The public response to last week's column about the "doctor shortage" in Tyler County was impressive to say the least. I had talked to several area residents before writing it, but I really had no way of knowing just how widespread the situation was until after the column appeared.

Many people have called to relate their experiences in obtaining medical treatment in Tyler County and others have stopped me on the street, in the supermarket and at the Woodville Inn Restaurant to let me know that they also feel another physician is needed here.

I am really pleased with the constructive and objective suggestions that have been coming in. One person has suggested the formation of a "relief" clinic here which perhaps could be manned by outside physicians on a rotating basis, similar to the weekend situation which currently exists at Tyler County Hospital with interns coming in from Galveston to provide emergency service.

Obtaining another doctor here will not be an easy task. Choosing a physician is a very responsible undertaking and it is difficult to determine just how one should go about it. The effort certainly needs to be an organized one and I am hopeful that some organization will come forth or even be formed to assume this responsibility. The local members of the medical profession and health related agencies should definitely be included in the selection of another doctor.

A letter to the editor appears in the "Open Mind" column of today's Booster and can be found on the editorial page. It relates to the doctor shortage situation and I feel I should call your attention to it.

If you have any ideas about this situation that you would like to share, please contact me soon or write a letter to the editor.

I received a letter this past week from Steven M. Leblond, a prisoner in Nevada. Steven made a simple request and perhaps there is someone in these parts who would like to respond.

"I am in prison and have no means in which to pay for what I ask, but do hope your paper can help by printing my ad," he wrote. "Here is what I want to say..."

"Man, age 24, in prison with no family or friends who care. Would like to hear from someone to help keep my head together and ease this loneliness. Anyone please write."

County Receives Travel Funds

AUSTIN — Tyler County received \$3,913,000 of the State's \$7,032,369,000 travel receipts in 1978, a national study commissioned by the Texas Tourist Development Agency has disclosed.

The 1978 figures reflect an increase of 11 percent in travel receipts over 1977 for Tyler County.

In addition to gross receipts, the study found that Tyler County in 1978 had 158 of the state's 243,887 travel-related jobs, with an annual payroll of \$942,000.

It also estimated \$158,000 in state and \$21,000 in local taxes were paid by county visitors in 1978.

The study was done by the U.S. Travel Data Center in Washington, D.C., an independent travel research organization funded jointly by public and private sectors.

It was based on the Center's Travel Economic Impact Model which breaks out a state's share of the national travel market on a county-by-county basis.

The model measures the economic impact of all travel involving overnight trips, away from home, and day-trips at least 100 miles or more from home. Thus it includes travel by Texans as well as out-of-state visitors, for all purposes.

It includes estimates of the traveler's spending at home in preparation for the trip, his spending en route, and that at his destination.

Basic data for the model comes from the National Travel Survey,

conducted every five years by the U.S. Census Bureau, and from the Center's own National Travel Expenditure Model.

It was the latter which estimated that in 1975 Texas had dislodged New York for third place in the nation's travel industry. The 1978 figures, however, show Texas back in fourth place behind California, Florida and New York.

"We're pleased that travel research techniques have finally developed to the point that states can determine where, within their boundaries, travel dollars are spent and travel-related jobs exist," said Frank Hildebrand, executive director

of the Texas Tourist Development Agency.

"Now we can trace travel's considerable economic impact on a county-by-county basis, observe changing patterns annually, and help direct the rapid growth of this burgeoning industry."

Many county wide improvements have been accomplished and most of these are due, in large part, to individual efforts. Selection will be on the basis of who, during the past year, has given unselfishly of himself, time and money (according to means) and thereby has substantially improved the economic and civic climate of Tyler County. He must have acted in his civic or business works so that he is admired and respected. This award will, in a small way, enable this individual to be recognized for his efforts.

Capital Highlights

AUSTIN--The curtain opened last week on the second act of a political drama that has promised for weeks to put the Governor of Texas and the Texas Attorney General on a collision course in the courtroom.

Attorney General Mark White filed suit in a Houston federal court last week seeking \$10 million in damages from SEDCO, the oil drilling firm founded by Gov. Bill Clements and a Mexican drilling firm, Permargo.

White told reporters he will seek to prove negligence on the part of both drilling firms in connection with the late 1970s well blowout, the largest in history, which washed hundreds of barrels of crude oil onto Texas beaches this summer.

Although the well is still flowing, engineers last week managed to divert the flow with a grant metal cap placed over the well hole on the Gulf floor.

White told reporters he declined to sue PEMEX, the Mexican government-owned company, because he did not want to interfere with U.S.-Mexico negotiations for damages in regard to the spill.

However, he left open the door on such legal action, should the negotiations fail to satisfy Texas interests. "We are refraining from suing PEMEX until it is certain that all negotiations by the U.S. Department of State for damages from Mexico have been exhausted," he said.

