## School Curriculum Post Said 'Ongoing' Academic Responsibility

A discussion on the hiring of a curriculum coordinator for the Woodville I.S.D. was the occasion for an "informal" meeting of the school board members and about 20 concerned citizens on Thursday, March 29, at 7 p.m. in the High School Library building.

School board President R.E. Swearingen opened the meeting by stating that this was "not a school board meeting, but a meeting of interested citizens." As a background for the meeting, Swearingen said that the board talked last at their regular meeting about hiring a curriculum coordinator. "We then discovered," he said, "that a group of citizens had already taken steps to learn more about this possibility."

Keith McCafferty, Position 3 School Board Candidate, introduced the speaker, saying that several parents began "straw-fall looking into" what could be done to improve the quality of their children's education. They were led, he said, to Dr. Nancy Speck in Nacogdoches who visited with them and suggested to them the need for a coordinated program of education for the school system. It was on her suggestion that they contacted Dr. Mullin, a professor at Stephen F. Austin University and a consultant for the U.S. Department of Education.

to public schools concerning curriculum activities.

Mullin outlined the reasons for hiring a coordinator, as well as the method for his hiring. He also suggested the responsibilities such a position would carry.

According to Mullin, a coordinator is needed "due to the need for continuous monitoring to determine the effectiveness of the school program." He further stated that "in our society priorities are constantly changing, but while priorities do change, there are certain essential in education that remain the same. These require continuous attention."

Dr. Mullin described some twenty areas of responsibility that a curriculum coordinator would be required to assume. The primary responsibilities would be (1) to devise and conduct a needs assessment to determine the curricular needs and status of the school district; (2) to set objectives in the different areas of curriculum; (3) to design a measurement program that will determine

whether desired skills and information are being taught to students, and (4) to formulate education plans.

According to Mullin, the development of a coordinated curriculum for grades K-12 would require five years for completion. This would place 1983 as a completion date for the project.

"The position," Mullin hastened to add, "would be an ongoing one." Some of the ongoing responsibilities of the curriculum coordinator would be to organize staff training; to evaluate the curriculum program; to continuously study the needs of the school; and to suggest resources for its use.

Suggesting a timetable for the recruitment and selection of a person for this position, Mullin stated that a job description should go to placement offices by April 1 with a closing date for application by May 31. The Board should complete their screening procedures by June 10. He added that the coordinator selected should be on board by July 1.

## Council Hears Objections To Proposed Housing Project

The Woodville City Council Monday endorsed a "letter of protest" concerning a proposed housing project to be located on the North side of Woodville.

According to Woodville Mayor Terry Watts, "The council is not opposed to a housing project in general, but only to one at this particular time and at this particular site."

Robert McCombs presented a number of letters from local citizens to be delivered, he said, to the Deep East Texas Council of Governments (DETCOG) protesting the establishment of such a housing project. McCombs also expressed to the Council his personal reasons for opposition to the proposed site. Among the reasons he stated "were unpaired streets into the area," the fact, he said,

that Beech Street, the only access into the area, is overcrowded already, and, he added, the school is almost a mile away, and "that" that area is already too crowded. Several other citizens also voiced disapproval of the project.

The proposal goes before DETCOG on April 26, for its review, which is required before any other action can be taken.

## Commissioners In Workshop

A workshop on the Housing and Urban Development (HUD) grant for the Beaumont Hill's project was the only item on the agenda at a special meeting of the Tyler County Commissioners Court on Monday, April 2.

The Beaumont Hill's project, which is in Precinct 4, was the recipient of a HUD grant in 1977 to improve the roads and a bridge there. According to Judge Allen Sturrock, the purpose of the special session was "to see what money is left for completion of the project, and to determine if it can be completed by August."

David Waxman, Planning Consultant to the county, reported to the commissioners that the bridge in the project was paid for and had been completed. "The only thing now uncompleted," he said, "is the paving of a 2.3 mile section of road."

Waxman further stated that there were three alternative ways to do the work on the road.

"First," he said, "could be done forced account with the commissioners doing the entire job."

A second alternative,

he added, "would be to bid the entire job out to contractors."

He suggested as a third approach, "that one or more of the commissioners could do the base work on the road and contract out the asphalt and surfacing work."

The commissioners favored the latter proposal, agreeing to work together on the basework in order to speed up the completion time.

