Tyler County Commissioners Meet

The Tyler County Commissioners met in regular session Monday opening the meeting in the form of a revenue sharing hearing to which there was no comment from the public. Other business at the meeting included tabling of a request for mobile radio assistance from the Tyler County Ambulance service and a request for \$300 from the Tyler County Minority Outreach Program.

Woodville City Council Meets

Woodville City Council approved a \$17,000 payment Monday night to a street building contractor to be held city fathers said "until the contractor begins work again on Willow Street." In other action, the council: Approved a \$650 change order for a housing rehabilitation project.

Industrial Finance Corporation Formed

The Board of Directors of the Industrial Financing Corporation of Tyler County held their organizational meeting on May 27, 1980. The meeting was chaired by Bertus Best, Acting Chairman with Joan Loidice acting as Secretary. Other Directors of this Corporation are C.A. Williams and Thomas C. Knaapp. Officers elected to serve three year terms are Dr. Harold Herrington, President; Major Alford, Vice President; and Joan Loidice, Secretary-Treasurer. This nonprofit corporation has been organized for the issuance of bonds on behalf of the County for the specific purpose of promotion and development of commercial, industrial and manufacturing enterprises. The ultimate goal is to promote and encourage employment and the public welfare pursuant to the provisions of the Development Corporation Act of 1979. The Commissioners Court of Tyler County must approve any recommendations made by the Board of Directors, following that, the Texas Industrial Commission must issue their final approval before bonds are issued.

Local contributions by area citizens, businesses, and industries as well as fund raising projects by organizations played a large part in making both the projects become a reality. Grants from the Texas Rehabilitation Commission and funding from the Texas Dept. of MHRM were used to guarantee the successful opening of the workshops. The purpose of sheltered workshops is to offer opportunity for training and employment of the handicapped. It is hoped that some of the clients who participate in the workshops will develop skills and confidence to the extent they can be gainfully employed in the private sector.

The facilities will be operated by MHRM. According to Dr. Wayne Lawrence, Executive Director of the Deep East Texas Regional MHRM Services, the two facilities will serve 25 clients each after six months of operation.

Senator Blake is a strong supporter of programs designed to assist the handicapped. "There are many Texans who by birth or by chance are handicapped to the extent they can not perform in society without outside help," Blake said.

"Although there are some who must be institutionalized, there are many who are trainable and who can perform, even if in a limited way, and who can improve their own self image and become producing members of society," he continued.

"I am pleased there are local citizens who care for those who are unfortunate and pleased that their efforts will be rewarded by the opening of these two workshops," Senator Blake concluded.

The first game of the state tournament matched the Bulldogs of Colmesneil against the Trojans of Windhorst. The Trojans drew first blood by scoring in the first inning. The score remained 1-0 till the seventh inning when Darren Bean started a rally by hitting a double. Cleve Handley got an infield hit and Richard Guillory advanced all runners when he was hit by a pitch. With bases loaded, Charles Hanks sacrificed Bean in home. Tommy Winters hit a sacrifice fly to center field to score Cleve Handley. This ended the scoring for both teams. The next game matched the Bulldogs of Colmesneil against the defending state champs of Palmer. The Bulldogs amassed together 11 hits and committed only one error, beating Palmer 8 to 0. Darren Bean pitched a good game giving up only 1 hit, striking out 7, and giving up 3 walks. The scoring started in the 3rd inning when Tracy Collins got on first base by an error. He was sacrificed home by a fly to left field by Bean. In the top of the 5th inning, Collins got a base hit and sacrificed to second by Thomas Deason. Kevin Davis walked and Bean scored Collins on a single, with men on first and second. Cleve Handley hit a triple scoring both men. Use Courtesy And Sense With Deaf

