## Western Week Soon

The 37th Annual Tyler County Dogwood Festival officially gets underway March 28 and 29 with Western Weekend. A full week of events follows with the climax on Saturday, April 5, with the Dogwood Coronation and Pageant in the open-air amphitheater.

The Western Weekend, which was incorporated into the Dogwood activities in 1968, brings about 1800 trailriders from throughout East Texas to Woodville for the exciting weekend. Trailriders converge on Woodville for the parade on Saturday, March 29, at 2:00 p.m. The parade boasts only riders, horses, and horse-drawn vehicles. Owen's Country Sausage is again bringing its six-horse Belgium Hitch Team and Wagon.

An open rodeo follows the parade and is held at the 4-H FFA Arena, located west of Woodville on Highway 190. Calf roping, steer dogging, bronc riding, bull riding, and girls' barrel racing, as well as the popular goat scramble for the youngsters will all take place in the all-weather arena.

A Western Weekend Sweetheart will also be crowned. She will be chosen from the trailrider clubs entering the parade. Two runners-up will also be chosen. Karen Spurlock, coordinator of the Sweetheart Contest, will see that the girls are judged as follows: 25% on appearance, 25% on personality, and 50% on riding ability. The girls will be judged immediately before the rodeo, with the production company providing the judges. The Dogwood Western Weekend Sweetheart will be sponsored by the Dogwood Festival Committee to represent the Dogwood Festival at the Jasper Lions Club Rodeo. The grandstand is covered with over 1600 seats available. Tickets at the gate are priced at \$3.00 for adults and \$2.00 for children.

All cowboys and cowgirls interested in competing for the 18 trophies that will be awarded should call Don Harris Cattle Company in Orange, (713) 883-8244, between 8 a.m. and 12 noon on Friday, March 28. Entry fee for barrel racing is \$15 and for all other events the fee is \$25.

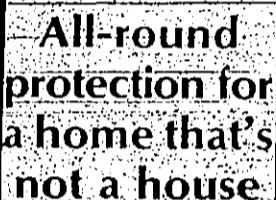
## Gear Up For Spring Gardens

CLINTON R. CURRIE, County Extension Agent, says it's time to gear up for that spring vegetable garden. And two major steps are getting the soil ready and planting at the right time.

Some vegetable crops are cold-hardy and can tolerate light frosts or freezes. These include beets, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, peas, radishes, spinach, cauliflower, collards, mustard, potatoes, kale and planting turnips. These can be planted in late winter or early spring. Planting warm-season crops in late winter or early spring will produce more high-quality plants, beans, squash, produce. During the hot months, water, summer such heat-tolerant crops as southern melons, cantaloupes, sweet potatoes, squash, are sensitive to cold and small-fruited temperatures and will tomatoes do best.

Planting the best highest frost gardeners adapted varieties that must be aware of the difference in the average date of the last frost for their particular areas.

According to the National Weather Service, the average dates of last frosts for various sections are as follows: South Texas, Feb. 1; Contender, Toprock, Central Bend, Feb. 17; Wade, Kentucky, Southeast Texas and Up-Tenderop, Greencrest, Post, Feb. 25; Southwest Texas (Winder Garden), Wonder, Mar. 1; East Texas, Dade, Romano, Mar. 15; East Texas, Jackson Wonder, Henas, Mar. 7; Central Texas, Bush, Fordhook, Texas, Mar. 25; North 242; Central Texas, Mar. 28; Rolling Wonder, Plains, Apr. 1; South Central, Bravo, Panhandle, Apr. 22; Cantaloup, Per. It's also wise to lift, Rio Gold, TAM wait until the soil has warmed before planting seeds of warm-season crops. Soil temperature, Danvers 126, Nan at the four-inch depth, Red Coré Chante should be in the upper 60's or into the 70's before planting in Calumet, Bonanza Merit, (white) Silver Queen, Country Gentleman.

**Schools Board Association Will Meet March 20**

Evadale School will host a meeting of the Schools Board Association on Thursday, March 20, at 7:30 p.m. for member superintendent and board members to hear the results of a survey just completed for the Association to check on sources of federal grant funds for the member school districts.

The Southeast Texas School Board Association is made up of 16 "small" independent school districts ranging in size from about 100 students to about 1,800 students.

The meeting was announced jointly by Joe Jordan of Spurger, president of the association, and Jack Hardy of Evadale, the association's lobbyist at the State Legislature.

"We have known for a long time," Jordan said, "that all the larger school districts such as those in Houston and Dallas have entire staffs whose job is to seek out Federal grants and money from outside sources, but what we did not know was whether small school districts such as those in our Association have a chance of getting some of the same grants."

The main purpose of the Southeast Texas School Board Association is to give the small school districts an equal voice with large metropolitan school districts.

# TOPICS TIPS TECHNIQUES

**BEWARE OF ANTIQUES**  
Antique stoves may have strong appeal, but a watchword is "Buyer beware." After years of use, antique cast-iron stoves are likely brittle. They may have cracks in the stove body, wobbly legs, sagging or rusted hinges, warped doors, missing grates, and louvers or dampers that don't work properly. A welder can repair many of these problems, but in many cases, older units aren't worth the risk they bring to a home.

**TODAY'S 'HOT' MODELS**  
Today's "hottest" models are those that look like the old-fashioned wood stoves, or you can find those with a modern touch that look like electric or gas heaters.

Currently, air-tight stoves are in big demand. These units have an air intake that restricts the amount of air entering the stove so wood burns more slowly.