The motion was made and unanimously approved to advertise for bids for the asphalt and surfacing work. Judge Sturrock then scheduled a meeting on Monday, April 23 to consider the bids.

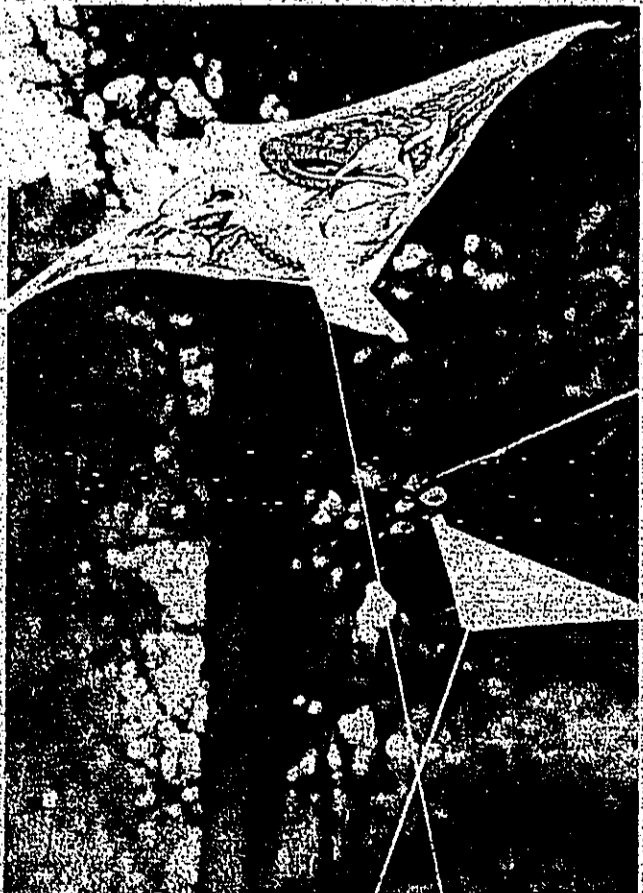

