Countywide Cleanup To Kick Off

A joint meeting of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce, the municipal city governments around Tyler County and the Commissioners court will convene at 7 p.m. Thursday, May 24, to work out details of a massive cleanup campaign during the month of June.

Spearheaded by the Chamber of Commerce, the meeting also will invite all retail businesses, civic clubs, homeowners, property owners and the recently formed "Improve Tyler County" group called UPGRADE.

According to Chamber President Bub Byram, the meeting will be to offer plans and establish goals in the cleanup effort.

"We want to get all parties working together," Byram said.

Projects already begun in the county to enhance the month-long clean-up push include art projects in the Woodville Independent School District which will result in numerous posters to be displayed through the county. Prize money will be awarded for the most creative works.

A project to locate four 50-gallon drum barrels painted with respective schools colors in each community has already been undertaken by the Vocational Education Department in the W.I.S.D.

Requests have been received from the Big Thicket project coordinators to leave some barrels at the entrance ways to the Big Thicket.

Tyler County Commissioners Court has promised fullest cooperation in public usage of the solid waste disposal dumps throughout the county. City crews have pledged extra efforts through the month in the cleanup effort, also.

A special movie supplied by the Highway Department will be shown at the Thursday meeting and at the Woodville Lions Club noon luncheon.

District Buys Buses, Hires Counselor

The Board of Trustees of the Woodville Independent School District voted, in a unanimous decision at their regular session on Tuesday, May 15 to purchase two new school buses for the 1979-80 school year.

According to Woodville I.S.D. Superintendent Tom Linam, two new buses will be needed to replace two of the older buses now in use in the system. The new buses would carry 72 passengers and be equipped with automatic transmissions. Approximate cost of each bus will be 18,000 for a total outlay of \$36,000.

Linam said that the buses would be paid for in cash rather than by financing them.

There were eleven other items before the board in the regular session and three in executive session.

Jack Stansbury, school architect, presented his monthly progress report to the board, stating that progress on the High School was proceeding steadily. The tractor is putting the stucco bands around the exterior of the building; and work on the curbs, sidewalks, and grading is underway. Stansbury said that the parking lot will hopefully be finished before the end of the month.

Some problems have shown up, particularly in the construction of the gym. There are definitely some major leaks in the gym," Stansbury said. He added that no more finishing work can be done inside the academic building, until the electricity is installed and the humidity is under control.

Stansbury presented a change order to the board concerning three additions to the school not originally

included in the specifications. First, the Home Economics department asked for a sink to be installed in the laboratory kitchen at a cost of \$796.00. They also asked that twelve additional sewing machine cabinets be built in the sewing laboratory at a cost of \$2941.00. The final addition was for a washer and dryer to be installed in the kitchen. The cost for the plumbing and wiring involved is \$806.00. Total cost of the changes," Stansbury said, "would be \$4543.00." The changes were approved by a unanimous vote of the board.

Stansbury then reported that he had received a sample of the material for the proposed sign to be located at the entrance to the school on Hwy. 287. The sample was fiberglass with decal-type letters. Because the lettering was easily scratched, Stansbury said that this type sign would not be acceptable. More samples will be available at the next meeting.

The third item on the agenda, and the one the trustees began the meeting with, was to interview Kathryn Patton for the position of counselor for the Woodville I.S.D. After an executive session lasting 50 minutes, the board convened the regular session and voted unanimously to hire her for the position.

The depository bid for 1979-81 was opened with Carey Cruse, representing Citizens State Bank of Woodville, presenting the bid. By law, the school system must deposit its money in a bank located within the district. Citizens State Bank is the only bank within the Woodville I.S.D. After hearing the terms of the bid, the trustees voted to accept it.

In other business, the board accepted the minutes of the previous meeting, accepted the April financial statement, and heard the April report of the school tax assessor-collector.

The board then discussed an offer by the Mason's to officiate at an installation of a corner stone in the new high school. This offer was contingent on the school paying for the corner stone, and the expense of having it put into the building.

Bid Opening Delayed; County Funding Ok'd

The Tyler County Commissioners Court met in a special meeting on Monday, May 21, with two items on the agenda.

Bids were scheduled to be opened on the purchase of "dump" trucks for precincts 1 and 3; but, one bidder, according to County Judge Allen Sturrock, was not notified in time to get his bid in. The bidding time has been extended until 10 a.m. on Wednesday, May 23. Bids already submitted will not be opened until that time.

