## Marsh Named Outstanding Citizen

Orman L. Marsh of Woodville was named Tyler County's "Outstanding Citizen" for 1979 at the annual Tyler County Chamber of Commerce Banquet Friday night at the Woodville Inn.

Marsh was cited for giving unselfishly of himself, his time and his money, not only during the past year, but through three decades of service to Tyler County.

He has been a member of the

Woodville Volunteer Fire Department since 1962 and has been Chief of the fire department since 1974. During his tenure as fire chief, the department has added thousands of dollars

of new equipment, community support has increased, and membership and participation of drills and training is at an all-time high. Hundreds of thousands of dollars in premiums

have been saved because of the fire department's effect on the city's insurance key rate. Marsh personally responds to every fire alarm when he is in town.

The department answers about 100 calls per year and holds 24 drills each year. Assistance is given to all areas of the county, and Marsh is currently working on a county-wide fire com-

munication system. Marsh received a 35-year service award in vocational education this year. Hundreds of students have been trained under his leadership. He is also active in adult education and training.

## Kinney Witnesses Takeover

Woodville attorney John Kinney was a witness to the horror of the takeover of the Spanish Embassy in Guatemala last week. As he watched from the street in front of the embassy building, 39 persons burned to their deaths in a small second-story room.

Kinney was in Guatemala last week on business and was driving in a car with a client near the embassy last Thursday when he noticed several National Police personnel and a police bus down a side street.

Kinney stated that his client was going to a meeting that did not concern him and he asked to be let out of the car so that he could determine what the police activity was all about. He walked down the side street to the embassy and knew immediately that something was not right. Twenty-seven Communist terrorists had already occupied the building and had taken the Spanish Embassy personnel hostage. They were crowded into a small room on the second floor of the embassy.

Kinney witnessed the action at the embassy for the next three hours until his client returned from his meeting. He was critical of the way the

National Police handled the situation. "I've never seen as much confusion in all my life," Kinney said. "No one seemed to be in charge. As the time drew on, the crowd kept getting bigger." He said when he first arrived the police were standing outside the building talking to the terrorists with a powered megaphone. A short while later the police climbed up on the balcony and the roof and occupied the first floor. At this time 39 people (the terrorists and their hostages) were in the small 12-by-15 room on the second floor. Kinney said he never heard a shot fired during the entire time of the takeover. After about 30 to 40 minutes, Kinney heard a muffled explosion

from the second floor. "It was the sound that gasoline makes when you put a match to it," he said. Then he heard a lot of screaming from the small room and several police officers came out on the balcony. It took 20-30 minutes for the fire department to respond to the blaze and by the time they arrived all the

### Fair Trade Needed

The battle over trade policies has long ignored. It's been virtually impossible to get the U.S. Treasury to take effective action against foreign countries guilty of dumping.

Mr. Nevin says that the U.S. public has the wrong information on the causes of the trade deficit—\$28.5 billion in 1978. "Economics do not have the answer," he says, "but the United States needs to export its goods. But many Americans are convinced that other countries, which give us service to use trade, engage in protectionist activities."

John J. Nevin, former chairman of the Zenith Radio Corp. and now president of the Firestone Tire and Rubber Co., recently addressed his views in an op-ed page article in The New York Times. His important position in the American business community gives weight to his comments.

The world today, he said, "has an administered trade system, not a free trade system. To pay for more expensive energy imports, other nations are looking for donations so that they have undertaken to earn more dollars by increasing exports to American markets. When such efforts required government export subsidies or some help in dumping. They have sought to contain this area. Kinney explained that the people in the room had no means of escape. Some of the terrorists realized the window on the front of the building had bars on it, "like most of the buildings and residences in Central Vietnam. There was only one door to the room and the terrorists had been negotiating with the national police. He then threw an incendiary through it on the second floor.

Killed in the blaze were the former Vice President of Guatemala, Eduardo Cuevas Linares, and the former Foreign Minister, Adolfo Molina Orantes. They were in the Spanish Embassy, obtaining visas in order to attend a conference.

He said he counted 23 bodies as the firemen brought them down a ladder before he stopped counting.

The takeover of the Spanish Embassy in Guatemala is a memory that John Kinney of Woodville will not soon forget.

