Court Approves Bills

Adams Is Mr. East Texas

WOODVILLE—Former state senator Don Adams of Jasper has been named Mr. East Texas for 1979.

The honor, which recognizes distinguished service on behalf of the East Texas region, is awarded annually in conjunction with the Tyler County Dogwood Festival. The 36th annual festival kicks off March 31 with Western Weekend, followed by the parade, coronation and pageant on Saturday, April 7.

Festival officials announced the selection during a Monday afternoon ceremony in Austin, where Adams maintains a law office.

The 40-year-old Adams joins a select group of past recipients that includes former governors Allan Shivers of Woodville and Price Daniel Sr. of Liberty, former ambassador

Ed Clark of San Augustine and industrialist Arthur Temple of Diboll. Last year's recipient was Beaumont businessman Ben Rogers.

Adams served nearly a decade in the Legislature before resigning in early 1978 to become chief legal counsel for then-Gov. Dolph Briscoe. Four days after joining Briscoe's staff, the governor made Adams acting director of the Governor's Office of Migrant Affairs after the director was indicted. Adams was acting director for about three months.

In May of 1978, the Jasper native had the job of appointments secretary added to his responsibilities as legal counsel.

Adams was first elected to the House in 1968 and was re-elected in 1970. In 1972, he won election to the Senate and had no opposition in winning a second term in 1974. In 1975, he was appointed chairman of the important Senate Administration Committee and in 1977 became vice chairman of the powerful Senate Finance Committee.

During his nine years in the Legislature, Adams authored and sponsored a long list of bills with both statewide and local impact. During his

second term in the Senate, he played a key role in enactment of the law which created the Texas Public Utility Commission. He also worked hard to win passage of the first comprehensive pension act for firefighters and was active in revising the state family code and code of criminal procedure.

In 1974, as a member of the Senate, Adams was a delegate to the first constitutional convention in 99 years. In his job as chairman of the Senate Administration Committee, he was responsible for preparing rules of procedure for the first in-

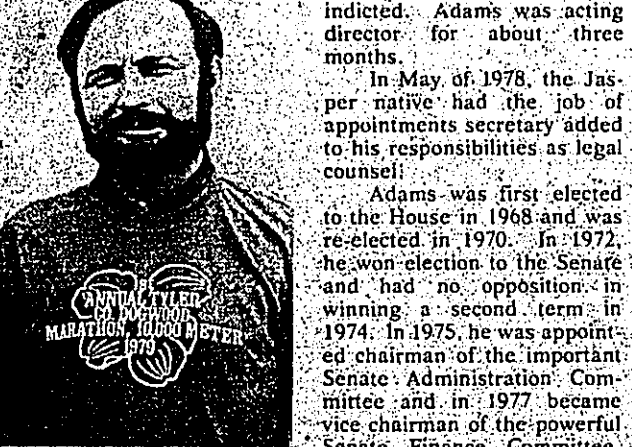

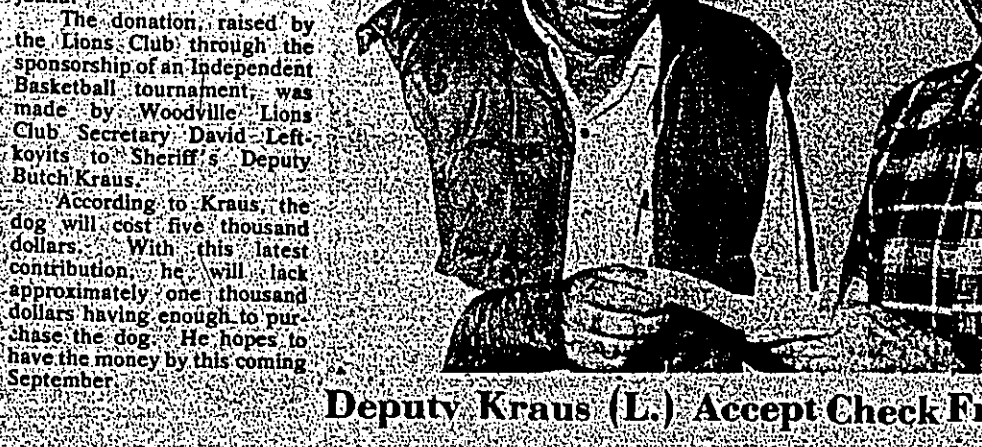

Dogwood Week Soon

With the annual announcement of its dogwood time in Tyler County, the citizens of Tyler County will pay tribute to the beauty of their East Texas springtime with the thirty-sixth dogwood festival, scheduled for March 31 - April 7. Known as the oldest outdoor festival in the South, the Tyler County Dogwood Festival was founded in 1940 by local citizens who wished to share the magnificent beauty of the dogwood blossoms with visitors from all of Texas. Today the festival draws participants from the entire southern half of the United States as its reputation for hospitality, natural beauty and excellent entertainment grows.

