Do you remember when there was a community celebration of Christmas in Woodville? "Miss Winnie" Matthews does.

The store is neat as a pin. Built in 1934, and bought by the Matthews in 1936, the building with its embossed tin ceiling and light-filled windows is warm and welcoming on a blustery winter day.

Joe just this week has released a record album entitled "The Good Old Days" which contains some funny material and stories about his past.

Weeks, 58, said that he has told funny stories for years and finally decided that he would turn his long-time hobby into a new career. He is a retired Merchant Marine officer and started making notes and keeping a log of his sea-going experiences many years ago. He says he has also noted some early memories of his childhood growing up in the Camp Ground community west of Woodville.

Weeks said he was still going to sea when his hobby began to fill his leisure hours. He added humorous stories and old time tales to his material as time rolled on this became enough material to put on tape.

After open-heart surgery in 1973 forced his early retirement, he once more turned his attention to writing. During a long period of recuperation, he completed a book manuscript and copyrighted all of his written work.

Weeks has been called on many occasions as an after-dinner speaker to share these stories and experiences with various organizations in East Texas.

This Fall he recorded an album at Caldwell Studios in Lubbock. The record is a collection of humorous tales and a special script entitled "The Houston Story."

The album went on sale this week at stores throughout this region and can be purchased in Woodville at Jarrott's Pharmacy and at Bob's Prescription Shop, and at Ace Grocery in Warren.

Notary Requirement Clarified

Tyler County Clerk Grace Bostick has noted a new requirement that notaries public in Tyler County must now obtain their reappointments from Secretary of State George Strake and not from her office.

The new regulation goes into effect January 1, 1980.

Other changes authorized by the voters will also be instituted with the new year. These include a four year instead of a two year appointment and statewide, instead of countywide, jurisdiction for notaries public.

Clerk Bostick explained that those Tyler County residents who are notaries now will be notified 90 days before their current appointment expires and they will be required to make application to Austin for reappointment.

Those who want to become notaries will have all their dealings with the secretary of state, including requesting application forms. The ones Bostick has in her office cannot be used to make application for statewide notary authority.

Some old regulations, however, are still in force. An applicant must (Continued on page 3A)

Political Filing Date Revealed

Potential candidates for the upcoming elections in Tyler County are reminded by County Clerk Grace Bostick of two key deadlines.

JANUARY 5, 1980 -- An application to have the name of the candidate placed on the ballot for any election (first primary) may not be filed earlier than 30 days before the deadline.

FEBRUARY 4, 1980 -- Candidates for statewide offices and candidates for district offices, located in more than one county file with the State Chairman application to have name placed on ballot with filing fee not later than 8 p.m. on the first Monday in February preceding primary election.

'Funds' Issue Undecided

The Tyler County Commissioner's Court is still undecided over what

action, if any, to take regarding an alleged discrepancy of funds in Precinct 3 Justice of the Peace Frank Grime's office.

In a called meeting Monday commissioners were informed by Tyler County Attorney Rols Brockman that the written recommendation on the matter that he and attorney John Kinney were scheduled to present to the court had not been completed. Commissioners had agreed at a November 26 meeting to seek legal recommendations before proceeding with the discrepancy of funds issue. At that meeting the court voted to hire attorney Kinney to assist Brockman in the preparation of the recommendation. The recommendation was to be presented at the meeting Monday.

Commissioners postponed any action on the matter until January 14, when the attorneys' report is now scheduled to be presented.

In an earlier meeting on December 14, Tyler County Sheriff Lewis Craven appeared before the court and requested that funds of \$6,000 which have been designated for a new car for his department in this year's budget be carried over into next year's budget. According to Craven, the car that would be replaced with the funds is still usable for another

5,000 miles. The court voted to amend the 1979 budget to reabsorb the \$6,000. (Continued on page 2A)

I apparently said something to the effect that the newspaper was an accomplice to the crime of the killing of an endangered species by running the picture.

Last week I checked with the Department of Parks and Wildlife about the bobcat and their representative told me that the bobcat was not an endangered species in Texas and is a legal kill.