**'AIR-TIGHT' CAUTION**  
One caution on air-tight units, though, there's some question of their safety, since the slow-burning wood gives off gases which form creosote deposits in the chimney. Creosote can start a chimney fire if allowed to accumulate, especially if the stove is overloaded with a roaring fire.

However, frequent checks for creosote accumulations in the chimney can assure hazard-free operation. Educational programs are conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service for people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin.

**RECIPE OF THE WEEK: HONEY MUFFINS**  
2 cups flour  
1 teaspoon salt  
3 teaspoons baking powder  
1 cup milk  
4 tablespoons honey  
1 egg, beaten  
1/4 cup melted shortening

Sift flour with salt, baking powder, mix milk, honey, beaten egg, and melted shortening. Add to dry mixture. Stir just long enough to moisten dry ingredients. Fill greased muffin pan one-half full. Bake at 400 degrees F. for 25 to 30 minutes or until delicately browned. Makes 12 muffins.

## County Farms Acres Treated For Conservation

During 1979, 1370 acres of Tyler County farmland were treated and served by one or more of the conservation practices available under the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP), according to Harry Stafford, Chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) committee. The ACP is the oldest and most widely used ASCS program.

To help farmers and ranchers solve soil and water conservation problems, ASCS provided cost-share funds totaling \$47,362. This assistance was used by 48 producers to carry out needed conservation measures. Stafford said: "Such measures include planting trees and establishment and improvement of soil proved grasses. Stafford said soil erosion is a number one problem facing farmers today. "With today's more intensive cropping, it is vital that producers perform good soil and water conservation practices such as those offered under the ACP."

He pointed out that the objectives of the program are to provide solutions to the problems of farmland being a source of agricultural pollution, or land affected by wind and water erosion. "We have an obligation to protect soil and water resources for the benefit of farmers and the public, and the ACP endeavors to meet this obligation," the ASCS official said.

## Tyler County Says 'NO' To Beef Referendum

Preliminary results of a nationwide referendum indicate cattlemen have voted against inaugurating a national beef research and information program. Ray Fitzgerald, Administrator of the USDA's ASCS, which conducted the referendum, said of the 231,032 ballots cast, 151,119 or 65 percent, were against the program. There were 79,913 votes in favor of the program.

## Changes-In-Store For Phone Users

Dramatic changes are in store for telephone customers during the 1980s, predicts Doyle E. Rogers, Southwestern Bell's vice president for Texas. "New phones, new systems, new services, new uses lie ahead," Rogers said as he reviewed the 1970s and looked ahead to the new decade.

Southwestern Bell is attuned to the coming changes, but our primary concern is still providing quality, day-to-day phone service for our customers in Texas," he emphasized. Rogers said that the company invested \$7.3 billion for growth and improvements in the state during the last 10 years. Forecasts of future growth indicate the need for almost \$9 billion more within the next six years. Construction expenditures in 1980 alone will total \$1.2 billion.

The vice president pointed out that growth is just one of several factors which will bring about significant phone changes. Other factors include:

- Far reaching advances in technology.
- Continued double digit inflation.
- Changing social patterns.

While each factor has an individual impact, they're all related, Rogers noted. He used growth as an example.

"Telephone growth is a key indicator of a state's vitality. We've almost doubled the number of phones served in Texas since 1970. Currently, we're adding more than 400,000 phones per year," Rogers pointed out.

Southwestern Bell now serves 8.5 million Texas phones. By 1985, the figure will be about 11.7 million.

"However, adding those phones isn't that straightforward," Rogers added. "This state has a very mobile population. Consequently, we have to install about seven phones to gain one. Taking care of that telephone movement is expensive."

Growth to Southwestern Bell, Rogers said, is a mixed blessing. "We're fortunate to be in a state that is growing and prospering, but telephone growth strains our ability to find investment capital in an overburdened money market."

The vice president said that if current double digit inflation trends continue, the amount of investment dollars needed in Texas during the four years of the 1980s could outstrip the six years.

Technology, too, has an impact on the growth-inflation situation. "Technological advances are a prime reason we can continue to meet growth," Rogers said.

He cited Electronic Switching Systems (ESS). Today, more than 60 percent of Southwestern Bell's Texas customers are served by the computer-operated switching gear, the highest ratio in the nation.

"The flexibility and options of ESS open the door to phone marvels of coming years," Rogers pointed out.

"Today, ESS customers have options for call waiting, call forwarding, abbreviated dialing, and conference calling. But imagine future options such as automatic recording of a message, or automatically forwarding a pre-recorded message at a specific time, or being able to determine who's calling you before answering the phone."

"We may be able to vote by phone or call home and start the oven or the lawn sprinkler. Eventually, homes may have a central communications console that gives access to all kinds of data information. You may even be able to dial up your newspaper on the communications center TV screen."

Rogers acknowledged that some of these advances may be further away than this decade. "Yet, I'm convinced that by 1990, we'll be offering services most of us are not even thinking of today," he said.

No far away are such advances as transmitting calls by light, and a new mobile phone system. Sending calls by lightwave-using laser beams over glass fibers-already is being done in Chicago. New large scale systems are planned in other parts of the nation.

In Texas, a lightwave transmission system will be installed late in 1980 between a Greenville telephone office and a microwave tower a few miles away.


"Advanced Mobile Phone Service (AMPS) offers great strides in mobile service," Rogers said. Other innovations will center around data transmission and large scale computer-operated switching equipment.



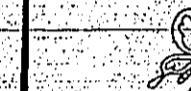
