Bells Ringing In Woodville

The clear, clean sound of bells ringing... calling people to worship, alerting towns of danger, pealing

with joy for celebrations and marking the hours within the pattern of an ordered day... to people in many parts of the world the sound is woven into their daily consciousness.

Outside The First Baptist Church of Woodville, the bell rings on Sunday mornings at 9 a.m. Inside, on Sunday evenings at 6 p.m., other bells ring. The two year old Handbell Choir is practicing Christmas music.

The choir, made up of eight fingers and led by Barry Johnson, is unique in this area. According to Phillip Sherrod, Minister of Music and Education at the church, the 25 Handbells cost \$1,700 and was donated to the church through memorial gifts. Eventually, as other octaves can be acquired, the choir will be expanded and more people can participate in the musical accomplishment and fellowship of the group.

The art of handbell ringing was founded more than 400 years ago in England. Tower bell ringers created the bells in order to practice timing sequences for a Change Ringing. Change Ringing was based on mathematical progressions rather than a

Appraisal Board Members Named

Seven people have been elected to serve as directors of the newly formed Tyler County Appraisal District.

Tyler County, the City of Woodville and the five school districts in Tyler County recently elected one director each to the new appraisal board.

Included on the board are Val Blanchette, Colmesneil Independent School District; Sonny Evans, Warren Independent School District; Jerry

Grimes, Tyler County Commissioner's Court; Grady Holdeman, Woodville Independent School District; Joe Jordan, Spurger Independent School District; Harold Lewis, Chester Independent School District; and Doug Folbert, City of Woodville.

Beginning January 1, 1980, the board members will serve two-year terms. The board is responsible for listing and appraising taxable

property in the district and providing local solutions to the problems of dissatisfied property owners.

Following January 1, 1982, property taxes will be based on the district's appraisal. The interim between 1980 and 1982 will be used to evaluate various methods of appraisal in order to arrive at the best alternative for the county. After that time the appraisal of property by all taxing units ceases and taxable property becomes appraisable by the appraisal district.

New Senior High Opens January 3

Senior high students in the Woodville Independent School District will resume classes at the new high school campus on January 3 following the Christmas-New Year holiday. The students will remove their personal belongings from Kirby High School when they leave for vacation on December 20.

Construction on the modern \$2.5 million facility was begun in January, 1978.

As a result of the new school, expanded space will be created for the lower grades, which will remain on the present campus. Grades 7 and 8, now located in the main Wheat Building, will occupy the two current high school annex buildings. Grades 3 and 4 will move from the Elementary Building to the Wheat Building. Grades 5 and 6 will remain in the Wheat Building. Grades K-2, now in the Primary Building, will be relocated in the Elementary Building.

Family Farm Survival Eyed

COLLEGE STATION - A major challenge to cooperatives in the 1980s is to develop an integrated cooperative grain and livestock marketing system that saves family farm operators in the decade that follows, says an economist at Texas A&M University.

Dr. Ronald D. Knutson, Texas Agricultural Extension Service economist, contends "the question is not so much where we are going but with whom we are going."

More specifically, he says, we are going with proprietary grain companies and great packers or are we going with cooperatives? Every farmer every local elevator manager and every regional cooperative manager has to make that decision," Knutson says.

Four major trends in agriculture, the economist says, will influence the future of the cooperative system. These include: (1) increased producer and U.S. dependence on grain exports; (2) fewer and larger grain traders; (3) a higher world grain supply demand; and (4) a riskier, more integrated livestock industry.

"Combining these trends, and you have sharply increased grain contracting, which will come before grain producers make their production decisions and will almost certainly come before harvest," Knutson says.

He sees a direct relationship between developments in the livestock industry and grain marketing.

"Beef feeding and hog production are moving rapidly on the same large scale, integrated direction as broilers, turkeys and eggs. Poultry, Cargill is the largest U.S. cattle feeder while Continental is the ninth largest. These trends have profound significance for livestock and grain producers as well as international cooperative grain marketing system. Such a multination cooperative would be owned by cooperatives located in market economies throughout the world.

"Integrate the cooperative livestock and grain marketing system. Without this action, the whole family farm system is in jeopardy," Knutson contends.

Pets for children often help children learn about compassion and caring.

As parents recognize that ownership of a pet for your child is really a partnership with you.

Assigning him the responsibility of the child may be giving him more than he's ready to assume.

This can result in dissatisfaction for the child, frustration for the parents, and potential doom for the pet.