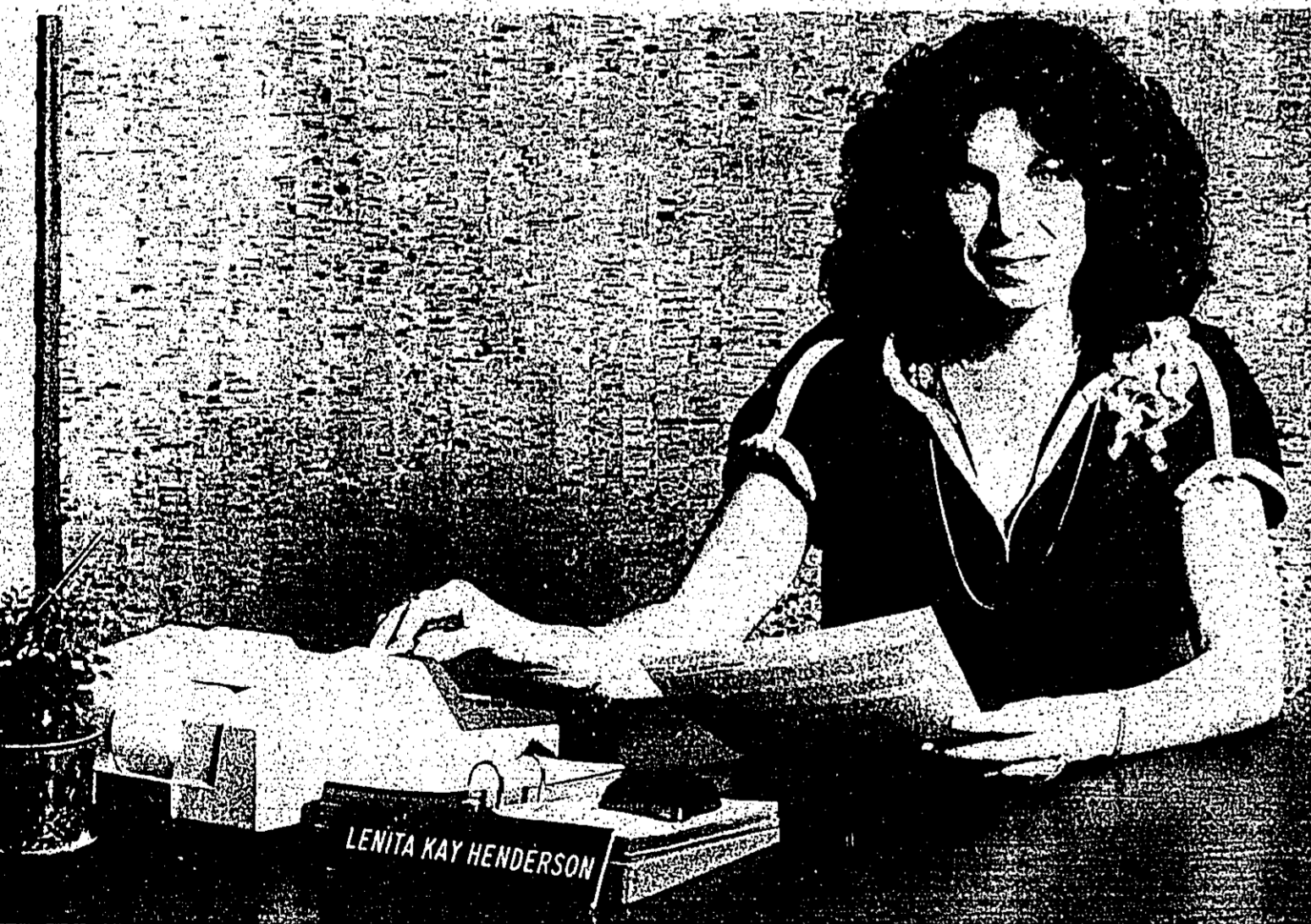

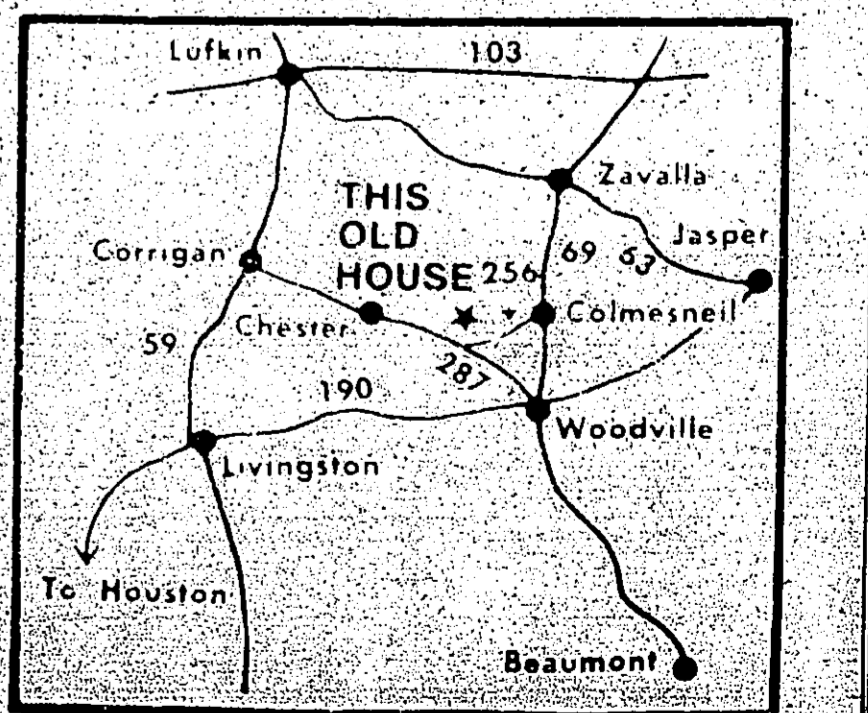

Joe Infante brought his Liberty baseball team to Woodville and went home on the short end of a 3-0 shut out by Mike Collins and Ricky Barlow.

