He said he hoped county residents would just have a little more patience. The commissioners are trying to get around to all the road repairs as soon as possible.


Holiday Monday

Garbage Funds Dwindle

It appears that time may be running out on the county's sanitary land fill. The Tyler County Commissioner's Court was supposed to meet in a called session Wednesday to determine user fees for the land fill.

County commissioners were informed by County Auditor Ann Fondren at a meeting last week that they were rapidly running out of operational funds for the dump and that some action was needed immediately to insure its continued operation.

Commissioners have been discussing garbage fees for commercial haulers and the City of Woodville for the past several weeks, however, none has been established. The fees were to have been the primary subject of the meeting Wednesday.

Commissioner Maxie Riley presided over the meeting last Friday when Fondren informed the group of the shortage of funds. County Judge Allen Sturrock was out of town at another meeting.

The commissioners agreed that they would wait until Wednesday and the judge's return before making a final decision on the user fee issue.

The commissioners indicated that they would invite the members of the Woodville City Council to the Wednesday meeting as the city is one of

the primary users of the landfill and would be subject to the fee when it goes into force.

At the same meeting last Friday, commissioners also open bids on bridges for Precinct III and Precinct IV.

Center Property Sold

The property adjoining the new Wal-Mart store in Woodville, comprising 5.72 acres, has been sold to Houston firm, according to an announcement this week by Harry W. Stafford, Woodville attorney and former co-owner of the land.

The property, which has been referred to in the past as the site for "The Center" in Woodville, was sold by Stafford, Josiah Wheat and Lloyd Fortenberry to SJW Investments, Inc., a group headed by Stanley J. Williams in Houston. Stafford said the property will be operated under the name of Woodville Shopping Center Associates, Inc.

The sale was entered into in August and finalized Sept. 23. Stafford reported a lease for a 20,000 square foot grocery store with Malone &

Hyde Inc. of Memphis, Tenn., was also assigned over to the new owners, Stafford said.

Stafford explained that Wal-Mart owns its building and land.

"There is some indication that a drug store will locate in the shopping center and other buildings will be built there for other types of business," Stafford said.

"We feel like this is really going to be an asset to our community," he said. "People can shop more at home without having to go out of town. The center will also provide more jobs here and bring in additional tax revenue from the improved acres at the site."

\$60,000 Grant Approved Here

The planned Sheltered Workshop for mental and physical handicaps in Tyler County, got a "Shot-in-the-arm" Monday with the announcement of a successful \$60,000 grant application from the Texas Rehabilitation Commission.

Officials of the Tyler County Mental and Physical Handicap Association, which was formed two

years ago with the express purpose of establishing a "sheltered workshop" here, said they were "elated" by the grant funding announcement.

The workshop opens June 1, 1980. Application for clients will be soon be accepted and routed through a special diagnostic evaluation team set up by the Deep East Texas Mental Health and Mental Retardation Services, of Lufkin, through the office of Dr. Wayne Lawrence, Executive Director, and with the guidance of Larry Heaton, workshop coordinator with the MMR Services.

According to John Morrison, president of the TCM & PHA, Inc., "Our emphasis until the shop is actually opened will be on encouraging people to join our organization and on obtaining further match-funding still needed to pay the local portion of the grant."

Morrison said the actual grant funding breakdown was \$11,000 local money matched by \$49,000 (Continued on page 3-A)

Indians Respond To Firing

The furor created by the Texas Indian Commission's attempt to oust Emmett Battise as the superintendent of the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation near Livingston may lead to a long and bitter fight, according to tribal leaders.

"We have been patient and trusting for as long as we could but we are just fed up with the paternalistic attitude now being adopted by the Texas Indian Commission," stated Tribal Chairman Clayton Sylvestine.

On Monday, Sept. 24, Battise was summoned to the state capitol by the Commission and was asked to resign. Two of the three-member Commission conducted the meeting. They were Chairman Jack Stallings of El Paso and the newly appointed member Frank Hildebrand. Only two members are necessary for a quorum. Battise refused to resign until conferring with the Tribal Council.

The other member of the Commission is Victor Fain, publisher of the Daily Sentinel in Nacogdoches and a long-time friend of the East Texas Indians. In expressing concern Fain stated, "I was unaware this was going to happen. It was my understanding that this was to be a routine meeting. This was a total surprise. I have a warm spot for the Indians and have one desire—to help the Indians. It would break my heart if something was done against their will."

