Canvass Shows 610 Votes

A total of 610 votes were cast in the April 7 School Board Trustees election, according to figures disclosed on the Tuesday, April 17 meeting of the Woodville I.S.D. Board of Trustees. The meeting opened with seven items on the agenda for the regular session, the first being the canvassing of election returns from the April 7 election. Board members looked over the figures and accepted them unanimously on a motion by treasurer Fred Sullivan.

After discussion, the motion was made and seconded to retain the present officers for the new term. Re-elected by the board were: R.E. Swearingen, president; Margaret Lane, vice-president; and Fred Sullivan, treasurer. Jack Stansbury, architect for the Woodville I.S.D. in the construction of the new school, gave his monthly report on the progress of the building. Stansbury stated that there had been a change of personnel on the construction of the two pre-fab buildings at the site, with the general contractor taking over responsibility for their completion. Stansbury further stated, however, that "this change will not effect the projected completion date of Christmas, 1980."

The four items that were on the agenda for the meeting were quickly acted upon by the commissioners. The first item on the agenda was to open the bids that had been received on the road work for the Beaumont Hill project. As of the meeting date, however, no bids had been received. The commissioners voted to extend the bidding date to Monday, April 30, at 10 p.m. They further agreed that no bids would be opened until that time. Next up was the consideration of bids for culverts on the HUD project. The commissioners were permitted to accept the best price under \$3000. 'Hike-Bike Happening' Is Saturday

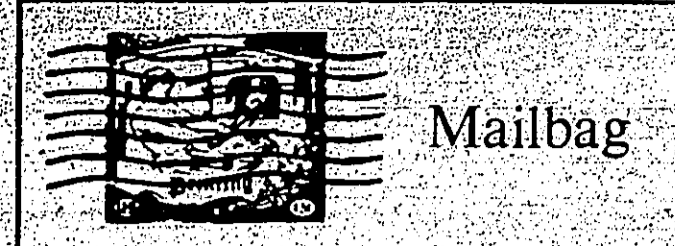
"Foot Power" produced by several hundred Tyler Countians is expected to produce funds this weekend which will assist the Tyler County Mental and Physical Handicap Association, Inc. in its goal to establish a Sheltered Workshop and work activity center here. The Hike-Bike-Happening will begin this Saturday morning at 9 a.m. when the walkers step off on the round-trip to Ivanhoe, (14 miles south on Hwy. 69) in an effort with pledges-per-mile, to produce dollars needed to create the sheltered work atmosphere for the mentally and physically handicapped of Tyler County. This year's event is expected to double proceeds from last year's trek which earned nearly \$4,000. Persons are asked to obtain pledge forms from members of the Association or at their respective schools. Participants will then solicit pledges-per-mile-walked or biked in the event. The walkers or bikers will then collect and turn in monies earned within a week after the event. Three top prizes are offered this year for the top three money earners in the event. (See Section B, Page 1) for more details. According to coordinators of the event all precautions are being taken for participants' safety along the route. Water stations and validation points will be set up along the shoulder of the roadway to record the walkers and bikers progress. The event will be held rain or shine. Walkers will leave the courthouse square promptly at 9 a.m. while bikers will leave at 10 a.m. Participants are asked to turn in pledge forms at the registration desk on the courthouse square before departing.

Aging Funds Now Available

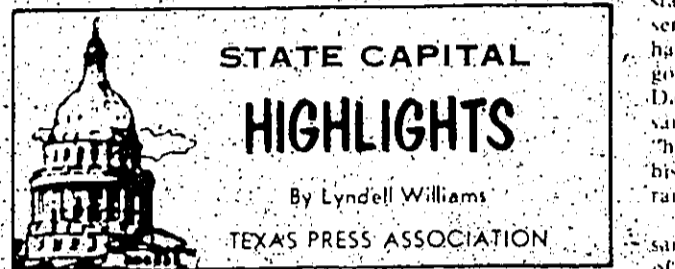

Best Buys This Week

COLLEGE STATION: Best buys at Texas grocery markets this week include poultry items, canned fruits and vegetables and some fresh vegetables.

Also, features appear on pork cuts, sales Goodwill. Give a consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

This week's price quality trends are the following: POULTRY-Turkey prices are attractive. Buy a turkey a bit larger than you can use in one meal; you'll probably pay less per pound and get more meat for each pound.

Whole frozen chickens and parts have special prices. Best specials are parts, including necks, drumsticks and mixed parts.

Egg prices are rising, but eggs are still an economical protein choice. GROCERY MARKET ASIDES-Canned fruits and vegetables have feature prices. Especially good prices appear on tomato products.

Since distributors are moving last summer's pack of fruits and vegetables off the shelves to make room for the upcoming pack, consumers should watch for many special prices.

