Open Air Market Here

A unique shopping treat for Saturday morning shoppers in Tyler County kicks off this week with the advent of the Tyler County Farmers Market which will be located on South Highway 69 in front of the Wal-Mart and Fairway Food Stores.

According to Howard Spoon of Wal-Mart Store, who in cooperation with Jim Miller of Fairway Foods, is helping to organize the event, the vegetable, fruit and produce growers of Tyler County may set up their stands and park their trucks in the east curb lane of Hwy. 69.

The market will be open from 6:30 a.m. to 12 noon.

According to Spoon, "There is a

need to provide the residents and farmers of Tyler County a centralized location for people to buy and sell their fresh vegetables."

Spoon said further, "As the crops come in, bring them on over," adding, "we realize that because of the recent dry weather it may be somewhat slow starting but we expect it to build rapidly."

Spoon emphasized the fact that farmers may set up any Saturday morning of their choosing and that there would be no permit required to participate. He said that shoppers would find no problem in finding easy parking space to get to the Market.

Military Credited At Workshop Opening

The Tyler County Sheltered Workshop for the Mentally and Physically Handicapped was formally opened in ceremonies Thursday, June 12, by regional and local officials.

The purpose of the Workshop is to train those who are mentally or physically impaired to be productive workers and to develop their skills to the fullest degree possible.

Nacogdoches State Senator, Roy

Blake, cited the cooperation of private citizens and state agencies, tracing the history of the MHMR Workshops to the 1965 House bill which provided the necessary funding. The workshops are certified by the Texas Rehabil-

itation Commission and administered by Deep East Texas MHMR.

The Woodville-based workshop is "the culmination of a dream," according to Tyler County Judge, Allen Sturrock, a member of the Tyler County Mental and Physical Handicap Association, Inc.

The concept originated more than three years ago under the leadership of newspaper publisher John Morrison, then TCM&PHA board president. He was instrumental in organizing the annual hike-bike-a-thon which, along with donations from private citizens in Tyler County, the Tyler County Commissioners Court, the T.L.L. Temple Foundation, Kirby Forest Industries, the Texas Rehabilitation Commission and MHMR, provided the funding for the project.

It was as a result of Morrison's invitation, on behalf of the TCM&PHA that 30 members of Company C, 34th Engineer Battalion, Combat Ready 5th Infantry Division (Mechanized), Ft. Polk, La. volunteered hundreds of man hours in the remodeling of the old VFW Post at 203 Willow Street.

Members of the military unit were on hand at the dedication under the command of Major General Joseph T. Palastra, to receive certificates of commendation from the Association for their contribution.

Also attending the event were Dr. Wayne Lawrence, executive director of Deep East Texas Mental Health Mental Retardation Services in Lufkin; Robert Goodspeed, regional director of MHMR from Sugarland and a crowd of approximately 75 persons. A reception hosted by the Tyler County MHMR Advisory Council followed the ribbon-cutting by Palastra, Blake, Sturrock, Tyler County Commissioner Mazie Riley, current president of the TCM&PHA, Woodville Mayor Doug Tolbert, Lawrence and Bob Boykin, MHMR Advisory Council chairman.

Workshop clients are already at work washing cars, reclaiming metal from old telephone parts in contract work for Western Electric, and performing routine maintenance tasks in and around the workshop.

The Association is actively soliciting contracts for local job and service commitments.

Spurger FM92 Nears Completion Says Young

Mr. F.C. Young, District Engineer for the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation has announced that the project for reconstruction of F.M. 92 from Spurger north 7.29 miles is nearing completion.

The completed work includes a continuous left turn lane through the community of Spurger. This type of roadway is provided in those areas that experience a high incidence of vehicles turning left. The left turn lane will allow motorists to get out of the main stream of traffic while waiting for a safe gap to turn. This will eliminate

the need for vehicles to stop in the main travelway and should reduce accidents and improve traffic flow.

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation points out that it is illegal and dangerous to use this center lane as a passing lane or as an acceleration lane to enter the main lanes. It should be used only as a turning lane for traffic turning left.

H. Vaughan Porter Co., Inc. is the contractor for this project and the contract amount is \$1,512,012.25. The Resident Engineer in charge of construction is H.P.R. Smith of Jasper.