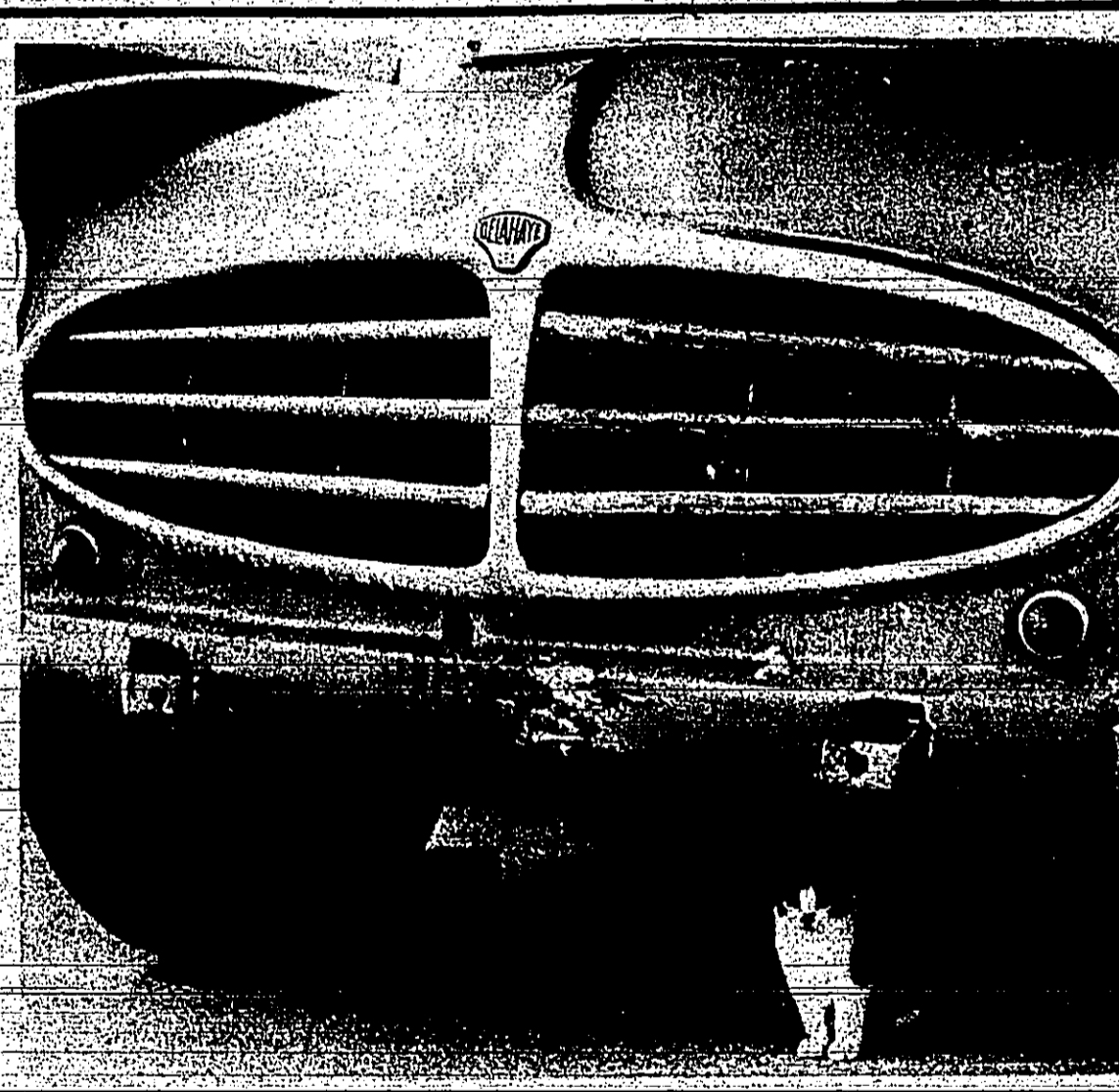
### Fur Prices Slide Downward

