Area Catholics Respond

Pope John Paul II captured the hearts of millions of Americans when he visited the United States last week and members of the Our Lady of the Pines Catholic Church in Woodville were no exception.

A recent interview with several members of the local Catholic parish revealed that the Pope came across as a loving, able and concerned leader, and one that has gained the respect and admiration of Catholics around the world.

Mrs. Martha Reynolds, wife of deacon George Reynolds, was very complimentary of the Pope. "To the Catholic community, he really showed himself as the shepherd of his flock. He showed that he really cared about the people and then he stood firm on the Catholic teachings," she said.

He expressed that we are all people of God, all faiths, and as such we should all act as brothers and sisters," she continued. "I was touched by his report with little children. If he has this report with children, think what he gave up to become a priest."

When asked her views about the Pope's stand against women becoming priests and priests being able to marry she replied, "I think we should be open to the Holy Spirit in the future, but for now we should follow what our Holy Father indicates."

"I am not a television fan," Mrs. Reynolds said, "but I watched all I could the last few days...mainly because he was speaking to the world and not just to Catholics."

Billy Holtman, 11, of Colmesneil said that he thought it was really good that the Pope could visit the United States. "Well, it is not often that a Pope comes to certain places just to visit. I think he would be fun to be with. He's not all that serious. He is religious, but he's fun to talk with."

Mrs. J.O. Landry of Ivanhoe said "I think that it (his trip) is the greatest ecumenical movement that one could think of. It seems that just as many Protestants were just as thrilled about him coming here and made an effort to see him."

"He seems to make a special effort to reach the younger people—the children and young adults. To me, it seems to make him a Pope for the people as a whole," she continued. "He seems to be one of the people; not above them."

Mrs. Landry said she doesn't believe anyone will ever forget his visit. "He made a bigger impression on the public than any other Pope, perhaps with the exception of Pope John. The whole world loved him."

"He made it clear we can't change the church the way we, individuals, want," she said.

Estelle Campbell of Colmesneil commented that she thinks the Pope coming to the United States "is one of the most wonderful things that could happen to us."

"I like his stand on not having women as priests and his stand on abortions," Mrs. Campbell said. "I also don't think priests should marry."

"I think the Pope is a wonderful person. He is right down to earth. He's the same with everyone, rich or poor. I am hoping his visit will make for (Continued on page 5-A)

Garbage Fees Set

Fees for using the Tyler County Landfill were established at a recent meeting of the Tyler County Commissioner's Court.

Last Wednesday, commissioners decided to charge the City of Woodville a flat fee of \$750 per month to use the county landfill. Commercial haulers will be charged \$5 a load. The new rates are to go into effect Oct. 15. There is no charge for individuals who wish to dump garbage at the landfill.

Judge Allen Sturrock pointed out that the fees would bring in approximately \$1,000 per month to the county which will be used to help defray the cost of operating the dump. He pointed out that it costs considerably more than \$12,000 per year to operate the landfill.

Effective December 1, the existing dumps in the county are to be used only for household garbage. Other items such as refrigerators, wire, large items, etc must go to the county's main landfill for disposal.

In another meeting Monday, commissioners decided to advertise for bids on a loader for Precinct 1. The bids are to be opened Nov. 13 at 10 a.m.

The commissioners also amended the budget to approve a car allowance for the stockman in the sheriff's department. The item had been overlooked when the budget was previously approved. The car allowance amounts to \$2,400 per year.

The commissioners also discussed the nomination of a person to represent the county on the appraisal board. The representative is expected to be named Friday.

Does the American diet have anything to do with cancer? This is an important question with few firm answers, but here are some key observations and information.

Says Jean West of the Tyler County Cancer Unit, "There are two aspects of the subject of nutrition and cancer. The first is the possible influence of diet on the development of cancer. The second is the role that good nutrition plays in a cancer patient's responses to therapy and general well-being."

Regarding diet and cancer, it is encouraging to know that in the last 20 years there has been a decline in stomach cancer among both American men and women. While there is no firm explanation, some experts theorize that better refi-

neration of foods to prevent fermentation (which involves cancer-causing substances called nitrosamines) may have an influence. Another factor may be distribution of foods grown in different areas which once were only available seasonally—for example foods high in vitamin C such as oranges and tomatoes.

The typical American diet is high in animal fats—meat, eggs, whole milk and cheese. Altogether, many Americans obtain 40 percent of their daily caloric total from fat. In Japan, where fat supplies only 15-20 percent of daily caloric intake, there is a much lower breast cancer rate among women. When, however, Japanese women migrate and adopt a western or American style diet higher in fat, breast cancer incidence rises. Recently, laboratory studies done by the American Health Foundation have shown that when animals are on a high fat diet they are more likely to develop breast cancer.

