every U.S. postage stamp issued by the U.S. Postal Service since 1847.

Stamps & Stories sells for \$3.50 per copy.

The 1978 Mint Set, which sells for \$4.50 is a colorful folder containing all the 28 commemorative and special stamps issued during 1978 except the CAPEX Souvenir Sheet. The Mint Set also features a brief description of each issue, and acetate strips on the inside of the folder provides spaces in which the stamps may be mounted and displayed. The cover portrays a montage of art work related to the stamps that wraps around all three sides of the folder.

Other philatelic items, including earlier issues of stamps and postal stationery, are available by mail order from the Philatelic Sales Branch, Washington, DC 20265 at the quoted prices plus a 50-cent handling charge per order. There is a \$5.00 minimum order requirement.





Senator Roy Blake Looks At Costs

The third most expensive function of government in the State of Texas is the Highway Function where \$60 per capita was spent in 1976. Texas ranks 11th in the most populous states in per capita expenditure. The State of Virginia, spending \$113 per capita and is followed by Illinois, spending \$102 per capita. The national average is \$85 per capita.

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation (SDHPT) is the agency responsible for the administration of the highway system. A three member commission and the state engineer-director, who is elected by the commission to serve at its pleasure, develop the policies and direct the operations of the department.

The designated Texas Highway System carries about 70,000 miles and carries 75% of all state traffic. It includes three major highway classifications: 3200 miles of interstate highways carrying over 20% of all state traffic; 27,300 miles of primary or secondary highways carrying about 40% of all state traffic; and 40,500 miles of secondary or Farm to Market roads carrying about 10% of all state traffic.

The Interstate Highway System when completed will total about 90% of the nation's system was originally planned to be completed by the early 1970's but because of inflation and manipulation of the federal highway fund, will not be completed until after the year 2000.

The Texas Farm and Ranch to Market System is the most developed and highly sophisticated system in the nation. The system was designed to primarily serve local needs, but it also provides access to connecting roads to metropolitan markets.

On the Federal Aid Projects involving highways other than the interstate system, the Texas State Engineer's Office is the most sophisticated and highly developed system in the nation. 

Flu Season Near Says County Health officer

The flu season in the Woodville area is supposed to hit sometime during the middle of the winter. The health officer on through the cold and rainy months ahead. Dr. John Gilchrist, County Health Officer, said Monday.

"This fall," he states, "has not been particularly heavy with outbreaks of flu, but rather with more of the allergic infections characterized by colds, coughs, and other complications. Along with this, the area has seen a degree of gastro enteritis which for the layman is best known by its characteristic symptoms of severe vomiting and diarrhea. The common flu is especially noted for myalgia, or that familiar aching in the muscles as well as vomiting and diarrhea. The flu is readily passed in crowded and poorly ventilated conditions such as schools, churches with cold, wet weather."

Even though it is not possible to avoid completely those conditions which transmit the flu germ, Dr. Gilchrist does advise sensible care especially for the aged and those with a sensitivity to myalgia and bronchitis. The flu germ changes every year and is often hard to categorize as well as treat, but for those who catch it, a flu inoculation which has been found to be of benefit," Gilchrist says.

The American College of Physicians agrees on the importance of flu inoculations emphasizing primarily chronically ill adults, children, and old people. Dr. Gilchrist concurs with the ACP that the inoculation of persons who is not particularly fit to the flu, but as in all administration of medicine care should be taken. The Center For Disease Control of the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare in Atlanta, Georgia recommends annual vaccination for all persons. It has been found that there are three types of care should be taken. The ACP states: "These are characterized by enteric fever and myalgia (muscle aching), allergic reactions due to some components in the vaccine, as in some extremely rare cases, paralytic of some parts of the body. This condition is very rare though; Dr. Gilchrist states, and occurs in other immunocompromised individuals. The treatment for rabies,

There will be two showings a night at the Pines Theater, the first feature beginning at 5 p.m. and the second beginning at 7 p.m.