This past Saturday, the man obviously came by the office, also when I was not in, and left a long list of endangered and threatened species in Texas, which was proposed and under review by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in August 1978. The bobcat was indeed listed on this publication. However, since the list provided by this person was proposed and under review, and obviously not yet adopted for Texas, the bobcat was apparently later taken off.

If our running the picture of the slain bobcat upset anyone, we are certainly sorry. I think the bobcat is a beautiful animal and personally would not kill one unless the animal was a threat of some sort.

The girls' team, with a 6-2 record, will travel to the Leggett Tournament Thursday, December 27, to meet its first opponent.

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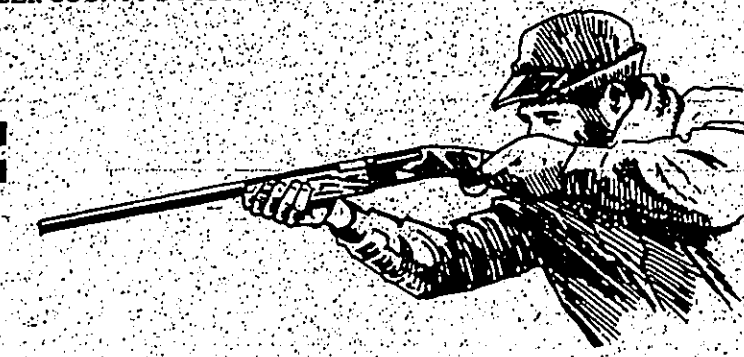