In the other court action, Judge Sturrock announced that the county had been approved for federal disaster relief assistance. The commissioners applied for this aid after the recent flooding left many miles of Tyler County roads destroyed. The purpose of the program is to bring the roads and bridges in the community back to their pre-disaster status.

In providing money for the repair of the damaged roads and bridges, the county will only have to provide 15% of the expense, while the federal government covers the other 85%.

According to Judge Sturrock, one of the requirements of the program is that the commissioners appoint an

Social Services Meeting Set

A meeting to allow public comment on the Department of Human Resources plan to provide social services in Texas during 1980, will be held May 30, in Jasper in the Community Room at First National Bank.

The meeting will be held from 10 a.m. to noon, and all persons in East and Southeast Texas who have an interest in social services programs are invited to attend.

Up for discussion will be the Title XX Comprehensive Annual Services Program Plan (CASPP), the document that explains in detail the proposed services that are to be provided in each of the state's geographic areas.

The CASPP is written each year based on comment from both DHR staff and private citizens throughout the state, in order to develop social services to meet specific needs.

Title XX federal funds, which are funds earmarked for social services programs, are matched with state monies to provide these programs in Texas.

The CASPP is an annual effort by DHR to allocate both state and federal funds to areas where the need is the greatest.

The public comment period on the proposed 1980 CASPP will end June 25. The final version of the document will be published on September 30.

Ambulance Firm Seeks Members

An ambulance service is one of those things that most people take for granted. Few people give the ambulance service in their community any more thought than they give the funeral home, hospital or police department.

An ambulance service is as essential to a community as any of the other services; but, the continued existence of such a service has not recently enjoyed much success in Tyler County. A funeral home, a hospital, or a police department have an assured source of income; an ambulance service does not.

Tyler County residents have an opportunity to change this situation and assure themselves of adequate ambulance service by joining the newly chartered Tyler County Ambulance Association. The initial membership will be held open only through June 1, 1979, however.

At one time the ambulance service here in Tyler County was provided by a local funeral home as an auxiliary service. As government regulations aimed at upgrading the quality of care provided by ambulances and their crews made operation more expensive, many of the funeral homes in the area were gradually forced out of the ambulance service business.

Tyler County is one of the rural areas that some years ago found itself without adequate ambulance service. This is particularly serious since many people are isolated, far from the county hospital. Older people are particularly vulnerable with this problem.

In June of 1977, Ambulance Service, Inc., owned by Teresa Greenup, president of the company, became the primary single source of ambulance service in the county. The service is not funded by the county or the Tyler County hospital district; it is entirely privately owned.

According to Nate Greenup, there are only two ways for an ambulance service to make money and thus stay in business. One method, and the one currently used by the ambulance service, is on day-to-day revenue. This means that the ambulance company income is dependent solely on the number of paying calls answered each day. Many calls are made for which no money can be collected.

"In a county this size," Greenup said, "you can't operate on this basis. There simply is not enough calls to make it work."

A group of concerned citizens from Tyler County, who were made aware of the difficulty in keeping an ambulance in operation, joined together and formed the Tyler County Ambulance Association. The Association is a state-chartered, non-profit organization whose purpose is to improve the quality of the Ambulance Service in Tyler County.

Membership in the Association is open to all families in Tyler County. The cost of participation in the program is \$30 per year for each family unit. That money buys the member family free ambulance service for emergency or transfer purposes anywhere in Tyler County. It also provides for free transfer services to Jasper, Silsbee, Livingston, Corrigan, Lufkin and Beaumont. The only time an Association member would incur any ambulance related expense would be when a transfer was made out of the immediate area. Even then, the member would save \$70 - \$80 over the cost to a non-member.

The Tyler County Ambulance Association has contracted with Greenup's Ambulance Service, Inc., to provide the ambulance service to its members. Under the terms of this contract, all money collected by the Association is maintained by the Association. The money does not go directly to the Ambulance Service. Each month the officers of the Association will meet and pay the ambulance service a specified amount per member.

Not only will the association pay the ambulance

service, but it will also place strict requirements on the contract under which the ambulance service will operate; that it is required to keep two fully equipped ambulances in service 24 hours per day, seven days a week. Each ambulance must meet all state requirements, be radio equipped, and be manned by two people.

Each ambulance attendant must have completed a certain amount of training initially, and by the end of one year, must be a certified Emergency Medical Technician (EMT).

The ambulance service must also guarantee a three minute response time, which means that the ambulance must be on its way to the scene within three minutes after receiving a call.