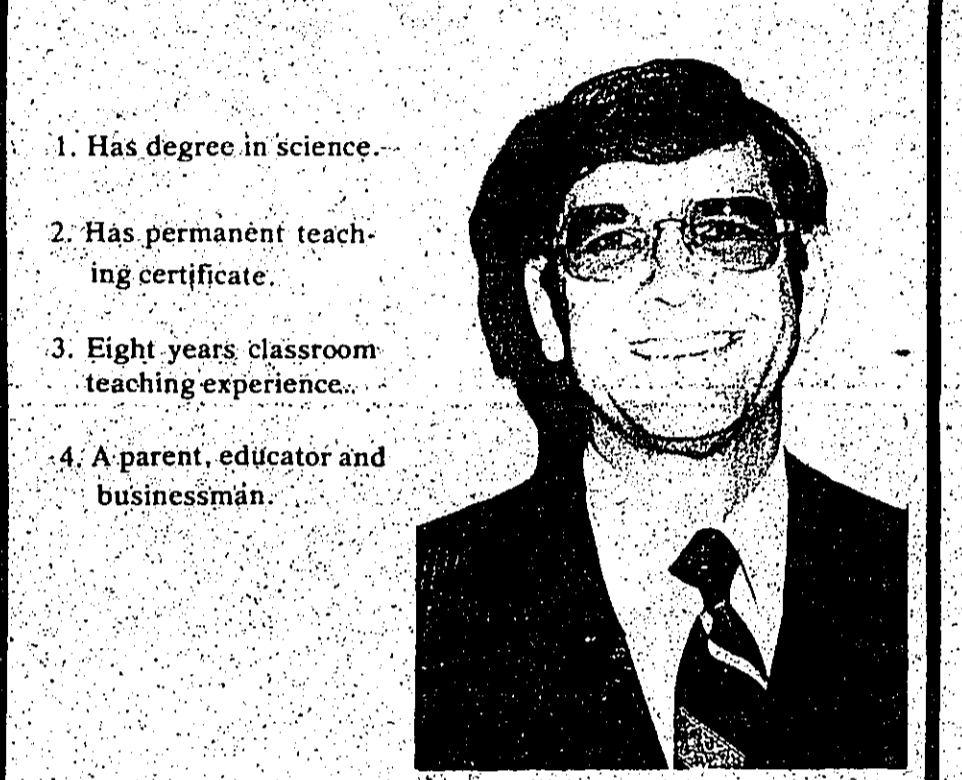
Garrett Mattice bangoed out three hits and Mike Collins slugged a double which turned into a home run when the right fielder over-threw the cut-off man.