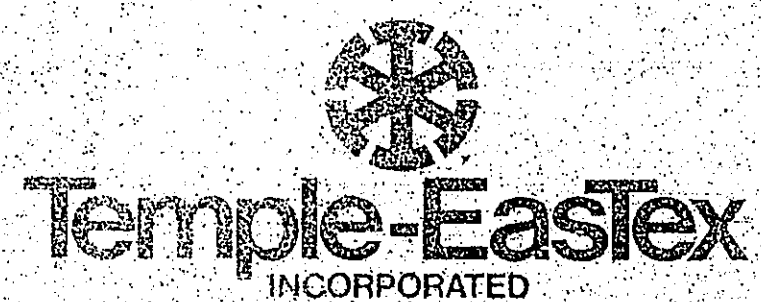


A VISIT FROM ST. NICHOLAS

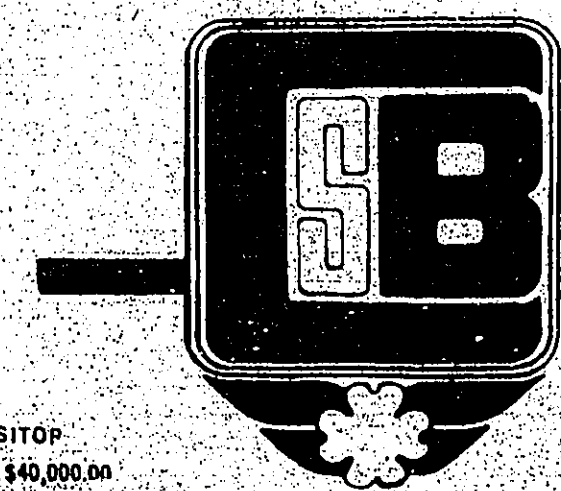

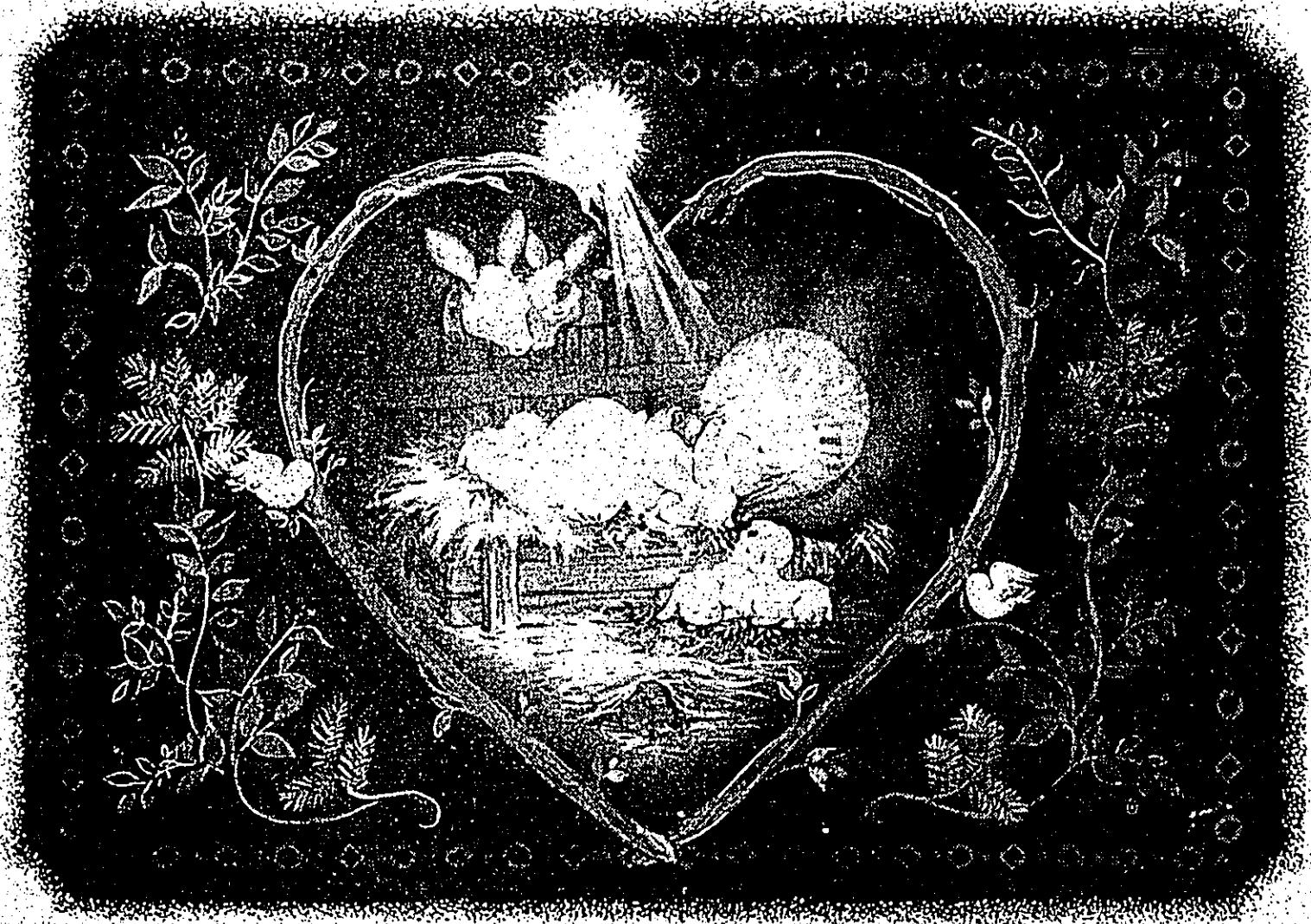

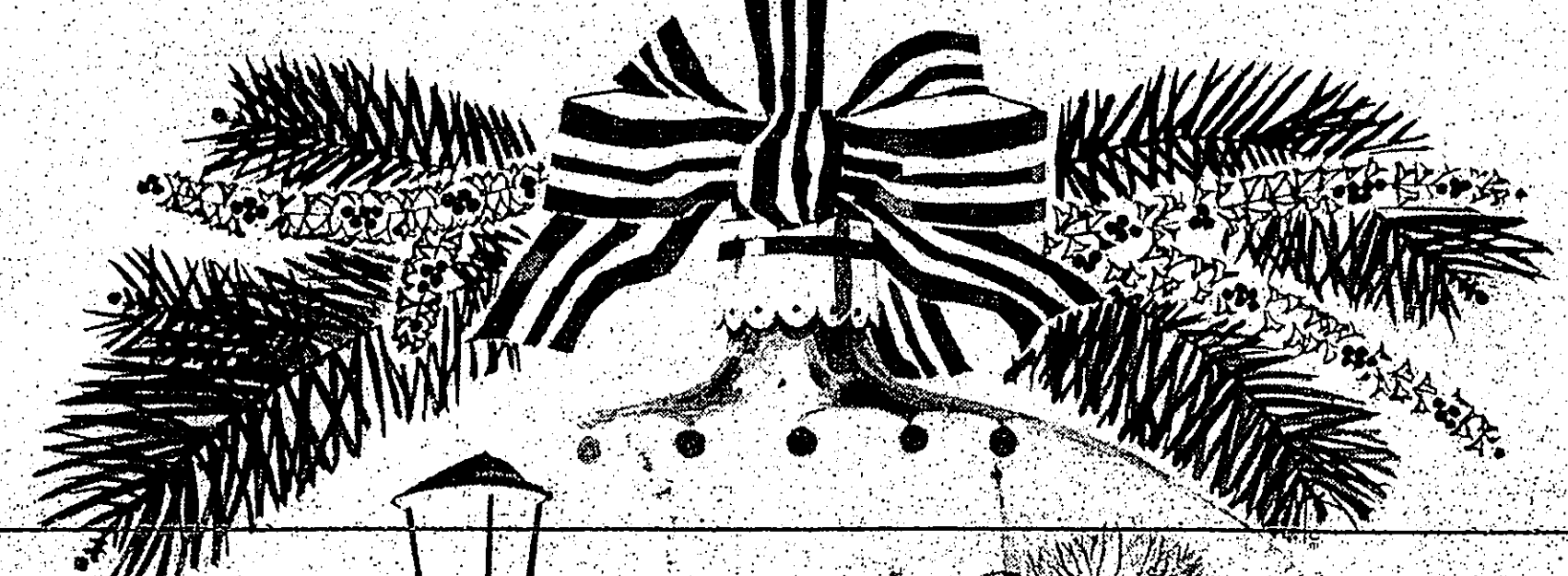

Treasury Announces New Bonds

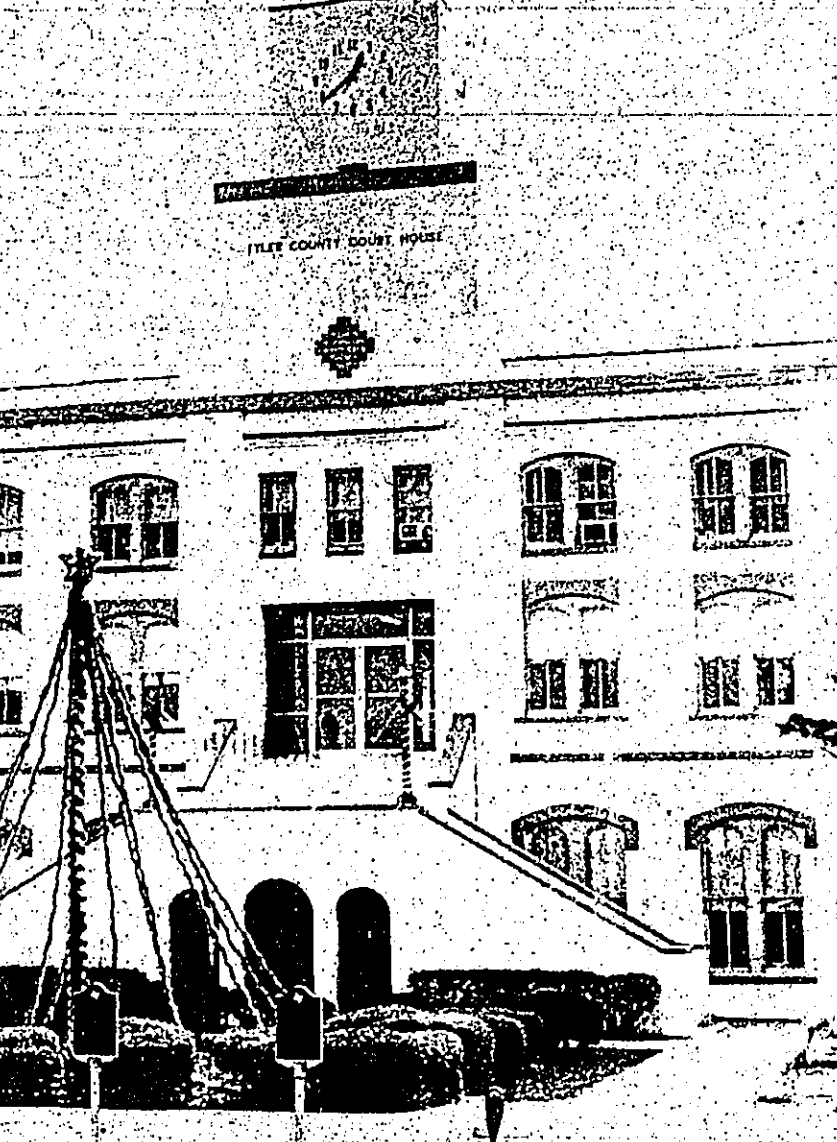
The Treasury Department today announced that the new Series EE saving bonds, which go on sale effective January 1, 1980, will be called United States Energy Savings Bonds. Series EE will receive a 1/4 percent bonus if held to maturity.