FRESH VEGETABLES-Real, seasonal prices apply to peas, potatoes, onions and spinach with prices near their peak season.

Other good values are carrots, potatoes, onions and squash. Fresh vegetables prices are trending down slightly, but prices are never cheap.

However, the asparagus season isn't underway yet. Short supply of fresh fruits. Have at least reasonable price levels include pineapple, apples, bananas, oranges and grapefruit along with peaches and strawberries.

PORK-Look for some features on fresh chops, whole and half hams, ham and quarter hams cut into chops.

One of the most reasonable meat cuts available now is ham. Look for good prices on seven pound canned and vacuum boned hams.

BEEF-Values are rather limited. Consider arm and boneless chuck roasts, chuck and round steaks, ground beef with six percent and liver. CONSUMER WATCHWORDS-With meat prices at relatively high levels, consumers can do two things to stretch the meat budget.

Plan menus around best buys according to newspaper ads on store specials.

The "portion control" at home. Serve reasonable-sized portions of meat directly from the stove to the plate. Put leftovers away for another meal. Three ounces of meat is considered adequate. (Remember there are 16 ounces in a pound).

Reduce Investment Risk

COLLEGE STATION: Knowledge, proper planning and commitment can reduce the risks of real estate investments, says a Texas Agricultural Extension Service economist.

Dr. Richard Floyd says that licensed real estate professionals provide the expertise needed to assist real estate investors. They help the investor complete an investment analysis, arrange financing, negotiate purchasing terms, close the deal, develop operating guidelines, rent the property, and cash in after the desired holding period.

Since quick liquidation may result in losses, it is important that real estate investors be ready and willing to stay invested, emphasizes Floyd. To the uninitiated, real estate investment can be similar to a mousetrap: easy to get into but difficult to get out.

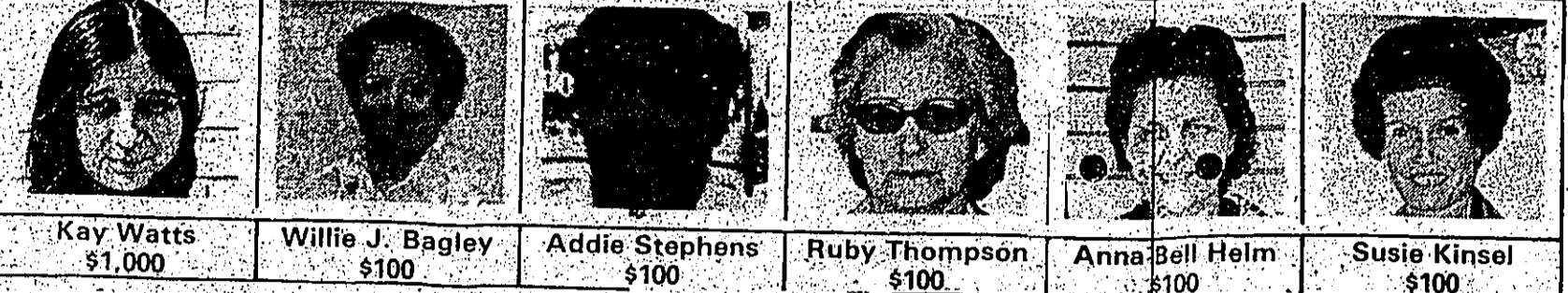
Real estate does offer the small investor advantages of leverage, tax shelter and inflation protection. Combining these factors produce an excellent overall return, contends the economist.

Kidney Failures Eligible

Almost everyone who requires kidney dialysis or kidney transplant because of permanent kidney failure is eligible for Medicare, Travis Briggs, social security district manager in Lufkin, said recently.

Those eligible are workers insured under social security, as well as their dependents and/or survivors who have permanent kidney failure. People with permanent kidney failure have the full protection of Medicare and are eligible for all covered benefits, not just those relating to their kidney problems, Briggs said.

Briggs said Medicare coverage can begin the month a course of dialysis begins if the patient participates in a self-dialysis training program and certain other conditions are met. Also, Briggs said, Medicare can pay 100 percent of the cost of home dialysis equipment if certain conditions are met and help pay for the cost for almost all supplies, including disposable items.

Offer Drinking Alternatives

If you are going to serve liquor or alcoholic beverages, be a thoughtful and considerate host and hostess. Show your genuine concern for the health and safety of your guests.

Here are some ideas for keeping things under control. OFFER SOFT DRINKS. One-third of the adult population chooses not to drink at all.

So offer a choice. And when someone says, "No thanks, don't push it. There are nine million Americans for whom even one drink is one too many."

Introduce two people who don't know each other. Get a conversation started. Give someone a compliment, or a laugh. You have more to give than just drinks.