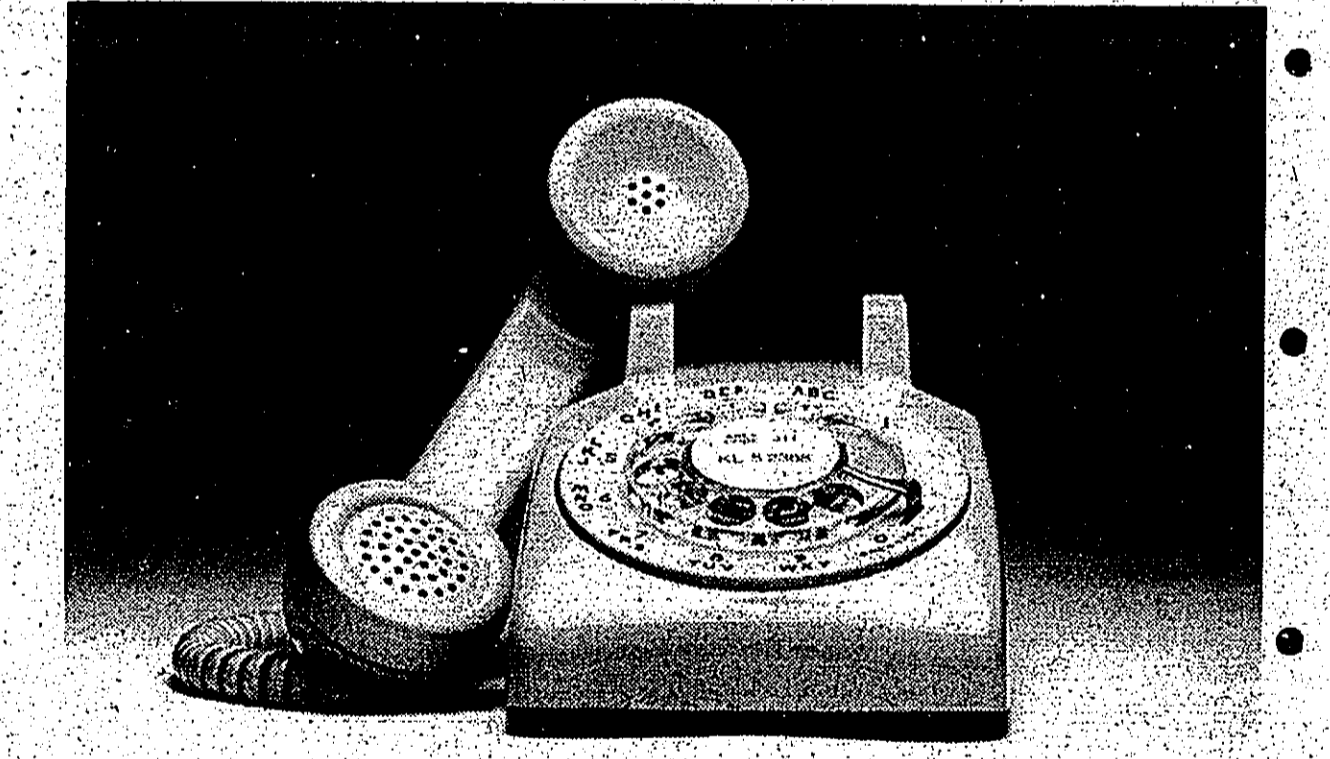

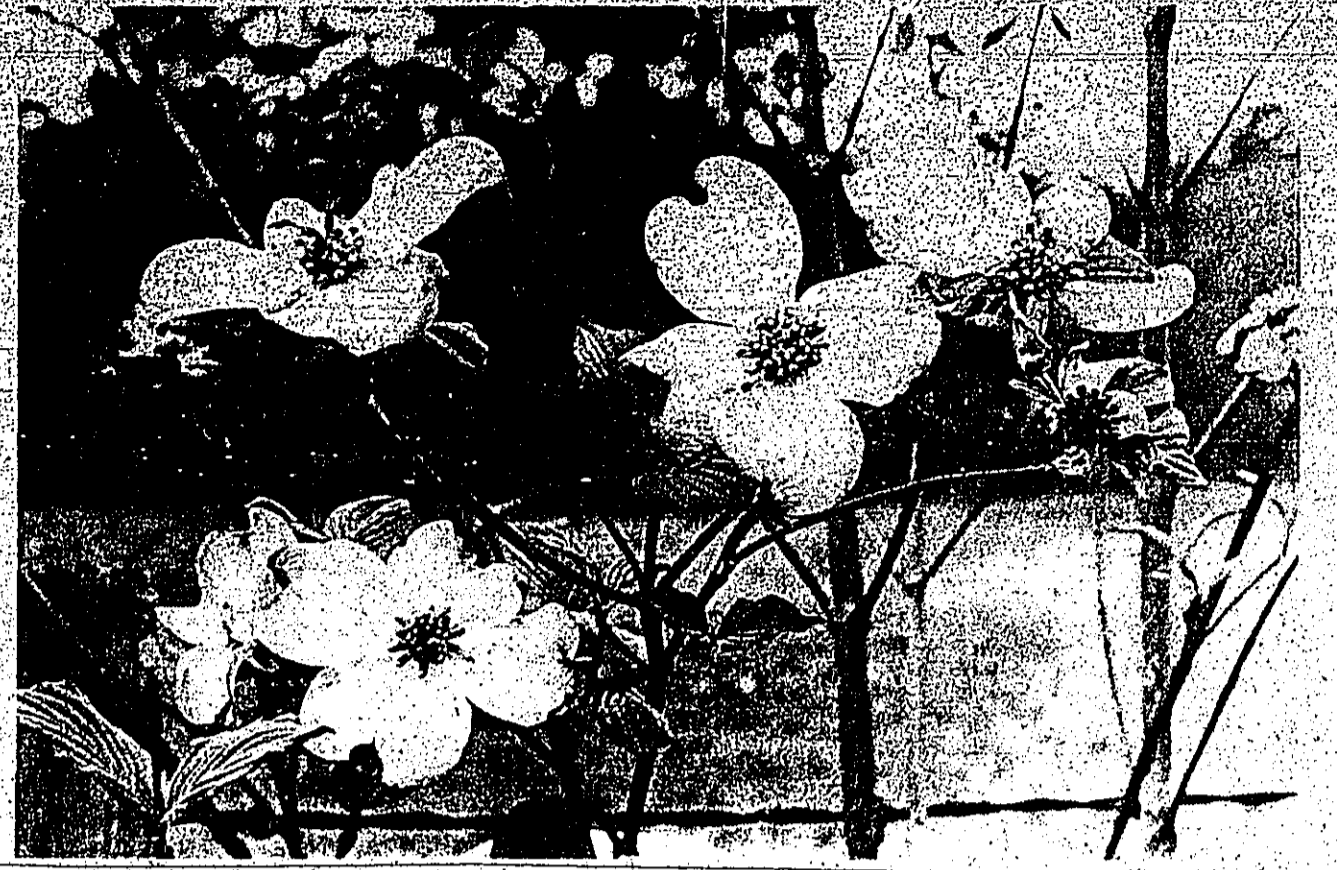

# Amos Hyde's Pink Dogwoods - 'A Blush Of Springtime'

## T-Budding Dogwoods: Pink Onto White

Budding can be done anytime the bark will slip, but May and June are ideal months. STEP 1) Snap off, as Hyde demonstrates below, "bud wood" from a pink flowering dogwood. Look for the eyes on the branches. STEP 2) Cut a thin "T" slit on the trunk of your white dogwood stock. The top of the "T" will be upwards, forming a small pocket for the bud. STEP 3) Cut the bud from the branch. Cut under the bud, leaving a sliver of the branch with it. Do not touch the back of the bud and, Hyde says, "If you drop it on the ground, don't pick it up."

With summer spent and the sun's path low in the sky, delicate leaves wither and begin to fall. Soon, deep red berries appear to be replaced in the spring by the easily recognizable and anticipated white dogwood blooms. However, nature's cycle, repetitive and predictable, occasionally throws a whim. Such was the case 20 years ago when Amos Hyde, a Woodville resident, "snatched a limb" from a pink flowering dogwood. The tree, although common in other states, is a "one time" in 50 year old native white stock. Hyde budded five white dogwoods from the initial find. The budding, he says, was done in the fall. Four buds took and two trees, now 30 feet high, stand in the Hyde's front lawn, a beautiful tribute to an intromittu experiment 20 years ago.



For several years, says Hyde, "I didn't think much more about the pink dogwoods." However, over the years, as more people saw and heard of the "unique trees," Hyde began the budding procedure again to meet the demand. Texas A&M University has been among those showing interest, says Hyde, and 4 years ago, sent representatives to Woodville to study the pink flowering trees. The researchers took samples of the seeds, the small trees underneath, even the bees, according to Hyde, and encouraged him, at that time, to name the tree he had developed. Other than the fact