## Nutrition Program Aids Elderly Here

Approximately 50 elderly residents of Tyler County were in for a real treat Thursday, Aug. 30, when the Tyler County Nutrition Program officially got underway.

Located 717 W. Bluff in the former location of Cartwright's Grocery, the purpose of the new nutrition program is simple. The organization is attempting to provide one warm, nutritious meal a day for the elderly residents of this area who need it. But there is also another spinoff benefit from the program. The building opens at 7 a.m. and remains open until 4 p.m., giving senior citizens a place to gather and from all indications this aspect of the program is just as important as the hot meal.

They play dominoes and cards, sing, visit with friends or participate in arts and crafts or handicraft projects. Social activities for the senior citizens are being planned and directed by Liz Rackley, county home economist.

Participants are expected to contribute something toward the cost of the meal.

The Rev. Jesse Adams, former chairman of the Pineywood Nutrition Program of which this service is a part, explained that "contributions from the participants is important if the program is to continue." He stated that the Pineywood Nutrition Program is currently operating centers such as this one in Cold Springs, Livingston, Corrigan and here.

The Pineywood Nutrition Program is comprised of three members from each county represented. Also serving on the program from Tyler County are E.C. Hardin of Colmesneil and Hilda Coats of Woodville. The Pineywood organization is a non-profit corporation.

Mrs. Bertie Dees is the site manager for the Woodville project. She is assisted by Nadine Barlow, Oma Patrick and Kathy Gilbert.

"We want everyone to participate who possibly can," Rev. Adams said. He explained that the program will also take meals out to shut-ins in the community and all one has to do to determine if he qualifies is to call the center 283-7402.

Persons wishing to eat at the center are encouraged to call the day before and make reservations so that the center's staff can make prepara-

## Woodville I.S.D. Receives Evaluation On Students

The Woodville Independent School District recently received the results of the California Achievement Test which was administered to students in the school district last year.

The test results were received by the school district about August 1, according to Mrs. Mary Nell Rainey, elementary supervisor who is involved primarily with reading and math in the Woodville Independent School District.

Mrs. Rainey explained that generally the students of the Woodville Independent School District did well and performed close to the national norm on the test. In some instances Woodville students were above norm and in other areas they were slightly below.

Mrs. Rainey stated that she was currently in the process of evaluating the test finds. A detailed, grade by grade evaluation will be presented at the next school board meeting which is scheduled for Tuesday, Sept. 8.

Mrs. Rainey said that teachers in the district spent their first day of in-service training, Aug. 29, going over the findings of the test. Teachers will have access to the findings on each individual student during the coming year and will be able to use the test result as a teaching tool to help them, she said.

The California Achievement Test measures basic skills of reading, language, math and reference skills. All pupils in grades kindergarten through grade 11 were tested. Mrs. Rainey said that all students, from special education students to gifted students, were included in the test in the grades outlined above.

The test shows how students perform on a percentile basis according to the national norms. The percentile area of a child's development is more important than the grade level evaluation, Mrs. Rainey explained.

The test also determines the student's strengths and weaknesses per subject area so that the school can best determine the student's needs in the classroom.

Once school gets underway and the teachers have an opportunity to study the test results, teachers will invite parents in to evaluate their child's needs and strengths. Mrs. Rainey said that all students, from special education students to gifted students, were included in the test in the grades outlined above.

## Tyler County Fair Plans Revealed

The 1979 Tyler County Fair promises to be one of the best ever, according to Ben Worthy, chairman of the Tyler County Fair Board. Additional rides for the kids, more exhibits and for the first time a livestock auction will be some of the highlights of this year's event which is scheduled for Sept. 14 and 15.

The fair will officially get underway at 9 a.m. Friday, Sept. 14, with a short opening ceremony by members of the fair board and the Tyler County Commissioners Court. Admission to the fair will be \$1.50 for adults and 75 cents for children.

Entries in the poster contest will be judged Friday morning. The posters will be on display throughout the fair.

The open dairy show is scheduled to begin at 10 a.m. Friday. Concession booths, exhibits and rides will all open at 9 a.m. each day.

The special event for Friday will be square dancing, scheduled for 5 p.m.

Livestock judging will begin at 9 a.m. Saturday, beginning with breeding beef and followed by steers, barrows, poultry and goats.

A tug-o-war event between the agriculture departments of county high schools will be staged throughout the day Saturday.

Other special events scheduled Saturday include a jazz ensemble performance at noon, the dress revue at 2 p.m., and fiddlin' at 4 p.m. An auction will be held at 5:30 Saturday in which the first, second and third place cakes will be sold to the highest bidder. Other cakes will be on sale Friday, following the judging in the cooking events.

A tobacco spitting contest is slated for sometime during the day Saturday and there is talk of a "cow chip" throwing event this year.

Following the judging Saturday, a livestock auction will be held. Grand champion and reserve champion winners in the steer, hog and poultry divisions will be offered for sale.

Wimpy's Fun Show will provide the midway entertainment this year. The company will provide the same rides as last year, plus two additional rides for older children.

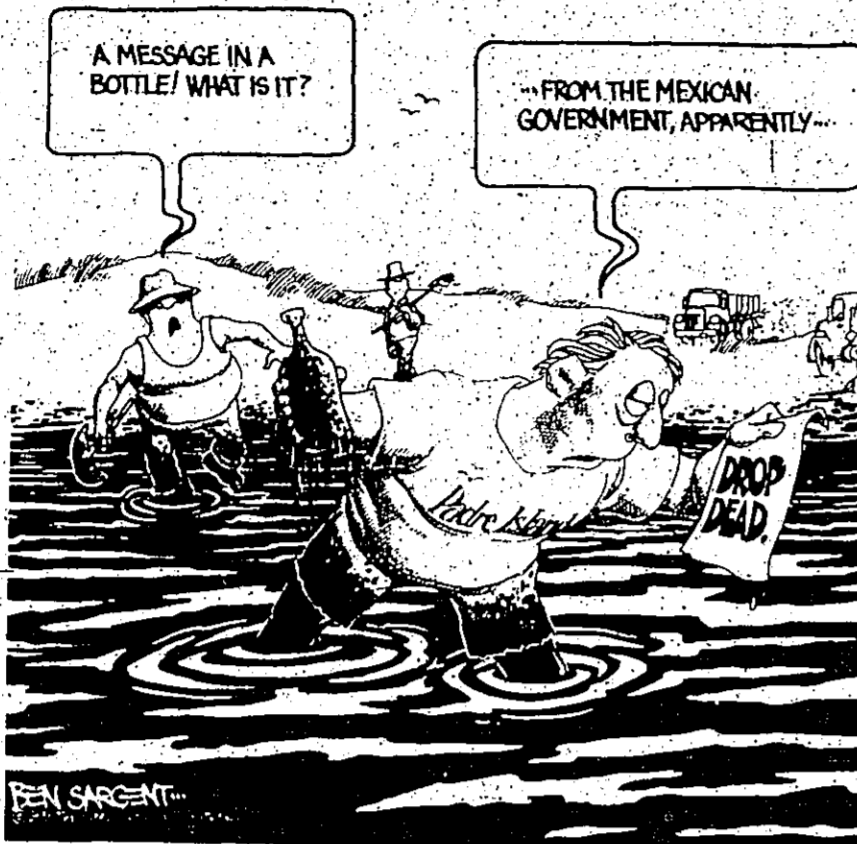

### The Consumer Alert

Texas consumers enjoy a double measure of protection against unfair debt collection practices. Says attorneys in our Consumer Protection and Antitrust Division in Austin, Houston, Dallas, San Antonio, Lubbock, El Paso, or McAllen.

