New Year's Tradition

Blackeyed Pea Custom Began In Athens, Texas

New Year's customs vary from state to state, country to country, even area to area. Watch services are held, resolutions are made, all night revelries are well-attended, and certain foods are eaten for luck.

Of all the customs, perhaps the two most widely known are the making of resolutions and eating of certain foods for luck. An old Smokey Mountain custom is eating boiled cabbage into which the dimes have been placed. Anyone receiving a dime is assured financial good luck for the coming year, so the legend goes.

The most well-known custom in our area of the world is the eating of blackeyed peas and hog jowl for good luck. For any "damnyankees" who do not know what this delicacy is, the "blackeyed pea" is the edible seed of the cowpea.

Outside of Texas, people for years thought of the cowpea as only feed for cattle. As a result of Texans' efforts and travels it is now known as a delicious nutritious vegetable. Back in the early 30's, so the tale goes, a group of Athens, Texas farmers and businessmen found themselves struggling with the depression prices and a bumper crop of blackeyed peas. As a half-joking idea, someone suggested eating blackeyed peas for good luck on New Year's Day. The suggestion was picked up and has become a New Year's tradition.

In recent years, enterprising Texans have even come up with a Texas Caviar made from blackeyes. This is a delicious dip for New Year's entertaining. Another delicious way of preparing "Blackeyes" for New Year's or any other day is Hopping John. This dish, similar to Jambalaya is said to have derived its name from the children dancing around the table until the dish was served.

The Woodville Independent School District will continue to use the elementary cafeteria, which is located in a separate building nearby, for the time being.

In other action at the meeting, regular reports and the annual audit for the school year of 1978-1979 were approved.

The board went into executive session to discuss a called meeting on December 19 concerning the Dora Mae Barlow case.

The Candidates wishing to have their names placed on the Democratic ballot should file at the office of Democratic Chairman Morris Clemmons beginning January 5, 1980 and ending February 4, 1980 at 6:00 p.m. Republicans wishing to file should file with Republican Chairman James Dillon.

Persons having questions concerning the election are asked to contact their County Chairman.

LIFE FLIGHT RESCUES BURN VICTIM

Jerry Womack, 44, of Jasper, burned extensively in a dragline machine explosion near Doucette, was transferred from Tyler County Hospital to the burn unit at John Sealy Hospital in Galveston by a Life Flight helicopter.

January 11, 1979
CITY COUNCIL ASKED FOR CO-OPERATION ON IMPROVEMENTS ON HIGHWAY 69

The State Highway Department, represented by Homer Smith, the resident Highway Engineer from Jasper, informed City Council of road work planned for Highway 69 from the Highway 190 intersection North to the Woodville City Limits. Costs of the project may impact Woodville heavily and Smith was visiting City Council to explain various alternatives.

January 18, 1979
BANK APPLICATION TURN DOWN

An application for a bank charter in the name of the Community State Bank with a proposed location in Woodville, was formally turned down by the three member State Banking Commission. The denial cited "lack of public necessity" and "lack of volume of business" as the prime reasons for the rejection.

January 25, 1979
GOVERNOR SPEAKS TO SWEARING-IN CROWD

Bill Clements is the first Republican Governor in Texas in over 100 years. He told the crowd of over 10,000 at his swearing-in ceremony that he expects to trim state expenditures, cut taxes and let the people of Texas have more involvement in the operation of their government.

The Tyler County Chamber of Commerce chose Major Alford "Citizens of the Year" at the Chamber's annual banquet last week.

FESTIVAL SAID BEST IN MANY YEARS
April 12, 1979
Susan Broadnax of Woodville was crowned "Queen of the Tyler County Dogwood Festival" by former Governor Allen Shivers.

OFFICERS SCORE ON DRUG RAID
April 16, 1979
A 29-year-old man was arrested as a result of a drug raid at 520 Elm Street in Woodville by the Woodville Police and Sheriff's departments. Numerous pills and 12 bags of marijuana were confiscated.

FATALITY
April 26, 1979
Thomas Daniel Garland, 36, of Rusk lost control of his vehicle and crossed into the southbound lane of Highway 49 where a truck carrying a semi trailer driven by Joe Edward Vanhouten, 24, hit him.

COMMISSIONERS VOTE TO CONDEMN BRIDGE RIGHT-OF-WAY
May 3, 1979
The Tyler County Commissioners Court voted to institute a condemnation of the Rockland Bridge right-of-way due to the owner's apparent unwillingness to release the land.

TOXIC ROAD OIL SAID SHIPPED TO COUNTY
May 10, 1979
Tyler County is one of seven Texas counties that received road oil from Browning-Ferris Industries of Houston, that allegedly contains nitrobenzene and cyanide, two highly toxic substances, according to the Texas Department of Water Resources.