Following the harsh winter weather, the belated spring promises to find the flowers at their peak along dogwood trails clearly marked for the festival visitor to enjoy. In addition, the ten day festival headquartered in Woodville, Texas, features two distinct weekends: Western Weekend, March 30-31 and Dogwood Weekend, April 6-7. Highlights of the Western Weekend include trailrides, a western parade, an exciting rodeo in the A.H.F.A. arena, and two western dances. Dogwood Weekend welcomes visiting royalty from surrounding towns who participate in the Saturday afternoon parade and the coronation and pageant Saturday night. The spirit of volunteer effort which makes the Tyler County Dogwood Festival such a success is evident in the elaborate parade floats, beautiful hand-made flowers which decorate the outdoor amphitheater, and professional performance of the pageant entertainers. To climax the event, two dogwood dances will be held April 7 following the coronation and pageant.

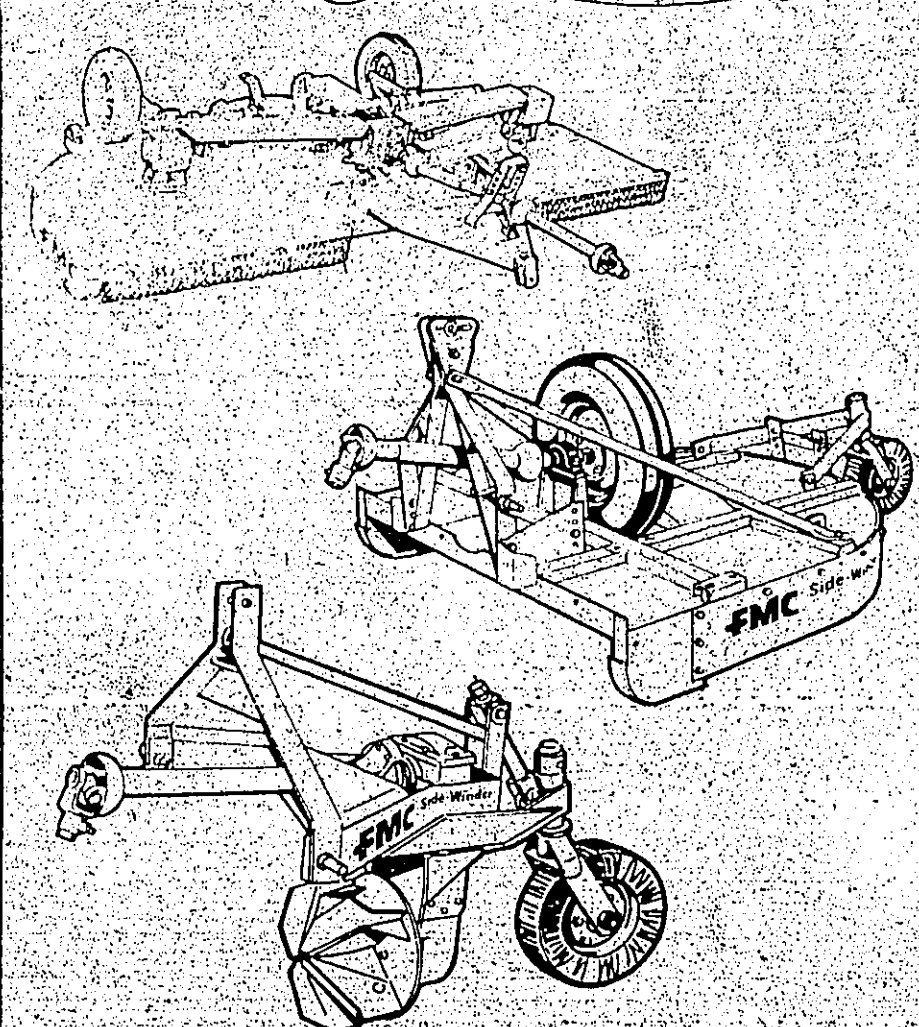

Dogwood Ad Sales Good

Advertising sales for the 1979 Tyler County Dogwood Festival book were the best ever according to figures released today by Bertis Best and Fred Sullivan, co-chair-