The interest rate on U.S. Energy Savings Bonds, Series EE, will be increased from 6.5 percent to 7 percent for bonds held for the full 11 years to maturity. Series F bonds that have not finally matured and U.S. Savings Notes ("Freedom Shares") will also receive the 7 percent bonus if they are held for 11 years from the date of the first semiannual interest period that begins on or after January 1, 1980. Bonds and notes redeemed earlier will not receive the bonus.

The re-designation of the bonds as Energy Savings Bonds is intended to help focus attention on the national goals of reducing energy consumption and increasing domestic supplies. The bonds were known as Defense Bonds before and after World War II and as U.S. Bonds from 1941 to 1945 reflecting the national concern of those times. The Energy Savings Bonds will assist in financing the large Federal energy expenditure required in the coming years.

After June 30, 1980, all U.S. Savings Bonds bought through payroll savings plans will be Energy Savings Bonds. Series EE, Series F and HH Savings Bonds will not be affected by these changes.

Fertilize Early

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP)—Farmers might be able to save some money as well as get a jump on the 1980 crop year by fertilizing early.

The possibility of shorter fertilizer supplies and much higher costs next spring should provide some incentive for farmers to put out fertilizer early for next spring's crops, believes Dr. Charles Welch, soil chemist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Increased crop acreages, export demands and reduced fertilizer production have caused a shortage in fertilizer inventories, points out Welch. This, coupled with an increasing transportation problem, makes it uncertain and difficult for many local fertilizer dealers to obtain fertilizer to maintain a desired inventory level.