The reason Texans are protected by both the Texas Debt Collection Practices Act and the federal Fair Debt Collection Practices Act, which became effective in 1978. While both Acts cover debts for personal, family or household purposes, there is one major difference in the scope of the two Acts. The Texas Act covers any person engaging directly or indirectly in debt collection where as the federal Act applies only to debt collection agencies hired to recover a debt owed to another company-creditors collecting their own debts are exempted.

Neither the state nor the federal statutes do anything to change the consumer's obligation to pay the debt but together they ban these unfair means of collecting payments.

Debt Collection is prohibited from making threats of violence, using abusive language, making harassing phone calls, impersonating government officials or attorneys, misrepresenting a consumer's legal rights, obtaining information under false pretenses, collecting more than is legally due, or missing post-dated checks.

Under the federal Act, debt collectors cannot contact a debtor's place of employment if debt collector knows or has reason to know that the debtor's employer prohibits the consumer from receiving such communications.

Debt collectors cannot represent to a third party that the consumer owes the debt if the consumer has notified the debt collector in writing that the debt is disputed.

Under the federal act, phone calls to debtors must be made during "reasonable hours" which are defined as 8 a.m. to 9 p.m.

When contacting consumers, debt collectors must identify themselves and disclose that they are collecting a debt.

By virtue of the federal statute, a debt collector cannot continue to contact a debtor directly when notified that the debtor has obtained an attorney.

Debt collectors cannot misrepresent the character, extent, or amount of a debt or threaten to take any action prohibited by law.

If you have a complaint about debt collection practices contact the Attorney General's Consumer Protection

### Soybean Rate Unchanged Fred Couple Arrested In Narcotics Raid

The loan and purchase rate for Tyler County's 1979-crop soybeans remains unchanged from the 1978 rate, Kathy O. Harrison, county executive director of the Tyler County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) office said. She said the premium and discount schedule is also unchanged from that used in the 1978-crop program.

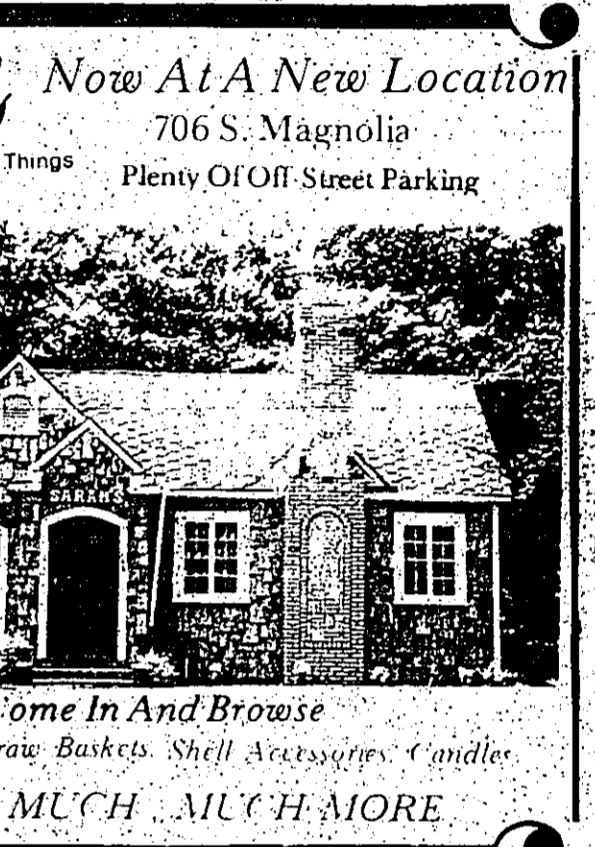

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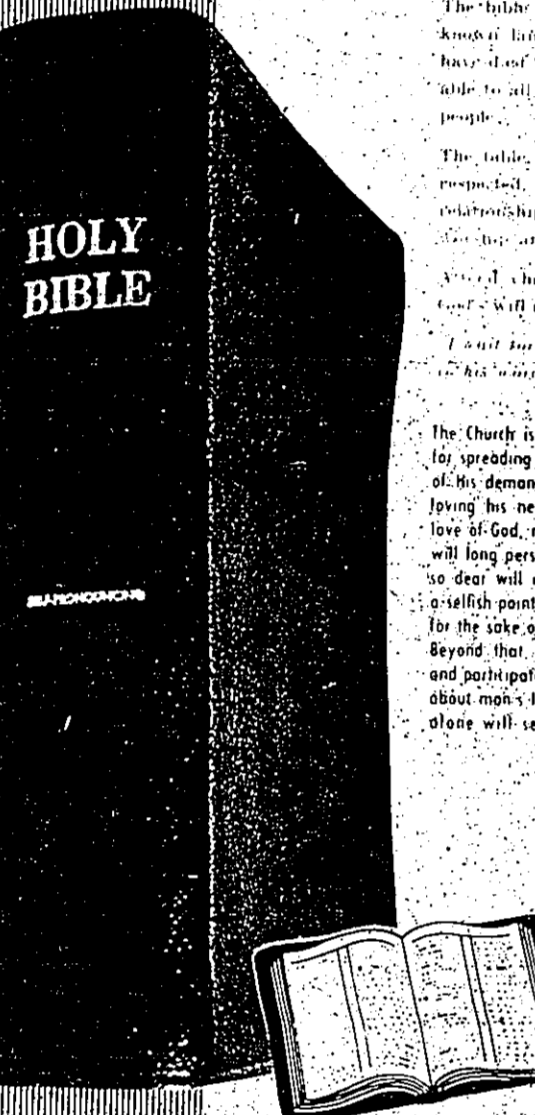

