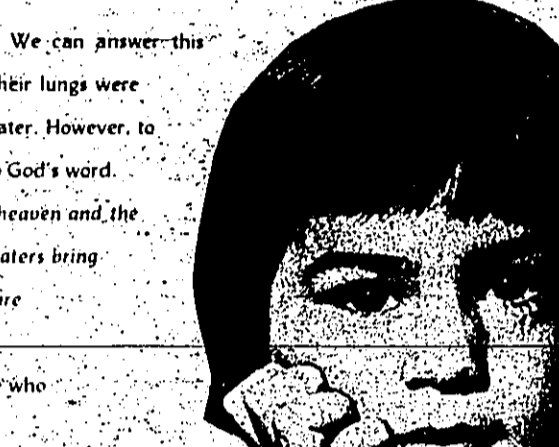

TOPICS IPS TECHNIQUES

You can brighten up some lampshades -- with a bath. Many are washable, especially those in color or those pasted on. You can't remove the trim, then, don't wash the lampshade. Here's how to give your lampshades a bath: Vacuum the shade inside and out to remove surface dirt. Immerse it in a bathtub or a sink filled with detergent or soap suds. Agitate the shade by moving it from side to side and up and down. Rub with a well-lathered soft-bristled brush for stubborn dirt. Rinse the shade in several changes of clean water. To dry the shade, tie a string to the middle of the frame. Then hang it over the tub or from a clothes line to drip dry. Or pat it dry with a towel. On the other hand, shades made of plastic or plastic-coated, laminated or parchment shades -- can be cleaned up sponging with thick suds. To rinse, wipe with a damp cloth. Dry with a clean cloth.

Low-Cal Salad Dressing
1/4 cup cream cottage cheese

Market Methods To Be Discussed

Livestock marketing means more than just hauling an animal to a local auction. If producers want to get top dollar for their livestock, particularly stocker and feeder cattle, they need to get into the swing of things. This means looking at some new marketing methods.

And that's precisely the purpose of a program at the National Guard Armory beginning at 8:30 a.m. According to Falls County Extension Agent, Ronnie Leps, this program is designed to get both cow-calf producers and buyers under the same roof to look at the latest marketing ideas.

"We want to look in particular at stocker calf sales, electronic and video marketing, and points out Leps. While local auctions will continue to have a role in stocker and feeder cattle marketing, new and exciting ways abound ahead of us."

One of the keynote speakers will be Dr. John Peters, Extension animal science specialist with West Virginia University who will discuss the success of the feeder cattle market in his state. Through the joint efforts of the West Virginia Cattlemen's Association and the West Virginia Extension Service, a feeder cattle marketing association was formed. The association holds graded feeder cattle sales each fall over the state and attempts to attract as many order buyers as possible. This enables buyers to obtain large lots of specific types of cattle at one sitting. Cattle men often get a better price for their stock at these sales.

Electronic or computer marketing offers a lot of exciting possibilities, believes Leps. These will be discussed by Dr. Ernie Davis, Extension livestock marketing specialist at Texas A&M University. Through computer terminals, various lots of cattle can be offered for sale on a daily basis. Information on cattle available for sale is fed into the computer, and buyers can then "pick" and "choose" to meet their needs. Davis will give a brief overview of a computer marketing demonstration project that will be launched in July which will involve 15 to 20 terminals at various Texas locations.

Another alternative, video marketing, is being used some by Port City Stockyards and Brenham and Searcy, F.D. Searcy, Jr., owner of Port City Stockyards. This program will be on hand to discuss this marketing method, which involves video-taping order buyers and then holding a showing for order buyers.

"Discussion of these various marketing methods should generate more interest in buying and selling stocker and feeder cattle," contends Leps. "Since we have an abundance of small grain pasture in Falls and surrounding counties, a lot of stocker calves are shipped in each fall to graze. Some 70,000 yearlings were put on winter pasture in Falls County last year."