## Mistletoe Isn't Just For Christmas Kissing

To most people, mistletoe means excuse to steal a kiss at Christmas time. But that's just one of many traditions that have been associated with this curious, parasitic plant, according to the current issue of National Wildlife magazine.

"For centuries, people all over the world have considered mistletoe to be a charm against disease, witchcraft, and infertility," says the bi-monthly publication of the National Wildlife Federation. "Mistletoe superstitions probably came about because of the unusual and rather eerie way in which the plant grows.

Mistletoe flourishes in clumps on the trunks and branches of various hardwood trees, where it robs its host of water and nutrients. Often, the host tree becomes weakened that it dies. But since mistletoe can produce its own food when necessary, the parasite remains green and moist.

Because they were unable to explain how mistletoe grew, ancient civilizations believed the plant had supernatural powers, says National Wildlife. Peasants in both England and Japan believed that barren women would be able to conceive after eating mistletoe. The Wata of Africa attached mistletoe leaves to their bodies, confident that it would then be protected from injury, the Swedes carved sword handles from mistletoe branches to ward off witches, while other Europeans wore mistletoe garlands to guarantee a successful hunt.

Mistletoe is not a very tasty plant. In fact, although there are more than a thousand varieties throughout the world, only one animal—the tiny Australian mistletoe bird—relies solely on mistletoe for food. But medical history reveals that despite its taste, mistletoe was often fed to ailing patients by physicians who thought it had curative powers.

French physicians used mistletoe as an antidote for poisons. And one 17th century British physician observed that the plant is "good for the grief of itch, sores, tooth-ache, and the biting of mad dogs and venomous beasts."

Even as late as the mid-1700's, National Wildlife reports, many European medical authorities thought mistletoe possessed magical powers, it's not surprising that the plant was long forbidden in Christian churches. It was thought to be tainted with heathendom. But the

## Clower Makes Proposal

AUSTIN—Senator Roy Clower (D-Garland) today pre-announced a proposed Constitutional Amendment reserving in the people of Texas all levels of government the rights of initiative, referendum and recall. "This amendment," Clower stated, "would allow the people through a petition signed by a designated percentage of the qualified voters to place a question on the ballot for consideration, to veto measures enacted by the legislature or passed by local governments, and to recall public officials from all levels of state and local government."

Clower, who has both introduced and supported these issues in previous Sessions of the Texas Legislature, as well as during the Constitutional Convention, commented that, "These provisions are not contained in our present Constitution, and it is literally putting the ability to govern into the lap of the people."

WASHINGTON—Loans for low-income farm families to build their farming operations and raise family incomes are now available through local county offices of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) of the U.S. Department of Agricultural Credit Act of 1978.

Gordon Cananough, FmHA administrator, today announced that FmHA is implementing the "limited resource" farmer authority of the Agricultural Credit Act of 1978.

The program provides credit at reduced interest rates to low-income families whose farm operations and resources are so limited they cannot afford the regular interest rates for FmHA loans. "The program is intended as a helping hand to young, beginning farmers and others, including many minority people, who have not had an opportunity to build substantial farms and make an adequate living," Cananough said.

Limited resource borrowers of farm real estate and operating loans will be allowed to defer the beginning of repayment, if necessary, until three years after they get their loans.

For real estate loans to buy or improve land and buildings, borrowers will pay a 3 percent interest for the first three years of repayment, then 5 percent in the following two years. Thereafter, they will pay whatever rate they can afford, but not less than 5 percent, and not more than the full rate ordinarily applied to FmHA farm loans (currently 8 1/2 percent).

Limited resource loans for production purposes will bear 3 percent interest during the first two years of repayment, with borrowers graduating to whatever higher rates they can afford, up to the maximum FmHA rate) as their farming operations improve. Borrowers' ability to pay higher interest will be reassessed every two years after the initial 3 percent interest period.

