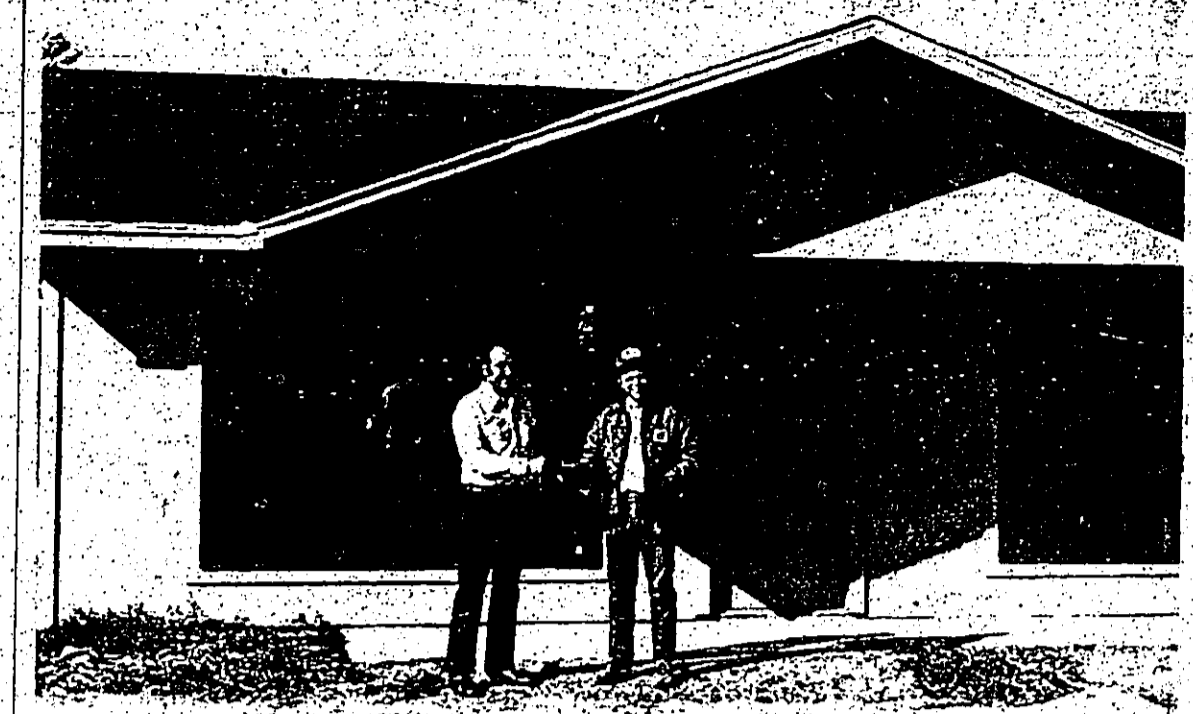

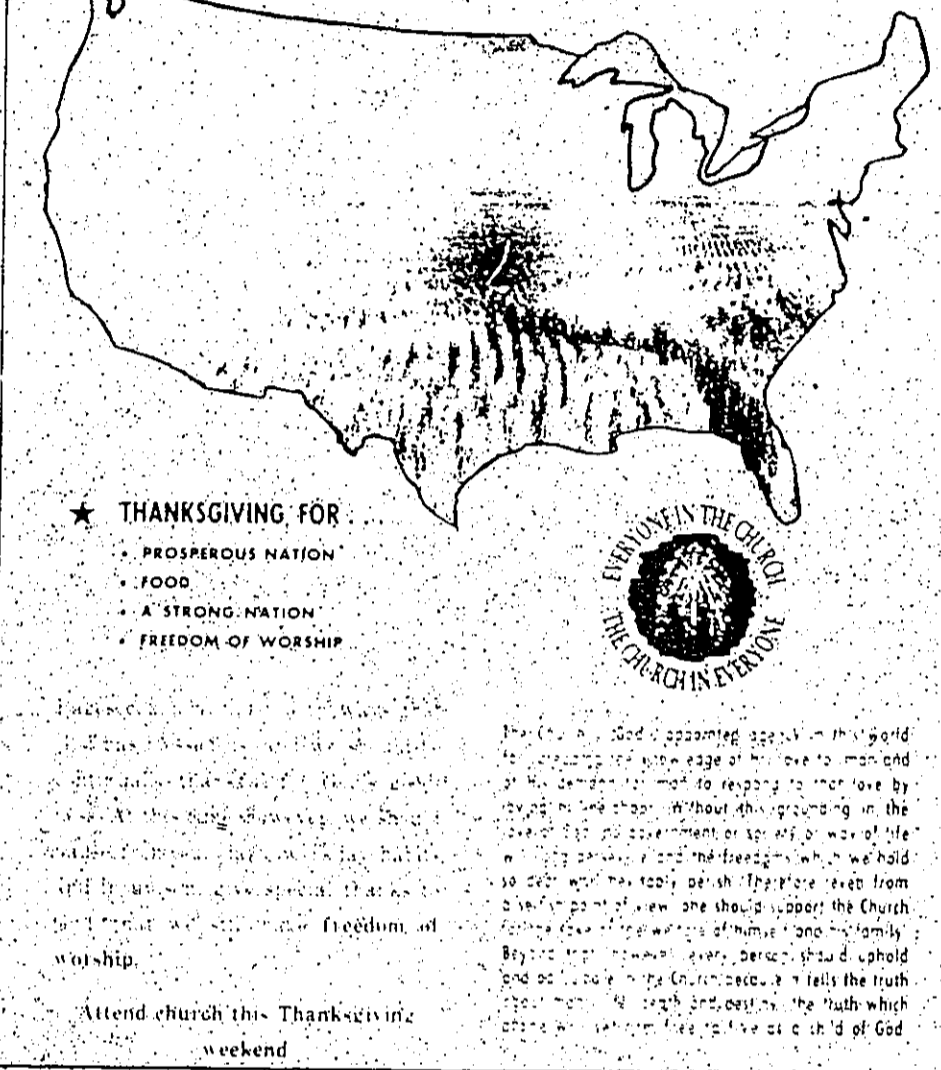

**HEALTH TIPS**  
Can colds be avoided? Colds increase when the winter heating season begins because the dry air in heated rooms parches the nose and throat membranes, which are then more susceptible to virus infection. Dry mucous membranes cannot clear themselves by action of their cilia (hairlike structures), that move mucus upward out of the respiratory system, clearing away germs and viruses. If homes, schools, and places of work can be humidified to about 40% it should help to reduce the common cold infection.

**Rebates Higher**  
AUSTIN - State Comptroller Bob Bullock reports that city tax rebates to Texas cities through November are 11 percent higher than payments during the same period in 1978. He said 1979 payments to date now total \$390.4 million, compared to allocations of \$349.8 million through November of last year.

## Welfare 'Reform' Plan Questioned

The House passed an Administration-backed, liberal welfare "reform" plan that will cost American taxpayers an additional \$3 billion for the first year it is in operation, Congressman Jim Collins of Texas said.

The bill, H.R. 4904, requires all states to support eligible families at 65 percent of the poverty level. This means a guaranteed income for these welfare families of about \$4700 a year.

# Catfish Farming Popular In County

Catfish farming is becoming more popular in Tyler County. More than 65,000 catfish fingerlings have already been delivered in the county this year, according to Clinton

Currie, county extension agent. Most of these fish have been placed in farm and recreational ponds, however, some have gone into special cages for practical research to determine

the method of fish raising for commercial and private use. On April 4, 425 catfish fingerlings, measuring 1.5 inches in length, were placed in a Vexar

plastic mesh cage in Forest Lakes, near Woodville at the home of Carl Nichols. The circular cage measured four feet across and was four feet deep.