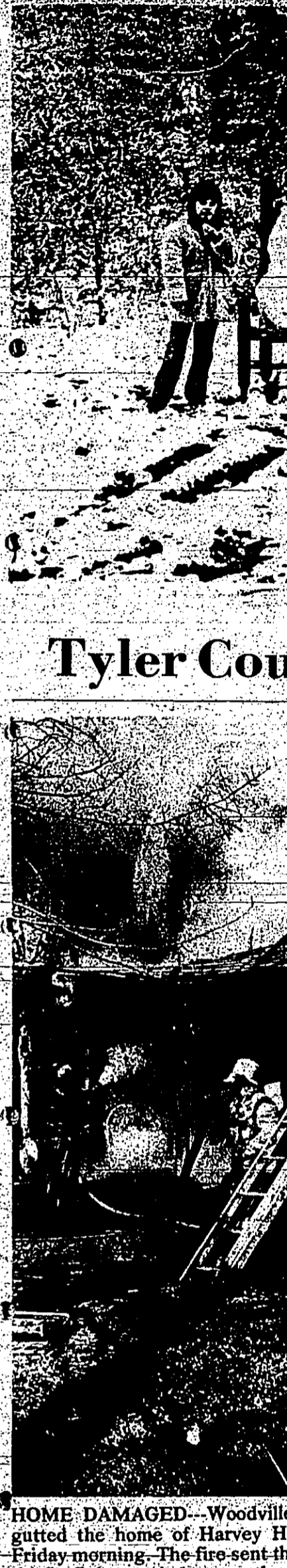

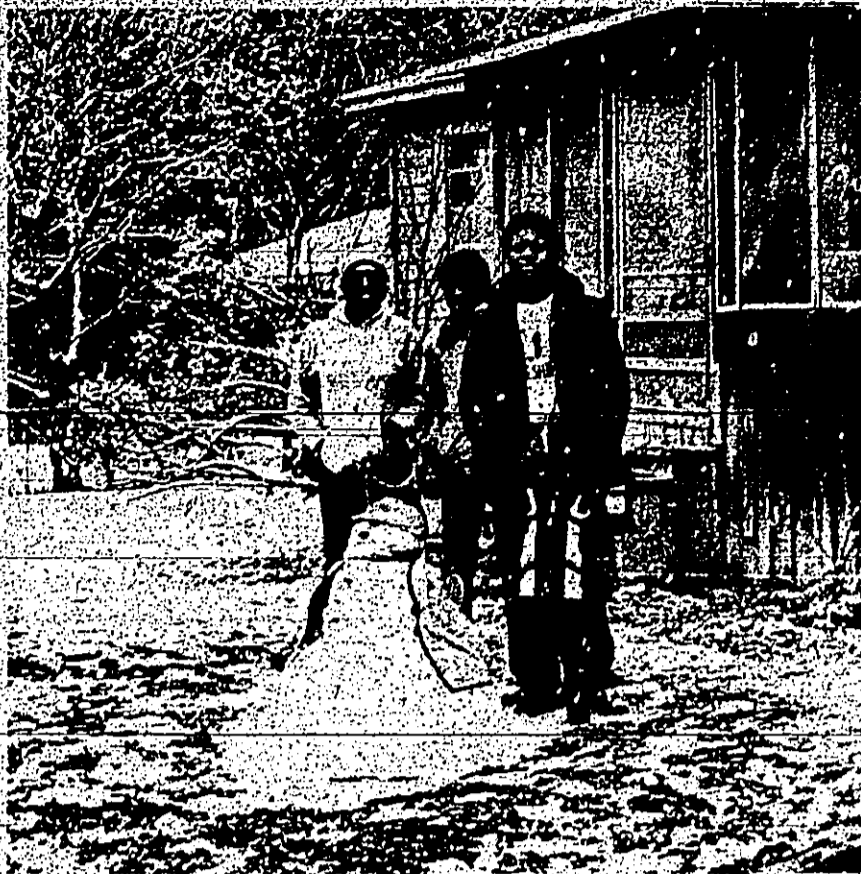

McCash Jr. of Texarkana.

