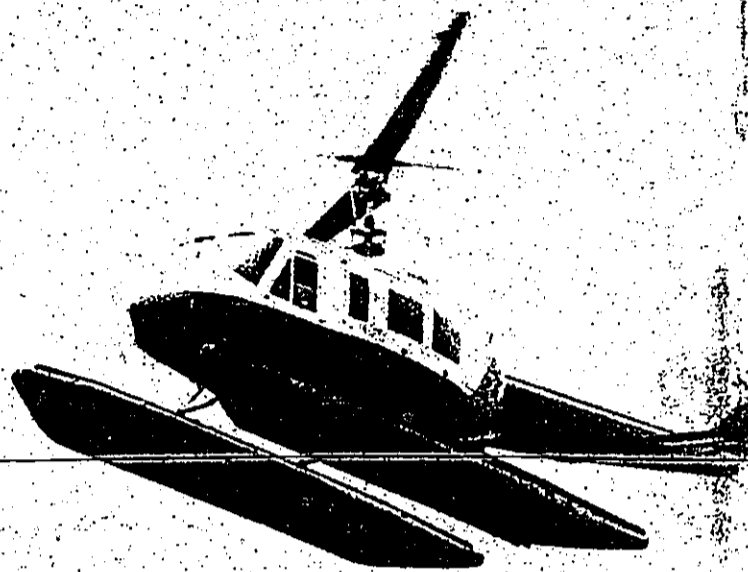

Woman Commits Suicide Sunday

Terri Lynn Causey, a 27-year-old Orange woman, fired a bevy of shots in front of the North Magnolia Grocery Sunday, sped away from the store and headed North on Hwy. 69 where she shot herself in the chest with a .38 caliber snub-nose revolver.

The shooting occurred just as Woodville police unit pulled up behind her vehicle which she had parked south of Doucette.

Woodville Gets \$500,000 Grant

A small cities-communities development block grant of \$500,000 to the City of Woodville, the second in a three year commitment totalling \$1.5 million, was awarded this past week, according to a joint announcement by the offices of Sen. Lloyd Bentsen and Cong. Charles Wilson.

Jim Alexander, program manager with the Dallas area office of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, explained that the funds will be divided as follows: housing rehabilitation, \$187,500; code enforcement, \$8,500; demolition of unsafe structures, \$3,500; water line and fire hydrants, \$28,859.55; street improvement, \$27,140.45; management and capacity building, \$10,000; administrative cost, \$35,000.

Some programs which were projected in the original grants projections were eliminated this year. Alexander said the cutbacks were the result of budget overruns the first year. He explained that bids for water lines, fire hydrants and street improvements totalled more than anticipated the first year, and as a result less essential projects were eliminated from the second year budget.

Public Budget Hearing Oct. 1

A public hearing on the budget for the City of Woodville will be held Monday, Oct. 1. The date was set in action Monday night during the regular monthly meeting of the City Council.

In a short meeting Monday night, the council awarded a bid for a tractor and brush hog to be Jo-Be Equipment Co. of Woodville. Jo-Be was low bid with a total price of \$7,180, including a trade-in on old equipment.

The council tabled action on his bids for the rehabbing of the baseball field. James Nichols and Wayne Stephen were appointed as appraisers for the city, with Jake Lyons serving as the review appraiser.

The council briefly discussed the city budget which must be adopted by Oct. 15.

County Firefighters Ask Commissioners For Funds

The Tyler County Firemen's Association met with a favorable response from the Tyler County Commissioner's Court Monday when the

organization went looking for funds for needed communication equipment for the area volunteer fire departments.

The firemen explained that they needed additional communications equipment in the county so that the various volunteer departments could better respond to fires.

The departments are wanting to purchase encoders, mobile units and pagers in their effort to upgrade the existing communications equipment.

Woodville Youngster Reported Missing

A pretty 14-year-old Woodville girl was reported missing at around 5:30 p.m. Monday, last seen witnesses say, walking away from North Magnolia Drive-In behind two other youth, one white male and one black male.

Pretty Terry Lynn Jones who is described by her mother as "one who would stay close to home" is also described by her as having "dark-brown hair, like most kids wear these days, split in the middle and feathered."

