## Willis Read Remembers 'Picking Corn By Hand'

Willis Read, clearly remembers those years when he was still picking corn by hand at Christmas. "I have no desire to go back to row crops," he says emphatically. "Labor is the big problem and it would be necessary to buy different equipment than is used in his beef cattle program."

When Read decided to investigate some other method of farming to make a living, Currie had been county agent in Tyler County about a year. As Read puts it, "I went to the county agent because I needed some help from somewhere." The results of that visit in 1957 are still being felt throughout the area. Willis Read became a result demonstrator, conducting trial programs to show the value of selected production practices.

Willis has averaged at least one demonstration per year since 1957, Currie says. "When I first visited with him, he had about 30 acres of corn which he used to feed his cows and sold some of it for \$1.00 a bushel. We worked out a program for him to plant 10 acres of corn. Using recommended fertilization, the 10 acres produced as much corn as 30 acres had produced in previous years."

Read finally stopped planting corn about 1965. "Read was also the first in his community to plant coastal bermudagrass when he put out 15 acres in 1957. In one demonstration on coastal fertilization, he applied 2,700 pounds of ammonia nitrate per acre. The demonstration produced more hay than he knew what to do with."

Other demonstrations included corn fertilization, pasture fertilization, and numerous beef cattle demonstrations. In 1958, he conducted

one of the earliest demonstrations showing that the application of potassium fertilizer could prevent the thinning of coastal stands.

"For his many contributions to Tyler County agriculture, Read was named Anniversary Demonstrator during the 75th Anniversary celebration of the demonstration method of teaching. He is one of three Tyler County demonstrators to be honored."

"According to Currie, Read consistently produces coastal bermudagrass hay that is 12 percent crude protein. The herd of approximately 60 cows is one of the best in the county. Heifers from the herd are in constant demand as are the calves fed for home freezers."

"Willis is one of the most meticulous record keepers I have ever known," Currie said. "Every item is recorded. When we summarize the demonstration, we know that the results are accurate."

## Vehicle Usage Studied

The Tyler County Commissioners Court, in a unanimous decision during their regular meeting on Monday, May 14, voted to have the County Attorney obtain a copy of the state laws that govern the use of county vehicles and present them to the Grand Jury.

This decision was the result of a request by the Grand Jury at a previous meeting that the commissioners develop a policy on the private use of county vehicles. The commissioners, after deliberation, determined that there were already laws on the books which outlined the limits of county vehicle use adequately, thus making it unnecessary for them to formulate policy.

In other court action, the commissioners approved the County Treasurer's Report for April, and approved the County Extension Monthly report.

The commissioners were sworn in by Royce Brockman, who gave them the oath of office as members of the board of equalization. The board then set Monday, June 11, as the next date for their regular meeting.

Brad Smith, who was scheduled to address the board in behalf of Concerned Citizens, failed to appear.

John Costner of the probation department presented his report to the board for April. He said that the department was making progress in locating absconders from probation.

The Juvenile Department, he said, "has a more active workload now."

Costner also requested of the commissioners permission to have the phone re-installed in their office. The motion granting this request passed unanimously.

Item seven on the agenda was to accept into the county's responsibility the maintenance of the streets in the Hatlason Subdivision. The item was tabled for an indefinite period until the developer improve the roads.

The commissioners approved the paying of bills from the County Auditors Office with one amendment. This was from Maxie Riley who amended the motion to request that foster parents who are aided jointly by the county and welfare, seek approval for spending money on some items before making the purchase rather than after.

The final scheduled item was a request from the Sheriff's office to be on the agenda. No one from the office was present.

Parents are to bring birth certificate and shot record. To enter school, a child must have the following immunizations:

Oral Polio: 3 doses, with one dose after the 4th birthday. DTP: 3 doses, with one dose after the 4th birthday. Mumps: 1 dose or have had the disease. Rubella: 1 dose. Mumps: 1 dose.