Along with the discussions on marketing methods, the program will also bring producers and buyers together to date on new USDA feeder cattle grades and the live stock market outlook. Frank Littrest, beef cattle specialist with the Texas Education Agency, will discuss feeder cattle grades while Dr. Ed Uvacek, Extension livestock marketing specialist, will give his view of the market situation.

Sponsoring the program is the Falls County Beef and Forage Committee.

Radio System Approved

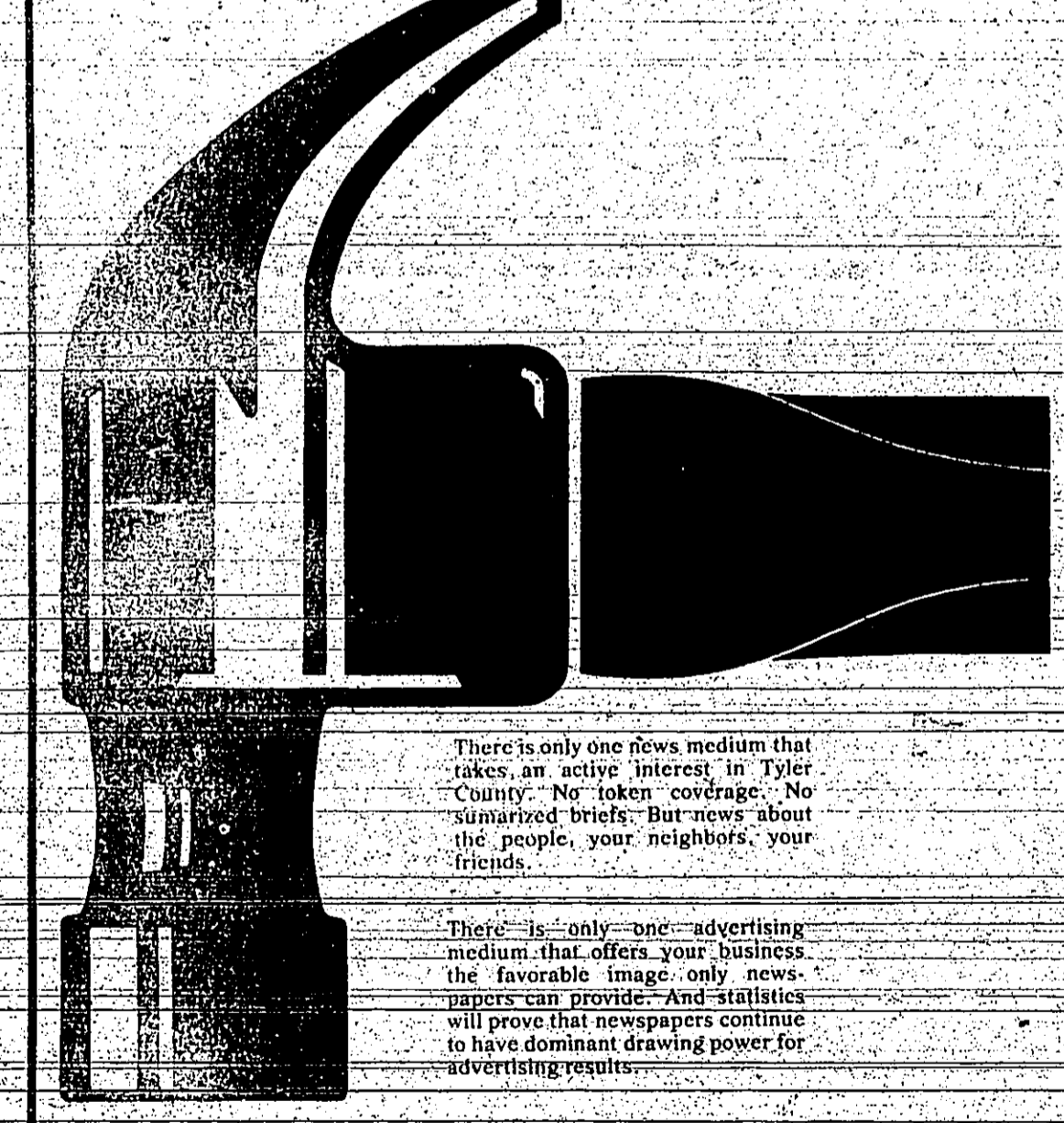
AUSTIN State Comptroller Bob Bullock has reported that the Federal Communications Commission has granted a license for a statewide radio communications system designed to save time and money for the comptroller's office. He said the system will bring the comptroller's office in line with 11 other state agencies who are users of radio communications systems. "We'll be able to instantly dispatch enforcement officers to meet taxpayers' needs and at the same time increase tax collections. These two-way radios will be an important tool to our collection folks as the computers are to our auditors," Bullock said. The system is expected to decrease mileage and travel costs by as much as \$25,000 the first year of operation and could bring in as much as \$2.5 million in additional revenue annually. Bullock said the radio system for the state will run about \$155,000. "This is a day-to-day management tool that we estimate can save as much as two hours a day in up-to-date information for each enforcement officer," he said. "The system will keep some 500 enforcement officers and auditors from shuffling back and forth from office to office because it allows them to send and receive information by radio either from field offices or the department's headquarters in Austin, Bullock said. "We can better keep track of our employees between assignments and reschedule their work when needed whether they are in a car, on a job or drinking coffee something," he said. "Because state law requires much tax information to be kept confidential, the radio system will include a 'scrambler.' It will be impossible for anyone to monitor or eavesdrop on someone else's tax business," Bullock said. "The system is expected to be operational by early spring."