Battise was asked to resign because of declining revenue from the tourist program at the Indian Reservation. Until 1972 when Battise was appointed as the first Indian superintendent, the Reservation received a substantial amount of state appropriated funds which was used to offset a majority of tourist program operations costs.

State appropriations have been reduced including an almost token assistance in 1978-79 when the aid was reduced to a few key personnel. Tourist program funds were used to support the state agency. In a previous biennium, medical program appropriations were totally cut. Again, tourist generated funds were used to support the program of the state. During this period, the Texas Indian Commission budget continued to climb.

A key figure in the Indian Commission organization is Walter Broemer who was the Indian Reservation superintendent until 1972. He is now the executive director for the Commission, a post he helped create. The position is salaried at almost \$30,000.

In blasting the Texas Indian Commission, the normally-restrained Tribal Council Chairman continued, "I was led to believe that all decisions were to be made jointly and approved by the Commission and the Council before it becomes legal. In this case, I learned of the decision made by the Commission from fellow employees when I arrived for work. This subject has not been presented to the Tribal Council for approval." Survey Predicts Waste Disaster

A total of 50 states have updated their laws and regulations since the NWF survey was done, Kamlet noted. Some states would fare better if reevaluated today, but most programs still need drastic improvements.

What were some of the most serious problems "uncovered" in the survey? Less than a quarter of the states regulate hazardous waste landfills either by segregating toxic from non-toxic wastes or by specifying areas where hazardous waste landfills may not be established. The NWF researchers found that nearly half the states require no assessment of the toxic chemical content of landfills, and less than a quarter of the states require the future use of such landfills to be monitored.

Other areas covered in the survey include the handling of toxic waste emergencies, pesticide disposal, air recycling, and surface and ground water monitoring and protection.

The study, which also included a detailed analysis of responses to each question asked in the survey, is available free for the first copy and for one dollar for additional copies. It is available from the National Wildlife Federation, Dept. K-1412, 1412 16th Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20036.

DPS Director Plans To Retire

AUSTIN - Colonel William E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has announced he will retire on December 31, 1979, after a total of more than 43 years of public service.

He made the announcement during the annual conference of the International Association of Chiefs of Police, at which he has served as president during the past year.

Speir, 62, was named director of the DPS by the Texas Public Safety Commission after the death of Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr. He had been assistant director since June 1, 1962.

As director, he has commanded a diverse agency which employs over 4,500 enforcement and support personnel. The department is responsible for programs related to traffic law enforcement and driver regulation, criminal law enforcement, and disaster emergency preparedness within the state.

Speir said, "As I conclude this wonderful year as president of the IACP, I think the time has also come to announce my plan to retire." He was named acting director in May, 1968, before being appointed permanent director by the Texas Public Safety Commission on September 16, 1968.

Speir, active in the law enforcement profession, is a past president of the Texas Police Association and has held vice-presidential positions with the IACP prior to assuming the presidency of the world-wide organization.

He was named American Law Enforcement Officer of the Year in 1971 by the National Convention of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, and presented the J. Edgar Hoover Gold Medal Award.

As director of DPS, Speir also serves on the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Standards and Education, the official body which sets standards for law enforcement officers in Texas, and is a member of the Governor's Criminal Justice Council which provides state-wide criminal justice planning and administrative grant programs to the various agencies in the criminal justice system.

With the Attorney General, he formerly served as co-chairman of the Texas Organized Crime and Prevention Council. Also he is an ex-officio board member of the Texas Board of Private Investigators.

He is active in community and church affairs. The Buffalo Trails Council of the Boy Scouts of America honored him in 1962 with the Silver Beaver Award for outstanding leadership and tireless efforts on behalf of boys, and he is a past president of the Capital Area Council.

He served as president of the Austin Rotary Club and district governor of Rotary District 587. He is a member of the Masonic Lodge and of Austin's First Baptist Church.

Speir and his wife, Ellen, are parents of three sons: Dr. Larry Speir of Seguin, Dr. Elwyn Speir of Austin, and USAF Captain John Speir, stationed in Florida.



With gasoline prices on the rise, many consumers may turn to mail-order shopping as a way to save time and money.

However, past experiences with mail-order shopping have left many consumers dissatisfied.

The Attorney General's Office and other consumer complaint handling agencies report that mail-order problems are among the most frequently reported of all.

To avoid consumer problems, take these precautions:

- 1) Learn to spot an exaggeration, the small type often, qualify the big bold headline.
- 2) Don't send cash. Pay only by check or money order and include shipping and handling charges.
- 3) Write a complete description of the item, as well as the address of the company, on your check so that the cancelled check is returned, you will have all of that information at your fingertips.
- 4) Or, keep a copy of your order with the date it was mailed and a photocopy of the check or money order.
- 5) When the order arrives, examine it immediately to be sure it is what you wanted and that it is in good condition.