VEHICLE USAGE STUDIED
May 17, 1979
The Tyler County Commissioners Court voted to have the County Attorney obtain a copy of the state laws that govern the private use of county vehicles.

WOODVILLE SCHOOL DISTRICT BUYS BUSES, HIRES COUNSELOR
May 24, 1979
The Board of Trustees of the Woodville Independent School District voted to purchase two new school buses for the 1979-1980 school year. The board interviewed and hired Kathryn Patton for the position of counselor for the WISD.

COUNTY CLEANUP UNDERWAY
May 31, 1979
A county-wide beautification meeting was held to formulate plans for a month-long county cleanup program in June.

BRINKS TRUCK DEPOSITS \$249,000 ON SPURGER HIGHWAY
June 14, 1979
A Brinks armored truck, southbound on Highway 69 west of Woodville, hit a rough spot in the road and jolted a bag of money onto the pavement. A high wind blew the bills of money around on the road. Two men who picked up a bundle of currency and drove away were later apprehended. According to a representative of Brinks Security most of the money has been recovered.

COMMISSIONERS HOLD BACK HB1060 ONE YEAR
June 21, 1979
The Tyler County Commissioner's Court, in a special meeting, passed a resolution to implement House Bill 1060, a bill dealing with agricultural-use land exemptions, in 1980 rather than 1979.

WOODVILLE I.S.D. BOARDS HEARS STATEMENT ON GRADE ASSIGNMENT
June 28, 1979
The Woodville School Board heard alternative statements formulated by a group of teachers concerning the alignment and placement of grades K-8 on various campuses.

GULF STATES FILES FOR 20 PERCENT RATE HIKE
July 5, 1979
Gulf States Utilities is filing for a \$50.5 million rate increase in Texas. The rate increase, if granted, will raise the average monthly bill by about 27 cents a day in Texas.

LOCAL DOCTORS HIT BY BURGLARS
July 12, 1979
The medical offices of the Swearingin-Garner Clinic and Dr. L. Gayle Burton in Woodville were burglarized between 8 p.m. and 7 a.m. Monday, July 2, and Tuesday, July 3.

ROCKLAND MAN BRUTALLY BEATEN
July 19, 1979
A \$500 reward is offered for information leading to the arrest of the person or persons who attacked and beat Billy Mitchell, a popular and jovial deaf mute man from Rockland.

BROWDER HERE TO ASSESS GAS SHORTAGES
July 19, 1979
State Representative Jim Browder has announced plans to hold hearings in each of the five counties in District 16 to discuss the problems relating to fuel shortages and allocations in this area. Gasoline dealers, farmers and other consumers are expected to visit with Browder at that time.

CSU CANCELS NUCLEAR POWER PLANT, AGAIN
August 2, 1979
The Gulf States Utilities nuclear power project in Newton County has been officially canceled. The project was dropped due to lack of funds. The estimated cost of the facility was \$1.6 billion.

HIGH FUEL COSTS THREATEN ROAD MAINTENANCE FUNDS
August 2, 1979
The possibility of reduced road and bridge maintenance services in Tyler County was a major consideration in a budget workshop held by the Commissioners Court August 3. Tyler County Judge Airon Sturrock stated that "due to the fact that fuel costs have doubled since the last time we had a budget, it will be very difficult to maintain current services provided by the county."

MISUSE OF GARBAGE DUMPS UPSETS COUNTY COMMISSIONERS
August 16, 1979
Public misuse of outlying garbage dumps was not on the agenda for the Commissioners Court meeting, but the subject drew a lot of discussion nevertheless. Commissioner Maxie Riley set the tone of the discussion when he stated that "people are going to have to start helping out, or I'm going to have to close my dump." He reported that persons from other areas of the county were using his dump and that the dumps should be used for household garbage only.

WILSON STATES OPPOSITION TO REVENUE SHARING
August 23, 1979
Congressman Charles Wilson spoke at a meeting of the Texas County Judges and Commissioners and told the group he would not support an extension of revenue sharing funds. The Congressman said, "I'm not for revenue sharing."

A 56-year-old white female was raped and robbed at knife point at her home Saturday, according to Tyler County Sheriff's George Reynolds. Reynolds said that a young black male is being held in Tyler County Jail pending further investigation.

November 15, 1979
Eddie Ray Barkley was arrested at his home near Hillister Saturday. He is charged with possession of marijuana.

COUNTY RECEIVES TRAVEL FUNDS
November 15, 1979
Austin - Tyler County received \$3,913,000 for travel receipts in 1978. The 1978 figures reflect an increase of 11% in travel receipts over 1977.

FFA Gets Favorable Ruling

A United States Circuit Court of Appeals ruling and a subsequent denial for a hearing before the Supreme Court has allowed the Texas Forestry Association to receive a check in the amount of \$4,560.36 for a portion of the court costs incurred during the federal court battle over even-aged management in Texas National Forests.