DON'T RUSH REFILLS. Wait until the glass is empty before you offer another drink. And then don't be in a hurry, especially if someone seems to be coming up empty too fast.

KEEP 'EM NIBBLING. Not just later on, but while your guests are dining. That's important, because it slows down the rate at which alcohol is absorbed into the bloodstream.

DINNER IS SERVED. If you're going to serve dinner or an evening snack, do it before it's too late. If the "cocktail hour" goes on for hours, nobody will know what they're doing.

Focus On Fred

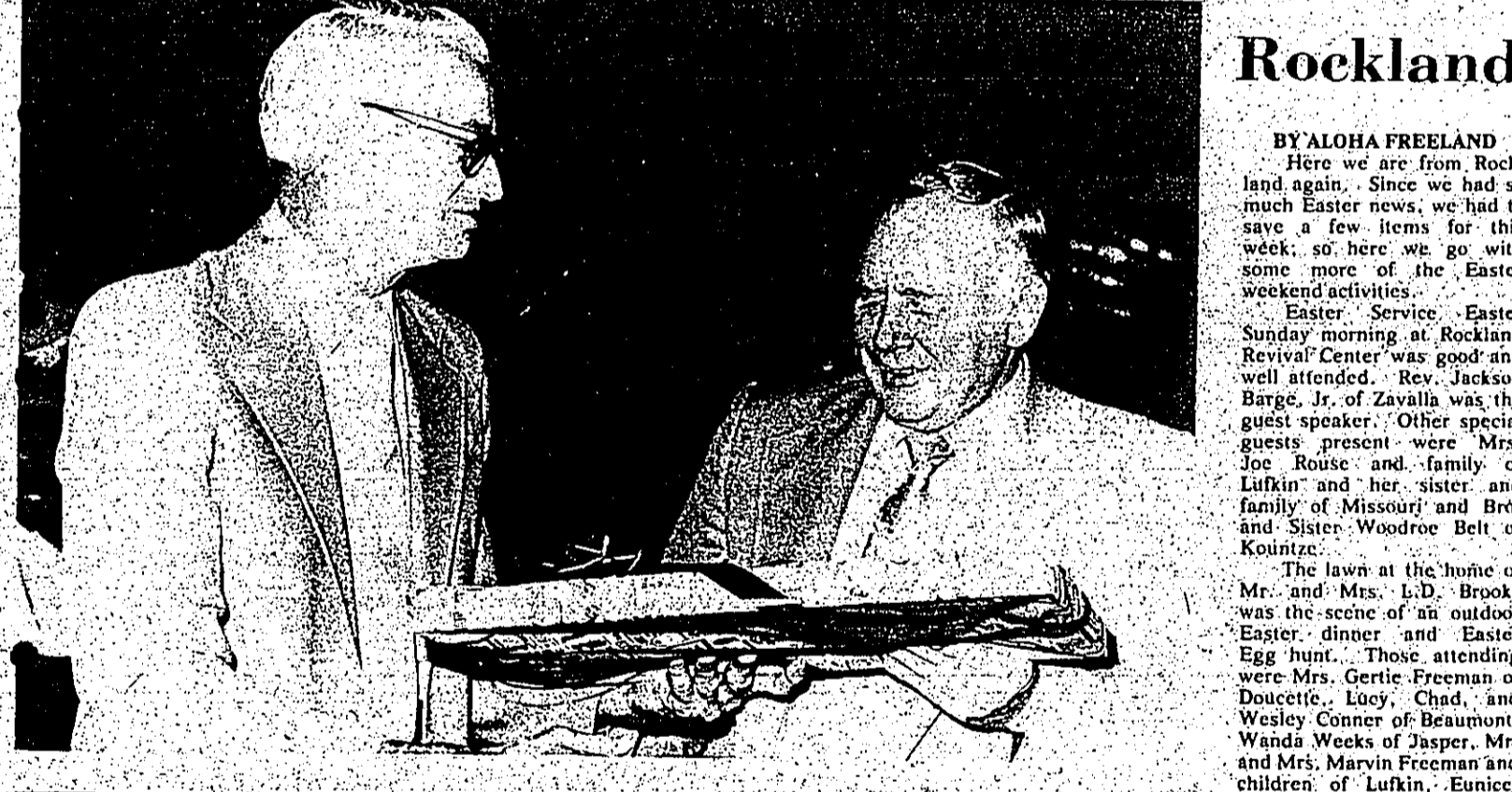
VIRGINIA ARCEAUX To the Tyler County Committee on Aging.

Herewith submitted are nominations for the Outstanding Senior Citizens of Tyler County for 1979. The following candidates for the honor are all from Fred and long overdue for recognition of service to their community and county.