- Will you please print this in the Booster. I am sure it will help the hearing people as well as the non-hearing. There are many hard of hearing and deaf people in this area. It will help.
- You don't have to be a registered interpreter for the deaf to communicate with the non-hearing. Yet many persons who come in contact with the deaf don't quite know how to react.
- They get embarrassed and walk away, or they talk loudly, or get impatient when the deaf person doesn't understand what they're trying to say. It can be a frustrating experience for both the deaf and the hearing person. But it needn't be, says Jan Castleberry, a staff interpreter at Travis County Services for the Deaf, an agency that provides interpreters for the more than 4,000 deaf persons in Austin.
- Common sense and courtesy should be the guidelines for communicating with the deaf, she said. Here are some suggestions for hearing persons.
- Get the deaf person's attention before speaking. A wave of the hand, a tap on the shoulder or some other signal will do.
- Look directly at the person. Remember that a turn of the head or a hand near the face can obscure the deaf person's vision. Eye contact with the deaf person is also important, even if there is an interpreter present. Remember that you are talking with the deaf person, not the interpreter.
- Speak slowly and clearly, but don't exaggerate or distort lip movements. Do not shout.
- Rephrase a sentence if the deaf person does not reply or has difficulty understanding what you've said. Not all deaf persons read lips, and even the best speech readers miss words. It is a good idea to ask the deaf person if the lip reads.
- Don't be embarrassed to use a pencil and paper if you have a problem getting your point across.
- Use natural gestures and facial expressions.

