## Polk County Joins DETDA

Members of the Deep East Texas Development Association passed a resolution requesting more funds from the Texas Highway Department for roadwork on US-190 at a meeting at the Crown Colony Restaurant in Lufkin Friday.

The stretch of Highway 190 between Woodville and Livingston in Tyler and Polk counties is one of the most dangerous in the state, according to J.L. Beard of the highway department. The hoped-for extra funding would make more passing lanes and

other improvements possible, Beard said.

The Association voted Polk County into membership in the formerly eight county organization during the group's monthly luncheon meeting.

Rich Lindell of the U.S. Forest Service announced that retiring forester John Courtney had been named Outstanding Forester of the Year and Bobby Young of the Texas Forest Service the Outstanding Young Forester of the Year by the Society of American Foresters. According to Lindell, timber is bringing \$300 per 1,000 board feet although a decrease in tim-

ber valuations can be anticipated as long as the housing slowdown continues.

Bobbi Twohig of the Texas Employment Commission reported a regional increase of 6.38% in unemployment with the increase most evident in Angelina and Newton counties.

Tyler County Judge, Allen Sturrock, encouraged DETDA members to report citizens in the respective counties who have not yet been contacted and counted in the Census. Sturrock said he felt the counties might be given an opportunity to challenge the Census count in order to qualify for

additional federal funding and legislative representation.

An impromptu show of hands revealed that a startling 10% of those gathered at the meeting had not been counted by the Census Bureau.

Gulf States Utilities still intends to build a power plant at the Blue Hills site 10 miles south of Toledo Bend in Newton County, said board chairman W. Donham Crawford, DETDA guest speaker.

The two nuclear power units Gulf States Utilities announced in 1973 have been cancelled in favor of construction at the River Bend unit in Louisiana, planned for completion in 1984. The reasons for abandoning the original Blue Hills project were given by Crawford as the result of a 5 percent GSU customer growth rate as opposed to 10 percent in past years, increases in construction costs and unclear federal regulatory assurances.

The River Bend project was more imminent and therefore was the one chosen to proceed with, stated Crawford.

The board chairman indicated that coal and nuclear power are the energy sources we should depend on in the next decade, adding that solar energy and geothermal energy, along with other alternate sources will only generate 5 percent of the country's energy needs.

In response to questions at the close of his remarks, Crawford reminded the group that there has never been anyone killed in a commercial nuclear power accident.

## Hopper Is New Postmaster

Sectional Center Manager/Postmaster Robert J. Christ of Beaumont recently announced the appointment of Royal M. Hopper, Jr. as the new Postmaster at Woodville, Texas, effective Saturday, May 3, 1980.

Hopper, age 45, a native of Groves, Texas, has served as Quality Control Officer at Beaumont for the past four years.

Postmaster selections are made

on the basis of merit from a list of qualified candidates submitted to the Regional Management Selection Board. The Board, composed of a representative of the Office of Personnel Management, a Postal District Manager, and two Postmasters, selects and recommends to the Postmaster General the best qualified person for appointment to each vacancy.

Mr. Hopper served in the U.S. Army, and attended Lamar University at Beaumont. He has been active in Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, and the R.T.A. He and his wife, Shirley, have five children.

Christ said Hopper's wide experience in all facets of Postal Operations will be beneficial in his Postmaster's position.

## County Absentee Ballots Heavy

A record absentee ballot count which ended Monday, almost doubled the previous year's total as a record 519 persons recorded their political preference using the absentee ballot by personal appearance while some 45 ballots were sent in by mail.

Only eight republicans voted with Election Judge Hilda Coats who administered the voting for both the Democratic and Republican parties.

Previous turnouts, according to Joyce Wilson, Democratic Party Secretary totaled a maximum of only 300.

Courthouse veteran political observers predict a large turnout as balloting begins this Saturday, May 3 at 7 a.m. around Tyler County in the Primary election activity.

The third Annual Tyler County Sheltered Workshop Hike-Bike-A-Thon has been scheduled to take place on Saturday, May 10, according to Frankie Rogers, Committee chairman.