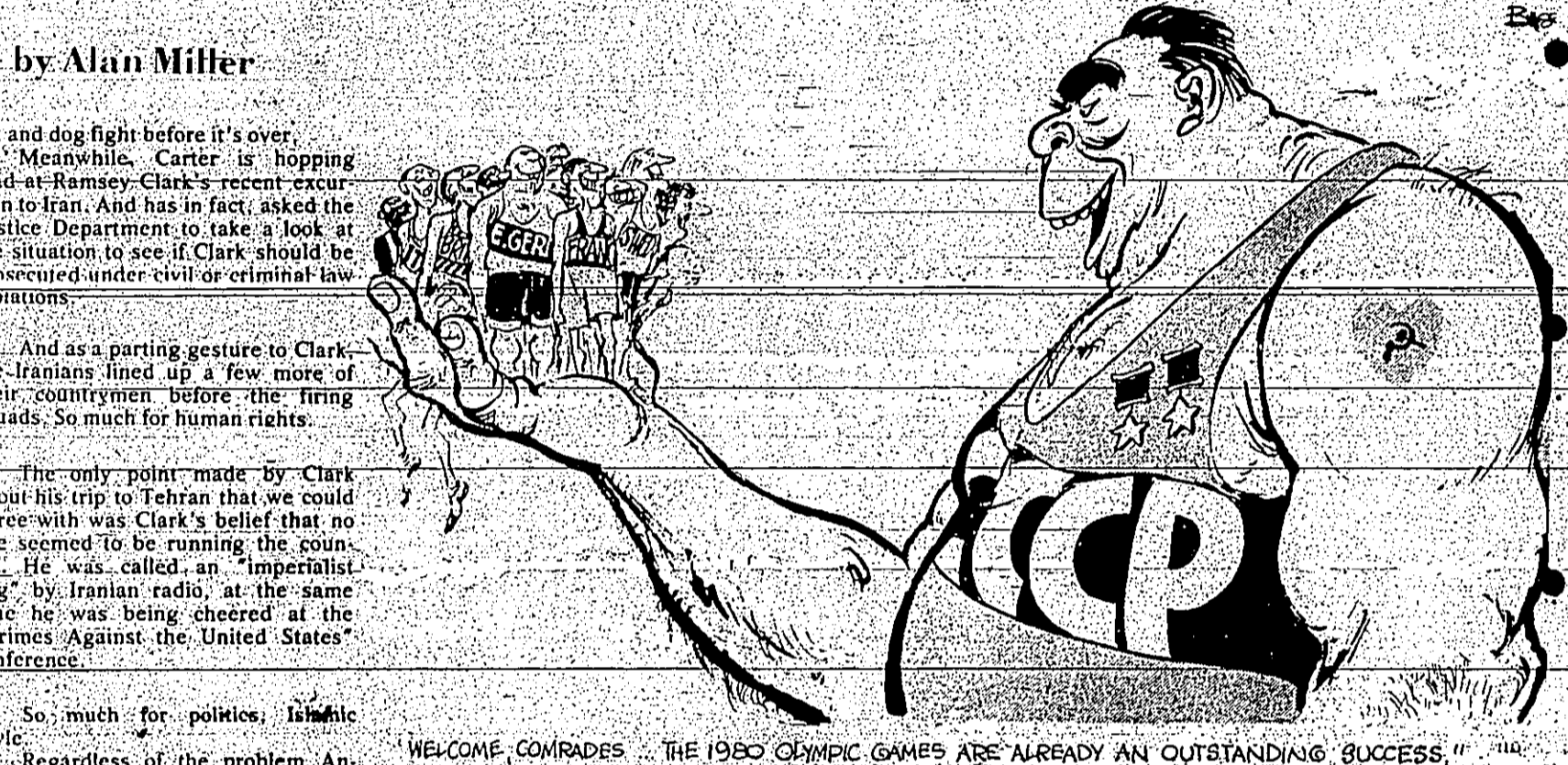

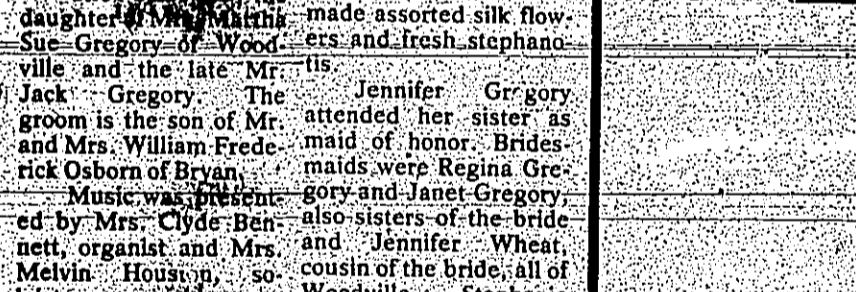

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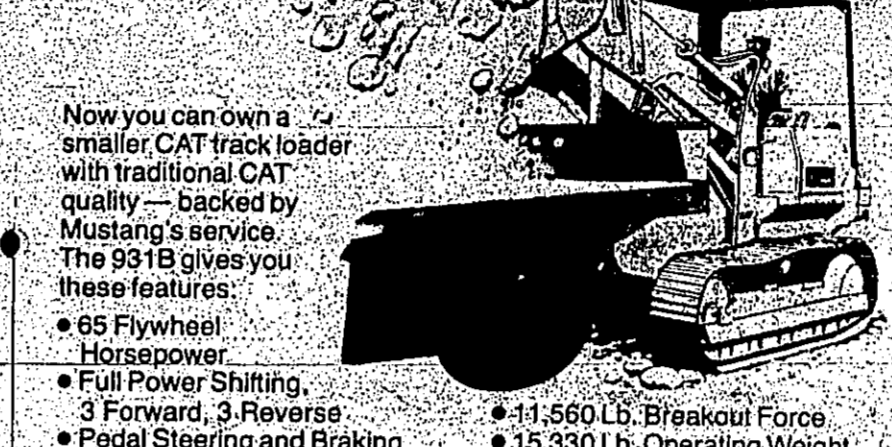

Initial response to the State's first television advertising campaign exceeded projections. And