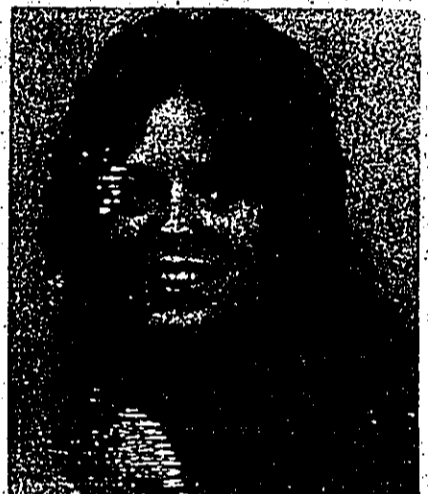
According to her mother, Mrs. J.W. Jones, Terry had walked up to the North Magnolia Drive-In located in front of their home in Platt's Trailer Park to buy a coke before going to Jasper to shop. She had just been given \$10 by her dad for the trip and she was excited about the trip, her mother said.

After about an hour the parents became worried when Terry didn't return.

Witnesses who live near the Magnolia store said they saw her walking away from the vicinity and she hasn't been seen since. The parents of the missing girl say the witnesses would be able to identify the two other youths.

Mrs. Jones said Terry was wearing a dark green shirt and a dark green top with long sleeves. She was also wearing a bracelet with "Jerry and Terry" engraved on it with a heart.

According to the Jones' friends and neighbors have been combing the nearby woods from Platt's Trailer (Continued on page 3-A)

Man Charged With Murder

A 52-year-old Woodville man has been charged with the murder of his 74-year-old step-father as a result of a reported family dispute which occurred late Thursday, Sept. 6, at 402 Beach Street.

Paul Young, 74, was pronounced dead on arrival at Saint Elizabeth's Hospital, Beaumont, after apparently being shot by his step-son Hardy Kyle Voith, 54, with a 12-gauge shotgun in a family altercation involving the use of a walking cane.

The incident occurred around 10:30 p.m. The felony first degree murder charge against Voith was set for arraignment proceedings Friday by Precinct Justice John Spanhans with bond set at \$15,000.

'Woody' Aids Officers In Drug Arrests

Three Tyler County deputy sheriffs assisted by "Woody," the new drug dog, arrested two persons Sunday near Warren for possession of a controlled substance.

Laurie A. Reid, 17, of Warren and Layne Patton, 25, of Wildwood, were arrested at 1:15 p.m. Sunday at the old Warren Gravel Pit, two miles south of Warren just off Highway 69, according to Deputy Gordon Toler.

Toler said that Patton was charged with three counts of possession of a controlled substance and one count of possession of a dangerous weapon. Bond was set at \$1,500 on each count, Toler said.

Reid was charged with three counts of possession of a controlled substance. Bond was set at \$1,500 on each count.

Toler said that the new drug dog detected two bottles of pills in the Reid woman's underclothing. This was the first drug related arrest the dog has been involved in since arriving last week in Tyler County.

Toler said the arrests were the result of a 45-day investigation. Max Langston, special reserve deputy, Toler and Chief Deputy Butch Kraus had been conducting most of the surveillance work during this time.

Langston, Toler and Kraus made the arrests at the gravel pit.

AUSTIN—In response to undeniable evidence that child abuse is a nationwide problem, the 66th Legislature has passed several bills dealing with child abuse and child care.

H.B. 1375 creates the offense of harboring a runaway. Under this law it is illegal for an adult to knowingly harbor a runaway child.

H.B. 1741 and H.B. 1742 expand and redefine what is considered child abuse.