According to Rogers, the purpose of the Hike-Bike-A-Thon is to raise needed dollars for the establishment and operation of a Sheltered Workshop here in Tyler County.

Administered by the Tyler County Mental and Physical Handicap Association, Inc., the Workshop itself is nearing an official opening date of June 2, soon after the actual Hike-Bike-A-Thon event.

Last year, several hundred walkers and bikers participated resulting in over \$4,000 earned toward the development of the shelter for mental or physical handicapped persons.

According to Rogers, the Workshop is being established to help those who want to work and help themselves in a sheltered environment.

TCM & PHA President Maxie Riley has announced that the regular monthly meeting of the organization will be held at the commissioners' courtroom beginning at 7 p.m. this Thursday, May 1, for discussion at the meeting will include a progress report on the Workshop remodeling and an update on the finances of the project. Further details of the Hike-Bike-A-Thon will be reviewed in preparation for the event, said Rogers.

The Dad-and-Dad weekends are the only authorized event which allows Cubs to go camping overnight as Cub Scouts.

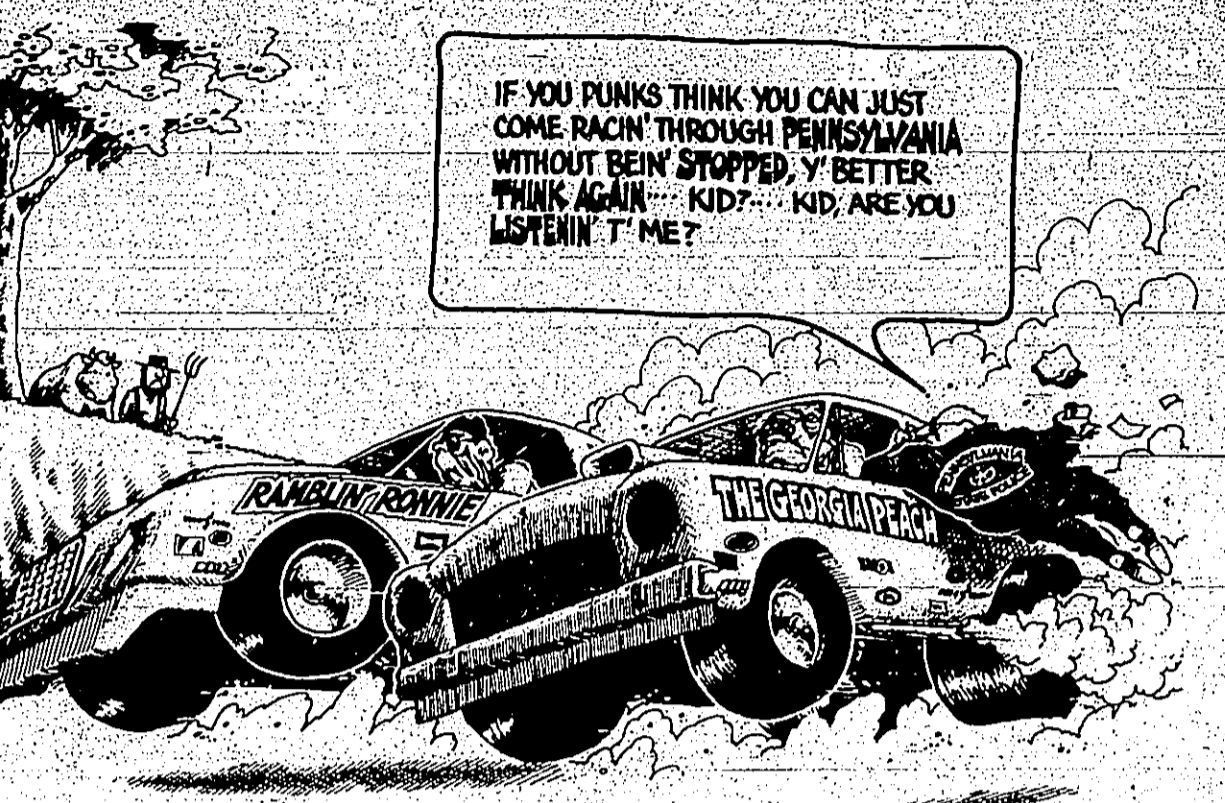

There seems to be no end to the quagmire in Iran.  
 The aborted rescue attempt this past week that saw eight American servicemen lose their lives is just the most recent chapter in the crisis that has frustrated us all these many months.  
 The inability of the Iranian government to speak with one voice makes direct diplomatic contact impossible.  
 Our European alliance seems on the verge of collapse, as the NATO countries see a very real threat from Russian action as we seem to move ever closer to direct military confrontation with Iran.  
 The only Mideast leader who has really sided with us has been Anwar Sadat of Egypt. And how long can he be expected to put his statesmanship on the line, as explosive as the situation has become?  
 He is sure to have alienated other Arab leaders, permitting Egyptian airstrikes to be used in the raid last week.  
 And rather than intimidate the Iranians, it is our assumption that the United States has only served to renege the political factions there, and once again rivet their attention on America as the primary focus of their anger.  
 What all this will do to the political situation as we enter the 1980 elections is an open question.  
 Our instincts are to back the President, and show a solid front to the rest of the world; but as the weeks go by, with no resolution to facing the hostages, candidates and the public at large will be hard-pressed to bite their tongues.

**Small Post Offices Closing Can Hit Community Hard**

Official business what kind of impact closing or consolidation of its post office would have.  
 I guess the post office is like drinking water, said Irma Dickerson, town clerk in Milroy, Minnesota. "You don't appreciate it 'til you don't have it."  
 Questions on the study just released by the Postal Service. Does the village have a geographic center, and is the post office in it?