"They will benefit both from the availability of credit and technical assistance from the FmHA county staff," he said.

### Farm Bureau Adopts Program

DALLAS - Delegates to the Texas Farm Bureau's 45th annual meeting in Dallas Nov. 26-29 adopted a compromise flexible parity program recommendation.

The 1,150 voting delegates, representing 228,079 member families, re-elected Carol Chaboupa, Dalhart, as president of the TFB.

They also elected George White, Thompsonville, Gonzales County, as state director, replacing the retiring Milton Harborth of Seguin.

Following the convention, the Board of Directors re-elected Reed Lang, Rio Hondo, as vice president and S.M. True, Jr., Plainview, as secretary-treasurer.

The flexible parity resolution calls for amending the present farm program to provide for a formula of variable government-set target prices for set-aside acres of cotton, wheat, feed grains and rice.

It also calls for a loan rate of 75 percent of parity for those crops.

The recommendation, which will be forwarded to the American Farm Bureau Federation annual meeting in January in Miami Beach, embodies provisions of the Dole Bill which the TFB

endorsed in February. Under the plan, the more acres a farmer sets aside, based on his past history, the higher his target price would be.

## Big Move to Los Angeles And Mike Douglas Is Acting Up

By DAN LEWIS

**HOLLYWOOD** — After 13 years in Philadelphia, four in Cleveland and more than 4,000 shows of 90-minute duration each, Mike Douglas has finally gone Hollywood.

He happens to love it. "I've never felt this kind of energy," says Douglas, a one-time big band singer (he was the "boy singer" with Kay Keyser) who is one of the most venerable talk-show hosts in television syndication.

Mike moved his show to California in October. He tapes the daily (five times a week) show at CBS facilities at Fairfax and Beverly Boulevard in the studio where Red Skelton toiled for so many successful seasons, and where Sonny & Cher had their original television successes.

He's living like a king, too. He and wife Jen purchased the sprawling, posh house once owned and inhabited (until his death) by Harry Cohn, legendary for his crudeness as well as business acumen as president of Columbia Pictures.

"It's quite a house," says Mike enthusiastically. "It has a screening room, and if I have a star coming on the show who is in a new picture, all I have to do is send for a print, and I watch it right there, in my own house."

That impressive luxury also makes it much more comfortable for Mike to prepare for his interviews.

"In Philadelphia, and Cleveland, if I wanted to see a picture before the star came on, I would have to go downtown to a movie house, which isn't so terrible, except you have to stick to their schedule. Now, I can view at my convenience."

There are a number of additional benefits in moving his show to the Hollywood area.

"Stars are more accessible," Mike observes. "I walked down the hall at CBS the other day and ran into Mary Tyler Moore. I said 'I'd love to have her come on the show, and she said she would. As easy as all that, I couldn't get Mary on in Philly.'"

He had Lucille Ball cohosting for one week. Mike, an avid golfer, plays with Lucy's husband. He also plays with George C. Scott, Lawrence Welk, Bob Newhart and Joe Namath at the "Bel Air" Country Club. You can expect any and all of those stars to appear on the show. Namath already has several times.

"You build personal relations with these people, and consequently, when you ask them to go on the show, you don't have to go

through 900 agents and managers."

Also, it's easier for Mike to do network guest shots now that he's out here where the action takes place.

In the past, Mike would take his show "on location" to Hollywood for several weeks a year. But those days were always hectic, trying to cram so much into so short a time. Now, he can pace it, go onto sets like "Battistar Galactica" at the studio, or visit the homes of stars and catch them in informal situations.

"In the past, the stars were only available to us in Philadelphia during hiatus, when the network or the studio would ship them around to plug movies, or TV shows, or books. Now that we're out here, we can get whom we want almost anytime. Even if they're working on a particular day we're taping, there's time for them to drop by and appear," Mike notes. "We get people at the height of what they're doing, and when they're working."