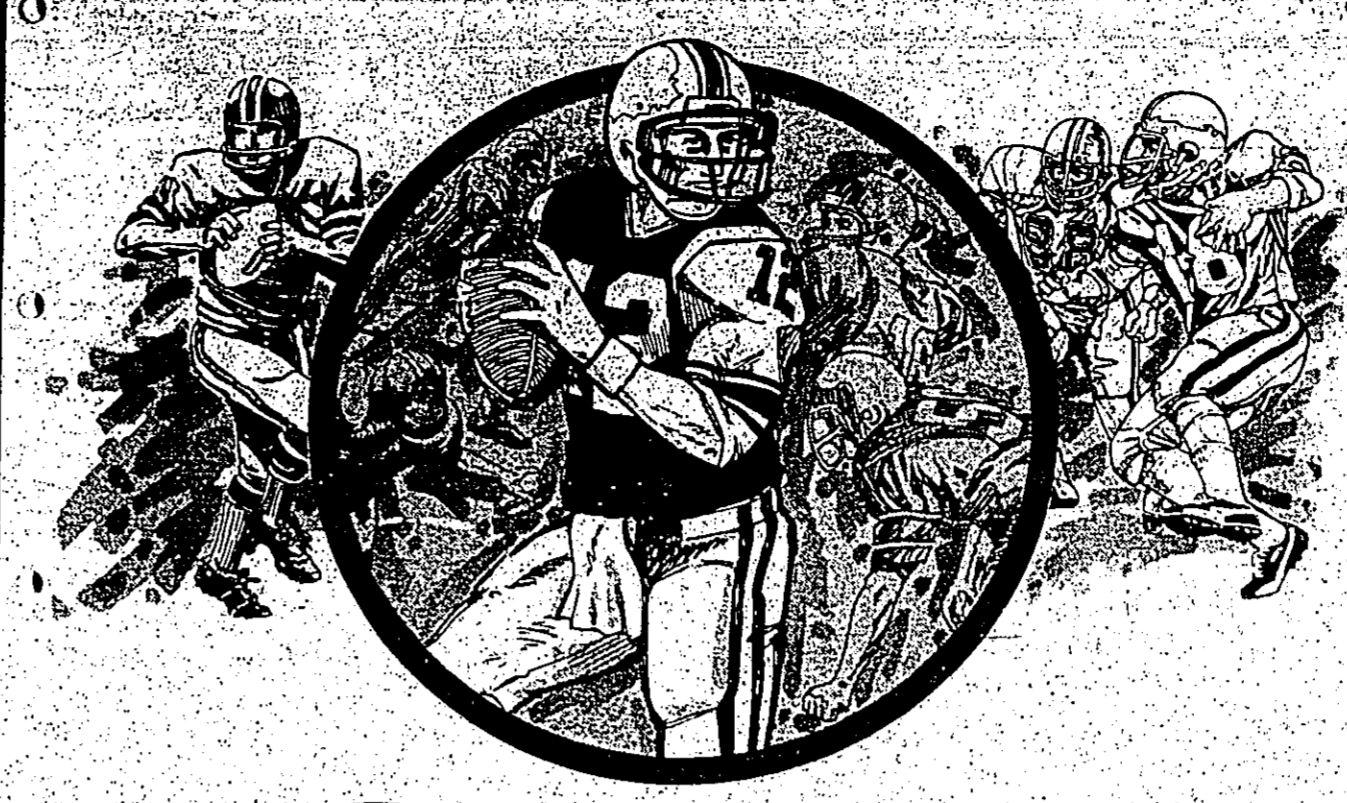

Survey Says TV Ups Crime Rate

HUNTSVILLE - About 2% said they would most two out of every three Texans think that crime and violence on television and in the movies cause moderate to large increases in their own communities' crime rate.

This was one of the findings of the latest Texas Crime Poll, a survey of attitudes and opinions in the area of crime and violence. Improved police services led with 42% approval, followed by Justice Center at Sam Houston State University.

A total of 3,463 Texas living in 176 counties participated in the survey. They were asked separate questions concerning television and the movies, and results were almost identical. A total of 28% felt that crime and violence on television have caused a "large increase" in crime, and 35% said a "moderate increase." Of the remainder, 23% felt they caused "very little increase" and 13% said they had no effect.

One fourth (25%) of those participating felt that crime and violence in the movies caused a "large increase" in crime, and 35% said a "moderate increase." Another 26% felt they caused "very little increase" and 13% again said they had no effect.

In Urban Kercher, an associate professor of criminal justice at Sam Houston and psychologist, said that most studies have shown that violence behavior that there are exceptions.

All kinds of unusual things happen in this area, said Kercher. "It's not a simple relationship. Studies have shown for instance that watching extremely violent crime 'turns people off'."

Kercher. Also, people who watched lawmen riddle Bonnie and Clyde with bullets became aggressive.

In general, moderate amounts of violence tend to incite people, he said. Children who watch violent cartoons show an increase in violent play.

On the whole, Kercher said, that question would agree with the 35% who selected a moderate increase.

Several questions in the survey dealt with the "post-rational disposition" of criminals, specifically, probation and corrections.

Most Texans (90%) said that probation should not be allowed for persons convicted of violent crimes, while about the same number (85%) felt probation should be allowed for non-violent crimes.

Respondents were also asked to evaluate the Texas prison system's effectiveness in preparing people to return to society, with 4% saying it does an "excellent job," 18% saying "good job," 51% saying "fair job," and 20% saying "poor job."

An overwhelming majority of the respondents (87%) said that juries should be informed about parole laws.
