Commissioners Accept Vehicle Bids

The Tyler County Commissioners Court, in a special meeting on Wednesday, May 23, accepted bids for two dump trucks for Precinct 1 and 3 from Jack Lane Ford of Woodville and Polk County Motor Company of Livingston.

Three companies placed bids on the dump truck

requested by Precinct 1 Commissioner Maxie Riley. Jack Lane Ford, who bid \$13,545 on a 1979 F800 without bed; Angelina Chevrolet of Lufkin, who bid \$19,951.06 for a 1979 Chevrolet Truck with 6-8 yard bed; and Polk County Motor Company, with a bid of \$19,197.94 on the same truck Angelina Chevrolet offered.

Commissioner Riley, after studying the specifications and talking with representatives of Jack Lane Ford and Polk County Motor Company, moved to accept the bid of \$13,545 from Jack Lane Ford of Woodville, in combination with a bid from Alex-Feigelson Company, of Beaumont, for a dump bed at a cost of \$2,942. Total expense of the dump truck with the bed will be \$16,487. The motion was approved by all commissioners present.

On the dump truck for precinct 3, there were four bids made: Polk County Motor Company offered a 1979 Chevrolet 4 1/2 ton tandem at a price of \$24,522.30; Jack Lane Ford asked \$21,065 for a 1979-11800 12/14 yard dump truck; A&M Motor Company of Woodville, bid \$27,138 on a 1980 GMC dump truck without bed; and Angelina Chevrolet offered a 1979 Chevrolet 4 1/2 ton truck for \$25,155.40.

