Audit Report Ok'd

Tyler County Commissioners met Monday and voted to accept the County Auditor's Annual Report for the year ended December 31, 1979, one which increased some \$500,000 over the past year.

County Auditor Ann Foudren made the statement to the court that "This means that we'll probably be hitting the two million spending mark in the year 1980."

Foudren, who assisted the court

in an initial review of bids submitted at the Monday meeting for an automated accounting system for the auditor's office, recommended that the court reconvene on Monday, April 28, to announce which of the five bidders would be awarded the bid.

The need for a new automated system had been identified many months ago by the auditor's office and only now is bearing reality.

According to Foudren, "The old

system... you just can't depend on it. Bids submitted were as follows: Longhorn Data Services, Nederland, Texas (software only); NCR Corporation Purchase Price \$21,731.51 (with software); Management Decision Systems, Inc. \$48,485 (with software); Burrign's Corporation \$24,283 (with software); IBM, \$32,379 (without software).

The court is in agreement that the auditor's office is in need of the system and agreed to meet formally on April 28 to act on the bids submitted.

In other action, the court approved the county treasurer's monthly report and the county extension agent's monthly report.

Other bid action saw the commissioners award a purchase bid for the Tyler County Rescue Boat and Trailer to DeWayne Durham who submitted a bid proposal of \$205.15. Another bidder, Allen Williams, submitted a low bid of \$551.51.

County Sheriff Lewis Craven sought assistance from the Court for the installation costs of a radio to be used in a private car belonging to Mark Langston, who Craven said, "was an invaluable asset to the Sheriff's Department in preventing crime in the south county area."

Langston, who is certified as a law officer, according to Craven, "does about as much as any other deputy."

The court tabled the request until the legality could be determined pertaining to installing county equipment in private vehicles. Another question was raised by the court as to the residency requirement for Langston.

In other court action, the commissioners voted to send County Treasurer Austin Fuller to attend a seminar, and amended the Annual Revenue Sharing budget voting to hold in that budget a provision of \$5,000 for the Tyler County Sheltered Workshop.

The court extended a one-year lease another year with International Paper Company for use as a ball park.

Membership Drive Underway

The Tyler County Ambulance Association, Inc. membership subscription drive was started on April 15 and will run through May 15, according to Nate Greenup, a spokesman for the organization, which he says is trying for a goal of 2,500 subscribers for the emergency ambulance service.

Greenup said the entire cost of a family was \$30 for "unlimited ambulance service."

Greenup said that it would be advantageous for a family to enroll in the program now because of a pending rate increase scheduled to go into effect on May 16.

Greenup said that a special effort has already been launched in the Dan B. Spurger and Fred areas where a goal of 500 membership enrollments has been set. Greenup said that if that special goal was met that an ambulance unit located in that vicinity would be provided.

"That will mean that we'll have three ambulances in service on a 7-day-a-week, 24-hour-a-day basis."

According to Greenup, the Tyler County Ambulance Association, Inc. is a non-profit corporation organized

and operated to provide emergency medical service to the Tyler County area. The corporation will provide, through an independent contractor, emergency transportation and attend-

ance of an accident or illness to the appropriate medical facility. Our service centers around a membership program, with an annual enrollment campaign, he said.

Tolbert Takes Office

The Woodville City Council met in regular session Monday and administered the oath of office to newly elected Mayor Doug Tolbert and alderman John Gilchrist.

The two were officially sworn in by City Attorney Josiah Wheat.

Councilman Jim Jinnette was elected Mayor Pro-tem.

In other action, the council read a formal resolution for outgoing Mayor Terry Watts for his devotion to duty while in office and his "many tireless hours of dedicated work in the service of the City of Woodville."

Watts said, "I'd like to say how much I appreciated being able to be the Mayor of Woodville and how much I have really enjoyed it."

In other action, the council awarded some \$74,285 in bids to Thomas Fortenberry for construction as part of the Housing Rehabilitation program under the Community Development Block Grant. Another bidder who submitted a lower bid of \$64,621 Triple R Construction Company and was recommended by the City Planners Waxman and Semelko, Inc. of Jasper was rejected. The Council agreed on the decision with action initiated by Jinnette and seconded by John Gilchrist. The vote was unanimous.