Currie and Nichols used these 425 fingerlings as their practical research method. Nichols fed the fish twice daily and kept constant records on their development over six months.

plastic mesh cage in Forest Lakes, near Woodville at the home of Carl Nichols. The circular cage measured four feet across and was four feet deep. Currie and Nichols used these 425 fingerlings as their practical research method. Nichols fed the fish twice daily and kept constant records on their development over six months. When the seven-month period was over, Currie and Nichols harvested a total of 162 pounds of catfish, some weighing as much as 4.5 pounds. The smallest fish in the harvest weighed a quarter of a pound.

This method of raising catfish has many advantages. It requires less space and less water than other methods. The fish are raised in a controlled environment, which reduces the risk of disease. Additionally, the cages are easy to move and can be used in various types of water bodies.

On April 4, 425 catfish fingerlings, measuring about five inches in length, were placed in a Yearling Lake near Woodville at the home of Carl Nichols. The circular cage measured four feet across and was four feet deep. Currie and Nichols used these 425 fingerlings as their "practical research" project. Nichols fed the fish twice daily and kept constant records on their development for seven months. When the seven-month period ended, Currie and Nichols harvested a total of 652 pounds of catfish, some weighing in at from two to three pounds, some smaller. The smallest fish in the harvest weigh three-quarters of one pound. Currie indicated that the best conversion rate of this project was impressive. During the seven-month period, the fish were fed 895 pounds of caged catfish food. This amount, plus 1.4 pounds of feed conversion, in other words, 1.4 pounds of feed resulted in one pound of fish. Nichols said that only two fish died during the project. Two others were used to check for parasites and disease.