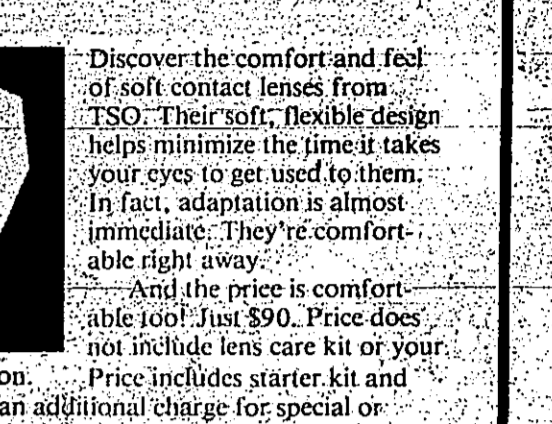

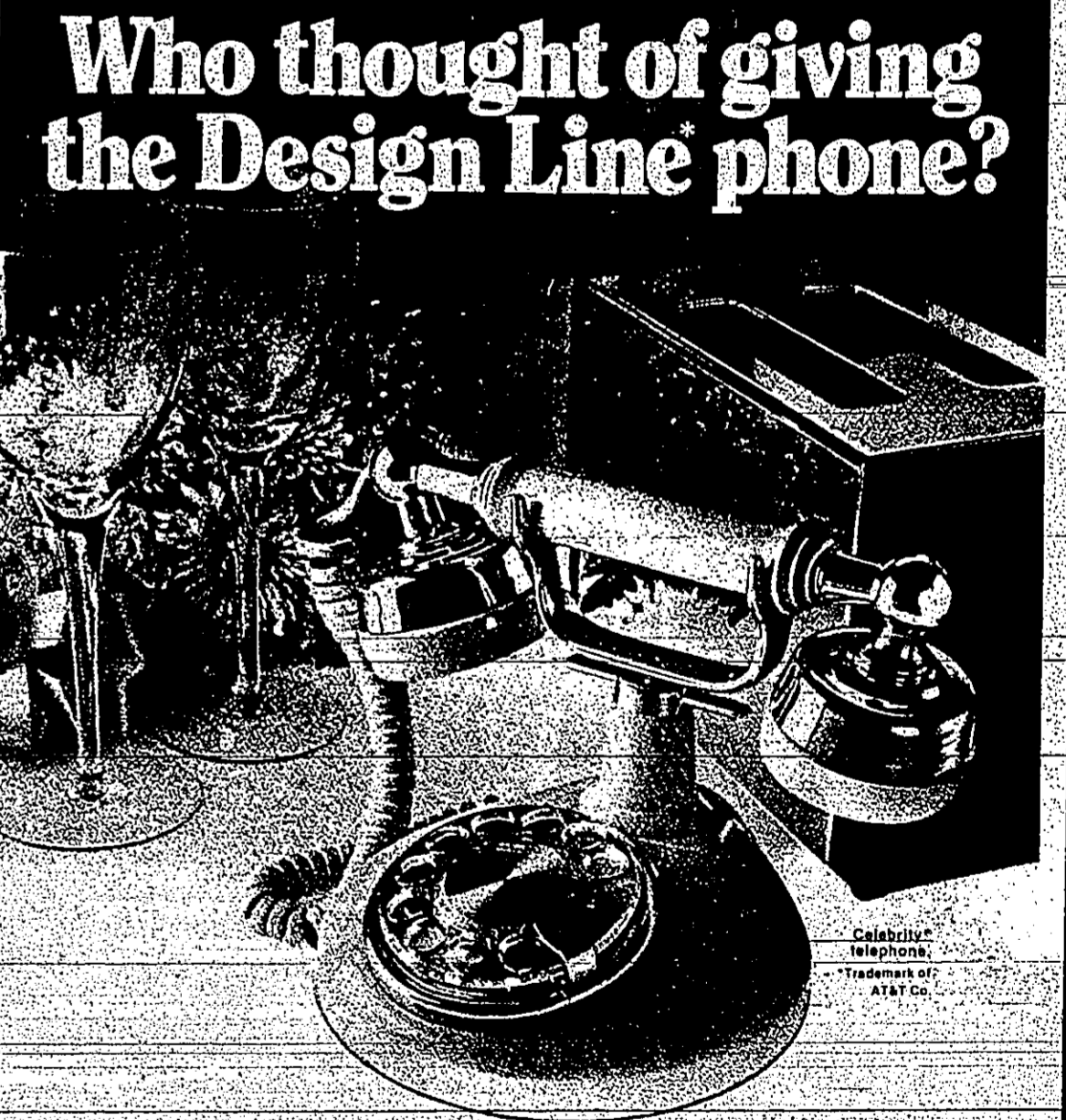

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Rehabilitation Means Hope For Heart Attack Victims

Since four times more people survive heart attacks than die from them, some doctors are working to improve the kind of life survivors have while other specialists are trying to improve the survival odds themselves, a Houston heart specialist said.

Heart attack disabilities cost more than \$50 billion annually in the United States due to work days lost and treatment costs, but some disabilities can be prevented if the patient has good rehabilitation. Stress, depression, nutrition, exercise and severe anxiety are factors that must be considered if the patient is to return to as normal a life as possible, said Lyle Peterson, M.D., in a speech prepared for a rehabilitation symposium at the Texas Medical Association's recent convention in Houston. Dr. Peterson is director of the Houston Cardiovascular Rehabilitation Center.

Sometimes heart attack damage itself is only one part of the problem, a victim faces returning to a normal life.

A victim may feel that family relationships, job and even life itself are threatened after a heart attack. This unstable feeling may lead to depression, anxiety, loss of self-respect and other problems.

Excess weight and other physical conditions that reduce the body's efficient operation can keep a person from functioning normally, anytime, but may be even more of a hindrance after a heart attack.

If these and other causes of disability are not evaluated, a vicious cycle may begin, Dr. Peterson said. This cycle can speed up because the symptoms of some psychological or physical problems mimic heart disease. Then when heart disease treatment such as bed rest is used, the actual problem may become worse in some cases.

A good rehabilitation program not only evaluates disability causes, it also gives advice about exercise, evaluation of medical treatment, nutritional guidance and emotional counseling that can help a heart attack victim have a happier, more productive life.

Some Texas Watermelons Ready

COLLEGE STATION — Mouth-watering South Texas watermelons are starting to show up at markets.

This year's crop of melons from South Texas is of good quality but the volume will be down, points out Tom Longbrake, horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Longbrake still mixes the watermelon acreage in South Texas to be only 25 or 30 percent of last year due to a combination of dry and weather conditions. Drought, late spring freezes, high winds and heavy rains.

Many South Texas growers cut their acreage early this spring due to dry conditions, explains Longbrake. And they're still a good buy on a per-pound basis.

While watermelons started moving out of Fallurris about two weeks ago, the crop will be late in the Hempstead area due to late spring freezes. Also, growers are still planting in North Central and East Texas.

Although early melons will be in short supply, increased planting in North Central and East Texas should bring the supply of melons to near normal, adds the horticulturist.

While Texas watermelons will be in short supply this year, they will still be a treat during the hot summer days ahead, contends Longbrake. And they're still a good buy on a per-pound basis.

Ring Hang Up

If you don't have a hang-up about wearing jewelry while doing physical work or playing sports, a ring could give you one.

When a ring hangs on something and the rest of the body is moving, the finger can be injured or even torn off, a Houston hand surgeon said.

The easy way to avoid the problem is to remove rings before possibly hazardous activities. But people participating in many sports including basketball, track and field, events, and other sports, seldom realize the danger. Even racket sports and jogging offer some risk because falls can cause dislocated or broken fingers. A ring on a hurt, swelling finger adds to the pain and problems because it can get off the finger's blood supply, said James Bennett, M.D., who spoke recently at a symposium at the Texas Medical Association (TMA) annual

Drinking Can Damage Unborn Babies

COLLEGE STATION — Pregnant women who drink alcoholic beverages can damage their unborn babies, says Dr. Mary Ann Shirer, a health education specialist.