 Postal Rate Commission Chairman A. Lee Fritschler, appointed by President Carter in 1979, said his agency will examine the study to determine whether or not the community via postal employees and customers to pertinent sociological and demographic data. Margolis queried postmasters and residents of 37 small communities in 19 different states on how they viewed the role of their local post offices.  
 Margolis found that rural post offices bolster small-town life in numerous ways. They are the scope of normal postal services. A rural postmaster reports that he helps his customers with a lot of their personal problems, ranging from filling out forms to helping them understand the contents of a letter.  
 Postmasters throughout the country according to the study cited many "special studies" in the "last years" of his life serving our region with integrity and pride. **Tax Relief To Encourage Savings**

DALLAS - Existing home sales and new home construction will improve because of Congressional action to provide tax relief for encouraging savings, Dr. Jack Carlson, executive vice president and chief economist of the National Association of Realtors, said here today.  
 The House-Senate conferees, Carlson said, "have agreed to give tax relief to savers as a part of the windfall profits tax bill. This will in turn provide more housing for Americans in the years to come."  
 He said that more than 250,000 families will be able to move to more adequate housing than would occur without the passage of this tax relief for savers.  
 Additional new housing could increase by 100,000 units.  
 The \$200 tax exclusion in interest income received by a single taxpayer, Carlson said, "and the \$400 for joint returns, and the savings that will result will have positive effects on productivity, increasing investment in modern structure and equipment, lower consumer prices and lower mortgage interest rates by one-third of a percentage point, making available more savings for mortgages."  
 He said the action taken yesterday on an amendment to the windfall profits tax bill was offered by Sen. Lloyd Bentsen (D-Texas) in his reality tax relief bill, but it will not add to inflation.  
 "In fact," he added, "it will have opposite effect by slowing the growth in consumer spending and providing additional savings for investment in structures, equipment and more adequate housing."

Nell Scott's son is shortly to emigrate to Vancouver and so she is looking forward to more visits to the U.S.A. in the future, and she says she quietly hopes that he may need a house-keeper eventually so she can spend more time in the United States.

## Mobile Homes Increase In Popularity

Mobile homes in- crease in popularity as housing continues to rise. While difference in initial cost tends to be the big attraction, other cost-related factors are ever-present on the minds of those looking for affordable housing.

Percentage-wise, mobile home prices are rising more rapidly than conventional housing, but in actual dollars, the gap has grown wider.

Between 1974 and 1978, the average price of a new mobile home increased from \$29,300 to \$15,300 -- a 61 percent hike.