the Woodville/Tyler County area will be a direct beneficiary through the East Texas Chamber of Commerce's direct mail program.

Friday, June 6 was the last of consecutive 18-day TV ad schedule in eight nearby markets. 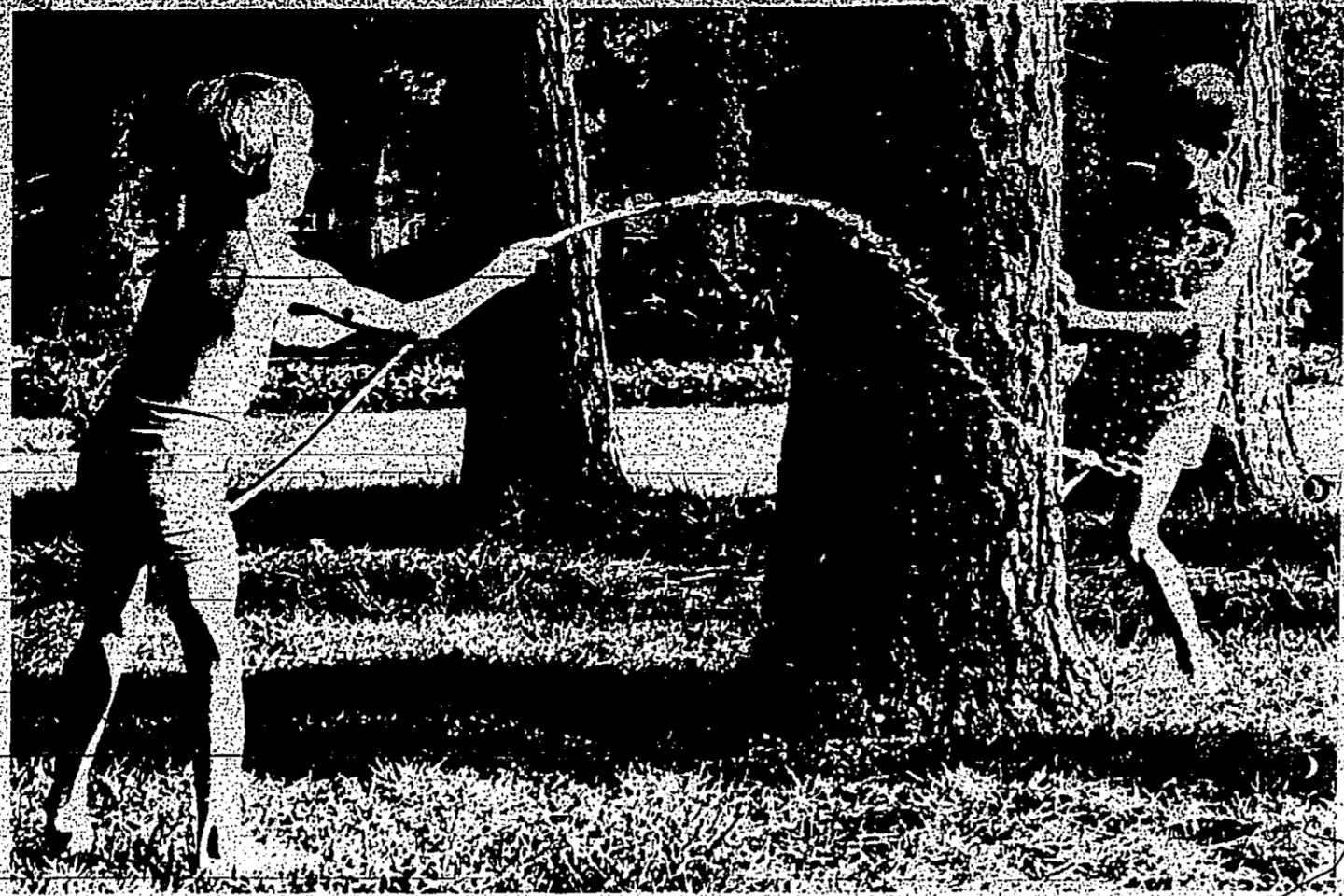

