## New Post Office To Open Soon

Woodville Post office Officer-in-Charge Elmer L. Hanna issued a letter to each postal customer this week informing postal customers who use the Woodville station of the upcoming move to new more modern quarters at the corner of Wheat and Reid Streets within the next few weeks.

Included in the announcement Hanna told the customers that the new boxes at the new facility will be "key type" and will require a deposit of one dollar per key.

Hanna also informed the customers of possible post office box number and size changes.

"The employees of the Woodville post office hope you will not be inconvenienced by any of the new changes and we will continue to give you the kind of service you expect and deserve," he said.

Construction of the new post office began in August and will contain some 4,400 square feet when finished. There is over 15,000 square feet of parking space for employees and customers.

The new facility is approximately double the size of the present office facility which currently handles some 11,000 persons out of the present location.

The new postal facility will contain all new modern energy conservation equipment and features and more modern postal equipment.

John Q. Vanderburg of Silsbee is the proprietor and leaser of the new building. The lease term for the new building is 30 years.

Answer the Census, because Tyler County is counting on you!

Just about everyone knows that the Census counts people. Every 10 years, the Federal government takes an accurate count of every man, woman, and child in the United States.

The information is used to project population growth, and economic and social needs.

What you probably didn't realize is that the Census also controls the flow of dollars to our community.

Here in Tyler County, each person that is not counted in the Census will cost Tyler County over \$250 in federal funds.

Those funds come in the form of grants-in-aid to education, school lunch subsidies, Community Action funds, CETA, Small Business Administration funds, HUD Block Grants, Social Security funds, and a host of other federally subsidized programs.

Still, thousands of people are not getting counted. In 1970, over 2.5 percent of the total population, almost five and one half million people weren't counted. And, as a result, their hometowns and communities were short, changed.

You can help. By now you should have received your Census form.

If you haven't, or if you have any questions about completing it call the special toll free number "hotline" in Beaumont for assistance. Phone number is 1-800-392-8384.

They can help you in completing your form over the phone, or they can send someone to help you in person. Census forms in Spanish and French are also available.

Starting on April 11 the Census office will start counting homes that they have received and matching them against known addresses.

If you have not returned your Census form, an enumerator will be sent to your home to help you complete the form.

The Census Office in Beaumont also needs people from the Woodville area to serve as enumerators in Tyler County. If you'd be interested in helping Tyler County count please call 1-800-392-8384 or 713-636-1330. Interviews are scheduled in the Alan Shivers Library.

You have an opportunity to help Tyler County receive valuable Federal funds, simply by filling out and returning your Census form.

Please answer the Census, we're all counting on you.