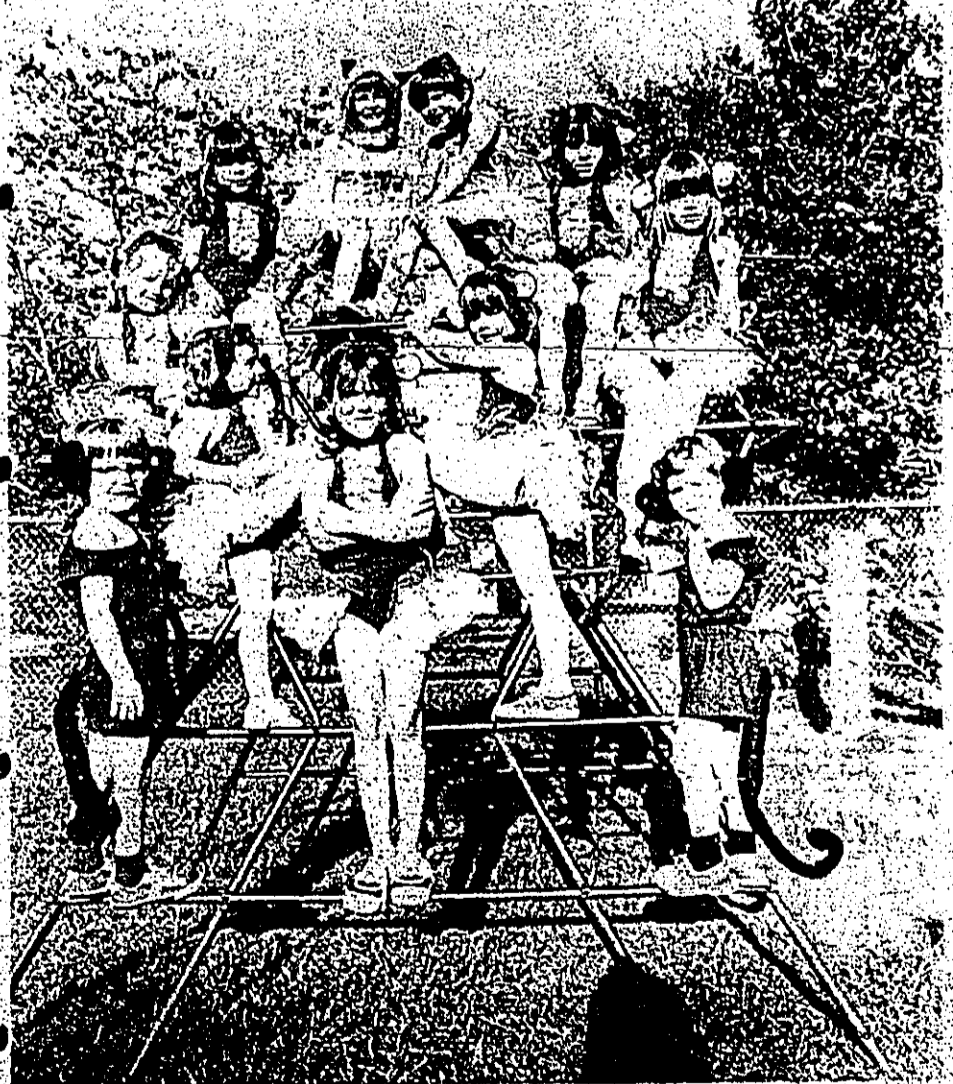
During Month Of April

Sergeant Russell Davis of the Texas Highway Patrol announced today that during the month of April 1979, in Tyler County, there was 1 Rural Fatal Accident in which 1 person was killed. In addition, the Texas Highway Patrol investigated 17 Rural Motor Vehicle Accidents in which 12 persons were injured.

Through April of this year, there have been 38 Rural accidents in Tyler

County, killing 2 persons and injuring 35 people. During the same 4 month period in 1978, there were 43 Rural Traffic Accidents, killing 1 and injuring 23 persons.

During the month of April in the 16 counties, comprising District 2B, the Texas Highway Patrol investigated 530 Rural Accidents, killing 20 persons and injuring 268 people.

County Cleanup Underway

A county wide beautification meeting was held on Thursday, May 24, in the Commissioner's Courtroom at the Tyler County Courthouse to formulate plans for a month long county beautification project during June.

Bud Byram, representing UPGRADE, opened the meeting, stating that its purpose was to "consolidate ideas for a cleanup campaign."

After showing a film on littering, Richard Cardwell, assistant District Engineer of the Department of Highways and Public Transportation, told the group that "over \$7.5 million dollars of your tax money each year goes for picking up trash." According to Cardwell, \$300,000 of that money is spent in this district. He then stated that he "feels the place to start any litter program is with the young people."

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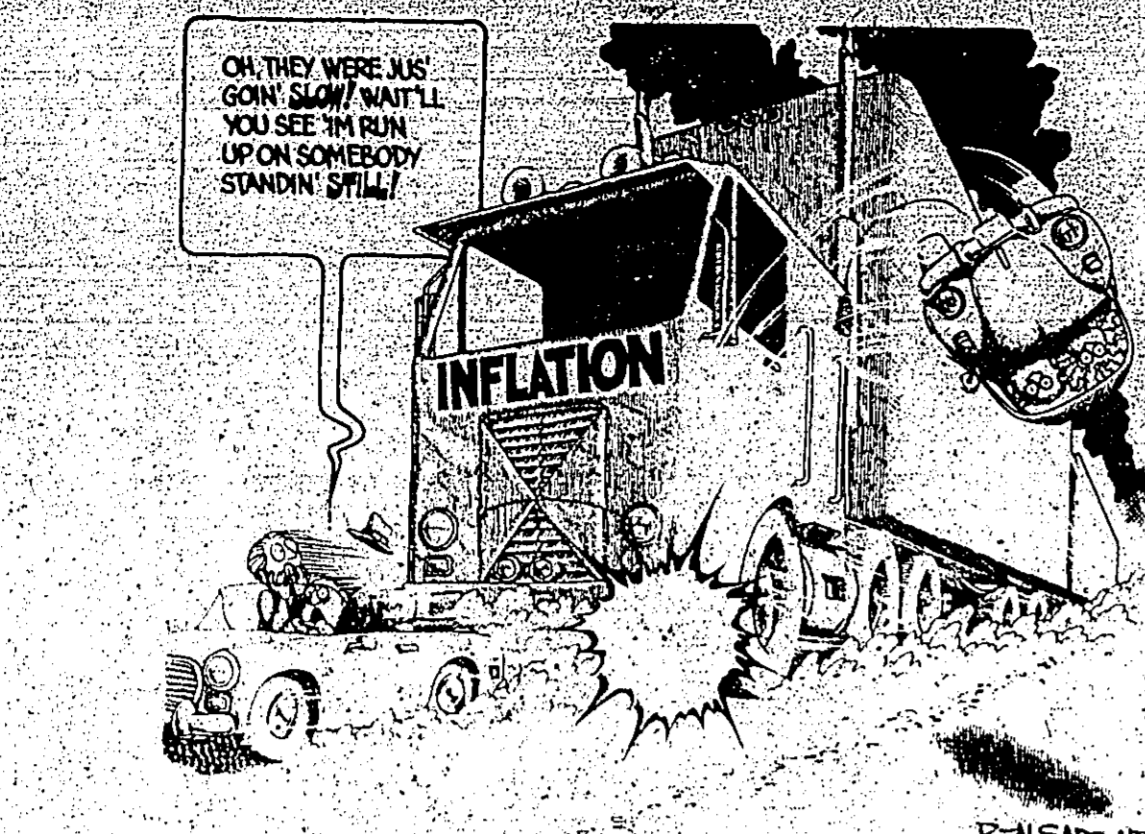