that the Hyde Beauty is native to this county, the differences in appearance of Hyde's pink flowering trees and those brought in from out of state are minimal. "There is a little bit of difference in the color and in the veins in the petals," says Hyde. Hyde, a retired engineer from the Texas Highway Department, has always been interested in budding and grafting procedures. He learned the techniques from friends and printed material, he says, and uses a T-budding method on dogwoods. The main differences, says Hyde, between budding and grafting is that budding is done on the side of the trunk or branch, while a graft is inserted in the end of a pruned back limb. Another major difference, according to Hyde, is that grafting is done in February or March while the buds are still dormant, whereas budding can be done anytime the bark will slip. According to Hyde, who at one time had a pear tree bearing 5 different species of pears, one advantage of budded or grafted trees is the elimination of many diseases. A pear tree, he says, which is prone to root disease, will thrive budded to plum stock, which has more resistance to that malady. The pink flowering dogwoods are only one of many unusual plants and trees Hyde likes to show visitors at his place west of Woodville. A stand of bamboo, stretching 30-45 feet high, is another impressive sight. Hyde planted the stand, which came from China, in 1952. The stalks, which range from 2 1/2 to 3 inches in diameter, reach 30-45 feet high, says Hyde, in 4 to 5 weeks. The bamboo is not only good for making furniture, fishing poles and fences, but parts of it are edible as well, he says.

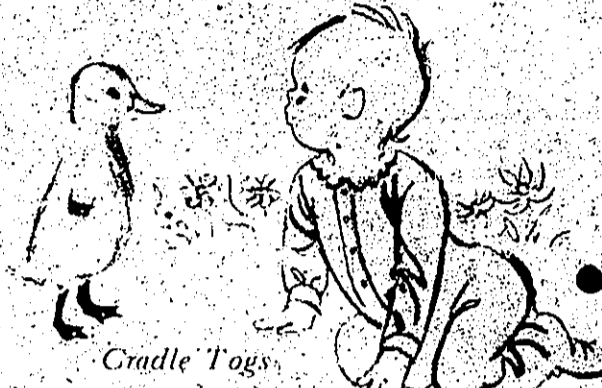

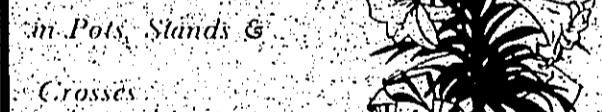

**Deutsche Bills**

**Reviewed**

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Senator Lloyd Bentsen on Thursday, noting that several of the administration's new anti-regulation proposals were included in legislation he introduced in the last Congress, joined as a cosponsor of the administration's program.

