Tyler County commissioners approved operational funds for the Tyler County Historical Commission during a short commissioner's court meeting Monday.

Woodville High School students were on hand observing the court's meeting in preparation for the annual Student Government Day activity which is scheduled for Wednesday.

Don Cole, chairman of the historical commission, appeared before the commissioners and requested funds from the court for the coming year. Commissioners approved \$400 for the commission's use during the coming year and decided to look into a \$300 appropriation which the commission did not receive in 1979.

## Village Mills Post Office Site Sought

The U.S. Postal Service is seeking a suitable site upon which to build and lease a new main post office at Village Mills, Postmaster C.S. Hopkins said.

The "preferred area" for site consideration is on FM Road 3063, between the present post office and the present contract station, which is located at Wildwood Recreation Community.

Minimum site size needed is 15,000 sq. ft., or a lot with dimensions of 100 ft. by 150 ft.

Property owners are asked to submit their site offering not later than March 1, 1980 to: Ray F. Barnes, really management and acquisition specialist, Field Real Estate and Buildings Office, U.S. Postal Service, P.O. Drawer 239, Dallas, Tx. 75221.

After a suitable site has been located the Postal Service will call for construction bids for a building that will be built with private funds and leased to the Postal Service for a basic period of 10 years with renewal options for an additional 20 years.

The proposed new post office will have 1,400 sq. ft. of interior floor space.

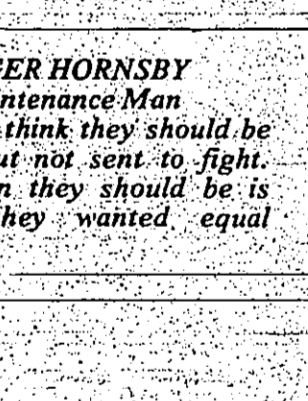

## Capital Highlights

**AUSTIN**—Last Monday marked the official opening of the political campaign season—it was the filing deadline for all candidates seeking office.

Already the 1980 election year seems one destined to stand out in history. Determined to end Texas' tradition as a one-party state, Republicans have fielded candidates for as many offices as possible and party leaders act confident of gaining more seats in the Legislature and on state courts.

In no small way are Republican hopes resting on their governor's promise to call a special session of the Legislature at the "most inopportune time" for incumbent Democratic Governor Clements has long promised to bring the lawmakers to Austin to tackle initiative and referendum wire-tapping authority and tax relief.

Last week he partly fulfilled his promise by saying he will hold the special session in August at a specific date to be announced later.

Why August?

Clements said September bumps into too many deadlines before the Nov. 4 general election.

August is also the month the Democrats will hold their national convention, and the special session will surely disrupt their participation.

The Governor has come under criticism for his intentions of calling in 1970 were extremely lax.

**Teachers Collective Bargaining**—The state's largest teacher organization will seek passage of a collective bargaining bill that will give teachers the right to strike during the regular session would be only four months away, they believe, and Clements is simply trying to put the pressure on them shortly before the 1981 session.

Clements, of course, has his defense for spending that much tax money—he thinks he can force the Legislature to reduce taxes by an

amount more than the special session will cost. His public opinion poll shows voters are split 50-50 on the necessity of a special session.

**State Rep. Matt Garcia**, D-San Antonio, may be nominated by Pres. Jimmy Carter as the new head of the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service, U.S. Atty. Gen. Benjamin Civiletti said he will urge the nomination of the son of a one-time illegal alien.

**AG Briefs**—In a legal opinion issued last week Texas Atty. Gen. Mark White ruled a governmental body may not meet in closed session; to discuss the employment of an independent contractor.

White also ruled the comptroller has the discretion to make payroll deductions from state employees' wages upon their written authorization.

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## Bike-A-Thon Head Named

Clarence T. Jones has been appointed to lead local volunteers in organizing a Bike-A-Thon to be held in Spurger, according to Robert M. Chandler, president of the Texas Gulf Coast Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

In accepting the chairmanship of the event, Jones said, "We hope many residents of this city will volunteer their time and talent to this worthwhile project. There are literally millions of children in this country who need our help because their lungs are threatened by this life-threatening disease."