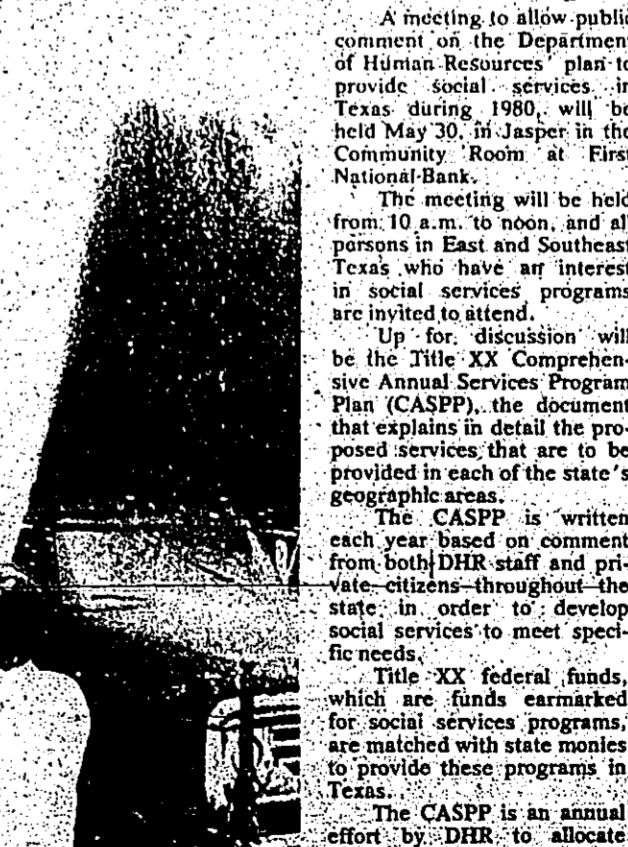
Teresa Greenup and Billy Cloyd of the Ambulance Service are both presently Emergency Care Attendants (ECA). As soon as a school is available, they will both qualify as E.M.T.'s. Eighty hours of classroom work and forty hours of emergency room work are required to become certified.

Registration for Ambulance Association membership is open through June 1.

Cowart Is 'Distinguished'

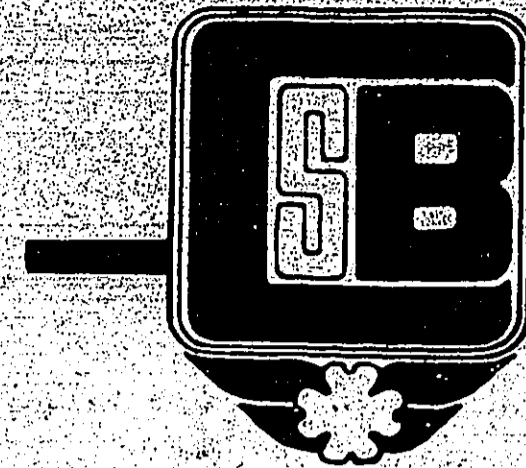

Texas Quail Bag Limits Deferred-Remain Same

AUSTIN—Texas quail hunters may be able to take quail production as a result of a decision by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission. The commission in its public hearing in Austin last month authorized the Parks and Wildlife Department to defer setting bag limits on quail in regulatory authority counties until after the quail nesting season is completed. The final decision on quail public hearing in Austin last month authorized the Parks and Wildlife Department to defer setting bag limits on quail in regulatory authority counties until after the quail nesting season is completed. The final decision on quail bag and possession limits will be announced sometime in September. The season dates will be generally the same as last year. In the Panhandle, Permian Basin, Trans-Pecos and South Texas areas the season will be Oct. 27, 1979, through Feb. 3, 1981. In the remainder of counties under the department's regulatory authority, the season will be Nov. 17, 1979, through Feb. 17, 1980. Currently the bag limit on quail statewide is 12 birds per day, but department officials deferred setting the 1979-80 limit in order to take advantage of any increases in quail production brought about by favorable nesting conditions. Horace Gore, the department's upland game program leader, said widespread rains throughout the state have made nesting conditions appear "extremely good" and he said high quail populations for the hunting season are a definite possibility.

Bag Limits Increased On Striped Bass

AUSTIN—Increased bag limits on striped bass, an experimental minimum size limit on largemouth bass in two lakes, and authorization for scientific study of the white sturgeon, were part of Texas highlighted action taken by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission April 26 in the field of fisheries.