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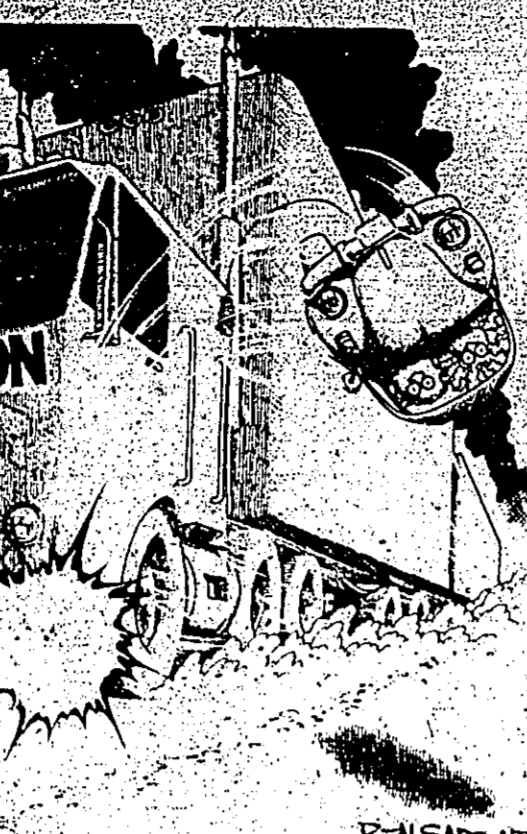

