Ambulance Deadline Nears

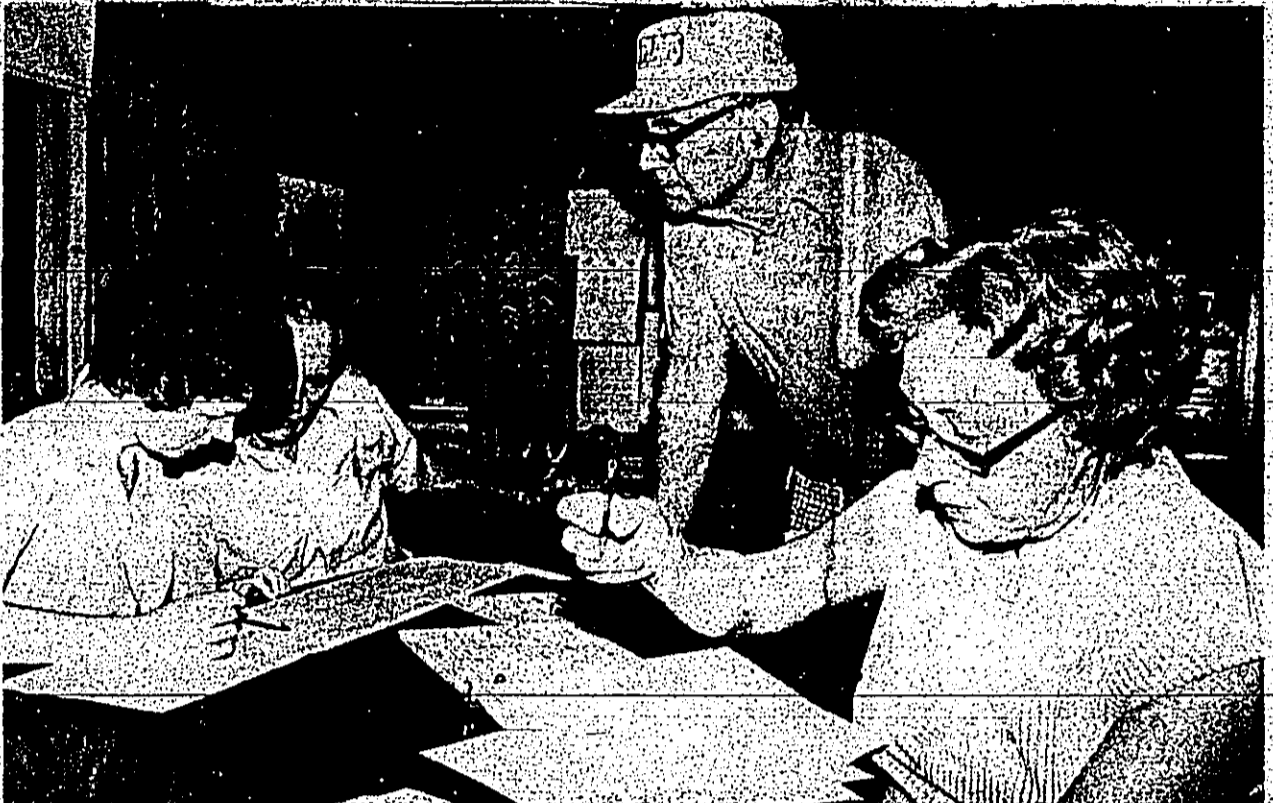
According to Nate Greenup of the Tyler County Ambulance Service, "There's only one week left to go to sign up for family ambulance service at the special \$30 subscription fee which is set to increase in the next month or so."

Greenup said, "Each family has an opportunity to join up now and save some money later on for emergency ambulance service."

Greenup said the service was presently attempting to enlist some 2,500 members.

"Increases in fuel are the main reason for the rate increase," Greenup said.

Election Runoffs Set In Three County Contests

Tyler County voters turned out in record numbers Saturday with some 46 per cent of the electorate casting ballots in an election which will see a runoff result on June 7 in a "hot" sheriff's race as well as a precinct 1 Constable race along with a Commissioner's race in precinct 3.