# Rural Churches Remain Stronghold

COLLEGE STATIONS to many rural communities and their churches. Discussions on the nature and extent of these changes will highlight the 34 annual Town and Country Conference at Rudder Center, Texas A&M University, Oct. 4-5. 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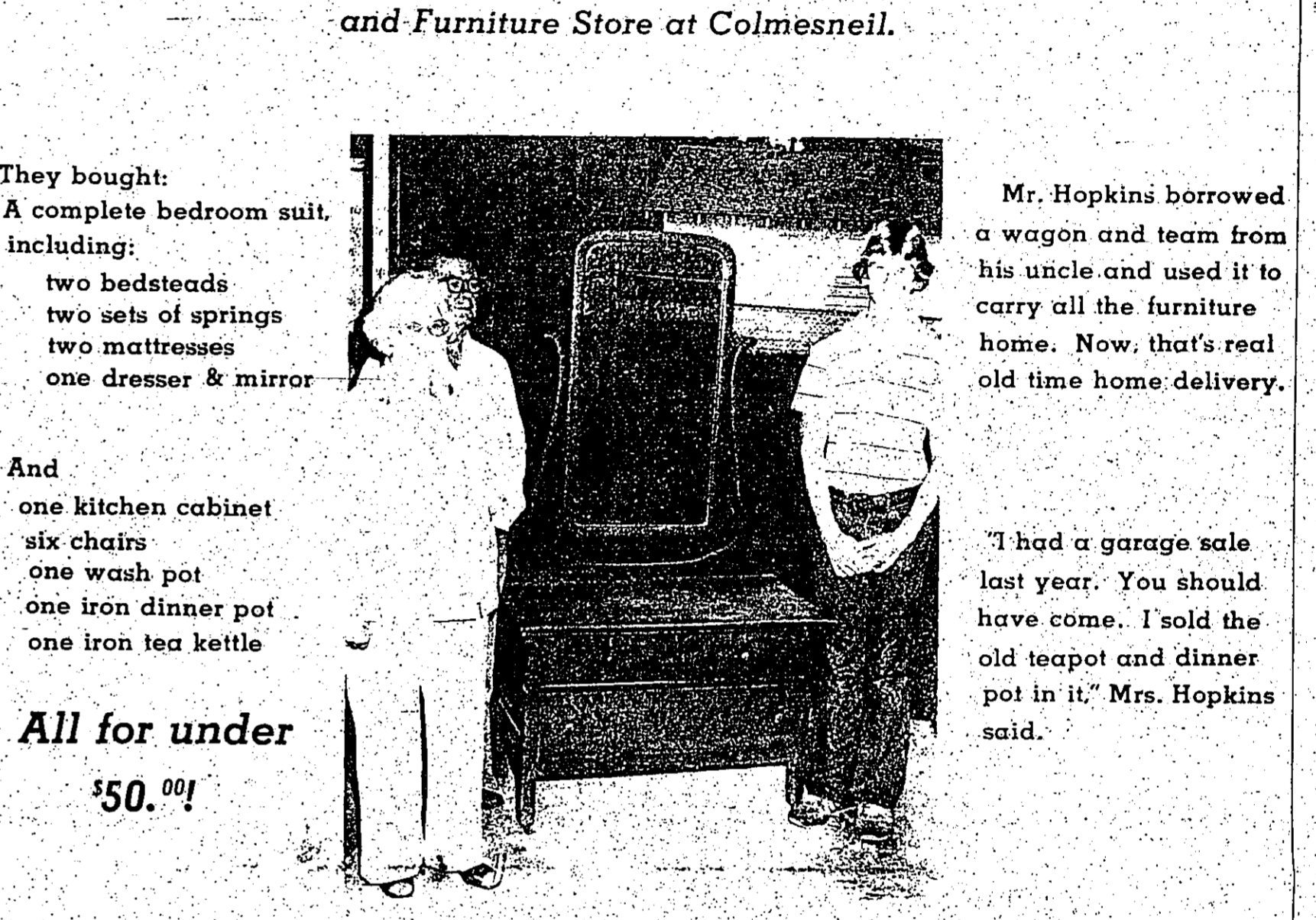

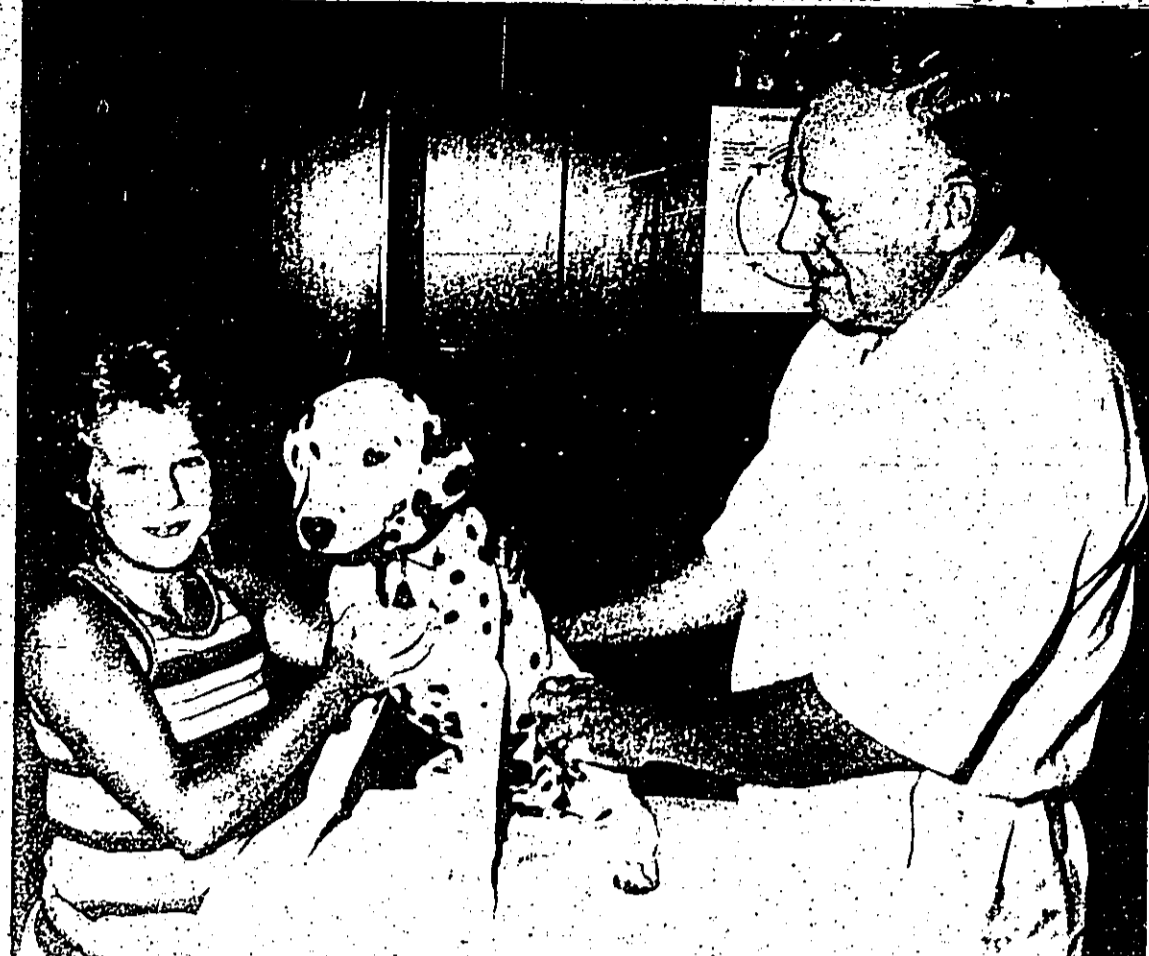

Continued dry conditions in East Texas have both advantages and disadvantages for the area, said an Extension economist. Hay harvesting is continuing at a rapid pace and the time to prepare for winter pastures is upon us. However, moisture would help pastures in many areas to continue growth and production of quality forage.