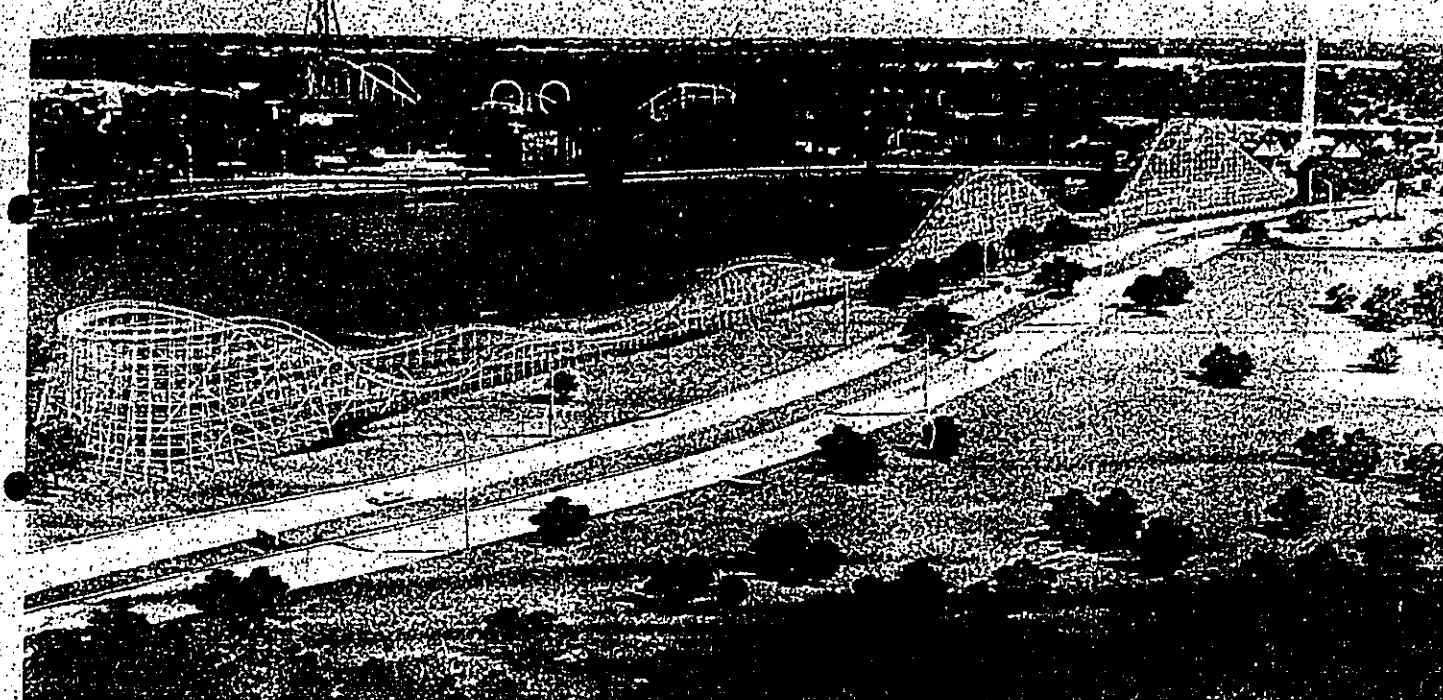

A sprawling, two million dollar, wooden roller coaster will be through an 80-foot-long tunnel which will begin inside the present park boundaries and extend to the new addition.

The theme park's general manager, Ray Williams, said the huge ride will occupy a 7.4-acre site on the shore of park's entrance lake. It is the largest addition, in terms of land area, in the park's history.

Williams said, "And, it's the first phase of a long-term program which will ultimately bring the entire lake area into the entertainment complex."

Construction of the coaster, which will be called "Judge Roy Scream," is already underway with completion scheduled for the opening day of Six Flags' twentieth season, March 1.

Williams said the new coaster will feature a first plunge of 65 feet to 30 seconds.

That first drop will be so steep that you will have the sensation of falling straight down," he said. "The top speed will be 50 miles an hour, the entire ride, from drop to end, will be 2,500 feet of track."

The capacity of the ride will be about 1,200 passengers per hour," he added. "That is double the capacity of The Big Bend Coaster which has been phased out because of low capacity and long lines."

"Judge Roy Scream" is a name we've already had a lot of fun with," Williams commented. "Each of the 'Judge's' two trains will carry 24 passengers and we're seriously considering calling them 'Law' and 'Order' or, perhaps, 'Jersey' and 'Lilly'."

Williams said access to the new ride will be through an 80-foot-long tunnel which will begin inside the present park boundaries and extend to the new addition.

In addition to the coaster, Williams said Six Flags will make major modifications of the park's Caddo Indian Canoe lake area to accommodate a fireworks spectacular.