Sheriff's office challenger Leon Fowler, who is currently serving on the Tyler County Commissioners' Court, earned a total of 1,500 votes to incumbent Sheriff Lewis Craven's vote total of 1,300.

According to Joyce Wilson, Democratic Party secretary, the record was broken in this election by the number of people who turned out to vote, 5,198 out of a possible 11,380.

The secretary said the percentage in the last primary in 1976 amounted to a whopping 54 percent.

The newly instituted Rockland box in north Tyler County surprised poll watchers when it turned in the highest vote total showing 81 percent voting including absentee ballots.

A possible voting challenge of the Number 10 box in Colmesneil was unsubstantiated as of presstime late Tuesday as no formal complaint had been filed in district court according to Clerk Pat Brown.

Constable, Precinct 1 candidates Jack Burns earned a total of 509 votes while Tommy Latta polled 342 earning a run-off condition in that contest.

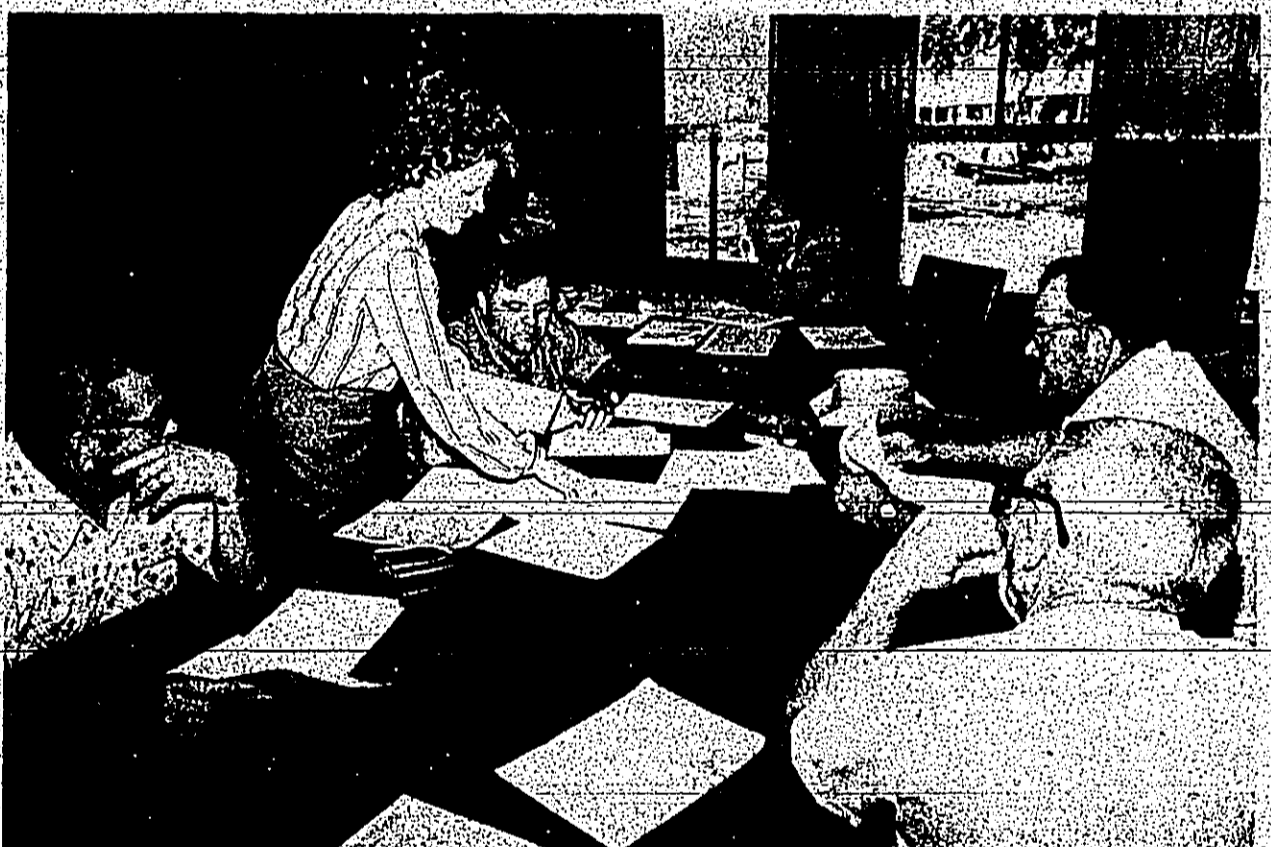
Commissioner, Precinct 3 voting action saw Jerry Mahan draw 237 votes while challenger L.B. Conner earned 223.