Compost Piles Are Valuable

Falling leaves during autumn make lawn rather unsightly, so what can one do with leaves and plant material to improve growing conditions for the next season? Have you ever heard of composting?

Compost is a mixture of decomposing and rotting debris which can be used to add fertilizing elements to the soil. It is a process which returns plant and animal matter back to the soil and completes the life cycle. This cycle begins when the seeds are planted. As the small plant seed grows, it takes nutrients from the soil to make cells and metabolites. The larger plant gets, the more material are required. When the plant dies, it decomposes and the "borrowed elements" return to the soil. Thus, the cycle is completed.

The advantage of using organically released fertilizer elements is mainly one of economics. They are free. Gardeners should realize that organically released fertilizer elements do not differ in any way from those fertilizer elements obtainable from other sources. The organic combinations of elements must be reduced to some soluble inorganic forms by plants again. These inorganic forms also are found in commercial fertilizers. With this information, one can readily recognize the fallacy in the claim that vegetables and other foods products fertilized with inorganic chemical fertilizers are somehow harmful to human health as compared with those in which the same elements are supplied from composted or other organic materials.

The main advantage, other than an economical fertilization technique, is that compost added to the soil improves tilth, fertility and ability to hold moisture. These factors encourage optimum plant growth and maximum yields if proper cultural practices are followed.

Basic items suitable for composting include leaves, grass clippings, animal manures, old plants and kitchen garbage. Do not use meat scraps and fats which attract undesirable creatures and generate odor. Offensive odors also develop if the compost pile becomes soggy or anaerobic (lack of sufficient oxygen).

This not only reduces odor but also hastens the decaying process. If a compost pile is properly made and maintained, an excellent composted material will be ready for use by late spring or early summer of next year. Try the "sandwich" composting effect. Choose a site on level ground if possible and near a water source since moisture is required. Pile an 8- to 10-inch layer of rough brush or twigs on the bottom of the site. This helps especially if you choose not to turn the compost. (Unturned compost takes about 6 to 8 months to decompose.)

36th Medical Detachment Helicopter Will Arrive At Emergency Scene Within Minutes After 'Hotline' Call

Polk Helicopter Ambulance Is Life Saver

The 36th Medical Detachment Helicopter Ambulance stands ready 24 hours a day at Ft. Polk, La., to assist in the rescue of persons in Tyler County who need emergency transport and who can't be otherwise serviced by commercial ambulance services.

"But," says Sergeant Jim Bailey of Brookeland, Texas, "it has to be a life or death situation or be serious enough for us to make the trip."

Bailey says that the service is offered by Ft. Polk as a medical support to the local hospitals within approximately a 100 mile range of the 13,000 population post located some 50 miles from Tyler County.

The helicopter responds to serious burn victim accidents, car crashes, hospital car crashes, hospitals who need to transport a western Texas or a Highway Heart victim, possibly premature baby, the post into Louisiana, for example, to better facilities for treatment, need arises - said the Officer-in-charge.

"There are a lot of small hospitals in East Texas and in Louisiana who call on us for surgical scissors and have sophisticated bandages the team enough equipment to handle the need."

Sergeant Bailey, who says his most satisfying experience was the rescue of two Texas or a Highway burn children from Southern Louisiana or a hospital just recently. "It took a lot of care and sensitivity to comfort those kids," he said.

The effective range of the helicopter service reaches to the western part of the state, possibly 100 miles east of the post into Louisiana, for example, to better facilities for treatment, need arises - said the Officer-in-charge.

"There are a lot of small hospitals in East Texas and in Louisiana who call on us for surgical scissors and have sophisticated bandages the team enough equipment to handle the need."

Sergeant Bailey, who says his most satisfying experience was the rescue of two Texas or a Highway burn children from Southern Louisiana or a hospital just recently. "It took a lot of care and sensitivity to comfort those kids," he said.


"The tank route sign verberations can be heard some 30 miles from the center of the headquarters area as tank trainees sight in on firing range targets in remote areas of the Fort."

When being such a part of a solar system will supply 100 percent of the heating and hot water nearby community and 90 percent of the air conditioning required for the massive building.

As an extension of a peace-time post emergency situation, the Army's rescue effort standing role in national defense has changed over the years. "This post has matured over the years and is proud now to be able to offer the best of itself. And, some is can do."