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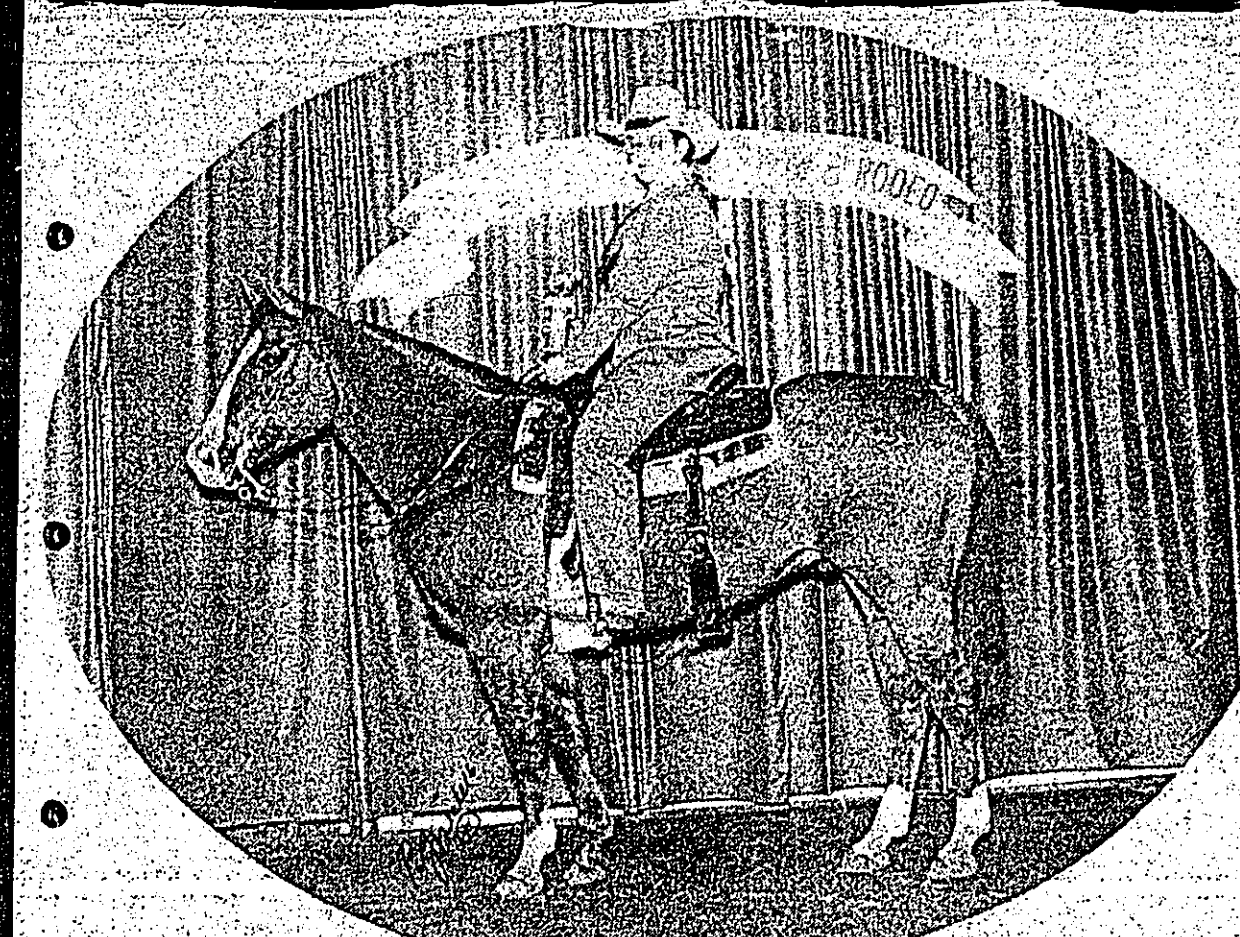