Commissioners Buy Bookkeeping System

Tyler County Commissioners met in a special session Monday and awarded a \$21,731.50 bid on a lease purchase proposal with the National Cash Register Company of Beaumont on motions by Commissioners Leon Fow-

ler and Maxie Riley. Ann Fondren, county auditor, indicated that the bid submitted by the

NCR Company was "The best and lowest bid."

Fondren began an appeal for an "automated" bookkeeping system several months ago and reported that the present equipment was causing the county "double trouble" in repairs costs.

Before accepting the bid, Commissioner Riley said he wanted it made clear that the purchase was not one which would computerize the whole courthouse, Riley said that he had received a lot of "flak" from persons believing the purchase to be one in which the whole courthouse would be on it.

Fondren reminded the court that dollars for the purchase had been provided for earlier out of revenue sharing funds.

- In other action the court:
- accepted the county extension agent's report;
 - approved the exterminating of the courthouse;
 - authorized Tax Assessor Collector Barbara Tolbert to attend a Tax conference in San Antonio on May 17-21.

The court tabled a request from Precinct Peace Justice Frank Grimes to attend the J.P. Conference in El Paso. On a motion by Adnell Odom, the request was tabled for further study.

State Capital Highlights

AJISTIN Presidential politics arrived in Texas last Saturday and all other issues took a back seat to the primary election.

Besides stumping done by home state Republican candidate George Bush, his primary opponent Ronald Reagan, and Democratic candidate Sen. Edward Kennedy, the President himself traveled to Texas - his first real venture out of the White House since the beginning of the Iranian hostage crisis six months ago.

President Jimmy Carter flew to military hospitals in San Antonio early in the week to visit and pay respects to the injured commandos of the ill-fated hostage-rescue mission. After talking at their bedside, the President said he was impressed by their bravery and patriotism; every man had expressed his willingness to go on a second rescue mission.

Although billed as a non-political visit, Carter's entrance into Texas on the eve of the state's presidential primary obviously had its political benefits. The President was here and back to Washington, D.C. in a jiffy, leaving front-page coverage and no political tax paid in his wake.

KENNEDY VISITS WOUNDED It worked so well, his primary opponent, Ted Kennedy, tried to copy it.

The Massachusetts senator shifted his campaign schedule to spend about 30 minutes with the wounded commandos the day after Carter visited their ward at Brooke Army Medical Center.

Kennedy tried to play down the politics, some said, by refusing their invitations to address a crowd, and by telling reporters he was supportive of Carter's mission to rescue the hostages.

DIFFERENT PRIMARIES Both the Democrats and the Republicans held presidential primaries Saturday, but the mechanics were different.

The Republicans held a binding primary, which means the presidential

delegates had to be apportioned according to the percentage of popular vote each candidate received in the primary.

The Democratic primary, on the other hand, was simply what party regulars refer to as a "beauty contest." It was non-binding and not tied to apportionment of delegates.

The balloting was simply the appetizer to the delegate selection process which develops in three phases.

The first phase began 15 minutes after the polls closed Saturday when Democratic voters assembled in more than 6,000 precinct conventions across the state to vote for either Carter or Kennedy. Each precinct selected delegates on an apportioned basis to attend the county and senatorial conventions next Saturday.

Those conventions will select delegates to the June 20-21 state convention in San Antonio where participants will select 152 delegates and 77 alternate delegates to the national convention in Detroit.