Cystic fibrosis (CF), the most serious lung-damaging disease, is incurable. One in every 1,600 American children inherits this devastating disease when they receive a gene for CF from each of their parents. It is estimated that 10 million Americans are symptomless and unknowing carriers of the gene which can cause CF in their child. Through research funded by the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, a test to identify carriers is being sought and scientists are pursuing a cure or control for cystic fibrosis.

The funds raised through the Bike-A-Thon will help support these research programs and provide medical care to lengthen the lives of all lung-damaged children in over 120 Cystic Fibrosis Centers in the United States. These CF Centers specialize in the diagnosis and care of the children with cystic fibrosis and other lung-damaging diseases.

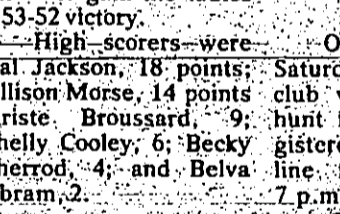

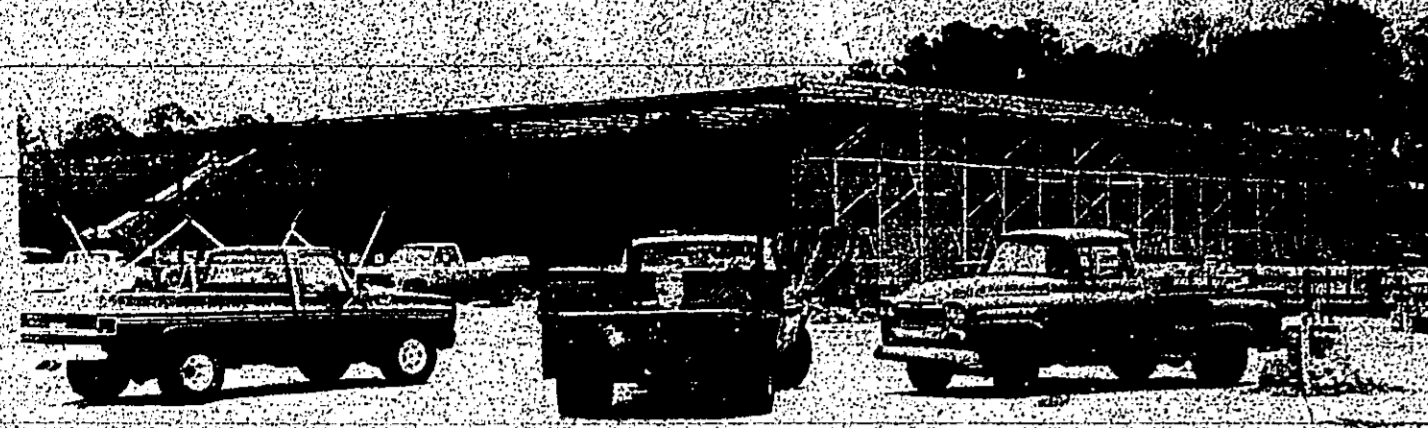

### Education Concern Voiced

FORT WORTH - Among questions appearing in educators' minds is how to best teach students the problem-solving skills necessary in so many kinds of work. A group of nursing researchers, including Texas Christian University associate professor Gail C. Davis, recently completed a preliminary study designed to help answer that question. We thought that if we could learn what different personality factors are involved in using the problem-solving approach, hopefully we could help in teaching students in the way they learn or perform best. Dr. Davis is a member of the faculty at TCUS Harris College of Nursing. Working with eight other nursing researchers from a half dozen schools across the country, Dr. Davis wrote the initial proposal for a comparative study of college students' attitudes and teaching methods. The researchers recruited 201 nursing students from five undergraduate nursing programs and looked at eight student attributes as scholastic aptitude, age, sex, impulsiveness and perceptual ability. The students' 77 instructors ranked the importance of teaching methods such as self study and small group discussion and reported the percent of time they used each one. Dr. Davis said solving based on the preliminary results indicate that the more a student possesses certain attributes, the greater his problem-solving ability is likely to be. Dr. James Robinson, area entomologist for the Texas-Agricultural Extension Service says that he has received several specimens of red necked cane borer infestations of blackberries. Symptoms include a swelling of the stem along a two to three inch section. Eventually, the stem will split. The borer travels inside the stem for about a foot above the swollen section. During this process the insect girdles the stem which eventually dies. The only control for the red necked cane borer is to cut out the infested section and burn it.

