The governor told the officials that he would definitely call a special session of the state legislature. "It will not be in January," he stated. "It will be called either in March or September." He said the three issues that will definitely be included in the session will be initiative and referendum, surveillance, and tax relief. Tyler County Judge Allen Sturrock was the first to question the governor. Judge Sturrock asked the governor if he would consider putting the lateral road fund in his call for a special session. It was pointed out by other officials at the meeting that the smaller counties of the state relied heavily on the lateral road fund.

"I will add that to my list of recommendations, which at last count number about 83," the governor said. "I will not promise that it will be there, I understand where it is on your list of priorities, but I also have my priorities."

When questioned about a county sales tax, the governor replied that he was not optimistic about counties getting into the sales tax business.

Gov. Clements told the group that he was also not optimistic about

I certainly hope that by the time this column appears in The Tyler County Booster, the American hostages in Iran will have been safely freed and enroute to their homes and loved ones in the United States. I hope they will, but at the same time I doubt it. As most Americans, I am really concerned for their welfare.

The takeover of the American Embassy in Iran is a "first" for world politics. It marks the first time ever that an act of terrorism like this has been endorsed by a nation's leadership. It is hard to use logic in evaluating a situation where idiots are in control.

We all know that the situation is sensitive and that anything is possible in the next couple of weeks. The outcome of the Iran problem will be determined, of course, on how it is handled by Washington. What Washington is planning to do, however, is only a matter of speculation today. As with other major developments in recent years, it appears that the American people will be the last to know what is really going on. We'll have to read some politician's book a couple of years from now to get the real answers.

The real question here seems to be, "where do we draw the line" on acts of terrorism. Are we really supposed to sit by and let 60 persons be held hostage?

Can you visualize the world reaction if American students had overtaken a foreign embassy in this country and held 60 hostages for more than a week?

President Carter has made a few suggestions during the past few days that are almost as alarming as the hostage situation itself. He is suggesting that the American demonstrations over the situation cease and has requested that the new media play down the developments in Iran. He has also gone on record stating that Iranian students who are in violation of immigration laws be considered for deportation. One would have thought that would have already been the case, but apparently it wasn't. This kinda makes one wonder why we have immigration laws any way if they are not being enforced.

Freedom of speech and freedom of the press are two rights which are highly valued by the American people. When the President, even hints at restraints on these two liberties, it is frightening to say the least. It appears that President Carter should start displaying what efforts he had undertaken to assure the freedom of the hostages in Iran and start spending less time trying to restrict our freedoms here at home.

## Wilson Hits Iran Issue

WASHINGTON--Rep. Charles Wilson of Lufkin introduced retaliatory legislation this past week in response to the Iranian invasion of the U.S.

Embassy in Tehran and the subsequent demonstrations by Iranian students in the United States.

Under Wilson's bill, when a U.S. Embassy is under attack and/or U.S. officials are being held hostage, foreign nationals of that country residing in the United States will be liable for deportation for holding public demonstration in support of the policies of the government responsible for the threat against U.S. property and lives.

### Capital Highlights

**AUSTIN**— Voters approved two constitutional amendments last Tuesday and rejected one which would have authorized the Legislature to override rules made by state agencies on certain matters.

Booster of the family and ranch loan amendment were fearful that the law would hurt rural areas which would defeat the proposal. But urban voters in Houston, Austin and Dallas-Fort Worth voted its passage. The bill's sponsor, State Rep. Luther Jones, D-El Paso, had traveled the state seeking editorial backing and was not disappointed.

**SPECIAL SESSION POSTPONED**— Clements is keeping legislators guessing again as to exactly when the Legislature will convene for its special session.

**WILSON ON IRAN**— Wilson said he is "outraged" by the action against the Embassy in Tehran. "I consider their invading our Embassy and holding hostages an act of war, and I would like to see American streets cleared of Iranian demonstrators," Wilson said.