Many children born to women who drink "excessively" while pregnant have shown recognizable patterns of physical and mental birth defects known as fetal alcohol syndrome, she explains.

Dr. Shirer, of the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says that no one knows what the safe levels of drinking for a pregnant woman are. Hence, her advice: "Don't drink."

Of course, there is one other alternative, she adds.

Since safe levels of drinking are unknown, pregnant women and those likely to become pregnant should discuss their drinking habits and the potential dangers with their physicians.

The "do's and don'ts" associated with pregnancy may seem overwhelming, but underlying all the advice and recommendations you get in this important message: What You Do Makes a Difference in the specialist stresses.

By making informed choices about alcohol use during pregnancy, you can increase your chances of having a healthy, normal baby, she says.

Good Rain Needed In East Texas

A good rain across East Texas would be extremely helpful to most agricultural producers. The dry conditions are beneficial, however, in helping control the spread of many plant diseases.

According to Dr. James Robinson, an entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, many insects are now infesting gardens and lawns. Several reports of fleas and ticks have been received. These pests are often difficult to control and may require several treatments when the proper insecticide is used.

Insects which cause damage to crops are beginning to appear. The damage done by these insects prevents the proper insecticide from being effective.

County Extension agents throughout East Texas have publications available on the control of various insect pests. A visit or call to the local county extension office could pay big dividends.

Hardwood Book Available

COLLEGE STATION — Hardwood forests cover nearly 7 million acres in Central and East Texas, and these hardwood trees are vital for wildlife, recreation and wood products.

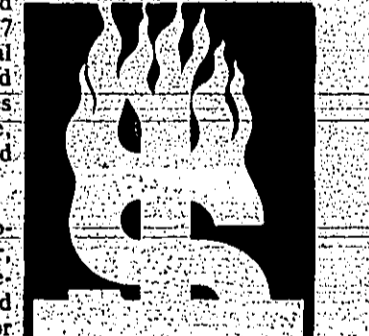
Well-managed hardwood sites can provide all three. However, specific forest management activities depend on the site (upland or bottomland), tree species, and desires of the individual landowner.