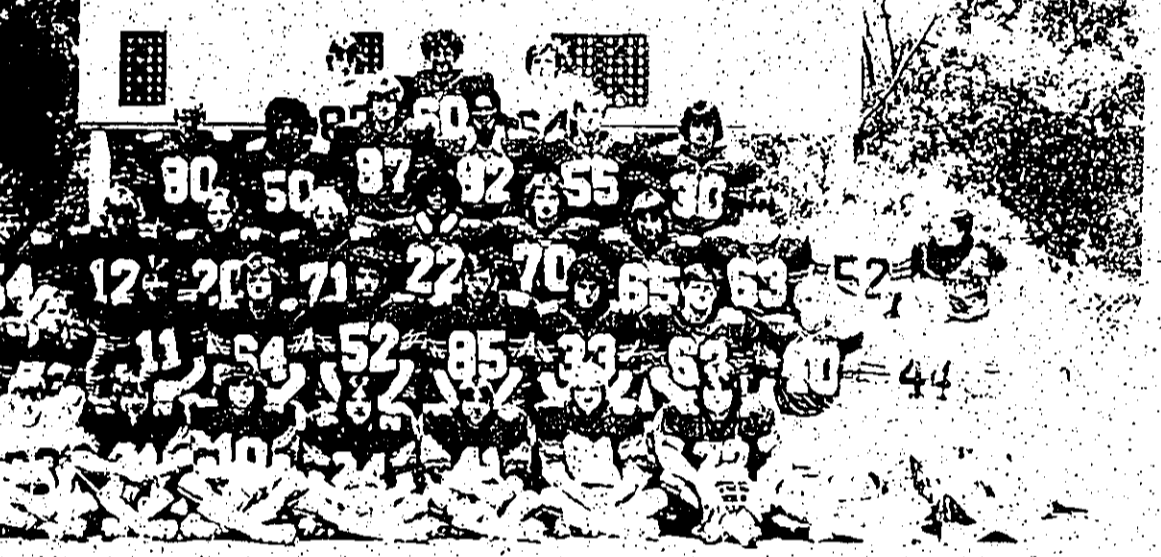
Dr. James Long, Extension area economist management for Extension District 5, estimates that winter pasture will cost approximately \$114.00 per acre this year. With this investment, producers would consider all aspects of grazing stocker calves this winter. Expected selling prices in spring are all in the \$1.00 to \$1.25 range. County Extension agents in East Texas have information available on costs and returns for those producers anticipating winter pasture.

Many beef cattle producers have learned through Extension result demonstrations that growth stimulant implants are very effective in stocker calf operations. Dr. Randall Grooms, Extension area livestock specialist, urges producers to place the implants correctly.

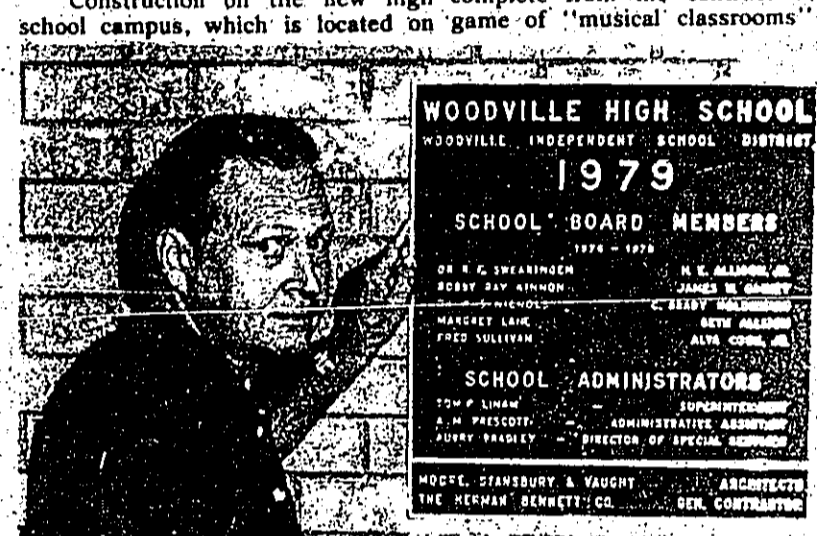

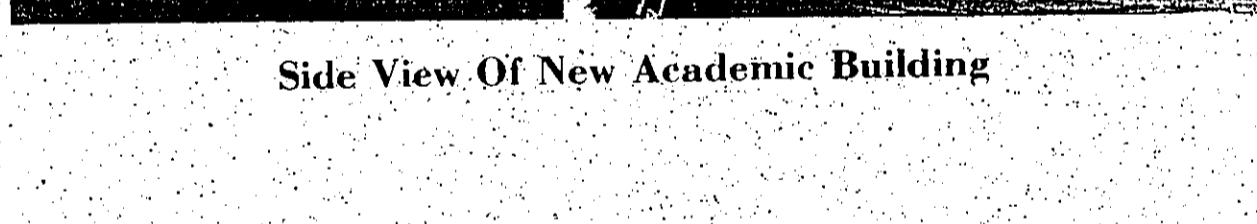
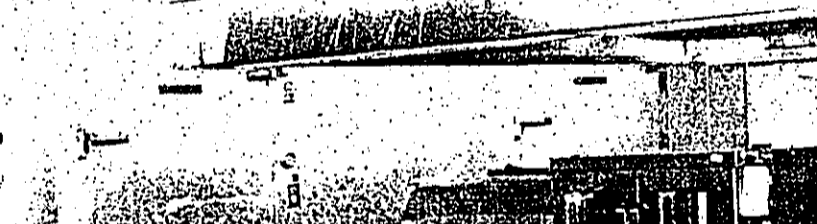

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## Gasoline Storage Dangerous

Storing gasoline may seem like the best solution to inconvenient service station hours, but Texas Safety Association warns there is no safe way to store gasoline in the car or in the house.

As gasoline vapors expand they fill the available space in which they are confined. This expansion can split the seams of an unvented can or plastic container and cause vapor leakage. The car ignites shorts in the tail light, a lit cigarette or a spark caused from sliding across the car seat can trigger an explosion.

In a test, experts placed a can of gasoline in the trunk of a running car and within 20 minutes, the car exploded. One gallon of gasoline has the explosive force of 14 sticks of dynamite.

When storing gasoline in the house, the location and the amount of gas in the can is important and should be considered. If the can is full there is no room for expansion causing raw gas or fumes to escape, and possibly ignite. Gasoline should never be stored near a hot water heater, because the heater can easily ignite the fuel. Also, sparks from a light switch or an electrical appliance can dissolve plastic jugs.

While gasoline may be harder to find these days, it is still available. There is not sufficient enough gas shortage for drivers to take along a can of gas. Before loading a gas can on a vehicle, Texas Safety Association urges Texas drivers to consider all of the potential dangers and weigh them against the benefits of a few more gallons of gas.

### 'Hunger' Meeting Slated At A & M

COLLEGE STATION — Texas A&M University's intensified efforts to help alleviate hunger and malnutrition problems both in Texas and abroad will take a giant step forward when the University and the Texas Conference of Churches Food and Hunger in Texas meet Jan. 22-24.

Dr. Perry L. Adkisson, vice president for agriculture and renewable resources at Texas A&M, in making the announcement, said the three-day program will be held in the Rudder Conference Center.

Adkisson said objectives of the Food and Hunger Consultation will be to "develop a model for other states in cooperative effort between churches, urban groups, producers and the land-grant university system."

Program speakers will explore three basic areas of concern, including the demography of hunger in Texas, how the hunger problem can be resolved, and who can assist in finding solutions to the hunger in the state.

Although many church groups and agencies are looking into the hunger issue and trying to define and create who will do the problem, more precise information is needed on the people who are hungry and where they are located, Adkisson added.

The Consultation in Food and Hunger at A&M will attempt to obtain this kind of information by involving church representatives, business boards and agencies, both government, private and church related.