"The regulatory reform measures submitted by President Carter are a well-conceived effort to improve the regulatory process and cut down on wasteful, conflicting and unnecessary government regulations," Bentsen said in Senate remarks.

"The President's proposals form a comprehensive package of reform measures that will, if enacted, significantly reduce the inflationary impact of many government regulations while still protecting the environment, the health and safety of American consumers and workers."

"Three of the President's proposals were introduced in the last Congress, and I introduced early this year," Bentsen said.

Bentsen anti-regulation bills are:

- The Regulatory Cost Reduction Act, which would require independent regulatory agencies of the federal government to comply with a presidential order reforming the process under which proposed new regulations are reviewed;
- The Regulatory Conflicts Elimination Act, which calls on the President to seek out regulations that are in conflict or that duplicate each other, then eliminate the one that makes the least sense;
- This last bill was approved by the Senate last year as an amendment to the Sunset Bill, which did not receive final congressional approval. Two other Bentsen bills were approved by Congress and signed into law last year. One of them would eliminate overlapping federal housing agencies, the other reduces the number on local governments under the Comprehensive Education and Training Act.

Another bill proposed this year by Bentsen was not included among the President's proposals. Named the Federal Regulatory Budget Act, it calls for a 25 percent reduction in the costs of regulations to consumers, taxpayers and businesses over a five-year period.

"There are, of course, provisions in the President's program that I do not completely agree with. Overall, though, it is a good bill," Bentsen said.

"I intend to support the Regulatory Reform Act and work to improve it, so that by the time it passes the Senate, we will have a true regulatory reform bill," Senator Bentsen said.

**New Tax Law Explained**

AUSTIN - A relatively new tax law allows taxpayers who have sold property after Oct. 31, 1978 to keep an extra ten percent of the profit, the Internal Revenue Service said.

The Revenue Act of 1978 increased the exclusion for long-term capital gains to 60 percent on sales or exchanges after Oct. 31, 1978. Sales and exchanges on or before that date still get the old 50 percent exclusion. The 60 percent deduction also applies to installment payments received on exchanges.

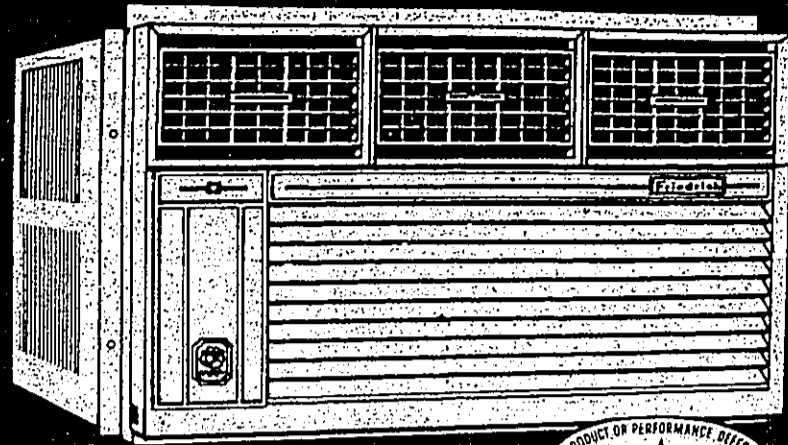
In 1978, no matter what the actual sale took place, the IRS said.

Taxpayers who had taxable transactions both before and after the cutoff date must combine all transactions to find their actual reportable capital gains, according to the IRS. Part III, Schedule D (Form 1040) should be used to figure the amount of taxable capital gains.

The new rates of exclusion for capital gains, and other recent changes in the tax law are covered in IRS Publication 553, "Highlights of 1978 Changes in Tax Law," available from most IRS offices.