CLEMENTS SAYS 'POLITICS' White said several weeks ago after he discovered SEDCO had drilled the damaged drilling rig in deep international waters, that he would include SEDCO in the negligence lawsuit.

The Dallas-based drilling firm was founded by Republican Gov. Bill Clements, who turned it over to his son in a blind trust when he left office. Clements has charged that the suit is "politically motivated."

Li. Gov. Bill Hight and House Speaker Bill Clifton are two leaders whom Democrats are considering running against Clements in 1982. Several Clements supporters think White is maneuvering to have himself become a third choice, but so far White has mentioned only lawsuits, not gubernatorial races.

Meanwhile, SEDCO filed suit early last month, but has all liabilities limited to a suit against SEDCO.

FUEL TAX INCREASE

Regarding tax issues, Clements last week said he will propose that the next Legislature increase the state gasoline tax, the lowest in the nation.

Clements said the drop in gasoline sales has caused a shortage of funds for highway construction, and that the state is "losing" on every gallon sold at the pumps, and recent curtailments in driving because of the fuel shortage is blamed for the loss.

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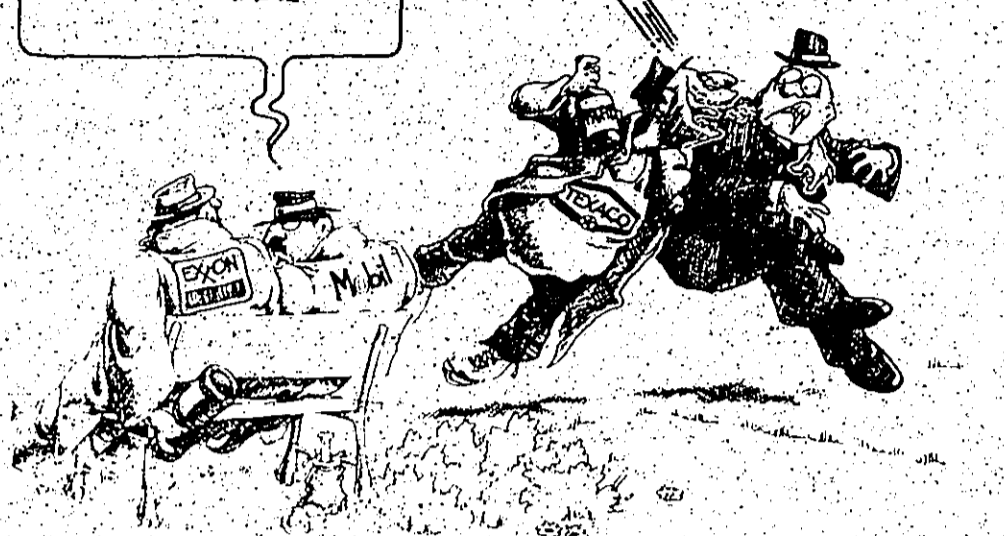

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Congressmen Seek Label On Bread

American consumers know how much they pay for a loaf of bread, but they have no idea how few of their pennies end up in the farmers' pockets.

Wilson has joined Congressman Jack Hightower of Vernon (Texas) to introduce legislation that would require the label on a loaf of bread to disclose the cost of the farm product ingredients to the manufacturer.

Wilson said the price of wheat has risen to more than \$3 a bushel, but it is still below what most farmers need to make a profit.

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Cong. Collins Hits Immigration Practice

Washington While millions of people around the world have been waiting for years to immigrate to the United States, priorities are being given to Vietnamese refugees, as we are doubling their monthly quota from 7,000 to 14,000.

Congressman Jim Collins of Texas has expressed concern about this sort of preference is unfair to many nationalities who must continue their long vigil to be allowed into the United States.

"I am concerned that we are not giving all the people in the world a fair shake. We are not treating everyone equally. We have to think what is fair today to the country and what is fair to the world," Collins said.

The United States has already taken in 240,000 Soviet and Cuban refugees and has pledged to take in 108,000 more from July 1, 1979 to June 30, 1980.

"We should look at how many of these refugees have taken in Japan, S. Italy, U.S., United Kingdom, Sweden, etc."

Collins noted that there are about 5000 immigration cases in Dallas each month over 50,000 a year. "If you take that for the State of Texas, that means we have about 350,000 people a year who want to be immigrants to this country."

"We are turning most of these people away. Very few of them are getting in. I asked myself why they were spending so much time on immigration cases. They tell me people keep coming in for follow-up reports. All of these people keep saying they want to be immigrants to the United States. They are coming from all over the world."

Cataracts Studied

Researchers at Texas Christian University are studying the cataracts that impair the vision of more than 1.6 million Americans. "Our basic objective is to learn about the changes at the molecular level which result in a normal lens becoming a cataract," said Dr. Prem P. Mahendroo, the TCU physics professor heading the project. "Besides learning how an eye lens loses its transparency, those working on the biomedical physics research project want to determine how detrimental biochemical changes can be slowed by drug therapy. They hope ultimately to reverse the process and make cataractous lenses normal again."