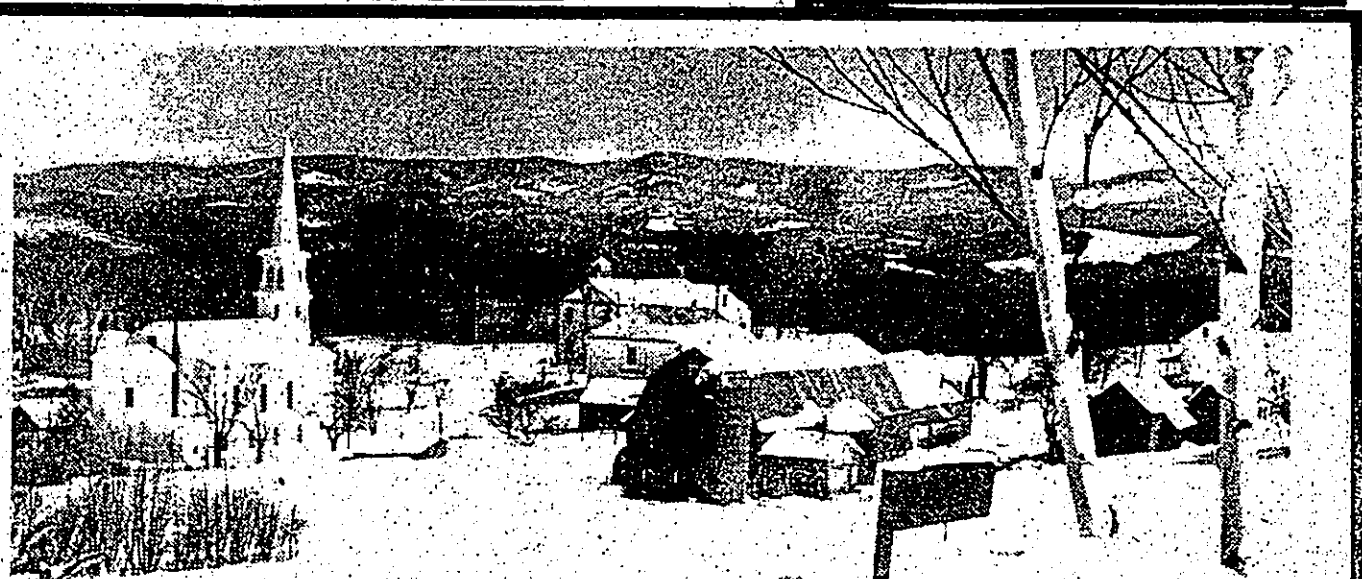
The canoe ride will remain, he explained, but one of the islands in the lake will be removed to make room for a ground-level, fireworks display and the lake's expanded area to provide a viewing area for up to 2,000 persons.

Williams said the fireworks shows will be staged nightly from late May until Labor Day, and will feature both pyrotechnics and Spectaculars of Los Angeles, the show will require a staff of six technicians to rig the colorful devices used in each night's presentation.

Cost of the production will be in excess of \$100,000.

Highlights

AUSTIN - The shutdowns of low-level nuclear waste dumps in other states may prompt Texas to create a dump of its own.

Although Texas has several sites which generate nuclear waste, the state has no permanent site for disposal of such wastes and has been shipping the dumps in South Carolina, Washington and Nevada. Only the South Carolina dump is still operating and officials there announced recently it would not take on the wastes refused by other states.

Texas now has to find a place to ship the radioactive wastes which are accumulating here. Health Department officials predict the wastes could pile up for six months to a year, before the state faces a major problem.

Last session the Texas Legislature rejected a bill to create a low-level nuclear waste dump somewhere in Texas because the penalty to other states for illegal dumping was \$200, the same fine for littering on the highways. The Nevada and Washington dumps shut down after illegal dumping was discovered at those sites.

Gov. Bill Clements long ago expressed his willingness to create a dump site in Texas, and lawmakers are now mulling over the problem. Strong sentiment exists that if Texas does create a waste dump, then the facilities should accept only Texas waste and none from any other states.

TUITION LOW IN TEXAS
A brighter note for Texas came last week from Higher Education Commissioner Kenneth Ashworth who told a legislative committee that state university tuition and fees would still be among the lowest in the nation, even if tuition doubled.

He stopped short of recommending an increase, though. The Coordinating Board will consider such a proposal in January.

REDNECK ATTITUDE
Institutions of higher learning came under attack from Gov. Bill Clements two weeks ago when he charged they probably wasted more money and tax than any other state agency.

Clements himself drew criticism from Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby for that comment.

Hobby told reporters that there is already a strong current of "anti-intellectualism" in the Legislature, but it should be the duty of the governor to counteract that sort of thing rather than give it redneck reinforcement.

He backed higher education as "very well run" and added, "If there were far too much tax money there, I think we could not do it."

BLACK-HISPANIC COALITION
Controversial Ruben Bonilla, national president of the League of Latin American Citizens and a Texas native, flew to New York last week to meet with the director of the National Urban League.

The subject, creation of a working coalition between blacks and Mexican-Americans.

The Corpus Christi attorney said minorities are concerned they are losing ground in the area of civil rights.

Bonilla, who has been outspoken in the past months, also blasted U.S. District Judge Ross Sterling of Houston for sentencing three former Houston police officers to one year and one day in prison for violating the civil rights of Joe Campos Torres. Torres died in police custody after he was beaten and thrown into a bayou by the officers.

