The Tyler County Sheriff's department responded to a call Sunday from Grammer's Grocery in Woodville where, according to owner Joe Grammer, someone took approximately \$400 from a change box under the cash register in the store.

According to Grammer, he and the store employee's were in the back of the store when an unidentified person took advantage of them not looking in the front and took off with the money. Grammer said that there were bundles of \$5's, \$10's, and \$20's, as well as checks and some food stamps.

"We don't know exactly when it happened," said Grammer. "But it was probably sometime between 2 p.m. and 4:30 p.m."

Sheriff Lewis Craven responded to the call, but was unavailable for comment at press time.

Grammer said that law enforcement officials had some suspects in the crime, "but nothing certain."

Commissioners Hold Back HB1060 One Year

The Tyler County Commissioners Court, in a special meeting on Friday, June 15, passed a resolution to implement House Bill 1060, a bill dealing with agricultural use land exemptions, in 1980 rather than 1979.

H.B. 1060 is an implementing bill to deal with the needed tax relief in the state. The bill deals not only with agricultural land, but also with timber, intangible property, household property, household goods and personal effects, automobiles, homesteads, and school tax bonds.

Taxing authorities are required to implement provisions of the bill in 1979 unless they, in open session, pass a resolution stating that it is impossible to do so. The Tyler County Commissioners, after discussion, decided that "due to the late time of the year" that the bill passed, it "would be impossible to put the Act into effect this year."

In a unanimous decision, they resolved to wait until 1980 to implement the bill.

The commissioners then took up a related bill on the Beaumont Hill Project, rejecting all bids on the paving of the road for the project, stating that they would go out again for bids on the project.

The issue of the federally required maternity insurance was brought up again. The commissioners resolved to pay 80% of the cost of the delivery up to a \$700 limit per maternity. This is in line with what the county's present insurance would pay for any normal illness that require hospitalization.

The commissioners also announced that bids would be accepted for the mowing of the Airport and would be opened on Monday, July 9, at 10 a.m.

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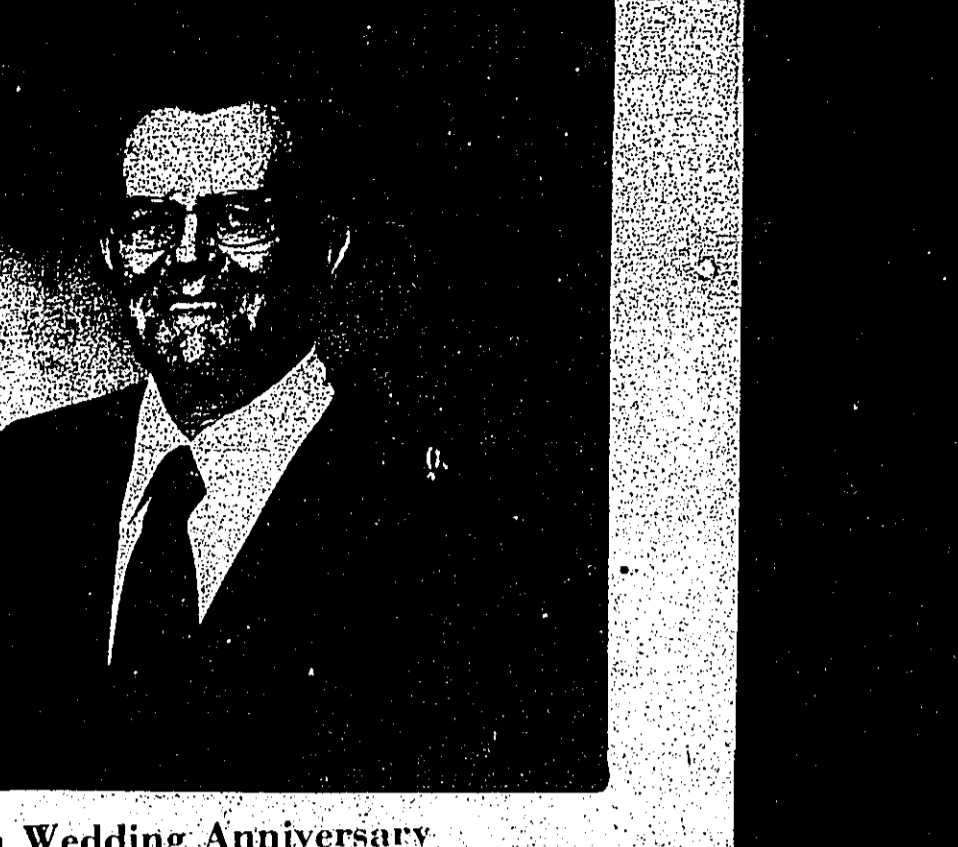

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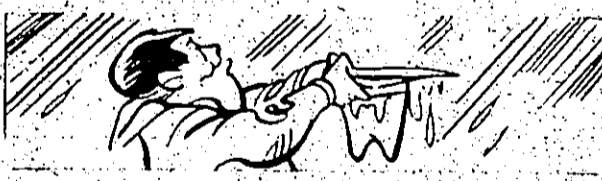

Childers Memorial On Exhibit

A new exhibit will be in permanent display at the Texas Forestry Museum in Lufkin as a memorial to the late Dr. R. R. Childers of Jasper.

The Common Trees of East Texas identification exhibit is a gift from Mrs. Zella Childers, whose husband was a forestry enthusiast. Dr. Childers died April 27, 1967, at the age of 71, and for nearly 30 years devoted much of his life to forestry improvements.