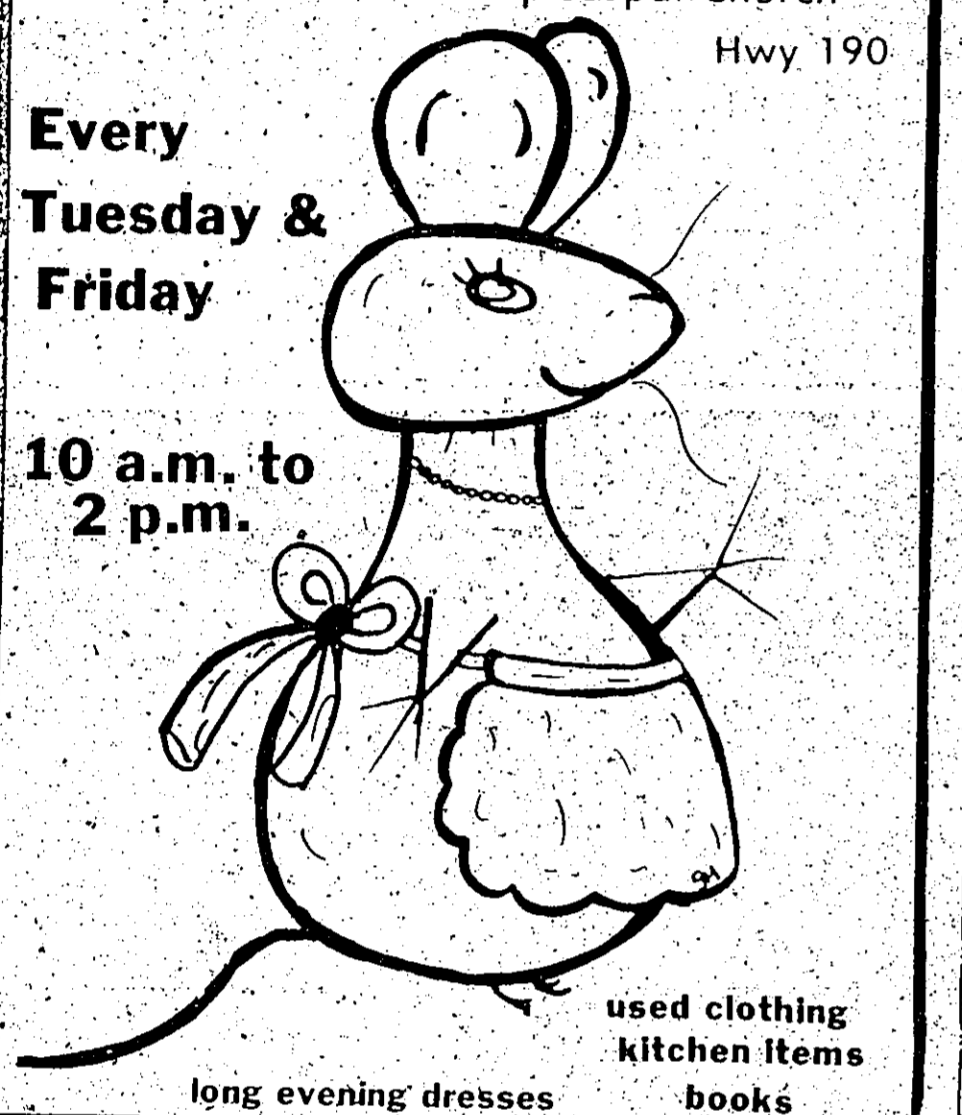

Summer Swimmers: Drownproofing Easy To Learn - Saves Life

Spring's warm, sunny days mean an increase in swimming, boating and water skiing for many people across the state. But even good swimmers should know about drownproofing before making their first splash.

Drownproofing is not a swimming technique like the breast stroke. In fact, the subject of drownproofing is to survive in water by using as little energy as possible. In tests using this method, even non-swimmers have been able to remain in water eight hours or more without assistance.

Drownproofing involves the following steps:

- First, fill your lungs with air and hold your breath.
- Second, allow your body to float higher than fresh water. Let your head, arms and whole body float freely.
- Third, relax and allow your body to sink.
- Fourth, practice the survival method on your own.

Gray said that this year's production of hybrids, 3.1 million, was compared to 2.7 million in 1978 and one million in 1977. For pure strips, this year's total will easily beat last year's production of 1.1 million, and with luck may exceed the 1977 record of 1.5 million, which was hatched.

The department's strip production has increased tenfold since 1974. Gray pointed out that this year's program was not without its difficulties, as erratic weather conditions apparently caused some brood fish to be "riped" or short of eggs. "We had some shipments where we found ripe females and completely empty females in the same group," Gray said. However, high river flows caused large numbers of strips to be lost in the Lake Granbury dam where crews with shucking basins were to collect them efficiently. A significant number of brood-ers were also lost from Toledo Bend Reservoir.

Lakes to receive stockings are determined by considering a number of priority factors, Gray said, including past stocking history, standing crop estimates, creek surveys and forage base.

In general, pure strips are placed in lakes where there is some possibility of natural reproduction, while the hybrids are stocked on put-grow-and-take basis in waters where reproduction is unlikely. Hybrids are stocked to thrive in small power plant reservoirs where there are warm-water discharges and high populations of silt and other forage fish.

Stripes are anadromous fish which, in their native habitat, live most of their life in salt water and migrate into rivers to spawn similarly to salmon. In recent years, it was discovered that stripes locked into freshwater lakes also can spawn in tributaries under certain conditions.

This has occurred in the Brazos River both above and below Lake Granbury and in Lake Texoma, department surveys have shown.

Stripes hybrids have caused a virtual revolution on Texas' freshwater sport fishing scene, even though the striped action appears likely to be replaced by bass.

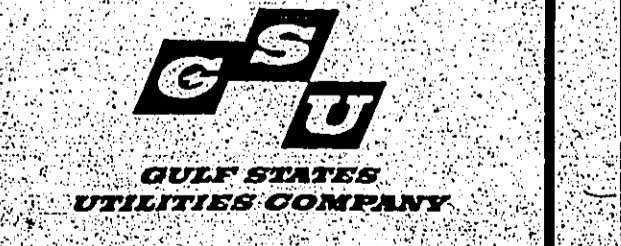

'Jaws' Help Fire Department Rescue Ability

A Fire Department is probably one of the most important yet ignored organizations a town or city has. Few people think much about it until they have a fire at their home. But, an even more unknown fact about a fire department is that they do a great deal more than simply fight fires.

The Woodville Volunteer Fire Department has been in continuous existence since the 1930's. It has approximately 30 active volunteer members who fight, according to Fire Marshal Alva Cook, Jr., from 80 to 100 fires per year. However, the fire department is active in other areas than firefighting.

With the recent addition in February this year of a piece of rescue equipment called "Jaws", the Woodville Fire Department is now able to participate in rescue operations more effectively than before.