Area Cattle Producers Urged To Vote In 'Beefendum'

Beef cattle producers are urged to participate in the upcoming referendum on the Federal Beef Research and Information Order, according to Milton Durham, Woodville, president of the Tyler County Farm Bureau. Producers who own cattle anytime in the first two years, 1979 and 1980, are eligible to vote in the 1980 "Beefendum," the farm leader said. "They can register at the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office anytime between Jan. 28 and February 6. They can vote at the office anytime between Feb. 19-22. The best way to determine how the majority of producers feel about this matter is for all producers to participate," Durham said. "We want to re-assert our position on this issue. It's their money at stake in the check-off by each seller of cattle. The county farm leader said, "A good turn-out should determine whether or not the producers want a mandatory check-off for beef research and promotion that is run by a quasi-governmental agency." The U.S. Department of Agriculture estimates that the Order, which must be cast by at least 50 percent of the producers registered to vote in the referendum, and a majority of those voting, must annually approve the 1 percent figure. Comptroller Eyes Student Loans

AUSTIN State Comptroller Bob Bullock recently said he is stepping up efforts to collect more than \$1.2 million in delinquent joint state-federal student loans for seven Texas colleges and universities. Bullock said 1,802 persons have been identified as being overdue in the repayment of loans from the National Direct Student Loan program. The defaulters will join some 400 other former students who owe money to the state's Hinson-Hazelwood program, which won't receive state salary checks or other payments until they have settled up their education debts. He said 235 persons who use the NDSL program money also owe the Hinson-Hazelwood program for student loans. In August last year, the Texas College and Coordinating Board held loan defaulters worth more than \$39.9 million under the program from loans to for beef research and a debt from receiving 24,685 former students.

Poultry Prices Get Attention

WASHINGTON—The Department of Agriculture has announced a program to provide more chicken for donations to hospitals, nursing homes and other institutions, and to remove price depressing surpluses of poultry from domestic markets.

Carol Tucker Foreman, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture for Food and Consumer Services, said the action is being taken because contracts for poultry exports to the Soviet Union could not be fulfilled as a result of the President's suspension of trade with that country on January 4, 1980.

The action announced today has two parts. First, the Department will invite bids this next week for a supply of whole frozen chickens at least equal in value to that which had already been packaged for shipment to the Soviet Union.