During the same period, average cost of a new mobile home in- creased 71 percent from \$9,300 to \$16,000.

The move to the owned site is a trend gathering momentum among mobile home owners.

Approximately 60 percent of the new mobile home owners are permanently erecting them on owned tracts of land, either in residential subdivisions or on individual sites.

Owners often find they can own their site for less than the cost of rental space in a park.

Liberalization of financing has spurred additional interest by making it possible to finance the mobile home, and the land at a lower interest rate with a single mortgage.

Lower down payments and longer-term mortgages also add to the attractiveness of the mobile home-on-site package.

The age-old question of whether a mobile home will appreciate in value is still being kicked around.

Increasingly, mobile home buyers are becoming aware that locating the unit on an owned site balance gain or loss in the unit's value against appreciation in value of the land.

But, several recent studies indicate that indeed, mobile homes can and are appreciating in value in certain areas.

The way lenders view the mobile home has tremendous influence on assessed value and other lending practices.

The majority of lenders continue to make use of the book value approach in determining the amount of the loan advanced on used mobile homes.

This approach often underprices in assessing the value of permanent housing. In contrast, and increasing number of lenders now look upon the mobile home as a permanent asset, and assess the total housing unit and assess value accordingly.

When appraisals are made similar to those used in determining value of a conventional home, the mobile home is valued at the same level as the mobile home's own and assessed accordingly. This care and improvement contributed to the in-

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### Rabies Cases Continue To Increase

Rabies cases continue to increase at an alarming rate in Texas. Laboratory confirmed positive cases of rabies in Texas showed a 115 percent increase in 1979 over 1978.

The number of cases of rabid dogs took the biggest jump with an 811 percent increase. A total of 82 dogs were found rabid in 1979 compared to only 9 in 1978. More rabid skunks were confirmed than any other animal with 157 skunks reported rabid compared to 47 in 1978.

A large number of foxes, raccoons, horses, cattle, cats and bats also made the rabid list. Reports so far for 1980 indicate the incidence of rabies in wild animals, especially the skunk, are still high.

Dogs and cats bitten by a known rabid animal should be destroyed immediately. If the owner is unwilling to have this done, the unvaccinated animal should be vaccinated immediately with a modified live virus vaccine against rabies and placed in strict isolation for 30 days.

The Texas House Bill 1323, which requires dog and cat owners to have their pets vaccinated against rabies at four-month intervals, regular intervals thereafter, becomes effective April 1.

Educational programs are conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to help people of all ages understand the economic, social and health consequences of rabies. The program is available in any county or national origin.

Persons who slaughter and skin an exposed animal should wear gloves and perform their duties with care to prevent possible exposure from the wound area.

### Start Stocking Firewood Now For Next Winter

LIVINGSTON, Texas, is fast approaching and cold weather will soon be behind us. We can't help but think of next winter's heating bill. Wrong! Now is the time to be thinking about preparing and storing your firewood for the 1980 winter season.

The main reason for doing this now is to allow the wood to dry. When first cut green wood may consist of half wood and half water. Six to nine months are necessary for wood to dry to 20 percent moisture content, according to Charles "Boo" Walker, district forester with the Texas Forest Service in Livingston.

"More heat is available for your home by burning dry wood instead of green wood," says Walker. "Burning dry wood also reduces creosote and soot deposition in your stove, stovepipe and chimney. Firewood that is dry, stacked and covered better if stacked off the ground and covered. Stacking wood off the ground will allow better air circulation and promote faster drying. Properly stacked firewood will help prevent rot from regaining moisture through its ends. Don't stack firewood against the house. It will provide a convenient pathway for termites if you do. Properly stacked firewood will reap the benefits next winter.

Homeowners can purchase firewood from vendors or they can search out places to cut their own. The USDA Forest Service allows firewood cutting by permit only on national forest lands, and some private developers will allow individuals to cut up felled trees or trees slated for removal. Be sure to get permission before cutting on someone else's property. No firewood-cutting is permitted on the Texas four state forests.

Though it may seem strange to be thinking about firewood in warm weather, approaching winter weather will help those who act now will reap the benefits next winter.