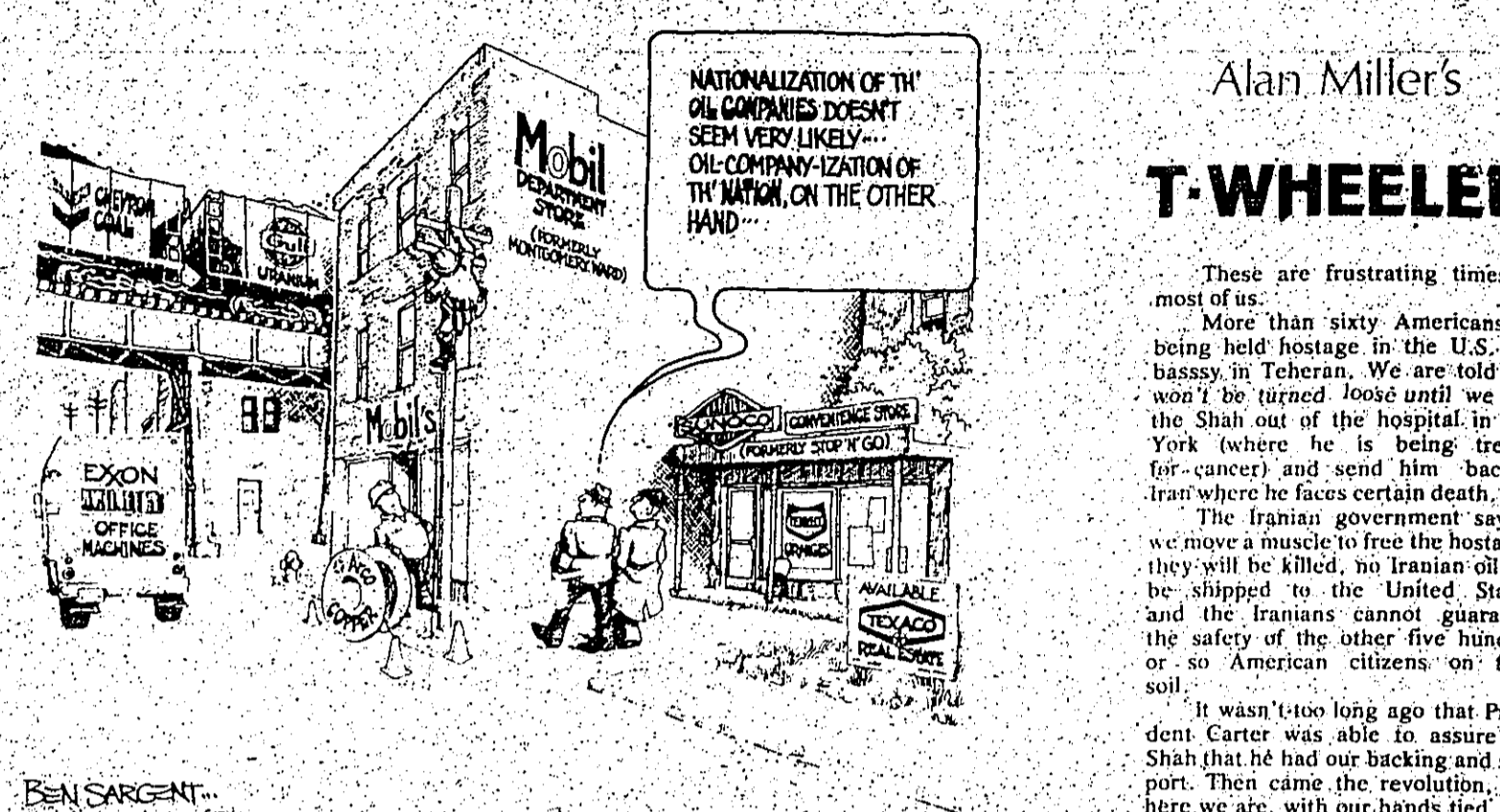
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### T-WHEELER

These are frustrating times for most of us. More than sixty Americans are being held hostage in the U.S. Embassy in Tehran. We are told they won't be turned loose until we take the Shah out of the hospital in New York where he is being treated for cancer and send him back to Iran where he faces certain death.

The Iranian government says if we move a muscle to free the hostages, they will be killed. No Iranian oil will be shipped to the United States, and the Iranians cannot guarantee the safety of the other five hundred or so American citizens on their soil.

It wasn't too long ago that President Carter was able to assure the Shah that he had our backing and support. Then came the revolution, and here we are, with our hands tied, and not able to do anything about it.