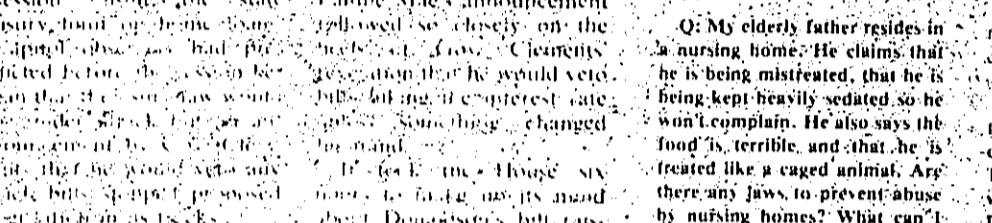

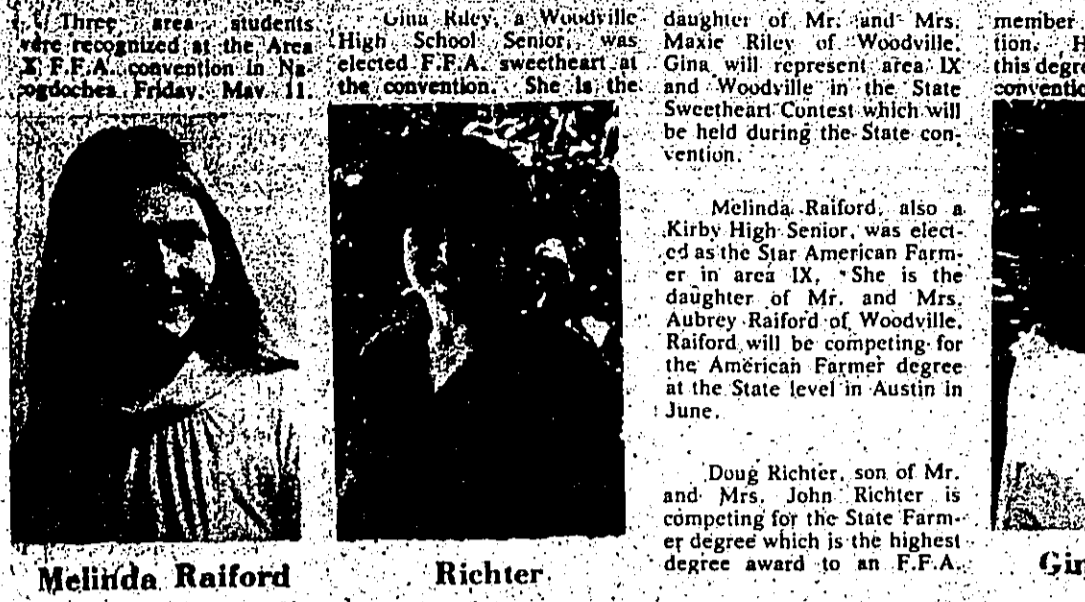

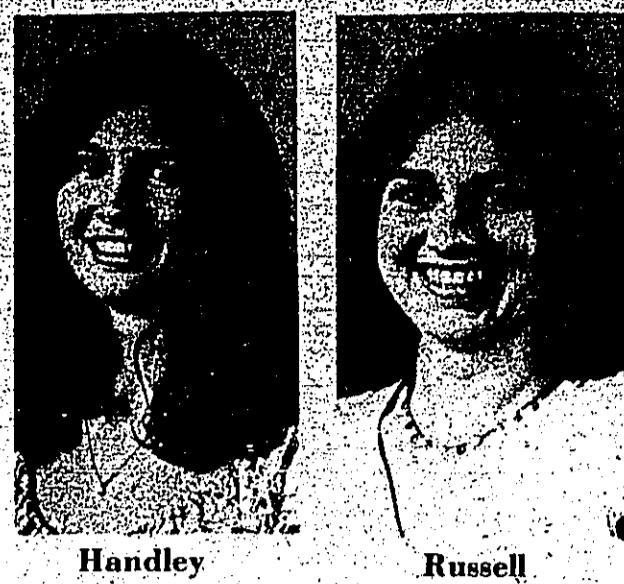
### Tina Fredieu Is Spurger Valedictorian

Hermann Hospital currently operates three Life Flight helicopters, now making nearly 200 mercy flights in the Houston area each month. ### State Crime Rate Up 2.7 Percent

AUSTIN—Figures released today by the Texas Department of Public Safety show that state's crime rate rose 2.7 percent in 1978. There were an estimated 721,581 major criminal offenses in Texas last year, compared to 692,450 major crimes in 1977. Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Department of Public Safety, said the largest increases occurred in the rape and motor vehicle theft categories. Both offenses posted crime rate increases of 11.5 percent. Speir said robbery was up 7.9 percent, and murder up 6.8 percent. Aggravated assault rose 4.8 percent, larceny-theft was up 2.4 percent, and burglary increased 0.4 percent. Of the 721,581 estimated crimes, at least 648,704 occurred in urban areas. Rural counties accounted for 72,877 major offenses. Twenty-two percent of the reported crimes were cleared by an arrest. Texas law enforcement agencies, however, cleared 68 percent of the aggravated assaults, and 54 percent of the rapes. At least 36 percent of the known robberies were cleared. Lower clearance rates were reported for crimes against property including burglary, theft, and motor vehicle theft. These property offenses account for 92 percent of the state's total criminal activity. Speir said the incidence of crime was fairly well distributed throughout the year, but noted increases in the summer months. The lowest numbers of crimes were reported in January and February. Overall in Texas last year, there was one major crime every 44 seconds. Property valued at over \$417.8 million was stolen, with property recovered valued at just over \$158.9 million. Firearms were used as the murder weapon in 71.2 percent of the 1,839 murders and while males accounted for 51.9 percent of the victims. In nearly 40 percent of the murder cases the killer was acquainted with the victim. In 18.9 percent of the cases, Texas law enforcement officers were killed in line of duty by "fanatic" criminals. In 1978, compared to four in 1977, in addition four officers died in duty-related accidents.