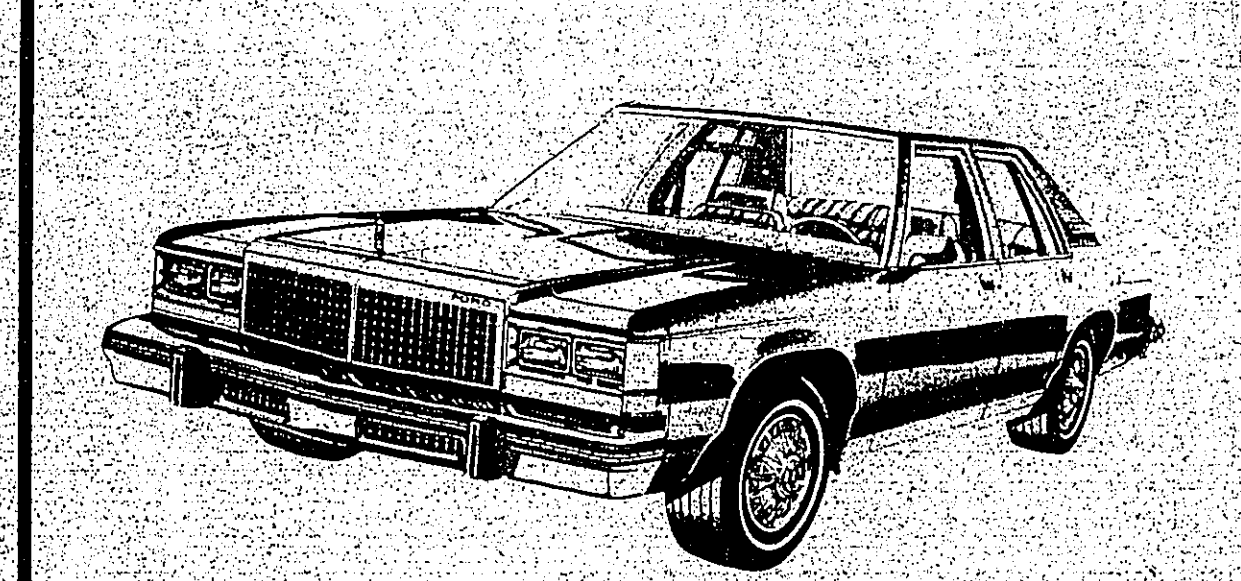

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Texas Education Agency To Test 78,850 Students

AUSTIN—The Texas Education Agency will test 78,850 elementary and secondary students April 3-May 15 in order to assess statewide achievement in economic and career education.

Results of the test, Phase II of the Texas Assessment Project, will be presented to the State Board of Education by January 1980, according to Dr. M.L. Brockett, commissioner of education.

We are continuing the Texas Assessment Project in order to meet the spirit of Senate Concurrent Resolutions 29 and 30 and Senate Bill 1 passed by the 65th Texas Legislature, Brockett points out.

The results of these tests, like the earlier assessment, will provide information for regional and statewide planning as we work toward a more effective system of public education.

First elements of the Texas Assessment Project tests in reading, mathematics, and citizenship were administered to some 94,000 public school students last spring. Results were presented to the State Board of Education in October and November.

Under the Phase II schedule, the following groups of students will be tested in two key areas: Economic education—22,400 6th graders and 28,650 11th graders. Career education—14,625 eighth graders and 13,150 11th graders.

The economic education test is designed to assess student learning in basic economics, the free enterprise system, and consumer education, according to Dorothy Davidson, Texas Education Agency associate commissioner for general education.

The economic education tests will be based on instruments developed by the Florida Department of Education.

"While we were able to use the Florida tests as a base, we revised some test items in order to make them more relevant to the Texas curriculum," Davidson explains.

The career education test packages will include a revision of instruments developed by the Texas Education Agency in 1975. The test items will point to job responsibilities to the job, and the relationships between education and careers.

"These tests will continue our efforts to assess the achievement of Texas students in learning areas which will enable them to function as adult citizens in our society," Brockett says.

Instruction in economic education, including the free enterprise system, must be effective if the state is to meet the needs of the future.

While career education is not mandated by law, it is a priority of the State Board of Education as well as a top priority of the Texas Legislature, the Governor's Office and the general public, Brockett adds.