These four men comprise a group known affectionately as the "Scrap Iron Quartet": 1) Herbert Caraway; 2) A.J. Spurlock; 3) John D. Self and 4) Uel Owens. They can take an old Stamps-Baxter songbook and harmonize just about any tune in it. Herbert Caraway prefers the "shaped notes" because that's what he learned at a singing school, taught by shape and "do-re-mi".

Mr. Caraway claims he discovered Texas in 1901, at Battle, Tex. That was a Kirby Lumber Camp near Fred. He has led quite a busy life. While working at the Texas Company in 1923 he decided to move back to this area and settle in Fred. His Dad had built a house here. Mr. Herbert relates how his Dad had cut trees and taken two or three at a time to the sawmill and had them cut. With these boards a house was built, the same house in which Mr. Herbert and Mrs. Callie have reared five children and live in today. In 1936 he went to work for the Texas Forestry Service. Then in 1942 he became the County Commissioner for the next ten years. Mr. Herbert served as Postmaster for Fred after Mattie Yawn and before Grady Lester. Now he claims to be a fisherman by trade (even though his daughter says his boat leaks) and a stockman of sorts. He is also a farmer, like his dad, and he and son Tom can smoke a mean batch of sausage.

A.J. Spurlock is the lead singer of the "Scrap Iron Quartet". He was born and went to school in the Shiloh community, near Fred. As a youngster he worked in his grandfather's store. (L.D. Richardson). Later in 1943 he owned his own grocery store. "Uncle Jay" was assistant postmaster when the Fred Post Office was on FM Road 1943 and while Chester Yawn was postmaster. While "down town Fred" was on FM

Miss Jane Thompson, creative director of Brigham Young University's Lamanite Generation, will direct a performance of the 40-member group at the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation on May 4-5, 1979 at 8:00 p.m.

In the summer of 1971 Miss Thompson and her group were featured throughout Scandinavia, where they performed at the famed Rebbil Festival, the largest Fourth of July celebration outside the United States, and at a special showing for Her Majesty Queen Margrethe of Denmark.

Miss Thompson has been director of the talented musical group of Indian, Polynesian, Mexican and Latin students since the beginning of the Lamanite Generation in 1971. Members of the group believe that native American and Latin are distantly related and have chosen the name "Lamanite" to show that native Americans have the talent and drive to meet the challenges of contemporary American society.

"It's difficult for the Indian to keep going after experiencing years of failure," she said. "It's a vicious circle of the Indian not treating the white man and the white man becoming discouraged when the Indian doesn't act entitled."

Miss Thompson's happiest moments come when she helps students discover hidden talents. "Sometimes a student will have the basic rhythm and innate musical talent but not the structured training," she said. "I try to help these students develop their talents and become skilled performers."

Since 1964 when the group first performed, Miss Thompson has developed many professional "baby calf."

Next in the group we have "preacher's son, John D. Self. He was not born here but moved to Texas from around Hornbeck, Louisiana. When he was a young boy he worked in the Texas Highway Department in 1969 he became a full fledged farmer and a deer hunter on the side. (On the side means the entire deer season John D. Self and Phillder can spin the deer yards. Mr. and Mrs. Self farm their 10 acres and sell a lot of what they raise. They grow their corn that is ground in the corn grist mill of the very few grist mills in East Texas. He sells the corn meat that he grinds if you want something really tasty, if he forgets to tell you to sift it before cooking it, don't worry about it, it won't hurt you. The self grist mill and hammer mill is run by a gasoline motor and housed in a barn made out of logs from the river bottom. Their sons brought the logs out of the bottom several years ago, John D. says there were places you could walk across the river back then.

The fourth nominee is the bass singer of the group and educator, Uel Owens. Many former students from Jasper, Hardin and Tyler Counties remember Mr. Owens as teacher and principal. There may even be one nearby that sat under his tutoring at A&M or S.F. that remembers his strict manner and dry humor. Mr. and Mrs. Owens are both retired from the teaching profession but both stay as busy as anyone. If you want to learn the secret of having the first new potatoes in Tyler County, you must see Mr. Owens. His garden each spring is as pretty as Mrs. Owens' African Violets. Each of the four above mentioned gentlemen serve as a Deacon at the Woodville Baptist Church. All four are faithful and hard-working men in their church and community. Their efforts will never be forgotten and their shoes never filled by anyone else.

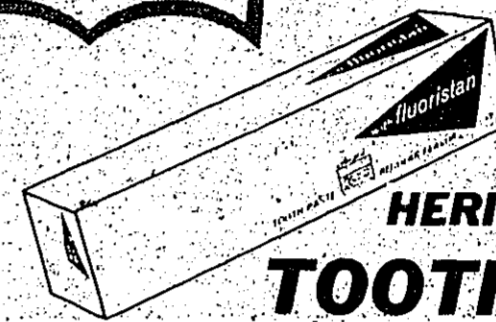