Most children are not ready for partial responsibility of pet until they're school age.

Even then, limit your expectations of their responsibility in keeping with their abilities.

Parents can help most setting examples and involving children in parent-child tasks.

These can include feeding, cleaning the pet's facilities and other aspects of pet care.

Usually the child can handle more of the tasks. It's also helpful to discuss the pet's special needs with your child; and to establish a routine for his care.

Make allowances for "forgetting," but help the child understand how the pet depends on him.

Pets have value for their owners. They learn about nature. They also teach humane values and responsibility. In selecting a pet, choose with the age and maturity of the child in mind. Safety of the child and the pet are most important.

Remember, when a child shows a desire for a pet and promises to take care of it, he's showing good intentions. However, the responsibility rarely rests with the child alone. It's a partnership that needs parental commitment, too.

Some Ideas On Cooking Turkey

COLLEGE STATION - Stuffed turkey or roasted turkey with dressing is the star attraction of many Christmas meals. However, a few precautions should be followed to make sure that the stuffing is of the highest quality and entirely safe.

Problems with a stuffed turkey may result from under-cooking. Other safety hazards may arise if the stuffed turkey is stored prior to cooking. If improperly handled, bacteria can be introduced into the turkey body cavity. Like most living things, bacteria require proper nutrients, moisture, and temperature. Generally, bacteria are introduced when the stuffing is prepared.

After serving the turkey and stuffing, remove the remaining dressing from the turkey body cavity and the meat from the carcass before stuffing each in the refrigerator. This will assure a shorter cooling period for the stuffing as well as the turkey.

"Always refrigerate leftover stuffing and turkey as quickly as possible to assure rapid cooling and prevent any possible growth of bacteria. Stuffing and meat should both be refrigerated at least within four hours after removal from the oven. Plan to use cooked, refrigerated stuffing and turkey within five days," Mellor suggests.