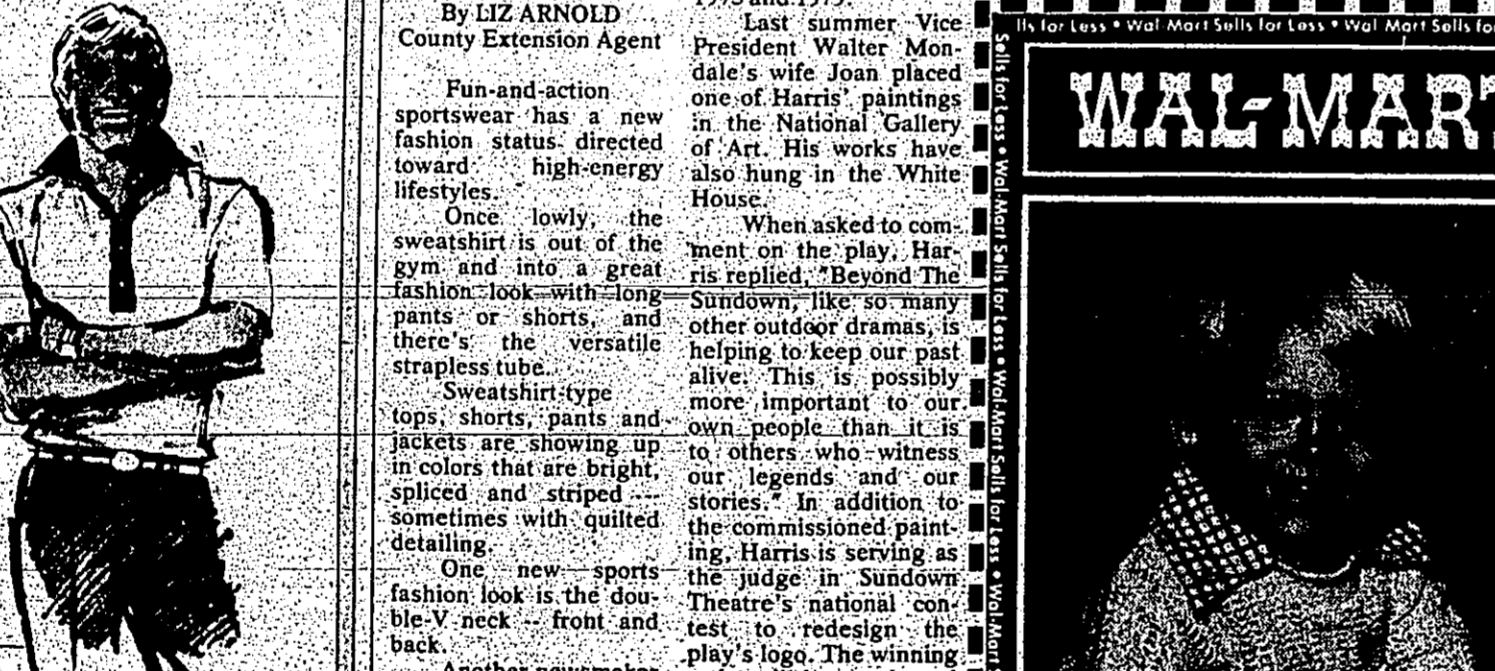

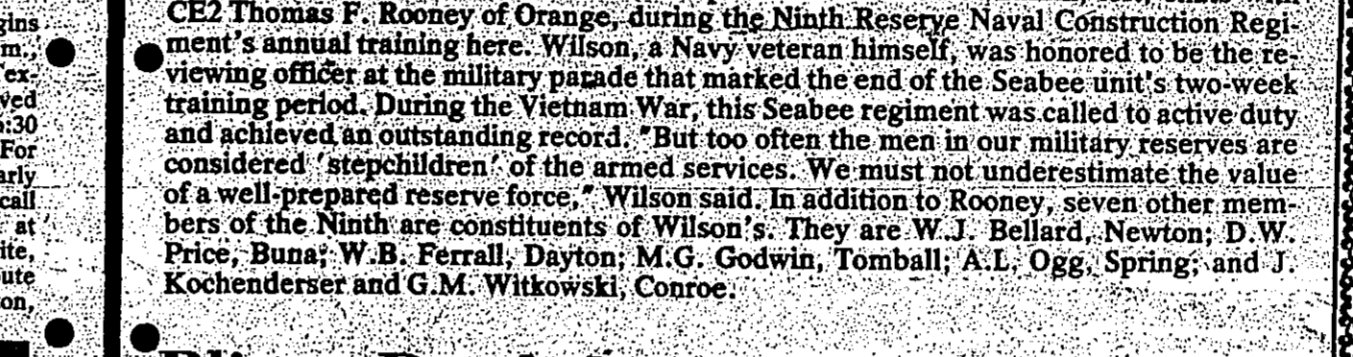

Operate Lawnmowers Carefully

Some lawn mowers just can't cut it when it comes to safety. But even mowers with safety features can be dangerous if operators are careless, tired or in too much of a hurry. Working within inches of a blade, whirling at approximately 230 miles per hour is no time to be careless, the Texas Medical Association (TMA) says.

The United States Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) says good lawn mower design can help prevent accidents that cost about \$253 million and about 77,000 amputated fingers and toes yearly. Among its recommendations, the commission says a walk-behind lawn mower should have a foot guard in back and a deflector shield to shoot debris

downward when a grass catching bag is not being used.

To further prevent injuries, TMA urges mower users to take special care to avoid injuries to hands, feet and legs, which the CPSC says are the most common places hurt. These precautions include shutting off the mower completely before unclogging the discharge chute or blades and making sure that feet and hands are clear of the blade area before starting the motor.

Other important precautions include mowing across a slope instead of up and down it. This mowing method will help improve mower control and footing. Riding mowers should move up and down the slope for better stability.

Footing also can be treacherous on wet grass. Not only does it increase danger, but wet grass is harder to mow, clogs the mower and increases the chance of shock for electric mower users.

One of the major hazards electric mower users face is being shocked because a cord is cut even slightly. Mowing the area nearest the electric outlet first and then working away from it, keeping the cord behind at all times, helps decrease this danger.

TMA says injuries to other parts of the body often occur when small objects hidden in the grass suddenly are hurled with deadly force by a mower. An iron bolt hitting a pregnant woman in the stomach, a piece of wire puncturing a man's

gallbladder and an object cutting a boy's neck artery are just a few of the cases doctors have treated.