### VA Reviewing Nuclear Claims

The Veterans Administration has initiated a full review of 229 claims it has denied from veterans who sought compensation for disabilities, including cancer, which they relate to their participation in atmospheric testing of nuclear weapons.

Thousands of veterans were exposed to varying levels of radiation from nuclear tests conducted between 1945 and 1963.

VA General Counsel Guy H. McMichael, III, told the Senate Veterans Affairs Committee the agency will ask each of the military services involved in the atomic tests to compute, within the next 30 days, estimates of the highest likely radiation exposure for each of the 229 veterans.

He told the committee that there are serious difficulties inherent in the adjudication of claims involving long time intervals between radiation exposure and the appearance of cancer.

"The fact is," he said, "that radiation-induced cancers have no unique pathological characteristics to distinguish them from cancers due to 'natural' causes. This makes it impossible to determine with certainty whether such a disease would have occurred regardless of radiation exposure."

McMichael said a government task force recently reported "a natural" incidence of fatal cancer of 1,600 in a population of 10,000.

One additional death could be expected for each additional "rem" of exposure to which the group was subjected.

He told the committee that "the realm of probabilities with which we are dealing is actually quite small when it is realized, that participants received less than one rem of external radiation and about 97 percent less than three rems."

But, he said, in view of the increasing number of radiation exposure claims filed with VA in the past year, the agency will issue formal guidelines to "codify existing practices and improve the handling of such claims."

Include VA acceptance of a veteran's statement that he was present at an atomic test unless military construction conclusively prove such was not the case.

"As is also currently difficult, individual dosimetry reading for a claimant is not available, but reconstruction of data indicates his unit was exposed to a range of exposure levels. It will be necessary to conclusively prove such was not the case."

Instructions will be issued which describe acceptable medical principles concerning causal relationships between exposure to ionizing radiation and the development of various diseases, with careful attention to the many uncertainties remaining in this area.

"Emphasis will again be placed on the agency policy to resolve in a claimant's favor any reasonable doubt as to service origin of disease," McMichael said.

### Farmers Need Adequate Records

COLLEGE STATION — An accurate record of farm transactions can play a big part in income tax management strategies, notes Dr. Ashley Lovell, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

For instance, the 1978 Revenue Act increased by 10 percent the net capital gain a noncorporate taxpayer may deduct from his gross income. The previous 50 percent deduction of net long-term capital gain over net short-term capital loss no longer applies, notes Lovell.

So producers should review holding periods for various assets, such as breeding cattle, speculative commodity future and farm machinery with respect to capital gains or losses. The economist suggests that producers review purchase dates of assets that are expected to be sold to determine if holding period requirements are satisfied.

Acquisition dates are important when assets are to be sold and investment credit claimed. Lovell cites an example: Suppose a previously purchased asset (on which investment credit was claimed) is sold before the three-year minimum holding period is achieved. In such a case, the investment credit is lost.

He encourages producers to consult an accountant, or attorney, regarding business details.

COLLEGE STATION--Look for corduroy fabrics at the top of the list for fall fashions, says Nancy Brown, a clothing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas A&M University System.

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**Just Enough Love Best For Kids**

COLLEGE STATION--"Just enough" love is best for kids - rather than too little or too much, says Dorothy Taylor, a family life education specialist.

"Children who receive too much love suffer 'smother love' and may be allowed to 'mature,' she explains.

Ms. Taylor is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"Children can be damaged by excessive or insufficient amounts of such essentials as affection, attention, stimulation and praise," she says. "Different children require different amounts and expressions of love, so it's important for parents to know their children and their special needs, she says. Some children feel better about a good grade, verbal praise or special privileges. Praise and recognition are closely associated with feelings of love.

Too little recognition may lead to feelings of inadequacy. When a child doesn't feel appreciated, he may become discouraged and develop a sense of futility or hopelessness.

On the other hand, an "over-abundance" of praise may create self-centeredness. Also, excessive praise can lose its meaning and lead to a feeling of dishonesty or mistrust.

Finally, the most important fact to remember about love, affection, attention, stimulation and praise is to give it immediately to children. When the act or deed has long been forgotten, love and attention have no impact or real meaning, the specialist reminds.

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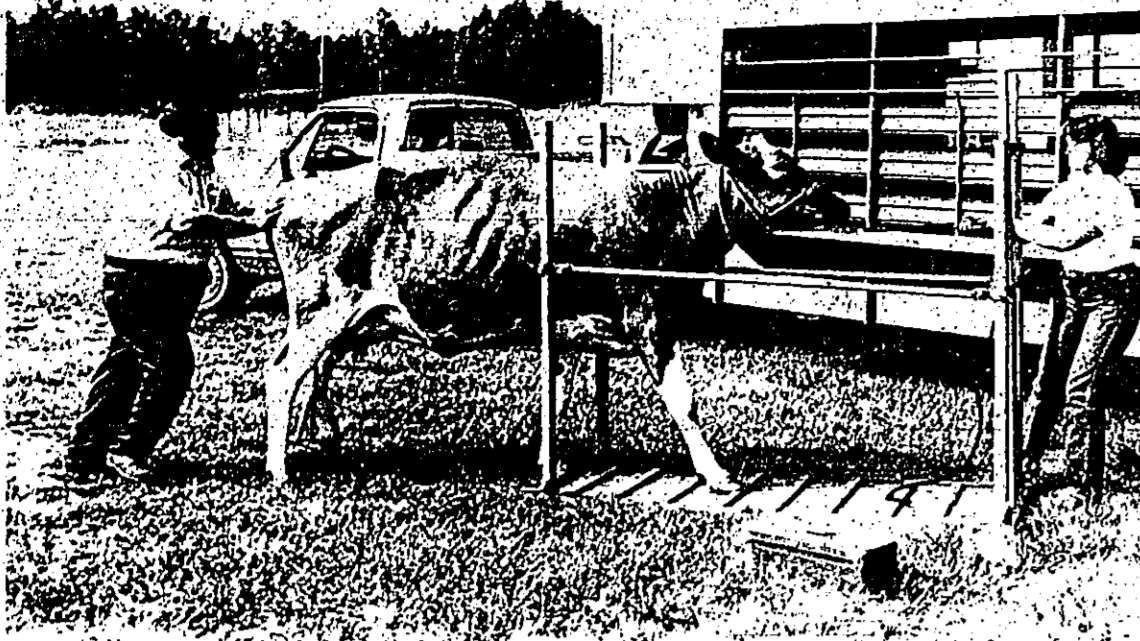

## TOPICS TECHNIQUES

Be "energy smart" with utility records, especially in buying or selling a home. Ask if you can see the utility bills. They give a quick picture of a home's energy usage, and they tell you about local utility rates. If you're selling your home, consider making a summary sheet about your utility costs and amounts used and energy amounts used and cost. Also, ask about the energy-use habits of the family members and the appliances in the home, especially those that will stay with the house, such as a new appliance, a new energy-saving feature or a new energy-use habit. Also, ask about the energy-saving features of the house, such as insulation, caulking, window types, heating and cooling features and any others that may exist. Also, notice window exposures—west-facing windows need special protection from afternoon sun in the summer. New home buyers may have more difficulty estimating utility costs. Ask your real estate agent or builder for information, or ask others already living in the neighborhood. Call the utility companies to obtain specific rate information. Once in a home, keep accurate records of utility costs and energy amounts used. Read electric and gas meters once a month. Read them even more often if you want to check the effectiveness of any "energy changes" you make, such as a new appliance, a new energy-saving feature or a new energy-use habit. Let down the information on your calendar or some other handy place. Then you're ready to compare and make changes that will save energy and money as needed. Also, this system is helpful in solving any billing problems that may arise. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin.