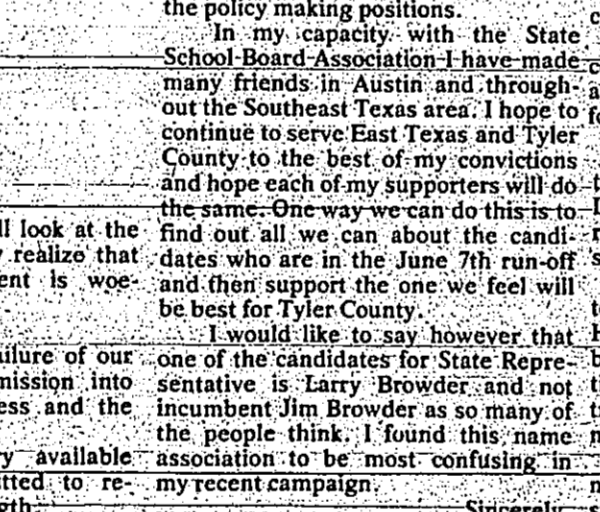
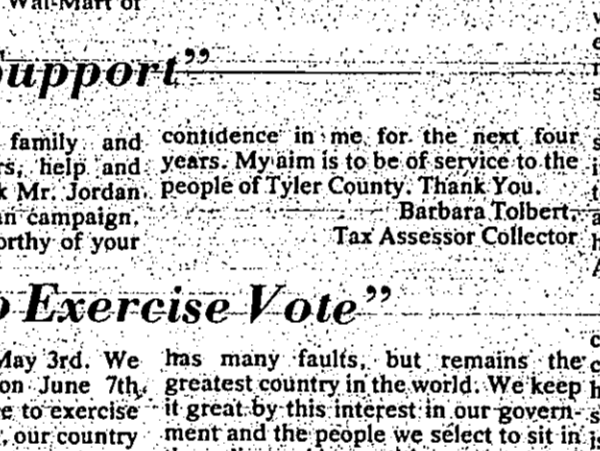
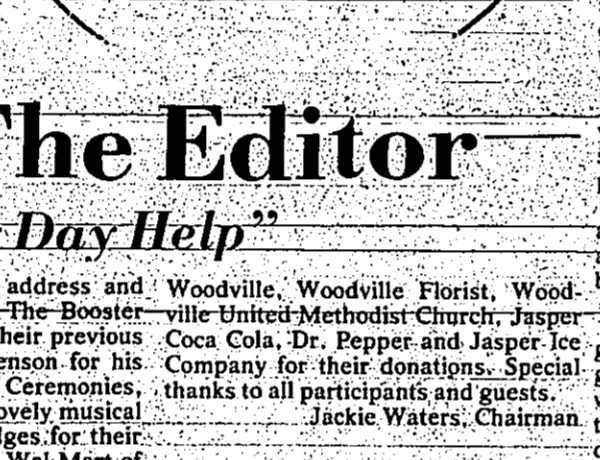
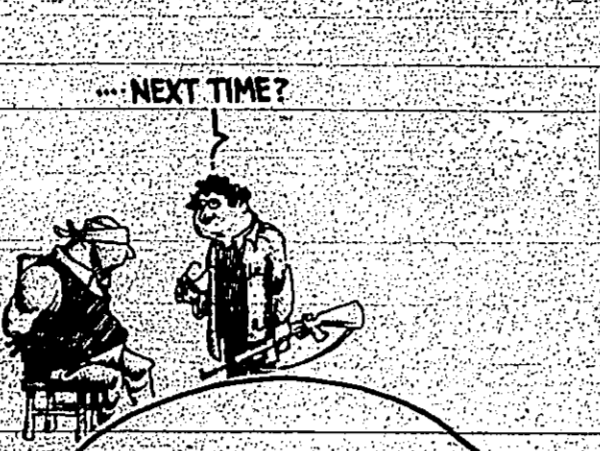
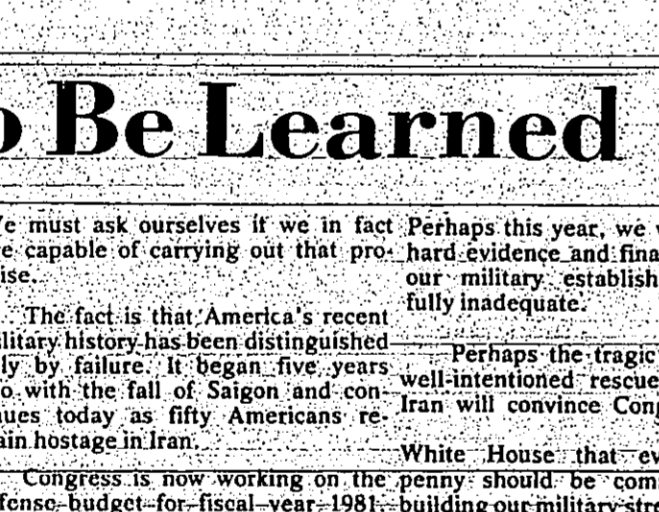