This action is being taken under the authority of Section 32 of Public Law 96-370, which provides that perishable commodities that cannot be sold by producers at reasonable prices may be purchased by the government for use in food assistance programs.

By making these purchases, we hope to improve the market demand and supply caused by the trade suspension. President Carter has said that actions will be taken not to guarantee profits for exporters, but to prevent catastrophic losses by producers. We think that by making additional purchases of poultry above what we normally would have purchased for our programs, we can help maintain reasonable prices for poultry products.

Second, the Department will increase its regular purchases of poultry (under Section 6 of the National School Lunch Act) to help absorb the extra supply which may have been generated by the sale of the contract chickens. This poultry will be purchased in frozen, cut-up, or cooked, broiled form for use in the school lunch program.

Foreman said, "Chicken has been one of the most popular commodities in our school and other feeding programs. We are confident that the poultry will be well used, and the poultry industry will be protected from devastating losses."

Details of the purchase and the specifications will be supplied to the industry this week of January 21.

School Lunch Portions Eyed

WASHINGTON—The U.S. Department of Agriculture is asking students and parents for their opinions about the size and nutritional content of school lunch servings, according to Assistant Secretary Carol Tucker Foreman.

USDA's Food and Nutrition Service is asking the public to help in developing a standardized monitoring system to ensure that each child receives a daily lunch that meets the department's nutritional requirements, Foreman said.

A committee of school food personnel will meet in January to consider alternative ways to measure the adequacy of school meals served to children, Foreman said. She said USDA wants specific ideas and comments to help the committee develop a system that will satisfy both common sense and the need for strict accountability of federal funds.

Public comment is invited on a series of questions, including: "What should be monitored—food portions, on plate or total amounts served in specified amounts of four food groups are eligible for reimbursement. Should food service workers determine portions visually or by gram. The amounts, some other method?"

Beef Cattle Management Encouraged

COLLEGE STATION—The day will come when cattlemen will accept management control, re-marked Texas A&M University's Extension beef cattle specialist L.A. Maddox, "as a means to more profitable production of beef."

Management control was described by Maddox as "for a rancher to set a goal of the kind of cattle he wants to raise, plan to do it, and then do it."

Maddox prepared some ranchers did not accept, sets of management control. "Use in small, large and breeding cattle types of ranching operations. May have been ahead of the times," Maddox conceded.

"I don't believe many ranchers were ready then, or maybe not now, to incorporate a system of management control. It's come," Maddox said. "There was reluctance by many ranchers to accept performance testing when research introduced this new system of measurement of the type of cattle the market as a replacement for 'eyeballing' to determine value of an animal. However, the more progressive ranchers demanded performance papers, particularly on potential herd sires to back up what the seller claimed the animal would produce."

"Practices unacceptable—20 years ago," Maddox said. "When buying a charter flight, deal with doing more with per-ormance testing and its application to cattle than we ever dreamed of." Maddox branded his recommendations as "Steps to Improve a Ranch's Operations." He assured that a rancher should have some measurement of his cattle. If for no other reason than for reference to determine whether or not the rancher is making progress or slipping back.

For example, if a rancher's cow is 500-pound calves when weaned, then he should have the kind of bulls and cows with records can produce 500-pound calves," he said.

Another example might be a goal of a 95 percent calf crop. Then a rancher should palpate as a management control, to determine if a cow is with call or not.

Maddox added that a pasture program is "must" in management control, if forage production supports this kind of high beef output. He also added that drought often has an ill-effect on cattle production, demanding a decision on which ones to keep and which ones to sell when grass supplies get critical.

"What has bugged me through the years is that so many ranchers who thought they were raising quality cattle never saw carcasses of their cattle after they were slaughtered and entered into retail trade channels," Maddox added.

Economics and eating habits of people brought changes in the type of cattle the market demands. Some cattlemen switch, and Maddox said there still are some who haven't altered their operations.

"Sooner or later, I believe," Maddox concluded, "the good ones (ranchers) will come around to some type of management and quality control of their cattle production."

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