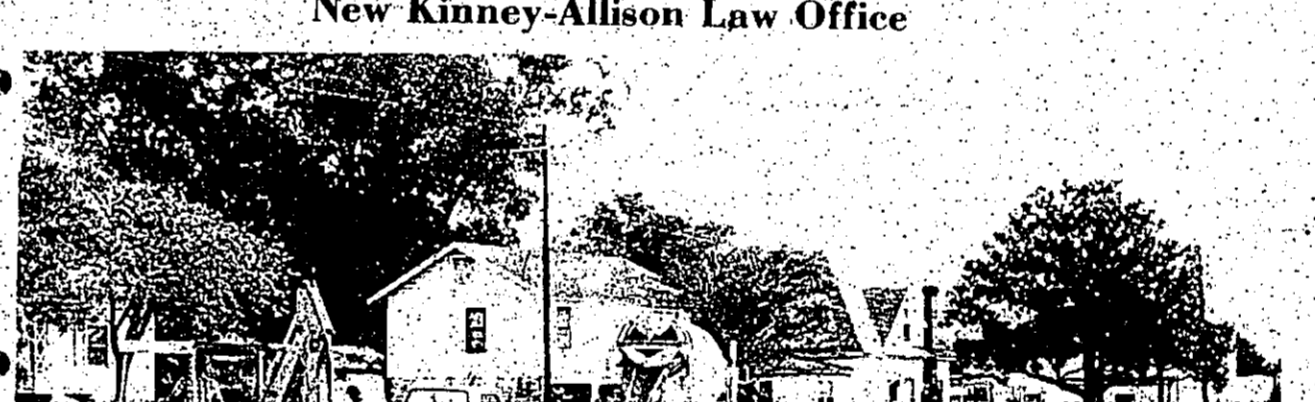

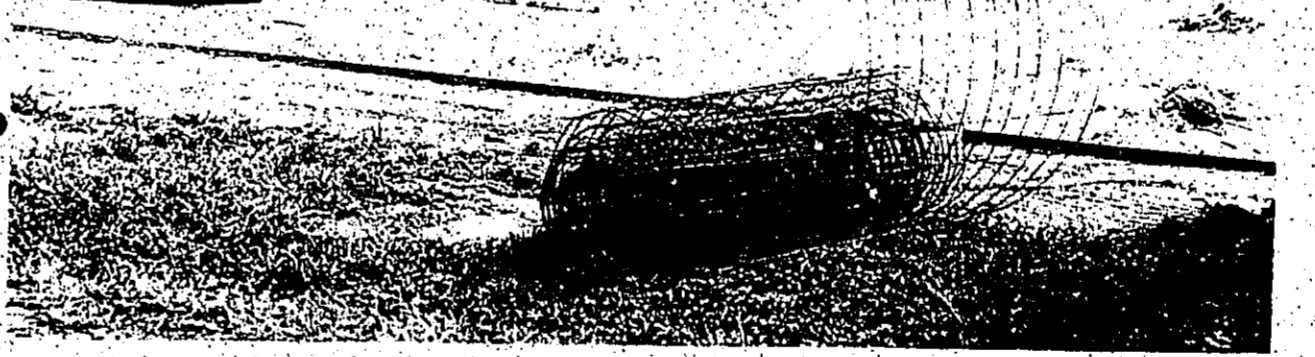

Steel structures climbing to the sky and cement slabs that cover more and more of Woodville each day seem to indicate to some that growth of this small community is on a never-ending increase. With the advent of a new shopping center to be located south of Woodville just inside the city limits and featuring Wal-Mart Stores, Inc. and an all new food store facility and drug store facility the retail activity is bound to increase the next few months. Southeast Texas Savings and Loan is several months away from opening its new modern facility located on the corner of West Bluff and Reid Street. The new law office has been under construction for approximately seven weeks. It is located at the corner of Reid and Dogwood. The 3,000 square foot building contains seven offices, a reception area and a law library.

The building is contemporary brick and features a suspended ceiling, vinyl wall covering, a fireplace, carpet and ceramic tile floor covering in some areas.

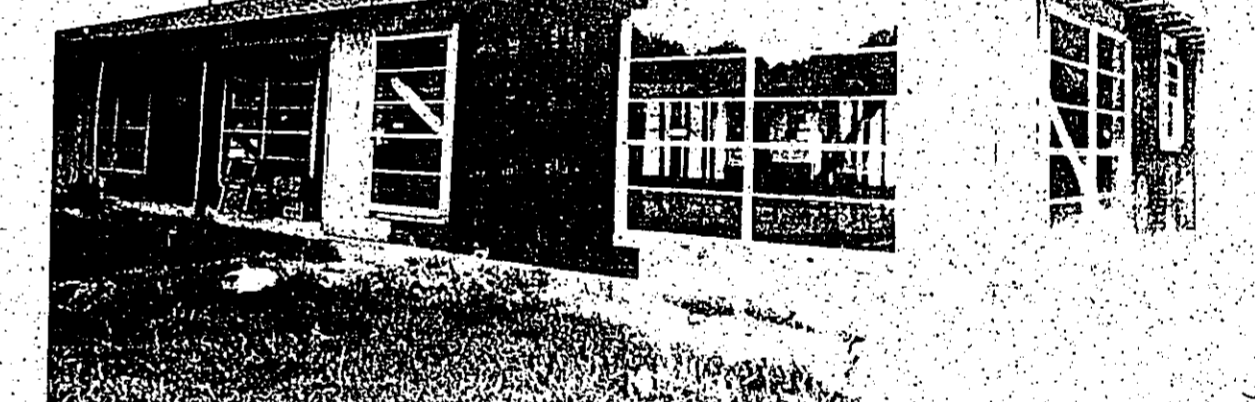
Woodville Abstract & Title Co. will also be located in the new building. The Kinney & Allison law firm is currently located at 409 S. Magnolia.