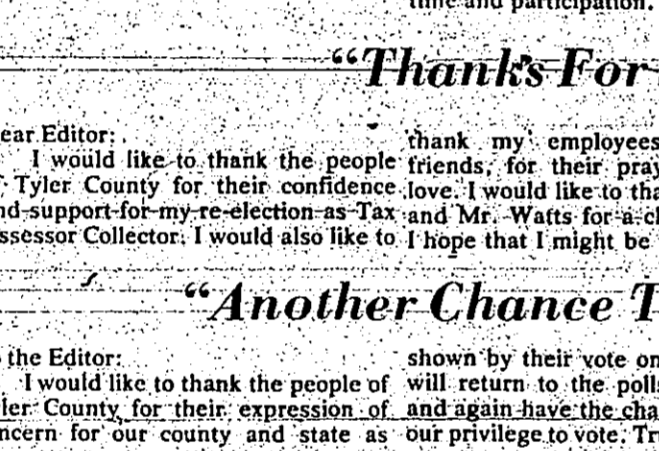
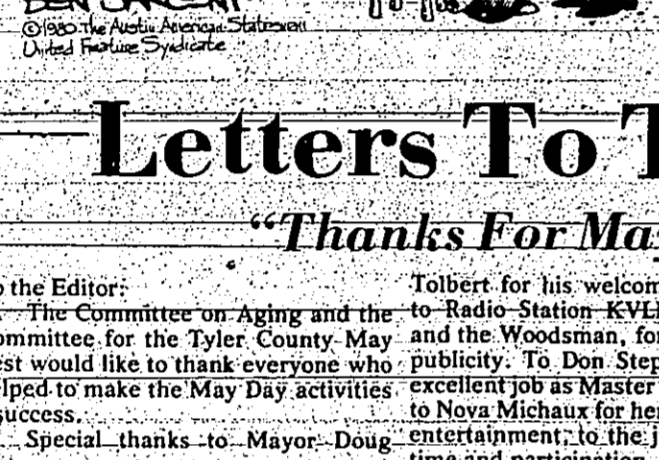
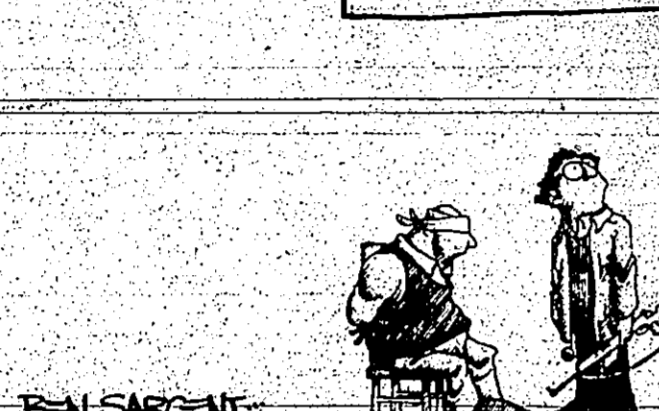
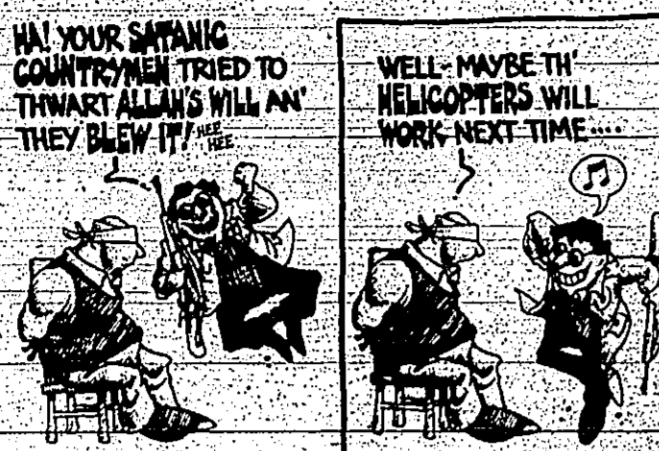