The Phase II tests will be for the first time, gathering information about school program characteristics believed to be keys to student learning.

"We will ask the schools for a limited amount of information about curriculum and instruction, teacher in-service, use of citizen advisory groups, school board policy statements, and other factors," Brockett explains.

Information gained from these program-oriented questions to school principals, as well as the student test results, will be compiled on a regional and statewide basis to help plan improvements in public education throughout Texas," Brockett adds.

Phase II, like the earlier assessment, will not report any findings on individual schools, school districts, teachers or students.

Results will be analyzed in relation to the ethnicity and sex of students, type and size of school districts, and home factors, such as family economic status and language spoken in the home.



1979 Easter Seal Child Wiley Barrington And Gov. Clements

Easter Seals Presented To Clements

The first sheet of the 1979 Easter Seals has been presented to Governor William P. Clements in Austin by the 1979 Texas Easter Seal Child, Wiley Barrington, of Waco. Wiley is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl D. Barrington of Waco. He is 6-years old and a victim of hydrocephalus with shunt, spastic diplegia.

Presenting the seals on behalf of the 23,166 handicapped children and adults served statewide by Easter Seals, Wiley represents the needs of the widespread program of direct patient services, information, referral and follow-up, community and professional education, and transportation.

The campaign, which began March 1 and continues through Easter Sunday, April 15, is led by Walk Garrison of Ffisso, Texas. State Education Board Calls For New Textbooks

AUSTIN—The State Board of Education will call for new textbooks for six high school subjects for use in Texas public schools beginning September 1, 1980.

The 1979 textbook program, approved Saturday (March 10) by the Board, will carry an estimated price tag of \$6.82 million.

Additional costs, including redesigning of current textbooks, additional purchases of books now in use, and large type books, will be added to the \$6.82 million cost to bring the total to \$7.82 million.

The new text materials are scheduled for six high school subjects, including: mathematics, civics, government, and automotive trades. There are no elementary subjects on the list.

Materials to be submitted by national publishers will be reviewed by the new State Textbook Committee through the State Board of Education through the summer. The 15-member committee, all professional administrators and teachers now serving in Texas public schools, will be appointed by the Board at its April 15 meeting.

The career education test packages will include a revision of instruments developed by the Texas Education Agency in 1975. The test items will point to job responsibilities to the job, and the relationships between education and careers.

"These tests will continue our efforts to assess the achievement of Texas students in learning areas which will enable them to function as adult citizens in our society," Brockett says.

Instruction in economic education, including the free enterprise system, must be effective if the state is to meet the needs of the future.

While career education is not mandated by law, it is a priority of the State Board of Education as well as a top priority of the Texas Legislature, the Governor's Office and the general public, Brockett adds.

The Phase II tests will be for the first time, gathering information about school program characteristics believed to be keys to student learning.

"We will ask the schools for a limited amount of information about curriculum and instruction, teacher in-service, use of citizen advisory groups, school board policy statements, and other factors," Brockett explains.

Information gained from these program-oriented questions to school principals, as well as the student test results, will be compiled on a regional and statewide basis to help plan improvements in public education throughout Texas," Brockett adds.

Phase II, like the earlier assessment, will not report any findings on individual schools, school districts, teachers or students.

Results will be analyzed in relation to the ethnicity and sex of students, type and size of school districts, and home factors, such as family economic status and language spoken in the home.

Harmony Is The Name Of The Game For Piano Tuner

For most people, the inner workings of a piano some 235 strings, felt dampers, tiny knobs and other foreign appearing devices offer a momentary curiosity; for Ernest Stanton, they are a way of life.

Stanton, a graduate accountant employed in that trade for 15 years, turned to the music business several years ago. His change of career was prompted, he says, because of "the physical confinements" of bookkeeping. "I traded for longer hours and lots of miles," says Stanton, whose territory stretches from his home in Tyler to Woodville.

Stanton, who received his apprenticeship in piano tuning while working for Brook Mays Music Company, says music was a natural field for him to enter. "My whole family was musical. My father was a part time preacher who wrote and taught music, mostly gospel music," says Stanton, who still has copies of his father's song books.