Pecans can be stored a long time without becoming discolored or rancid or stale. Pecans can be stored as shelled kernels or in the shell in several locations, including kitchen cabinets at room temperature, refrigerators or freezers. Each has a different storage life. PECAN STORAGE LIFE FOR GOOD QUALITY: Cabinet (70 degrees): 3 months; In-the-shell nuts: 4 months; Refrigerator (50 degrees): 6 months; In-the-shell nuts: 9-18 months; Freezer (0 degrees): 2 years plus. In-the-shell nuts 2 years plus. Areas should be clean, dry and free of odors; have some air circulation, and be out of contact with airtight gas. Unshelled nuts will stay in the shell as long as shelled nuts, although shelled pecans weigh less and take less space than unshelled nuts; they absorb moisture and flavors readily, become "dirty" and state easier and consequently require more careful handling. Pecan kernels will lose their longer life to keep them fresh and crisp.

Wheat Abstract title records reveal the history of Tyler County, Texas, from its early days to the present. The records show the land ownership and transactions that have shaped the county over the years.

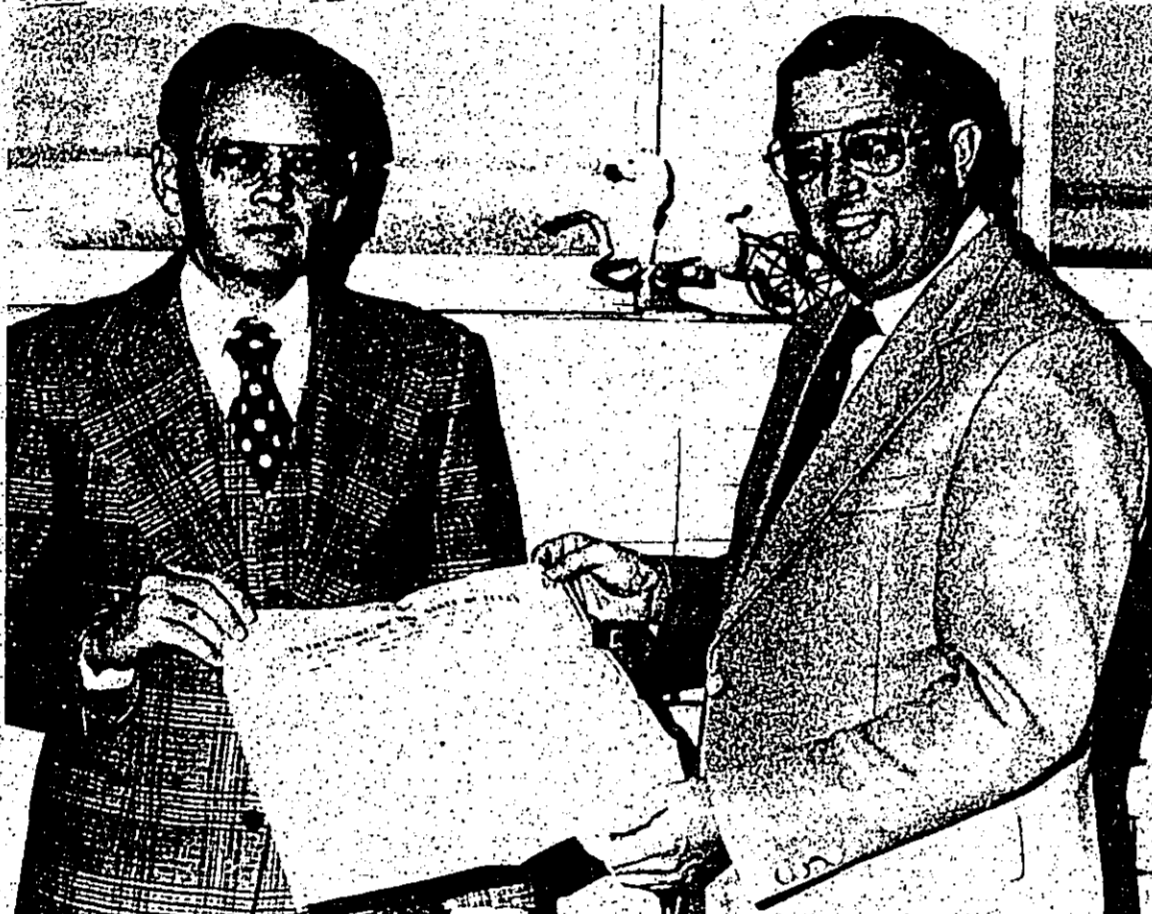
The records are maintained by the County Clerk's office and are available for public viewing. They provide a wealth of information for researchers, historians, and anyone interested in the local history of Tyler County.