"Jaws" is a hydraulically operated unit which is able to apply 50,000 pounds of pressure needed to possibly free a trapped person from a vehicle for example. The unit is gasoline operated. It has a power head weighing 67 pounds. The unit is operated by one man, which means that the job becomes very tiring very quickly to that individual.

"Jaws" was purchased by the Woodville City Council at a cost of \$6,000 and vastly upgrades the ability of the fire department to deal with rescue missions in the area.

More in keeping to the traditional role of a fire department, the new American-Lafrance fire engine recently purchased by the city almost doubles the volume of water that the department can pour on a fire each minute. The \$64,000 engine is capable of pumping up to 1000 gallons per minute (gpm) of water,

which is twice as much as the 1951 pumper that it replaces.

According to Fire Marshal Cook, "The new engine is a fine piece of equipment for a city the size of Woodville." He added that in the predicted life of the engine of 30 years, the engine "would mean many homes saved

from fire in Woodville."

With the addition of these two pieces of equipment, the Woodville Volunteer Fire Department is better able to move beyond the traditional role of the fire department of fighting fires, and into the more modern role of a multifaceted rescue team.



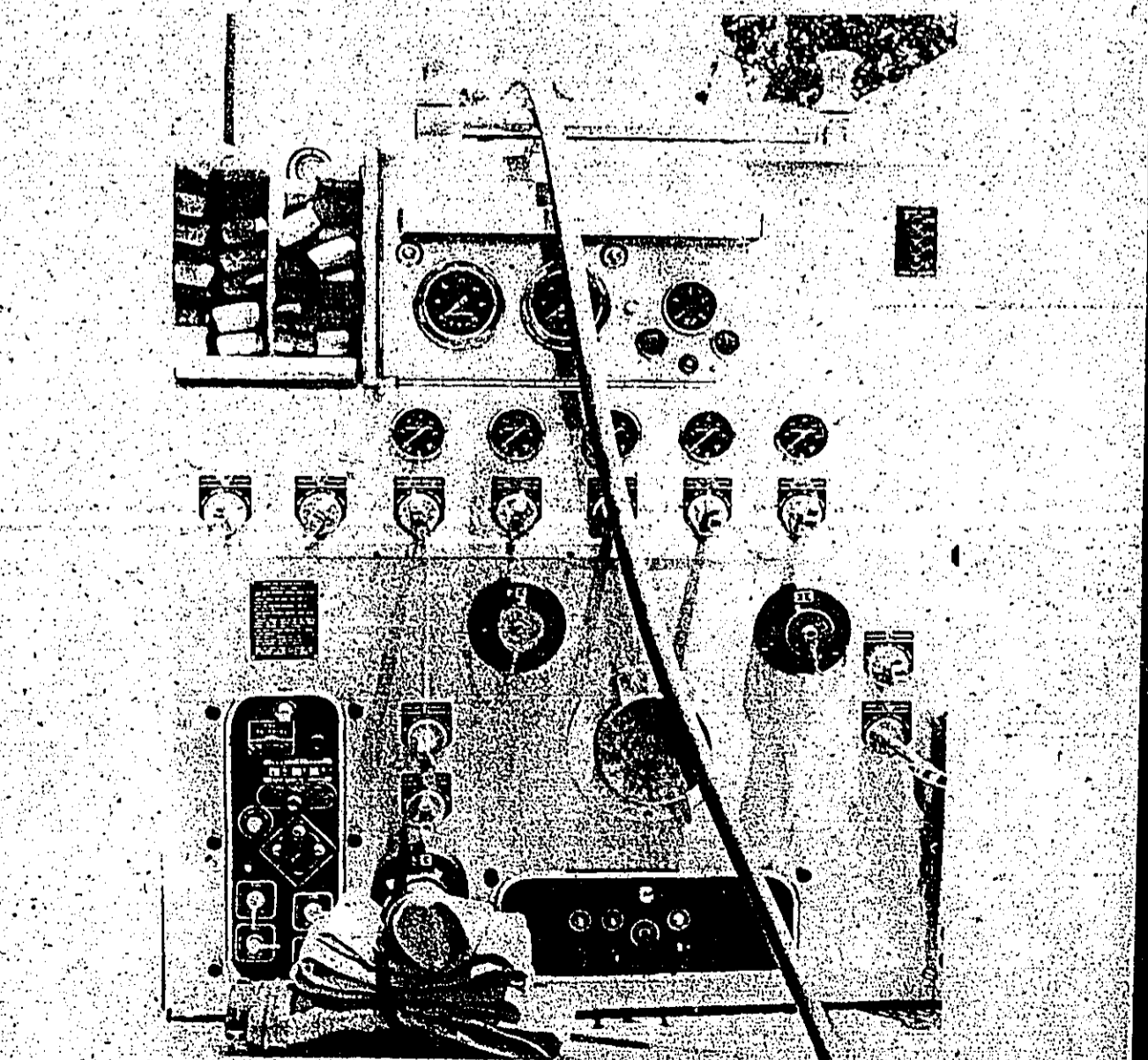
"JAWS" POWER UNIT (foreground) is shown with its power head being readied for use. The power head, which must be fixed by one man, weighs 67 pounds.