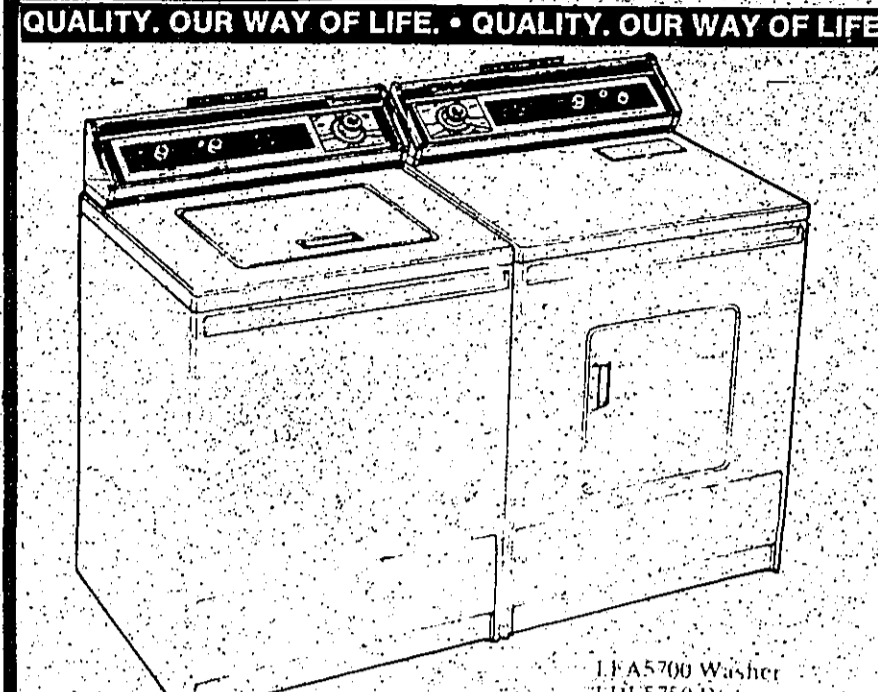

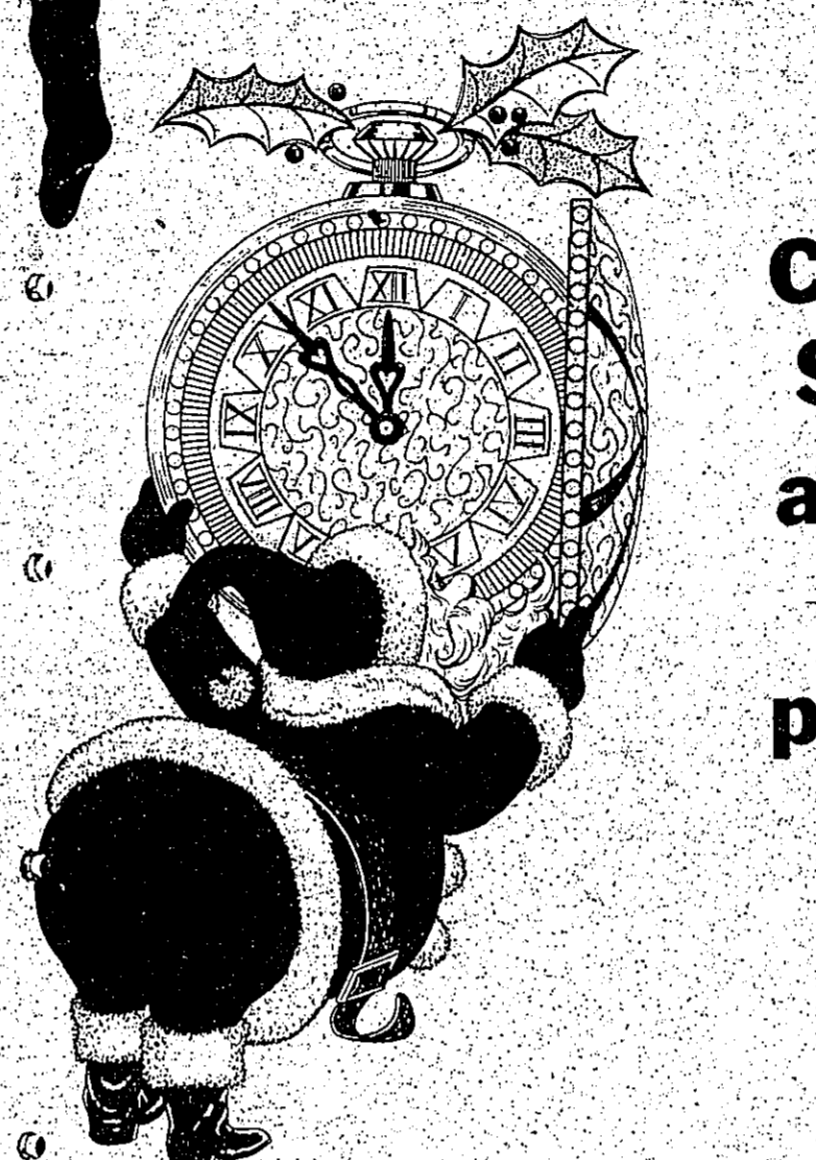

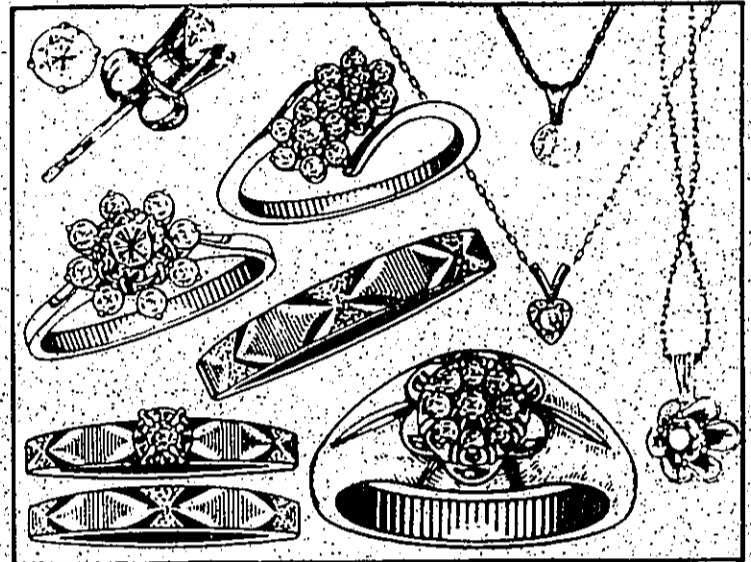

Deer populations have expanded rapidly in recent years throughout most of Tyler County resulting in total deer populations of about 18,000 deer according to the latest Parks and Wildlife Department biologist for expert advice. However, as a "rule of thumb" biologist have found that in most instances a landowner may harvest almost as many does as bucks each year without reducing populations. The reason for this is simple. Your deer herd is producing about as many doe fawns each year as buck fawns each year. For example, if you are harvesting about ten bucks per year on the average and maintaining a stable buck population through your buck fawn production, then you could expect about the same results from a similar doe harvest. After all, one-half of your fawns produced each year are does and will be available to replace the loss. This principle has been long applied in live-stock management and applies to deer as well.

