## Jury Finds

# Lee Guilty Of Rape

A seven-man, five-woman jury found Charles Lee of Hillister guilty of aggravated rape and assessed his punishment at 20 years in the Texas Department of Corrections last Friday in the District Courtroom of the Tyler County Courthouse.

The guilty verdict was returned at about 3:35 p.m. Friday after about four hours of jury deliberation and what appeared to be a possible deadlock. A hung jury was anticipated by the many of the spectators after the jury foreman sent out a note to District Judge Monte Lawlis indicating a possible deadlock. The note came at about 3 p.m. and Judge Lawlis called the jurors back out into the jury box and instructed them to continue to attempt to reach a verdict in the case, if at all possible.

Some 30 minutes later the jury returned with the guilty verdict. Testimony was then presented in the punishment phase of the trial. Woodville attorney John Kinney, who served as the chief prosecutor during the trial, and District Attorney George Kirkpatrick asked that the jury assess a sentence of 99 years against Lee. Defense counsel Roy Jerut of Houston asked for minimum sentence of five years. Formal sentencing of Lee will be done by Judge Lawlis in about 10 days.

Lee was on trial for the aggravated rape of a 56-year-old Spurger woman on October 14, 1979.

The trial lasted for four days and at times was overshadowed by charges by Lee of police brutality and violation of his civil rights.

Lee took the stand himself at one point during the trial, during a hearing on a motion by his attorney to suppress Lee's confession.

After a lengthy testimony by Lee,

in the absence of the jury, the motion was denied by Judge Lawlis and the confession Lee made to the crime was permitted into evidence.

During his testimony, Lee made several allegations that he was kicked, beaten and harassed by deputies during his confinement. He also stated that he was denied his right to make a phone call and his right to contact an attorney. He also contended that he was forced to take a polygraph examination at Nacogdoches and claimed that during that test the polygraph operator tapped on the machine with a pencil, causing it to register, indicating that he was not telling the truth.

Lee also testified that on the day after he had made the written and oral confession and been arraigned by Justice of the Peace Roy Drake, that he was taken to a shed off the Spring Hill Road and abused by Tyler County deputies Butch Kraus and Gordon Toler and a third man. He stated that Toler hit him beside the face with the rope and that he was also struck with a "black thing." He said the officers attempted to throw him in a creek.

He said the deputies then took him in the shed, threw a rope over a

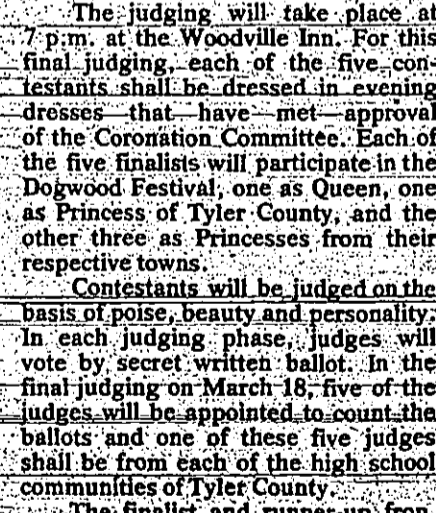

rafter and put it around his neck. He said he was forced to stand on his tiptoes while one of the officers beat him with a rubber hose. He said one of the men pointed a gun at him and said "shoot that nigger."

He also contended that Deputy Kraus told him he would take him to his mother's front yard and that he would die there along with some of other members of his family. He contended that the only reason he signed the confession was because he was in fear of his family's life.

On cross examination by John Kinney, Lee admitted that the alleged beating occurred after he had signed the confession and not before, and as a result of this fact, the trial from that point forward was limited only to evidence which pertained to a time period from the time of the rape to the time of the confession. Nothing which allegedly occurred after that time was presented to the jury.

Lee also contended that the rape was committed by a friend of his named "Amigo" and that this friend had left the victim's coin purse in his car. The coin purse was the only one piece of physical evidence that linked Lee to the scene of the crime. Prior to the written confession, Lee took Sheriff Lewis Craven and Deputy George Reynolds out to a pipe line the chief investigator of the case and testified for several hours during the trial. He also denied any mistreatment of Lee; however, he did testify that there was no threat of violence against Lee during his confinement.