Crop Livestock Reports Needed

During late May and June, many Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service's field staff. The information gathered through the questionnaires and interviews provides the basis for determining the acreage devoted to the various crops and mid-year livestock numbers for the state of Texas and for each county.

Crop and livestock reports provide a dependable, unbiased picture of Texas' most important industry - agriculture. The estimates in these reports are tools to help farmers and ranchers work out their planting, breeding, feeding, storing, producing, and marketing plans.

Farm organizations and legislatures use them in planning programs. The estimates are also used in establishing various government program acreage and payment levels to farmers for the state and county.

Extension economists and private farm and ranch management consultants use them as a basis for advising farmers and ranchers.

Exporters use them in planning and promoting the sale of agricultural products abroad.

Prompt and accurate completion of the survey forms provides for more reliable estimates and helps to reduce survey costs.

All individual farm and ranch information is kept confidential, and only state and county summaries become part of the final published estimate.

This is a cooperative effort of the USDA's Economics, Statistics, and Cooperatives Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

4-H Projects Cover Wide Range

Texas 4-H members are involved in more than 60 different projects ranging from acre space to wildlife science that vary in complexity as much as their names imply.

The 4-H project forms the basis for educational programs. It is popular in that it can be related to any other 4-H project and teaches members to practice safety in their everyday lives.

Gardening and livestock projects are among the more traditional 4-H projects and their popularity remains high. Both rural and urban youth raise vegetables and flowers, rabbits and sheep. Many of larger animals requiring more space are most often found in rural or suburban areas.