Cattlemen in East Texas should pay particular attention to the mineral needs of beef cattle during the winter months. According to Dr. Randall Grooms, Extension area livestock specialist, cattle need a high phosphorus-magnesium mineral. These minerals are essential if the cow is to metabolize and utilize the nutrients available in hay, dead grass and supplemental feeds. Insufficient phosphorus and magnesium limits the amount of energy available to the cow.

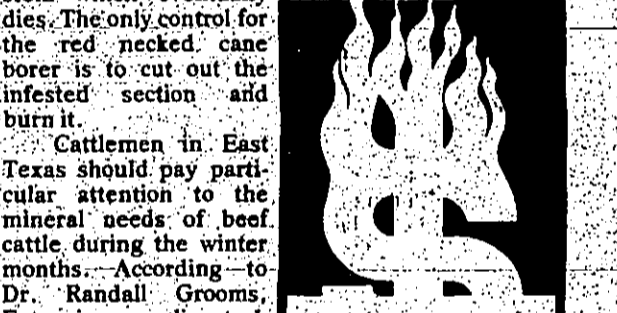
Grooms suggests mineral mixes that contain about six percent calcium, 12 percent phosphorus and three and one-half to four percent magnesium. The consumption of these minerals will be higher during the hay feeding season and will drop dramatically when the lush grass is available in the spring. Salt and minerals should be self-fed and protected from the weather. Keep a fresh supply available at all times.

During cold weather, use the kitchen range fan sparingly. In a very short time, it can blow away a "useful" of warmed, stale air.

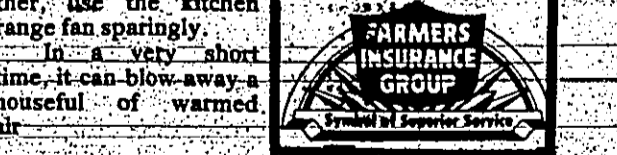

## Attic Tips For Saving Energy

With all of the attention being focused on energy efficiency and conservation, these days, area homeowners need to be aware of a lesser known aspect of energy conservation, an aspect that involves possibly damaging moisture build-up in the attic.

According to Jack Ogden, Consumer Service Representative in the Woodville area, which encompasses South-east Texas and south Louisiana, Ogden remarked during the winter there are ways to achieve the proper air flow in a structure. Vent area required ranges from 4 to 11.7 square inches per square foot of attic floor area, depending on the type of ventilation. He suggests that homeowners could check with area National Energy Watch builders, that they could call their nearest GSU office of the Energy Store, Parkdale Mall, according to Ogden. The home's internal vapor pressure causes this indoor humidity to be pushed through the ceiling and into the attic.

This water vapor moves in the form of gas, and the attic can absorb some of it, commented Ogden. "But if there is not enough ventilation, a saturation point is reached and moisture begins to condense in the wood and in the ceiling material, causing extensive damage," he added.

So any savings in heating costs the homeowner could get from reduced ventilation is

quickly lost because of ineffective insulation, according to Ogden. Also, explained the roof structure starts to deteriorate, and the lesser known aspect of energy conservation, an aspect that involves possibly damaging moisture build-up in the attic, homeowner should check the rate of air flow in the attic. A flow of 4 to 10 cubic feet per minute per square foot of attic floor area is required to prevent damaging build-up of moisture.