Piano tuning, a somewhat rare skill, requires a great deal of mechanical ability. "There are several hundred working parts. In addition to an average of 235 strings," according to Stanton, "the profession also requires dedication, a sharp ear in discerning between good and wild tones and the ability to correct many kinds of malfunctions. It also helps to be able to play some," Stanton adds, who began playing as a small boy.

Pianos, according to Stanton, were first made by Italians and later perfected by Americans and Germans. One of Stanton demonstrates his piano tuning technique on this old upright piano. Tuning involves much more than the obvious part of adjusting the tuning pegs itself.

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

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Plant Pecan Trees Carefully

COLLEGE STATION—Pecan trees can add significantly to any home landscape or farm fruit planting. However, special attention should be given to selecting disease-resistant varieties, says a plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"The principle disease that Texas homeowners have to control on pecans is pecan scab," points out Dr. Jerral Johnson. "Pecan scab is caused by a fungus. Once infection occurs, small black spots form on the shucks and leaf foliage. Heavily infected pecans drop prematurely, or may be poorly filled."

Trees infected with scab early in the season often become severely defoliated, says Johnson. This defoliation can reduce the quality of the current season's pecan crop and can also reduce crop for the next two to three years.

"A number of excellent varieties are available to homeowners, including Chickaw, Cheyenne, Shawnee and Desirable. Homeowners that annually receive 28 inches or more rainfall should select varieties within this group," recommends Johnson. "These four varieties have good scab and will perform well in most areas of Texas."

In western areas, scab is not a major limiting factor, so other varieties can be used with good success, according to WCC plant pathologist. Varieties such as Wichita and Western can be grown in these areas with little chance of loss due to scab. However,

Pine Tree Disease Shows Orange Color

COLLEGE STATION—Forest landowners and homeowners may soon notice orange swellings on their pine trees. The orange dusty substances are spores of the uniform rust fungus, a case of southern pine rust, points out a forestry specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Slash pine appears highly susceptible to the disease while loblolly pine may also be infected, says Dr. Mike Walterscheid. The disease causes leaf problems on shortleaf or longleaf pine. Fusiform rust can severely damage pines, says the specialist. The disease may kill a young tree or make it susceptible to breakage if it grows older.

Quite often the disease may be present on young pines used in reforestation or during the rest of the year. The only sign of the disease is the spindle-shaped swelling on the pine stems or branches. Trees often have to be examined closely to find the swellings.

The bright orange spores that are produced on pines do not infect other pines but rather they infect oaks, Walterscheid. Orange spores or brown hair-like structures can be found on lower leaf surfaces of nearby water oaks, willow oaks or several other species about two to three weeks after spores are produced on pines. These structures are the halftone rust disease as it grows on oaks. The disease does not damage oaks, but spores produced by the halftone rust on oak leaves will infect pine trees.

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Tips On Planting A Good Pasture

COLLEGE STATION—A smaller than row crop seed, they do possess the stored energy reserves necessary to survive deep plantings. This means shallow planting, which subjects seed to insect removal, soil crusting and premature dryout of the soil. The planting material should be the first consideration, says Dorsett. The new grass should be planted by seed (such as Bahiagrass or Kleingrass) or vegetative growth (such as the bermudagrasses), and should be high quality, good germination, and free of weeds.

Dorsett suggests locating sources of the plant materials first in advance of planting. This prevents drying to prevent last-minute rush of the planting material. Another important factor for a successful pasture plan is a well prepared seed bed. Dorsett says a good seed bed is clean, firm, moist and smooth. It should not be freshly plowed or cloddy. The soil should be well settled, given time to settle. Soil disturbances near planting time should be kept to a minimum. Grass that develops can be broken by harrowing or by the planter itself. A stand should emerge with no further effort if high quality seed is properly placed in a good seedbed, contends Dorsett.

Other considerations in pasture establishment include weed control and fertility. A successful pasture can be established, contends Dorsett.

Services provided by professional lawn care companies can include fertilization, weed, insect and disease control, and problem diagnosis.

Fertilization should include timely and uniform applications of nitrogen at an annual rate of five to seven pounds per 1,000 square feet, says Duple. At least half the nitrogen should be from a slow-release source such as ureaformaldehyde, IBDU or sulfur-coated urea. Slow-release nitrogen extends the color response and reduces the burst of growth that follows application of soluble nitrogen.

