TCM & PHA Seeks Donations

Sheltered Workshop Nears Reality

The Tyler County Mental & Physical Handicap Association's TCM&PHA board of directors, Marie Riley, president, informed the group that Temple Industries had donated \$10,000 to the workshop project. Riley's announcement of the gift was made only minutes before the organization voted to accept a proposal from the U.S. Army to do actual construction and remodeling work on the workshop building. The organization is utilizing the former

Veterans of Foreign Wars building in Woodville.

Chief Edward Sayers, representing a detachment of U.S. Army engineers from Fort Polk, La., was present at the Thursday night meeting and stated that the Army was ready to assist with the project. He said that Army engineers are scheduled to arrive in Woodville the first Monday in April to begin work on the renovation of the VFW building and grounds.

The sheltered workshop is now slated to open on June 2.

Various items are needed now by the TCM&PHA in order to complete this project. The board indicated Thursday night that an intensive effort would be made during the next few weeks to seek financial and material donations.

Persons wishing to make a donation are encouraged to contact Joyce Crowson, building committee chairman, at 283-3322.

Some of the items which are needed include: 1,000 gallons of fuel to be used by the military detachment here; fertilizer and seed for three and one-half acres; 300 feet of 1/4" scotch coat PE pipe and 300 feet of 2" galvanized steel pipe; miscellaneous plumbing fittings and a meter box; gravel; two 60' culverts;

four twin flood security lights, one flagpole, lumber, plywood, posts and concrete for a billboard sign for the workshop;

Forming and concrete for the construction of a wheelchair ramp; porch columns; three flush solid core doors; six windows; 32 gallons of water base paint and brushes; rest room fixtures including toilets, urinals, sinks, plumbing supplies, a heat vent light, 30-gallon water heater, and handicap apparatus.

Electrical items needed by the workshop include 16 lights, 30 outlets, four poles and 1,000 feet of No. 4 triplex wire. A considerable amount of lumber is needed for various areas of construction and repair of the building.

Queen's Train Complete

Last December the Dogwood officials took a look at the queen's train and decided it needed a replacement. They called upon a committee to come up with an idea and follow it through.

The five ladies chosen for this gigantic chore where Dr. Blanche Phillips, Ruth Stecher, Mary Ann Johnson, Willie Mae Feagin and Maurine Gassiot. With Dr. Phillips as chairman, the group began to work on design and Mrs. Gassiot created the final design. Ralph Phillips, son of Dr. Phillips designed and built a huge frame to hold the train as it was worked on in the study of the Johnson home and work got underway.

The basic train is made of white velvet, with a lining of white slipper satin. It is twelve feet in length, and falls from a fitted yoke. All decorations

on the train are handmade. The center of interest is a braided gold dogwood branch running the length of the train. The large dogwood blossoms are of trapunto, and are fashioned of gold lame, edged with metallic gold cord. The trapunto centers are covered with amber and emerald stones. The leaves are of gold mesh with sequin trim.

The entire train is framed by a double gold sequin border, inside of which is a row of miniature gold lame dogwood blossoms and leaves with sequin and emerald trim.

The ladies have met two and three times weekly while working on the project and say they believe they could write a cookbook now on quickie pickup meals. Mr. Johnson can soon get back in his study and another beautiful dogwood queen's train will be enjoyed by all.

Lacox Promoted

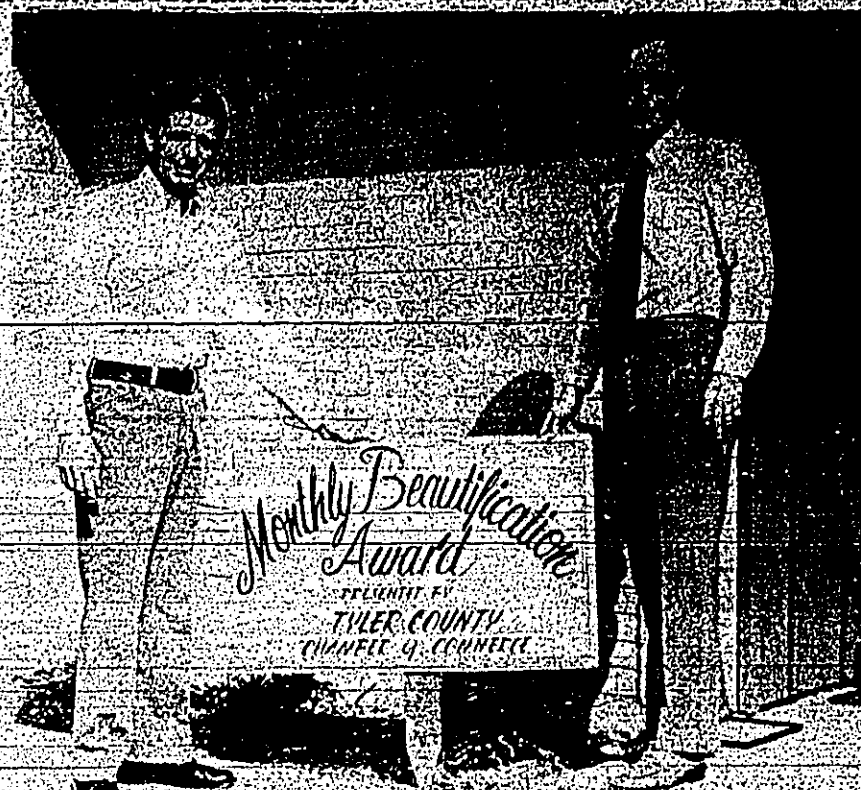

Lora E. Whiteley, State Property Tax Board in accordance with the provisions of Senate Bill 621, passed by the Texas Legislature in 1979.

Mrs. Whiteley noted that homeowners are eligible for a \$5,000 school home-stead exemption, and that certain disabled persons, and those aged 65 or older may qualify for additional exemptions from the tax savings available to them.

Also farmers and ranchers have the option of having their agricultural land taxed at its productive rather than market value.

To qualify for exemptions and productivity valuation, however, application must be made to the school tax office before the district's rendition periods end on April 30.

"District resident are encouraged to review the pamphlet and make application for all tax relief to which they are entitled before the rendition period ends," Mrs. Whiteley said.