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Cost-per-wearing will stretch clothing dollars if you pay attention to it. It's like figuring cost-per-serving in food buying. To find the cost-per-wearing of a garment, just divide the number of times you'll wear it into the purchase price.

Here's an example: you've found a sweater on sale for \$20. You buy it, then don't like it, so you only wear it twice.

Its cost-per-wearing is \$10. An expensive for most people's budgets, even if it was on sale.

On the other hand, say you buy a seeming-ly expensive all-weather coat for \$100 and wear it four times a week for six months.

Its cost-per-wearing is only \$1. A very reasonable cost-per-wearing.

Also, if the coat lasts two years, the cost-per-wearing would be 50 cents, or for three years, just 33 cents.

Remember, a bargain is never a bargain unless it fits a need.

When buying clothing, consider color, pattern, comfort and need.

For wardrobe basics that get lots of wear, buy the best quality you can afford. Think of high-quality basics as investments, and don't just buy "bargain-priced" garments each time you need a clothing item.

Of course, when high-quality basics

actually have sale prices, they can mean a great savings and a really wise investment.

Finally, "bargain-priced" items can have a place in your clothing budget, especially for very limited needs, such as unusual occasions.

To help you decide, always figure the cost-per-wearing of high quality items and "bargain-priced" items. Educational programs are conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin.

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# Pruning Can Help Plants

Currie, Spring flowering plants such as azalea, dog-wood, quince, and winter just before the pruning once they are greening of new spring complete their peak growth is pruning time bloom in the spring for many plants in the Evergreens, such as Junipers, and shrubs such as hollies, is perhaps the least should be pruned in understood and most the winter. Summer abused of all the many flowering shrubs and gardening chores. Stress such as hollies, correct pruning; re-crepemyrtle and mimosa suits in poor growth, call for a dormant improper growth, season or winter unnatural plant forms, pruning. Some plants poor flower and fruit such as roses require production and often a special pruning, the death of the plant. Hybrid tea roses should be pruned just prior to the spring growth in landscape which is late February or early March. Climbing roses with eliminate much should be pruned after their spring or early summer blooms.

Berrying ornamentals such as hollies and pyracantha produce berries, and old or second-year growth, must allow the growth to age to have berries. A continual removal of new growth on these plants will ultimately eliminate potential berries.

Hydrangeas which flower in neither spring or summer, but in between seasons, are best pruned after the flowers fade in mid-summer. Pruning also goes along with transplanting, which is a dormant or winter season choice when moving a plant. Always prune back the branches so as to compensate for the loss of the root system.

Large cuts on trees or cuts over two inches in diameter should be sealed off or treated with a horticultural sealer. When removing large branches, the gardener should always cut back flush with a main trunk or branch so as to eliminate stubs which eventually decay or rot.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin.

The wise gardener chooses dwarfs or semi-dwarfs to plant near the home, at entrance areas, near the patio and in planter boxes. Compact dwarfs such as dwarf yucca, Indian hawthorn, dwarf Chinese holly, dwarf pyracantha, dwarf pittosporum, dwarf nandina and many others will never need pruning.

Large plants should be given ample growing room at their mature size. Such plants are correctly used at back ground or screening material or planted on large walls without windows, never to be pruned. Avoiding pruning not only eliminates the aging process of a plant to take its natural form. Unfortunately, the rounded flowing forms of pyracantha, cleargaug, privets and spires are destroyed by pruning shears.

The gardener should prune with a good reason for pruning. Just to be pruning because it is pruning season is not a good reason for pruning. Reasons for pruning may include correcting winter damage and correcting over-grown plants which are usually too small of an area. Plants may be pruned to increase flower production, with roses and cranesprays, being examples. Fruit trees are pruned to increase new growth and fruit formation. Pruning an old plant will rejuvenate it and cause it to grow. A good example of an old plant often calling for rejuvenation is nandina with its old leggy stems. A severe pruning of nandina will induce a flush of new growth.