Space Vegetables Properly In Garden

If your spring garden is making good growth but looks crowded, maybe it's time to do some thinning. Thinning vegetable plants can mean more fresh produce for your dining table.

Gardeners often plant more seeds than necessary to insure enough healthy plants for a productive stand. However, too many plants in a given area can lead to overcrowding. Overcrowding can result in unhealthy and unproductive plants.

Therefore, thinning is usually necessary for proper spacing and maximum production of your vegetable plants. And plants usually need thinning periodically.

For example, if snap beans are to be thinned 3 to 4 inches apart, thin the plants 1 1/2 to 2 inches apart when they are young. As they become crowded, thin them again to do some thinning. When thinning larger plants, cut them at ground level instead of pulling them from the ground. This will protect the root systems of neighboring plants.

The size of mature vegetable plants dictates the distance needed between them. Larger plants such as broccoli, cabbages, cantaloupes, squashes and tomatoes require at least 24 inches between them. Smaller vegetables such as beans, beets, carrots, lettuce and onions need only 2 to 6 inches of space for maximum production.

Department Evaluates Water Quality

AUSTIN — A key activity of the Texas Department of Water Resources is the collection and evaluation of ground water data for both quantity and quality.

Historically, the Department and its predecessor agencies have measured water wells annually to determine the number of feet below land surface of the water level, and have collected data on the quality of water in wells.

Currently, water level measurements are made in a statewide network of carefully selected

6,800 wells and water quality is determined in over 1,000 wells each year.

Personnel of the Department's collection and evaluation section of the Data and Engineering Services Division measure the water levels in all but 1,500 of the 6,800 wells. Personnel of the three underground water conservation districts in the High Plains of Texas provide the Department with the measurements of about 1,500 of the wells in their respective areas.

The data are stored in the Texas Natural

Resources Information System from where it is made available to the public and other State agencies. In addition, Department personnel help the public and other State agencies in individual inquiries, and to support the Planning and Development Division staff who continuously update State water planning and projections.

The information is essential in the Department's delineation of the extent of groundwater formations, and determination of the occurrence and the availability of the water.

Some 50 of the 5,200 water-level monitoring wells which are serviced by TDWR staff are equipped with continuous water-level recorders. These wells are strategically located around the state and the continuously recorded data are correlated with the annual measurements of the Department personnel.

Department personnel measure the water level by coating the first tape with blue (Builders) chalk and then lowering the tape down the well. Sediment in the well is noted and the tape is lowered into the well to determine the number of feet from land surface to water level.

The once-a-year measurement of the wells is done from mid-November through March, normally a period of lowest stress on the aquifers.

For more than 30 years, the Department and its predecessor agencies have collected samples from wells to determine the quality of the groundwater. Among properties routinely determined are concentrations of calcium, silica, magnesium, sulfate, bicarbonate, sodium, sulfate, chloride, fluoride, pH (acidity-alkalinity), total dissolved solids, and temperature. The number of wells sampled has now grown to over 6,000 with about 1,000 sampled each year.

An important data collection activity concerning the State surface water supplies is sample of suspended sediment in the major streams of the State.

At some 28 stream gaging stations, a water sample is taken every day of the year. Part-time samplers in the local area each day lower the float and collect usually from a highway bridge, into the stream to a depth of about one

Wilson Moves To Protect Coal Users

WASHINGTON — Congressman Charles Wilson of Lufkin has already made clear his opposition to the Rail Act of 1980.

Recently, he said he will go one step further by joining Austin Congressman J.J. Pickle who intends to introduce a bill that will protect Texas utility customers from skyrocketing freight rates for shipping western coal to Texas.