Our only access to Iranian officials seems to be working through the terrorist PLO, and isn't that a hard to draw?

And we continue to move farther and farther away from energy independence. We are importing more Arabian oil today than we were prior to the oil embargo in 1973, and domestic production has not improved.

Iranian students are demonstrating in our major cities—mostly college students, here on student visas, as our guests.

Quiet diplomacy is being tried, but even it works, how many other pipsqueak countries are going to kick us in the shins, knowing we are probably in no position to do anything about it?

All the nuclear submarines in the U.S. Navy, and missiles in our silos, can't react to this type of blackmail.

It must be little consolation to our friends and allies that we are boxed into a corner at almost every turn, and from the lack of pressure being exerted by the OPEC people on the French and British, as an example, it seems very clear we Americans are, and will continue to be, the primary target.

When you think of the tens of billions of dollars in foreign aid we have spread around the world in the last thirty years, you begin to wonder where our foreign policy is leading us. Only a country as economically strong as we are could have accomplished what we did to put Europe back on its feet; helping friend and foe alike.

Now we have to accept, including from almost every quarter, insults from many of our own citizens who demonstrate against everything from nuclear power to small darters.

There are even those among us who blame the United States for the wholesale slaughter of Cambodia by Viet Nam. The same people who wanted us out of Southeast Asia, so they could resolve their differences peacefully.

We wouldn't care to contemplate the consequences of a nuclear flare-up in the Middle East, but we are perilously close to just such a situation.