All these accommodations create a less hectic schedule for him, and Mike says he'll have time to do other things — like producing, acting and organizing a production company.

He'll also host the Mike Douglas-E.F. Hutton National Football League Pro-Celebrity Golf Tournament. The annual event, which he started, will take place in Las Vegas, Feb. 7-11, at the Desert Inn.

About an acting career, Mike asserts: "I want to do some acting. It seems natural with me. I want roles; not Mike Douglas parts. I've had offers to play Mike Douglas in films, and I've turned them down. I've also had other offers, but it wasn't possible when I was

# Cazenove Tattles on 'The Duchess'

Minus a mustache, tails and a top hat, Christopher Cazenove has the same quiet charm of his "Duchess of Duke Street" character, Charlie Tyrrell. Playboy Charlie romances Louisa Trotter and the American public in the current, Sunday-night series airing on PBS's "Masterpiece Theater."

If Louisa Trotter is based upon the life of Rosa Lewis, does Charlie Tyrrell have a historical counterpart?

Casually dressed in a grey suit and blue plaid shirt, Chris looks very 1978 as he comments on his turn-of-the-century role. "Not strictly speaking, Lord Ribblesdale, perhaps. Rosa was initially set up by the Edward VII, the Prince of Wales, when the hotel first went bust... Lord Ribblesdale certainly had a suite of rooms there."

Charlie Tyrrell, therefore, is a composite of Lord Ribblesdale and Edward VII.

Chris added that Rosa Lewis claimed to have had three lovers in her life: "The Prince of Wales, the Kaiser and Ribblesdale. But Lord Ribblesdale was 20 years older than Rosa, it's doubtful that there was a child."

"After WW I, Rosa was still running the hotel — of course, it had gotten rather seedy by then — a woman collaborated with her on her life story. People joked that she was Rosa's daughter."

He insists that this rumor was the closest Rosa ever came to having a child. He also adds that producer John Hawkesworth toned down Rosa's eccentricities when he created Louisa.

The big question for "Duchess of Duke Street" viewers is whether Charlie is relived when Louisa rejects his marriage proposal.

Chris hedges a bit, lights another cigarette, then answers, "She was the only woman who really held his interest. He was genuine in the offer."

Although Charlie doesn't appear in every episode,

"He comes and goes," Chris explains, "that I would only be in episodes with strong story lines for my character."

Unfortunately, in the episode in which Chris's wife, Angharad Rees, guest-stars (she starred as Demeza in the "Poldark" series), Charlie is absent. The husband and wife acting team didn't get to work together as they had planned.

Charlie stays on at the Bentinck Hotel, and he romances several pretty women. But Chris says the romance between Charlie and Louisa is a case of "unrequited love. Both are the only ones for each other."

Although Charlie is "a bit of a rogue," throughout the rest of the series, he is involved in a search for purpose.

Chris says that he thinks this is a pet theme — the well-to-do person with everything but a purpose in life — of producer John Hawkesworth. He says, "I take up painting. Charlie thinks for a while he's found a way."

According to Chris, Charlie is a lost soul, who is dependent upon Louisa's strength. He says that Charlie is "a bit of a tease" to stay on in the hotel after his affair with Louisa is finished, but insists that he and Louisa have a need for each other.

Chris has been a common face on British television screen since his "The Regiment" series aired in 1971. "The Duchess of Duke Street" was such a success — it aired in 1976 — that the BBC also produced a second series, which picks up where the first leaves off in 1909 and goes through WW I up to 1922-23.

Chris can pinpoint the image he's developed in England. "Since the 'Regiment,' I've been typed between 1880-1890, in higher echelons of society with military leanings."

Quickly, he adds, "In the new play, I'm up to date and modern. In theater one can avoid stereotyping."

Chris begins rehearsing Alan Ayckbourn's new play in London's West End in January.