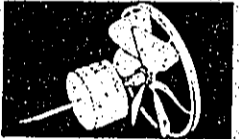

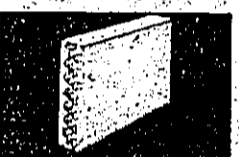

## Wilson Introduces Oil Bill

Congressman Charles Wilson (D-Lufkin) today introduced legislation which may more than double America's proven oil reserves. Congressman Wilson introduced the "Tertiary Recovery Incentives Act of 1979" which would encourage the use of enhanced recovery techniques in oil production. Senator Lloyd Bentsen (D-Texas) has introduced similar legislation in the Senate. "Oil production technology has made some incredible advances," said Congressman Wilson today. "Producers may now drill for oil which was previously impossible to reach using the more conventional methods of producing oil. By using such cryptic-sounding techniques as 'miscible fluid displacement' and 'polymer augmented waterflooding,' producers may increase this country's oil reserves from 30 billion barrels to as much as 70 billion barrels of oil.

"However, such new techniques are extremely expensive to use. The current pricing system for oil, which was enacted by the federal government does not provide incentives for producers to use the new techniques."

"Producers are businessmen. They cannot be expected to use the new recovery methods if they lose money in the process."

"Government should spur the development and use of new technology, especially in light of our present energy situation. We currently import more than 46% of our oil. Our national interests would be best served by increasing domestic supply and decreasing our dependence on foreign nations," said Wilson.

"We are also in the midst of an energy shortage. If we do not increase our domestic supply of oil, we can expect tightening government controls on consumers forcing them to conserve energy."

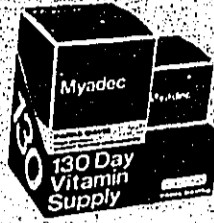
Several recent studies by the Congress and independent firms have concluded that the best way to spur development of new technology would be to remove price controls from oil produced through tertiary or enhanced oil recovery methods. The "Tertiary Act" which I introduced would remove controls on such oil and increase our supply.

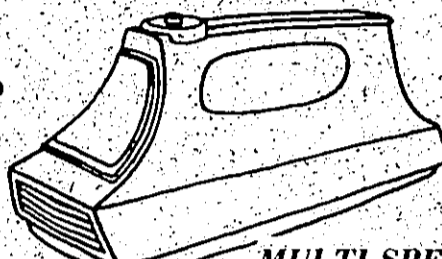

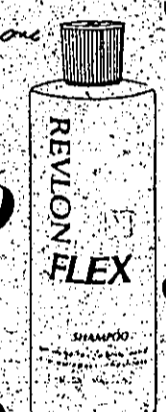

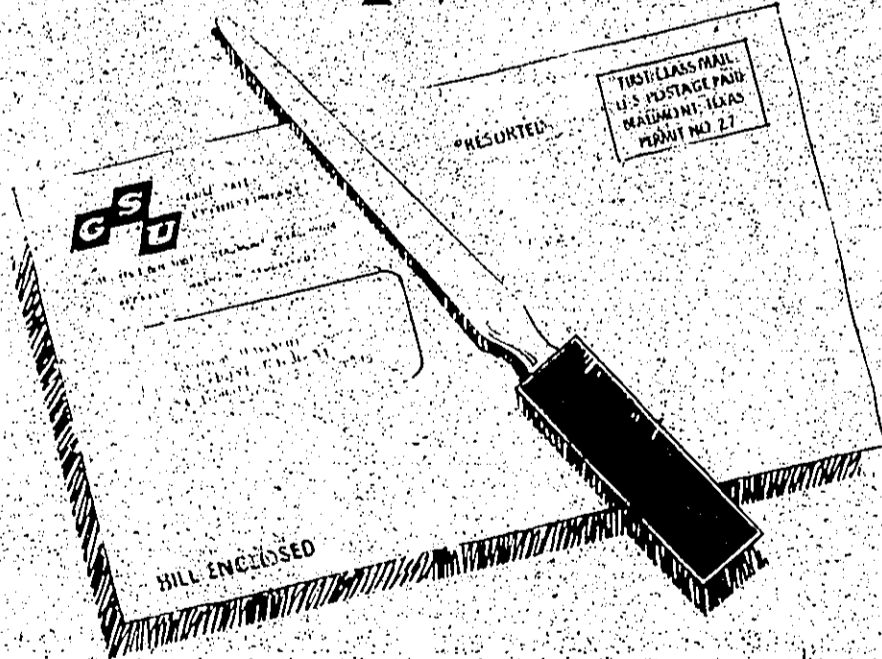