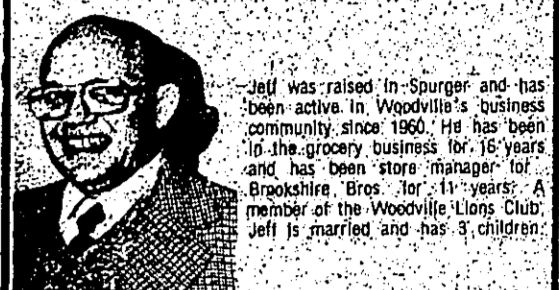

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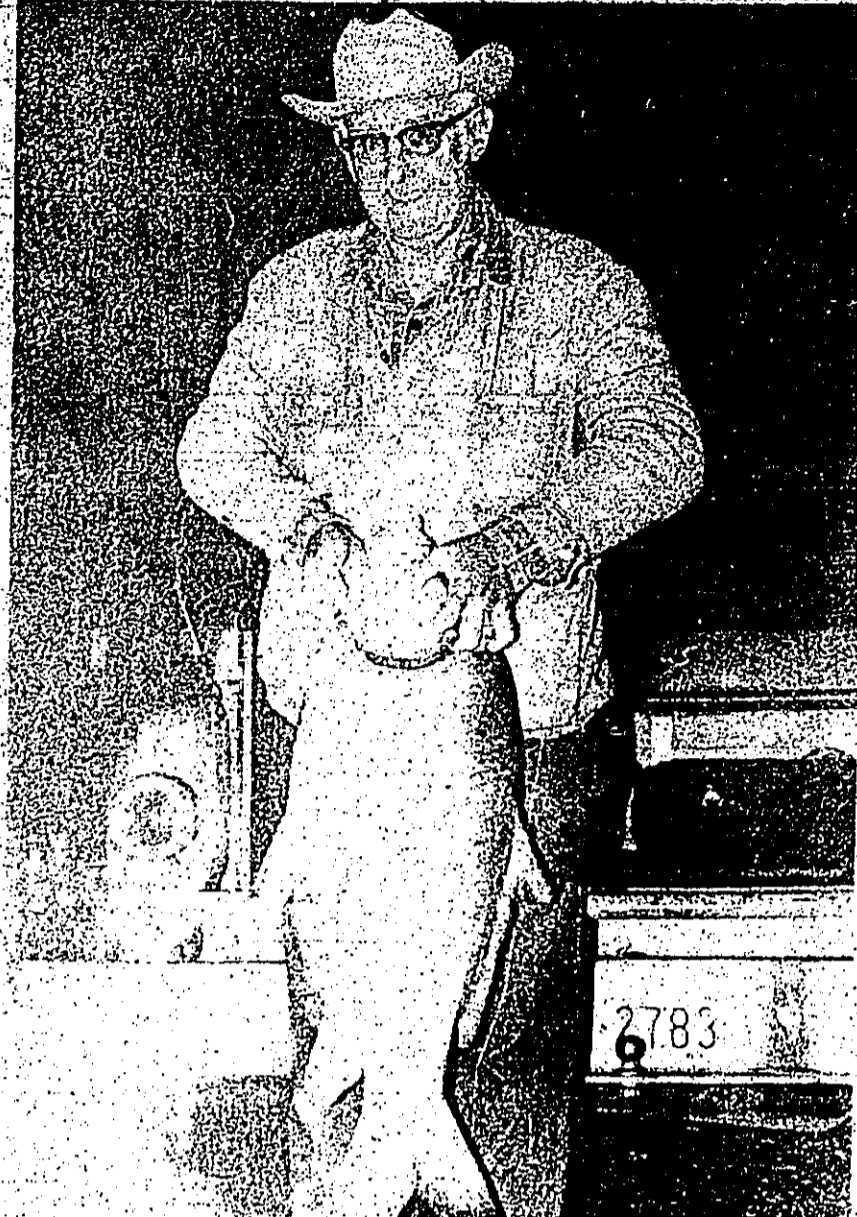

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## Gas Heaters Pose Hazards

Gas heaters and hoses should be checked before being lit for the first time every winter and after they are accidentally hit. The old simple way of running a lighted match near the heater to detect leaks can cause explosions. Smelling for gas and letting a repairman inspect heaters are the best methods of checking heaters. If a gas smell is noticed, flames should be put out until the leak is found and fixed. Gas heaters also need to be checked for major accumulations of dust. Often a filling station air hose can clear any excess dust out easily.

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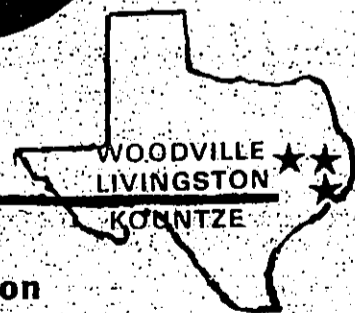