Clipped hedges, of course, call for a regular pruning. The gardener looking for low maintenance in the landscape should never establish a clipped or formal hedge but instead allow the hedge to take its natural form.

The gardener is often confused as to the best time for pruning, and rightly so, as different types of plants are pruned at different seasons. Basically, pruning times may be grouped as follows:

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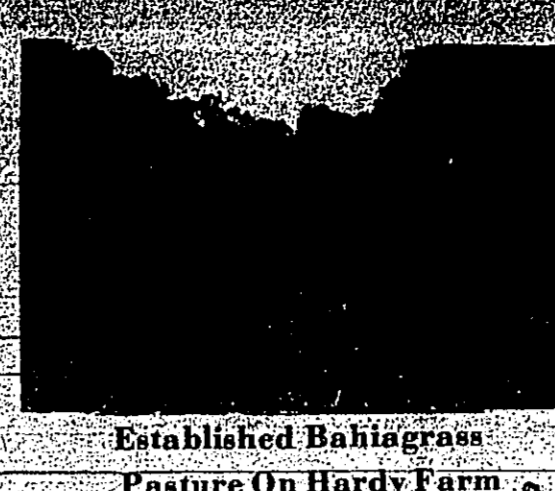

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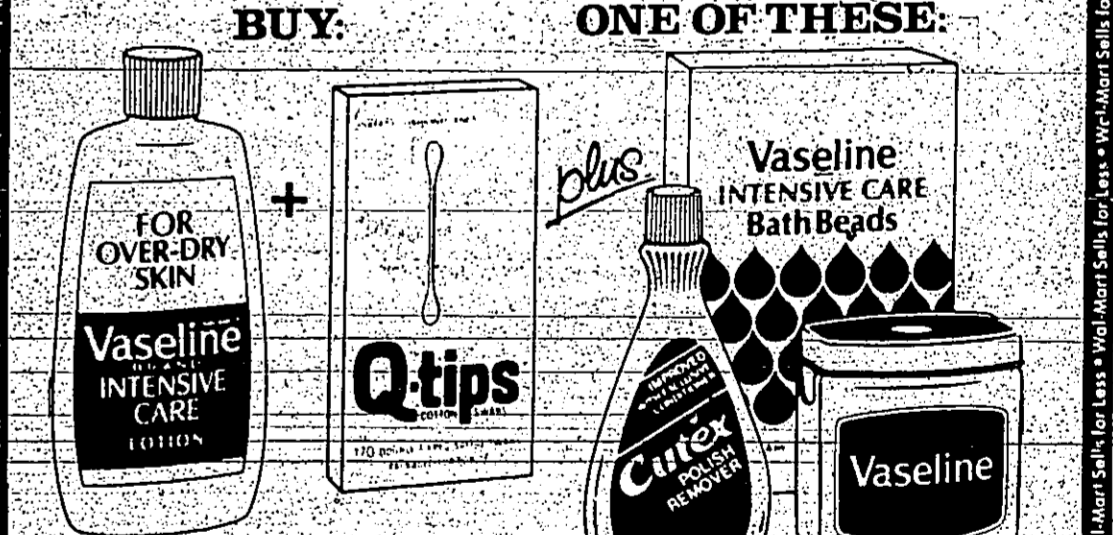
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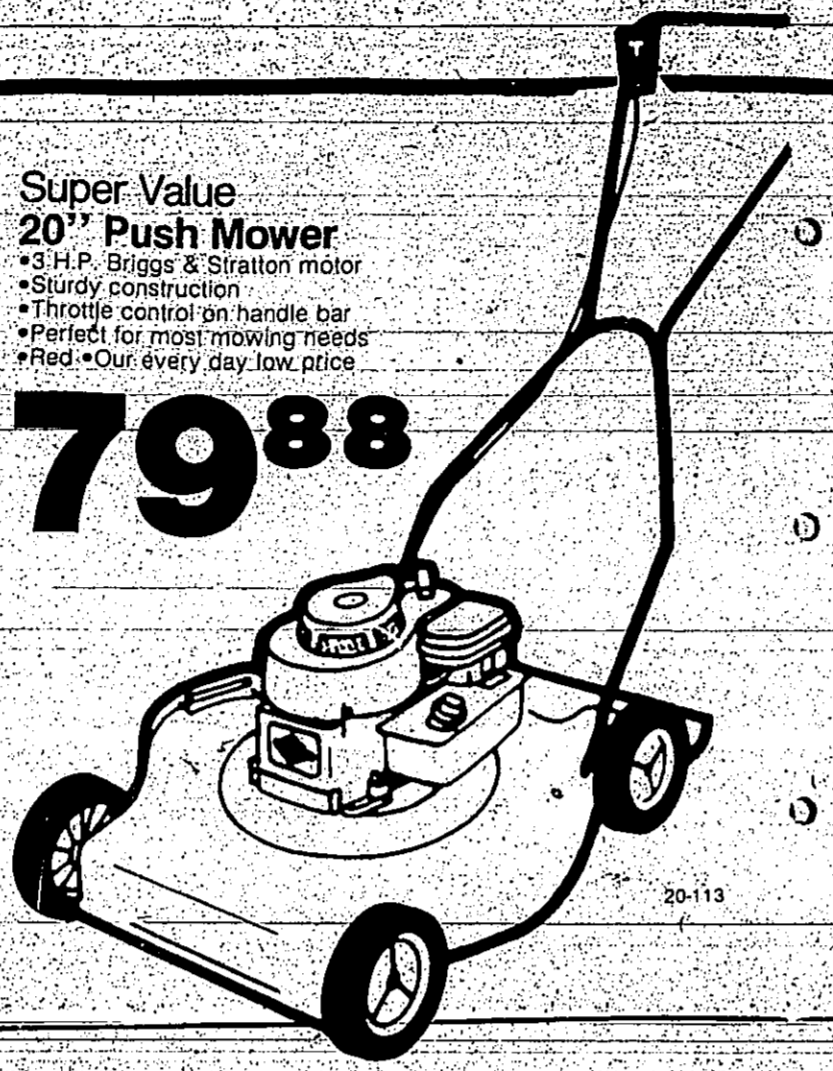