At the conclusion of this hearing, Sheriff Lewis Craven also testified that there was no threat of violence made to get Lee to sign a confession. He said that Lee told him personally that he would submit to a polygraph. "I told him he did not have to have one," Craven said.

### Capital Highlights

**AUSTIN**—Embattled House Speaker Bill Clayton, alleged to have accepted a bribe in return for legislative favors for an insurance company, is not giving up without a fight but Gov. Bill Clements is backing away from his promise to sell a special session of the Legislature in August.

Clayton will testify before a Houston federal grand jury next month about a political contribution he received in his office last fall in the presence of an FBI informant. Clayton said he temporarily accepted the money to avoid "embarrassing" the donor and later tried unsuccessfully to return it, and the grand jury will want him to elaborate on the incident. Clayton apparently is on tape as being offered at least \$200,000 and possibly as much as \$650,000 during a meeting between himself, Houston labor leader L. C. Moore, and FBI informant Joseph Hauser.

The scandal has put a tone of uncertainty on business-as-usual at the Capitol. If Clayton is indicted after his grand jury testimony, he will probably be asked by his colleagues to vacate the Speaker's platform.

Clayton's resignation will turn the gavel over to Speaker Pro Tem Tim VonDohlen, D-Goliad, a conservative Democrat and one of Clayton's top lieutenants.

The House will not elect a new speaker until the next regular session in January, or until a special session is called by Gov. Clements.

**SESSION IN DOUBT**

Almost from Day One of his new administration, Clements has promised to call legislators back to Austin and hold their feet to the fire until they pass bills giving Texans initiative and referendum, wrapping up of Zavalla, and one Department juvenile were arrested included ammunition.

Last week, with one eye on Clayton's troubles, Clements told the press he is having doubts about calling the session, once promised for August.

Clements is concerned that the legislators would be more interested in finding a replacement for Clayton than in passing his three issues.

"There's a question over what would be the first order of business and whether we'd ever get to the second," Clements said.

**CONVENIENT OUTS**

Whatever the reasons for backing away, Clements has a convenient out with the Clayton problem, most legislators agree. They also see other motives behind his method.

# Foods Traced To Indians

COLLEGE STATION — Southwestern foods trace much of their heritage to the Indians, says Dr. Rode Hindall Postel, a foods and nutrition specialist.

Blended with spicy touches added by the Spanish, the foods became the multitude of flavorful and hearty dishes typical of Southwestern cooking today, she adds.

Dr. Postel is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Southwestern Indians were predominantly farmers who raised large crops of major squash, beans, melons and pumpkins.

Unlike other agricultural tribes from the various regions of the United States, the men, rather than the women,

of the Southwest tribes did the farm labor. Hunting for wild game was obtained by trading with tribes who hunted buffalo on the Great Plains.

Thus, meats were used sparingly — most were buffalo, rabbit and some wild turkey.

Corn was hand-ground between rough stones and the bread was baked in outdoor domeshaped ovens typical of the pueblos, or Southwestern Indian villages.

In addition to these farm-grown products, the Indians used fruits and seeds of plants native to the region.

Fruit of the prickly pear cactus, beans of the wild mesquite and nuts from the piñon pine were some.

Mesquite beans were pounded into flour, mixed with water to form a dough, shaped into tiny "thin cakes and sutt bakes."

Pinon cakes were made by the same method.

Pinole was made from dried, maize, mesquite beans, parched corn and water.

On some occasions meat jerky was pounded into bits and added to the mixture to make "pinole."

These foods may seem dull and bland, but add the influence of the Spanish, who brought garlic, onions, peppers, tomatoes, highly seasoned sausage, citrus fruits and spices, and you have today's exciting Southwestern cuisine.

# Catfish Economics

COLLEGE STATION — Smaller fish and larger farms are the key to maximizing profits on Texas catfish farms, according to researchers with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas A&M University System.

"You can increase profits by producing a one-pound cheaper and getting a lower price than feeding the fish to a larger size, and getting a higher price," Dr. Wade Griffin told participants at a recent Fish Farming Conference here sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"But it does depend on the market the farmer develops. If there is no market for smaller fish, then of course, it is best to keep the fish until they reach a marketable size."