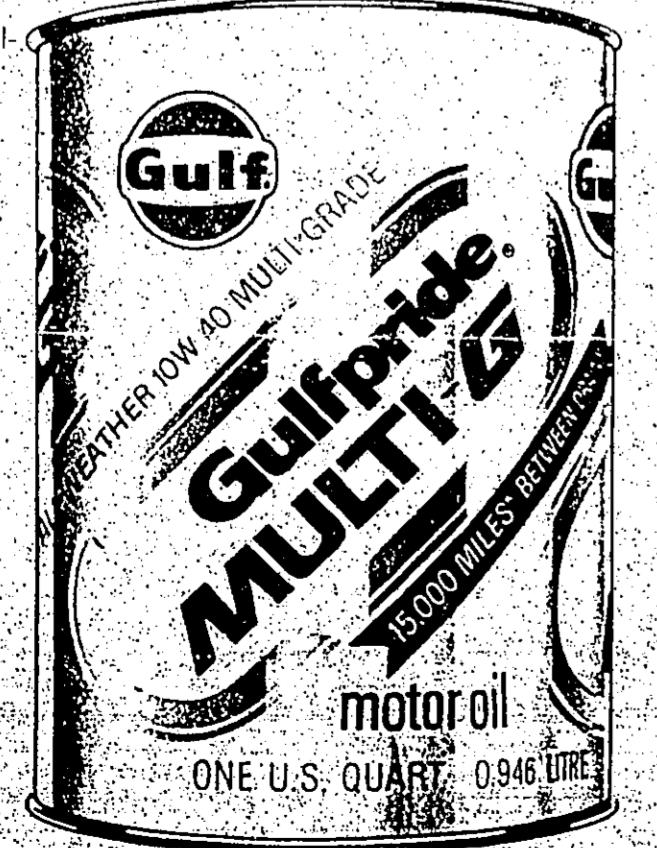

### Agri Research Objectives Set

SAGINAW, MICH. — Even though U.S. crop production is projected to record levels this year, Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland has said the "challenge of the 1980's is going to be to get back to basics and re-establish agricultural research knowledge."

In a recent meeting with agricultural leaders here, Bergland said that budgetary restraints demand that research be undertaken on only the highest priority needs.

Those needs, he said, include expanding human nutrition research, learning more about photosynthesis, relieving plant and animal stress to weather extremes, increasing plant and animal productivity, developing alternate energy resources and new conservation techniques, while developing ways to reduce our consumption of fuels.

"I'm confident that there are ways to economize and that our researchers will develop them. It is absolutely necessary if we are to meet President Carter's goal of reducing our use of imported oil by 2.5 million barrels a day by 1990," Bergland said.

"We are going to give research a sharper focus and take on the rough questions. Only by doing this can we undertake an effective research program to meet our goals for the 1980's," he said.

### Ironworker Training Gets Federal Funds

WASHINGTON — The contract is about \$900,000 economically funded under Title III of the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) which is administered by the Department of Labor's Employment and Training Administration (ETA).

The National Ironworkers and Employers Training Program is a non-profit corporation representing both the Ironworkers Union and Employers. The contract renewal with the National Ironworkers and Employers Training Program will add approximately 1,400 new trainees to the program in the next year.

ETA defines as "economically disadvantaged" one who is a sheltered worker, confined to an institution; receiving first community care; substantially handicapped; or is a member of a family receiving cash benefits or welfare payments or an annual income (for four persons) of less than \$7,200 and a total of \$300,000, depending on the location and program.

The contract provides for the development of new projects and the allocation of funds to sheltered workers.

### Insurance Dividends Can Be Misleading

COLLEGE STATION — Your life insurance dividends aren't really dividends; they're extra money you needlessly paid to the company, and you're getting some of it back, says a family resource management specialist.

"These dividends are considered taxable income, but even the tax collector won't tax your life insurance dividends," because he recognizes them as only a refund of your money, Linda McCormack explains.

Mrs. McCormack is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

So-called "dividends" such as these are also "idle" money, Mrs. McCormack says.

You could have taken that same money and invested it, getting a far better return on it, or you could have put it in a savings account where it would earn interest.

Nor are life insurance "dividends" guaranteed.

Just because the company overcharges you, they are not required to repay the money although they usually do.

However, you may not receive the full overcharge back as a dividend, and, of course, the "dividends" are not guaranteed.

Some insurance agents tell you that these so-called "dividends" are a "share" in the company's profits, which they are not, Mrs. McCormack says.

"That is a deceptive sales practice," she adds.

So-called "dividends" are given by mutual insurance companies participating in insurance contracts not by non-participating companies.

Mutual companies don't have stockholders who have invested money in them.

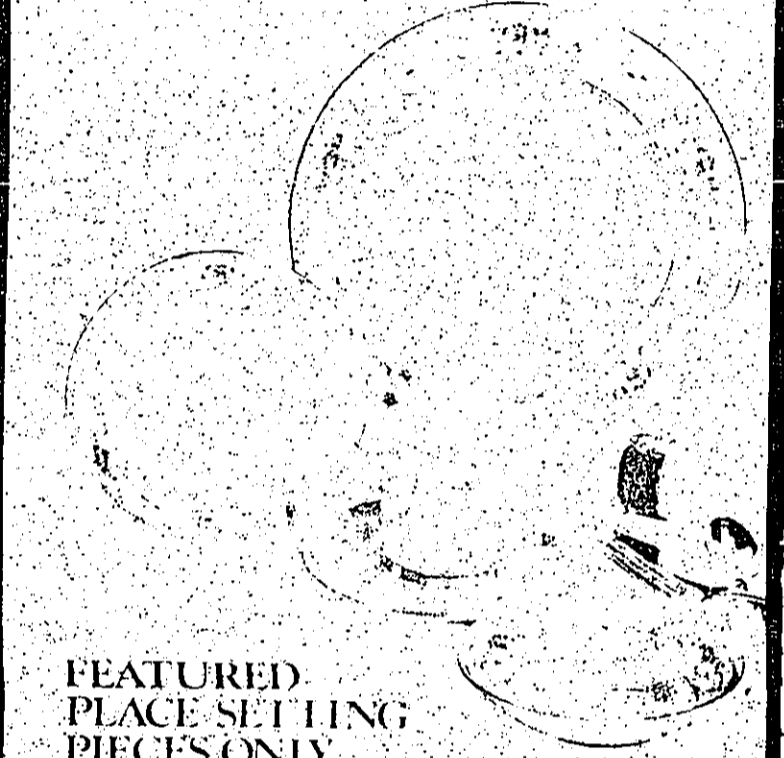
So, the actual cost of providing insurance is shared by the policyholders.

For that reason, this type of company produces and slaughters itself for the insurance premium than you'd pay for a similar policy from a non-participating company, in fact, the overcharge may be as much as 30 per cent.

Once the mutual company's cost becomes known, if the premium charged for coverage proves to be more than actually needed, the left-over or extra money is invested.