The commission voted to place the grass carp on the Parks and Wildlife Department's "partially restricted" list of potentially harmful fish in order to prohibit the immediate stocking of the controversial species, but allow controlled scientific studies. The commission authorized the department's executive director to issue scientific permits only to Texas A&M University to carry out this research. Commission members emphasized that investigations by the department staff and studies done in other states indicate that the fish might spread through wild fish and cause damage to beneficial vegetation and game fish.

The grass carp is viewed by some as a possible solution to the problem of controlling hydrilla and other aquatic plants in Lake Corpus and elsewhere.

The commission authorized increasing the statewide bag limit on striped bass from three per day to five; and increasing the possession limit from six to ten. Exceptions are the border lakes of Texas and Toledo Bend where the limits will remain unchanged. On Toledo Bend the limit is three daily and six in possession. The Toledo Bend limits are two and four.

Also, all bag and possession limits on striped/white bass hybrids were removed statewide.

In other action, the commission authorized an experimental program for Lake Naughton, and the Fayette County Project Lake in Fayette County aimed at maintaining a high-quality largemouth bass fishery. The two lakes will have a daily bag limit of three largeemouth bass and a possession limit of six. Also, fishermen may not keep any bass under 16 inches in length.

The department staff told the commission the experience should enable biologists to determine if the bass harvest can be spread over a longer period of time to a greater number of people and maintain a quality fishery.

Other commission action on fisheries matters included: Setting a daily bag limit of three Nile perch in Lake Victor Braung near San Antonio, and a daily limit of five Nile perch in Lake Bastrop in Bastrop County. Establishing a 14-inch minimum size limit on 50 per day bag limit for blue and channel catfish taken from Lake Livingston the grass carp of commercial fishing licenses. In this special Lake Livingston regulation, anglers may take 50 channel and blue catfish in the aggregate. They retain catfish. Any inches in length. Authorizing the use of artificial minnow lures in all regulatory counties on the waters of Toledo Bend, Buchanan Reservoir. Sellers may not be tracked in a manner which would impede the movement of fish. The prior regulation limited the length of seines to 20 feet in a number of counties.

Prohibiting the use of nets in Camp County, in B.A. Steinhagen Lake in Tyler and Jasper Counties, and in that portion of Toledo Bend Reservoir north of the U.S. 84 bridge in Shelby County.

Authorizing the use of three-inch mesh nonmetallic nets for rough fish only in Grimes County.

Prohibiting the use of fish spear guns and spear bow and arrow for the taking of red drum (redfish) and sport catchout.