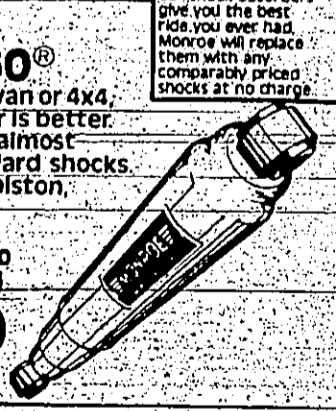

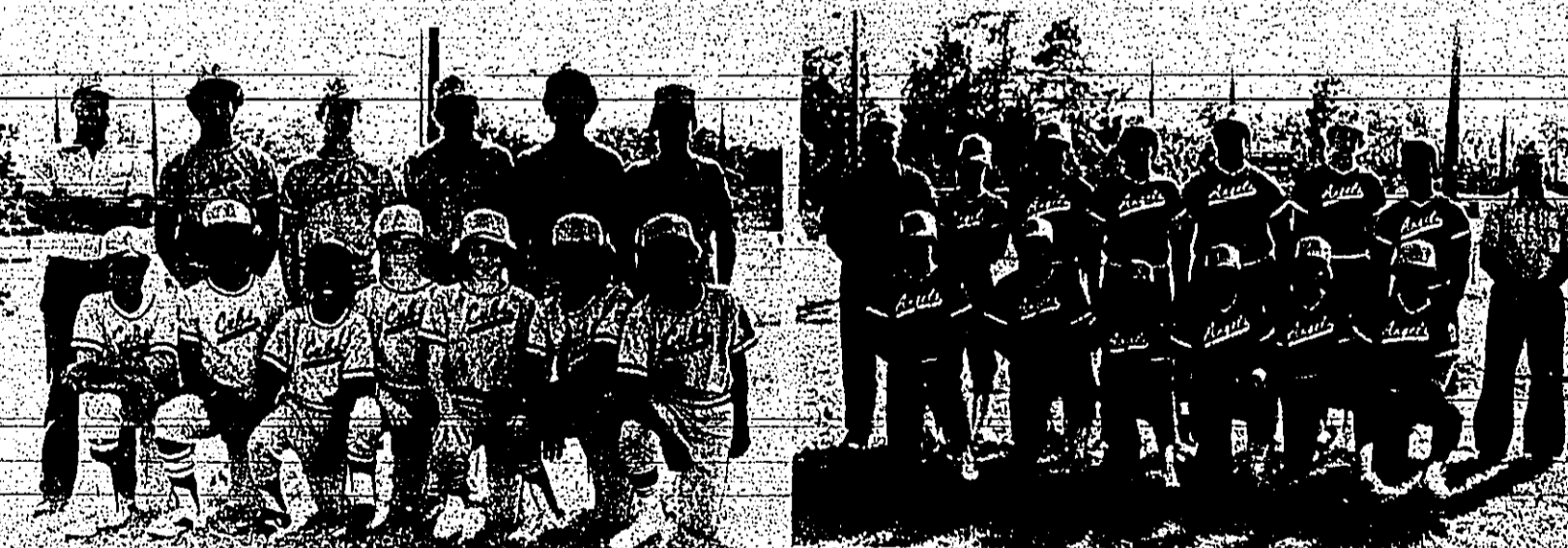

Ethanol Production In Small Quantities

COLLEGE STATION—Ethanol produced by small-scale distilling units now available will perform as a fuel for internal combustion engines, but most of it cannot be mixed with gasoline or diesel fuel, warns an agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Henry O'Neal explains that most small-scale units produce 160 to 190 proof ethanol. "Because it contains 5 to 20 percent water, ethanol, or ethyl alcohol, mixed with gasoline or diesel fuel will reduce engine performance or totally stop the engine," O'Neal says.

Gasohol, a mixture of 10 percent ethanol and 90 percent unleaded gasoline, requires 200 proof anhydrous ethyl alcohol, which is water-free.

O'Neal points out, however, that both anhydrous and lower proof ethanol can be burned directly in a spark ignition engine without relying on gasoline.

"Primary modification required for successful performance is to increase the fuel jet orifice diameter in the carburetor."

"Increased jet size is needed to meter an energy charge equivalent to 1.8 gallons of 160 proof ethanol by 1.5 gallons of 190 proof ethanol is required to replace 1 gallon of gasoline," O'Neal explains.

He recommends adding a small gasoline tank to allow starting the spark ignition engine on gasoline before switching to ethanol. "Ethanol will not vaporize as readily as gasoline."

Cankerworms Hitting Trees

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (UPI) — Tiny little worms that devoured the leaves of oaks, elms and other trees early last spring over much of Texas. Well, they are back again this spring.

Adult moths of the tiny worms have been found in parts of South Central Texas and other locations. This is a signal of infestations by leaf-eating worms, this spring and should warn us to be on the lookout and to take action if necessary, points out Dr. Phil Hamman, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Cankerworms are about an inch long and are slender. They vary in color from light brown to nearly black and from green to brown. The worms feed on buds and unfolding leaves.

Cankerworms are also called inchworms because of their spanning or measuring action as they move about. They move from branch to branch or drop from trees on silken threads.

When disturbed, they may stand nearly erect and resemble small twigs. What can be done to control this cankerworm pest?

One method of control is to band tree trunks with a sticky material such as tangle-foot since female moths must climb tree trunks to lay their eggs. This might be effective in northern areas of the state where egg-laying has not yet started.

While this method offers some control, spraying a tree with a residual insecticide soon after worms become active is the surest control practice, points out Hamman. He recommends spraying only those trees where foliage damage is evident and worms are present. Give particular attention to newly transplanted trees, special landscape trees and fruit or nut trees.

Insecticides are available in a biological called Bacillus thuringiensis (Dipel, Bacter). It is also effective against toxic to humans, pets or wildlife. Trees in good condition and not under stress due to drought, disease and insect damage may withstand partial defoliation by cankerworms early in the season.