Lately, many people in Tyler County may have read or heard comments about the influence of fiber as a dietary factor in cancer.

Bulk or fiber are catch-all words for many foods including raw salads, lightly cooked vegetables, bran, cracked and whole wheat cereal and breads. While some experts say that the (Continued on page 5-A)

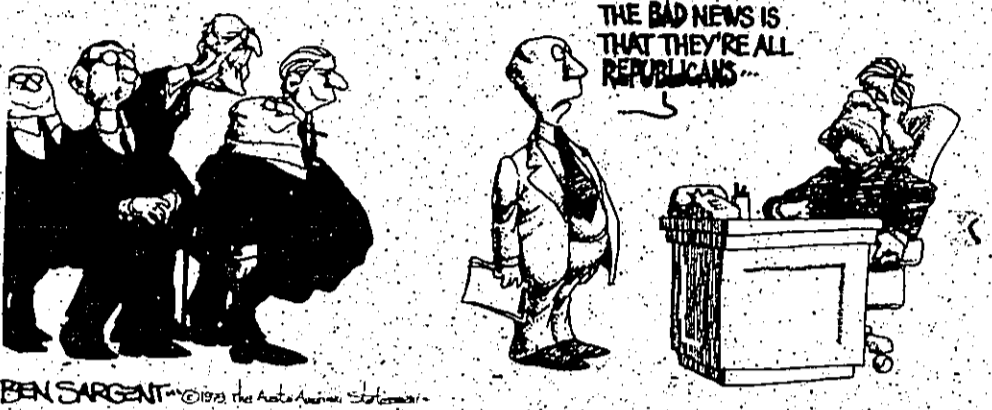
Editorial Cancer Evidence Mounts

The Consumer Alert

Has this ever happened to you, your friends or neighbors? A Homeowner fails to make his mortgage payments and is in default. Suddenly, a letter arrives or a phone call comes and apparently all his problems are solved. A "mortgage counselor" or "credit counselor" says, "Don't worry, we can take care of your problem. We'll take care of your mortgage and even pay your moving expenses!"

The story just related involves a new, perfectly legal scheme designed to take advantage of homeowners who are having financial difficulties. This new scheme has been referred to by some as the "home equity rip off" and is being used in many areas.

"Equity in a home is the difference between the home's market value and the amount of the debt outstanding on the mortgage. The home equity rip off relies upon the fact that most people do not know the market value of their homes. All most of us know is how much of the mortgage is left to be paid off.

With a typical thirty years mortgage, the bulk of the payments for the first ten years goes to interest. Very little of the "Principal" debt is retired. Because of this, many of us assume that we have very little "equity" in our homes. The fact is, however, that because of inflation, our homes may be worth \$10,000 or \$20,000 more than we think. It is this equity created by inflation that is constructed at 17 state colleges and will go out of existence at the end of the year.

In his opinion request Clements suggested the tax is unconstitutional because it is based on property values as assessed by counties.

OTHER AG OPINIONS

In a legal opinion issued last week White said a school district may employ relatives of the superintendent in instances where he exercises no control over who is selected and does not himself appoint to hire his relatives.

The request came from Education Commissioner Marlin L. Brockette seeking a clarification of nepotism laws.

White also issued an opinion allowing the Department of Corrections to purchase a site for a new prison solely from the appropriation for prison construction. White said back to them with an "option to purchase." Thus, the homeowners are led to believe that the sale is only temporary, that it will solve the immediate financial difficulty and, as soon as times are better, they will own their home again! Unfortunately, since the family is unable to pay the mortgage, they are unlikely to be able to pay the rent, which usually is greater than the original mortgage payment. They quickly fall behind on rental payments; their failure to pay rent cancels the option to purchase and the family gets evicted.

Whatever the method used, the result is the same. The speculator ends up with title to the property and the family ends up on the street, having lost thousands of dollars of equity in their home.

Unless there is a misrepresentation or unless the speculator takes a grossly unfair advantage of the homeowner, the scheme is legal. Consequently, the only effective protection against the scheme is to know about it and be forewarned.

If you get a call or letter promising help for nothing, your house is probably worth more than you think. Ignore these calls and letters. Instead, ask for advice and help from the people who gave you your mortgage, or HUD approved housing counseling agency or a licensed real estate broker who can tell you the value of your house and, if necessary, help you sell it for a fair price.