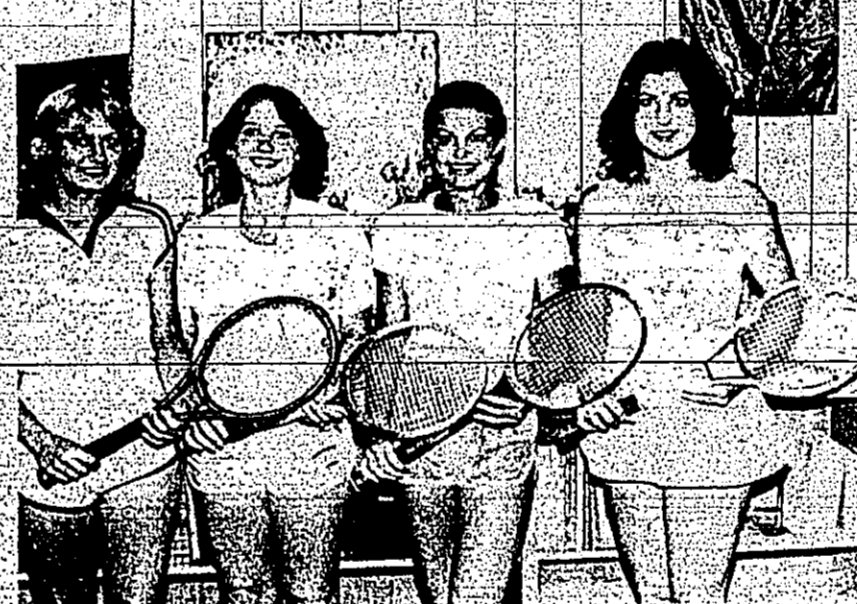
### Little Theater To Hold Social May 2

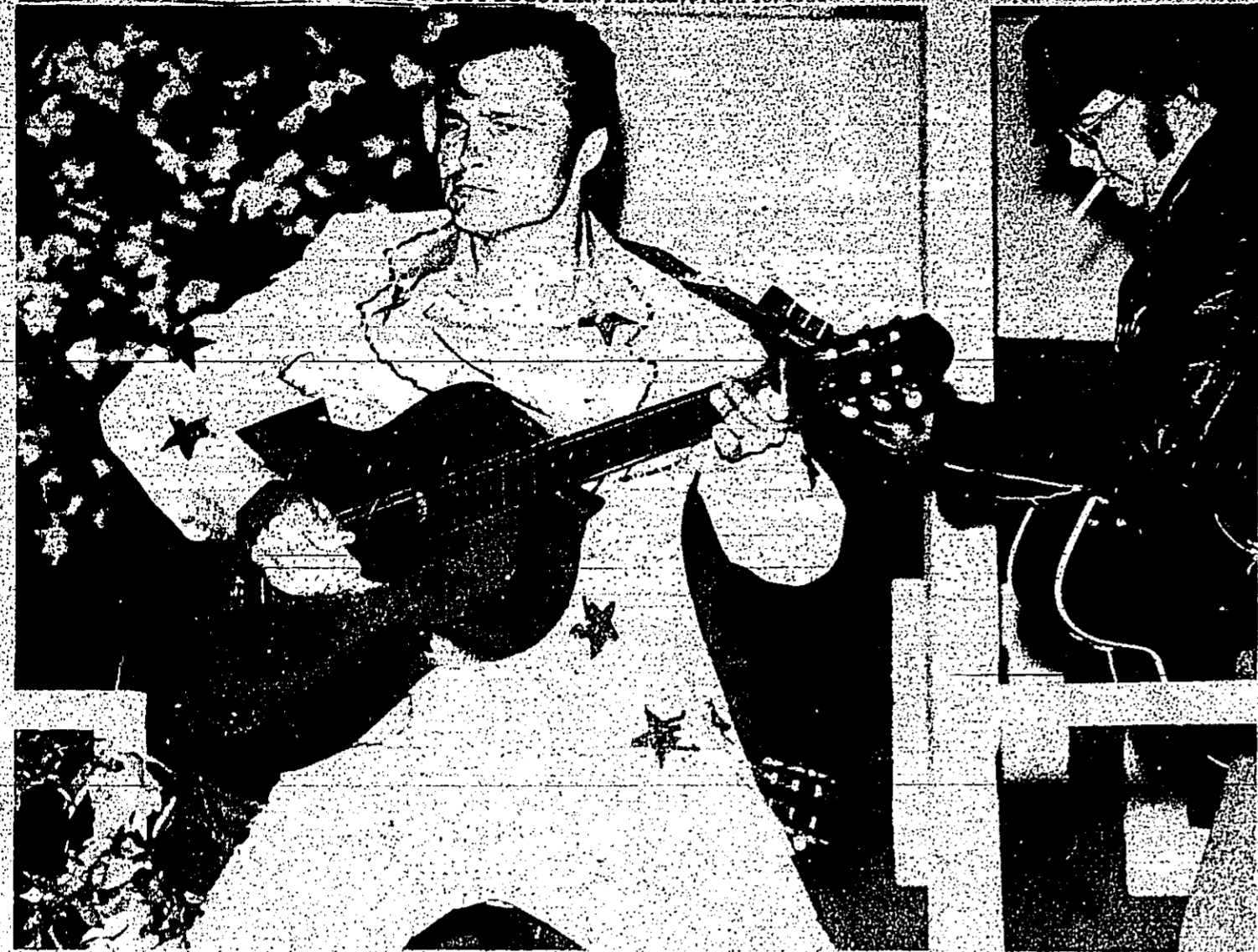
**AUSTIN** - Governor Bill Clements last week predicted the Legislature will increase the state gasoline tax next session to make up for some \$300 million taken out of general revenues in 1979.

Clements is already on record along with Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, in favor of increasing the state's nickel-per-gallon excise tax, currently the lowest in the nation.

Speaking to a Dallas convention of the Texas Oil Marketers Association, Clements also surprised gasoline advocates with his endorsement of increased production of alcohol fuels and said he hopes that gasoline will be exempted from the increased tax.

The Texas Oil Marketers Association represents about 900 companies and owned service station chains in the state.

Unemployed workers in the Governor's office said last week he favors giving legal status to undocumented workers from Mexico, at least for limited