Phosphorus and potassium should be included in spring and fall fertilizer applications in about a 3:1:2 ratio of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium, respectively. A source of iron is also needed in all fertilizer applications to St. Augustine lawns that weaken the lawn, notes the specialist.

"There is no advantage of liquid over dry fertilizer, or vice versa," says Duple. "Both slow-release and soluble fertilizers can be applied in dry or liquid formulations and can be applied uniformly with proper equipment." A light irrigation should follow fertilizer applications whether they are applied in a liquid or dry formulation.

"Professional lawn service does not free the homeowner of the responsibility to water and mow the lawn," Duple says. "Too often a lawn service customer fails to realize that fertilizer and chemical applications do not guarantee a beautiful lawn. Adequate watering and proper mowing are essential to maintaining an attractive lawn. If anything, additional fertilizers applied by professional lawn services increases the need for watering and mowing."

Study Lawn Service 'Professionals'

COLLEGE STATION—Homeowners subscribe to a professional lawn service to develop an attractive lawn and to reduce the time spent on lawn care. But most don't know what to expect from such a service, says a turf grass specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Many homeowners feel they do not have the time or expertise to apply fertilizers and pesticides when needed, so they call on a professional lawn service," points out Dr. Richard Duple.

"The specialist feels that the homeowner is often in a vulnerable position with respect to professional lawn care. A customer is likely to subscribe to the first company offering their service and to change the first time another company claims their service is superior."

What are reasonable expectations of a lawn service company?

"The company should describe its service in detail, provide advance notice of applications, respond within a reasonable time to problem calls, and provide trained and qualified applicators," says Duple. "Of course, a customer should also expect the lawn service operator to fulfill his promises. Too many operators promise weed control, grub control and other benefits which they really do not provide."

Choose Oysters Carefully

Very few people know anything about oysters except that they are good to eat.

But Texans need to be careful concerning the source of oysters and under what conditions they are processed, says the Texas Department of Health.

"Raw, fried, or Rockefeller oysters make delicious eating, and when they are properly harvested and handled under sanitary conditions, they are perfectly safe for eating," says Richard E. Thompson, with the Shellfish Sanitation Control Division.

"Because diseases such as typhoid fever, gastroenteritis, and infectious hepatitis can be spread by oysters from unsafe sources, consumers should be careful to buy 'certified' oysters from established legitimate dealers whose oysters are processed and packed in accordance with state requirements," said Thompson.

Thompson said these oysters will be found in containers bearing the name, address, and valid certification number of the packer. The container used for oysters can have the information embossed on the side and the popular 10 ounce jar will have it lithographed on the lid.

This is stipulated by the Texas Shellfish Sanitation Law of 1965 which establishes sanitary processing standards for oysters.

The Health Department also provides for the routine monitoring of Texas estuarine waters to determine which areas are safe and which are not for the taking of oysters.

"Maps of the 'produced' or closed areas and open areas are published and distributed free of charge by the Health Department and from the Parks and Wildlife offices," Thompson said.

Thompson said that currently, the economic crunch is providing incentive for illegal or 'bootleg' oyster activities in the state.

"A bootleg operation is one that is not under state inspection or supervision," he explained. "The sanitary quality of such oysters is questionable since such operations usually don't have the facilities to process a safe edible product."

ASCS Still Accepting Applications

The Tyler County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) began accepting applications for the 1979 wheat and feed grain program on February 15.

Program participation is voluntary. However, farmers with set-aside crops of barley, corn, grain sorghum, or wheat must file their intentions to participate during the sign-up period to be eligible for deficiency and disaster payment protection for these crops, as well as rice and upland cotton, and be eligible for price support loans on all crops except sugar.

All producers planting wheat and/or feed grains for harvest in 1979 on farms with a normal crop acreage are eligible to participate, Mr. Stafford said.

Forestry Films Offered To Public

LUFKIN—Several color films and slide sets on forestry and the Texas Forestry Museum are available for public use from the Texas Forestry Association.

The viewing range for some of the features has already included members of the city council, civic and garden clubs and students from several grade levels.

The "South's Amazing Forest" is a film receiving the greatest demand. The one-half hour film traces the history of forests in the South beginning with the period of cut-over lands through the reclamation of

the land to the most modern forest practice.

Another one-half hour film, "The Forests Are For People," tells the story of a college dropout who discovers forestry through encounters with a professional forester and a student environmentalist. Education proved preconceived notions to be false.