Griffin, an associate professor of agricultural economics, said research studies show that as the size of the fish farm increases, average cost-of-the-operation continues to decrease. Since there are no fish farms in Texas larger than 100 acres, the research studies concentrated on 96-acre farms with 80 acres of water. Griffin said that the most profitable size farm for Texas fish producers. He recommended a capacity of 3,000 pounds of fish per acre.

Regarding reasons cited by fish farmers as to why the fish industry remains undeveloped in Texas, Griffin noted the No. 1 reason was non-availability of water. Inefficiencies and costs due to the lack of flat land in Texas was the second-most common reason listed.

# TOPICS IPS TECHNIQUES

Family savings pose a challenge, but it can be done. During the last decade the average household managed to save about six percent of their disposable income, but during 1979 the level dropped.

Many families are not saving at all. There are tactics that lead to saving success, however, for families who want to save in safe, liquid, regulated ways. Some families have made saving a habit.

They pay themselves first... a portion of every paycheck goes into savings regardless of other expenses.

Other families need different tactics to force themselves to save. "Coin play" is one. Coin savers set aside a jar or piggy bank or special drawer. Selected coins, quarters, dimes, are diverted into the jars.

Some people empty their pockets at the end of every day and put all change in a jar.

Family members may race to see who can fill a jar the fastest.

Sometimes labeling a jar, such as "Summer Vacation Money" or "College Fund" helps the whole family join the project.

Here's another idea: change a debit to a credit -- or a debit to a savings.

With this method, when a debt is finished, use the now-freed money for savings instead of spending.

For example, when the refrigerator is paid off, save the amount that had gone for its monthly payment.

Pick a time period during which nothing is spent that isn't absolutely necessary.

Be sure to set limits to the "time-say two months" and mark it off on a calendar.

During this time, cut out movies, "eating out," babysitter, sales, beer, cigarettes, and feel like a hero for the time involved.

You can learn about yourself during this time, and probably

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## Retirement Plan For Farmers

COLLEGE STATION - Starting with the 1979 tax year, farmers and other employees have a new retirement plan alternative to evaluate for their employees. It's called the Simplified Employee Pension (SEP).

Under SEP an employer may contribute annually to an employee's individual retirement account or annuity (IRA) set up with a bank, insurance company or other qualified sponsor of an IRA.

SEP is an alternative which farmers and other may consider for establishing a retirement plan for employees.

SEP contributions may be made during the 1979 calendar year or until April 15 and still be used as a 1979 deduction for calendar year employees. However, individuals getting two-thirds of their gross income from farming must make SEP

contributions by March 1. Contributions must be included in the employee's gross income for the calendar year for which the amount is contributed.

If contributions are made after 1979 Form W-2s are issued, then each employee must receive an additional Form W-2 showing the amount of contribution to the pension plan. The contribution is treated as an adjustment to income from Form 1040, and thus is excluded from the employee's taxable income.

All eligible employees must participate in an employer's SEP. The SEP should be advantageous to employers as an additional alternative for personal management as well as a means for influencing income tax liability. Furthermore, yearly contributions are not required, which especially advantageous to farmers and ranchers whose income varies from year to year.

With the many reporting requirements today, the SEP was created to make it easier for employers to provide a pension arrangement without having to file a lot of forms, says the economist.

In fact, the Contribution Agreement (Form 5305-SEP) is not filed with the Internal Revenue Service, a copy is distributed to each participating employee.

## Record Veteran Benefits Expected

The Veterans Administration will pay a record \$566 million in dividends during 1980 to 4.1 million veterans holding GI life insurance policies. Ted W. Myatt, Director, Veterans Administration Regional Office, reports the figure is an \$81 million increase over the amount paid in 1979. VA will make payments throughout the year on anniversary dates of individual policies kept in force from World War I, World War II and the Korean Conflict. "All VA insurance dividends are made automatically and there is no need for policy holders to apply for them or to contact VA about them," Myatt reported that 3,304,000 veterans who kept their GI insurance in force will total nearly \$32 million, an average payment of \$62, up from \$48 in 1979. The 93,300 World War I policyholders will receive \$27.8 million, an average of \$298 each. The 1979 figure was \$256. Certain World War II and Korean Conflict veterans with service-connected or serious non-service-connected disabilities will receive dividends for the first time on their insurance policies in 1980. A total of \$15.75 million will go to 168,000 holders of these special policies, an average dividends of \$94.