The request by the association for \$15,000 from the Texas Committee on Natural Resources to cover court costs was made in 1978. The Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals allowed the request after hearing the case and then reversing the previous ruling by Judge William Wayne Justice in Tyler. The TCNR's original suit was filed in 1976, but was amended in October before going to trial in December of that year.

Blackeyed Pea Recipe Perfect For New Year Start

HOPPING JOHN
1 lb. dried blackeyed peas
1 ham hock
1 1/2 cups cut tomatoes
1 cup chopped onion
1 cup chopped celery
1 whole bay leaf
1 cup 'pecocked' long grain rice

Rinse the peas, add to 8 cups of cold water. Bring to boil. Simmer 15 minutes. Then remove from heat. Cover. Eat salt, bay leaf and a dash of pepper in a Dutch oven. Cover and simmer until almost tender (about 1 1/2 hours). Add rice; cook 40 minutes. Add water as needed. Lift ham hock out, remove bones and fat and mix in well. This recipe is taken from the 1879 edition of "Housekeeping in Old Virginia" published by John P. Morton of Louisville, Ky.

RESIPEE FOR CUKIN KON-FEEL PEES
Get your peas 'bout sun-down the forlin day, 'bout seven o'clock, gowve out your peas, wif your thane, like gowvin out a man's eye-ball at a kotee house. Rense the gray to seep out and intermary wif your peas. When mudrilly brown, but not scurchy, empty into a dish; Mash 'em gently wif a spate, mix wif raw-tomaters sprinkled wif a little hrows and shugar and the im-mortal dish at quite ready. Eat a hepe.

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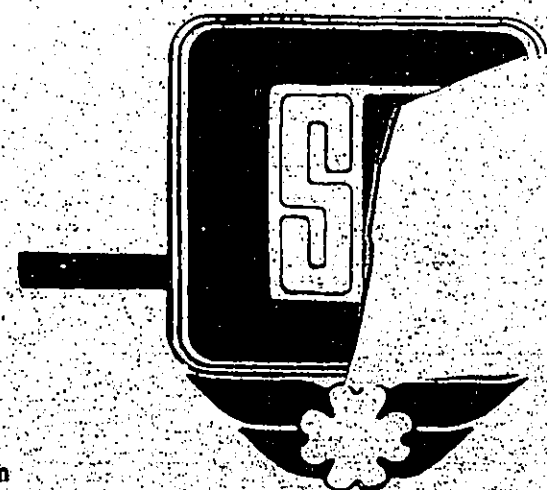

Aliens Must Report

District Director Paul B. O'Neill of the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service stated that the period within which aliens must report their addresses is almost at hand. O'Neill urges all aliens to comply with reporting requirements, as willful failure to do so may lead to serious consequences. S W Bell Announces Customer Savings

On January 1, reduced federal excise taxes on telephone service will result in an estimated \$22.9 million savings during 1980 for customers in Texas, according to Gary Pitcher, local manager for Southwestern Bell. The tax will drop from its present rate of three percent to two percent, he said. This is a further step in the gradual phase-out of the telephone service excise tax instituted by Congress in 1973. The tax is scheduled to expire after 1981. Congress first imposed the excise tax on a limited basis during World War I. Although repealed briefly after the war, it was reinstated during the Depression and has continued since then on a more extensive basis. During the 1940's and 1950's, the rate was as high as 15 percent on local service and 25 percent on Long Distance service. From the mid-1950's until 1972, it was 10 percent on most local and Long Distance services. Since 1973, the rate has been reduced by one percentage point per year.

Challenge Credit Disputes Quickly

COLLEGE STATION — Report billing disputes about a credit card bill or charge account in writing within 60 days of receipt of the billing statement.

Your billing inquiry must be acknowledged within 30 days and settled within 90 days, says Linda McCormack, a family resource management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas A&M University System.

All of the following are considered, billing errors:

- 1) account errors.
- 2) failure to credit the account for payments made or goods returned.
- 3) billings that need further explanation.
- 4) charges not made or unauthorized by you.
- 5) charges for goods not delivered as agreed, which were not accepted.
- 6) charges billed with an incorrect description, date or amount.
- 7) failure to bill the consumer at the correct address, provided that the creditor was given a change of address notice at least 10 days prior to the billing.

Also, prior to settlement, creditors cannot send harassing letters and may not close the account during the time for refusal to pay the disputed amount, Mrs. McCormack points out.

In addition, creditors are forbidden to issue bad credit reports unless the consumer is notified and credit bureaus are informed that the bill is in dispute.

In such cases, the creditor must send the consumer the name of all delinquencies of the delinquent.

If the company later discovers it was in error, it must report the bill's settlement to everyone who received notice of the delinquency.