The Parks and Wildlife Department is interested in assisting landowners and sportsmen in Tyler County in the proper management of area deer herds. The goal of the agency is to provide technical assistance and regulations which will permit every landowner and sportsman to properly manage his deer herd if he so desires.

Already deer herds in many areas of Tyler County have exceeded safe limits and have reduced food supplies through over-browsing. Unless these populations can be controlled through an increased harvest, landowners and sportsmen can expect to see herds decline due to reduced food supplies resulting from over-browsing. In addition, as populations reach high levels and food supplies become short during critical periods, we will see further reductions in antler quality, body size and fawn survival.

Most landowners and sportsmen in the county should find these general facts about the county deer herd interesting and informative but biologists realize that most people are primarily interested in the land that they lie on or lease for hunting, and average landowners, hunters or sportsmen really want more specific information about their local deer populations.

One question that concerns many people is "How many antlerless deer can be harvested on my place without reducing my population?" The answer to this question is not always simple and the concerned individual should consult with the local Parks and Wildlife Department biologist for expert advice. Gulf States Begins Experimental Rates

Two experimental electric rates have been instituted for Texas residential customers of Gulf States Utilities. The new rates are meant to benefit low usage customers who install solar water or space heating units to supplement existing electric water or space heating units.

The new rates were developed in a negotiated rate case filed during the summer and approved by the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT) Nov. 27. Both the PUCT commissioners and GSU's senior vice president, Thomas H. Burbank, emphasized the new rates are strictly experimental and their effects will be carefully studied by the company and the commission.

The low usage rate is based on the winter and summer electric rates. Summer rates, in effect from June to October, are one-half cent per kilowatt-hour higher than winter rates. Under the new rate customers are charged the cheaper winter rate during summer months if they use 500 kilowatt-hours or less per month. If usage exceeds 500 kilowatt-hours, the customer will be charged the summer rate for the entire month. Average residential electric consumption for GSU customers is more than 1000 kwh per month.

GSU's Burbank said the company is not sure the rate will benefit those for whom it is intended. He said it may have greater mental and can be rescinded by the PUCT, a person should not be installed solar heating systems solely on the present economics.

Pork Remains Good Consumer Buy

COLLEGE STA. — Pork should be plentiful and therefore a good buy for consumers for the remainder of 1979 and the first half of 1980. However, pork producers are struggling to pay the feed bill, and pork prices are being pushed up by a decline in real income. Consequently, the outlook for choice beef is "near" inflation. Today, the other less expensive meat products, such as ham, sausage, and bacon, are being purchased in large quantities. According to Davis, the year-to-year change in slaughter over the next 10 months is expected to be near zero. The average retail price of meat products has been reduced by 10 percent since September 1979. Through sow slaughter last year a difference of 98 cents slaughter has been inventoried.

Now's Time To Test Soil

By Clinton R. Currie, County Extension Agent

Fall and winter are good times for soil testing. However, soil samples are available from the laboratory in advance of planting to obtain needed fertilizer recommendations. In many instances, soil samples as soon as they arrive, and reports are mailed within five to seven days.

Use of a new soil analysis program has a data base which helped speed up the testing process. However, soil testing, until now, has been a slow process. It takes time to have temperature, pH, and nutrient levels tested. A soil test can result in a report that lists the nutrient levels of the soil and the amount of fertilizer needed to bring the soil up to normal. Laboratory spots in fields are larger than 40 acres. Letting one sample represent fields as large as 100 to 200 acres only gives a general information.

For specific information, the sampling unit should be as uniform as possible. The size will depend on the number of factors, in this case, soil variation. To get reliable information from a soil test, the sample must be as nearly representative of soil in the field as possible. For a soil as well as past and future cropping practices, make a composite by taking a core of soil from 10 to 15 spots in a field. Collect a good sample and fill out the information sheet as completely as possible. You may contact the county extension office for detail on how soil tests can supply the news for this week.

Inflation Control Possible

FORT WORTH — The bad news is the cost of energy. The good news is that there is a cure for inflation. And that's the picture for business in the 1980s.