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AUSTIN — Four major pieces of teacher legislation to go before the 1981 Legislature were outlined at a Wednesday (February 6) news conference by Texas State Teachers Association Pres. Cecile Russell.

The four proposals affect job security, health insurance, collective bargaining, and salary increases.

Twelve other areas of education legislation will be supported by TSTA, but the organization does not plan how to introduce legislation on them, Mrs. Russell said.

The four major proposals calls for:

- A "teacher employment act," providing due process and fair dismissal procedures for public school employees.

- A statewide group health insurance program for public school employees and retired teachers, similar to that now provided other state employees and higher education personnel.

- Collective bargaining, authorizing a school employee group representing a majority to bargain with local school boards over terms and conditions of employment and other matters of mutual concern. The majority organization would be recognized exclusively.

- Salary increases, to include the following: A beginning and career salary which recognizes the professional status of teachers; rewards for

- advanced training and experience; allocation of more of the state's resources to teacher salaries; and dealing with cost-of-living increases due to continued inflation.

Specific salary proposals will be developed later, Mrs. Russell said, when a more realistic picture of the state's resources, revenues, and budgets is available.

The 12 "support" areas include:

- Reduced class size

- Expanded sick leave program

- Funding of remedial classes for students who fail competency tests

- Improved bilingual education programs

- Provide three teacher positions on the Teacher Retirement System board of trustees

- Fund cost-of-liv-

## Gains Spot

## On Ballot

The Connally for President Committee qualified John Connally for a spot on the Texas Republican ballot for president by turning in 27,000-plus names to the State Republican Party office; more than five times the number of qualified voters needed.

Texas Campaign Chairman Paul Eggers personally delivered the signatures to the party headquarters after holding a news conference at the State Capitol.

