## Commissioners Vote To Condemn Bridge Right-Of-Way

The Tyler County Commissioners court, in a unanimous decision Monday, voted to instruct the County Attorney to file for condemnation on the Rockland Bridge right-of-way, in a special meeting on April 30, 1979.

After a short discussion on the issue of the right-of-way for the Rockland bridge, the commissioners concluded that, due to the owners' apparent unwillingness to release the land for the right-of-way, the only course of action left open to them was condemnation. The consensus of the commissioners seemed to be that the need for such action was unfortunate, due to the expense to the county.

Also on the agenda was the opening of bids for the roadwork on the Beaumont Hills Project. The bidding had been extended from the previous session due to there being no bids presented to the county. And, since there were still no bids before the commissioners at this meeting, the bidding deadline was extended one day to Tuesday, May 1, at 10 a.m., at which time they will reconvene to take further action.

Nate Greenup, owner of Ambulance Service, Inc. of Woodville, addressed the commissioners on the newly chartered Tyler County Ambulance Association. Greenup said that the association was a non-profit, State Chartered Association, made up of two people from each town in the county. A \$30 membership fee provides free ambulance service for one year to the member and his family.

Justice of the Peace John Vanhanks, asked the court to provide funding to replace the bid floor in his office with carpet, and to furnish the paint for the walls. The commissioners unanimously approved his request.

Next item considered was the new federal law that requires the county to provide to all county employees with pregnancy insurance in addition to their other medical benefits. According to Judge Allen Sturrock, the present policy carried by the county does not provide such coverage.

Judge Sturrock added that there were two methods by which the requirement could be met first, the county could provide blanket coverage of all employees at a total cost of \$5 per employee per month. A second alternative, also acceptable to the federal government, is to set

aside a sum of money specifically for that purpose, thus providing self-coverage for the employees.

A motion was made and unanimously accepted to provide this coverage for the county employees, while not specifying which alternative would be used.

Next on the agenda was a request from the Grand Jury that the commissioners formulate county policy on the personal use of county vehicles. The request was tabled until the May 14, 1979, regular meeting.

Don Cole reported to the court on progress on the Tax Office Construction Project, stating that he and Thomas Fortenberry, the contractor, were having trouble matching the color of the new brick to the old. He also reported that the sight and foundation work had all been completed, and that the rear wall had been removed. "Approximately 18% of the project is complete," Cole stated.

The final action of the court was to approve the advertising for bids on two dumptrucks, one each for Pct. I and Pct. III. Motion was made and unanimously accepted to advertise for bids. Judge Sturrock set the time for opening the bids at 10 a.m. on May 18.