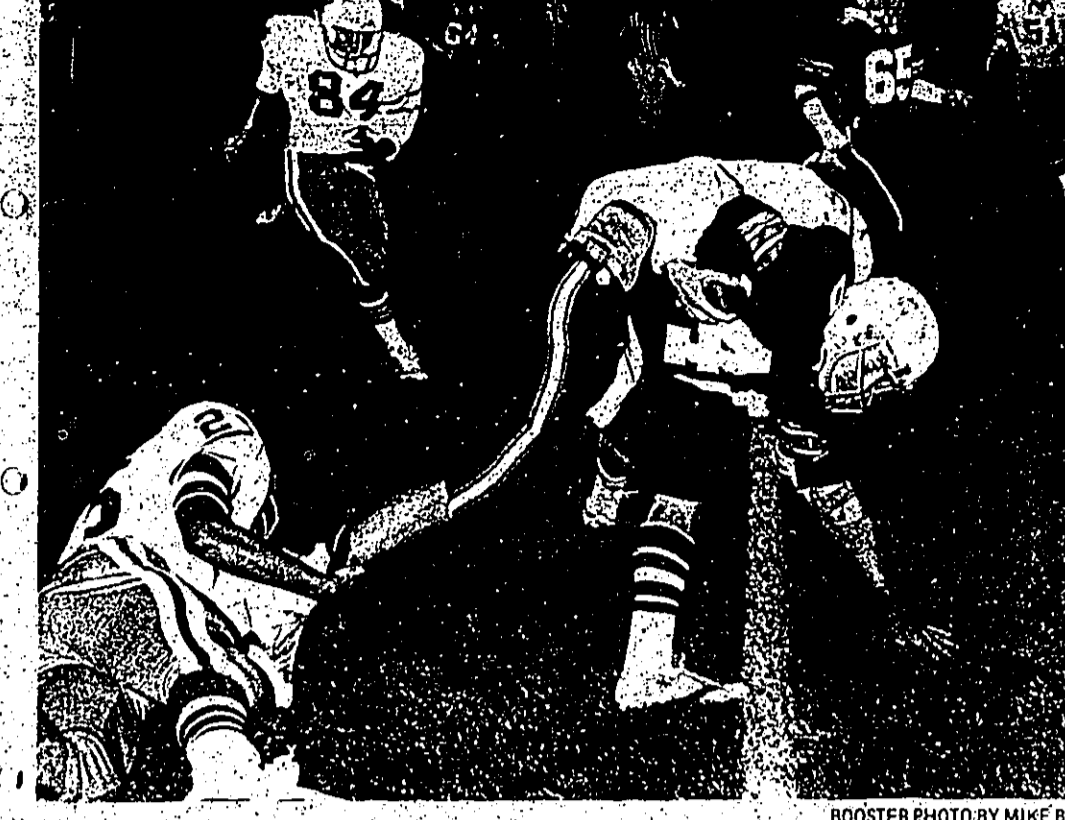

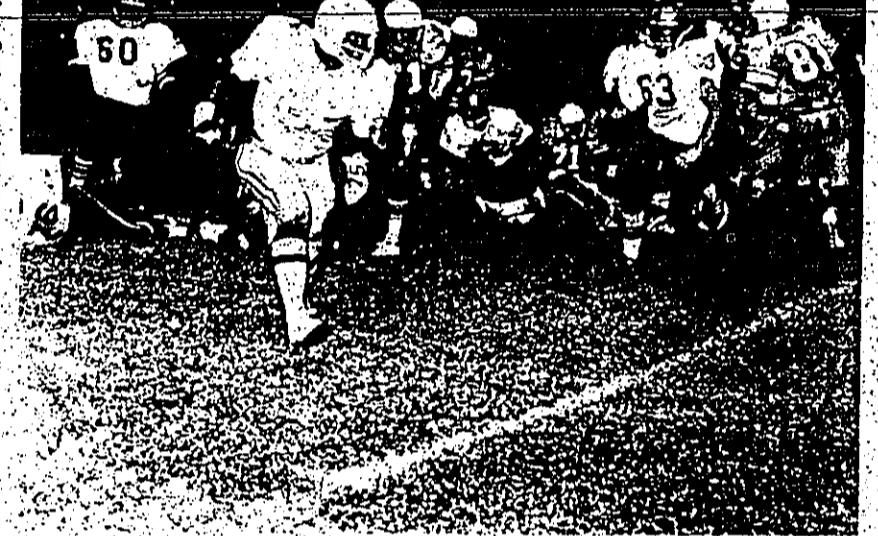

### Wilson Seeks Aid Cut

Congressman Charles Wilson of Lufkin, Texas, is currently out of the country on a military aid to Panama. Offering an amendment to members of a Senate House conference committee working on the 1980 foreign aid bill, Wilson said, "I don't think we ought to give \$5 million in military grants and sales credits to a country that actively supported the overthrow of a pro-U.S. government in Nicaragua."

Wilson, a member of the House Appropriations Committee, expected his amendment to be a controversial one because the Administration has promised Panama that it will request from Congress a total of \$50 million in military aid over the next 10 years.

The fact that the amendment passed so easily is a sign that Congress is growing very tired of the Administration's foreign policy and the leftist ideology of the State Department. Wilson said, "There are too many inconsistencies in the Administration's foreign policy, and I think Congress is ready to make it clear that we will no longer support a double standard."

Wilson said that the State Department is ready to cut aid to Guatemala and El Salvador, both human rights violators in the United States, because of human rights violations there.

But the Secretary of State says it is in our strategic best interests to keep sending money to Panama, even though its record on human rights is questionable at best. The Administration's policy just doesn't make sense, Wilson said.

In an earlier vote on the House floor, Wilson's amendment to cut military assistance to Panama was passed overwhelmingly, but it was vetoed by President Carter. The authority to end the medical help immediately is not in the hands of the President, Wilson said.

### Higher Food Costs Possible

WASHINGTON — Higher food costs and less efficient production could result from national policy alternatives now under discussion in agriculture, an economist from Texas A&M University warned here Nov. 14.

Dr. Ronald D. Knutson, professor and economist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas Agricultural Extension Service, challenged national leaders and economists at the National Outlook Conference in Washington, D.C., to base their analyses on facts instead of opinions of the issue.

Knutson noted that not all large farms are corporate farms. Many, in fact, have the farm family as a base for management even though they may hire significant labor and thus not fall within the USDA family farm definition.

Knutson also questioned the conventional economic viewpoints which portray smaller farms as the most efficient. He cited studies which show substantial efficiency gains beyond the normal \$100,000 in sales that is used to divide large farm agriculture from smaller and medium size farms.

Knutson was critical of studies which conclude that farms in the \$20,000 to \$100,000 sales range are most efficient, since the studies allow no cost for farm family labor, management capital, and policy decisions based on this technique would imply that the U.S. is willing to continue to exploit middle size farms, Knutson said.

Knutson also questioned the current belief that food prices will increase if trends toward large scale agriculture continue.