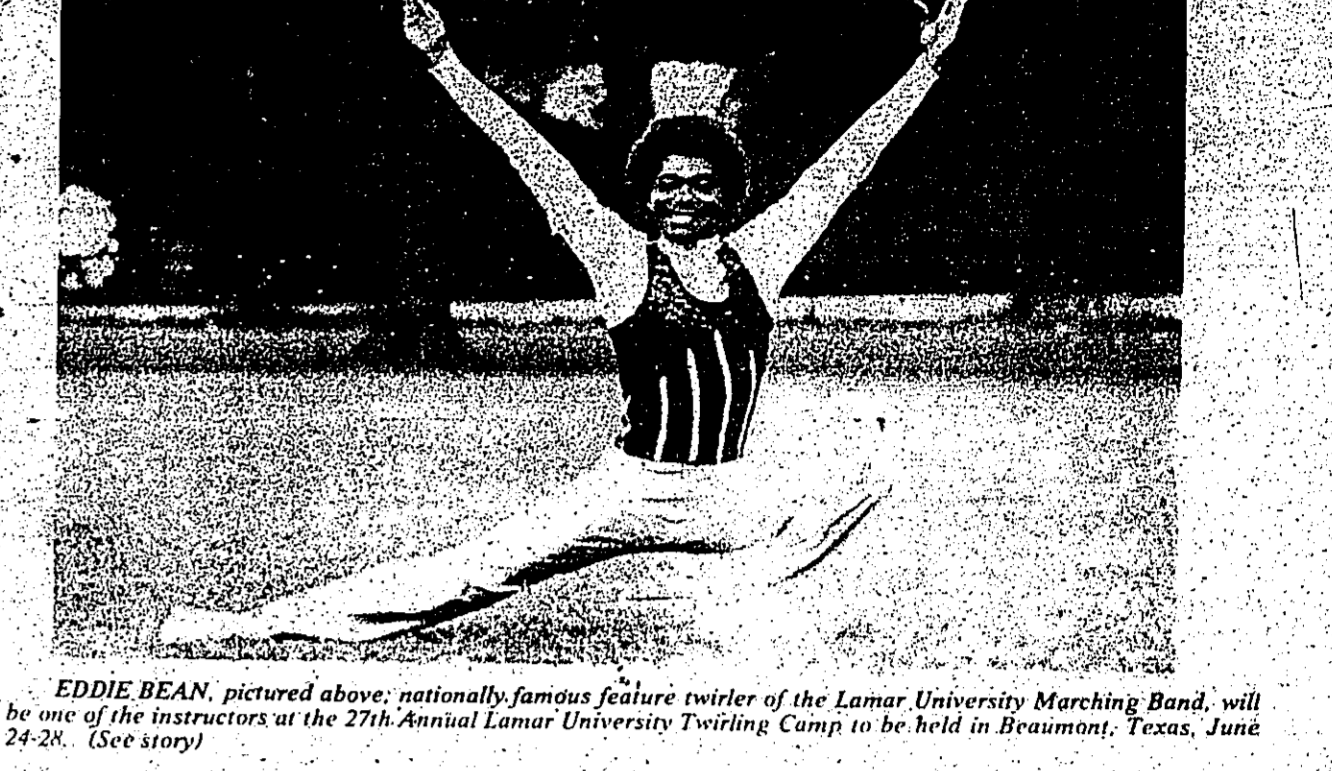

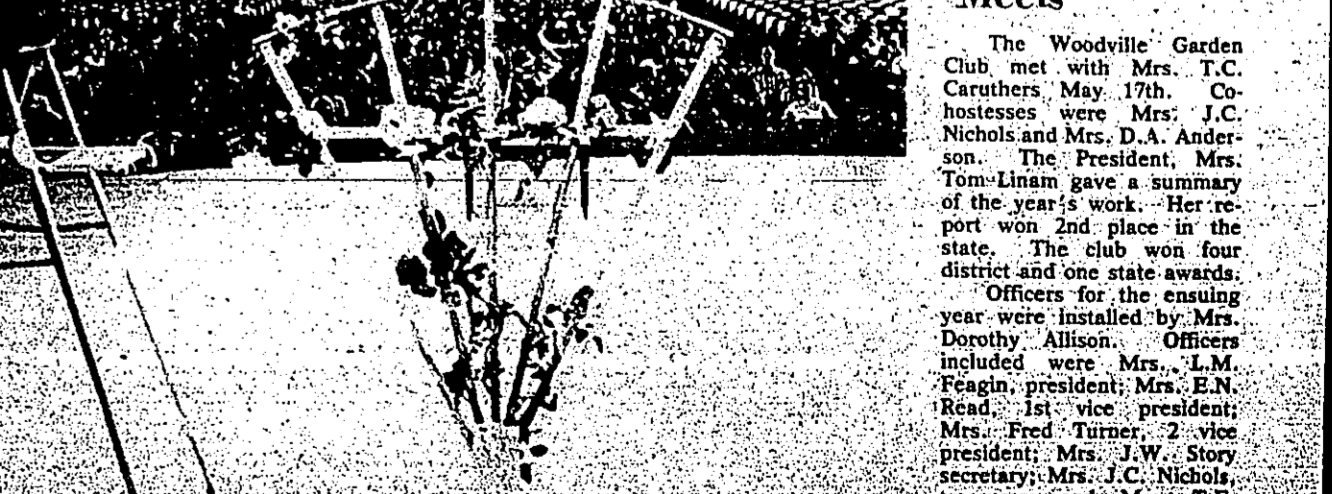

Mailbox Improvement Week 'Is Here

Mailboxes are easily reached by improvement week carriers to help speed collection and delivery of their mail. Postmaster Lattolis urged all rural customers to paint and mail repair unkept damaged mailboxes in town and on rural routes.

The Postmaster recalled that a man named Collins was among the first to show interest in improving the appearance and security of the mailbox.

On April 29, 1903, he filed an application with the U.S. Patent Office for a two-horn cylindrical mail receptacle. It consisted of a detachable scoop with a weather-resistant cover and a metal flag that could be raised to indicate when mail was to be collected.

Until Collins came along, Postmaster Lattolis said, many makeshift receptacles -- including tin cans nailed to trees -- were used as mailboxes, particularly after rural mail service began in 1896.

Today, he said, a variety of approved commercial mailbox designs are available for use with decorative posts, and those who prefer a custom-made mailbox may check with the Woodville Post Office to make sure it meets specifications and requirements.


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