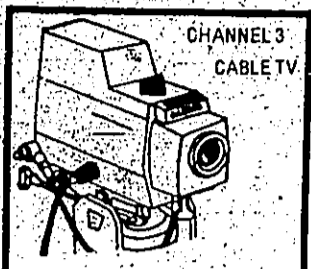

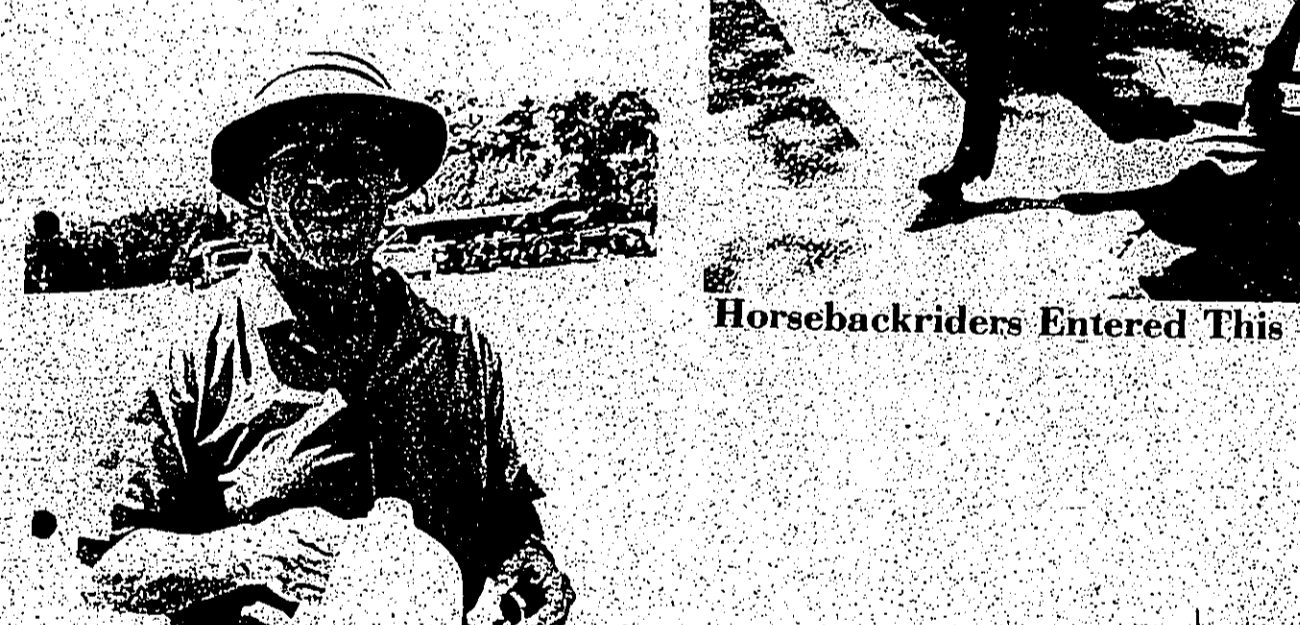

# Lamar U. Band Camp Invites 350 Area Students

**BEAUMONT**—More than 350 high school and junior high school band students from across Texas and Louisiana are expected to attend the annual Lamar University Summer Band Camp, July 8-13, according to Dr. Charles A. Wiley, professor of music at Lamar and Director of Camps.

Students completing the 6th grade band classes through high school are eligible to attend, Wiley said.

The purpose of the camp is to give the student a better understanding of the fundamentals of musicianship, Wiley said.

Along with this, it gives them some practical performing experience under different conductors and an opportunity to study from a specialist in his own instrument.

All students will be placed in one of four bands, depending on their age and ability.

Wiley will direct the advanced band composed of 10th, 11th and 12th graders. Wiley is a member of the American Bandmasters Association.

The organization is composed of 200 members nationwide and strives to establish standard world-wide instrumentation for the symphonic band, promotes new compositions for this type of ensemble, and publishes the only research journal in the field of band music.

Woods has been assistant director of the advanced band will be Bill Woods, band director of Seagraves High School, Seagraves, Texas.

Woods has been sweepstakes band director for the past 20 years, placing 1st consistently in University Interscholastic League competitions.

Ralph Hite, director of the Christian Brothers High School Band, Memphis, Tennessee, will direct the intermediate band for 8th and 9th graders.

Hite specializes in teaching the reading of music notation, with an emphasis on interpretation of rhythmic patterns.

He uses a series of slides projected on a screen in front of the band and promotes reading skills through a system of counting.

The director of the 5th grade bands will be announced at a later date.

In addition, university students will serve as counselors.

There is a dormitory space for approximately 400 students. Rooms will be issued on a first-come, first-served basis.

Commuting students may also eat in the dining hall or the Setzer Student Center for about \$5 per meal.

Jornorty, supervisors will be Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Williams. Mr. Williams is Band Director at Sterling

High School, Baytown, Texas.

The camp schedule includes a series of social activities.

Director of social activities will be Steve Hankins, a senior music major at Lamar and a member of the student government.

The camp will end with gala performances by all the bands in the Lamar Theater on Friday evening, July 13.

Admission to the performance is free, according to Wiley.

Lamar University operates a health center staffed by

physicians and nurses. It is available to all students for minor illnesses and injuries.

Medical insurance is carried on all campers.

The band camp is a non-profit venture sponsored by the Office of Continuing Education at Lamar.

## Tax Rebate For Cities Up Over Last Year

AUSTIN—State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said local government sales tax rebates to Texas cities for April were up over the same month last year.

Bullock said city allocations statewide for April totaled \$34.9 million, compared to \$20.1 million during April of 1978.

The 1979 payments to date to cities reached \$135.2 million this month, compared to \$121.6 million over the same 4-month period last year.

Houston will receive \$7.6 million in rebates this month, compared to a \$4.9 million monthly payment last year.

Dallas will get a check for \$4.9 million, up from \$2.6 million in April of 1978.

Fort Worth will receive \$1.4 million, compared to an \$852,000 payment during April of last year.