Problems with defective merchandise or bad service are not considered "billing errors." However, the consumer has certain rights in connection with credit-card purchases which were not accepted.

In the past, the consumer was not permitted to withhold payment on credit card issuers when goods were defective.

Now, the law allows the consumer to withhold payment until the matter is settled, provided the address notice at least 10 days prior to the billing and was bought in the consumer's home state or within 100 miles of home, Mrs. McCormack says.

During a dispute involving a possible billing error, the consumer may withhold only the amount of money in dispute.

Once the dispute is settled, the consumer may be required to pay financial charges accumulated in the disputed billing. If the bill was incorrect, the consumer must pay the bill as correct, without financial charges.

If the consumer does not follow the prescribed dispute settlement procedure, the consumer offers the first \$50 of the disputed amount, even if the bill is correct.

Also, the consumer may sue the creditor for violating the law and meet with monetary damages of \$100 over costs and reasonable attorney fees, she adds.

Highway Patrol Report Given

Sergeant Russell Davis of the Texas Highway Patrol has announced that during the month of November, there were no rural fatal traffic accidents in Tyler County. During the same month of November, 1978, there were 190 rural fatal traffic accidents in the State of Texas.

Patrol investigated 19 rural motor vehicle accidents in which Counties, comprising eight persons, were Highway Patrol investigated. During November, 408 rural accidents were investigated, killing 10 persons and injuring 186 people.

Beef Producers Will Decide On Research Program

WASHINGTON — All sellers in the beef marketing chain would be assessed whether they want a nationally coordinated beef research and information program for the referendum. The upcoming referendum was announced today by Assistant Secretary of Agriculture E.R. Smith.

He said beef producers will be asked to register for the referendum between Jan. 28 and Feb. 6.

They'll vote by secret ballot Feb. 19-22.

The order issued by the U.S. Department of Agriculture authorizing the program provides for a beef board of up to 26 producers to administer the program. There would be as many as five non-voting consumer advisors to the board.

Each state or geographic area would be represented on the board in proportion to its share of the U.S. cattle industry.

The program would be funded by assessments based on the value of cattle sold. During the first two years of the program, assessments could be up to two-tenths of one percent of the value of cattle sold (20 cents per \$100).

After two years, the board could recommend an increase up to five-tenths of one percent.

A similar order issued in 1977, although favored by 56.4 percent of voting producers, was not implemented because of a lack of information. Since that time, the Beef Research and Information Act has been amended by Congress so that a majority of producers

Sales Tax Producers Over 467 Million

AUSTIN — State Comptroller Bob Bullock reports the local option one-percent sales tax provided more than \$467 million in revenue in Texas cities in 1979.

Bullock also announced the December city sales tax allocation to more than 900 Texas cities totaling \$76.6 million, boosting tax payments for this year \$42.2 million more than 1978.

"From that standpoint, there was reasonable, but not recession-proof growth in city sales tax rebates," Bullock said.

"In a blizzard of bad economic news, these totals show municipalities fared moderately well. While overall inflation—which is now close to about 13 percent annually—has softened some of the city's economic gains, adjustments for inflation paint a better picture," he said.

He said inflation covering these periods are not due until the first of the year.

With retail prices increasing daily, home vegetable gardening is taking sharp upswing all across the nation. If you asked the average gardener why he or she gardens, they would probably answer, "to save money on the grocery bill," "to have higher quality fruits and vegetables," "to have more nutritious food for the family," or "I just enjoy gardening."

The benefits from gardening can be economical, but more often seem to be psychological, says Dr. Terry Menges, area horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Getting close to nature, having a sense of accomplishment when the garden begins to grow when it's ready to harvest or when placing your own home grown produce on the table are major considerations."

For whatever the reason, escaping everyday pressures or savings on the pocket-book, more and more Americans are gardening each year. Who is this home gardener?

He is a member of one of the 31 million households that garden in America. This represents 41 percent of all American households. He and fellow gardeners spend approximately 100 million dollars for seed, 250 million dollars for garden tractors, 205 million dollars for rotary tiller and 754 million dollars for home food processors. Total spending in the home gardening effort exceeds one billion dollars annually.

Although he spends over a billion dollars to raise gardens which average 620 square feet in size, he raises a product that is valued at almost 14 billion dollars. The major vegetables produced by the home gardener are tomatoes, beans, onions and lettuce. He processes 11 percent of all the fruit and vegetables processed in the U.S.

He may be a medical doctor, homemaker, laborer, or retired. He may be a college graduate or may have never graduated from high school. He may be male or female, married or single. He may live on the farm or in the city. He could be one of the two million gardeners who utilized community gardens in large cities and urban areas each year. He is a member of one family out of every 2.5 in American gardening for fun and profit.