Bentsen Bill Hits 'Presumptive Sentencing'

WASHINGTON, D.C. (AP) — A bill introduced by Sen. Lloyd Bentsen on Wednesday would change the federal criminal code to allow judges to sentence offenders to prison for a fixed term if they are convicted of a crime that carries a maximum sentence of 10 years or more.

The current system of "indeterminate" sentencing, with a new approach known as "presumptive sentencing," is not working. Many murderers like Charles Manson and Richard Speck are eligible for parole. Other dangerous offenders go unpunished. Glaring disparities in the sentences of those who are punished lead to numerous and great injustices. Bentsen said in Senate remarks accompanying his legislation.

"The dangerous criminal should no longer be able to feel that even if he is convicted the odds are in his favor, that he may do violence at will to the lives and safety of innocent citizens. Certainty of punishment, the fact that the criminal believes that punishment will be imposed, is a deterrent. The criminal should know in advance the cost of his crime."

Senator Bentsen noted that under the present "indeterminate" system the law often reads: "imprisonment for any term, years, or for life." The judge has discretion to set virtually any sentence under statutes such as this. And, once sentence is imposed, the convicted individual is generally eligible for parole after serving a third of that sentence.

Under the Bentsen presumptive sentencing bill, specific prison terms would be established by law for specific crimes. For example, punishment for bank robbery, which violence is involved, first offense, would be seven years in prison. The sentence would increase for subsequent offenses. Womens Marriage Role Often Hurt By Tradition

COLLEGE STATION — Traditional marriage roles may damage some women's self-concepts, says a family life education specialist. New research shows that traditional "marriage roles" may be chipping away at women's feelings of competence, says Patricia Lamson, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Although marriage can increase a woman's general happiness and her roles can give her identity, those same roles also may produce stress and eventually damage her image of herself, Ms. Lamson notes.

In the past, women traditionally were limited to home-making roles. Because of that, they did not have access to many of society's other rewards, so some remedied this deficiency by viewing their husbands' successes as their own.

"They gave their husbands support, interest and attention, so they felt part of their husbands' achievements."

But research has shown that women who viewed their husbands as "successful" also felt that they had "successful" marriages. The more successful wives were at maintaining a marriage, the better they felt about themselves.

However, new research reveals that the success of a husband may harm the self-concept of his wife. The wife has little success of her own.

Latest findings show that women may feel guilty, or think "less of themselves when they cannot contribute money to the family."

They also may feel slighted when they cannot acquire it themselves.

"When researchers recently compared these feelings with the feelings of professional women, the damaging effects did not appear," Ms. Lamson adds.

Safe Boat Week

Is June 1-7

Governor William P. Clements, Jr. has proclaimed June 1-7, 1979, as Texas Safe Boating Week in conjunction with National Safe Boating Week.

The National Safe Boating Council has designated June 1-7 as National Safe Boating Week in recognition of the growing number of Americans who spend their recreational time on the water.

The idea behind this campaign is that boating, for the amateur, as well as the professional sportsman, can be more fun if it is done right, with safety in mind.

An ever popular sport in Texas, boating and related activities on the Gulf coast and at the 21 major lakes and hundreds of smaller waterways touches upon the lives of Texans in many ways.

But safety is very important in the large industry. Last year, 96 Texans, 88 men and women, died in boating-related accidents.

During Texas Safe Boating Week, BTAT plans to remind Texas boaters of safety measures that they might be neglecting in their enthusiasm to get out on the water this season.

Myr. Jeffrey Palmer, water safety consultant for Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in Austin, reminded boaters to check out one feature device of life preserver for each individual in a boat while on the water.

Perhaps the most important thing people should remember is to keep track of the weather, so that they can take cover if a thunderstorm should develop.