Making sure people and pets are far away from the mower is a

good way to avoid such accidents. This precaution is necessary because a mower, even with a grass catcher, can sling objects from any side.

Survey Shows

Home Sales Slump May Be Over

WASHINGTON—Substantial reductions in mortgage interest rates have apparently rekindled home buying activity in most areas of the nation, Dr. Jack Carlson, executive vice president and chief economist of the National Association of Realtors, disclosed recently.

A survey of 22 major metropolitan areas indicates that the sharp decline in existing home sales is behind us, Carlson said. "Respondents said there has been increased buyer interest in resale properties. This interest should give rise to increased sales, which should continue in the months ahead."

Based on the telephone survey, he said it appears that May sales will be about 2.5 million units on a seasonally adjusted annual basis, a moderate increase from the 2.4 million existing home sales in April.

Carlson noted that conditions vary across the country, with the South and the West reporting sales either comparable to April or slightly improved, while metropolitan areas in other regions no longer are reporting steep declines.

"In these areas," he added, "we anticipate improvements in June."

Prior to the sales slump, prices of existing homes were increasing at a double-digit rate—faster, in fact, than the overall inflation rate, Carlson said.

The last six months, however, have seen some moderation in the rate of increase in home prices, he said. "The survey reveals that home prices in general are remaining stable or increasing at a more modest annual rate, equal to about half the rate of inflation."

The survey suggested, he noted that should sales increase further, the inventory of existing home listings would be depleted quickly and the rate of home price appreciation could parallel the overall rate of inflation.

The survey also disclosed that not only are mortgage loans becoming less expensive, but also more available.

Eighty percent uninsured conventional loans are now available in all areas surveyed, Carlson said. "And the supplies of mortgage funds have shown improvements and are deemed quite adequate."

Mortgage interest rates have fallen dramatically in recent weeks, according to most respondents, with average declines of 2 percentage points reported in the areas surveyed. Rates now range from 12 1/4 to 15 percent, with the average being about 13 1/4 percent. In the South, Carlson pointed out, rates have fallen to as low as 12 percent in some areas and average about 13 percent, while in the Northeast, the average appears to be about 14 1/2 percent.

"The recent declines in mortgage interest rates have slashed \$50 to \$100 from the monthly principal and interest payments on a \$50,000, 30-year mortgage," Carlson said. "This has gone a long way toward restoring the affordability of a home purchase for millions of Americans who want to buy their first home or move up the housing ladder."

The telephone survey, conducted by the Economics and Research Division of the National Association of Realtors, involves 22 Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas (SMSA) and the results are based on aggregate responses, not individual areas.

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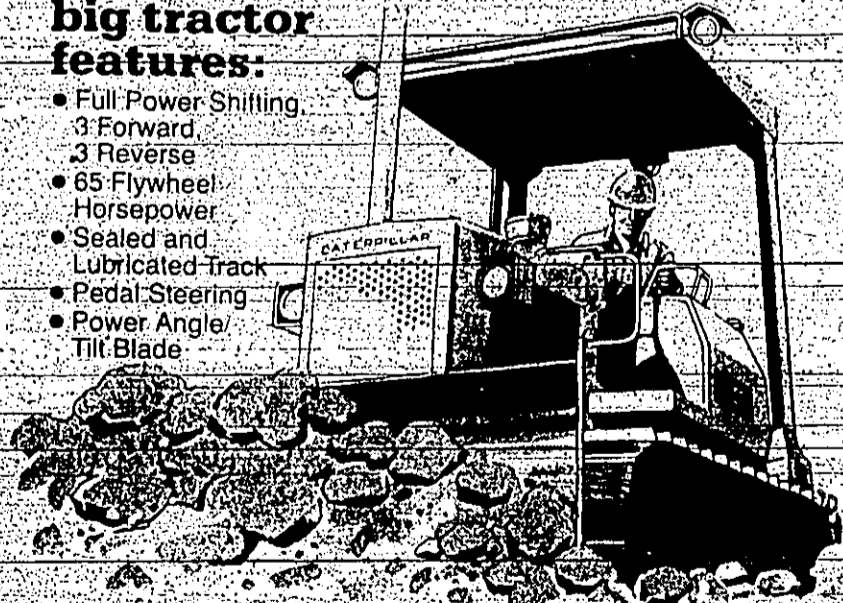
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