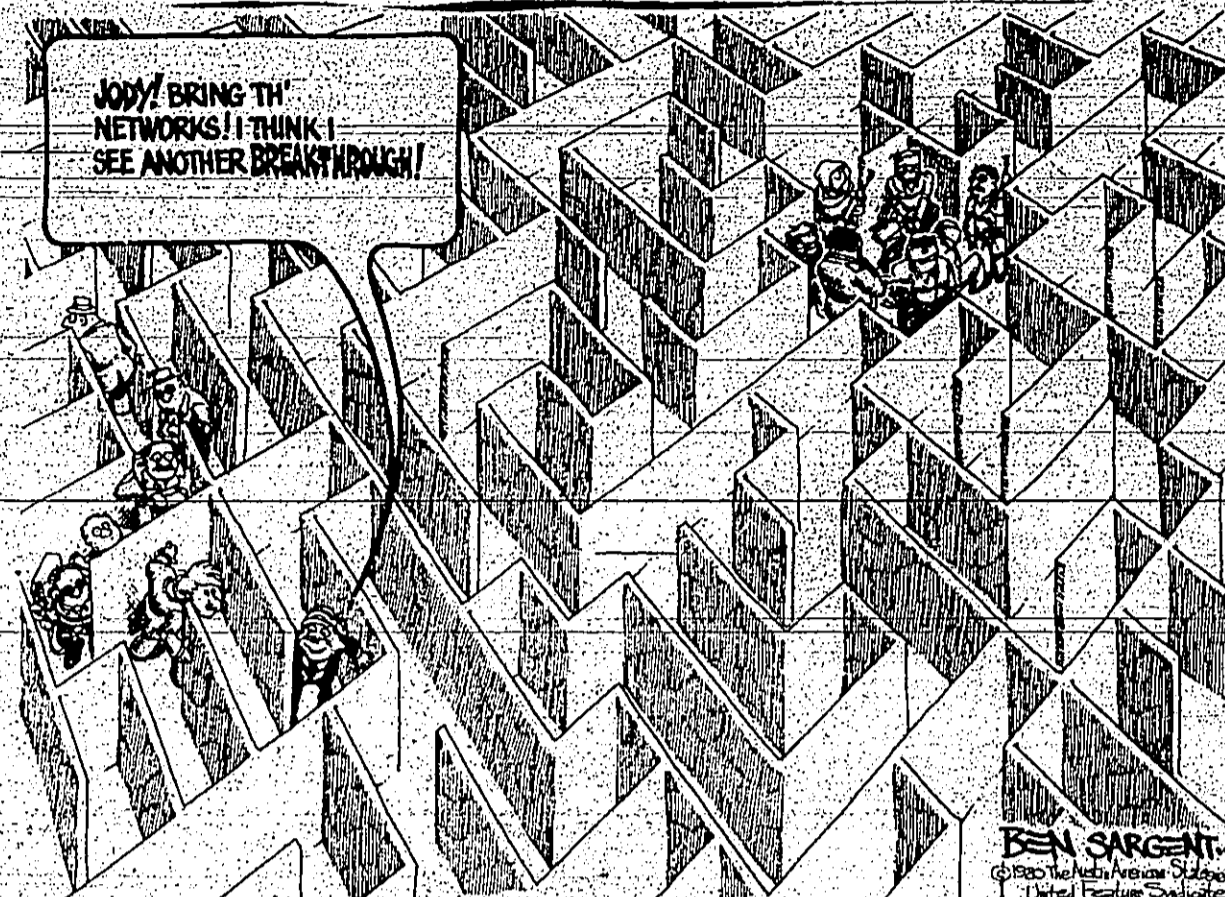

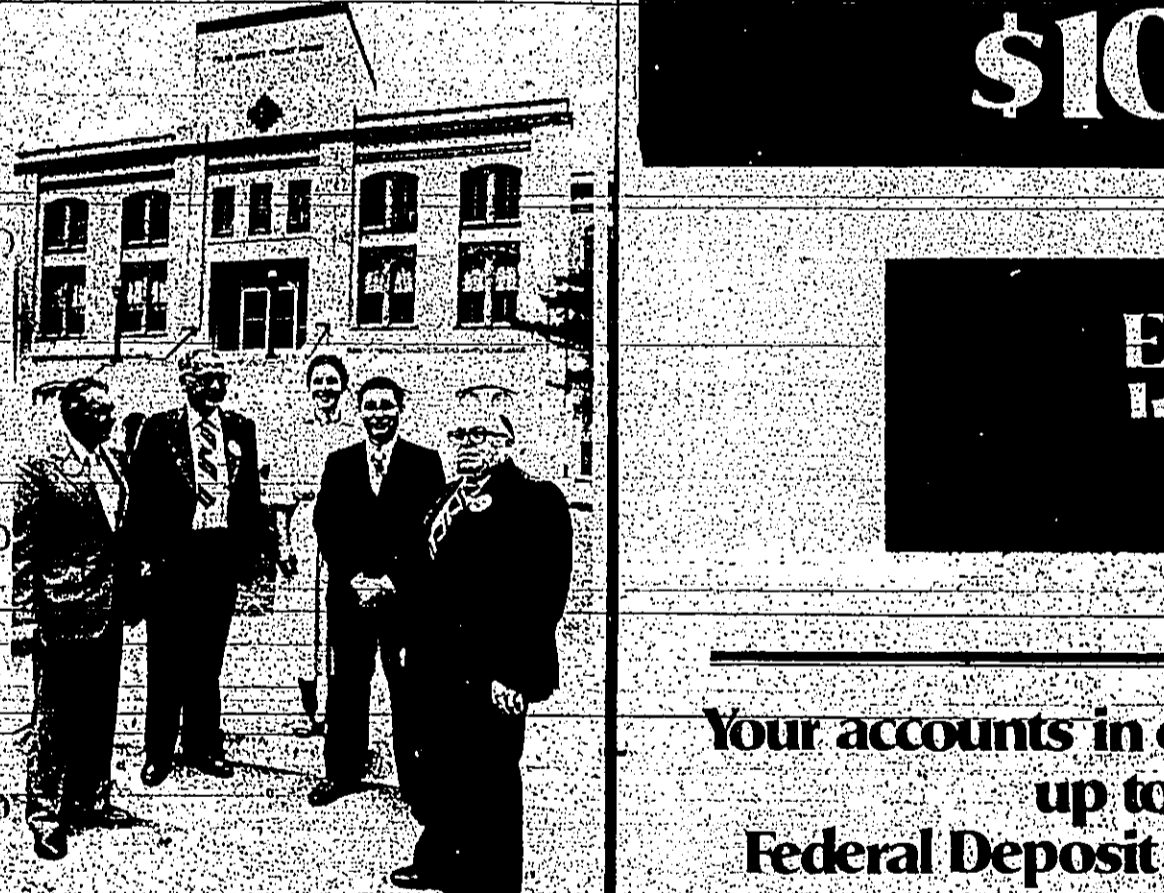

New Laws? Or Just Enforce Old Ones!

To Editor of Tyler County Booster:
Day after day I have read on the front page of the Beaumont Enterprise of the alleged violation of the Civil Rights of Charles Lee sentenced on March 14, 1980, for twenty years in prison for the rape of an elderly Spurger woman many questions come to my mind. If you could answer these questions in the Booster maybe many law-abiding citizens define Civil Rights. Does every citizen have the same Civil Rights? More specifically, in this instance what about the violation of the Civil Rights of the elderly Christian woman who has worked hard to build and maintain her home, attends church regularly, supports the Church and community and is a dependable friend to all neighbors?
I firmly believe in our Democratic form of government with equal rights for each citizen regardless of race, creed or color.
At an early age my parents taught me a Democracy is where anyone can live his life as he pleases so long as he does not infringe on the rights of a fellow citizen.
The thing that really frightens me is how the balance of the Scale of Justice has tilted so far in favor of the lawbreaker or criminal. I realize in the eyes of the law the accused is innocent until proved guilty.
How much has the crime rate increased in the past five or ten years? How many of the offenders or second time offenders on parole?
To whom was the complaint made and who made the complaint to have the violation of the Civil Rights of Charles Lee investigated?
When any woman has suffered the horror and mental anguish of rape committed by a man, the lawbreaker, how would I feel about the punishment if the victim was my Mother, sister, wife or daughter?
What provision is made in our laws for compensation to the victim when home or place of business is burglarized? Is there a law that provides support for the innocent and helpless members of a family when the wage-earner is the victim of armed robbery?
In Tyler County within the past five years, how much tax payer's money has been paid to court appointed lawyers to defend the accused? What crime has been committed in each case? Who were the lawyers and where from? How often are these cases appealed when the lawyer is being paid out of his money?
I do not claim to have any answers or solutions. I do believe that if the criminal had to labor to earn money to compensate the victim of his crime for the loss sustained he would take the second thought before committing the first offense to say nothing of the horror and mental anguish of rape.

Unless the Christian men and women of America realize the strength, privilege, and responsibility they possess in their right to vote and do something about it I see no solution.