"There are actually more than 30,000 qualified voters on these petitions," Eggers said, "but we had the workers stop counting at 27,000 because they needed to get to work on the big upcoming nationwide telephone Governor Connally will hold February 14."

Eggers said the committee gathered 3,488 pages of names to turn in to qualify Governor Connally for a spot on the May 3 Primary ballot. He said some had more than the 10 signatures each page had lines to accommodate and some were half-filled.

"I would say there are well over 30,000 names of qualified voters," he said. "There is no doubt that the people of Texas support Governor Connally, and they are the people who know him best."

Eggers said workers had obtained enough signatures in Harris County alone (5,600 names) to qualify Connally for the ballot. He added that 4,200 names were turned in from Dallas County.

Eggers said more signatures were coming in daily but would not be included in the total.

"We are obviously quite pleased with this expression of widespread grassroots support for Governor Connally's candidacy," Eggers said. "This is a true indication of the organization we have put together in Texas, which we believe will be vital to the success of any candidate on the Republican ticket this year."

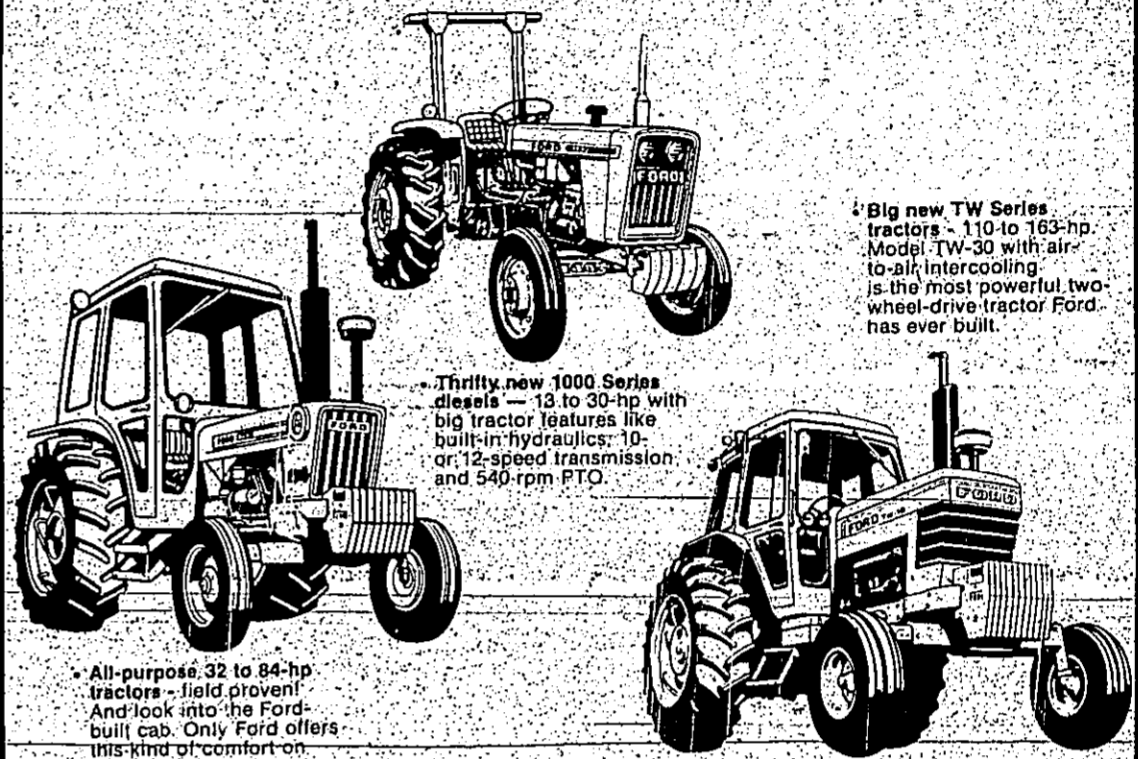

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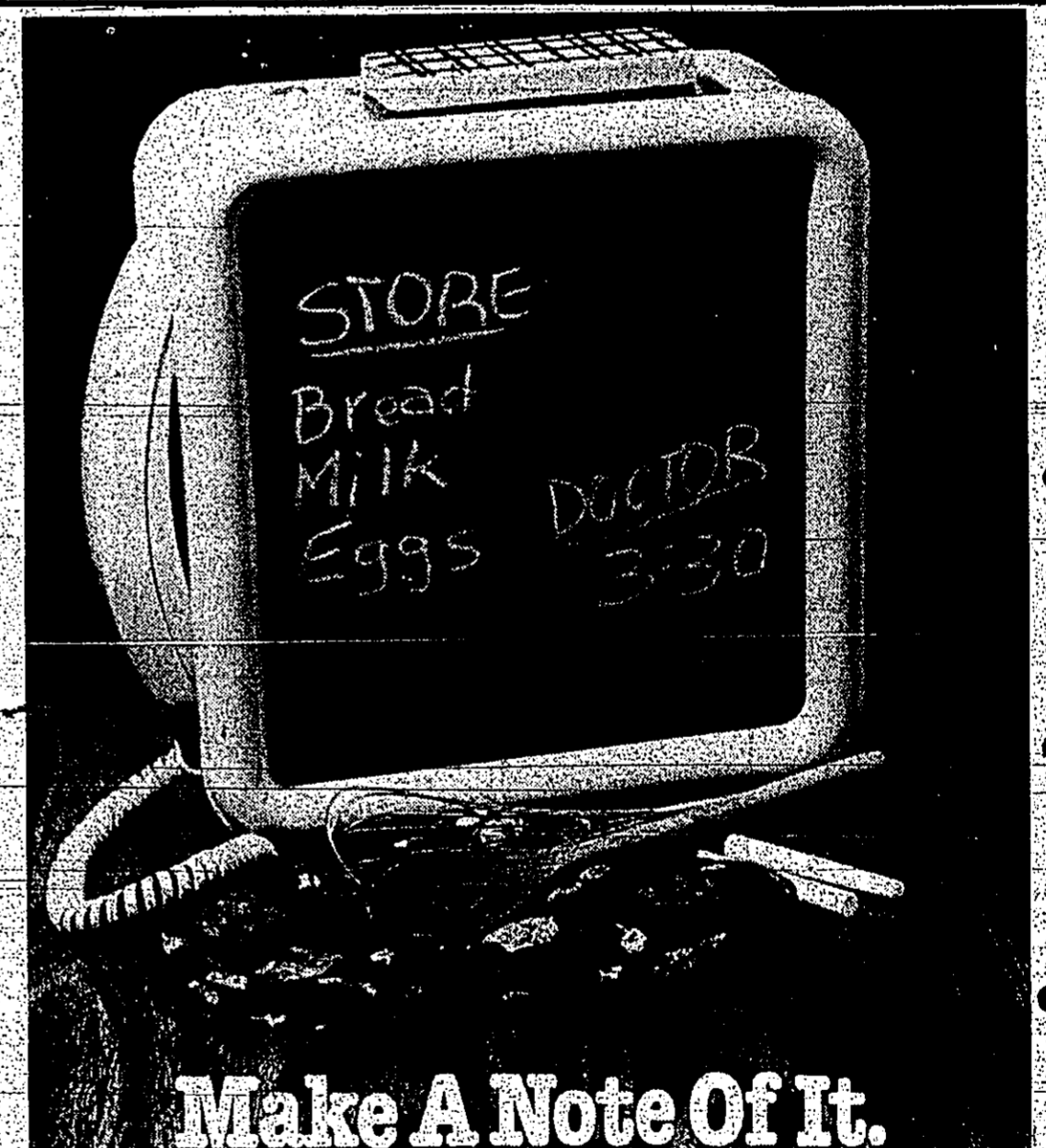
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