The exhibit has been constructed by the Texas Forestry Service through money made available by Mrs. Childers. Ideas were discussed with museum officials and the tree identification exhibit was chosen as a fitting memorial to Dr. Childers.

The exhibit will allow visitors to match the common tree names with color pictures of the tree and its leaf. The exhibit consists of 30 varieties of trees found in East Texas.

Mrs. Childers and members of the Texas Forestry Museum Board of Trustees were on hand June 11 for the presentation of the exhibit to the museum.

"We expect this to prove to be one of our most popular exhibits," stated Ed Wagner, Texas Forestry Association executive vice president. "It is just looking for visitors who operate the exhibit. It has a lot of educational value for our youth, school class groups, and the out-of-state visitors touring the museum."

Paul R. Kramer, director of the Texas Forestry Service, stated in a letter to Mrs. Childers: "His educational aspects are a fitting tribute to a man like Dr. Childers who made so many contributions to forestry in East Texas."

Dr. Childers served on the Texas Forestry Association Board of Directors, and was named Texas Outstanding Tree Farmer of the Year in 1959.

The Childers' tree farm acreage in Jasper and Newton counties, was first certified on July 25, 1949, only five years after the program began in Texas.

A successful veterinarian in Jasper, Dr. Childers became interested in forestry when a friend in the timber business told him of the economic advantages of growing trees. At the age of 52, in 1938, Dr. Childers purchased his first tract of land, 67 acres. He continued buying land until he had 37 tracts, totaling 1,125 acres, ranging in size from two to 160 acres.

Even before he got into tree farming, himself, Dr. Childers assisted a group of students in 1942 at Calhoun, Texas to plant slash pine. He also gave 20 acres for forestry work to the Jasper High School Chapter of Future Farmers of America.

Dr. Childers was one of the first private landowners in the area to establish hardwood control and reforestation of his tracts. Mrs. Childers has been referred to as the "First Lady of East Texas Forestry."

The influence and example of the Childers' has persuaded many forest landowners to follow good forest management practices.

Students Explore Spindletop Hill

BEAUMONT, TEXAS—A hot sun beats down, as Lamar University instructors and students alike shovel sand atop Spindletop Hill, site of the original oil gusher in North America.

The 1901 boom town of Gladys City sprang up on the site amid a confusion of pumping oil derricks and holding tanks; men and women from all over the country converged on the hill to make their fortunes.

Some did. Gulf Oil, Texaco and Mobil carted their rock back to Gladys City and The Hill.

Now weeds and scrub trees cover the area, instead of the horse bellows of oilmen, clanging equipment, hot steam and rowdy cowboys, nearby a quail calls from the brush and a few cars whiz by on a distant highway. On the ground and just beneath the surface, artifacts from the turn of the century are scattered across The Hill.

Old bottles, ceramic tables, a porcelain dolls head, coins, glass telephone insulators, drilling tools, spent shells and plaques from China, Germany and England—the list is endless.

The students are digging a 500-foot baseline across the hill, patiently sifting the dirt through a screen meshed with a rope, in a line across the top of the hill where Gladys City stood. The slow, tedious work is very thorough, part of a summer course in Excavation Techniques. Artifacts are placed in a bag for future analysis, each bag representing a certain spot on the hill.

The volunteer workers, the Texas Archaeological Society help with the project, some of them digging in scattered spots where pottery and glassware litter the ground.

"The object of the dig is to find out more about the settlers and oilmen who worked and lived here," said Calvin Smith, director of Spindletop Museum, Lamar University. "We've already found out several new things about the people who lived here—they brought their finest glassware when they moved here, despite the boom and bust atmosphere. We've found pieces of slate, a rare product in those days."

Large patches of the ground to be excavated are ringed yellow and the smell of sulphur lingers in the air like the aftermath of a firecracker celebration. The sulphur came up with the oil and was left behind, mixed with the sand.

The original well spurred a million gallons of oil a day into the sky in 1901. Tremendous pressures from oil, sulphur and salt created the hill, pushing it a few feet above the surrounding country near Beaumont.

Patillo Higgins, a Beaumont resident in 1901, was determined to find oil on the hill despite the findings of the U.S. Geological Survey. For eight previous years he had borrowed money, talked with companies and watched three shallow drilling attempts fail. Higgins kept claiming there was oil and people began to laugh, but he drilled deeper than anyone had ever done in the past and in cold weather, in January morning, barely a week into the 20th century, he struck black gold and pushed America into the Age of Oil.

Mr. Hodges, who is a graduate of Oklahoma Baptist University will be singing many of his own compositions. He has involved himself in the ministry of music for many years through evangelism.

George and Teresa Atwell of Orlando, Florida will round up the team as organist and pianist.

The team has combined 18 years of experience in more than 1,000 evangelistic crusades in 23 nations of the world. The public is invited to attend all crusade services where all seats are free as well as other meetings held in conjunction with the crusade.

TEXAS LIGHTING TREND—Trends reveal ceiling lights, floor lamps, wall sconces and strip lights, says Sue Young, a housing and home furnishings specialist.

Because these lighting types lend character to a room, they are collectively termed "atmospheric lighting," she explains.

Mrs. Young is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

However, each type has a unique quality of its own, she says.

FLOODS—Floodlights shine wash walls over a wide area and illuminate clearly defined edges. Art galleries, Zavis, this effect is uniformly bright walls of paintings.

SPOTS—Spotlights have a narrower beam than floods, available in more than 300