"The key factor in bringing inflation under control is to stimulate supply, to have business produce more," said Dr. Block, who is currently writing two books on business. "We are usually worried about stimulating demand, but our problem now is inadequate supply. We are using solutions of the '30s and '50s, and they won't work for the '80s."

The decade of the 1970s saw greater regulation on business, weak markets, and time for "seat-of-the-pants" operations, great volatility in interest rates and profitability, but a time when the most able could prosper beyond normal.

The TCU professor explained that the 1970s brought in "stagflation," a philosophy which dictated that the public buy, not save. "The idea is 'buy it now or it'll cost you more tomorrow.'"

"This was the decade we had to accept the fact that recession doesn't necessarily break the back of inflation, something we used to take for granted."

Prevent Holiday Fires

COLLEGE — STA. Prevent holiday fires with simple safety steps, cautions Claudia Kerbel.

Mr. Kerbel is a consumer specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

Here are the safety steps to remember:

- 1) Keep the Christmas tree away from radiators and heaters.
- 2) Place it in a water stand and water it daily.
- 3) Disposition of the tree when needles begin to fall in large quantities — a sign it is dangerously dry.
- 4) Check labels before buying outdoor lights — to make sure they're weatherproof.
- 5) Check tree lights and outdoor lights each year before using.
- 6) Look for frayed wires, loose connections, broken or cracked sockets, and spots where bare wire is exposed.
- 7) Don't set up electric trains or similar equipment near the tree.
- 8) Don't overload electrical outlets. Don't put more than three sets of lights on one extension cord.
- 9) In decorating water supply of a live tree — never use a balanced ladder, never a box, bench or chair.
- 10) Never use wax candles on a tree, near it or near other flammable items, such as pine boughs.
- 11) Teach children the importance of these safety steps. Make an emergency plan to use if fire breaks out anywhere in the house.

Be sure each family member knows what to do.

Weekly Agri Report

As the year draws to a end, agricultural producers should be concerned with tax management decisions which could save them money. According to Wayne Taylor, area economist-manager for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, now is the time for farmers who report income tax on a cash basis to do some tax management.

Taylor says the first step is to determine where the business is right now. Good records certainly help in this process. Next, summarize year-to-date income and expenses and estimate the sales and expenses for the remainder of this year, through December 31. Then, look at last year's tax return and estimate the deductions for depreciation for 1979.

Farm income, minus cash expenses and depreciation, results in an estimate of net farm income.

A few examples are: questions about Medicare requests for retirement benefits; address changes from social security; beneficiaries to insure promptly delivery of their monthly checks; beneficiaries reports of earnings; questions about the disability provisions of the law; supplemental security income. The agency refers to this type of service as:

Christmas Packaging Tips

Why take a chance of dampening someone's holiday spirit by sending poorly wrapped Christmas gifts through the mail? Officer-in-Charge Elmer Hanna asks.

According to Hanna, customers can be assured that their gifts will arrive in good condition if the following packaging tips are followed:

A single item in a package should be cushioned with shredded paper, excelsior, compressed tissue paper, cloth, or expanded plastic foam. If two or more items are in the same carton, cushioning material should protect items from contact with

each other, and each item should have its own individual inner carton.

Fiberboard containers, including large soap, cereal boxes, etc. larger than the gift being mailed, should be cut down to about the size of the gift to minimize shifting of contents in transit. However, breakable items should have at least one inch clearance between the sides of the boxes and the item to provide adequate room for cushioning.

Fiberboard should have "pound test" strength of at least 175. This is usually shown in the box maker's certificate on the bottom of the box.

Fragile articles must be individually cushioned, and all four sides of the container should be padded with cushioning material.

The Post Office suggests fiber reinforced tape be used to seal the parcel. Do not use masking tape.

When paper must be used for the outer wrapping, it should be at least equal in quality and strength to the kraft stock used for grocery bags. However, it is preferable that paper wrappers be omitted if the box itself contains an adequate shipping con-

tainer. Each package should contain the name and address of the person to whom it is being mailed inside the package as well as outside. An address contained inside is assurance that it will be received promptly even if the outside address should become lost or obliterated.

Be sure to put your return address on the package. And, finally, address the package correctly and legibly so that it can be read at two feet. Be sure to include the ZIP Code with the address. Do not abbreviate ZIP CODE. Be sure to address the package to the outside of the parcel. Do not use more than one mailing address. Regular post should be assured timely before Christmas.