Energy Crisis Affects Food

HOUSTON — Due to the energy crisis, there will be no more cheap food, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture Reagan Brown told a gathering of vegetable producers here last week.

"If the consumers of America want to continue to enjoy the bounty to which they have become accustomed, they must be willing to pay for it," Brown said, addressing a meeting of the Texas Vegetable Association.

Brown pointed out that energy costs alone now eat up 12 percent of the average producer's gross income and this will likely increase to 20 percent over the next few years. Other production costs also are increasing, he said, pointing out that fertilizer and fuel costs are up 50 percent.

"As energy becomes more scarce and expensive, it will be realized that there is no greater use of energy supplies than in producing food and fiber," Brown said.

"The other industries are as important as agriculture to this country's security and well-being," Brown said.

Brown challenged the vegetable growers to be adaptable to changing conditions and to work with the state and federal officials to meet the challenges that change brings.

The agricultural official noted that vegetable production is big business in Texas, with the state ranking third in the nation in vegetable production for the year.

Cash receipts from vegetable sales totaled more than \$2.6 billion last year, Texas supplies more cabbage and spinach than any other state and is the nation's largest producer of spring onions.

At a north Houston, Kerry Yeager of Texas Farmall was presented the Award of Merit and a special award was given to Strick Farms of Houston for conducting field demonstrations.

Numerous speakers at the meeting emphasized the need for better conservation methods, which will be implemented by state law.

Wayne Reese, agricultural hygienist with the Texas Extension Service, pointed out that irrigation efficiency is the cause of mental retardation in children.

"The average irrigation farmer is handicapped, wasting 40 percent of the water he uses for irrigation," Reese said.

"We must find ways to increase irrigation efficiency if we are going to stay in business," Reese advised growers to check the efficiency of their irrigation systems by determining the pumping rate (gallons per minute) and the total head (in feet) and fuel consumption.

"Avoiding long-term pumping rate (gallons per minute) and the total head (in feet) and fuel consumption," Reese said.

Jack Smith, Texas Medicines, the burg advocated the use of trickle irrigation to increase irrigation efficiency.

Trickle irrigation, according to Yarna, M.D., estimated Smith, prevents that it can cost at least moisture stress in plants \$10,000 a year, to care by applying a constant supply of moisture at a slow rate.

With even after deducting a trickle irrigation, only cost of about 31 percent of the plant root zone is watered, so a little could save \$350,000 to water can go a long way: \$500,000 for every 10 This provides the best cases found.

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Kiowa History Book Available

Culmination of a project begun in 1975 to produce a history of Kiowa history, E. Worcester, TCU's culture and folklore Lorin Boswell-Proff will come with the Texas Christian University Press publication of a two-book, four-volume series entitled "Kiowa Voices." A \$10,000 grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities and additional funding from TCU has cleared the way for publication of Book One in early 1980.

Dr. James Newcomer, TCU Press director, will contain Volume I, "Kiowa Voices: Dance, Music and Song" and Volume II, "Kiowa Myths and Legends." Book Two, containing Volume III and Volume IV, "Kiowa History and Culture," will be published in 1981, Dr. Newcomer said.

Both books will contain 24 specially commissioned color illustrations by Kiowa artists.

The project was conceived by Kiowa scholars and artists who were concerned over the permanent loss of their history as tribal elders passed away. The first result of that concern was the incorporation of the Kiowa Historical and Research Society with the approval of the Kiowa Tribal Council. Jointly sponsored by TCU and the National Endowment for the Arts, the society produced the four volumes with the intention of providing the Kiowa version of their own history and culture.

Project director Dr. Maurice Boyd, file the simpler one-page Form 1040A, information for the work was gathered from oral histories handed down from generation to generation and until now recorded only in the memories of tribal elders.

Additional information was gleaned from the papers of the late Susan Peters, United States Bureau of Indian Affairs, and from the Kiowa tribe from 1917 to 1968. She became the first white person in the tribe in 1954.

Dr. Boyd said, "Other information sources named were manuscripts from various archival museums in Oklahoma.

Emphasizing that his role was only that of an editor, Dr. Boyd acknowledged the work of Linn Paushy and other present-day members of the tribe whose efforts have made the work an authentic voice of the Kiowa people.

AUSTIN — Many high school students are graduating these days knowing pretty much the basics of English, grammar, math, and history, but they probably can't balance a checkbook, compare price shop, or fill out an income tax return.

Thanks to Under Internal Revenue Service-sponsored, colorful illustrations of high schools for their students, the tide is turning as far as filling out a tax return is concerned.

"Understanding Taxes" is a free, in-structure program which nearly 24,000 schools incorporated into their curriculum in the 1979 school year—reaching almost five million students.

The main thrust of the program is to teach students when they must file a return, the correct form, and supporting schedules to use.

Generally how to file out the form.