Mrs. Carter will be on hand to watch this year's tongue-in-cheek Olympics as over thirty contestants vie for the \$1000 cash prize and the crown of Champion Hushpuppy Cook of the South. Festivities will begin at 10:00 a.m. and admission to the park is \$1.00. Officials say that a battle of the bread is shaping up for the competition with all five of the past Olympics Champions returning to compete. O.D. "Shuglin" Wright of Dallas will be returning to defend his championship, but he will face some stiff competition from a long list of competitors including two-time winners, Dallas architect Parker Folsie and Virgil Tullos of Longview. Tullos, winner in 1973 and 1974, says he will return to defend his title. "East Texas," But Folsie, 1975 and 1976 winner, is undaunted by Tullos' threats. "He must put gun powder in his hushpuppy recipe," judging from the way he shoots his mouth off," Folsie said. Also returning to compete are Cecil Davis of Wichita Falls who won the first Olympics in 1972 and Ed Kadlock of New Braunfels, 1977 winner. Davis, a reformer chili cook says he is ready and waiting for the competition to begin. Kadlock contends his German recipe cannot be beat. Miscellaneous "humorists" Bob Murphey, with his own brand of East Texas humor will enliven the competition. A lawyer and former district attorney, Murphey appears throughout the nation as a much sought after dinner speaker. Judges for the 1979 event include Mike Richardson of the Texas State Network News, L.D. McAllister, Editor of The Atlanta Journal-Constitution, and E. J. Murphey, Executive Vice President of the Dallas Oak Cliff Chamber of Commerce. A special cookoff will be held this year pitting past Olympics judges against one another. Already confirmed to cook in this event are Howard Rosser, Tourist Director of the East Texas Chamber of Commerce, Stanley Tiner, Editor of The Shreveport Journal, Tinsley, Editor of The Ft. Worth Star Telegram and noted radio columnist Tumbleweed Smith. An Olympic official said: "It will be interesting to see the past judges get a taste of their own hushpuppy!" Other activities included in the day's event include an all day arts and crafts show, square dance and folk dance exhibitions and special fish and barbecue dinners. "It is an activity planned for family entertainment and one will be disappointed," an official of the Olympics added. Last minute Olympics entries may be made by calling the sponsors of the event the Angelina County Chamber of Commerce at 713-634-6644. Entries in the Olympics competition must be sponsored by an organization and pay a \$25 entry fee.

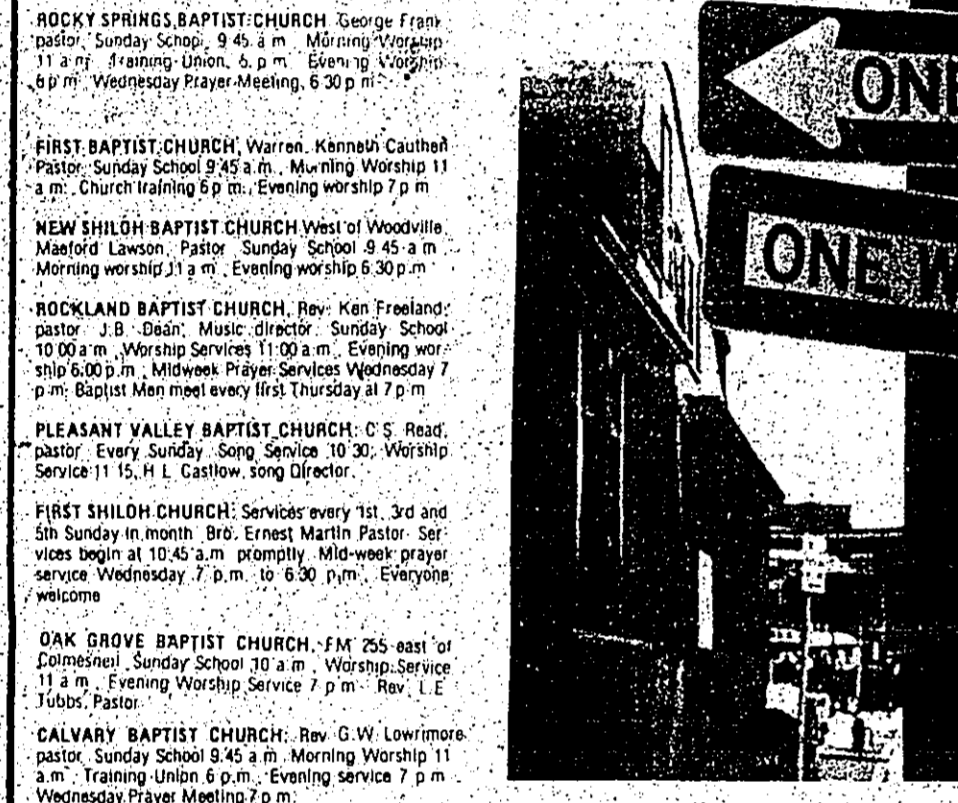