"Forests and the Insect Factor" is a 28-minute film describing the role of insects and man in the ecology of the forest. The problem of specific insect infestations around the country is told through the use of color animation, live interviews and

Galveston Hurricane Recalled

A hurricane on September 8, 1900, left 6,000 dead and 2,600 homes destroyed in Galveston. The city appointed Brig. Gen. H.M. Roberts, retired Chief of Army Engineers and author of "Robert's Rules of Order," Alfred Nobel, and H.C. Ripley to develop a means of protection. To prevent flood damage buildings were jacked up and the surface of the city was increased to as much as 12 feet above sea level. A 3.3 mile solid concrete wall rising 17 feet high and 16 feet wide at the top was constructed from 8th to 39th Street. For reinforcement a sand embankment backed the wall and stone riprap 127 feet wide and three feet thick protected the seaward side.

Completed in 1904, the seawall received its first major test in 1915. The 1900 storm winds had raged over 7 hours at 60 mph. The 1915 hurricane lashed the island with 19 hours of winds over 60 mph and winds of 70 mph pounded the coast for 9 hours. The tide rose 3.5 feet higher than in 1900, yet only 12 lives were lost and the property damage was far less. Although the wall cost \$1,500,000 it paid for itself

in the 1915 storm.

Through the year's work has continued on the seawall, extending it to nearly 10 miles or almost one third of the ocean front. In 1961 Hurricane Carla which covered almost the entire Gulf of Mexico, passed 120 miles southwest of Galveston and caused a tide of 10.7 feet above mean low tide. Although Galveston suffered from flooding from the bay side

and from severe damage inflicted by tornadoes on the edge of the storm, the seawall held back the storm waves. No homes were destroyed and no deaths occurred because of storm surges.

The original seawall has been marked with an OFFICIAL TEXAS HISTORICAL MARKER by The Texas Historical Commission. The marker is in the 2100 block of Seawall Blvd., Galveston.

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Living History To Unfold At Dogwood Trails Festival

AUSTIN—A living history encampment set up by more than 150 members of military revival units at the Texas State Railroad's Palestine depot March 24 will help launch the 1979 Texas Dogwood Trails Festival.

The units, which traditionally gather for mock battles at community gatherings across the state, will be dressed in authentic Civil War period clothing with all the trappings.

In addition to a military skirmish near the depot, the soldiers will be marching with their respective Confederate and Union units in the Dogwood Trails Parade at 10 a.m. March 24.

The Texas State Railroad is operated by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and it is entering its third year of runs between Palestine and Rusk—a 50-mile round trip through a scenic pine and dogwood area of East Texas.

The railroad's 1979 season was launched by Gov. Bill Clements and a large delegation of public officials March 16, and the train's first public run of the season was Saturday, March 17.

The railroad's spring schedule also will coincide with the Dogwood Trails festivities of the two weekends following the March 24 activities—March 31-April 1 and April 7-8.

The spring schedule, which continues through May 20, features one round trip each morning and afternoon on Saturdays and Sundays only. The expanded summer schedule will begin May 26 with runs Thursday through Monday continuing through Sept. 3, 1979. Detailed

Parent-Child Reading Offers Interaction
COLLEGE STATION—Parent-child interaction through reading experiences can be more than just words between the parent and child, Diane Welch, a family life education specialist, says.

Learning to read is a gradual process that begins before the child enters school and continues into adulthood.

Reinforcement in the home environment is supportive to the school and at the same time encourages parent-child relationships, the specialist points out.

Mrs. Welch is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

EXPLORE INTERESTS
Reading aloud to the child in elementary school makes the child feel he is the focus of attention. Together with the parent he can explore widening avenues of interest, she continues.

Books which fit the child's level of understanding but stretch his reading skills can be shared. Answers to stimulating questions are more readily available.

INCREASE THOUGHT PROCESS
Reading aloud is an old-fashioned way of helping the child become a good listener. Thoughts are built, one upon another, as the child hears the smooth flow of words that might be stumbling blocks at his ability level.

Inflection and tone added by the parent increases the child's interest.


BUILD RESPECT
Parents can transmit their respect for reading to the child as together they select, read and discuss a book. The positive attitudes of a significant adult reinforces the idea that reading is fun, Mrs. Welch says.