## Tax Incentives For Savers Urged

WASHINGTON—Legislation providing meaningful tax incentives to savers has been strongly recommended by Dr. Jack Carlson, executive vice president and chief economist of the National Association of Realtors.

"We support legislation that would exclude from gross income the first \$500 in interest income received by a single taxpayer," Carlson told members of the House Ways and Means Committee.

"The exclusion would be \$1,000 for joint returns and would be implemented over a five-year span," Carlson noted that approximately half the members of the tax-writing committee have recognized the urgent need for such legislation by sponsoring bills that would exclude interest earned from gross income in amounts ranging upward from \$100.

"A \$100/\$200 exclusion would not provide a significant impact on the American economy," he said. "nor would it be a meaningful incentive to save in this time of high inflation."

The legislation proposed by the association, Carlson said, would encourage savings and thereby reduce consumption.

The U.S. Department of Labor and 14 organizations representing migrant and seasonal farmworkers have signed a settlement agreement ending seven years of litigation over services and protections afforded migrant and seasonal farmworkers by agencies in the Department of Labor, Secretary of Labor Ray Marshall has announced.

The settlement agreement affects migrant and seasonal farmworkers throughout the United States.

Under terms of the agreement, the Labor Department has agreed to publish proposed regulations setting forth procedures within the department for coordinating enforcement activities relating to migrant farmworkers. These regulations will apply to all agencies within the department which presently are directly responsible for activities relating to migrant farmworkers.

# Indian Reservation Brings Many Tourists To Area

"Gateway To The Big Thicket Of East Texas" is an appropriate slogan adopted by the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce and in addition it can be regarded as the front door to the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation.

The family vacation spot features guided tours through the forested region commonly known as the Big Thicket of East Texas. Its regularly scheduled tours which are easily accessible by visitors makes the Indian Reservation unique in its relation to the Big Thicket. Combining the Indian culture with colorful Tribal Dances and tours through the Living Indian Village, the reservation represents more than an impulse stop-over.

Students who are studying the Indian culture in individual research or as a unit in Indian studies often find a visit to the reservation a must.

Among the many types of visitors who come to the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation, the most common are weekend tourists and vacationers. In addition, the outdoorsmen enjoy the spacious campsites of the Tombigbee Lake and Campground. The 26-acre lake along which the camping sites are located gives a majestic view of the forested area.

Many travel trailer clubs are discovering the Indian Reservation as a gorgeous place to hold small rallies. Serious fishermen also are surprised to find the

game to be adequate. One of the more eager additions to the demographics of typical visitors to the Indian Reservation is the local residents of the area. The visit of relatives from out of town often signals a trip to the Indian Reservation. The addition of Beyond the Sundown Outdoor Drama adds more of an incentive to show off the Indian Reservation to out of town travelers.

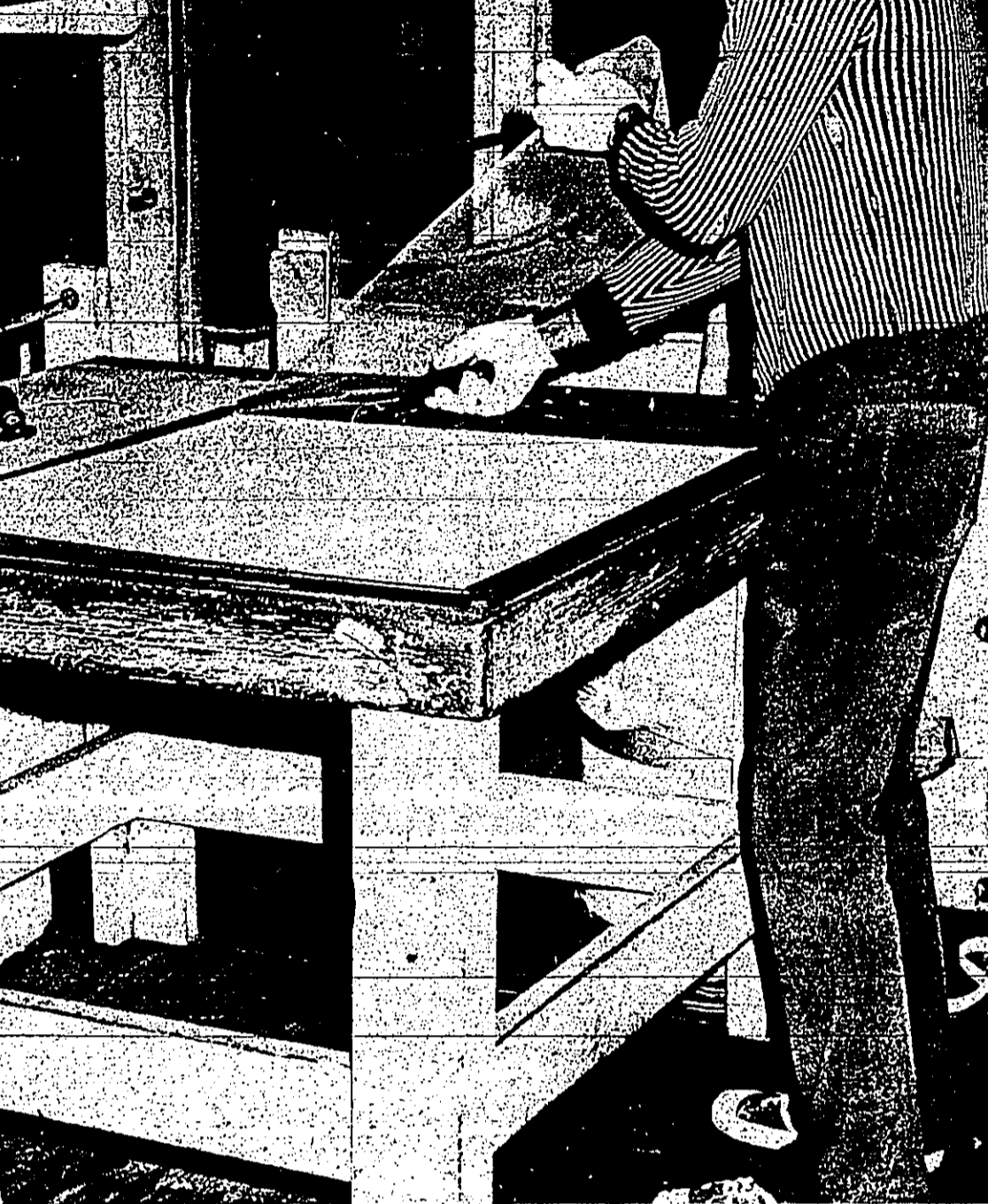
Beyond the Sundown is presented nightly except Sunday mid June through late August. Written by America's foremost outdoor drama playwright, Kermit Hunter, the historical drama of the Tribes have been an instant favorite of the seasoned outdoor drama patriots as well as new comers.