In 1975, Congress passed legislation mandating the "conversion" from oil and gas to coal. Texas utility plants that are just following the law are suddenly finding themselves paying outrageous rail rates to get the coal, and they in turn pass that expense to the "consumer," Wilson said.

Since 1977, freight rates on the Burlington Northern Railroad route

Try Summer Housecleaning This Year

So you missed cleaning this year after all, rainy days aren't the best incentive to your heaviest energy.

There do come "summer" housecleaning, and this year make it conservation cleaning with energy-saving devices.

Pay a lot of attention to your heaviest energy users — such as air conditioners and major appliances. That includes the clothes washer and dryer and the refrigerator and freezer.

Energy-saving cleaning also means maintenance — like driveway tightening or lubrication — to help your appliances work more efficiently.

Start with the air conditioner. Inspect the filter. Clean it or replace it every month during the cooling season.

Make sure the condenser is clean. If not, they will reduce efficiency. Regular lubrication is important here, too, if required by the manufacturer.

Have a professional repairman check the air conditioner every other year.

Here are some other energy-saving things you can do:

Keep the condenser coils on your refrigerator and freezer clean — to help them work their best during the hot summer months when demands on them are heaviest.

Think about repairing the walls with light

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Wilson Supports Productivity Increase

WASHINGTON — By making it easier for small business to retain and re-invest more of their own profits, Congress could encourage economic growth and job creation, Congressman Charles Wilson of Lufkin said.

Wilson is co-sponsoring the "Small Business Capital Retention and Expansion Act of 1980," which would allow small businesses to retain capital by putting it into a reserve fund to be used for business expansion.

The single most important economic goal we have is increasing productivity. But as the rate of inflation increases, the "tougher" it becomes for small businesses to borrow money to pump back into investment.

Wilson said this bill would allow an eligible small business to place its profits up to a maxi-

imum of \$600,000 in a reserve fund. The business would be able to take a 50 percent tax credit on that amount. And the money could be invested in any number of things, new equipment, personnel, new facilities and even research, Wilson said.

A recent study by the National Foundation shows that sales are three times greater for small companies that invest in general innovation. That can only lead us to a healthier economy in general.

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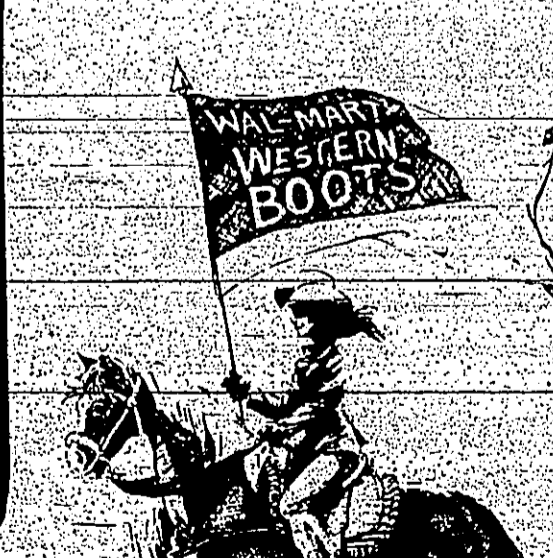
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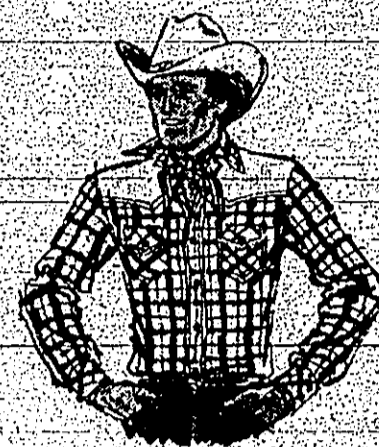
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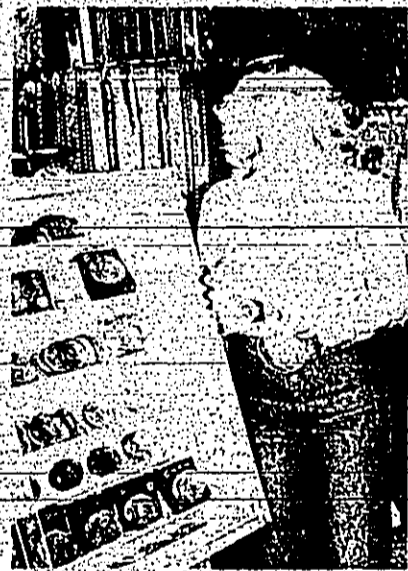


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