Fire Prevention Week

October 8-14 is National Fire Prevention Week, an observance which originated because of two fires that shouldn't have happened.

On October 9, 1871, carelessness sparked a fire in a modest midwest home. It didn't seem threatening or uncontrollable, but by the next day more than 2,100 acres of Chicago were burned, claiming over 200 lives and direct losses in excess of \$168 million. On the same day, the worst forest fire in U.S. history broke out in Peshtigo, Wisconsin, claiming 1,152 lives and burning over 1.28 million acres.

Since 1922, Fire Prevention Week has been observed annually on the anniversary of the Chicago and Peshtigo tragedies.

Texas have a big stake in fire prevention. Last year, volunteer fire departments throughout the state reported to the Texas Forest Service that more than 6,320 fires occurred outside city boundaries. These fires, the majority of which were natural cover fires, damaged over 265,000 acres of land. More than 30 percent of the improved structural fires reported involved rural residences.

Over half of the 3,500 wildfires fought by TFS crews last year were caused by careless brush and debris burning, according to Don Staples, TFS district forester in Livingston.

"Last year's number of forest fires and amount of acreage burned were the highest in 10 years," said Staples. "This year we've been fortunate. The number of fires and acres burned to date have been the lowest in 10 years, thanks primarily to the wet weather we've had."

Staples indicated that forest fires could still become a problem this fall.

The wet spring and summer weather has contributed to a heavy buildup of fuels, particularly grasses. A period of dry, windy weather could quickly reduce the moisture content of these fuels and thereby create a very real fire hazard.

Fire Prevention Week should serve as a reminder to all persons to be careful with fire. Most fires can be prevented.

State Capitol Highlights

AUSTIN. Hispanic groups and leaders, both in Texas and in Mexico, held center stage briefly last week in several arenas, testing clout that is predicted by many to wield more "political" influence in the coming decade.

A low-key announcement from Mexico's nationally-owned oil industry, PEMEX, that it may pay for oil damages on Texas beaches was a bright note.

PEMEX's new public relations manager, Reynaldo Zentella, said the company, if pushed, will pay damages resulting from the Ixtoc 1 oil well blowout in the Bay of Campeche.

Zentella cautioned "we'll do our best not to pay when we're not supposed to." They'll have to prove it was oil from Ixtoc 1 that damages the beaches.

The company is still trying to cap the blowout, but an attempt to put a giant \$3 million "umbrella" designed by Brown and Root of Houston over the hole in the gulf floor was disrupted by choppy seas.

TEXAS PROTOCOL CHIEF

A native of Floresville was sworn in Thursday as chief of protocol. Abelardo L. Valdez was named to that position and to the title of ambassador of President Jimmy Carter.

Earlier last week Valdez addressed the Federal Bar Association convention at San Antonio and said Texas is a key port of entry for imports from Mexico and the rest of Latin America.

Sixty-four percent of all U.S. trade with Mexico (some \$6 billion) and one-fourth of U.S.-Latin American trade (\$8 billion) passes through Texas, he said.

He also pointed out that 82 percent of the U.S. direct foreign investment in the developing world is in Latin American, our third largest trading partner.

Meanwhile, Ruben Bonilla, of Corpus Christi, national president of League of Latin American Citizens, announced a commission has been established to coordinate discussions between the Mexican government and Hispanic groups in the U.S.

Justice Raps Clements

Joe Greenhill took a milder approach but all the same criticized Clements and the Legislature for "making it difficult for judges to do their jobs."

Greenhill led the Judicial Section Conference meeting at Abilene that the Judiciary needs to present a unified front in the future to secure higher salaries and funds to ease overloaded dockets.

He rapped the governor's Office for failing to supply the funds necessary to ease caseloads in urban areas.

SPIER RESIGNS

Department of Public Safety Director Col. Wilson Spier, has resigned at the end of 1979, has recommended his top assistant to fill his shoes.

Spier tapped Lt. Col. Leo Gossett, a 30-year DPS veteran. His replacement will be appointed by the DPS.

No Fatal Accidents Reported

Sergeant Russell Davis of the Texas Highway Patrol has announced that during the month of August in Tyler County there were no rural fatal accidents in which seven persons were injured.

In addition, the Texas Highway Patrol investigated 13 rural motor vehicle accidents in which seven persons were injured.

Through August of this year there have been 13 rural accidents in Tyler County, killing four persons and injuring 61 people.

During the same eight month period in 1978, there were 129 rural traffic accidents, killing five and injuring 55 persons.