The Drama is presented in the beautifully designed Sundown amphitheatre which can accommodate 1,600 guests. The story of the drama focuses on the period around 1924. The drama utilizes dramatic lighting, outstanding costume designs, well choreographed modern interpretive of some traditional Indian dances and a quadrophonic sound system.

The facilities built as an economic development venture of the Tribes, attracts over 200,000 visitors a year. The impact of these surveys is quite significant in Woodville and Livingston. Recent surveys by the Texas Travel Research Association indicated that 6% of the tourists

dollars is spent on admission to attractions, 11% on souvenirs, and 22% on food. Less than 1% is spent at the Indian Reservation. The majority of that tourist dollar including a large amount for lodging, fuel and miscellaneous expenses is spent in the surrounding communities.

Tyler and Polk County have as much at stake whenever the tourist trade is affected. Recent changing patterns of the visitors begged by the availability of fuel recently affected the Reservation as well as the two surrounding counties. A spirit of "we're all in this together" prompted a cooperative advertising and promotion campaign by the two counties with the Indian Reservation.

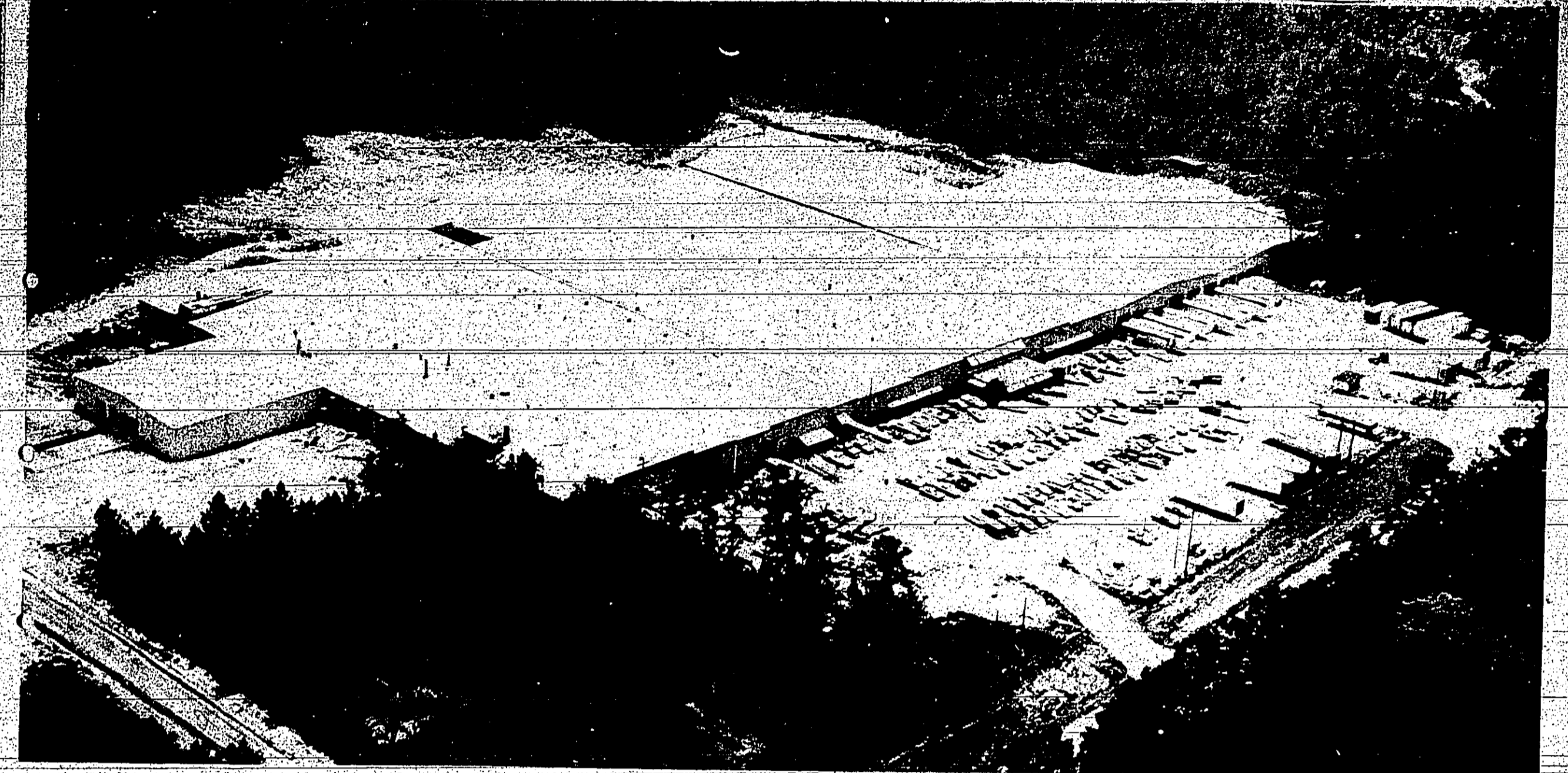

## Keller Plant Experiences Solid Growth

The Keller Aluminum Products of Texas plant in Woodville has added greatly to the economic vitality of Tyler County during the past 20 years. The plant has undergone another expansion since its inception in 1960 and today employs approximately 375 persons.

The plant has an annual payroll of \$1,750,000 and manages to average a workforce of 375 employees year around. John Crane is the general manager and Henry Carroll is the plant manager.

Adjoining the Keller Aluminum Products of Texas is the Keller Extrusion Division which was added in 1973. The plant in Woodville was originally called the Air Control Window Corp. of Texas.

In 1962, the plant added a horizontal slider window line and 40,000 square feet of warehouse space. In 1976, a 24,000 square foot finished product warehouse to the Woodville plant and in the same year initiated a sliding patio door line. Another 20 employees were added to the workforce in 1976.

In 1963, a 48,000 square foot building was added to the house the extrusion plant. Thirty additional employees were added in 1977. At that time a smelter to reclaim scrap aluminum and to make billets used in the extrusion process was also installed. In 1973, Keller added 48,000 square foot finished product warehouse to the Woodville plant and in the same year initiated a sliding patio door line. Another 20 employees were added to the workforce in 1976.

In 1950 in Miami and the firm now has 23 plants in 17 states and 50 sales warehouses throughout the United States. Keller Industries, Inc. had sales of \$179 million in 1979.

"This year we are going to add a thermal break window to our line," Henry Carroll, plant manager, commented when explaining the operations of the Woodville facility. "In 1979, we added a storm sash line and also a paint line. We now paint our own metal and this alone resulted in 20 more jobs in Woodville."

Carroll said that Keller contributes its growth and the fact it has done so well here to the people here. "We are proud to promote our people within the plant," he said. "and this alone resulted in 20 more jobs in Woodville."