Sterling's removal from the bench will be priority Hispanic issue, Bonilla vowed.

LET SEEKERS REFUND
Former Attorney General John Hill asked Dallas County to refund half of money he paid for a recount of county votes last year in his race against Gov. Bill Clements.

Hill said he was due the money not spent in the recount, about \$1,000 of the \$2,071 he paid.

GARWOOD NAMED
Governor Clements has appointed Austin attorney Will Garwood as associate justice of the Texas Supreme Court. He replaces Sam D. Johnson, who is now judge of the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals. Garwood is expected to seek a full term as a Republican in the 1980 election.

REP. ROBERTS TO RETIRE
U.S. Rep. Ray Roberts, D-McKinney, announced he will retire at the end of the 96th Congress. Roberts, 66, touched off a flurry of political activity in the 4th Congressional District. One observer predicted the district will be split by redistricting.

ATTORNEY GENERAL OPINION
Atty. Gen. Mark White, in a legal opinion ruled expert witnesses at criminal trials cannot be paid greater fees as witnesses than other witnesses.

On Mood Over Iran

Several news commentators and columnists have noted recently that the national mood over the hostage situation in Iran is much the same as the days following the Japanese attack at Pearl Harbor in 1941.

An incessantly warm day in the Pacific Northwest, a leisurely late Sunday morning, and then the flash bulletin over the radio that a Navy fleet anchored in the Hawaiian Islands had been bombed and strafed by Japanese pilots.

As the week went by with the Japanese invading the Philippines, names like Corregidor and Bataan were as prominent in the headlines as Khmeint and Tehran are today.

And there are similarities today in the two eras. With most of the Pacific Fleet on the bottom at Pearl Harbor our Air Force destroyed on the ground, we were in no military position to counter the Japanese. Our military forces were a shambles, and our intelligence operations provided very little hard news.

We were frustrated, realizing how few options we had. Recognize the symptoms?

There was a unity of purpose in those dark weeks of World War II. Every recruiting center had long lines of young men, since they had no rifles. At the Navy base where we were, civilian clothes were the order of the day, since there were no uniforms.

But it was amazing how quickly we got our act together. The Navy teaches us anything, let's hope it is that we keep our guard up from now on. We do have strategic interests around the world. There are regions where we must play an active and forceful role. Our dependence on foreign suppliers doesn't give us the luxury of non-involvement as we have tried to do since Vietnam and Watergate.

The billions of dollars we poured into Europe and Asia after World War II were humanitarian in nature. Helping those nations that had been blasted flat through six years of war.

There was another side of the coin. Those same billions of dollars created a market for American products overseas, and we kicked off one of the biggest economic booms this country has ever seen.

Maybe we are reaching that goal again. A sense of purpose and dedication to do those things that make this country great. A commitment to create a society that supports its friends, and equips the aggressive threats of its enemies. President Teddy Roosevelt had an apt phrase to define United States policy as he saw it.

"Walk softly, and carry a big stick."

His Great White Fleet of U.S. Navy ships called at ports around the world, showing the flag, establishing an American presence in those areas where we had an economic investment or military considerations.

We may not get the most glowing press reports for our future actions. But the need for us to stand up to the brags of the future is, and there will be more - is paramount to our future existence as a world-wide power.

Victims Of Crime May Get Relief

Victims Of Crime May Get Relief

AUSTIN - As of January 1 crime victims and citizens who suffer personal injury or death in the prevention of crime or the apprehension of criminals may be reimbursed for pain and loss of income as a result of action taken by the 66th Legislature.

Under the new Crime Victims Compensation Act, any Texas resident damaged by a crime in Texas after January 1 may be eligible for compensation if he or she files a claim with the Industrial Accident Board within 180 days of crime. The claimant must also have reported the crime to authorities within 72 hours to be eligible for compensation.

Crime victims may receive up to a maximum of \$50,000. This maximum sum is broken down as a maximum of \$150 per week, plus \$20 a week for each child, not to exceed 75. Medical and funeral expenses are also included. Victims of family crimes, such as battered spouses and abused children, and victims of automobile accidents are excluded from the act.