He noted that during the past 30 years, when integration of the broiler industry was taking place, broiler prices remained constant despite inflation. Yet the real price declined 45 percent and consumption more than doubled, Knutson said.

While the feed beef industry is not as highly concentrated and integrated as the broiler industry, there is no evidence that large scale coordinated feed lots result in higher meat prices, the economist added.

"Warnings of economists about adverse long term consequences of large scale agriculture have not materialized," he observed.

The outlook for the structure of agriculture is a continuation of the trend toward large scale agriculture, Knutson said.

He warned that trends toward large scale agriculture may have progressed to the point that they are not reversible on either political or economic grounds. Implications of such structural changes in agriculture are not as sharply defined, he said.

"An important factor trending toward more contracting in crop production could be a combination of integrated livestock with a relatively tight world supply-demand balance for grains," he said.

- Although there are many chemicals, including alcohol, that can mask stress symptoms, they do not give you 20 percent more help you adjust to the stress itself. The ability to handle stress comes from within you, not from outside.
- Get enough sleep and rest.
- Schedule time for recreation — to relax your mind.
- Do something for others. Sometimes when you are distressed, you concentrate too much on yourself and your situation. When this happens, it is wise to do something for others, and get your mind off yourself.
- Take one thing at a time. It is defeating to attempt to handle everything at once.
- When you are bored and feel left out, go where people are. Get involved instead of withdrawing.

## Increasing Energy Demands

Living in one-story homes and driving your own cars to work may be only a memory in a few years... thanks to the greater demand on energy in coming years. The energy shortage will change the shape of cities and the way Americans live, according to Dr. Floyd Durham, professor of economics at Texas Christian University.

Stacked homes, contrasted to one-story houses, are easier to heat and to cool. Dr. Durham says, and public transportation is feasible only with people living closer together.

In his opinion, increased costs of energy will cause people to come together to live in greater density. In Fort Worth, for example, there were 5,000 people per square mile in 1900. Today the number has dropped to 1,750 persons per square mile.

The concept of spread-out dwellings will bring about a different standard of living, but not necessarily a lower standard, added Dr. Durham. The trend toward smaller lots for homes.

The TCU economist also predicts that as energy becomes increasingly expensive, middle class and upper middle class populations will tend to move toward the central city and compete with urban dwellers for space.

The higher cost of getting to and from work, the higher the buildings will be since, as he explained, "we will think of turf not by groups but by the number of cubic feet we control."

Last winter's "brown outs" illustrated to the nation that electricity can become less dependable. As a result of this awareness, Dr. Durham anticipates food storage will change, and the dependence will be less on frozen food and more on dehydrated and packaged foods.

Registration cards, along with additional information on the TCIP, is available from county Extension offices.

Awards of \$6,400 will be distributed to those communities who have been "deemed best" in their class.

## Electric Heater Problems

Electric space heaters need inspection for dust and worn electric cords. But most electric heater problems occur when the heater is running. Unless it has a switch that cuts the heater off automatically when it overturns, an electric heater can cause a fire if it is knocked over. Another electric heater danger involves shocks that can occur when water or household items hit the electric heating element.

Electric heaters share some fire hazards with gas open-flame heaters. They both can cause furniture, floors and drapes to burn if they are too close to such items. And they can catch clothing on fire if people stand too close too long.

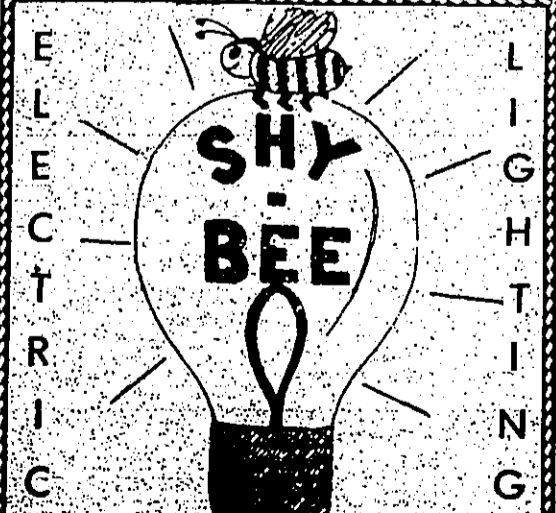