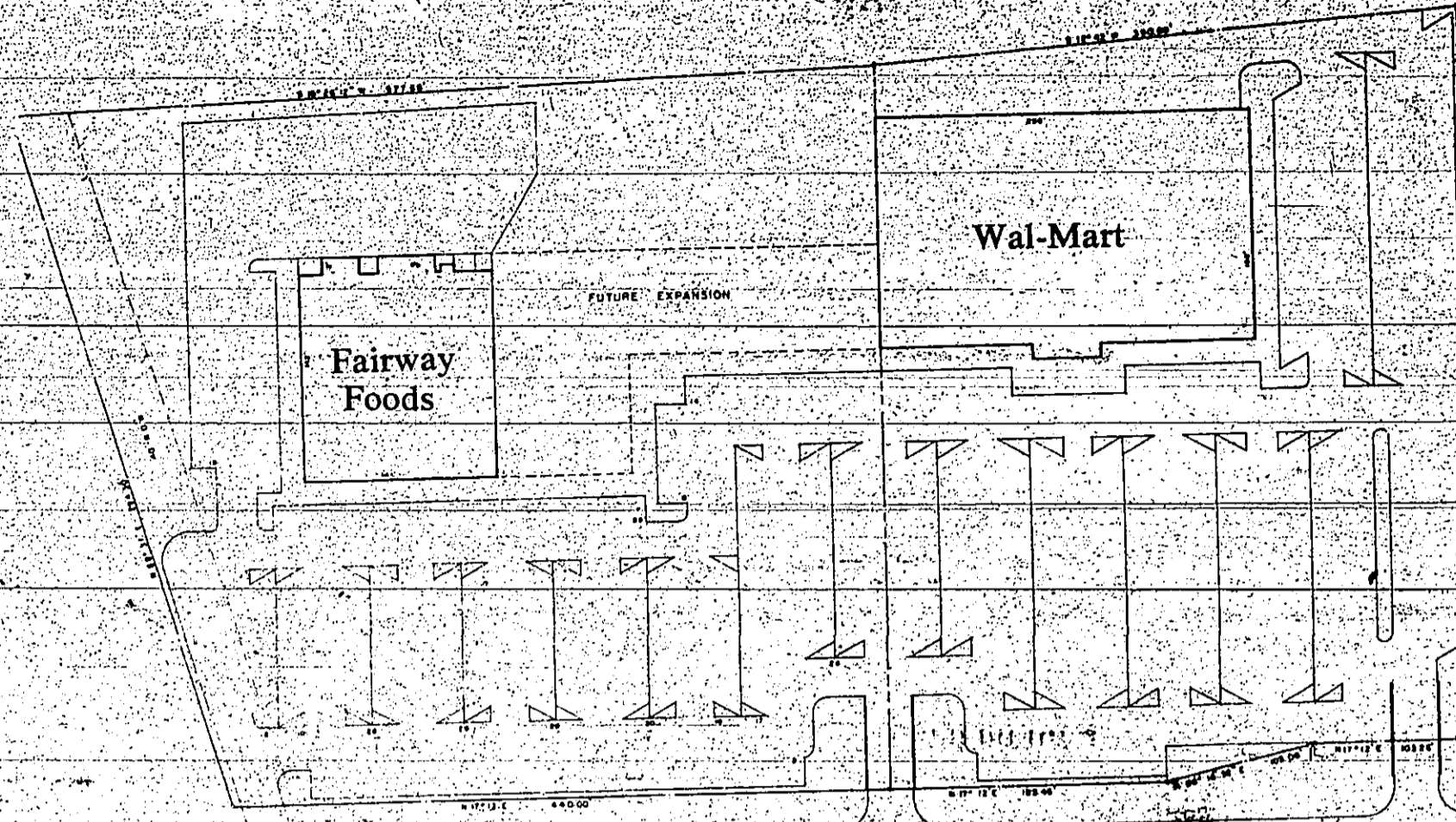

## History Group Reorganizes Here

The Tyler County Historical Commission (formerly the Tyler County Historical Society) was reorganized in the fall of 1979 and has been working steadily to preserve and promote the cultural heritage and history of Tyler County.

After the death of several long-term members and officers, the TCHC (formerly the Tyler County Historical Commission) was elected to the secretary-treasurer position.

Articles of association were formulated and approved. Committees were appointed and a plan of action was developed.

The TCHC is the official county body to recommend sites for historical medallions and to collect and preserve historical memorabilia and promote tourism through heritage development.

One committee is working on building the membership; another is working on fund-raising; another is working on informing the public about TCHC and its necessity, while still another committee is working on historical site surveys. Special interest projects will be incorporated into TCHC programs, such as archaeological finds in Tyler County and genealogy.

The TCHC meets the fourth Thursday of each month at 4 p.m. in the Allan Shivers Museum. Members participating groups so that the ISEC can serve as a forum for the analysis of programs with emphasis on project planning and effective mobilization of manpower and other resources.

One of its major goals is to encourage joint participation between the federal government and participating universities in development projects abroad. It will also assist colleges and universities in strengthening their research and extension capabilities relevant to agricultural development activities overseas and help disseminate agricultural findings and new technologies to the international agricultural community and the general public.

The new agreement reaffirms the participating universities' commitment to these goals and also provides for the development of annual work plans and budgets for joint projects. Plans also call for more communication between participating groups so that the ISEC can serve as a forum for the analysis of programs with emphasis on project planning and effective mobilization of manpower and other resources.

Several bills dealing with foreign ownership of agricultural land were introduced in the 66th Legislature. One of the strongest, House Bill 431, would have prevented non-resident aliens from acquiring title to more than 320 acres of land in Texas and would have required alien owners to register their ownership with state and county officials. Although the bill was defeated, several other agricultural states have introduced similar legislation.

## Youth Job Training Set

WASHINGTON—More than 4,340 economically disadvantaged youth and semi-skilled construction workers will be trained for, building and construction trades and other jobs in 33 cities by the National Urban League (NUL), the contract renewal with the NUL will enable League chapters to place about 3,255 of the total in apprenticeship programs after 6 to 8 weeks of tutoring keyed to trade-related studies and skill areas. Many of the tutors will be craftworkers, union officials and building contractors.

The NUL will also help 300 men and women over the age of 18 to enter the construction trades as journeymen. An additional 785 person will be placed as trainees, and advanced trainees in other apprenticeship occupations.

Under previous contracts, NUL has placed about 33,000 trainees under the present contract, approximately \$5,449,000 will be subcontracted directly to 33 NUL affiliates for training slots.

The balance will be used to provide technical assistance to NUL's 116 affiliates in working with local CETA prime sponsors to develop other training opportunities for economically disadvantaged persons.

### The Newsprint Pioneers

Forty years ago this month, a stream of newsprint spurted out of a block-long machine in a factory that had risen only months before in a cotton field near Lufkin.

To depression-weary East Texans, it was a bootstrap to economic recovery. To the South's newspaper publishers, it signaled the beginning of independence from foreign newsprint suppliers.

The mill at Lufkin was the first to produce newsprint from southern pines — an achievement once considered impossible — and it stands today as a tribute to the dedication of hundreds who labored for its creation.

Among them were Dr. Charles Holmes Herty, a mild-mannered Georgia chemist, and Ernest Lynn Kurth, a robust Keltys lumberman with a flair for bringing people together.

Until the 1930s, paper manufacturers had written off the South as a newsprint producing region because they felt the high resin content of the southern pines would gum-up the machinery.

However, laboratory experiments by Dr. Herty suggested the obstacle could be overcome. And when Herty met Kurth at Beaumont, they found they shared a common dream. Fired by the chemist's enthusiasm, Kurth altered his own plans for a kraft mill and began championing the cause of newsprint. Southern newspapers and East Texas leaders joined the chorus.