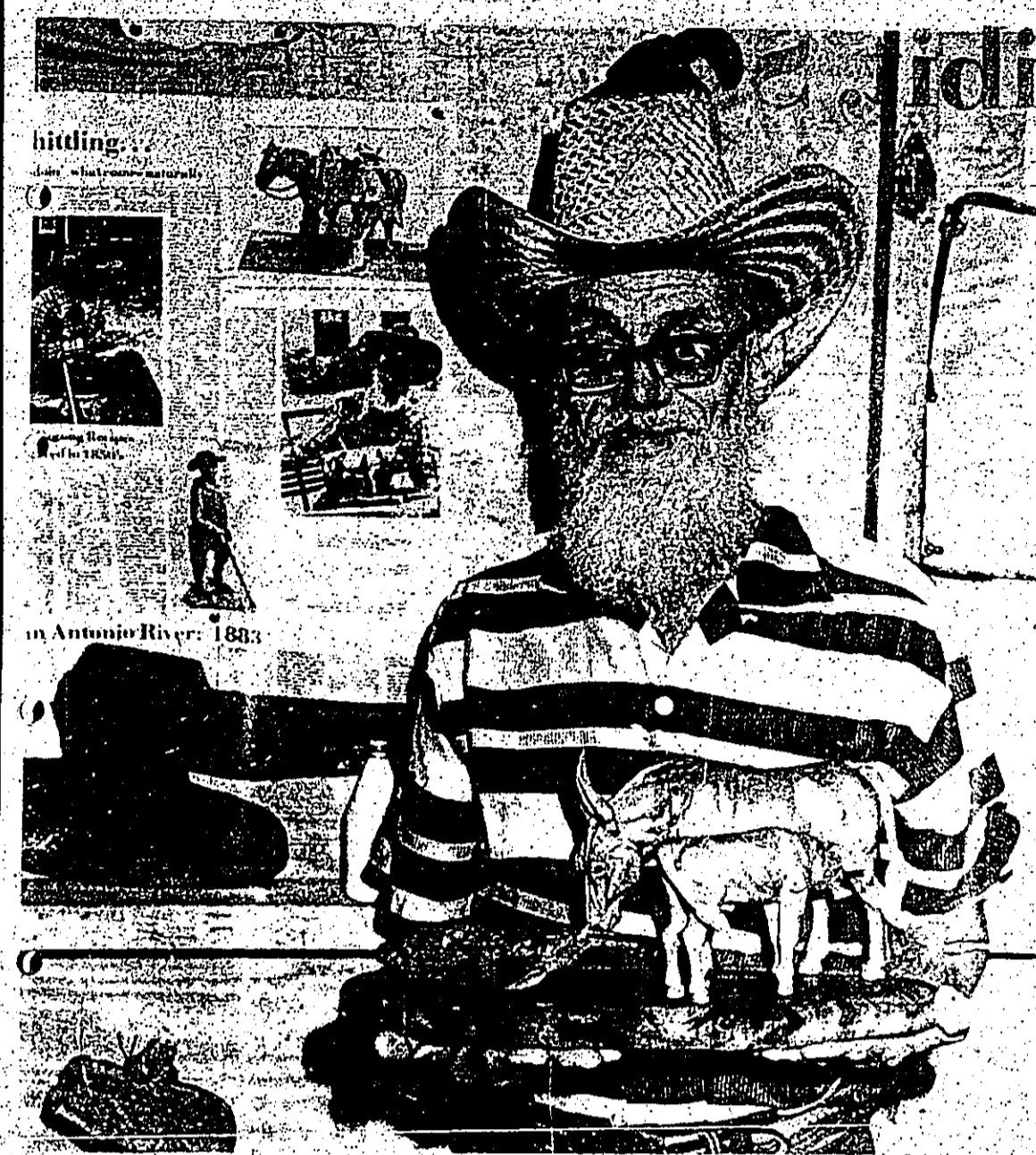

## Solar Grain Drying Loans Now Available

To help farmers conserve energy, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) will finance solar grain drying systems. Funds for the energy-saving systems are available under the farm facility loan program, according to Kathy Harrison, director of the Tyler County ASCS.

Although solar energy is a relatively new technology as applied to agriculture, farmers are being encouraged to develop and use solar systems because of steadily rising fossil fuels costs.

Mrs. Harrison said ASCS will finance commercially constructed or homemade solar systems. Producers eligible for farm systems loans under current procedures will be eligible for financing solar grain drying systems.

Grain drying using conventional fuels—liquid petroleum gas and natural gas—is a high energy operation. Solar grain drying is an alternate technology that uses less energy but still preserves the crop for the feed use intended, the ASCS official said.

Loans for solar systems were first made available last fall in 10 States, and 27 counties as part of a pilot project. Shortages of various farm fuels and higher costs prompted the agency to open the program nationwide.

## Levingston Gets Contract With Argentina Firm

Levingston Shipbuilding Company of Orange announced today that it had signed a contract with Bidas S.A.P.A.C. of Buenos Aires, Argentina, for the construction of a Levingston Class 111-C jack-up drilling rig. Bidas, a major Argentina operator of drilling rigs, will employ the new jack-up in exploring for oil off shore Tierra del Fuego, in Argentina's extreme southeast.

The rig, which has been designated Levingston's hull number 356, will be built in Levingston's Orange shipyard with some support and final leg assembly being handled by Levingston's Gulfport Shipbuilding Division in Port Arthur. The new rig, which is valued at \$22 million, is scheduled for delivery in early summer 1980.

Levingston's Class 111-C jack-up is designed for operation in water depths of up to 300 feet and to withstand winds of up to 125 mph and wave heights of up to 50 feet. The 111-C model differs from the basic 111 design in that drilling operations are cantilevered off the stern rather than conducted through a slot in the stern; this arrangement provides the operator with greater workover capability.

It has a modified triangular platform measuring 194 feet by 178 feet by 23 feet depth, fitted with a 60 ft. x 60 ft. heliport deck. There are three 400-foot long legs of square truss design fitted with 48 ft. diameter support footings. The jacking system is a rack-and-pinion arrangement with a nominal capacity of 7,200 tons and a jacking speed of one foot per minute either direction.

Accommodation is provided for 54 persons.

## Winter Season User Fee Program Begins

The Fort Worth District U.S. Corps of Engineers began its Winter Season User Fee Collection Program Tuesday, Sept. 4. It will continue to May, 1980.

District Engineer Col. Donald J. Palladino said today, "Collection of fees are required under Public Law 93-203 enacted in June, 1974.

Where economically feasible, fee collection is required under the law at all federal campgrounds providing drinking water, sanitary facilities, access roads, reasonable visitor protection, and other facilities.

Electrical hookups for campers are available in most of the winter fee parks. Electrical hookups in non-fee parks were to be turned off on Sept. 4, 1979, for the duration of the winter.

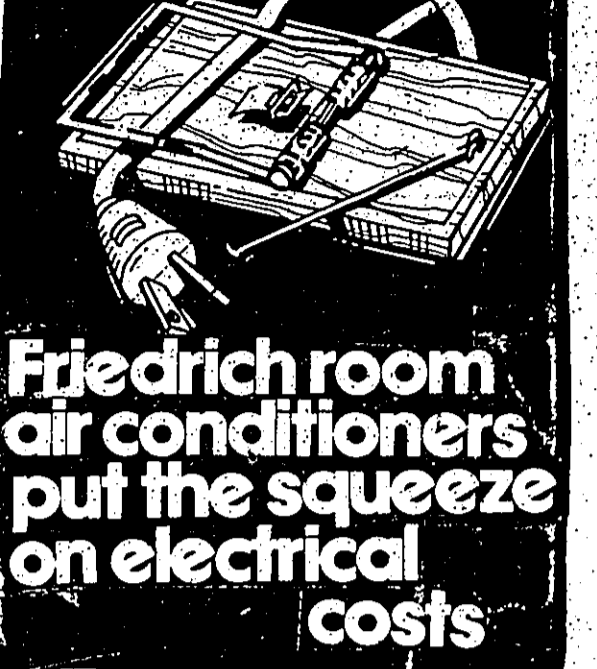
The fees range from \$1 to \$3 per day at designated campsites. Fees of fifty cents per day will be collected for use of electric outlets at the Corps of Engineers fee areas. The Corps of Engineers will provide several fee camping areas without electrical hookups at each Corps of Engineers lake.

Holders of the "Golden Age" passport issued to Senior Citizens will receive 50 percent reduction on camping electrical hookups fees at all Corps of Engineers operated fee recreation areas.