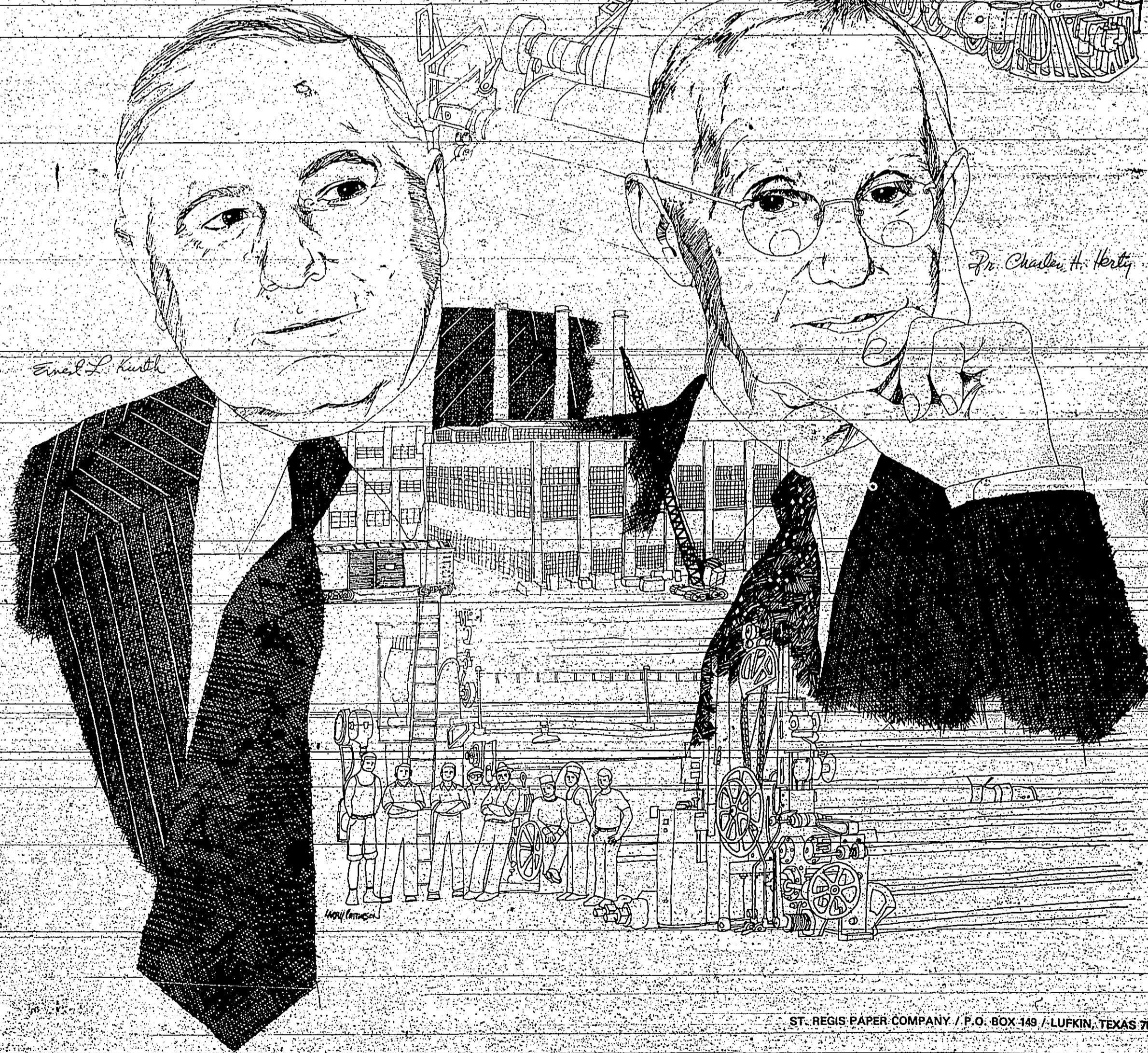
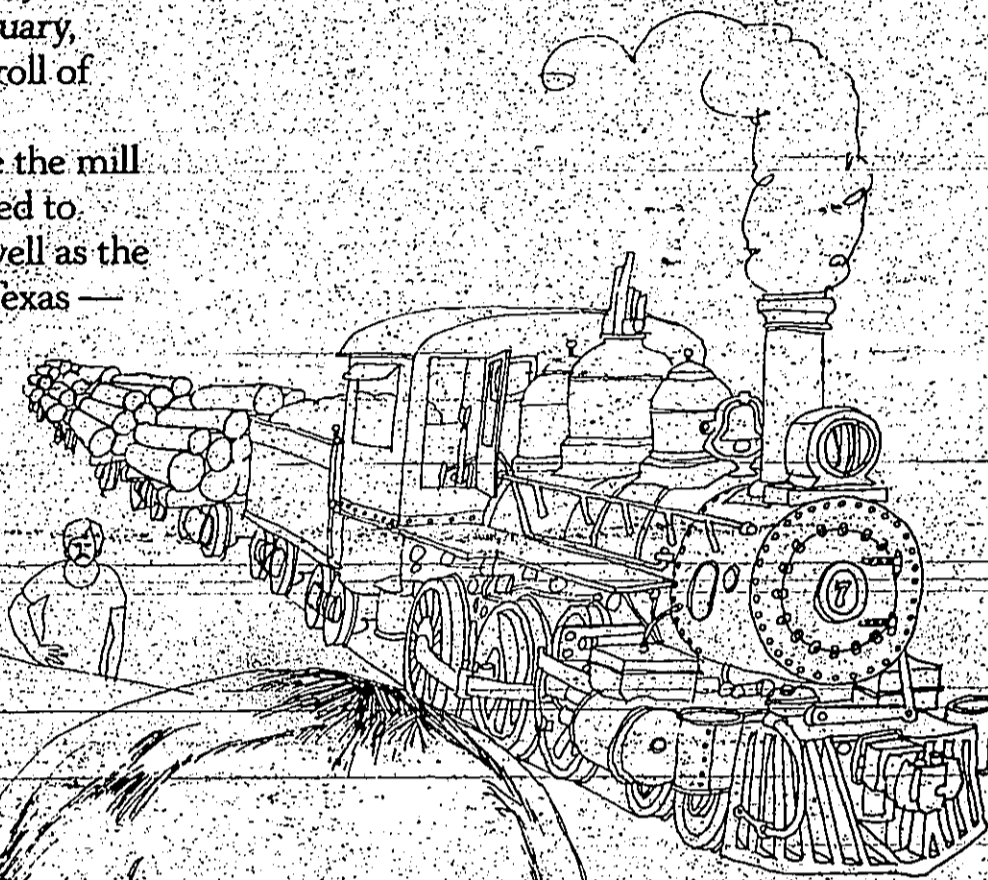
Overcoming dozens of obstacles, Southland Paper Mills was founded in 1938 and construction of a mill began a year later. On a winter morning in January, 1940, the mill turned out its first roll of newsprint.

Ironically, Herty died before the mill opened. Kurth, however, continued to push for the mill's success — as well as the economic improvement of East Texas — until his death in 1960.

The achievements of men like Charles Herty and Ernest Kurth will endure forever in East Texas, a lasting legacy to the unique heritage of the land and its people.

## National Job Outlook

### Post Office Opening Soon

Construction of the new Woodville Post Office began in August and is scheduled to be open for business in March. The new building will contain 4,400 square feet of floor space. There will be 15,000 square feet of parking for employees and customers. The new building is approximately twice the size of the existing post office facility in Woodville. The new building will eliminate this problem. The new postal facility will contain all the most modern energy conservation equipment and features. The rapid growth in the rural areas has placed an increased load on the postal operations, requiring the new building. The new building will provide a storage area and the new building will lease it to the U.S. Postal Service for 30 years.

WASHINGTON — There were 504,426 permanent full-time jobs available through state employment service Job Banks across the Nation during November, the Department of Labor reported in its "Occupations in Demand At Job Service Offices." Occupations in Demand identifies occupations most frequently listed at Job Service offices the previous month. The 504,426 openings at local offices of the Job Service agencies represent an average of 2,654 openings at 190 local Job Banks covered by this month's survey. November's average openings figure is 19.8 percent lower than October and approximately 8.3 percent lower than the November 1978 average. There were more people looking for employment and significantly fewer jobs listed by employers. However, historically there is a seasonal drop in employment at this time of year. The Labor Department's Employment and Training Administration estimates that jobs listed in the bulletin are still available. They represent occupations for which there was a continuing demand during November in the communities listed. Changes in Job Bank openings were computed from "matched samples" developed to cover only those geographic areas represented in both current and previous period surveys. These "matched samples" are called comparable districts. Samples are compared from the current month to previous month and from current month to same month previous year. The trend of fewer job openings being listed in these comparable districts over the year continues. November's Job Bank openings for comparable districts were 15.9 percent less than in June 1977, that one month's job openings have been less than in the same month in secure time since these data were first published previous year.

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### Foreign Land Holdings Told

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Foreign groups and individuals have reported they own 5.2 million acres of U.S. agricultural lands as of Oct. 31, 1979, according to a report released by Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland.

The report, compiled from 6,500 reports filed with the U.S. Department of Agriculture between February and October 1979, under the requirements of the Foreign Investment Disclosure Act of 1978, today was sent to both President Carter and the Congress and released to the public. The 5.2 million acres includes land held as of Feb. 1, 1979, and land brought or sold between Feb. 1 and October 31, 1979.

The report to Congress and the President is required under the Act to analyze in greater detail the reports of holding 2,899,998 acres; purchases (54,432 acres) and sale (4,991 acres) from Feb. 1 through Aug. 24. The study shows that of the 2.9 million acres held on Feb. 1, 1979:

- Foreign owners—ship—concentrated in the South, although foreign agricultural landholdings were reported in all states except Rhode Island, Georgia, South Carolina, and Tennessee.
- Foreign-owned acreage the study showed (see table below):

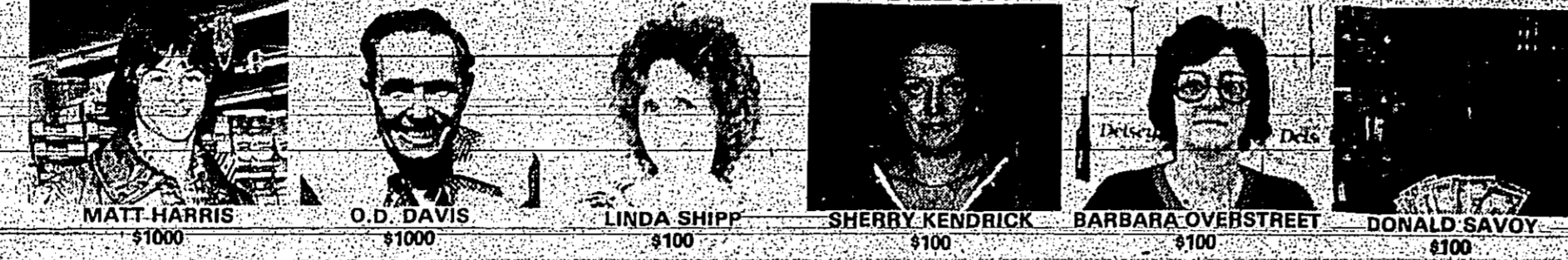
A few countries account for the bulk of foreign-held U.S. agricultural land (table 2). Investors from the United Kingdom, Luxembourg, and West Germany hold 52 percent of all foreign-owned land reported.

U.S. corporations with at least 5 percent foreign ownership hold 76 percent of the 2.9 million acres of foreign-held agricultural land.
